Short-Course for Farmers on CBC-TV

In an hour each morning, Monday through Friday, January 6-10, farmers in the Prairie Provinces can learn the latest about managing their farms, on **THIS BUSINESS OF FARMING**

FARMERS THROUGHOUT the Prairie Provinces will have the opportunity the week of January 6 to 10 to learn the latest about farm management, without leaving their own homes. *This Business of Farming*, an agricultural short-course, will be seen on all CBC affiliated stations in the prairies from Monday to Friday of that week, 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. each day. The series will be produced by the CBC in co-operation with the Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta departments of agriculture and the three prairie universities.

The 1964 edition of *This Business of Farming* will be patterned after the series of television programs produced and telecast in Manitoba in January of 1962 and 1963. The prime objective of the telecasts is to bring to prairie farmers, through television, the latest agricultural information. The 1964 programs will feature expert opinions on agricultural production, as well as farm management principles, and will outline how the modern farmer can best utilize the services and materials available to him.

All three prairie provincial departments of agriculture are interested in promoting greater use of television for agricultural extension programs. This interest was greatly encouraged by the results of a comprehensive audience survey carried out in Manitoba immediately after the first presentation of *This Business of Farming* in January, 1962. At that time the CBC research department co-ordinated an audience survey that brought forth many interesting aspects that supported the use of television for short courses.

Results of the 1962 survey showed that 63 per cent of the farm operators in Manitoba with television sets watched all or part of the five-day series of programs. High audience interest was maintained throughout the whole series, with an estimated total audience for each of the five days ranging from 19,000 to 23,000 adults.

Course content of this year's series will include soils, forage crop management, and beef cattle production. The fifth and final day of the course will be separate for each province—the Alberta program will feature farm and home management. Saskatchewan viewers will see how to reorganize and improve the farmstead, while the Manitoba program will deal with career guidance.

Co-hosts of the series will be Lionel Moore, Regional Supervisor of the CBC Farm Department, and Professor Clay Gilson, Agricultural Economist, University of Manitoba.

Topic of the Monday, January 6, telecast is *Soils and Man*. Agricultural experts will tell the effect of climate on land resources, discuss land use in Western Canada, and take a searching look at the value of summerfallowing.

On Tuesday, January 7, *Forage for Today* is the title. The program will deal with pasture management, the relative value of forage and cereal crops, and other methods of turning a profit through the use of forage.

The Wednesday, January 8, program carries the title, *Tomorrow's Beef*. Experts discuss cow-calf enterprise, feed resources for the cow herd, and desirable equipment for efficient handling of beef cattle.

On Thursday, January 9, *Feeding for Profit* is the subject. Discussed are: sources of credit for cattle raisers; the buying of beef breeding stock versus the raising of feeders; setting up the feed lot; and beef marketing.

Friday, January 10, Manitoba viewers will see a program entitled *Career Explorations*. It reveals the opportunities for rural young people, on or off the farm, and the steps in making career decisions.

On the same day, Saskatchewan stations will carry a program entitled *Improved Family Living*. It is a

George Bernard Shaw's

HAD GEORGE BERNARD SHAW not been a wonderfully endowed playwright, acute and caustic drama critic, and refreshingly biased music critic, he might well have made a career as a writer of tracts, for few pamphleteers have shown such ability as he to propagandize in a forceful yet sociable manner. It has been said that Shaw's prose is "a model of the art of conducting unfair arguments" and that his skill lay in "the transmuting of disruptive debate into a kind of classical Mozartian music."

Though some of the arguments and causes espoused in his plays are now somewhat dated, his verbal wit is perennially irresistible, whether he is tilting against marriage, God, capitalism, socialism, or just the business of living itself.

Shaw's dazzling language sometimes obscures the fact that his arguments often leave something to be desired; and the frequent and abrupt changes of his own attitudes towards ideas and customs are similarly concealed by the glitter, though they emerge in his habit of talking on both sides of a question, then capping or sinking his own arguments with counter-arguments. Consider, for example, the following two quotations. The first is from a long preface, amounting in length to a separate

book, to an edition of *Back to Methuselah*. It was written in 1921 and revised in 1944. "Our schools," writes Shaw, "teach the morality of feudalism corrupted by commercialism, and hold up the military conqueror, the robber baron, and the profiteer, as models of the illustrious and the successful. In vain do the prophets who see through this imposture preach and teach a better gospel; the individuals whom they convert are doomed to pass away in a few years, and the new generations are dragged back in the schools to the morality of the 15th century."

But in *Major Barbara*, Shaw puts into the mouth of Andrew Under-shaft, the munitions magnate, these words: "If you good people prefer preaching and shirking to buying my weapons and fighting, don't

blame me. I can make cannons; I cannot make courage and conviction. . . . (The seven deadly sins are) food, clothing, firing, rent, taxes, respectability and children. Nothing can lift those seven millstones from Man's neck but money; and the spirit cannot soar until the millstones are lifted."

It is *Major Barbara* that concerns us this week, for the 1905 play is being presented on CBC-TV's *Festival* on Wednesday, January 8, at 9:30 p.m. Produced by George McCowan, it stars Frances Hyland in the title role, with Gillie Fenwick as her father, Andrew Under-shaft; Eric House as Snobby Price; Frank Perry as Adolphus Cusins; Moya Fenwick as Lady Britomart; John Horton as Charles Lomax; Tom Kneebone as Stephen Under-shaft; Michael Learned as Sarah, and Ruth Springford as Mrs. Baines.

The principal message of *Major Barbara* is that poverty is a crime, the root of all evil. Like other of Shaw's plays, there is little story, little action. It is an intellectual circus in which everything depends on the interplay of various types of character and of thought. Under-shaft, the kindly and philosophical cannon manufacturer, expounds Shaw's witty sermon; his daughter Barbara is the Salvation Army lass who has to be converted to it, who eventually sheds her uniform when she begins to understand conventional philanthropy. Side issues concern war and "conscience money," but the play's main attack is centred on poverty as the great threat to an orderly and decent society.

BEDLAM GALORE

for Two or More

EVERY SO OFTEN, rambunctious French-Roumanian playwright Eugene Ionesco makes another sortie into the theatre of the absurd, the realm of man at the end of his tether, and raps his audience sharply across the knuckles for making the tether so short that it banishes mystery from life and poetry and deeply-felt meaning from expression. His latest effort to awaken us, a farce called *Bedlam Galore, For Two or More*, will be presented on CBC-TV's *Quest* this Tuesday night, January 7, at 10:30 p.m. The translation is by Bernard Frechman. Production is by Mario Prizek.

This time, Ionesco's protagonists are He (played by Jack Creley) and She (played by Norma Renault), who, after 17 years of marriage-gone-sour, are living in considerably less than domestic bliss in an anonymous flat. With savage relentlessness they try to destroy each other with every bit of logic and emotion they can summon up. Suddenly their routine bickering is interrupted by the noises of warfare outside their room, and their private discords are paralleled by the discords in society, invading their private background in the form of grenades and shell splinters spilling through the walls and windows and ricocheting around their room.

The bombardment finally destroys their house. It collapses around them, and one of the nameless armies in the fight wins a victory, celebrates it, and hangs the losers in the attic. And all the while He and She continue their endless, pointless arguments.

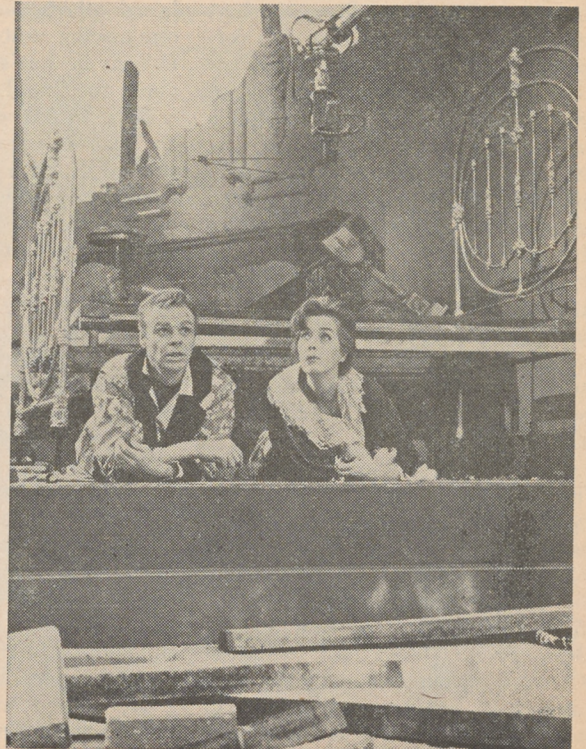
Sets for the production have been designed — and will be methodically destroyed — by Robert Lawson.

A good deal of Ionesco's chastising is aimed at intellectuals, whom he considers to be the most bigoted, ignorant, and blind members of our species. He thinks "they're not in touch with anything. That fact exasperates them. They want power, but no one tells them anything. The psychology of the crowd applies most especially to intellectuals who find in the company of other intellectuals all sorts of alibis for their weaknesses, for their ineffectiveness and their fears."

Ionesco insists emphatically that he is not an intellectual. He's more of a thinker. And he thinks that one of the big problems in the world today is the fact that people are rarely aware of what they're actually saying—they're too foolish or afraid to marshal their ideas and speech, and so they mouth all sorts of idiotic things instead of what they really feel or mean. This way nobody ever really reaches anyone else, and life is a constant, frustrating, floundering-around in jargon.

When Ionesco talks of the difficulties of communicating, he's not excepting himself. He writes, he says, with great difficulty and reluctance, which may come as a surprise to those who think he's always knee-deep in scripts and forever bubbling over with diatribes aimed at the bumbling man-in-the-street. Ionesco once arranged to be locked in his room so he'd *have* to sit down with a ballpoint pen and some loose-leaf graph paper and grind out another play. But his friends took pity on him and rescued him through a window!

He doesn't mean that he thinks it's impossible for

Alistair Cooke:

THE MAN FROM MID-ATLANTIC

*Tony Thomas turns the tables
on journalist-TV host Alistair Cooke,
making him subject of
an interview Sunday, January 5,
on CBC Radio's PROJECT '64*



IN THE REALM of cultural communication, Alistair Cooke is something of a phenomenon. Besides being a political pundit, critic, host of the TV series *Omnibus*, and correspondent for *The Guardian* of Manchester, he is a jazz pianist of considerable ability, and has fallen so deeply in love with the U.S. that he became an American citizen and has been interpreting his adopted country and its people for Britishers for many years, with wit, illumination and persuasiveness. A tall, lean man of 55 with thinning grey hair and hawk-like features, he's a persistent and articulate talker, never tense, hurried or pompous, and seemingly interested and delighted by everything.

Recently freelance broadcaster Tony Thomas cornered the suave Mr. Cooke and recorded a rather unusual interview with him, which CBC Radio's *Project '64* presents on Sunday afternoon, January 5, at 5:00 p.m., under the title of *The Man From Mid-Atlantic*. Getting Cooke to discuss his many interests was easy, but persuading him to talk about himself was most diffi-

cult, Thomas reports, so he used Cooke's love of music as a focal point in their discussion. Cooke is heard playing and singing jazz, reminiscing nostalgically about the U.S. as he has seen it, and talking about the world around him.

Born in Manchester, the son of an insurance salesman, Cooke studied English literature at Cambridge, and after graduating stayed on to teach and to edit the university magazine for two years. Then he won a Commonwealth Fellowship on which he studied drama at Yale and Harvard for two years, and found the U.S. "as exciting as a nine-ring circus." "It's supposed to be standardized," he says, "but I find tremendous variations among individual Americans and the life of different regions. Then there's the spoken language, which is always changing and always alive. And there's the American flair for colour—in taste, mood, on the surface and underneath. And the endless fascination of American history, especially Western history."

He settled in the U.S. permanently in 1937, became a citizen,

and has been writing about his fellow Americans with unrestrained affection and insight ever since, made all the more effective by his gifts for polished prose and humorous turn of phrase, and for getting right to the heart of the matter. He has crossed the country a score of times, and amazes native-born Americans with his fantastic array of facts and impressions about small towns and little-known customs.

He explains: "If you are a goldfish or if you swim with them long enough, it is impossible to say what are the characteristics of a goldfish. But if somebody slaps a mackerel into a goldfish bowl, you can see at once all sorts of things goldfish have and the other things lack." In telling the British about the Americans, he isn't blind to the faults of their side. He admits that the U.S. is a little too obsessed with bathtubs, and that no Britain would spend 10 minutes talking to a man and call it being "in conference," but is just as quick to point out that Americans "don't believe that whatever is uncomfortable is good for the character."

He Broke Rules to Succeed

David Ogilvy is subject of
two programs on THE SIXTIES,
Sundays, January 5 and 12, on CBC-TV

A FORMER CHEF in the Hotel Majestic in Paris, who once sold stoves door-to-door in Scotland, and ran a tobacco farm in Pennsylvania, has parlayed a \$6,000 shoestring advertising agency into a \$59 million dollar business in 14 years by breaking most of the rules for how to succeed in the ad game.

In two programs to be seen on Sundays, January 5 and 12, at 5:00 p.m., CBC-TV's *The Sixties* takes a look at this renegade Englishman, David Mackenzie Ogilvy, whom *Time* magazine calls "the most sought-after wizard in the advertising business today."

The first interview with Ogilvy will reveal how he got started in the ad game, and how he has made an extraordinary success of it. In the second, he offers his unorthodox views on advertising.

"If I had behaved in a more professional way," he says in his best-selling book, *Confessions of An Advertising Man*, "it would have taken me 20 years to arrive. I had neither the time nor the money to wait. I was poor, unknown, and in a hurry."

He was born in 1911 in West Horsley, England, studied at Fettes College in Edinburgh, and flunked out of Christ Church, Oxford, after which he settled down in the kitchens of the Majestic, where his greatest thrill was "watching the President of France eating a souffle I'd cooked. He died a week later."

Shortly after that, though not because of it, Ogilvy took off his chef's hat and went to Scotland to sell stoves, and to develop his ideas about selling—giving the potential

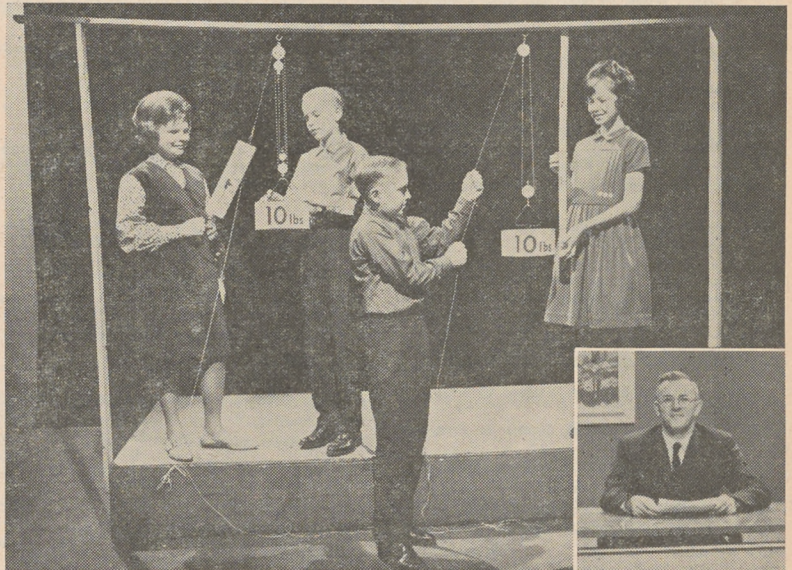

Faust, by Charles Gounod, founded upon Goethe's tragedy.

CAST: Faust—tenor Barry Morel; Mephistopheles—bass Cesare Siepi; Marguerite—soprano Anna Moffo; Siebel—soprano Janis Martin; conducted by Fausto Cleva.

Act I. Faust's study. In despair at completely solving the secrets of science, Faust is about to take poison, but desists on hearing Easter carols. However, he calls on Satan, who shows him a vision of Marguerite, whereupon the old man sells Satan his soul in exchange for transformation into a young man.

Act II. Before the city gate. Students sing, as it is a Festival day. Valentin arrives and gazes upon his sister's picture. Siebel promises to protect Valentin's sister while the soldier is in the field. Mephistopheles, mingling with the students, prophesies to Siebel that never again will he carry a bouquet to Marguerite, as all the flowers he touches will fade. Valentin with his friends attacks the jeering Mephistopheles, but the Fiend draws a magic circle around himself that fends off their weapons. The people return and dance. Faust offers his arm as escort to the blushing Marguerite, and is refused.

Act III. Marguerite's garden. Siebel picks a bouquet for Marguerite, but the flowers fade. Then he dips his hands into holy water, and through this expedient is able to place this offering at Marguerite's door. Faust and Mephistopheles appear, and the latter leaves a casket of jewels at Marguerite's door, then departs with Faust. When Marguerite discovers the jewels, she is dazzled by them and in delight adorns herself. Martha appears, then Faust with Mephistopheles. Faust declares his love to Marguerite, and she loses her heart to him.

Act IV. A street. The soldiers return from war. Valentin enters his house. Mephisto arrives with Faust and scoffingly serenades Marguerite. Valentin rushes out of the house and is stabbed by Faust in a duel which ensues. The people assemble in excitement. Marguerite sorrowfully bends over the dying Valentin, who curses her as a wanton.

Act V. The Walpurgis revel, and Mephisto takes Faust to join them, but when Marguerite's image appears, Faust orders Satan to convey him to his beloved. (This scene may be omitted.)

Change of scene: Marguerite in prison, having become insane. Faust, trying to

A Developer, Not a Pioneer

A WORK COMMISSIONED by the CBC from Montreal composer Kelsey Jones — *Prelude, Fuguetta and Finale*, for harpsichord, violin and 'cello—will be given its first performance by the Hugh McLean Consort of Vancouver on *CBC Sunday Night*, January 5, at 10:35 on radio.

Dr. Jones, born in 1922 in South Norwalk, Connecticut, has lived in Canada since 1945 and is a Canadian citizen. Apart from his work as a composer, harpsichordist with the Baroque Trio, and pianist, he teaches counterpoint, fugue, harmony, history, analysis, and the

harpsichord in the Faculty of Music at McGill University.

"I became conscious of music quite early in life," Jones recalls, "or I should say my parents did, when they saw me tapping with a knife and fork, keeping time with the radio, and I was given over right away to a piano teacher."

While attending Mount Allison University in Sackville, N.B., Jones began to study composition, harmony and counterpoint with Harold Hamer, who recognized his young pupil's ability and suggested he concentrate on composing.

He taught at Mount Allison and conducted the college orchestra, studied in Toronto with Dr. Healey Willan, Sir Ernest MacMillan and Leo Smith, and in Paris with Nadia Boulanger, and received his doctorate in Toronto in 1951. He conducted the Saint John Symphony Orchestra for four years, and composed his first symphonic work for it.

"My attitude to composition isn't that of a pioneer," he says. "I don't aim to startle the world by writing in the extreme, or to create new 'effects.' In the necessary attempt to break down the traditions of the past, many new and wonderfully exciting innovations have been made. Many of these have not been fully developed, to my way of thinking. That's where my interest as a composer lies."

Naval Battle On Lake Erie

ONE OF THE most significant and desperate naval engagements of the War of 1812 was fought by deep water men in the shallow fresh water of Lake Erie. The Americans had been doing pretty well at sea, but the war in the west had reached a stalemate, and they were in grave danger of losing their western territory unless they could depend on using British-held Lake Erie as a highway for supplies and troops.

And so young Admiral Perry came hunting for the British with a fleet of jerry-built ships. He found what he was looking for off Put-in-Bay on South Bass Island—five makeshift men-of-war commanded by a brisk young Scottish Regular Navy officer, Captain Robert H. Barclay. A gentle little breeze drew the ships together in a three-hour engagement that went badly for Perry at first but ended with the fall of the British flags, the wounding of Captain Barclay, and the changing of the whole complexion of the war in the west.

The story of the preparation of the five gallant little ships, the men who trekked from Halifax on foot to man them, the charming, attractive and willful widow who strongly influenced their fate on the inland sea, and the aftermath of the engagement, is told with excitement, humour and deep understanding of ships and sailors, in *His Majesty's Five*, a new radio drama by Joseph Schull which J. Frank Willis will produce on *CBC Sunday Night*, January 5, at 8:30 p.m.

presentation on the principles of farmstead improvement, ways of beautifying the farmstead, and an outline of the methods of improving the farm home for greater efficiency.

Friday's program on Alberta stations will deal with *Farm and Home Management*—Providing a Profitable and Satisfactory Farm Income. The program shows how several farm families in the Olds district of Central Alberta have built up their farms

and improved their financial returns through an improved management program, developed as members of a farm and home management association. Through this association, they have learned the value of farm records in permitting wise management decisions, and have become acquainted with the assistance available to them through their district home economists and agriculturists.

customer all the information he could about the product so that in the end it sold itself. He tried his hand at tobacco farming, became associate director of the Gallup Audience Research Institute at Princeton, and served during the Second World War in the British security and diplomatic services.

In 1948 he decided to have a fling at advertising, and it wasn't long before his bold approach to the job was raising eyebrows. "A good advertisement is one which sells the product without drawing attention to itself," he insists, and relies on basic, old-fashioned rules of advertising. "The two most powerful words you can use in a headline are *free* and *new*. You can seldom use *free*, but you can always use *new*—if you try hard enough. . . .

His best-known successes are probably a well-shirted gentleman with a patched eye, a bearded Commander drinking tonic water, and a luxury limousine so silent that "At Sixty Miles an Hour the Loudest Noise Comes from the Electric Clock."

humans to communicate. "This is one of the most idiotic fashionable phrases," he says. "Communication is not only possible, it is easy, sometimes even too easy. What I'm concerned about is that people are too lazy, too indolent to make the *effort* to communicate; that the tools of communication, language, have been allowed to fossilize into cliches and have lost the power to serve as instruments for genuine communication. Mind you, I also think that there can be too much communication. At times one does not want to be compelled to communicate. Solitude is sometimes a necessary and very agreeable state to be in.

"I am convinced that if we make the effort required we *can* communicate with any human being, however different his background or his cultural environment may be. But it does require a real effort to make contact, real human sympathy, real sincerity and imagination. That is why I am suspicious of all conformisms, all ready-made formulas. They come between human beings and make communication more difficult by substituting dead slogans for genuine human utterance. . . . By being ruthlessly

frank about our own feelings and obsessions we can achieve real communication, and so the most personal and most private can also be the most genuinely social, collective matter, because it may help other people to deal with their own private fears and obsessions."

Ionesco was born in Roumania 51 years ago but has lived in Paris since early childhood, so French is his second language. His English is almost non-existent, but he loves London, because he finds it kind and comfortable. He has visited it often, as well as other European capitals, because he likes to follow his plays around and tell off critics and producers when they don't please him.

Although he can be quite shy at times, he adores putting on an act, the more macabre the better, and thinks nothing of lunging into a room as a hanged man with his tongue lolling out. A few years ago, during the intermission at Collins Music Hall in London, he raised a few eyebrows by prancing around the bar as a matador, using his program as a cape to tease his friend, who was advancing menacingly as the bull. "Who do you think you are, Australians?" demanded a shocked usherette. And ever since, when Ionesco indulges in a mood of fantasy, he explains it away with: "Je suis *Australien!*"

Composers Invited To Enter Competition

EVERY TWO YEARS, the *Grand Prix* of *La Communauté radio-phonique des programmes de langue française* is offered by the national French-language radio networks of France, Belgium, Switzerland and Canada for a musical work with integral text for voice, written especially for radio.

The first Canadian entry in this biennial competition was submitted by the CBC in the spring of 1963. The work was Pierre Mercure's *Psaume pour abri*, a cantata for soloist, choirs, orchestra, percussion and electronic instruments. It did not, however, win the *Grand Prix*,

which was finally awarded jointly to Swiss and French entrants.

The 1965 *Grand Prix* competition, for the *Prix Paul Gibson*, is now open and Canadian composers are invited to participate by submitting their manuscripts to the CBC. The closing date for such submissions is May 31, 1964, and on that date Canadian entries will be delivered to a three-man jury selected by the Corporation. The Canadian work judged the best will then be recorded by the CBC and entered in the final competition for the *Prix Paul Gibson*, which has a cash value equivalent to 10,000 Swiss francs, or approximately \$2,500.

Composers wishing to take part should note that the prize-winning work will be broadcast on French-language radio. Consequently, texts must be in French and translations from other languages cannot be accepted. Works should be of 30 to 60 minutes' duration.

Since they are created specifically for radio, works may feature any sound effects or arrangements the composers desire, such as, for example, those achieved electronically by Pierre Mercure in his *Psaume pour abri*.

For what the CBC hopes will be a large number of Canadian composers wishing to participate, complete rules for the *Grand Prix* competition are available from: Mr. Roy Royal, Director of Musical Programs (French Network), CBC, Box 6000, Montreal, P.Q.

New Series On CBC-TV's Heritage

CBC TELEVISION'S religious series, *Heritage*, begins a new series of 13 programs on Sunday, January 5, and moves to a new time: 3:00 p.m. The programs will include studies of Church attitudes towards some contemporary customs and problems, profiles of religious leaders, and programs on the history of the Church in Canada.

The January 5 telecast, which originates in Winnipeg, will recall the days of old-time camp meetings in the Prairies, through narration and music of the period. A similar historical program will be seen January 26, when CBC Halifax presents a story of how the Church came to St. John River.

Profiles of two leading churchmen, a Roman Catholic and a Presbyterian, will be presented on February 9 and 16, and a study of the life and work of the Sisters of Charity, a Roman Catholic order, will be seen on February 23.

A discussion of Church attitudes to health insurance, including statements from religious leaders on the subject will be telecast January 12, under the title *My Brother's Keeper*. Later in the season similar programs will deal with credit buying, the treatment of Canada's Indians, and the use of liquor.

Explorations and National Schools

Begin Series On Canada's Explorers

THE FIRST commercial traveller to drop in on Canada was John Cabot, a man who had done business in Mecca and was anxious to get back there by the shortest possible route. That was in 1497, at the height of a historical period marked by restless searches for new horizons in both the spiritual and physical worlds.

A dramatized film study of the stubborn Venetian adventurer-explorer-businessman who made the first officially recorded visit to what is now Canada will be presented on CBC Television this week under

the title *John Cabot, Man of the Renaissance*. It is the first in a series of programs about Canadian explorers, to be seen on two separate CBC-TV program series. The Cabot film will be shown on *Explorations*, Monday, January 6, at 10:30 p.m.; and on *National School Telecasts*, Thursday, January 9, at 10:00 a.m. Other explorers to be covered in the school series are Samuel de Champlain, Alexander Mackenzie, Simon Fraser and David Thompson. *Explorations* will deal with only three: Cabot, January 6; Thompson, January 13; and Mackenzie, January 20. Four of the programs were produced by the National Film Board. The Simon Fraser film is a CBC production.

In Cabot's time, Mecca was a focal point for business as well as religion, and was the biggest market for east-west trade. So, when Cabot transferred his base of operations from Venice to England, it was the Bristol merchants who received him most warmly, recognizing him as a fellow businessman.

In the film, written and directed by Morton Parker, John Vernon appears as Cabot, and Powys Thomas as Henry VII.

- 2 *tblsp. gelatin*
- $\frac{1}{4}$ *cup cold water*
- 2 *tins of cream of chicken soup*
- $\frac{1}{4}$ *cup mayonnaise*
- 1 *tblsp. minced parsley*

Soften gelatin in water, heat $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of soup, add gelatin and dissolve. Stir dissolved gelatin into remaining soup. Cool. Fold in mayonnaise and parsley. Pour into 6-cup mould, chill until firm.

CRANBERRY LAYER

- 1 *15-oz. can jellied cranberry sauce*
- 1 *tblsp. gelatin*
- $\frac{1}{4}$ *cup cold water*

Crush cranberry sauce. Soften gelatin in cold water and set in pan of warm water to dissolve. Mix gelatin and cranberry sauce and pour on top of firm chicken layer. Chill until cranberry layer is firm. Unmold and serve.

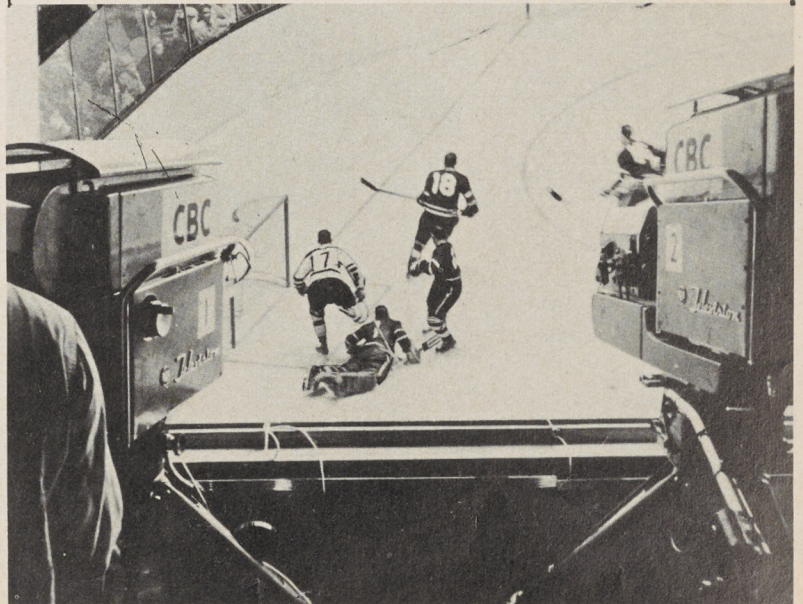
