CANADA'S MUSIC HOP

While ABC-TV wallows in the success of "Shin Dig" their first "live network teen TV show, Canada goes into its second series of "Music Hop" on CBC-TV.

ond series of "Music Hop" on CBC-TV.
Youthful bustling Stan Jacobson, and
writer Les Pouliot began "Music Hop last
season as an experiment, and apparently
the formula was not only the forerunner of
more teen TV to come, but has prompted
Canada's CBC to extend the weekly half
hour to five half hours. One half hour each
weekday will originate from different
points from coast to coast in Canada. The
teen artist in Canada has never had it so
good.

This series of shows promises to give exposure and camera experience to many young hopefuls and bring attention to our recording artists on a national scale. Jacobson has already brought young personalities like The Rhythm Rockers, The

Girlfriends, Robbie Lane, Jayson King, Shirley Matthews, Lynda Lane, Sandy Selsie, Larry Lee and many others to the attention of young Canada. Often, old troupers like Pat Hervey, Bobby Curtola, Gord Lightfoot, and Pierre Lalonde have appeared to perform their new records. While radio basked in the glory of American and British artists, TV was spearheading a movement to develop new talent (for their medium) that would someday be at hand.

Jacobson and Pouliot both very interested in the Canadian scene, believe in the talent that is at our doorstep and have gained the respect of the music industry.

Music Hop has done more than any previous effort to boost Canadian talent and employ Canadians in Canada.

In its earliest stages, selling the idea the show was one of the hardest things to do. A full scale production aimed at the teenager was something the CBC had never tried before, and many were reluctant to agree to spending the money. Jacobson will himself admit that he was a little optimistic at first and felt that the

Toronto area could not furnish him with enough talent to keep the show interesting but now feels that with the amount of good talent he has found in Toronto he could

produce the five half hours right in Toronto.

The latter part of last season Jacobson screened Music Hop for the ABC-TV network and interest ran very high even to the point that purchase was discussed. Their only demand was that the show originate from New York. Jacobson stood his ground and insisted that the show remain in Canada and that he would use one American artist each week. This wasn't satisfactory so the idea was dropped. The idea of a teen type TV show was fostered however as evidenced by the highly successful "Shin Dig".

The English sound is one that record producers everywhere are striving to accomplish. It was once said "The Germans discover it, the Americans mass produce it and the English perfect it." Sounds like the record business.

The Canadian Sound (we might as well join the club) is making inroads to the American market. Appearing on Music Business Top 100 this week is "Unless You Care" by Terry Black as No. 73 with a red arrow. "Shake Hands" by the Rockatones on Melbourne has been picked as a "Best Bet" in Cashbox.

Arthur Fiedler who liked the Beatles' material so much he recorded an LP of their hits with the Boston Pop Ork will be appearing with the Toronto Symphony Ork Nov. 17. Rita Pavone will make a personal appearance in Montreal Oct. 24 and in Toronto Oct. 25. That's quite a bundle of news from Mike Doyle of Victor. Thanks Mike. By the way watch out for Lorne Greene with his newest "Ringo". Could be a hot one.

The Travellers who appeared at a command performance during the Queen's recent visit, impressed the Duke sufficiently enough for him to remark that they should make a trip to England. What better recommendation could you have? Latest reports have it that the Travellers will leave for England shortly and that their popularity has gone on before them. So watch out for big things to come from the Travellers. Their latest LP has been well received but now that Royalty is interested it may sound that much better. It's on Columbia FL 310.

Hal Ross of London Records looks for big things to happen with a new group from Masena N.Y. (a suburb of eastern Ontario) Tommy Dishaw and the Panthers with their single on London "Ain't Gonna Bother You No More". Hal is also very enthusiastic over a French Canadian turned English... Donald Lautrec who recorded "The Ska" a fifty thousand seller, debuts in English with a Platter's hit "I'm Sorry" f/s "What To Do With Laurie". New label is Jupiter handled by London.

Ed Lawson, Ontario Promo topper for Quality reports good reaction on the new Wes Dakus' single "Las Vegas Scene". This could be one of the better instrumentals of the year.




THE IMPORTANCE OF BELIEVING IN THE INDUSTRY: Much has been written about our music industry, many writ-

"GARBAGE! THAT'S WHAT THEY'D HAVE ME PLAY -

PURE GARBAGE. Canadian disc jockeys are getting a little tired of the wailing, whining and moaning of record companies that they are not promoting Canadian talent.

I don't think there's a deejay in this country who wouldn't give preference to a Canadian artist PROVIDING that the record is good. Good enough to compete with anything that's produced anywhere. Unfortunately, this rarely happens. You'd be amazed at some of the unbelievable garbage that is produced in this country.

ACCUSED - It doesn't get on the air, and right away we're accused of 'Not having faith in Canadian talent' (This is

Many Canadian recording artists I count among my closest buddies, but if the record doesn't come up to scratch, I don't believe in kidding them about it.

If there's any doubt, the listeners have the final decision. Nothing makes disc jockeys happier than to see a Canadian artist 'make it' with a hit record.

Here are some recent releases that could possibly do it. It's up to you

Feel So Pretty, by Shirley Matthews. Sneakin' Around, by the Stratotones.

Don't Make A Fool Of Me by Little Caesar & the Consuls And look for a couple of new ones by Ronnie Hawkins and Robbie Lane. Incidentally, I wish Bobby Curtola would get off the 'sweet sound' kick and record a real rocker. If you've ever seen Bobby do R & B material on stage, you'll know how well he handles it.



The Skunks recently appeared in a Greenwich Village club with Brian Hyland. They were billed as Canada's answer to the Beatles.

The Four Seasons were in town long enough to cut their next hit. It is called "Big Man in Town" and will be released momentarily. In the meantime the Hollyridge Strings album of the Four Seasons' hits is rapidly climbing the charts.

Burt Bacharach's newest discovery is a singer named George McCannon. George recently completed a Dick Clark tour and will record in the near future. Talking about Burt, Dionne Warwick has a single out on a song called "Reach Out For Me" which was recorded a year ago by Lou Johnson and made chart noise then. This new version could go "Top 10".

England's Andrew Oldhom made a quick trip to New York, to help map out a forthcoming tour for the Rolling Stones. The boys have a new record "Time Is On My Side". When I mentioned to Andrew that the record did not have the identifiable English sound, he said, "I like American records!"

As a result of the play "Automatic Reaction" by Nino and the Ebb Tides is getting up in Canada, Amy Records is starting to break the record in the US.

Bobby Darin fans are in for a treat. On his new album, he is reunited with Richard Wess. It contains recent standard type ballads. The name on the cover is "From Hello Dolly to Good Bye Charlie".

Breaking big on the charts is "Listen Lonely Girl" by Johnny Mothis (Mercury). The song was written by Bobby Scott who wrote "A Taste Of Honey".

It seems that every time Shirley Harmer appears on television she gets better. She was outstanding when she guested on the Johnny Carson Show.

Robert Goulet did an outstanding acting job on a recent Kraft Suspense Theatre. He is regarded by most Americans as Canadian although he was born in the US. It looks like Mr. Goulet will have his first chart record judging from the sales of his Columbia disc "My Love Forgive Me".

There is definite chart action on this record. Walt tells me Canadian charts are already showing listings.

Adam Faith had planned to record in N.Y. when he was suddenly called back to England. I wonder if the ads in the London trades would have read "Recorded in America" just as the ads for Brenda Lee's new record say "Recorded in England". "Is It True" is as English a record as you'll hear and it looks like a monster for Brenda.

Bernie Wayne, new man in charge at 20th Century could take this company to the top.

ART COLLINS



Music Man, Art Collins is probably the most important programmer of Good Music in Canada. As header of CFRB's impressive record library (Chief Librarian) Art and his staff of three program the music that the largest segment of Canada's most densely populated area listen to.

Art is no overnight wonder in the music business, but has instead progressively accumulated a great knowledge of the business. As early as in his teens, Art was responsible for the first sound systems for teen dances in Canada which later led to CNE teen dances, and started Art in the music business. In 1948, Art joined the staff of CKEY's music library (at that time programming big bands and the contemporary music of post world war two) then to CHUM in '51, where Art collected one of Canada's most impressive libraries of recorded music. At CHUM he instigated the program Promenade Under the Stars which eventually he announced and operated. In '56 Art joined CFCF in Montreal. There too he accumulated a vast library which was later destroyed by fire. In '57 he joined CFRB to program Canada's evergreen radio station.

In his early thirties, Art is an avid sports car enthusiast presently more interested in cycling. In '62 he owned one of the first Honda's in Canada. Presently his BMW is shown once a year at the CNE and for the past three years has won a trophy each year.

Art is a devotee of Canadian talent both on records and the Canadian Talent Library.

George Wilson of CKFH informs us of a new version of "The King & I" on RCA Victor. This is from the Lincoln Centre in New York with Rise Stevens and Darren McGavin. George also recommends the new double album of "Roger Williams At Town Hall" on Kapp.

Art Collins at CFRB suggests you give a listen to "No Arms Can Ever Hold You" (Decca) by Georgie Shaw and "Who Can I Turn To" by Tony Bennet and "My Love Forgive Me" by Robert Goulet both on Columbia. Art was very impressed with an album from Denmark "The Svend Saaby Choir singing Great American Standards". This LP was recorded in Germany on the Ariola label and is distributed in Canada through Canada Record Sales. Recommended cuts are "Carioca", "Lady Is A Tramp" and "In The Still Of The Night". A very interesting LP from Capitol is "The Three D's (New Dimension in Folk Songs)" This is a trio of men putting the works of Poe, Kipling, Tennyson and others to folk music. For classical listening Art is very impressed with the Deutsche Grammophone release of Tchaikovsky Sixth Symphony by the Berlin Philharmonic Ork conducted by Herbert Von Karajan. The Third movement is very exciting.

Helen Hatton at CHUM-FM is very excited over the London release of "Bach's Harpsicord Concertos by George Malcolm. Mr. Malcolm is using the newly developed Goff Harpsicord. Thomas Goff's improvements have allowed for more speed and with extra peddles (there are five) is now

capable of extra swells.


Helen informs us that Victor has just released "The Songs of Giuseppe Verdi" performed by Lica Albanese. Angel has released "The Verdi Requiem" conducted by Carlo Maria Giulini. Critics hail this LP as "the recording of a lifetime". Another London release that impressed Helen is "Benjamin Britten's Serenade for Tenor Horn and Strings" with Peter Pears as soloist. Mr. Pears will be appearing with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra in November at which time they will perform the "War Requiem". CHUM-FM will air this complete work the Sunday before the performance. Pierre Monteux made only one recording with his son Claude (a noted flautist) and London has just released this already acclaimed LP "The Mozart Flute Concerto No. 2 in D". This LP also includes Ballet numbers by Gluck.

If you are familiar with Mahler then you will be most interested and pleased with his Symphony No. 1 performed by the London Symphony Ork conducted by Georg Solti on London. Another beautiful London release is "The Arias of Julius Caesar (Handel)" performed by the very popular Sutherland supported by Marilyn Horne and Monica Sinclair, Margreta Elkins, Richard Conrad with Richard Bonynge conducting the New Symphony Ork on London.


