

It Was Opening Night at Toronto's Central Library Theatre (10) for "Cindy-Ella" a Musical produced by Marigold Charlesworth and Jean Roberts. Of particular interest was the fact that two of Canada's recording artists appeared on stage. Phyllis Marshall Columbia recording artist, no stranger to theatre audiences and in her first stage appearance, Shirley Matthews (Big Town Boy). Show promises to be a sellout and the enthusiasm of the opening night audience indicated the program was well received. In the audience as well that night was Capitol recording artist Garry Ferrier who currently climbs the chart with "Ringo-Deer". Shirley Matthews, Tamarac recording of "Feel So

Pretty" is No. 1 on the Quebec City CFOM chart.

Hal Ross, London Records, returning from his highly successful promotion trip west informs us that the following radio stations across Canada will participate in the London Records Youth Club-Red Robinson, C-FUN, Harry Boon, CJCA, Marion Lawrence-CFAC, Doc Steen-CKRC, Al Slaight - CHUM, Johny Murphy-CKGM, Frank Cameron-CHNS. Hal also tells us about a group called The Jury out of Winnipeg that will be making the western news soon.

AI Reusch, Aragon Records Vancouver sends news of great success for Patty Surbey with her single "A Beatle For Christmas". Backing Patty on this west coast winner are the popular VIP's. Patty hails from Guelph, Ontario. David Dickinson of Ronal TV in Chilliwack, B.C. also sends news of Patty's success in sales. Apparently, sales and reaction in the Chilliwack area were worthy of note.

Rudy Assaly of Kanaphone has joined Musicmart as National Sales Manager headquartered in Montreal.

Pat Hervey's English produced hit "I'll Count Every Hour" is shaping up to be a cross Canada favorite and is picked this week as an EXTRA on RPM's Top Forty & 5.

Joe Popiel's waxing of "I Can't Live Without You" also shows promise as a winner and enters RPM's Top Forty at number 40.

Jayson King, well known Toronto blues singer and recording artist has furthered his interest in the record business and recently released a single on the CLIP label by Jay Smith and the Majestics called "Driven From Home". The record is experiencing considerable airplay across Canada and will shortly be released in the US.

lan Tyson of Ian & Sylvia fame wrote "Four Strong Winds" but apparently the big guns in Canadian radio prefer to program American artists such as Bobby Bare and now Harry Belafonte. Anyway, it must be of some consolation to Ian to know that his composition is being so well received.

**Crashing into the Canadian** folk scene are five young easterners name of The Newlanders with their first London LP. They are a popular addition to the college and ski circuit. In 1963 they made a tour of Europe and became much in demand from France to Sweden and were a popular feature on the Country and Western Show over the BBC-TV.

Rudy Vallee made a return engagement to the Imperial Room of the Royal York Hotel in Toronto and again turned out to be one of the big draws for this popular nitery.

Sparrow, the worlds most famous Calypso singer, in fact he's been billed as the King of Authentic Calypso, holds forth at Little Trinidad in Toronto this week (10).

lan and Sylvia return to Toronto to what's shaping up to be a sellout show at Massey Hall Dec. 18.

Paul White, Capitol Records reports great acceptance to Jack London's "If You Don't Want My Love". London will be filling in on the Liverpool School on CHUM.


RPM Will Be Available at International Music in Montreal, Sam's and A&A in Toronto.

"AFTER FOUR" IS PRODUCED AND DISTRIBUTED BY BB PRODUCTIONS, A SUBSIDIARY OF BATON BROADCASTING LIMITED, TORONTO. The Old Guard, firmly entrenched and wrongly dubbed a family station, CFRB received yet another boost from a local newspaper columnist. According to Nathan Cohen of the Toronto Star, CFRB is first in the ratings in Toronto. This information no doubt came from one of the many agencies that take ratings for Canadian radio. We often wonder how accurate these ratings really are. If taken at 10 minutes to 12 noon and 10 minutes to 6.00 PM when the controversial Sinclair holds forth then we agree CFRB could be number one. The efforts, put forth by some of these broadcast rating companies

are open to question as to their accuracy. For instance there is one such agency that checks parked cars. Peering through the closed car window they come up with figures. Both CHUM and CFRB are in such close proximity to each other on the dial it would be most difficult to give a true reading. And then there is the story of the little old lady who claims she listens to CFRB when her radio is working but it hasn't worked for 15 years. Another mystery is the disappearance of CKEY as a power. We refuse to believe that a popular radio station such as this can be consistently low in the ratings.

Moving Over To a good music station that is definitely a family station without the syrup, we were personally knocked out with CHML's "The Wonderful World Of Music" hosted by R.O. Horning. The never to panic but always ready to experiment, attitude of CHML is the reason they have always been one of the top-rated radio stations in Canada. Did you know that CHML was one of the most listened to stations in Western New York?

**Glad To See** that "Unless You Care" by Terry Black enters the CJMS Montreal list this week (11).



It Takes a Giant to lead the way. Our hats are off to CKEY in Toronto for playing the Garry Ferrier smash Xmas novelty "Ringo-Deer". In the rat-race radio rating razz-matazz it takes a great deal of guts to lay heavily on a competing radio station's on the air personality. But this may be the breakthrough the industry needs. Perhaps radio can compete for ratings with good programming and not kick the record industry around like a football.

**CHUM-FM** has drastically changed the rock image of the AM outlet, for the better. The success of this one year old FM station is due partly to the efforts put forth by HELEN



HATTON librarian. Helen was born and raised in Toronto and at an early age began an extensive classical collection, with emphasis on "historic" recordings (records from 1900 on up into the 30's). Helen's late husband Geoffrey Hatton ran the classical record department at Eaton's Toronto and the record collection of both Helen and her late husband ran into the thousands. Helen prides herself on her ability to put her hand on whatever record she needs with-

out the use of the catalogue number. She has supplied historic records for LP re-issue along with historic photographs of various artists of which she has an extensive collection dating from the 1890's. Helen has written for Record News and had her own radio show called "From My Collection". She worked at the CBC for three years in the music department but left to take over duties as librarian at CHUM-FM plus programming, doing the daily recital program, and the weekly opera which is crammed full of background, anecdotes etc. but very short on technical dissection of the music which is a bore to anyone but a musician listening with a score at hand. Helen's pet beef is "The paucity of material available domestically, compared to the vast amounts of records issued in USA and Europe, and the reluctance of domestic importers to bring in anything but a well known War Horse type of release. (And damn few of them.)

Battles Beat. Like a dead dog. The value of the playing one record against another has dwindled to the point where many foreign stations have come up with newer innovations on that theme. The battle of the two sides is safer (since few stations or record companies have bothered to check into the legal aspect of this practice in Canada).

Speaking of Things Legal. It has been brought to our attention that law prohibits the playing of tapes taken directly from TV performances. Actually if you get into the finer points of legality nothing but an actual record can be played on the air, or other commercially used discs. Taping anything musical and playing it is questionable. If you're interested, we understand that once a record is released, it is impossible to prohibit air play. The performance belongs to the world, and can be played by anyone who is licenced. The desirable effect is usually the reverse. GETTING it played.

A Midget Radio Station with a big wattage comes up with "We don't play Canadian records, and WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO ABOUT IT?" It may be news to the industry to know that a number of Canadian charts have not listed ONE Canadian record in the past 11 months. That's a record to be proud of. Some kind of a Canadian record.

PAT HERVEY became aware of her singing capabilities at the early age of 9 as a member a prize-winning of junior choir. Her singing developed along the way and upon entering High School she teamed up with another girl.. They both played quitars and were much in demand for parties and finally this female Everly Bros. act was the talk of the High School circuit and were booked solid for school dances. This led to a performance at an ama-

teur rock 'n roll show which was emceed by popular DJ Al Boliska. Al liked the way Pat sang and passed her name along to the CBC where she auditioned for the "While We're Young'' show and made it and this started her off on a TV career, which included Cliff MacKay's "Holiday Ranch" show, "Club Six" and finally as a regular on "Country Hoedown". Art Snider, who is the musical director of many CBC shows became interested in Pat and suggested she record. Off to Nashville and the recording of "Mr. Heartache" which turned out to be the biggest Canadian hit of the year. Then came the busy time of her life. Personal appearances, radio and TV interviews, the learning of new material and the many hops that are necessary when you have a hit. Much was in store for this Toronto born hit maker including more records and a change in record companies. Her new record company ACT was the first of Canadian companies to realize the potential of recording in England. So Pat was off to England and has come up with what could be another smash called "Think About Me".



Made In Rome by Riz Ortolani Ork and chorus on UA is a beautiful presentation of themes from Italian movies.

Jack Morse of WHEN Syracuse has been sending his play list for some time and we find that his picks, although a little advanced of our own market, turn out,

for the most part, to be the big ones across the US. We will use Jack's playlist from time to time and we are sure you will find it most helpful. New on his chart this week is Getz Au Go Go by Stan Getz on Verve and Modern Country by Kay Winding also on Verve. From RCA Victor Jack lists the new Tommy Leonetti release of Nobody Else But Me and Golden Boy with the Original B'way Cast on Capitol. Getting good action is We'll Sing In The Sunshine by Gale Garnett on RCA and still getting good action is Bert Kaempfert's Blue Midnight on Decca.

Helen Hatton is very pleased with this months RCA Victor release and comments "Victor has turned out a good issue." CHUM-FM is particularly interested in the Victor release of Parsifal with Flagstaff and Melchior. The flip has, for the first time on record The 5 Duets of Robt. Schumann with Melchior and Lotte Lehmann. Another re-issue is Four Saints in 3 Arts written by Gertrude Stein. Helen feels this is a comparitavely contemporary opera and a milestone in American opera. Very well done and very interesting is Concerto by Rozsa. Rozsa is a well known soundtrack composer. One of his greatest accomplishments was The Robe. Heifetz is the featured artist on this concerto. Also on this LP is The Romantic Fantasy For Violin and Viola by Arthur Benjamin with Heifetz and Wm. Primrose playing a duet. Violaist Primrose has recently retired. Masters Of The Guitar, Volume 3 features Pomponio and Zarate performing as a duet The Haydn Guitar Concerto. They were also featured on the Volume 2 of this series.

Our own suggestions for easy listening include the new Bob Goulet release of My Love Forgive Me on Columbia and first on the scene with a tribute to the late Cole Porter is Ella Fitzgerald with her Verve release of A Tribute to Cole Porter. Billy Vaughan has brought out a beautiful LP and a must for GMP Pearly Shells. Check the title song, just great! The old but great Bobby Darin is very evident on his Capitol release From Hello...To Goodbye. (See page 13 for an exclusive story on Darin by Harriet Wasser.)

#### WEST COAST DISTRIBUTOR OF OVER 100 LABELS, AL REUSCH, OF ARAGON ENTERPRISES, MUSICIAN, SONGWRITER AND RECORD PRODUCER.



Bob Smith of the Vancouver Sun recently wrote an article on Al Reusch which we reprint below.

"For the past 10 years all of us who collect jazz records, especially the so-called off labels have been indebted to Al Reusch. He's a softspoken affable person who's been involved in many phases of the music business all his adult life. Besides the record distribution business Al's talents and special equipment are much in demand as budding or established art-

ists imprint their efforts on tape or wax. Reusch is a lifemember of Local 145, the Vancouver branch of the International Musicians' Union, as a saxophonist for more than 30 years. Al led the band and emceed for Sandy De Santis at The Palomar in the late 30's then joined Ole Olsen at The Commodore. He continues to play weekend gigs to this day as they are offered. But that Palomar announcing job convinced him he'd like to try radio and that's how we met in 1946. He had started his radio career in 1942 at Kamloops. Then he moved to Edmonton. By 1945 he returned to B.C. as CKNW's production manager and later that year joined CKMO. By my standards Al Reusch became the first modern disc jockey with his Name It, Play It show which ran three years. Actually I can recall only two other radio personalities before Reusch who were interested in music, the late Billy Browne and G.G., or Colin Fitzgerald. Al Reusch always scheduled jazz. He started an exposure to jazz for listeners in the Kamloops area and amplified this approach in Edmonton by using live musicians occasionally as they came to town. For three years he was host at CKWX's Saturday Swing Show. His encyclopaedic knowledge of records, songs and personnel still continues to be tapped. Today Reusch distributes more than 100 different labels. He's just purchased new stereo recording equipment so this phase of his musical life should increase. 'My idea is to combat the so-called Nashville sound and I think it can be done' says Reusch."

For a number of years our New York correspondent, Harriet Wa secretary to Bobby Darin. This week Harriet writes a very interes on the phenominal rise of this great TV, recording and movie star. very interesting story

It is hard for me to realize that seven years have gone by since I first was introduced to Bobby Darin, I remember our first dinner together as if it was yesterday. Bobby was that vital an individual then. As we spoke, it was obvious he was waiting for my reaction. That night we hit it off and became fast friends. Today, Bobby is much more relaxed than he was when he was seeking recognition, but there is still the same drive and desire to succeed in everything he does.

Perhaps more than anybody else, I was there when Bobby needed somebody to talk to. His insecurities were hidden under a smile or funny joke, but there were many months of frustration before the success of "Splish Splash" erased some of the doubts. I can still remember Bobby once asking, "What if I don't make it? How could I ever face all the believers?" (I wonder how many other struggling artists ask the same question.)

I had known Jack because of my past association with Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme. As things happened, Jack was forced to turn down the assignment. Bobby immediately decided to call upon Richard Wess. Today it is hard to say whether "Mack the Knife" would have been the smash it was without Dick's swingin' arrangement.)

My association with Bobby, as his personal secretary, continued until the end of 1962, when he made a permanent move to Hollywood. I had many thrills during the four years I worked for him...like watching him at the Copa for the first time and getting a standing ovation...personally introducing him to two of his favorite performers, Sammy Davis, Jr. and Harry Belafonte...and watching him make his entry into motion pictures as an actor to be reckoned with.

Today, as a successful publisher and record producer, it comes as no surprise to anybody who knows of his desire to succeed that T.M. Music will receive three BMI Awards for top ten songs this past year. They are "Under the Boardwalk," "The Shoop Shoop Song" and "Three Window Coupe". Bobby is also busy watching the progress of his song, ''I'll Be There" by Gerry and the Pacemakers.

The turning point of Bobby's career came with the release of his "That's All" album and his meeting with the man who was to become the single most important influence in his career, Steve Blauner. Steve was the person who convinced Bobby that he would have a smash single in "Mack the Knife" and finally convinced Atlantic Records into taking the record out of the album. (Before Bobby recorded his "That's All" album, I had contacted the late Jack Kane.




