## The Big Town Boys



CANADA'S BIG TOWN BOYS entered the picture just at the right time and have reached the first plateau of success with their initial outing for RCA Victor, "Put You Down".

Recently a deejay came up with a line that pretty well tells the story, "These guys have got something different going for

different going for them - short hair" and probably one other very important asset. From the minute you meet the group you'll notice a certain naturalness that says "the boys next door".

The Boys are a little confused by what's been happening to them. Everytime they get together for a rehearsal they discuss the last achievement in their careers as if it was the ultimate. A few days later something better happens. They spend most of their time marvelling at the development of their group because everything seems to happen by itself. They don't stop to think that their talent and wholesomeness may have something to do with it.

The group is self-propelled and have no manager. When a crisis arises they contact one of their mentors and choose the best advice.

Tommy Graham who heads the group and looks after their interests as well as sings lead, plays lead guitar, arranges their repetoire and their sessions (and he wrote the music part of their first two sides) writes and arranges (in his spare time) for other groups and singers and has arranged and conducted on many Cancut sessions. It is in this field that he feels he'll end up if the music business can ever support craftsmen of this talent.

Possibly the most in demand group in Ontario, the Boys' chief ambition is to someday be the second biggest

group on the circuit. They're still working for that honour.

Johnny Basset Jr. of the "After Four" TV show signed the group to play behind their weekly guests. Later Mike Doyle of RCA started to move to get the Boys out on the RCA label.

Graham said recently "Everybody has been so great to us, and we've had nothing but the best in assistance everytime we've done something. Staging, costuming, business image and production we've had the best people, and Canada has a lot of people that know what they're doing".

Sometime ago Graham was offered a position arranging south of the border but felt that Canada was the place and something was going to happen here and "I don't want to miss anything". Well, the Big Town Boys aren't missing a thing as they sit and wonder what will happen to them next, and they get a phone call from their producer to tell them their first record "Put You Down" will be released in the US by RCA Victor.

Dateline Upper Canada: Someone started a rumor that the Rolling Stones would be appearing in the Big Pineapple and the capital. Looks like it's a sure thing and a bagfull of money for the sharp promoter.

Dateline Ottawa: The Staccatos, Ottawa based foursome are off on the right foot with a big boost from the Ottawa Journal. Their outing "It Isn't Easy" is skedded for release sometime in February. The boys make their home at the Chaudiere Club just outside Ottawa and from all reports a Saturday nite crowd is something to behold.

Another capital group making great progress are the Esquires. A great asset to this group is their fan club run by Pam, Pat & Paula, 475 Guy St. Ottawa. They put out a bi-monthly news pamphlet with pictures, news of groups, etc.

Dateline Montreal: Carl Schmidt (the Pres) of Danco Records lets us in on a hot new Canadian name to watch for, Bobby Mitchell with a new release "Destiny" distributed by Allied Record Corp. One of Carl's earlier releases, "Don't Act Smart" by the Royal Jacks is beginning to show on charts across the Bigland. Carl is also responsible for the release of "The Shaq" by Carl Danco. See GMP column.

Marty Hill and his Brother Harold are very proud of the fact that their companies HIllco Music and H-Bro Productions were one of the first "Stay-In-Canada and-Export" proponents in Canada and they intend to maintain this stand. They were responsible for the Vicky Baker hits and Ronnie Fraser's hit "Stop Look Listen" on Columbia and will be looking after Ronny's next outing "Hey" also on Columbia.

Dateline Vancouver: Les Vogt, topper at Jaguar Enterprises has just released a single by Fred Latremouille (latrimo) called "Latromotion". Latrimo is the popular C-FUN personality and co-emcee of CBC's TV show "Let's Go" He is also a very talented drummer.

Dateline Hamilton: Don Legere of the steel town bows in with a fan mag devoted to Canadian artists. Cana Wirl is a bi-monthly publication and all correspondence should be directed to Box 93, Station "D", Hamilton, Ontario.

Dateline The Big Pineapple: Arc Records comes up with a first with their release of a single by Andrew Murdison 'Auld Sandy), "The Curlers Song" f/s "Alibi's". Included in the colorful package are the words and music of what could become an evergreen.

In spite of all her problems with the "Grizzly Fisherman" Giselle of Quality should be very proud of the inroads her company has made with Canadian talent. "Shakin All Over" by The Guess Who made such an impact in Canada with the Canadian conscious stations that a foreign release has been arranged with Scepter. A foreign release has also been arranged by Crusader Records for 'Southern Love' by Max Falcon. On the way up with a "go go" sound is the Regents newie "Me and You". By the way Quality records is not one of the companies listed as delinquent in sending out radio promo copies.

Geoffrey Racine, Exec. VP at Capitol Records advises that Capitol took a giant step forward into the French Canadian market with the recording of Mickie Day and Richard Proulx. These artists are just a start for Pathe. As Racine put it, "We intend to sign more French Canadian artists shortly and to put Capitol's French repertoire into the same class as our other product - at the top of the charts!" The success of the two best selling LP's by Les Cailloux on Pathe is a good reason for expansion.

Hot on the heels of Wolff Records smash of "Say Baby" by Dee and the Yeomen comes a release by 15 year old Rita Curtis with "Spring Rains". From all reports her first release is sensational. Foreign release skedded for Feb. 26.



Recently we receive a comment from one of the people in the industry (he receives RPM gratis) "RPM is terribly expensive". We couldn't agree more. The struggle of publications is much like that of the music industry in Canada. This is why recently an old "pro" in the music industry "bit the nail" on the head when he said "RPM is a struggling publication about a struggling industry". He added "Very few industries in Canada have a weekly trade of any size " We are constantly being told how to cut costs. "Go to a cheaper paper'' etc. Well, none of these suggestions would solve the problem. The problem is actually the small population of

Canada, and the initial costs of limited run publishing. If there were twice as many potential subscribers in Canada (or a music trade, and we could run twice as many RPM's each week the cost per issue would be a little more than hall of what it is presently, and right now the single copy price is slightly less than what the weekly costs are. One year ago, your publisher would have guessed a publication such as RPM would cost about \$100 per week to put out. NOT SO. The costs would stagger anyone who has not experienced art, layout, typography and printing charges. Possibly this might indicate why there hasn't been a trade paper to the industry before and why there are bi-monthlies, and monthlies for other industries. The music industry is fast moving and glamourous and needs a weekly trade that looks like the industry and glorifies the industry and the people within its (ramework.

It would be nice to think the people in the radio and music industry feel that RPM is worth the yearly rate, and will get that much benefit from being informed.

If there was ever a list of energetic, concerned and interested people in the music industry in Canada, this list would be our paid subscribers.

Dateline Port Arthur: Johnny Murphy, Canada's man about Cashbox will be the new radio and TV personality at CKPR. We know Murph will be happy at the lakehead where there is an abundance of nice people, and obviously where the action is.

Dateline Truro: Graham Wyllie of CKCL reports great reaction to the Big Town Boys outing ''Put You Down'' also the Ronnie Hawkins release of ''Bluebirds Over The Mountain''. At a recent hop Graham featured 12 Canadian releases which is somewhat of a record. CKCL will be entering the FM market shortly. Graham also informs us that he is receiving letters from artists who would like to make a tour of the Maritimes but promoters are pretty cool to the idea.

Dateline Peace River: When you receive a letter from CKYL the envelope alone indicates the public service attitude of the "Progressive Radio In The Progressive North". A look at their chart is further proof of their willingness to go all out in backing good Canadian product. Chuck Benson, Production Manager at 'YL writes "They say that one appearance on Ed Sullivan is worth 20 on CBC. I say (if it could be done!) one appearance on 'This Hour Has Seven Days' would be worth 20 on Ed Sullivan's show. We need a show of Sullivan's calibre to support our talent. I know we have the teen shows; but, why so early in the afternoons? Why not program them in the evening, where the talent will be recognized?"

Dateline Regina: Bob Wood of CKCK is sold on Jerry Palmer's new release of ''Don't''. Air play has made it one of the hot items for Regina listeners. Dave Jacobsen formerly of CKSW takes over the 9 to midnite slot. Roy Mullet moves from CHEC to take over the all nite show at 'CK.

Johnny Onn at CJME reports good reaction to ''Until You Do'' by the Winnipeg group the Jury and finds a whole lot of support for the new Dianne James' release of ''Don't Go''. Wes Dakus and the Rebels are continuing their popularity run with an appearance in Regina. Flipping the current Chessmen hit Johnny finds good reaction to ''Mustang''. Congrats from Johnny (and us) to Hart Kirch at CJOC Lethbridge who added a bouncing 6 lb. 12 oz. boy, Kirby-Jay to the Kirch flock.

Dateline Chatham: Paul Burke of CFCO writes to remind us that two years ago the Detroit sound was considered garbage but now because of much exposure is a most desirable sound. Paul feels the same thing could happen to Canadian recordings, if the big 50,000 watters who boast "We make the hits" would try to do the same for Canadian product.

Dateline New Glasgow: Jungle Jim Morrison of CKEC reports that this Nova Scotia station is another of the many not receiving current hot items from record companies. One of the problems with the Maritimes is the prominence of foreign radio stations. Listeners expect the same hits to be heard on their local stations. This is a situation the Maritimers will have to live with. Releases are always 3 to 4 weeks behind that of the foreign market. IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT A FOREIGN RECORD TO PLAY FOR YOUR LISTEN-ERS PLAY A CANADIAN RECORD AND TALK ABOUT IT. MAYBE YOUR LISTENERS WILL APPRECIATE A LITTLE NATIONALISM.

Wayne Petrie, Country spinner at 'EC would like to be put on the list to receive Canadian country discs.

Dateline Halifax: Frank Cameron is hip-hurraying over the fact that the CHNS chart has listed 9 Canadian records. (TAKE NOTE CANADA THIS IS 15%.)

Dateline Winnipeg: Daryl B reports great great action on 'Shakin' All Over'' by Chad Allan. PA's in the Peg by the group are turned into near riots. HEY NO MORE WORRIES f's HELP

The airwaves are currently saturated with Beatles records being this week marks the first anniversary of The Beatles National invasion. It is too early to say, but I predict a double-sided smash after hearing both sides of their new single, "Eight Days a Week" b/w "I Don't Want To Spoil The Party"... It can now be told that "Stop The Clock" is the name of Canadian Shirley Matthews' new single. It will be released anytime now. . . It is my guess that Brenda Lee's next single will be the old Joe Henderson hit, "Snap Your Fingers". It is in her brand new album.

Archie Bleyer was a great believer in the theory "the song's the thing". He came up with a million seller for The Chordettes by recording "Never On Sunday" following a smash version of the song by Don Costa. Now, Scepter Records has decided to release "Who Can I Turn To", by Dionne Warwick instead of "You Can Have Him". Let's see if Miss Warwick will be able to top the Tony Bennett version of the song.

More and more folk artists are trying to integrate the "pop" sound into their records. The Modern Folk Quartet will try for more of a pop sound in the future. On the other hand, The Tokens new one, "Sylvie's Sleeping", has a strong folk quality to it.

Tin Pan Alley is talking about the coverage recently given to Les Crane in the music trade magazines . . . also the fabulous King Cousins (offspring of The King Sisters).

The "songbook" LP is becoming the thing. Listen to Canadian Robert Farnon's new one devoted to Johnny Mathis faves. . . Then, how about 4 Corners Records with "The Incomparable Coronados'' by The Coronados. Don't miss up on this one.

Waiting to break big on the charts are "Go Now" by The Moody Blues and "People Get Ready" by The Impressions. Out of Detroit comes J.J. Barnes' "Poor Unfortungte Me" for real chart action.

Joey Heatherton will record Paul Anka's song, "The Hip Lip" and will appear with "Mr. Talent, Sammy Davis, on the Feb. 23rd "Hullaballoo" show. Did you know that it was Sammy who told Vic Dana's parents to take him to Hollywood after seeing Vic perform in Buffalo or that Eydie Gorme still uses the late Jack Kane's arrangement whenever she sings "After You've Gone" on stage or TV?

Let's hope that "Say Baby" by Dee and the Yeomen is a hit for the Wolff label. It was a \*\*\* Pick in Record World. IT wasn't mentioned as being a Canadian release.

Notes of Interest . . . Ian and Sylvia appear in Town Hall (NYC) on Feb. 27th . . . Burt Bacharach recorded his own LP in London . . . Bobby Rydell left for six months active duty in the U.S. Army on Feb. 6th . . . Lainie Kazan (Barbra Streisand's understudy in "Funny Girl") to record some singles for Colpix . . . Exposure is being given to Denny Vaughn, Howard Cable, Bill Butler, Lucio Agostini, Trump Davidson, Bert Niosi and the Raftsmen. Dunc Anderson, PD at CJPB feels more Canadians are receiving more exposure due to better quality recordings, promotion and the fact that more Canadian talent is now being developed more rapidly.

George Wilson, CKFH personality interviews the stars the way they want to be interviewed. It's unfortunate his listeners are restricted to the Big Pineapple. This is the

type of show that should be syndicated. Latest of the Wilson accomplishments are his interviews with George Maharis and Judy Garland. Rumour has it that when artists appear in Toronto they ask for Wilson.

Mike Duffy writes from CKDH Amherst that Manny Pitt-, son's production of Cathy MacKinnon's ''Voice of An Angel'' has been meeting with wide approval in the Maritimes. Recommended cut is Cathy's version of ''Today''.

Arnold Anderson, PD at CKPC Brantford writes that besides being a MDR station they do program the hits including Canadian from 6.45 p.m. to 10 p.m. which is looked after by Jim Steel. The rest of the day is MDR programming. Arnold has been airing "Lappland" by Mats Olsson on RCA and never fails to get phone response over this GMP single.

Gordon Morrison, PD at CHFM-FM Calgary would like to take exception to Chuck Benson's letter to the editor (Jan. 4). Gord advises that his station programs a great deal of top Canadian musical talent including the finest Canadian orchestras, bands, combos, singers and instrumentalists. One hour every Thursday evening is set aside for Canadian talent. "Tempo" (10 to 11 p.m.) is sponsored by a local music store. Gord points out that his programming does not include the current "Pop Hits" but rather concentrates on the classics and MDR tunes. Friday evening they have a two hour strictly jazz show.

We came across a cute version of "The Shag" by Carl Danco, a single on the Danco label distributed by Allied. It's right down your alley for GMP listening. Danco is a Canadian and the tune was written by Johnny Cowell.

Malka & Joso are experiencing a rare phenomena in the Canadian music industry. Their Capitol LP is selling like a single. One Toronto store reports having sold close to 2000 copies, which must be a record. Their tour of the west has been just one success story after another and they have sales to prove it.
