CHFI MOVES TO 680

TORONTO FM STATION WOOS 2 MILLION TORONTO LISTENERS ENCOMPASSING NEW AM OUTLET AT COST OF \$2,000,000.00

Toronto: A significant development in broadcasting was made in Canada recently when CHFI moved to 680 kilocycles to accomodate their broadcasting on AM radio on a 24 hour daily schedule.

The move, which cost an estimated one million dollars, was the result of five years of intensive research, employing the services of six consulting firms, computors, and highly skilled engineers Ted Rogers, young President of Rogers Broadcasting, succeeded in doing what had been considered impossible. He now has one of the most complex and advanced broadcast transmission systems on the North American continent. The CHFI transmitter, situated on 106 acres of land on Toronto's outskirts accomodates 9 towers each rising 310 feet above the ground with nearly 100 miles of copper wire and transmission cables underground.

The new signal will be clean and clear to a potential audience of more than two million listeners in Greater Metropolitan Toronto. CHFI has budgeted over \$200,000.00 for promotion designed to attract new listeners.

In the short period of six years since Ted Rogers took over the helm of CHFI his station has stacked up an impressive record of "firsts" including being the – First FM Station in Canada – First with Commercial Stereo FM Broadcasting – First FM Station to go to High Power – First to install FM Vertipower and now with the move to 680 becomes the first Canadian Station originating as an FM operation to put its good music – limited commercial policy into effect on AM on a 24 hour basis.



Popular Montreal bi-lingual artist, Jenny Rock, recently overcame any bi-bi problems, if there were any, when she appeared for a taping of the popular CTV show "A Go Go '66". Jenny's most recent single, on Apex, called "Le Sloopy" has already sold an estimated 150 thousand copies. She will shortly venture into the English Canadian and U.S. market with her first English recording.

CHRIS LAWRENCE

Toronto: Chris Lawrence, aged, 45, well known radio personality at CHFI, died suddenly at his home April 25. Mr. Lawrence had been with CHFI for the past five years and will be sorely missed as host of "The Music Box" which he had made an enjoyable habit for many Toronto and area AM and FM devotees of the easy listening school.

It was Chris Lawrence who first supplied RPM with the list of available Canadian albums and it was through his efforts and his believing in Canadian talent that many Canadian artists were given that little bit of exposure that meant so much.

Mr. Lawrence was formerly a staff announcer at CFTO-TV and had also held staff positions with the American Broadcasting Company in New York and Washington and the North American service of the British Broadcasting Corporation.

Mr. Lawrence had appeared in more than 30 television films and as a character actor had many movie roles.

He is survived by his wife, Ruth. Their only child, a son, died a few years ago.

Ernie Lyons makes an appearance in Kingston Apr. 29-30 at which time he will debut his latest Capitol release. Now that the hockey season is over the CKWS Radio TV No Stars have hung up their skates and will now concentrate on basketball to keep their public service and appearance image high in the eyes of the locals.

Gene McCormick has news of a close liason between Canadian broadcasters. CHUB Nanaimo and CFUN Vancouver got together for a double bandstand recently, featuring two Vancouver bands, Nocturnals and The Shadwraks. CFUN even bought time on CHUB while CHUB reciprocated with free plugs. The dance was emceed by CFUN's Daryl "B" and Tom Peacock while Gene McCormick represented CHUB.

CKCK's "Canadian Pick" this week is the Jimmy Dybold effort of "A Bit Of Love". Last week's pick "That's Why I Love You" by Joey Hollingsworth has begun to show sales action. Joey is skedded for a Queen City appearance later this spring. Jerry Palmer who made such an impact west of the Lakehead with his RCA release of "Walkin" The Dog" is a big favourite in Regina and has just completed a successful 10 day Easter tour and returns to Hollywood for more recording dates.

Scott Alexander, The Soo's CKCY rock jock, has great news about their local sweetheart, Debbie Lori Kaye. Debbie has just returned from a 10 day tour of the Southern U.S. She was part of a package show out of Nashville and shared the billing with Kitty Wells, Johnny Wright, Loretta Lynne and Stonewall Jackson. Her first appearance was at the stadium in Knoxville where she found herself in front of 10,000 country fans and carried her bit off like the real professional she is. So successful was this tour that another one has been set up for Debbie. Her father Dave Carter, who is morning man at CKCY accompanied Debbie on her trip south. A follow-up to her Columbia recording of "Soldier Boy" is to be released shortly.

The CKLY "Music Eye" survey has been drastically changed and is now the "Radio 910 Hitline" featuring the Top Forty, Pick Hit, Album of the Week and the Top Ten Country, including the Country pick hit. Lindsay hippy's dig the best in rock and country, including Canadian releases.

Will Mackenzie notes that the CKAY "Lucky License" contest has been drawing a great deal of interest with their Duncan listeners. Licenses are supplied to listeners by 8 sponsors. Every hour through the day CKAY calls a number and the listener is given 5 minutes to register for a prize.

Denis Menard writes that Bobby Curtola made an appearance in Bathurst recently and completely won over station CKBC. Says Denis "He's the friendliest person I've ever met and it certainly was the greatest of pleasures to spend a little time with him." His appearance in the city was a giant success and everyone is looking for his return. Denis is finding good reaction to "Gloria" by The King Beezz and the Capitol release of "Sorry About that Chief" by The Smart Set. "April Is Wayne Newton Month" promotion went over very large in the Bathurst area. Wayne has always been a big favourite here. The month of April was also the 11th year of broadcasting for CKBC who began serving the New Brunswick North Shore and Quebec's Gaspe coast with 250 Watts of power. They now have gone to 10;000 Watts and broadcasting on the open channel of 1360.

Newest addition to VOCM in St. John's is Russ Baker who takes over the 10AM to 2PM slot. With Mother's Day coming up, CKNL is taking advantage of the natural promotion with a giant contest sponsored by three local businesses. Listeners mail in the name of their favourite nominee, with reasons, and the winning "Mother Of The Year" picks up a bundle of prizes.


Ron Morey sends news that CHAT has gone format from 6AM to 3PM but keeps the country and rock shows. Ron's television show has been meeting with much success, being as he features local groups live. The Outlaws made the tube last week. Pat McGarry moves from Weyburn to take over the weekend duties giving Morey the chance to do what he does best, book teen dances.

June 3 will see two lucky CKLB listeners off on a trip to the French Riviera. Sponsors supply forms to interested parties who send them along with their name and phone number to CKLB. A card is picked every hour and if the contestant can identify the sponsor who just had his commercial aired, the winner then gets a chance for the big draw.

To adequately cover today's fast breaking news events, CKXL now presents a full 25 minutes of news each weekday at 7:55 AM, 12:25 PM and 5:WT PM. In addition, CKXL also presents "CKXL News Conference", a 70 minute open line show each afternoon at 12:50. A guest newsmaker is featured each day and listeners phone in with questions on the day's news events.

News from Montreal's number one station CJMS is that Michel Desrochers looks after the Top Forty American and Canadian records each day Monday through Friday from 3:30 to 6PM. Although CJMS is basically a French Canadian station, promoting French Canadian records they do find air time and chart space to spotlight the best in Canadian records. Top French Canadian personality at CJMS is Normand Frechette, 11AM to 2PM Monday through Friday.

SECRET'S BEST YET

The Secrets, who made the hockey star even more famous with their Rca recording of "Here Comes Shack", have shown class "A" talent with their newest release of "Cryin' Over Her" which was produced in the new Arc studios by Jerry Martin. This is a very strong side and one that should make the playlists of the MOT stations. The Hanna Barbera release of "Evol. Not Love" by the Five Americans is distributed in Canada by Arc and could find a place in the upper ten. The Five Americans are in the news with their suit against their home town radio station KLIF, Dallas. The suit is for \$715,000 and is the result of KLIF pulling their "Evol" off the playlist after three or four days of play. The suit claims this action shows the station's survey list is "False and misleading" and apparently damaging. This is definitely a test case but it will be interesting to see how many stations will review the wording on their charts and finally admit that they don't go on sales alone and are therefore not accurate.

CARAVAN GETS ACTION ON QUID

Frank Swain, bossman at Caravan, advises that his latest pick up for distribution, Eagle Records' "Crazy Things" by The Quid, could make it on a national scale. Many stations across the country are giving this Winnipeg produced disc, "picks" and chart listings.

Formula radio stations are far more aggressive and promotion minded than their block programming or GMP competitors and record companies do spend more money in advertising and promoting singles for the "pop" market. We have wracked our brains to figure out how our coverage could be more thorough and how our many attempts to instigate a GMP column could succeed .We feel now more than ever that the time is ripe for all radio stations and all musical product to be covered in RPM. This week we launched our first all out campaign to attract press releases from stations other than "Top 40" to give RPM a wider scope. We feel strongly that you will see the results in RPM soon and we also feel that Canadian record companies will soon be doing more sessions that will have adult appeal. The industry is less"scattershot" now then ever before and there are only a few lost sheep wandering outside the fold. Give them time.










