DEBBIE LORI KAYE DEBUTS ON CBC-TV

Toronto: Dynamic young Columbia recording artist, Debbie Lori Kaye, made her CBC television debut on the popular "Tommy Hunter" country show. The appearance of this Sault Ste Marie talent was so well received that it's possible Debbie may become a regular on the show.



It was just last month that Debbie's new manager, Sol Holiff, and CBS presented her to a bevy of press and trade representatives at New York's 21 Club, and the response from this highly influential gathering was most encouraging to her manager and producers.

Columbia is expected to announce, shortly, the release of Debbie's next single which will probably be in the "pop" vein and a strong follow-up to her "Iron Cross".

KING BEEZ AND CAMROUX SIGN PACT

Edmonton: Quality recording artists, The King Beezz, have just signed a long term producer/manager contract with Chuck Camroux (better known as Bob Stagg to his thousands of listeners at CJCA).




"Found And Lost" is the latest recording effort of the group and is expected on the market shortly.

A recent appearance at The Pink Panther, in Winnipeg, resulted in an open invitation being extended to the group to return to the 'Peg.

A tour of the U.S. and Canada is being set up with hopes of making it home to the U.K. for personal appearances.

THE RECORD BUSINESS WAITS FOR THE MONSTER. The big act that will bring the buyers into the store in droves doesn't happen very often but when it does, most record stores find an increase in sales of all items in their stores.

Not since the Beatle invasion has there been so much excitement over a recording group as there is now with every release of The Monkees. Albums sell like singles and singles set new sales records.



STONE LABEL ISSUES BUDGET C&W LINE

Oshawa: Bob Stone, prexy of Robt. J. Stone Associates, announces the introduction of their economy line of Country albums under the Stone Label.

Retailing for \$1.98, the material for the first 8 albums was leased from Fred Roy's Acadia Records and features Ross Allen, Smokey Warren, Billy Wallace and many other Canadian favourites.

QUALITY RELEASES BREAKING ON A NATIONAL FRONT

Toronto: Quality's Harold Winslow reports good 'cross the board activity on their Canadian and U.S. singles.

The popular Winnipeg group, The Eternals are having themselves a store-full of sales success in the west. Their single "The Girl In The Window" is also beginning to show in the Trenton-Belleville area.

Herman and his Hermits have sold the equivalent of 175,000 in U.S. sales of their "Je Suis Anglais" in the province of Quebec and sales are looking good from the Maritimes and Northern Ontario. Billy Graham and The Escalators, on Atlantic, have scored heavily with "Oop-Poo-Pa-Doo", particularly in Quebec but it now looks good for national action. The Trait's offering "Harlem Shuffle" on Scepter, also gets the Quebec nod.

MUSIC AND ARTISTS SIGN McLINTOCK

Toronto: Bert Mitford, Vice President of the newly formed Music and Artists Placement firm, announces the exclusive signing of the Ellis McLintock orchestra for college and club bookings. McLintock is considered one of the top trumpet players in the nation, and is particularly well known in and around the Toronto area where he has played many of the supper clubs. He is presently music director at Toronto's famous Old Mill where his orchestra has been playing on a steady basis for some time. His album "Ellis McLintock At The Old Mill" on RCA Camden has enjoyed much success.

FIFTH'S MANAGER TO TORONTO

Toronto: Peter Slywka, manager of The Fifth, voted Winnipeg's No. 1 group, flew into Toronto for a round of talks with promoters, bookers and club owners.

Reason for the trip is to arrange for one niters and possible TV and club appearances while the group are in Toronto for a recording session. Date for the session has been set as Feb 17.

With their current single riding the top of many charts, and their LP the undisputed best seller, at the moment, the Monkees have just released LP number two. The advance orders are already setting records. Dealers across Canada unanimously report heavy action on both the LPs and "I'm A Believer".

Since their first single "Last Train To Clarksville", the Monkees popularity has grown. The records have brought attention to their weekly TV show and the TV show exposed their records. The combination shot them into stardom. Each week, the Monkees TV show becomes a family affair in most homes, and the comic group has become so well known to adults that the logical Christmas present was a Monkee item.

The three Americans and one Britisher have captured the imagination of audiences all over North America. Their present tour has them playing to capacity audiences.

The idea of a weekly TV series about a rock and roll group was kicked around for a long time before someone decided to do something about it. The series closely resembles the story of the Beatles, and the success that followed again resembles the success of the Beatles.

David, Mike, Peter and Micky have found their way into the homes of many, with their TV show, and now with their singles and LPs that rapidly climb the hit parade.

The question that comes to the minds of many groups struggling for recognition might be, "Where would the Monkees be if it wasn't for the added boost of their weekly TVer?"

COMPO TO DISTRIBUTE DAMON

Edmonton: The hot new western Canadían label, Damon, has been picked up by The Compo Co. for national distribution. The label, a group effort (Nomads) has had fantastic success in the province of Alberta with their first release "Cry Baby" and "By Myself" by Lennie Richards and The Nomads. The reaction in Edmonton alone has given it No. 3 spot on the CJCA survey.

GUESS WHO MAY TOUR BRITISH ISLES

Winnipeg: Because of the tremendous interest shown by British radio, both government and pirate, in the "His Girl' single by The Guess Who, it's quite possible this Quality foursome may headline a tour of the U.K. Homeland support of their disc is rather spotty and most discouraging but rather typical of Canadian unity. The western provinces are usually solidly behind their artists as are the eastern seaboard areas. Toronto, well dubbed Hogtown, has built up a wall of resistance that can only be forced when their non-conformity becomes obviously embarrassing.

The beat, the pulsating rhythm, the music, the atmosphere. It's Dee and The Yeomen. Here is a group that is making it big. They play a commercial type of music, much of which is their own material. At the end of each set, sweat streams down their faces. The put everything they've got into their performances. They have a mystical power (gobs of talent) that transfers their music to the audience who holler for more.

The Night Owl Coffee House has a very warm atmosphere and Dee and The Yeomen are a very humane group. When I was down at the club last week, Keith, one of the members of the Outcasts (a musical group involved in a fatal crash) had just had his leg amputated and phoned in and requested a number, which Dee and The Yeomen played for him.



DEE and THE YEOMEN

Dee and The Yeomen have been together for 14 months under the able management of Harry Finegold.

Dee, who is 24 years of age, is leader of the group and has played lead guitar with several groups in his homeland, the British Isles.

Terry Watkinson was born in Ft. William, Ont. 23 years ago and is considered one of the best organists in the business. He studied classical piano before taking organ.

When it comes to talking about the best, you just have to refer to drummer Lenny Lytwyn who studied the art for two years and has been perfecting this talent for the past six years. When Len does his famous drum solo the audience just stops dead in their tracks in utter amazement over his fantastic movements.

As a three man group their sound equals that of 6 men.

They have had a lot of success in one niters and have had steady employment since they were formed.

They have just completed a cross country tour of Canada for British travel and arrangements are underway for them to tour with The Yardbirds in a forthcoming U.S. tour.

As a recording group, they have also met with much success. Each of their Reo singles "Take The First Train Home", "Baby It's All Worthwhile" and "In A Minute or Two" have all been accepted across the country and has led to the group being considered one of the best recording units in Canada. This was attained even though their hometown radio (Toronto) completely ignored them.

Their manager, Harry Finegold, has made plans for them to cut another record session with Canada's top producer, Stan Klees. The boys say the single from this session is "something different". It is also hoped to release an album as well.

Brecht On Brecht is now playing at the Hydro Theatre. Stars of this Canadian stage production are, Bruno Gerussi, Sylvia Lennick, Ben Lennick, Pam Fernie, and Larry Beattie.

Divided into two parts, the first is called "Man And His Writing" with interesting and well done excerpts of Brecht's poems, essays and other writings.

The 2nd part "Theatre" is made up of Brecht's plays; "Galileo", and "Good Woman Of Setzuani" and the complete playlet "The Jewish Wife". The play was quite different than had been expected and was well produced. In fact from the point of sheer enjoyment and professionalism, it should be a must for every student entering into or already involved in the art of acting.

The Bodessa are a group you may be hearing a great deal about. Their average age is 16 and they have been spending every spare minute of their time in putting together a rock, blues and Detroit sound that will make them one of the top groups in the area.

Alan MacRae is down at the Steele's Tavern, one of his favourite Toronto nite-spots. He plays a terrific 12 string quitar and writes most of his own folk and country material. If you happen to catch his act, ask him to play "Down To Mexico". This is one of his own compositions and it just sends me.

One reason the BEATLES may no longer tour is the suggestion that when they are performing on stage, they cannot be heard above the screams. This was apparently put forth by Paul McCartney, in London, this week. "Stage performance, as an art, is going out anyway" continued Paul. "I think the Stones had a shock when they didn't do a bomb at their recent tour."

Another reason for the decision could be that many Beatle numbers today have big instrumental backings which the boys feel they can't possibly reproduce on stage without changing their entire stage presentation to include a full band. This would probably be very unlike what would be expected of the Beatles.

The group will keep on recording, hopefully with each cut that much better than its forerunner. Says Ringo Starr, "The rumour that the Beatles are splitting up is nonsense. We're all good friends and we don't want to split up. There has never been any talk or sign of it except in the minds of others.'

Meanwhile the Beatles are likely to film their own TV spectacular soon, featuring tracks from their forthcoming LP which is nearing completion. The show would be shot in colour and would be made available to North American networks. The Beatles film plans are also taking shape. The problem has been getting all parties concerned to agree on a script. The next Beatle single will probably be a four minute waxing, their longest ever, to be released at the end of the month.

THE ROLLING STONES have finally agreed to appear on the LON-DON PALLADIUM TV show in February following months of negotiations between the network and ANDREW OLDHAM, the Stones' manager. They will also appear on the ED SULLIVAN show in mid-February.



Bob Stone, down Oshawa way, has been plugging away at the new



Spencer Davis Group single "Gimme Some Lovin" ever since he grabbed hold of it for his company. All he's

been trying to do is tell Canada that he has one of the greatest records to come across the pond. (That reference to Canada, by the way, was to the country). Well, anyway, there he was with a number one record (in England) and from nowhere in Canada. Well success comes eventually, if you knock on enough doors. He didn't have to bang on our door very long. One listen was enough to register GREAT, and apparently you out there thought so to, because it jumped up to No. 78, first week on and I hear that a number of Canadian radio stations are also giving it a go, including Toronto.

Now about that British Columbia scene. It looks like we're going to get somewhere. Got a note from a Vancouver reader name of Gordon Watson. Says Gordon "Hey! Why don't you Hogtown Homebodies turn your ears to the great sounds coming out of B.C.? You guys are too patriotic about Toronto." Now where did he pick up that apt description of Toronto? LIGHTFOOT SETS DATES FOR CONCERT TOUR

Toronto: Gordon Lightfoot, currently rising on the charts with his "Go Go Round" and packing them in at the Riverboat in The Village (Jan 3 to 29) will interrupt his Toronto engagement to appear for one performance (Jan 23) at Winchester, Ontario, just outside Ottawa. From Jan 31 through to Feb 2 he will be in NYC to record and make final arrangements for his next album release. Feb 3rd sees him at the University of Windsor and the next day (4) he appears at Dalhousie U in Halifax. The Strand Hall in Kirkland Lake Feb 10, Queens U in Kingston Feb 11, Waterloo Lutheran U on Mar 3, Georgetown District High Mar 10 and The Living End in Detroit Mar 22 through the 26.

Friday March 31st. Lightfoot will appear in a one man concert at Toronto's Massey Hall.

The Canadian Pavilion at Expo will be the next scene of operation for Lightfoot when he will appear from May 8 through the 14. It is hoped that a tour of western Canadian universities will be arranged by late Spring.

Latest U.S. action on "Go Go Round'' has it as "picks" in Philadelphia, Chicago, Houston, St. Louis and several other mid-west outlets. Murray The "K" put it on his "Battle" and found his WOR-FM NYC listeners preferred it over several contenders.





ANY DAY NOW....a certain record producer will announce that he is NOT going out of business, and make a comeback. People are asking, who is PUMPING the money into this operation.




Here's a new country cousin. Doug Hobbs has taken over the 1 to 4 country show at CKOX in Woodstock.
