

Ralph Hicklin, at 45, is the film and ballet critic, as well as feature writer for Toronto's Globe & Mail, and a regular writer-broadcaster for the CBC. He began writing revue material when he was an undergraduate at the University of Toronto, where he collaborated frequently with Donald Harron, author of SPRING THAW '67. Seven years ago, he wrote the greater part of the first VILLAGE REVUE which was produced at the Bohemian Embassy, a Toronto

Coffee House. The revue surprised everybody and even received a not-so-often nod of the burliest of Toronto's critics, Nathan Cohen, which possibly helped further the Toronto run of the revue.

Hicklin has contributed sketches to past editions of Thaw, and to a special revue edition of CBC-TV's "The Public Eye".

Thirty three year old Ben McPeek is Canada's best known and perhaps most successful arranger, composer, and what have you, if it deals with the music in-

dustry. He composes and arranges most of the singing commercials heard on radio and TV, and at one time or another, every national advertiser in Canada has been a client of Trail, British Columbia's most famous son. He also composes scores for many films and now operates his own recording company, and was responsible for the fame enjoyed by Canada's great-est selling single, "Canada" being that he arranged the Young Canada Singers Quality production.

McPeek has also done exceptionally well with revues and was music director for the Crest Theatre, as well as for the Canadian Players' successful production of THE FANTASTICKS and THAT HAMILTON WOMAN. He was also music director for two of the Dell Tavern revues, ACTUALLY THIS AUTUMN and DING DONG AT THE DELL.

As yet, wraps are being kept on who the principles will be. and what the revue will be about, however Hicklin will admit that the theme will relate to the revue coming of age.

In view of the past successes of SPRING THAW, and the fact that the '68 production will use the "coming of age" theme, one might hope that, for posterity sake, SPRING THAW '68 might find its way onto a soundtrack album. It could very well become a Canadian best selfer.

Moffat Awards Presented

Ottawa: Wednesday, Nov 29th, at 5:30 PM, one of the biggest events in the history of the Canadian recording industry took place in the Chateau Laurier Hotel when three Canadian record companies were presented with the Lloyd E. Moffat Memorial Awards, representing the best Canadian-produced records of the year in four separate categories.

"Canada" by The Young Canada Singers picked up two awards; Best Middle Of The Road and Best Example Of Canadian Talent And Originality. Bobby Gimby, one of the artists and Quality Record's Lee Farley were on hand to receive the award.

Catharine McKinnon's Arc release of "Come Share The Good Times With Me" was awarded the honour of Best Beat Record. Arc's Phil Anderson accepted for Miss McKinnon.

Best Folk Or Country Record award went to Jimmy Arthur Ordge's Apex single "Irena Cheyenne". Ordge and Compo's Roy Smith accepted.

Also on hand were prominent members of the broadcasting industry, The Board of Broadcast Governors; The Canadian Association of Broadcasters; and The Broadcasting Committee of The House Of Commons as well as representatives of the national press.



Hamilton's top groups, The Jameson Roberts and Reefers suffered a bit of a setback when fire destroyed the Pilgrim Music Store on Catharine St. N. The two groups had rented space in the basement for rehearsals and lost all their equipment with the exception of the drums from the Jameson Roberts. These were apparently removed only hours before the blaze. Fortunately for the Roberts, they've been staggering their gigs because of exams and should have replaced their instruments before their next appearance.

That Proud Canadian is on another kick this week. It's The Rainvilles, who have been tagged as "going together like peanutbutter and jam, boy and girl" and their music has been referred to as "being from the plunkiest country to the popinest rock". Dot Rainville keeps up with the American style with her offering of "Ode To Billy Joe" and her husband Morris has a sound like Johnny Cash with a slight Lee Hazelwood thrown in. Although they're a married couple don't think they're over the hill. You can get married when you're 16 you know. Marc Sonier is their bass player and comedy man and Mike Weaver is on the drums. They've been packing them in everywhere they've played and have been held over at their last 5 engagements.

The Witness Inc., are back in Toronto after a cross Canada tour with Roy Orbison and The Candymen. Their manager William X advises that the group played to over 30,000 during their 8 engagements. Their first gig back in Toronto was at the Broom and Stone on Nov. 25. Dec. 1 will see them in Orillia and they'll be playing Brampton on Dec. 2. If any of you westerners happen to be in Toronto from Dec 4 to the 9th., you can pop into the Penny Farthing in Toronto's Village for a look see at the group. They'll be appearing on CBC's "Let's Go" Jan 4th.

The Fraser Loveman Group is off and running up the popularity poll throughout the Niagara Peninsula and including Hamilton. Randy Newell, who pens the "Tempo" column of Hamilton's Mountaineer, caught the Loveman Group in action at the Kiwanis Club and kinda dug them. The new group includes some members from the old Dr. Funk band, and of course Loveman who was formerly the lead of The British Modbeats.

The Rainy Fields, besides having one of the best sounds in the Toronto area, are now classified as being one of the best dressed groups. Formerly The Evil, they've come out of the underground and with good direction from superb management will now be shown to the world. They've been outfitted in subdued yellow and green pleated suits with yellow shirts and green and brown English loom ties and high black leather boots. They've got one of the better lighting systems going for them including several strobes. At a recent popularity contest got together by Birchmount High School, The Rainy Fields topped the poll. Their fan club is now bolstered by members from England, Holland and Viet Nam as well as coast to coast in Canada and the U.S. They'll be playing a gig in The Empress Room of the Park Plaza (Toronto) on Dec 9 and one at the Milton high school on Dec 15. Mitchell high has them on Dec 21 and they'll be at St. John's Hall in Niagara Falls on Dec 22. Coming up is a recording session just as soon as they can book time in the Sound Canada studios.

The big international news would seem to be the possible establishing by The Beatles of a string of Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Clubs across the U.S. It's still just speculation but because of the hard times in England it could happen. They might have to come off their "high horse" when it comes to appearances, if they hope to kick off such a venture. It might be hard getting bread out of the tight li'l island.

Rumour has it that Zal Yanovsky is to join a Toronto group. Zal hit out on his own with "As Long As You're Here" on the Buddah label and then kinda disappeared from the scene.

That CBC-TV "Let's Go" show featuring Toronto's Magic Cycle will be aired on Wednesday Dec 13 5:30 PM. Apparently it was one of the best tapings in the series.

Donovan is one of the top folk-rock, pop-flower, what have you, performers in the world today. He is currently touring the larger centres of the U.S. and drawing capacity crowds. His appearance at New York's Philharmonic Hall, would probably have got the giant put down from Toronto critics, being as he was barefoot and wore a long white robe that almost covered his tootsies. As well, there were flowers everywhere, even covering the mikes. Too bad some enterprising Canadian promoter doesn't take a chance with Donovan. He's apparently making money for his U.S. promoters. If they're going to grab him they better act fast. His latest Epic outing "Wear Your Love Like Heaven" should hit the top end of the charts within the next four weeks, and that's when a recording artist is hottest, for appearances.

20th Century Fox are apparently flying an English group in for a pilot film hoping to take some of the thunder away from The Monkees. The goup is The Warren Davis something or other. Sounds like a CBC announcer.

Capitol's Staccatos will soon have their next release going for them. Rumour has it that it'll be "Walker Street", a hurry-up writing by Les Emmerson. They'll be heard on practically every radio station (pop) who carry Coke commercials. I've heard a couple of them and they're a gas. Big band and the works. The Staccatos, by the way, were the first Canadian pop group to employ symphony orchestra types to bolster their gigs. It all happened back on March 28th at Ottawa's Coliseum, when The Staccato's hired a string quartet for their presentation of "Half Past Midnight" which was one of their top selling singles.

Watch for a new Atlantic single by The Young Rascals. It's titled "It's Wonderful" and is comprised of two separate bands, although it's not an EP. The reason for the divided bands is to assist those Top 40 radio stations who have a tight format. The first band, running two minutes 30 seconds is titled "music" and is followed by a fifty second band subtitled "sound effects" and contains psychedelic sounds. This allows the operator to fade out the record after the first band. The Beatles' "Strawberry Fields Forever" had a similar presentation but without the two bands. All the Rascals need now is to have "It's Wonderful" make it as a hit.

CANADA'S PRODUCERS ARE AHEAD OF THEIR TIME

As Canadian produced records go out to disc jockeys, the comments regarding their potential eventually feeds back to the producer, and sometimes the group. The same comments keep cropping up too often to be ignored, and it might not hurt to study these observations from disc jockeys.

Often the critics say the production is a "copy of the American sound". They mean it sounds too much like a successful group, and there is nothing distinctive about it.

The other common criticism is that it is "not the sound that sells" meaning it is too far out and not enough like the other records.

You have probably figured out that the two comments practically cancel each other out except that there is a very thin line in between that isn't a copy, but does sound enough like everything else to be commercial.....acceptable....a hit.

I don't want to talk about the group that copies their style or arranging after a successful established group. They are imitators and usually depend on old songs already recorded. They have limited talent. I want to talk about the groups and producers who, very skillfully, come up with something unique and different and warn them that the critics often aren't capable of reading into an avant garde production the commercial potential of a new approach. Too often it may be years later that the sound rejected becomes the sound accepted throughout the world.

Often (and even very recently) I have warned groups that what they are about to release won't be understood by disc jockeys. Although the production is excellent and the idea inventive and well done, they are up against a static CITY..... Zone..... Prov.

formula of record production that is hard to break. Familiarity doesn't breed contempt in the music business, but you may have to disguise the formula you are following.

Three top notch record producers in the U.S. are currently producing right in the formula and no one is ready to yell "copy cat". They weave their own production characteristics into the formula and a hit is born. Many more hits are born as they wait for the next formula to become the fad (usually originated by someone braver and more talented) so they can produce their afterthought to again join the sameness. There is no law that says you have to create something new. You can, in fact, create thirteen Mamas and Papas, twenty-two Motown sounds, seven hundred Beatles and make hundreds of thousands as everyone calls you "genius". You must stick to that very thin line.

If a new sound came out of Canada would disc jockeys sit up and take notice? The past history of programming says NO! Canadian records aren't programmed for their originality.


Today there are three current records done in Canada that are ahead of their time. They aren't being programmed sufficiently to make any difference. There will be more to come and they won't be recognized, but no one is about to start a course in production techinques for record critics (or the performing arts for newspaper critics, for that matter!)

Toronto: "Rumble Of Silence", a \$150,000 production was commissioned by CFTO-TV, the first privately-owned television station in Canada to produce a major Canadian movie, and will be seen in colour on Channel 9 (CFTO-TV)

Tuesday, December 12th from 9:30 to 11:00 PM. "Rumble Of Silence" was written by Toronto's Dr. Sandy Stern, and tells the story of a young deaf girl whose fairy-tale existance becomes shattered by her first emotional responses to womanhood. The mother (Kate Reid) handicapps the youngster Stephanie (Joy Tepperman) somewhat by being overbearingly possessive and not much help is offered by father (Paul Harding) who likes to play around. Stephanie ends up in Yorkville with an artist (Marc Strange) and then enters artist's dope-pushing friend (Gino Marrocco).

Los Angeles: Barry Kane, former original New Christy Minstrel and now the new West Coast A&R director for Epic distributed Gregar Records, announces the signing of The Touch, a self-contained group. They are presently completing their first sides at Sunset Sound Studios.

Gregar is currently happening with the Randy Boone outing of "It's So Hard To Tell Mama Good-bye". Boone is a regular on CBS-TV's "Cimarron Strip".

LUCIE DONNA RELEASES ON MOUNTED

NYC: Lucie Donna debuts on the Mounted label with "Where, When, How" and "The Italian Bagpipe Man". The Howard Hodge Ork supplied the background of the production which was arranged and conducted by Billy Ver Planck.

Around Town WITH LORI

MONTREAL - Quality Record's Quebec branch manager, Liam Mullan, has left his post in Montreal and will headquarter out of Toronto as promotion manager for Atco-Atlantic group and Ontario sales manager for all product carried by Quality Records. Sales rep Robert Nickford, takes over as Quebec branch manager.

Guy Bertrand, former national promotion manager for Musimart Ltd., has been appointed marketing manager for the newly formed Polydor Records of Canada.

Shirley Harmer, formerly of Toronto and Hollywood and now residing in Montreal, has cut her first single with producer/arranger Pierre Noles, on the Disco Prestige label, a product of Jupiter Records, distributed by London Records of Canada.

Jupiter's Les Sinners, Montreal's top group, are currently No. 1 in the Province of Quebec with "Ne Reste Pas Sous La Plue". Also on Jupiter, Marc Gelinas' "La Ronde" has gradually dropped from the No. 1 position to No. 6. It is interesting to note that every record Marc has recorded in the past three years have been No. 1 on the charts. "La Ronde" has already surpassed the 70,000 mark in sales and that is for the Province of Quebec, not national sales.

Donald Lautrec's Expo song "Hey Friend, Say Friend" on the Jupiter label has sold in excess of 100,000. The French version is on the flip.

The Stampeders have left their mark in Montreal with their recent appearances at McGill and several high schools. Their MWC single "Morning Magic" would appear to be gaining attention. The group are now appearing in Ottawa, where CJOH-TV is reported to have taken several shots of the boys and may use them during the Grey Cup celebrations. Another famous Calgary crew almost made the capital but not quite. Here's a few dates that you might keep in mind for The Stampeders: Brockville Tiki Club (3); Welland Shing-A-Ling Club (8); Kitchener's Bingeman Park (9); Kingston Collegiate (15) and they'll be appearing for the first time in Chatham (29) and Sarnia (30).

John Herbert, author and Mitchell Nestor, director of the much talked about Fortune In Men's Eyes experienced a frightening few hours of imprisonment and reported brutality of their own just prior to the opening of the play at the new Bourse Cultural Centre. There had been some concern over the unfinished sets and a demand (while the audience waited and consumed food and drink, on the house) by Nestor that the actors run through a combined dress and technical rehearsal. The Centre's artistic director, playwright Jacques Languirand set four burly workmen onto Herbert and Nestor and apparently had them dragged downstairs and out of the way. After a few noses had been punched and a lot of shoving and swearing, the show got underway, to a somewhat tipsy audience at 11:20 PM. Herbert and Nestor were released from their confinement shortly after midnight. It was a smashed opening night.

MERCURY RUSHES CHRISTMAS SINGLE BY BLUES MAGOOS

NYC: Mercury Records is rushing out a Christmas release by The Blues Magoos. The record is a raunchy version of "Jingle Bells". Actually, only the lyrics are in keeping with the holiday season. The record came about when the boys suddenly hit upon the idea at the tail end of one of their recording sessions. Although Mercury rarely goes with a Christmas single, they feel this outing by The Magoos can see chart action.

NEMPEROR EXPANDS NEMS-BEATLES TIES AS STIGWOOD RESIGNS, PLANS NEW COMPANY

NYC: With the recent announcement of the resignation of Robert Stigwood and his associate, David Shaw, from their posts as directors of Nems Enterprises, an announcement is expected shortly of the formation of a new Stigwood Company

Stigwood had merged his show business interests with those of the late Brian Epstein in Nems earlier this year. The Nems firm, a British management complex, was formed by Epstein at the time The Beatles first came into prominence.

Stigwood's departure from Nems means that the New York-based Nemperor Artists, headed by attorney Nathan Weiss and responsible for handling the American business interests of The Beatles and all other Nems properties, will no longer be involved with such Stigwood-managed artists as The Cream and Bee Gees.

Meanwhile, Weiss clarified his position with the announcement that Nemperor will now broaden its base of representation for Beatles activity in the U.S. as well as for all other Nems pactees. Weiss flew into London recently for a week long series of meetings with Geoffrey Ellis, managing director of the firm which Epstein headed until the time of his death last summer. Neil Aspinall and Peter Shotton, long time close colleagues of The Beatles, are expected to fly to New York to confer with Weiss on a number of upcoming Beatles-oriented projects for North America



Another step in the right direction for Canada's growing music industry. RCA Victor announced plans for the construction of a new million dollar facility in Montreal containing three recording studios ranging from full symphony to narration sizes. The future studios are slated to be ready by August, 1968.

A&M Records must have influence with the "Hollywood Palace" TV show producers. The December 12th show will be hosted by Herb Alpert and features the Tijuana Brass, Liza Minnelli, The Baja Marimba Band, Wes Montgomery, Sergio Mendez & Brazil '66, Burt Bacharach, and singing duo Tommy Boyce and Bobby Hart. All the acts are with A&M.

The Irish group, Them, who are credited with such hits as "Gloria" and "Here Comes The Night", return to the record scene with "Walking In The Queens Gardens", on the newly created Ruff label. They are managed out of Amarillo, Texas, by Ray Ruff who, it's reported, paid \$25,000 for the groups' contract.

Scandanavian groups are trying to break in on the U.S. scene. Capitol Records has picked up The Golden Earrings, Holland's top group and have just released their new album "The Golden Earrings", which contains many tunes sounding like the early Beatles. Standout tracks include "Dream", "Call Me" and "Lionel The Miser"./Olga & The Janglers are Sweden's hottest attraction. Their new U.S. release "I Can Wait" is on London. Mercury Records is releasing "Turn On, Tune In, Drop Out", the original soundtrack of Dr. Timothy Leary's "Psychedelic Celebration". The soundtrack

is based on an imaginary LSD trip, featuring Dr. Leary as the guide.

Watch out for Bob Dylan's return. He will be bearded, have shorter hair and will even be donned in a suit and tie (Yes, a tie). He is presently recording three albums for Columbia./Lee Maye, outfielder for the Cleveland Indians, has been signed by ABC Records. His first single-will be "Can't Get You Out Of My Head''

Record companies have found a novel way to promote new records. RCA Victor has a 16 mm three minute colour film of their new English act, The Spectrum, singing their new release "Portabello Road". Rather than inaugurating records through trade ads, companies are experimenting by using films to introduce records through special screenings for disc jockeys and dealers, as well as on television.

Fans jammed L.A. phone lines for a chance to talk to Mark Lindsay of Paul Revere and The Raiders. Two California published teen magazines invited subscribers to call collect. More than 10,000 readers, mostly girls, responded, temporarily blacking out calls from Los Angeles. Calls came from all over the U.S. and from as far away as London, Tokyo, Rome and Montreal. Only 300 callers were actually able to speak with Lindsay. Wonder what the phone bill amounted to?

MORTON D. WAX & ASSOCIATES BOWS THE "IN-FORMER"

NYC: The "IN-FORMER", a copyrighted idea from Morton D.Wax & Associates, which will aid effectively in giving pertinent information to radio people in a more efficient manner than is presently possible, was recently introduced to the trade. Wax contends that "One of the biggest problems in record promotion, is that by the time a music director or DJ has seen 5 or 6 promotion men, each with 5 or 6 records, it becomes humanly impossible for him to remember which record is doing what." The "IN-FORMer", a $1\frac{1}{2}$ " by 7" strip with an adhesive back designed to fit a standard 45 rpm jacket, gives trade paper chart action, "tip sheet" action and radio play at a glance in a standard format. Unlike notes, which have a tendency to get lost, The IN-FORMer" will accompany the record into the music meeting. The "IN-FORMer" is available to all record promotion people, with their own custom logo, through Wax & Associates' New York offices.

Also on Starday is Justin Tubb's "Songs That Made Cowboy Copas Famous" which includes "Tragic Romance", "Flat Top" and "Signed Sealed And Delivered".

Rodeo recording artist Wayne King and His Blue Cats are featured nightly at the Country Palace, Montreal's largest country night club. The group have been the house band for the past six months and are considered one of the most popular country groups in the province.

Wayne is an accomplished fiddler, guitarist, pianist and vocalist who hails from Sherbrooke, Quebec. He first mastered the fiddle at an early age, and is recognized as one of the top fiddlers in the nation. Proof of this was the release of his first fiddle album, which made a nationwide impression. His second fiddle album has just been released and two cuts "Maple Sugar" and "Orange Blossom Special" have been so well received that Rodeo have released them as a single. Wayne's new approach to these two standards will no doubt gain new fans to fiddle music.





VANCOUVER'S "LET'S GO"

Perhaps one of the most viewed half hour daily television shows in Canada is the CBC-TV's "Let's Go" which originates from five major Canadian television centres each day at 5:30 PM.

Mondays, it's the Halifax edition with Frank Cameron hosting; Tuesdays, has popular Robert Demontigny hosting the Montreal show; Wednesdays, Diane Miller holds forth on the Toronto showing; Thursdays, it's Chad Allen and his Winnipeg crew; and Fridays, the CBC cameras zeros in on the Vancouver scene.

Vancouver's "Let's Go" entry features guest host-singers for a period of four or more weeks and also features guest bands on occasion, where the complete show is devoted to the band.

The hard working Vancouver CBC crew are constantly on the lookout for new talent but also concentrate on bringing in some very special and highly rated entertainment groups and stars.

Before that thirty minutes of a "Let's Go" production hits the television screen, many hours of work have gone into the final few minutes of entertainment. The production and technical staff have to map out the best approach to take in setting up sets, type of music, camera angles have to be figured out and a host of other very important chores. Good looking artists can look pretty bad with the wrong lighting and camera shot and the ordinary looking talent requires other angles to make them look better than ordinary. The viewer is very critical, particularly the teenage viewer.

After the dry run-through for camera, lighting, and other pertinent information, the production suddenly begins to take shape. In many of the "Let's Go" productions, the back-up band has its sound put down on tape so that when the final taping is underway, the band has a full well balanced sound and can't interfere with the artist up front, who usually sings live at the final taping.

Just before the final taping, there's a dress rehearsal. This will allow for the producer to make any last minute changes. On his monitors up in the control room, the producer has the choice of 3, sometimes more, camera shots on his subject, whether it be the artist or band. He is in constant touch with the camermen and floor director. If you ever sit in on a television production you will notice several people including the camermen are equipped with headsets. The producer is in complete control of the situation both on the floor and in the control room. While one camera may be zeroing in on a shot he sets another camerman up for either a wide angle shot of the set and subject and can set yet another camera up for a shot of a frantic fan in the audience.

One of the best ways to kick off a teen oriented type show is with a pretty and talented young gal and that's Gillian Russell, who besides being a successful recording artist with the New Syndrome label, is much in demand for personal appearances throughout the province. It's not just enought to put a good looking talent in front of a camera and let her talent do the rest. The right set and costume must also be taken into consideration as well as song material.

Much of the success of the "Let's Go" series depends on the drawing power of the male stars. Vancouver prefers to concentrate on the singing host and have had a great deal of success with Mike Campbell, who works well with Probably Us, the "Let's Go" regular band.

Local talent has to be used extensively to keep the drawing power of the show high among the area's teeners and one of the most popular is Dave Sinclair, who makes regular appearances. Another is Jason Hoover who has been featured with The Epics.

It's not just the localites that require sweetening. As a show taking up prime time on the giant CBC-TV network, it's necessary to come up with some extra money to afford the big stars (if they happen to be in the neighbourhood). That's what adds the professional frosting on top of the show, and Vancouver has shown the rest of the network that they can pick them, and there's more on the way. England's New Vaudeville Band, provided a riot of humour and music and let Canadian viewers see how "Winchester Cathedral" was done and another "top drawer" happening was a very close-up interview with Frank Sinatra Jr.

That's "Let's Go" from Vancouver and a pretty exciting thirty minutes, now just a memory and it probably took more than 20 hours of preparing to spotlight the best in Canadian west coast talent as well as some of the top names in the international field.

We'll take a look at other "Let's Go" productions in the weeks to come.
