

RPM's AWARD **PRESENTATION**

In 1850, the St. Lawrence Hall (then the town hall of Toronto) rang out with not much more than a jig, a reel or a polka. On February 23rd, 1970. The same town hall. now restored, was the meeting place of the music industry in Canada when young and old mingled together as part of the Annual Gold Leaf Awards presentation. The party, which was intended to honour the greats of Canada's music industry later became a tribute to RPM Weekly and RPM's Editor and publisher Walt Grealis.

Beginning at 6 p.m., the crowd started to pour into the hall. By 7 p.m. when the presentations were made, an estimated 250 music industry figures were on hand to witness the first Awards Presentation. Amid the clinking of glasses and the laughter, the band brought the attention of the audience to the stage. John Watts, Assistant to the Editor of RPM greeted the crowd and introduced George Wilson who acted as master of ceremonies for the occasion. As the band played "Canada", Wilson introduced Walt Grealis who made a short statement about the reason for the Awards and acknowledged his appreciation for the attendance of so many in the industry.

The Award Presentation began; the first honoured guest was George Offer of Apex Records, who represented Compo Records at the Awards. Offer was introduced as 'one of the pioneers of the record business in Canada". The crowd greeted his remarks with a round of applause as he introduced the winner of the Top Country Singer Female Award. The winner, Dianne Leigh was late in getting to the stage, as she took time to regain her composure. Dianne's latest Chart recording, "I'm A One Man Woman", was the music the band played as she made her way to the stage. As she accepted, a battery of photographers flashed pictures of the event.

Fred Wilmot, Vice-President and General Manager of Columbia Records of Canada, made the next presentation to the Top Canadian Content Record Company. The Award went to Quality Records and was accepted by George Struth who acknowledged the Award and thanked the industry for their vote of confidence.

Wilson then introduced Jack Richardson of Nimbus 9 whom he referred to as "pioneering the Canadian breakthrough". Richardson presented the Top Male Vocalist Award to Andy Kim, Steed Recording Artist. As the band played "So Good Together'', Kim made his way to the stage where he thanked the industry and reminisced about his early days in Canada and his

association with Walt Grealis prior to RPM and what RPM had accomplished since.

Jack Boswell was the next honoured guest. He made the Award to Canada's Top Company In Promotional Activities. Taylor Campbell, Capitol's Vice President In Charge of Marketing accepted the Award on behalf of Capitol and acknowledged the moves that Capitol had made in

Wilson introduced Ken Middleton of Warner Brothers next. Wilson referred to Warner Brothers as "one of Canada's truly great record companies". Middleton made the Award for Top Canadian Vocalist Female which was accepted on behalf of Ginette Reno by Gilles Talbot of Grand Prix Records. Miss Reno is currently appearing in London, England. Talbot honoured Miss Reno by making the point that her work in both our languages could bring the nation closer together.

The next honoured guest was introduced as the head of a company that had "excelled in sound for years" and had recently entered the tape cartridge and disc field. Joe Pariselli of Ampex made the Special Award to the Canadian Music Industry Man of The Year. Saul Holiff. Pariselli told how Holiff had managed the affairs of Johnny Cash from his offices in London, Ontario, and of his work on behalf of Canadian artists. Tommy Hunter accepted the Award for Holiff.

Next was George Harrison who was introduced by Wilson as the head of the company that had been the "first in records" in Canada for





many years. Harrison brought two points to the attention of the audience. One was the very fact that the Awards were possible and the second honoured Gordon Lightfoot who had worked from Canada and brought so much attention to Canada because of his works. He then presented the Award of Top Folk Singer to Gordon Lightfoot. Accepting for Gordon was Al Mair General Manager of Early Morning Productions. He thanked RPM and the industry on behalf of Lightfoot.

Art Snider was the next honoured guest. He was introduced as one of the pioneers of Canadian content. Snider was to present the Award to the Top Country Group...The Mercey Brothers. He mentioned their many contributions in bringing the attention of the nation to Canadian talent. The group accepted their Award and thanked the industry for their continuing support.

To introduce the next guest, Wilson noted, "Aroundthe RPM offices, he's referred to as the John Wayne of Scotland". He was speaking of George Taylor of Rodeo Records and then spoke highly of Rodeo's pioneering of Canadian content as an independent. Taylor then made the Award for Top Record Company to RCA Victor. Ed Preston, RCA's regional Sales Manager in Ontario was greeted warmly by the crowd. Preston dramatically outlined the push that RCA had made in 1969 to reach the top of the heap. His colourful remarks were appreciated by the audience. Preston exited as the band played "Sugar Sugar", RCA's big seller of 1969.

Among the many in attendance who had travelled from other parts of Canada was Fred Exon of Polydor Records in Montreal. In glowing terms, Wilson spoke of the reputation Polydor had attained under Exon's guiding hand and the strides they had made to further the Canadian industry. Exon then introduced the winner of the Top Country Singer Male, Tommy Hunter. He told of the research that he had done to make the Award and the esteem that the industry held for Tommy Hunter and his talent.

George Struth made the Award to the Poppy Family for the Best Produced Album of 1969. He told of the success and rise of the Poppy Family and their single and made note of the fact that they also won the best Single category. Accepting for the Poppy Family was Adrian Bilodeau of London Records of Canada. The Poppy Family had not been able to attend because of air line difficulties. Air Canada's public relations department did everything possible to get them into

Toronto on time, but it hadn't been possible.

GRT's Ross Reynolds made the next Award. He presented the Award for Top Radio Station In Community Activities which is a special Award given by RPM's editorial staff to an outstanding station. Reynolds spoke of CKLG's contributions to community activities and the role that Vancouver was playing uniting the music industry. CKLG's radio representative in Toronto appointed Denny Whittaker to accept on CKLG's behalf. Whittaker thanked the audience and RPM on behalf of CKLG.

The next guest introduced by the master of ceremonies was Don McKim of Phonodisc. He was introduced as the leader of the Canadian independent record company. He spoke about the newly legislated Canadian content regulations and bemoaned the fact that broadcasters would be forced to program Canadian content records. He then expounded on the talent and abilities of the Poppy Family and made the Award to Gilles Aubin who accepted on their behalf.

Modern Tape Cartridge of Canada's Bob Martin was introduced to make the Award to the Top Group. He outlined the success of the Guess Who over the years and the number of times they had received the Award previously. He praised the Nimbus 9 Group of Companies for their belief and effort on behalf of the group. Accepting for the Guess Who was their business manager Don Hunter. He apologized for the Guess Who's absence. Up to the last minute they were to attend, but they were called upon to help out a group who had to bow out on a performance and at the last minute, Hunter flew into Toronto to accept the Award.

As the band played the Guess Who's "No Time", the presentations seemed to be coming to an end. George Wilson began to end the precedings and as the band was about to strike up "Canada", Wilson made a special announcement and introduced Sam Sniderman of the Sam the Record Man stores. Sam praised the Awards presentation and brought Walt Grealis back before the audience and announced that the Ontario promotion men had got together to make a special presentation to him. He held up a Gold Leaf Award that the promo men had arranged for, which read "Walt We Love You, Ontario Promotion Men, February 23rd, 1970". The audience broke into applause and the ovation sustained itself for minutes as Grealis raised his arms to bring it to an end. When the ovation subsided, Grealis' first words were "Do you want to see a grown man cry?" Choked with emotion, Grealis continued. He

I don't know if RPM will do it or if they can, but I think it should be mentioned that history was made on February 23rd.

The music industry took that day to honour the winners of the RPM Annual Gold Leaf Awards and also to pay tribute to RPM's sixth year.

We shouldn't take away from the Award winners, but the biggest thrill of the evening was the Award the promotion men made to Walt Grealis, the editor and publisher of RPM and the applause that greeted Walt as he accepted the Award. It was a great moment for many of us, and from where I was standing there were many tearfilled eyes and many grateful people who were relieved that Walt was so honoured.

There are too few people in the business whom I have met who have the added attribute of being honest, friendly and sincere as Walt. The staff of RPM are all handpicked who, like Walt, are hard working and good people. RPM has become a bible in the business. Anytime you have a question that needs answering, or any kind of help, RPM will assist, and if they can't help you, they will put you quickly in touch with someone who can.

There aren't sufficient number of words that could express the feelings of the whole crowd at the St. Lawrence Hall that night. Friend and enemy of RPM had to admit that RPM had made more than a small contribution to the music industry and the industry honoured Walt Grealis.

Again, I ask you, who has done as much? The question was answered that night.

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thanked the crowd for what he referred to as "RPM's moment". He thanked the artists who had done so much to make the presentation a success. He talked about next years Awards and promised an even better presentation. Many in the audience suppressed tears as Grealis spoke. It was truly a great moment for the Canadian music industry. Not only had the presentation been such a success that the one evening seemed to unite the industry to one cause, and not only were the artists who were honoured. overwhelmed by the event, but the guests had been given an opportunity to come together to honour the industry. Ending all this was the presentation by the promo men to Grealis and the ovation that greeted the event might possibly have been motivated by the gratitude of the industry to RPM for having given them a common cause and bringing them together.

Sam Sniderman voiced the opinion that the industry would next year make possible an even greater presentation. Many of the record executives present talked about a banquet, cocktail party and dance to honour the Award winners next year, and amid the celebrities and the flowers, the crowd gathered around the winners to congratulate them personally.

The entire presentations ceremony was taped by CJRT FM which featured highlights on the air the following day. Other members of the media also covered the event and it is hoped that even more substantial coverage will be available in coming years.

It was a big day for the winners, but it was a bigger day for RPM and our seventh year of publication began with a bang-in a hall that 120 years ago awaited 1867 and confederation.



Domestic Production Increasing At Capitol New Recording

Production of records by Canadian artists on the Capitol label in Canada will have reached an alltime high at the end of this month reports Paul White, Director of A&R for the company. Sales of Canadian product in the month of December exceeded all previous records with Anne Murray, Edward Bear and Ivan Romanoff leading the list. Also a major seller in December was Pierre LaLonde's French language album and his hit single "Caroline", which became the biggest selling Canadian-artist single in Capitol's history. This January, Capitol recorded, in Nashville, Gene McLellan and Donna Ramsay, followed in February by a session for Pierre LaLonde in

English in New York and Toronto sessions for Halifax's Pepper Tree and Edward Bear who laid down tracks for their second album. Vancouver's Mother Tuckers Yellow Duck is in the process of canning material in Toronto.

Future plans call for Gary Buck and Anne Murray to begin album sessions. White stated that the approach he has taken is to aim all artists signed with the label towards the International market. "A strong indication of the interest Capitol in the States is taking in our talent is evident when we note that they have chosen to release records by Edward Bear, Anne Murray, Gary Buck, and Donna Ramsay"

Humber College To Stage Folk Festival

Humber College of Applied Arts and Technology, north of here, is set for two folk concerts to be presented March 5, 1970. The concerts, organized by the institution's student council will mark the opening of the new Phase II building on campus. Appearing will be: Allan Ryan, who has been signed by Columbia in the US to cut a double album to be produced by John Hammond Sr. Ryan has written a number of songs including "Born Alive" and "God is Dead". He has made several television appearances and was a regular guest on the Juliette show.

Martin and Sally arrived in Toronto in 1968 from the west. Originally

they performed on the night club circuit but in the past year have changed their style and now travel the American Coffee House and College Circuits.

Michael Cooney is a banjo picker and folk artist who has delighted audiences in both the States and Canada. He has, in the past appeared at Toronto's Mariposa Folk Festival.

Owen McBride has worked most of the the major festivals including Mariposa. His singing is strictly a hobby and he holds down a full-time job in the day.

Ampex Intros New Duplicator System

A master duplicator system for high speed duplication of both stereo cassettes and cartridges has been placed on the market by Ampex Corporation. The new system consists of the Model BLM200 bin-loop reproducer and the Model 3400 slave assembly. It is designed for use by tape duplication companies producing stereo cartridges and cassettes for consumer use.

Use of the bin-loop method improves efficiency in audio tape duplication because no time is lost in rewinding the master tape, according to A. Sroka, general manager of the professional audio products division. In addition, tape waste is reduced with the unit resulting in user economies.

The bin-loop concept involves a continuous loop of tape being pulled evenly across the reproduce heads. Program material is ready to start over from the beginning immediately after a program is finished There are no reels to handle or rewind. The BLM200 master duplicator is a self-contained unit capable of driving up to 10 slave assemblies without additional amplification. The unit is capable of reproducing at speeds up to sixteen times that of the original recording.

Record Companies

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Company For Toronto

Toronto: Toronto-based producer Harry Hind and Bob Marcotte, also of Toronto, have formed International Talent Associates, a set-up which will combine record production and artist management wings. Two publishing firms have already been set up: Redgate Music, a BMI affiliate, and Foresight Music, a CAPAC affiliate.

Several productions are already underway. Hind has recorded a group from London, Ontario, The Pink Orange and the Marcatos from Toronto. Other artists signed to the new company include Matt Lucas, who enjoyed regional success with his Mercury recording of "I'm Movin' On" and Bill King, a writer who composed and arranged the numbers for the Marcatos.

Hind will handle the producing end of the operation while Marcotte will be responsible for administration. Sessions are being recorded at Sound Canada. Future plans call for the formation of a label in Canada. The new organization has offices in Toronto at 50 Alexander Street, Apt. 2807 and in Detroit at 20211 Greenfield, Suite 3.



US Cap Signs McKinnon

Capitol Records in the United States has signed popular Canadian singer Catherine McKinnon to a recording contract. The chanter has already completed sessions for her first album on the label. Recording was done in New York. Miss McKinnon has twice captured the RPM Gold Leaf Award for Top Female Vocalist.

Paul White, A&R man for the Canadian arm of the company stated: "After the successes with Edward Bear and Anne Murray albums we have found that groups from all over the country are approaching us. This has made us even more aware of just how much talent there is in Canada and we will be making some important signings in the near future." The company announced at the same time that album product by Canadian artists would now be released in eight-track and cassette formats.

Rovers Fourth Tour

The Irish Rovers, residents of both Canada and the United States began their fourth annual "Sound of Ireland" tour, February 27th. The tour will encompass nineteen cities, and will run through to March 17th. Only Canadian date set for the tour is March 15th at Massey Hall. Featured on the tour will be Tommy Makem, formerly with the Clancy Brothers.

CKLW-FM Salutes Valentine's Day



Dave is no newcomer to this thriving business. For several years he operated The Surfer, which has seen many unknown Calgarians pass through its doors to climb the ladder of success. His policy is simply this—on Friday and Saturday nights, two or three groups are presented on two different levels, with old time movies run during the breaks. Sunday nights are reserved for a weekly rock festival where dancing is still prohibited.

The atmosphere of The Apollo can best be described as pure soul, due mainly to the fact that the premises were once the stomping ground of Premier E.C. Manning and William Aberhart as a house of the Lord.

Also new on the scene, is another major booking agency which has moved in from the Winnipeg area, known as Solo Entertainment.

Spear-headed by John N. Page and in cooperation with the Hungry I Agency, also out of the Winnipeg area, Calgary looks like it might finally come alive.

Through the years, Calgary audiences have been small in numbers and very, very unappreciative when it came to supporting Canadian Talent. But the past few weeks have seen a dramatic change.

Theatre Calgary's production of "You Two Stay Here, The Rest Come With Me", just might make it down to Eastern Canada this summer. Basically "You Two" is a rock musical of a different sort. Unlike "Hair", this play is based on the origin of Calgary from 1870

Piccadilly Square brought the Collectors back to town for a return engagement in January. Their only set was a little longer but contained fewer songs when compared to their first appearance. Their performance of their current single, "I Must Have Been Blind" was well received.

Buddy Knox appeared here recently at the Crossroads for a nine day stay. He was backed by the "Wiggy Symphony" who call Vancouver their home.

His style was a simple one as most of his material remained in the three chord category. "Hula Love", "Party Doll", and "Rock Your Baby to Sleep" brought back pleasant memories.

Monday February 23rd, Herbert Khaury, better known as Tiny Tim bowed into the Beverly Hills Hotel's plush Hook and Ladder Club. His first appearance on stage brought squeals of delight from the audience of grandmothers, suburban couples, sophisticates and five-year old kids alike. Tiny was called back for an encore following each of his two sets and no one left the Beverly Hills feeling under-entertained. By way of interest, Miss Vicki did not make the trip to the city of the Maple Leafs, she is reportedly staying with her mother and having some bridgework attended to. God bless Jack Fisher and Seaway Multicorp for bringing us Tiny Tim.






