

Gold Leaf Awards Are Expanded

The RPM Gold Leaf Awards for Outstanding Record Sales took a big step forward recently when it was decided that all records of outstanding sales would be eligible for certification through RPM. The Awards were established only a few months ago, and record companies have asked RPM to establish fair figures for all records whether English Canadian, Foreign and French Canadian recordings. We have also been asked to establish sales figures for the other configurations that are becoming very popular. We will soon be able to certify cassette and cartridge

RPM is presently preparing a brochure that will outline all the figures required for certification, It will also explain how the record and tape certifications make possible the Annual Gold Leaf Awards that are presented in conjunction with the poll conducted by RPM annually. The certifications also make possible the reception and presentation to the winners.

The standardization of record and tape sales is very important to record companies in that each company is up against the same set of rules. Each company must attest to their sales figures to an impartial body and only the qualifying sales are honoured with an Award.

The industry has already indicated their enthusiasm for the concept of the Awards and have shown



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their wholehearted support. The Awards indicate that an exception; al record has been promoted and sold to achieve a sales figure that is not easily come by.

The whole concept of the Awards would appear to be what the industry was waiting for and would welcome. We are pleased that so many companies have submitted their figures for certification and that so many Awards have been or are, in the process of being granted.

A kit that will contain all the information and figures for certification is being prepared by RPM and will be in the hands of key record men shortly. If you wish more information regarding a particular record that you would like certified, either phone or write RPM. We will gladly make the information available to you in the interim.

Warners to Bow Woodstock Film

Woodstock, the greatest gathering of people in one place to listen to music, is to be relived on film via the upcoming Warner Brothers film release of the documentary "Woodstock". For those who were there, the film will bring back memories, for those who weren't, it will chronicle an event of fantastic proportions. The film covers both the music and the life-style that Woodstock was.

Included are performances by Joan Baez, Arlo Guthrie, Richie Havens, Jimi Hendrix, John Sebastian, Sly and the Family Stone, Joe Cocker, Ten Years After, Country Joe and the Fish, Santana and Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young. Each is shown at his performing peak, with an audience of close to half a million. The live performances were captured by an extremely large sound crew working with two eight track machines.

To capture Woodstock on film required twenty camera crews, operating under the direction of Michael Wadleigh. From the original one hundred and twenty hours of film, "Woodstock" has been edited to a reasonable length for theatres. In total some ninety persons pooled their efforts and resources to make the film possible. Director Michael Wadleigh and Producer Bob Maurice and their crews worked for three days and nights

Appearing on the first bill are the Magic Cycle, Brutus and the Tote Family. Each of the groups have a time allotment in what is called the CAPAC spot. The groups will not only perform, but according to Lou Applebaum of the Canadian Association of Publishers, Authors and Composers, will play, talk and get to know the audience. The whole thing will "just happen".

This is the first of a series of these events that will "happen" in the new city owned Civic Centre and are an indication that the Centre is going to be opento all ages and become a community gathering place. The centre graciously opens its doors to young people at \$2.00 a head. The event goes on all day and from 10 A.M. until (who knows when) the young people can come and go as they please. CAPAC has participated in the musical activities to assist their young writer-musicians. They have been working with booking agencies and record companies to underwrite the performers and the promotion. The event is seen by CAPAC as a very worthwhile attempt to promote the groups in question in Toronto.

The announcement was made by Mr. Roy Perini, President of All Records, to whom Mr. Macleod will report.



HUGH JOSEPH - MAN ABOUT SNOW

(Since the photo of Hugh Joseph appeared in RPM (Feb 28/70) we have received several enquiries as to what Mr. Joseph is currently doing. Ontario promotion manager Scott Richards was so impressed with meeting Mr. Joseph at RCA's January sales meeting, he researched the Hugh Joseph story resulting in the following. — Editor)

Hugh Joseph retired from RCA in 1961 and has kept himself active with attending sports events, concerts, stage presentations, travelling and wintering in Florida. He keeps abreast of the industry by means of trade publications and still visits dealers. He will be 74 in June of this year.

It was in 1957 when RCA through Bob Simpson, then general manager of the record division and now general merchandising manager, consumer electronics and appliances, paid tribute to Hugh Joseph with a well put together article in the now defunct Canadian publication, Music World. The article appeared in a series of articles about the great "Backroom Boys" of Canada's music industry. Much of the following is borrowed from that article.

Hugh Joseph was born in Quebec City in 1896. He was educated at Quebec High School and went on to McGill University, graduating in 1920 with a B.Sc. Degree in chemistry. After a tour of duty with the 10th Canadian Siege Battery, a unit formed at McGill for overseas duty in World War 1, he was hired as a chemist with the Berliner Gram-O-Phone Company in Montreal. It should be explained that just prior to the turn of the century Emile Berliner had invented the disc record, and along with Eldrige R. Johnson, founded the Victor Talking Machine Company through which they were to market their new invention thus challenging the Edison cylinder. It was a few years later that Berliner founded the Berliner Gram-O-Phone Company in Montreal. It was Emile's son, Edgar M. Berliner, the president of the Montreal firm who hired the young Joseph.

Being a chemist in the record business in the early days was a real chore. Besides testing materials he made the "cast waxes" in which the original By WALT GREALIS

recordings were cut. These waxes were supplanted in later years by lacquer acetates and then by tapes.

Many changes and near disasters made Joseph's tenure with the company one of much excitement. Through the name changes from Berliner to Victor and then to RCA Victor and from the 1924 disaster which was almost the end for the record business (only to be saved by the development of electrical recording and orthophonic reproducers) and again in 1929 when the bottom fell out of the rich and frenzied twenties, Joseph maintained his position with the firm. Even in the midthirties his record department consisted only of himself and one stockroom girl and this lavishness was almost too much for the firm which was constantly in the shadow of the world-wide opinion that the record business was doomed

It was not Joseph's intention to become a desk bound record exec. He was keenly interested in new talent and was one of the first top execs to have a bugaboo about artists and repertoire work. He had an uncanny sixth sense of "hit pickin" which was just as important then as now, and he had exceptional interest in the discovery and development of new recording talent. Because of his interest in new talent. many of the stars of that day and, indeed, today acquired their star status through the assistance of Hugh Joseph.

It is interesting to note that it was Hugh Joseph who wrote up a recording contract for Edward Johnson (Eduardo Giovanni) who was later to become the celebrated general manager of the Metropolitan Opera Company, and who later became the father-in-law of the Honourable Mr. George Drew.

Some of Joseph's recommendations were accepted by his superiors and unfortunately some were turned down. One of the most glaring booboos was the thumbs down given an unknown dance band that Joseph discovered playing in Cleveland. Now after more than forty years and millions of successful records, that same band, Guy Lombardo and His Royal Canadians is universally known and still chalking up top sales.

Besides recording groups, bands

and artists, Joseph found himself recording events. One of the most difficult was the "live" recording of the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation in 1927. It was his job to record the brand new Peace Tower Carillon along with a message from the then Prime Minister of Canada, Mackenzie King. Joseph is probably the forerunner of portability in recording. Although available equipment was far from portable. he and his crew hustled the cumbersome box affairs along with several hundred feet of extension cables out onto the roof of the Parliament Buildings and successfully recorded a piece of early Canadian history.

There were some big names and many lesser known names who received the benefit of the Joseph production touch. As the villians of today's recording industry decry the use of Canadian content, they should be reminded of Hugh Joseph who, in the twenties was actually competing successfully with the world market with 100% Canadian content. One of the first was the Melody Kings Orchestra under the direction of the late Andy Tipaldi who, until his death in 1969, was president of the Musicians' Guild of Montreal. Besides "packin" 'em in" at the Jardin de Danse, they sold a helluva lot of records. Other Montreal names recorded at that time by Joseph included Harold Leonard and his Red Jackets who were playing the posh Windsor Hotel, Charlie Dornberger, Jack Denny, Sleepy Hall, the exciting Billy Eckstine, Harry Thomas and vocalist Dick Todd.

Joseph also looked in on the Toronto scene and recorded the Hart House String Quartet, Frances James, Reginald Stewart and Ernest Seitz, the latter remembered for his penning of "The World Is Waiting For The Sunrise". Also recorded were the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, Dr. Fricker's Mendelssohn Choir, the Happy Gang and Mart Kenney.

Perhaps because of his Quebec background, Joseph did much to create a recording industry for French Canadians. His early action is perhaps the leading factor in the success and dominance of the French Canadian recording industry over its English counterpart. Names like: Joseph Allard, The old-time fiddler, Charles Marchand et ses Troubadours of Le Quartier de Bytown and Conrad Gauthier, a folk singer known

border to border in the bi-bi province. Chanteuse Alys Robi, Claire Gagnier and Raoul Jobin, Les Disciples de Massenet and Les Petits Chanteurs de Granby and on and on.

Some of the names that are famous today include Wilf Carter, the great cowboy balladeer who was one of Joseph's early Canadian discoveries and who was followed by Hank Snow. There was the Joseph touch in the launching of Oscar Peterson. Peterson was too young to sign his own contract when he started working with Joseph making it necessary for parental permission to record the great jazz pianist.

In his 1957 article Bob Simpson quotes Joseph as saying "The most interesting thing about this Artist & Repertoire business is that it is never finished. There are always new artists coming up—new artists who have to be found, trained, encouraged, and developed.

"It is a never-ending job, and while you can take some pleasure and pride in what may have happened in the past, the real challenge is what you are going to do now and in the future with the youngsters who are just beginning. That's where the real fun is."

The Joseph philosphy of 1957 still holds true as we prepare, hopefully, to enter another era of Canadian recording triumph with some of the supposedly insurmountable obstacles once overcome by the trail blazing of Hugh Joseph, Canada's first believer in Canadian content.

"House Of The Rising Sun" Reborn

The "House of the Rising Sun" a traditional folk song about a New Orleans cat house and its attendant evils is in the process of being revived for what must be the tenth time. The song has been sung by countless folk and blues artists through the years and recorded by such notables as Bob Dylan, The Animals and most recently the Frijid Pink. The first major commercial success for the song was the Animals version which established the group as a major force in the group music scene.

Now, the newest version by Parrot group, the Frijid Pink is showing signs of becoming a major hit. In view of the renewed interest in the song, Quality is pushing their oldie Animals discing which has been a heavy, con-

Sly and Grand Funk to Gardens

Toronto: Eaton Walker Associates Ltd., headed by George and Thor Eaton and Ken Walker, have announced the newly formed company's first presentation. Sly and the Family Stone and Grand Funk Railroad bow into Maple Leaf Gardens April 3rd. Tickets for the package, which sold out three weeks in advance in New York's Madison Square Gardens, are pegged at \$3.50 to \$5.50.

Sly and the Family Stone are currently meeting with great chart success with their double sided gold hit "Thank You" f/s "Everybody is a Star". Their first major break into the charts came a few years ago with "Dance to the Music". They consistently meet with enormous success on the concert circuit, greeting SRO crowds almost everywhere in North America

Grand Funk Railroad have two albums on Capitol to their credit: "On Time" and "Grand Funk". The most recent, "Grand Funk" has made rapid inroads in most major charts.

OZAWA RETURNS TO TSO

Toronto: Seiji Ozawa returns to Massey Hall to conduct the Toronto Symphony for the first time since the end of his four year period here as Music Director and Conductor. Before leaving the Toronto Symphony, he was accorded the title of Honourary Music Director; the first to receive this title in the Orchestra's history.

Since leaving the Toronto Symphony, Ozawa has been kept busy. In September of last year, he conducted the New York Philharmonic for a two-month period, which was followed by a trip to France, where he worked with L'Orchestre de Paris until early December. He then returned to Japan to conduct the Japan Philharmonic in Tokyo. Since leaving Japan at the end of January, he has been conducting the San Francisco Symphony, a position which he will hold permanently next fall.

The proposed legislation of Canadian records on radio is a blessing to the Canadian artist. It is very important at this time for someone to say that the government is not legislating to open the door to every opportunist that will find the content ruling a good way to make some fast dollars and run.

It should be realised now that the legislation is just the door opener to a great deal of honest hard work that will someday create a healthy industry.

How fast it will happen and how healthy the industry will be is dependant on the kind of dedicated people that are willing to make sacrifices to create the industry.

From the standpoint of the booking agent, there is a great deal of talent required to promote and push the most talented groups. It is the job of the booking agency to create a clean atmosphere of competition that will result in the most talented groups and artists reaching the top. Any other motive on the part of the booking agent will result in a setback of the entire industry.

The booking agencies must fight to clean their houses. They must be selective in their choice of acts and build each group honestly and sincerely and rely on genuine talent. Too often the agency is guilty of manipulating a dollar making entity into a position where their lack of talent is quickly discovered. This must not happen.



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



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Peacefest Banned at Mosport

Toronto: The Ontario Municipal Board this week upheld a by-law of Clark Township restricting Mosport to automobile racing, thereby making the Lennon Peace Festival an impossibility at the location. The by-law was passed as a result of pressure applied to Clark Township Council by local residents fearing the influx of a large number of people, mostly young, into their secluded area. At least one resident of the area, whom this writer knows personally. had made arrangements to hire himself out, complete with loaded shotgun to "protect" property during the three days of the proposed festival.

Besides having troubles with local governments, the festival is having serious internal difficulties. Pop writer, Ritchie Yorke, one of the orignators of the idea has dropped out to further pursue his journalistic career. John Lennon, whose name is being used to promote the affair has now disclaimed, through Apple business manager

Allan Klein, all responsibility for moves which he does not officially sanction. Reports indicate that communications have broken down between Lennon and John Brower, a Toronto promoter who has been in on the plan since its inception.

Rabbi Abraham Feinberg, named by Lennon as an administrator of the peace fund to be set up with the proceeds from the venture, reports going into Karma Productions, the Toronto-based firm set up to handle the financial end of the festival and finding no one present administering the over \$60,000. already in the festival's coffers. At the time Brower was thought to be in Los Angeles. The \$60,000. reportedly was put up by a group of northern New York state resort operators.

Brower has asserted that the festival will go on with or without Lennon, "peace is bigger than Lennon". Arrangements for an alternative site are presumably being made.

Jocks Flown In For Hawkins/MTCC Bash

Several important radio personalities from major Canadian radio stations were flown into Toronto (14) to join press and local radio VIPs in a round of festivities that ended at the Hawk's Nest



and the presentation of the new Ronnie Hawkins Band.

Guests began arriving early in the day and gathered together at a cocktail party at the Four Seasons Hotel at mid-day. They later met at the Hawk's Nest for a special showing of the new band. Hawkins, who is currently chalking up excellent sales on his Hawk album "Ronnie Hawkins" and single "Down In The Alley" recently returned home to Toronto after a worldwide "Peace" tour in conjunction with Yoko and John Lennon.

Bob Martin, vice-president of MTCC, who distribute Hawkins' Hawk label, reports that the "Bittersweet" cut on Hawkins' album has become one of the top request items on several stations across Canada and is being rush released as a single. Flip side of the Gordon Lightfoot composition is "Forty Days", one of the past "big ones" for Hawkins.

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Ritchie Yorke To Telegram

Ritchie Yorke, Billboard's Canadian editor and former pop music staffer at the Globe & Mail, has taken on similar duties at the Toronto Telegram.



Yorke's first item for the Tely revealed the splitting from the Toronto Peace Festival of John and Yoko Lennon.

According to the Yorke article. disagreement between the Lennons and organizers of the Festival came about through the Apple pair's wish to make the Festival free to the many thousands who are expected

Organizers for the Festival are apparently determined to go ahead with the proposed summer show although it's not certain if their originally agreed upon location. Mosport, would be available. There have apparently been many obstacles thrown in the way, including the Ontario Municipal Board's refusal to alter a bylaw restricting Mosport Park to rac-

Reports have it, the Ontario Government have taken precautions so as to not have a repeat of a similar Festival in the U.S. which resulted in the show being declared a "disaster area". Apparently the Government wants the organizers to assume financial responsibility for up to \$875,000 for security; \$425,00 for water facilities; \$377,000 for garbage disposal; and almost \$1,500,000 for medical facilities.

MTCC Tapes Bobby Griffiths

Bob Martin, vice-president of Modern Tape Cartridge Corporation, along with his A&R director John Driscoll, have completed a taping session at Toronto's RCA studios, of Bobby Griffiths.

Initial release from the native Winnipegger will be his self penning of "Living On A Wish-bone" and "Simplicity". Martin also reports the disc has been set for release in the U.S. on the Buddah label.

Other taping activity for MTCC include Ray Hutchinson and a planned session for newly signed Rembrandt.

PR Appointment For Fielding

Liz Fielding has rejoined the Seaway Hotels' Public Relations department replacing Mrs. Reta Harris. Miss Fielding joined the staff of Trans-Canada Reid Theatrical Agency in November of last year as assistant to Mrs. Mona Norman. With the dissolving of the agency, early this year, Mrs. Norman was appointed Entertainment Director for the Seaway chain and Miss Fielding will continue to assist her in addition to her special duties.

Miss Fielding will work directly out of the Seaway Beverly Hills and will report directly to Doug Miller, the hotel's PR director.

Cross The Board Gains For Capitol

Glen Blouin, promotion for Capitol Records, reports brisk sales and chart action on several recently released singles. Showing top gains is the Canadian produced Edward Bear deck "You Me And Mexico" which has successfully bridged the gap of MOR and MOT programming. Major MOR stations have now added the lid to their playlists with many MOT stations giving a chart berth to the single.

Another Canadian single showing gains is the Anne Murray release "Bidin' My Time". Country stations have now shown a strong liking for the Gary Buck outing "Wayward Woman Of The World" which is holding strong at No. 2 on the the RPM Country Fifty.

Foreign product showing national strength include "Come & Get It"/Badfinger; "Instant Karma"/ John & Yoko; "Temma Harbour"/ Mary Hopkin and "Give Me Just A Little More Time"/Chairman Of The Board.

The Band, a four part Canadian group, are making good moves up the chart with their single

On the album front, top attention is being given the release of "The Letter" by Brian Browne. Already given a "pick" on the RPM Album selections, the set is receiving important exposure on the free form stations across Canada as well as top plays on the CHUM-FM outlet. MOR stations are also airing the album.

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ABUNDANCE OF CANADIAN TALENT - PROGRAMMER

So the legislation, long awaited by some sectors of the music industry, long feared by other segments, is practically a fait acompli.

We, as broadcasters, are staring the 30% compulsory Canadian content regulation right in the eye. As a broadcaster of comparitively long standing, and a Canadian talent booster of equally long standing, I view the whole thing with mixed emotions

I am sorry that the Canadian content must be legislated, but I am at a loss to come up with a better idea for a fair shake on exposure for deserving Canadian talent.

May I relate some of my own recent experiences in connection with the impending legislation. I have recently been engaged in an exhaustive review of our record library at CHAM, to determine where we stand at this moment with regard to the availability of Canadian records. I am happy to report that I have been able to find a great many LP's that are not only suitable from a content point of view, they are extremely good programming from any point of view. Some have been on hand for an extended



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period of time, I am embarrased to admit, others are relatively new releases. In the former category may I mention a specific example or two: "Broadway Hit Parade'', Wally Koster; "Introducing Peter Martin": "James Last presents George Walker". I was pleasantly surprised with the "today" sound offered by these and other LP's that suit our mixed bag of music here at CHAM to a "T". It is to my everlasting discredit that they have been overlooked until now, particularly in view of my continuing vocal support of Canadian talent. We are subscribers to the Canadian Talent Library. It is to their credit that the producers of this series have maintained their effort on behalf of Canadian talent for as long as they have, with but little support from their broadcast contemporaries. Much of their releases. particularly their earlier ones fall well short of the necessary "today" sound that I bear in mind as I approach the audition of any new product. Happily, of late, their releases are very much with it. Specific examples here would include: S5108, Anita Ortiz: S5103. Graham Teear: S5084 and S5095, The Al Baculis Singers, and although the numbers are not immediately to hand, the recent releases by Rob McConnel and the Boss Brass, Nat Raider, Denny Vaughn and the Metronomes. Then, in so far as newer LP releases are concerned, I am really enthusiastic about the Ginette Reno and Anne Murray LP's, to mention only two.

In the singles department, there have been outstanding Canadianproduced singles right along. Admittedly, there have been a great many "nothing" items as well. I would no more play a "nothing" Canadian record than I would play a poorer effort by the biggest name from south of the border. Maybe it's only my imagination, but it seems to me since word of the impending legislation first broke, we have received several, in fact many more that usual, first class commercial outings, all Canadian. I refer specifically to "The Chant" by Lighthouse: "You and Me And Mexico" by Edward Bear; "Julie's Just A Friend" by Justin Tyme and "Don't It Make You Wanta Go Home" by Terry Roberts. Of course, there are such great things as "That's Where I Went Wrong'' by The Poppy Family (and I should have included the group's LP in the preceding paragraph) and the two latest singles by Guess Who. However, you can't really tie in those releases with the

news of impending legislation. They were out, and they were good, before the CRTC took any stand at all.

The point of all of this that has gone before is that I believe that the 30% level can be readily attained by any Canadian broadcaster, format not withstanding, IF AND ONLY IF the Canadian record manufacturers make an all out effort to produce good commercial material in sufficient quantities to satisfy the need.


There have been, and will be. fears expressed that the increased quantity of Canadian produced records will drive listeners to border stations to hear the records they want to hear. Who's to say at this point in time that Canadians don't want to hear Canadian records? Certainly not the Poppy Family, nor Ginnette Reno, nor Anne Murray, nor the Guess Who, it's an established fact that Canadians not only want to listen to records such as these, they'll buy them as well. And that's what its all about in the long run, isn't it?

One important thing, there's absolutely no room for gloating on the part of any individual or facet of the music industry at the expense of the broadcasters as a result of legislation should it come to pass. The "I told you so" attitude that Don McKim spoke of in his letter in your March 14th., issue will only boomerang on that individual or organization that is foolish enough to express such an attitude.

As a broadcaster I will try to play those Canadian records that deserve exposure, hopefully there will be at least enough to reach the 30% level. If more are released then I will be happy to play them, without being told I must. If the threat of legislation only inspires programmers to research their libraries as I have done, and reach some of the conclusions that I have, enough programmers to make it worthwhile, then we may never need legislation. I have no axe to grind with Canadian talent, I do resent any intrusion by the state in the control rooms of the nation. But if that's the only solution, then so it must be.

"Stewart Sock Showcase" Increases Following

Kingston: Ratings recently taken in the Eastern Ontario region indicate that Greg Stewart has gathered a sizeable following since previewing his 'Stewart Sock Showcase' on CKWS six months ago. Many factors have contributed to Greg's success in Kingston, among them his personal approach, knowledgable platter chatter, and musical variety.

"I believe in Personality Radio and audience participation", says Stewart. "I talk to my listeners instead of shouting Formula Radio phrases at them, they vote on the "make it or break it" records, I invite them to call me about anything they would like to discuss, and teen reps from the local high schools broadcast weekly reports on my programme. I wouldn't have a secretary

answer my calls while I'm on the air because it's too impersonal and, if people take the time to phone, I want to take the time to talk to them."

The Kingston audience covers a broad spectrum of discriminating listeners. In addition to the teenyboppers and high school students, the city has undergraduates from the Royal Military College, Queens University and St. Lawrence College. The ratings indicate that Stewart's format has attracted an impressive percentage of the college crowd, in spite of the free form format of the Queens University AM outlet.

"I aim my radio programme at the young adult," Stewart explains, "I'm really not concerned with attracting the teenyboppers because I'm hoping that they'll tune me in after seeing my television bandstand show. It isn't likely that the college crowd will watch "Uptight".

Stewart doesn't believe in Formula radio's tight playlist which, in his opinion, is killing the single record; "It's a proven fact that the young adult wants to hear a variety of music -- current hits, potential hits, and oldies. That's why I programme a playlist of forty selections, plus at least twenty potential hits, and a generous cross section of oldies."

The "Sock Showcase" has excellent pacing. Between 4 and 6 p.m., Greg runs a tight board and keeps talk to a minimum. Between 6 and 8, he slows things down a bit and touches upon topics of interest to his

planning a schedule of specials following the fading of his Music Scene show and he left L.A. this week to fly to Lake Tahoe where Richard is performing to catch his act and speak with him about the possibility of a special.

If the special with Little Richard comes through, as I certainly hope it does, it may be just the thing to open the door to some recognition of some of the other rock and roll greats who made the music we enjoy today but have never been given the spotlight that network television affords.

Up in San Francisco Nick Gravenites and his fellow musician Mike Bloomfield have been very busy. After stints with Paul Butterfield and the Electric Flag, Nick has turned to producing albums full time and recording himself occasionally. He's just finished the first album with Sam Lay's new band and the first album by folk duo Brewer and Shipley. Brewer

and Shipley are not at all in the hard rock vein and this evidences what Gravenites can do when he's not working with a rock or blues band. It's an album I think you'll enjoy. It's called "Indian Summer" and the group is Brewer and Shipley.

Speaking of new albums, the first American Indian rock band has made an appearance and they're good, Called Redbone, they hail from Memphis and they've just released their first album on Epic Records. Like the first Chicago album on Columbia this is a two disc set for the price of one. Playing hard rock and a soft, pleasant feeling, Redbone sound like winners. It was produced by Pete Welding who has become well known in the music business for the work he's done in reissuing old blues material.

audience. The final half hour has become the highlight of the "Sock Showcase" -- a solid half hour of "Oldies for Pussycats Only". High school reports, contests, and occasional music documentaries also work their way into the programme's format.

"If a job's worth doing, it's worth doing well." This familiar maxim aptly summarizes Greg's broadcasting philosophy. Before attending a year of Ryerson's Radio & Television Arts course, he learned a great deal about the industry from Dick Williams and Len Michaels of CFPL in London and from Marty Adler of CKNX in Wingham. While in Toronto, he took some pointers from CKFH's Tom Fulton.

In April of 1967, Stewart was

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replace departing group member Eric Brann.

The two new musicians are Mike Pinera who was formerly the guitarist and vocalist with the West Coast group the Blues Image and Larry Rhino Reinhardt who has worked with a couple of groups including the Tropical Trip Company and the Second Coming. Both guitarists are originally from Florida and both have been performing in California most recently.

According to the Butterfly's manager, the reason guitarist Brann quit the group was that he wanted to pursue his own musical ideas. Brann has formed a new group which he will call Flintwhistle. Flintwhistle comprises other original members of the Iron Butterfly including Jerry Penrod on Bass and Barryl Deloach on vocals. Completing their lineup is Larry Feigen on drums. Flintwhistle will be completing their first album in the near future.

hired by CKNX. He established the Fab Forty Survey, hosted a two hour rock show, and got together a television bandstand show. "I enjoyed working at CKNX," Greg reminisces. "I learned a lot about programming there and established some important contacts because I was my own music director."

During his three years as a broadcaster, Greg has earned a reputation as one of Canada's most outstanding programmers. He not only knows what will sell in his market, but also strives to broaden the musical horizons of his listening audience. Frequently, he has been credited with breaking recordings that have become national chart items. In February of 1968, Laurie Records presented him with a gold record. recognizing the part he played in breaking the Royal Guardsmen discing of "Baby Let's Wait" and more recently he was the first Canadian broadcaster to air Norman Greenbaum's "Spirit In The Sky". Other recent firsts claimed by Stewart include: "She Belongs To Me" and "Easy To Be Free" by Rick Nelson, "As Feelings Go" by Spring, "Venus" by the Shocking Blue, "Ma Belle Amie" by the Tee Set, and "Space Oddity" by David Bowie.

Although Greg doesn't feel threatened by the 30% Canadian content ruling proposed by the CRTC, he is somewhat concerned about the influence it may have on the Canadian recording industry. "Perhaps the ruling will help to break down regional rivalries, but I'm afraid that the record companies may stress quantity instead of quality. I would rather see the industry continue to produce product of international calibre than to see the companies get hung up on numbers. The ruling could do a lot of good, but it could be harmful if unit production costs are reduced to accomodate a greater quantity of recordings."

The success of Greg's "Sock Showcase" at CKWS has led to the revival of his "Uptight" television show on CKWS-TV. Each week, he spotlights a local high school by inviting 25 couples to

appear on the show, featuring a film clip of the school, and setting aside time for the school's teen rep to discuss recent and upcoming activities. Also featured on the programme are film clips of the finest international recording groups and visits from the promotion men of Canada's recording industry. Artists who have been, or will be seen on upcoming editions of "Uptight" include: Creedence Clearwater Revival, The Guess Who, Rick Nelson, Brutus. The Hollies. The Collectors, Spirit, The Marshmallow Soup Group, The Grass Roots, The Copper Penny, Sly & The Family Stone, and Tranquillity Base. Promotion men who have or will appear on the show include; Scott Richards of RCA, Liam Mullen and David Brodeur of A&M, Ken McFarland of London, Ed Lawson of GRT, Tom Williams of Warner Bros., Charlie Camilleri of Columbia, Mitch Koritipel of Fantasy, and Rick Abramson of ABC-Probe.

With the "Stewart Sock Showcase" and "Uptight", Greg Stewart has established CKWS as a challenger for the youth market. With his approach, knowledgeable chatter, and musical variety, he has proven to his audience that CKWS is a station that cares about Kingston.
