

# Everyday People ready for charts

#### COVER STORY

GRT's new Canadian entry, Everyday People, have gone the usual recording route and armed with an aggressive and enthusiastic promotion network, from the label, are now ready for the block, Their first entry, "You Make Me Wonder", a 100% Canadian production and proudly displaying an oversized MAPL logo, comes from the production hands of Terry Brown and Doug Riley, who head up Toronto Sound Studios.

The plug side was written by lead guitarist Bruce Wheaton, a native of Amherst, Nova Scotia. A former member of the Stitch in Tyme, Wheaton does most of the writing for the group. On the flip, "Nova Scotia Home Blues" he is given a writing assist by gal group member Pamela Marsh. This Haligonian does much to keep the guys together, vocally, with herself in command of a good set of pipes. Pamela also doubles on piano and organ.

Another native of Halifax, Carson Richards, has played the bar circuit and every other type of circuit where he could work his bass guitar. He's been on the scene for over five years, which makes him almost over the hill. However, his joining the Everyday People probably saved him from the usual rock and roll musicians' boot hill.

### Quality to distrib Freedom label

George Struth of Quality Records has announced the company's acquisition of distribution rights for the newly formed Freedom label in Canada. First release to bow on Freedom will be "Wonder Girl" by Toronto's Nucleus. Nucleus first appeared on the recording scene with an album on the Mainstream label.

The Nucleus record is now in production and release is anticipated for early November. Promotion activities for the label will be handled by Shel Safran for Freedom and Mel Shaw, National Promotion Coordinator for Quality. Initial promotion will be in the form of a mailer including a giant poster, biography and photo folder. Nucleus is currently active on the concert scene with numerous engagements in Eastern Canada and the Northeastern United States. Somehow the East met the West and out of it came employment for a couple of Ontario musicians, Alan Muggeridge and David Hare. Calling Barrie his hometown, Muggeridge, the drummer for Everyday People, got his lumps playing with local groups in and around the snowbelt area. He was associated with Cathedral for almost two years before joining forces with this new group. Hare, an Oshawa boy, started off the hard way, whichever way you want to look at it,

with Jack London and The Sparrows (now Steppenwolf). Although he completed Grade 8 in piano, his function with this

group was as manager. Now he fights Pamela for the opportunity of providing the piano and organ work for the group.

Now for the piece de resistance. It's common for Canadians to join foreign groups. In fact it's even more common for a group to be comprised completely of Can-

adians with the exception of a foreign lead for which they receive flowers and hurrah's from both sides of the border. But Everyday People have pulled a switch. They've enticed a talented guitar and harmonica player from Greece to join their outfit, which should, make Everyday People a top play item for radio Greece. Christopher C. Paputts is the frosting on the Everyday People cake. He hails from Florina, Greece but, really, you wouldn't know him from any of the other group members. He spent four years with the New Breed and digs the Beatles which somewhat influences his delivery.

Everyday People are now holed up in Toronto. They're just as their name implies - everyday people. They're pseudo-establishment, which should help them breach the MOR ramparts, but they're just freaky enough to start their people ball rolling with the free formers and straight AMers.

### Hesler forms Atlantic provinces' first 8-track

Ronald J. Hesler will soon unveil the Atlantic Provinces first serious recording facilities with his new eight track Fundy Recording Company in Sackville, New Brunswick.

Hesler, who has produced in Montreal, Toronto and New York, has instigated this move into the recording field because of the lack of such facilities in an area of Canada that has produced, of late, some of the country's top recording acts. These include: Anne Murray, the writer of her top recording "Snowbird", Gene MacLellan and the Pepper Tree as well as many others.

The Moncton Times and Transcript in a published interview in their Oct. 24 issue quoted Hesler on how he attempts to accomplish a

breakthrough in recording as follows: "In the first instance, I shall be making available to embryo and budding talent, the most modern recording facilities east of Montreal and at reasonable cost and this is of vital importance to anyone who aspires to take the professional road. Recording is one of the most important phases in the training and formulative stages of a polished and professional group. Secondly, I propose to produce, record, promote and distribute 45 and LP recordings under our Fundy label, groups and individuals who, in my opinion, have the talent to make it on the national and perhaps international scene. I am certain that a great deal of such talent does exist here in our Maritime provinces."



Morris Cownden, one of the first investigators hired by the Board of Broadcast Governors to report on the state of music programming by Canadian radio stations, has exited this post for duties with Information Canada.

During his two and a half years with the government regulating body, now known as the Canadian Radio Television Commission, he has seen many changes including the introduction of legislated radio



# Anne Murray certifies for Canadian gold



### Armistice Day peace festival - a no no

#### (SPECIAL TO RPM)

Apparently youth can't comemorate peace in their own way in Medicine Hat on Nov. 11 this year. The "Armistice Day Peace Festival", which was to be a 12 hour representation of the younger generation's views and anxieties on peace complete with films, speakers and music, has become just another rock festival.

A number of local veterans lead by the past-president of the local Legion branch protested the association of the word "peace" with Remembrance Day and demanded that the whole thing be cancelled.

They said that holding a peace festival on that day was in bad taste and called it a "prostitution" of Remembrance Day.

Although the man claimed to be speaking, not only for the city Legion branch but for the whole Canadian Legion, the current president issued a denial a couple of days later, saying the man spoke only on behalf of himself and that the Legion; in fact, did not oppose the festival.

In the meantime, however, the small group of detractors had used the lever of the new, city-owned Arena & Convention Centre which was booked for the festival, and hammered out a compromise with the two, 16 year old promoters.

# Peg's Royal Ballet & Lighthouse for TV

Following smash performances at Ottawa's National Arts Centre and Toronto's St Lawrence Centre for the Arts, "Ballet High" receives its first television exposure via the CBC on November 25th. "Ballet High" brings together the creative forces of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet and Toronto's Lighthouse under the direction of choreographer Brian MacDonald.

The television production of "Ballet High" was taped at CBC's Studio 7 in Toronto during the first week of the St.Lawrence Centre engagement. "Ballet High" won bouquets of critical praise during its live run with Nathan Cohen surprisingly joining the throng and writing, "It is Hair, as it were, with people who can really dance."

"Ballet High", Canada's first and only rock ballet, is the brainchild of Brian MacDonald, a native of Montreal, who began his career with CBC doing variety programs. His works are currently being performed in nine countries. All reference to Armistice Day was to be dropped and the happening would be known simply as the "Peace Festival". Films would be deleted from the program and the list of speakers would have to be approved by the veterans group.

The starting time of the event would be put back from noon to 1 p.m. so as not to conflict with traditional celebrations of the day. In addition, the city threatened to close down both the festival and the arena if any violations of the contract were seen.

Some of Alberta's best musical groups had been signed to perform on the day. They included: Painter, South-West Freight, Bloody Winter, and Gainsboro Gallery. Canadian folk-singer, Laurie, was also skedded.

# Liberty/UA releases first quadrasonics

November 15th was the date set for Liberty/U.A.'s first release of eight track quadrasonic cartridges. Charles Bratnober, head of the firm's stereotape division revealed that the fourchannel cartridges were developed and engineered at the tape duplicating plant in Omaha. Liberty takes credit for developing the first quadrasonic cartridge which bowed last March at the National Association of Record Manufactureres convention in Miami. Initial release in the configuration comprises six tapes by the Ventures, Buddy Rich, Canned Heat, Vikki Carr, Leroy Holmes and Ferrante and Teicher. All are listed at \$7.98 in the U.S.

## TVer for Poppy Family

The Poppy Familŷ, Vancouverbased recording team headed by writer-producer Terry Jacks, have just completed taping of a guest appearance on the forthcoming Bobby Darin television special set for network airing early this winter. The Poppy Family have met with major recording success throughout the world, most notably with "Which Way You Goin' Billy" and "That's Where I Went Wrong". "Billy" became one of Canada's all-time best-selling singles for the London label.

Following the television taping, the group moved on to their home town of Vancouver for recording sessions, according to personal manager Dub Allbritten.

Ahmet Ertegun said this week that "contrary to all the rumours about Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young...they are not breaking up. This spring they will be playing a tour that will cover the entire United States right after they finish their new album for Atlantic. Right now they are preparing a show for the BBC which will be televised this winter".



A live album featuring the group will be issued in December as well, in the spring Atlantic will release another studio recording which the group will work on during January-February. So... aside from the individual efforts we will be able to hear from the various members (Neil Young's "After The Gold Rush" is already a best-seller, Steve, Graham and David will all have solo lps out very soon as well).....it looks like the main group will be around for awhile.

Aretha's new single (rush released) is Elton John's "Border Song". This is a really great song that hasn't been a really big hit yet. If anyone can do it, Aretha can. She certainly did it at Philharmonic Hall last week when she performed two concerts there to sellout, wildly enthusiastic crowds. She completely knocked everyone out with her vocal power, emotional range, and just plain funkiness.

I have never seen Lady Soul so together, despite the band that was somewhat lagging behind her. She did all her hits, "Respect", "Natural Woman", "Call Me", "Dr. Feelgood", "Spirit In the Dark", "Don't Play That Song For Me", "Eleanor Rigby", and "Share Your Love With Me". Aretha looked beautiful, slimmer and younger than ever before, and her performance was a sheer joy. When she has a good night, it doesn't get better.

Eric Clapton is producing Buddy Guy in Miami, with the assistance of Ahmet Ertegun. The combination of Clapton, a white blues guitarist who has been heavily influenced by black blues guitarists such as Elmore James and Robert Johnson, and Buddy Guy, who is, in fact, a black blues guitarist of repute, should be an an interesting one.

Watch out Led Zeppelin...Creedance Clearwater's next lp is already "instant gold"....two months before release! As a matter of fact....the album hasn't even been recorded yet! It will be the sixth gold record for the group, and as yet is untitled. 

# Duff Roman. . good news for the business by Jim Smith ,

It is hard to believe that Duff Roman is only 32. Not that he looks any older, only that the man has been prominent in Toronto's music scene for so long that I naturally assumed him to have more advanced years. After all it was way back in 1959 that he left Saskatchewan to work as a jock for CKEY. Then in 1965 he switched to CHUM. Now he can be found any weekday morning on the wake-up shift at CKFH, where he is also Program Supervisor.

Not only has Duff turned up at all the Toronto rock stations from one time to another, he was also a pioneer in bringing rock music to Yorkville, and establishing a Canadian record production industry.

Duff Roman was the man who put David Clayton Thomas on record, the man who turned out three successive hits with Thomas, and the man who suddenly disappeared from record production. To find out what drove Roman from the record business, and whether he plans a return, I visited Roman at his CKFH offices.

Of his business failure, Duff disclaims any outside responsibility. "If you're looking for a bogey man there really isn't one. The easiest thing to do would be to say that the radio stations wouldn't play the records, that Canadian talent wasn't the in-thing to promote in the media. But it was more, I think, of having done too much in too short a time and not appreciating that everything kind of operates in plateaus. (With such a sense of diplomacy, it is of little wonder that Roman has few enemies around Toronto, unlike so many people in the record business.) When we entered the recording business, we were all amateurs and things happened too fast for us to learn in time to save the business.

"All of the success we had was in almost a one-year period. We went from Boom Boom, which was in the late summer of '65, and was really the start - we weren't even in record production at the time; Mostway Productions wasn't formed yet and this was done as a flyer because we couldn't get any satisfaction from any of the local record companies - to Brainwashed/ Out of the Sunshine in 1966".

Boom Boom was recorded in Hall-

mark Studios and was a solid Canadian hit. It encouraged Roman to try again.

"Our second record in late 1965 was Walk That Walk and that was the turning point. That was the start of my company which consisted of David Clayton Thomas, the Shays, and a few other local people now withother groups and spread throughout the music industry.

"We were able to get it charted and played on CHUM. It served as the springboard to an appearance on NBC's Hullabaloo Show which, if I have to look back, was our greatest coup. Hullabaloo should have been the turning point, it should have solved our problems rather than being just another part of our mixed-up Canadian scene."

Roman believes the band should have stayed on in the States to exploit the offers which followed from the Hullabaloo appearance. Unfortunately they were too parochial (Duff calls it "nationalistic") in outlook and returned home. A spot on the Rolling Stones show at Maple Leaf Gardens followed but from there on everything was downhill.

In 1966, Roman produced Thomas' finest recording, Brainwashed. "We thought we really had a hit this time. Every radio station in the country was playing that record. The band had a western tour arranged and set off to capitalize on the hit. This is where I made one of the biggest mistakes: I didn't send a road manager. I was tied up in Toronto with my job and-looking after our business. We didn't know how important a road manager can be.

"On their way to the Lakehead, the boys had an automobile accident that almost ruined the car. They drove the rest of the way to Sault St. Marie without a windshield. Then they went on through to Regina."

Regina was the home of the concert promoters and was also the town where the band was told their tour was cancelled. Without a road manager, someone who knew how to deal with sudden business disasters, the band was helpless. The group of musicians

# Solway quits CHUM after program chop

Larry Solway, host of the sometimes controversial CHUM "Speak Your Mind" hot-line show, has resigned from the station. The resignation was apparently in view of the cancelling of his show the morning of Nov. 9. The show was chopped by Allan Waters, president of CHUM, who went on the air and apologized to the listeners "who were offended," adding "Nor will the Larry Solway show be heard on the station in future."

The Solway show of Nov. 6 was apparently what caused the hassle and was regarded by CHUM management as being "beyond the bounds of good taste." It was because of this that Waters made his surprising and public announcement. Solway reportedly based his Nov. 6 show and the hoped for 9th. on Dr. David Reuben's book "Everything You Wanted To Know About Sex and Were Afraid To Ask". Reuben was, in fact, expected to share the mike with Solway the morning the show was axed by Waters.

The Canadian Radio Television Commission has asked for tapes of the Solway shows in question.

Associated with CHUM for the past 14 years, Solway has hosted his hot-line-type show for 11 years.

Canadian radio has been extremely keen over the past couple of weeks. They are in the midst of rating period which runs from Nov. 2 through Nov. 15.

### CKLW to sponsor youth concerts

The Young People's Concert series staged every Saturday morning by the Windsor Symphony Orchestra throughout 1970-71 will be sponsored by radio station CKLW and aired on CKLW FM. Windsor. Agreement on the series was reached between F.J. Sorrel of CKLW and the Symphony. Tickets for the concerts, held at Windsor's Cleary Auditorium, are made available at no charge to Windsor and area students. Marti Holli, conductor of the Windsor Symphony has introduced a plan for the performance of an increasing number of Canadian compositions by the orchestra this year, kicking off the season with Harry Somers' "Little Suite for String Orchestra"

This year, the Orchestra's media exposure is greater than ever with both CKLW and CBE AM broadcasting concerts of both the youth and adult series at different times. Programs are also being made available to stations across the country through the Program Exchange Department of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters.

# Pioneer Village draws Yorke's wrath

As you probably know, Annette (my lady) is a pop photographer. No Linda Eastman grease this though. Ann has taken some really far out pix, especially of the Beatles.

Quite often, Ann goes out on strange missions to take publicity pix and album cover shots. A few days ago, she was getting together some pix of the new Nimbus group, Homestead.

Locations being harder to come by than a good rock single, they (being Ann, Homestead, their assorted managers and friends, and people from Nimbus) decided to take a few shots at Black Creek Pioneer Village

Readers not from Hogtown should be informed that Black Creek Pioneer Village is a settlement just outside Toronto (it was yesterday, anyway, but what with zooming city limits ... ) which has been restored by some Government authority so you can see what it was like to live in Southern Ontario a century ago.

I was there a couple of years ago. and I have to admit that the place had quite a funky feel to it.

The party arrived at Black Creek, and told the gatekeeper that they weren't sightseeing, but wanted to make some publicity pix. The gatekeeper dispatched them to the office, whereupon the guy from Nimbus explained that they'd taken publicity stills there before. One of the shots had been used for a cover, and appropriate credit was given to the Village in the liners.

The superintendent's secretary however -- decided that to take any more publicity pictures at the Village, 20 point typeface (almost 1/2") credit would be necessary on the front cover, or failing that, a fee of \$25 per hour. Either way, no interior shots.

The lady then whipped out a contract requiring about four signatures There were all sorts of clauses about credits and what have you.

The gang then raced in and took sixty minutes of pictures, in a style reminiscent of the way they used to make Keystone Cops movies.

Nimbus has been duly billed for \$25. and will have to take the trouble of putting special credits on every picture they use.

When I heard this sorry tale, I was furious. I couldn't believe that a Government which spends

millions trying to promote the attractions of Ontario through paid advertising, would have such a ridiculous, small-time attitude like this.

I'm not begrudging the Village getting its name around, but shouldn't that be something which Nimbus would do quite naturally? Do we really need a bunch of stuffed civil servant shirts acting as though they owned Black Creek? Don't the attractions of Ontario -natural and historical -- belong to all of us, even if we do have long hair and don't don white shirts?

The issue is so petty that one wonders if our own silent majority isn't suffering from the same miserable afflictions as are evidenced in the mob south of us. Why a big hassle about charging someone who wants to publicize an Ontario asset, while all the time. ugly high-rises are suddenly poking out all around the Village site. Or that auto fumes might be

rotting the old grey wood in the Village's buildings? Or that dogs might be pissing on the pioneer herb gardens?

Where is their sense of values? Where is their common sense? Where is their realization that Canada's young musicians are doing more to make this country internationally recognized than anything that a million uncivil civil servants could do?

An album cover would be one of the greatest promotional tools that Black Creek could ever hope to get. Especially if the LP was a big seller.


The whole affair reeks to me of a widespread lack of knowledge or belief of what our young musicians are doing for Canada.

The media in general certainly can't take any credits for what it's been doing lately to make Canadians aware of the local music boom. Radio is now far out in front, but they're only doing it because come January, they'll have to.

Television, as usual, is doing nothing. Canada's newspapers and magazines are doing little better.

When I arrived here about three years ago, I was staggered at the lack of press coverage of the Canadian music scene. I still am. Despite all that has happened, you might not have known about it if

Jim Smith's article "A Licence" is so true. If the radio stations want to invest in the record business, why not buy stock (49% or less) in an established label. Help them to produce better Canadian discs.

The C.A.B. is unbeleivably optimistic, if they really do expect a million seller in 18 months. As you know I'm an optimistic producer too - but that's ridiculous. But, all the best to them.

The CRTC decision is going to be a real nightmare to make happen, but we ( the broadcasters) will eventually make it happen to everyone's satisfaction. As one U.S. programmer told me a few weeks back, it's what Canada needs to get Canada on the record map in a big way. Maybe he too is optimistic, but it's a good sentiment.

One other point. Why do record manufacturers want royalties from radio for play? I have yet to hear a simple, short and good argument.

# US distribution arm for CTV productions

# CCR gold two months before release

For the first time in recording history (with the possible exception of the Beatles) an album has been certified "gold" in the United States two months prior to release. According to Saul Zaentz president of Fantasy, based in Berkeley, California, Creedence Clearwater Revival are only now going in to the studio to record the album following rehearsals. All material on the album was written by the group, production is to be by group-leader, John Fogerty. Advance orders of over 500,000 units are now in. In the United States 200,000 units qualify for gold.

Four of the previous five Creedence LP's have passed the magic million unit mark qualifying for platinum. The as-yet un-named album is set for a December 1st. release date.

### CBC/Brott to present Beethoven unknowns

On November 26th, the CBC Radio Network will give "The Young Prometheus" by Beethoven its broadcast premiere on CBC Thursday Music at 8:00 p.m. Composerconductor-violinist Alexander Brott first heard of a collection of unpublished works by Beethoven while on tour over twenty years ago. The 1970 bicentary of Beethoven's birth prompted the CBC to commission a score and arrangement of certain select works, the result of which is the November 26th program. The program will consist of four preludes and twelve fugues which will be heard for the first time.

suddenly found itself broke and unable to carry on. "They came back to Toronto in ones and twos. I guess most of them hitchhiked. Anyway, that was the end of all our plans. David dropped out of sight and no one could find him." With Thomas gone, Roman's recording business quickly withered. And that is how Duff Roman left the recording industry.

Would Duff try again? "Naturally I don't want to waste all the knowledge I picked up first time around. There are so many errors I wouldn't make again. The problem with me the first time, and the greatest problem facing all new producers, is that I was an amateur. Until Canada turns out a great many records, we will continue to be amateurs.

"Regulated radio opens a lot of doors to finding a hit record in Canada. I feel that with what I learned with David I could compete very well with the Canadian records. But I wouldn't want to make records just for the Canadian market: I would want to know that I am producing records that compete favourably with the American releases and that could do well in the American market.

"It is important to have the right performers. If I couldn't make it with a performer of David Clayton Thomas' ability, I would be unwilling to try with anybody less talented. It could be very difficult for me to find anyone that good."

### November is Motown month

Following Ampex' acquisition of the Motown label for distribution in Canada last week, the company has announced a month of intensive promotion to kick off the deal. In the past few days Ampex has released recordings by Motown artists in all configuartations numbering fifteen. Artists represented include Edwin Starr with "War and Peace", Stevie Wonder with "Signed, Sealed and Delivered", the Temptations, Rare Earth and the Jackson Five.

Under the long-term distribution contract, Ampex will handle material from nine labels from Motown including Motown, Gordy, Tamla, Soul, Black Forum, Rare Earth, V.I.P., Weed and Chisa. Thirty releases in all configurations are skedded for the month of November. Ampex reports that they intend to release all Motown album product simultaneously on tape and record.

# Northern Hair to close in December

The rock musical "Hair" will close its mammoth run at Toronto's Royal Alexandra Theatre in December with almost 400 performances under its belt. As of the first week in November, over 390,000 people had viewed the show, breaking all Canadian theatre records. "Hair" started reviews at the Royal Alex on December 29th, 1969 and has drawn huge crowds since. Of the original cast, ten are still with the show, Doug Barnes, Harriet Cohen, Dorian Clark, Freddie Nicolaidis, Paul Ryan, Wayne St. John, Shelley Sommers, Graham Teear and Robin White. Other members of the cast have gone on to television work and recording careers.

# Capitol to market 'Seraphim Guide''



# Spain's Raphael tries hand at English lyrics

Liberty/U.A. Inc. in the U.S. has picked up rights to all recordings by Raphael in the British Isles and Scandinavia. The deal, negotiated by Martin Davis, managing director of Liberty/U.A. England and Hispavox of Spain, is a natural extension of the association between Hispavox and United Artists in the United States where Raphael is released on the United Artists label.

One of the most important factors resulting from the agreement is the plan for recording Raphael in London, England, for the first time in the English language. Raphael has long been one of Spain's major recording talents beginning with his representation of Spain at the 1966 European Song Contest where he achieved fourth place.
