

Polydor push on Gregorash deck

Studio 3's Herschorn into own pubbery

Jack Herschorn, a managing director of Vancouver's Studio 3 Productions for the past eighteen months, vacated that position last



month in order to start a new publishing firm. Herschorn is still a major shareholder in Studio 3. He was the original organizer of the complex, an outgrowth of New Syndrome Records and Jack and Jill Music which Herschorn organized with Tom Northcott in 1966. Studio 3 currently has an agreement with MCA a result, in part of Herschorn's activities.

The new pubbery has been dubbed Jack Herschorn Music and will

concentrate its efforts on negotiating recording contracts for groups and single artists and to publish the acts' original material. Thus far the company has come up with three acts, Christian on London, Nancy, London and Songbird on GRT. Several other acts are under negotiation. The pubbery has also signed two writers; Glen Miller of Chilliwack (formerly the Collectors) and Wayne Achreiner, a new writer from Saskatoon.

Col's Chicago to play at Waterloo snow do

The Waterloo Lutheran University Winter Carnival '71 has made arrangements with the rock-jazzclassical Columbia recording group Chicago to appear in conjunction with the carnival festivities on Wednesday, January 27th, at the Kitchener Auditorium. In addition to the one Chicago concert, there will be concerts by Smile and Milestone, back-to-back on the campus showings of "Bonnie and Clyde", "2001 A Space Odyssey", "The Graduate" and other great movies, folk singing, snow sculpture, concessions, gambling, hayrides, and two, as-yet unnamed, top Canadian rock groups for the closing celebrations.

Canadian/English May Blitz touring U.S.

With a first album climbing the English charts, a tour, and a contract with Paramount Records in the U.S., May Blitz are Well on their way to North American success. Comprising former Jeff Beck drummer Tony Newman, and Victoria, B.C. natives Jim Black and Reid Hudson on guitar and bass respectively, May Blitz is currently on a tour of the United

States.

As well as his work with Beck, Newman is well known as a session drummer in Europe and has played with such artists as George Harrison, Little Richard, Brenda Lee, Jerry Lee Lewis and Cilla Black. Black and Hudson have spent a number of years playing with various groups on the west coast.

New Harrison LP. . . 3 for the price of 2

George Harrison is the third
Beatle-gone-solo, and Apple
Records will release his very
own album this week. Titled
"All Things Must Pass" (is he
trying to reinforce something?), the
three record set was recorded in
London during the past four months,
mixed in New York City. George
produced the album along with Phil
Spector, and he has made sure that
the price of the boxed set of three
discs be kept down as low as
possible.

The set will sell for the same price as would a double lp, and included in the package are a poster of George, plus a booklet containing the lyrics to the songs.

On the album with George are Eric Clapton, Billy Preston, Pete Drake (the Nashville steel pedal guitarist who has recorded with Ringo), Dave Mason, Bobby Keyes, Jim Price, Badfinger, and others. They are all heard on a 2-sided jam session segment of the album called "Apple Jam". Harrison also recorded a Dylan song, "If Not For You", and one that George and Bob Dylan collaborated on called "I'd Have You Anytime".

I have always felt that George was the most talented of the four Beatles and I am really looking forward to hearing the songs he has written, which Delaney Bramlett once told me would "flip me right out".

Music Director MOR guide available

The Massachusetts based Music Director programming service has announced availability of the 1970 supplement to their Oldies Guide as of December 30th of this year. The guide consists of some two hundred Middle of the Road oldies which made trade charts during the year. The titles are listed alphabetically, complete with the numerical highpoint reached by each record and the date it reached that peak.

Herbert Jackson, of Music Director, said that many stations were planning New Year's Eve, year-end programming of oldies and that the guide would be available in time for this. Last year, the company came up with MOR Hits/The Sixties which met favourable acceptance by radio stations in Canada, Australia and the U.S.



Anne Murray honoured at Capitol affair

A Capitol reception held at the Royal York Hotel, Nov. 26, honoured Canada's greatest success in the music industry to date. Youthful and beautiful Anne Murray is the first of the new stars that will come out of Canada as part of the 30% AM radio ruling for Canadian content.

The event was filled with events. The industry was honouring Anne Murray's million selling gold record in the U.S., special Awards from Capitol in Canada and The RPM Gold Leaf Awards for both her single "Snowbird" and her LP which have both been certified for "outstanding record sales."

On the 30th of November, Miss Murray opened at the Royal York's Imperial Room, possibly the poshest booking in Canada.

Arnold Gosewich took this opportunity to honour Paul White, Capitol's A&R man, for his many accomplishments with Capitol over the years. He outlined some of

White's acheivements. His discovery of Jack London and the Sparrows (who eventually became the nucleus of the very successful Steppenwolf), White's discovery of the Big Town Boys, and brought attention to the fact that Tommy Graham of that group was one of Capitol's Canadian artists. He told of White's work in bringing the Beatles to Capitol in Canada before the big invasion in the U.S. He told how White, as Capitol's A&R chief, signed Anne Murray and eventually the success of "Snowbird". He bestowed a special Capitol award on White.

White introduced Anne Murray to the radio, press and industry figures who had come to honour Miss Murray also presenting her with two Awards from Capitol and the two RPM Awards.

In attendance were representatives of all the media and particularly of importance, Pat Pearce of the CRTC which seemed to indicate that the Commission was anxious to see the early results of their very important ruling that could create a truly Canadian recording industry.

Polydor makes bid for Gregorash recognition

The Canadian arm of the giant Polydor Records is working hard to bring the talents of a young Canadian to the ears of the public. Polydor has been in the Canadian production business since they opened in Canada and although experiencing some success with the Montreal-based Bells, have never really captured the brass ring on the domestic disc merrygo-round.

The entire Polydor program that revolves around Winnipeg's Joey Gregorash is to break the record — first in Canada. The world will follow.

At 20, Joey is probably one of the brightest single talents on the Canadian scene. His recording career began with the Mongrels. a 'Peg group, and it was only two records ago that he decided to go it alone. His first deck for Polydor saw the label lay down a heavy promotion tour. Chaperoned by their popular promotion manager, John Turner, Gregorash was offered the red carpet treatment whereever he went. His disc experienced mild reaction. The label is now convinced of the potential of the young Gregorash as are many of Canada's knowledgable radio personalities. "Tomorrow Tomorrow", the second entry by Gregorash, has been slow to catch on but many believe it could be a sleeper.

If this is the quality of the Cana-

dian artist, then come January 18th. we have very little to worry about. "Tomorrow Tomorrow" looks good for a national breakout and its release in the U.S. on the MGM label has added much importance to its future in Canada.

Lightfoot gets winning nod from MLS network

Voting for the Maple Leaf System conference call for Dec. 3rd. resulted in the Gordon Lightfoot single, "If You Could Read My Mind" topping the vote.







Sam Sniderman. . . just by Jim Smith started again

If I were considering an occupation, the one I would choose would definitely not be in retail merchandising, a career that has all the security of a position on Montreal's bomb squad. In particular I would avoid record merchandising. Look at what's happening there: Capitol with an established chain (Alex Sherman's) that is still growing, Columbia

showing interest in a chain of their own, and no knowing how far racking will go.

Sam (The Record Man) Sniderman laughed. "Would I start in the record business today? I have just started out in the record business again. Last year at this time I had one store. Now I have 12." The additional eleven are franchises, stores that pay for the right to use Sam's name and follow his management guidance.

Sam outlined the situation facing the small dealer today. "The small dealer found that instead of dealing with RCA, Capitol, and so on he was dealing with many large distributors who handled many small labels. These distributors are not interested in dealing with small orders.

"A large chain of small stores gives each of those stores much greater buying power. Big volume buying means it is easy to get hard-to-get items. The distributors are sure to supply me or my neighbour next door (A&A Records) faster than they'll supply a guy who only needs five copies or who doesn't order large quantities of their other items. And I understand it takes 10 days to ship a record to the Western provinces. So distributors are reluctant to service them (the western provinces) because they don't want their hardto-get items tied up in shipping somewhere.

"'You have to have the records as soon as they're released. The way the communications system has developed, today a kid in Oshkosh is aware of a record the same day as a kid in Toronto. Either he's going to write to a mail-order house or he's going to wait 'til the weekend, hop in his car, and go to Toronto. So someone else who can get the records has to be supplying the guy up north to keep his store competitive.

"We had the choice of running the stores ourselves and making maximum profits but facing the problem of staffing them. So we went to franchising and avoided the staff problem.

"Our target is 80 stores from coast to coast in five years with an annual gross of \$25 million. I've been allotted five years from my charming wife to do all this. Then I'm quitting."

Sam Sniderman has figured in record retailing in the Toronto market since 1938 when he opened Sniderman Radio Sales and Service Ltd. on College Street in the west end of town. Later it became Sniderman's Music Hall. Not until 1951 did the name change to Sam The Record Man.

The current Yonge Street location, home of the world's largest pure record store, with an annual gross of \$3 million, opened 11 years ago. Immediately next to Sam is the other large Canadian record store, A&A's. Rivalry between the two stores is fierce. "When one of those stores phones me and says they want a shipment of a new release sent down in a taxi right away, I know I'd better send the same thing down to the other store at the same time," one distributor told me.

Sam built his store with ingenuity and long hours of work. He works ten hours a day at a minimum, six days a week. "Almost the shortest hours I've ever had in the business world," he says. "I'm not any different from anyone else who's been successful except I like what I'm doing."

It is his camival-flavoured sales tactics that get Sam's credit for his success. "We make people happy when they're buying a record and they're happy at home when they play it. We feel we are

MLS Network. . . now international

NETWORK of stations is now supplying news and comments on the Canadian scene through a tip sheet out of New York. One of the principal functions of the new arr angement is to supply what they call an "accurate" list of what records are being played in Canada. Emphasis is on foreign product. A high ranking spokesman for the MLS offered the service of their "accurate" top 30 to another publication (Ed: Which shall also remain nameless) and it was felt that a duplication of a service that has existed for seven years was only an attempt to be insulting, rude and downright assinine. So

the MLS took their "Canadianism" to the United States. (Ed: Sounds like sour grapes!!!)

A TORONTO RADIO STATION... has installed a permanent chopping block. It is coated with oil slick! (Ed: It's that "smooth" is it?)

PLUG THE DRAIN!!! A certain government body is looking at the Canadian artists that make it in Canada and expatriate. They feel that Canada shouldn't be a "farm

team of recording talent" for the USA. (Ed: What would you do Ellie, if you couldn't get a fair shake from the broadcasters in your own country???)

NO OLDIES OR GOODIES! Radio stations are out looking for Canadian oldies. When they were newies they usually threw them away before listening to them. Now they

Capitol lays on heavy promotion for Graham

Capitol Records have launched a massive promotion campaign to get disc product of Tommy Graham off the ground. Graham isn't doing to bad on his own with "Things Ya Say", his initial single release, already showing strong regional action. The flip, "24 Hours From Tulsa", a foreign copyright is expected to be released in the U.S. as the plug side. There are some Canadian stations now showing a preference for this side.

Graham's album, "Planet Earth", which contains both sides of his

single release, has also shown strong indications of making gains on the charts. This album was cut at Toronto's Bay Studios with Graham producing.

Part of the label promotion will be a cross-country jaunt by Graham into every important centre in the nation. He has just completed a trip to Montreal where he made strong contacts with local radio personalities. He is expected to move west within the next week, completing his promotion tour in Vancouver with Capitol's Western promotion manager, Barry Ryman.



Yorke tells Canadian phono fairytale

Once upon a time (in November, 1970 to be deadly accurate) a young man decided that he wanted to become a record producer. He lived in Canada, he really dug rock, and he had a few friends in a band which he thought were easily as good as most of the Americans who crowded the stages of Massey Hall and the Gardens and the airwaves.

So our young man went to a bank, drew out all his savings, tripped off to a studio and cut himself a record. It was a pretty good record too -- funky, well-made and instantly commercial.

The young man took his tape around to the record companies, where the various A & R director's secretaries told him to leave his tape and his phone number. Three weeks later, one of the companies called and offered him a deal for his single -- an advance of \$25 and 6-per cent against 90-per cent on all Canadian sales. Foreign sales brought a fifty per cent reduction in royalties and no advance.

In return, our young man had to provide two albums a year, the covers for the albums and he had to make sure the group were prepared to transport themselves to the Whisky a Go Go in Los Angeles at one day's notice.

Not hearing a word from any of the other companies (except one, where the record executive thought the Billboard Hot 100 was a list of baseball averages) our man decided to go with this highly enthusiastic company. They told him what a fabulous promotion job they'd do--they would faithfully send out 37 sample copies of his single to the key program directors and they would get someone to write a biography of the group. They'd even submit his record to the Boa Constrictor Chain, which was a group of Canadian radio station music directors who met once a month to pass judgment on the quality

of the new domestic records.

Now, if the Boa stations liked your record and gave it more than 389 votes, you would get a fabulous amount of free airplay on all of the stations -- probably as much as seven times a day.

"Wow, far out" figured our young man, and he told them to draw up the contract. Two weeks later, he received a copy of the contract in the mail. Everything was fine except that if the group broke up through any act of God, the producer's right to any further royalties would be henceforth terminated. There was also another little clause on the 37th page of the contract which said that the record company's publishing company had to have 50per cent interest in all songs written by the group. This included both sides of the single.

"Ah well, I'm not going to get my record out if I don't sign this contract, and that \$25 advance will sure be a big help towards paying the rent next week" our producer thought, and he signed the contract.

His record duly came out, but not before our young man had learned that there were better record and publishing deals around. One of the deals he heard about sounded really incredible.

There was a production and publishing company in Moose Jaw, which was owned by a radio station conglomerate in Halifax, which said they'd give you all sorts of air-play and chart listings if you let them publish the B side of your record. If you let them publish both sides, you'd probably get to number one.

Another radio station (this time in Vancouver) would guarantee to put you on the chart if you played at a club they owned for \$12.75 a week, and gave back \$10.

Yet another radio station would put you on their chart if you agreed to let them help produce your next single and album.

Disc jockeys in all sorts of places would play your single as an album track if you took them to dinner, bought them champagne and greased them with assorted 11-year old virgins.

A writer at one of the larger dailies would do a piece on your group if you paid him \$200 in new un-marked bills.

GRT. . . the way the west was won

While Montreal was still celebrating GRT's stepped-up activity with Canadian signings (Nov.16), the label's national marketing manager, Ed LaBuick, was out in his hometown of Edmonton and dazzling the localites with the usual GRT image building bash. The Embers party was a co-production of GRT and Tommy Banks, the latter owns the popular Edmonton nite spot. After the guests were wined and dined and wined again. LaBuick introduced Edmonton artists who release on the GRT label. These were: Tommy Banks, who had just released an album "Make Someone Happy" with Judy Singh; Bob Bradburn, local broadcaster who had already made a dent in the local record scene with his Christmas novelty deck, "Santa's Barber"; and a very talented young country singer, Dallas, who will release "Muds wamp", produced at Edmonton's Damon Studios, sometime in the new year. Bradburn's single was also cut at Damon Sound Studios while the Banks album was produced by CHED's Keith James at Edmonton's Century II Studios. It's interesting to note that some of the city's top musicians supplied the instrumental back-up for this album. These were: Marguerite Marzantowicz, Frans Hengeveld, Donna Jenkins, George Naylor, Mary Cockell, Tom Johnson, Claude Kenneson, Rostom Mody, Anne Bakker, Marcel Pinske, Mary Ingham (strings); Blaine Wikjord (drums); John Toulson (bass); Pete Thompson, P.J. Perry (flutes); and Alan Scott (percussion).

This was Edmonton's day and surprisingly enough there would appear to be a great many believers. Radio and television personalities were on hand along with key dealers and members of the press. Barry Westgate Edmonton's most valuable press booster of the Canadian disc scene, has added a note of importance to Canadian talent with his reporting on same, on a continuing basis.


Making the national picture almost complete, GRT has signed a Vancouver group name of Songbird, who will release "Sweet Elaine" sometime in January. This is a Jack Herschorn (late of Studio 3 Productions) discovery and are produced at Studio 3.

GRT have now laid down plans for a western Canadian assault by several of their signings. The last week in January will see a tour of Ronnie Hawkins and his band, the Fedville University Collegiate Klan, and Everyday People, kickoff in Winnipeg and be joined in Edmonton by the Vancouver signing, Song bird. They will then play dates in Calgary, Lethbridge, Vancouver and Victoria with a giant free concert in Vancouver to cap the tour.

Dec. 20th has been set as the big party day for GRT in Toronto. They'll take over the St.Lawrence Hall and present their new signings to radio and press and key dealers. This, of course, will include Everyday People, currently climbing the charts with their ini-

the large list of soloists and choir members. These included Ada Lee, Bobbi Sherron, Jodie Drake, Almeta Speaks, Jacki Gabriel, Colina Phillips, Mel Dixon, Bobby Dean, Edward Vann and Abbott Anderson.

The large throngs attending the program caused organizers to immediately enter into discussions concerning a repeat performance. Several noted television programme producers were spotted in the audience and it will surprise everyone if a television special doesn't result. Professional musicians and entertainers in the audience said the show was one of the most exciting they had ever witnessed locally. The general response was that if church could be like this the pews would be full and grooving each Sunday.

Jodie Drake is winding up the busiest performing year since coming to Toronto to first perform here some ten years ago. In the past the tall and talented transplanted Michigan song stylist has concentrated almost entirely on club work. To her credit she holds several records for long-running engagements at Toronto clubs. Miss Drake builds audiences and holds them, is the way more than one club operator has voiced satisfaction with her performance.

This past year Jodie has not only kept busy in clubs; the Holiday Inn (Don Valley), the Constellation Hotel, the Heritage Inn, and the Cav-A-Bob to name a few, but as well she has been busy with noteworthy appearances on popular CBC radio programmes, principally the Afternoon Show and Gerussi. In addition to CBC radio appearances, Miss Drake was one of the first performers to be booked on the network edition of Elwood Glover's CBC television program Luncheon Date, and has just performed in a live CBC production "Black Hallelujah - The Gospel According To Soul". The latter was taped for a special CBC Easter broadcast in 1971 and rumour has it that several prominent television producers are vying for the television rights.

Though it would seem that some of the busiest times are over temporarily, a look at Miss Drake's future schedule would imply otherwise. Coupled with club dates is an important week at the Town Tavern, beginning December 28., when she is featured along with Tommy Ambrose and the Norm Amadio trio, as a special holiday season entertainment package.

Come February Jodie will be back in the Cav-A-Bob for the entire month, reunited once again with the celebrated Saints and Sinners, including Buddy Tate. Added to all this are numerous other prospects for important engagements, at the moment still at the discussion stage.

Happy as they are to see the magnetic Miss Drake perform live her large and steadily increasing entourage of club followers continue to request records. It's a nightly occurence when she is giving live performances, to have countless requests for records in a single evening. Despite club appearances concerts and broadcasts. Miss Drake, undoubtably the best popular vocalist on the local scene. somehow has never been recorded. It's a mystery to her fans, many of whom drive from London, Kitchener and Oshawa, night after night whenever she appears in Toronto's leading nite spots.

With so many triumphs behind her in 1970, it hopefully will not be long before the records come. Perhaps the upcoming date with Norm Amadio's fine trio and Tommy Ambrose, will lead to a recording session. Somebody is going to do it one of these times and then thousands more will know and flip over the gal with the soulvoice-plus!

Manson's "Lie". . . cynical, haunting set

Charles Manson, in addition to all his other problems, has an album out. On ESP Records, it is entitled "LIE" and the cover shows Charlie as he was pictured on the front of LIFE Magazine, with the capital



letters LIE....(The "F" omitted). Apparently everyone concerned with the record has had a lot of difficulty, in getting it pressed, distributed, into the stores, and so forth; but despite all of the politics involved, it is a really interesting and compelling album.

Obviously if it were an album recorded and written by a total unknown, there might not have been any interest generated in it at all.But, as it has been done by Charles Manson, it bears some contemplation.The songs are really haunting, cynical lyrics that clearly spell out the man's alienation from society.There are thirteen songs all composed and

performed by Manson, with accompaniment by "the family". Much of the recording was done sitting around the fire at the Spahn ranch, the rest in a studio in Los Angeles.

Songs like "Garbage Dump", "Sick City", "People Say I'm No Good", and "Ego" make some incredible statements about what Charles' life was all about. Totally aside (well, as much as one can be objective with all of Manson's bad press) from his current criminal/political situation and the alleged crime, this would be a perverse and fascinating poet.

His voice is sort of folksy/raspy, and his guitar playing is adequate. The sweet voices of the girls in the family are chilling.

I have no idea of where this album can be obtained. Obviously the record company who is distributing it, ESP, is having difficulty selling it. Yet, for anyone interested in history and popular culture, this is a valuable album to have.

A popular culture heroine of another sort has also written a book.Viva, star of Warhol movies and others, has written "Superstar" The book is called a novel, but is obviously an autobiouraphy with most of the names changed. The story traces Viva's (Gloria's) early Catholic girlhood and brings her to New York, superstardom, and frantic lifestyle.

I absolutely loved reading this book. The first half, dealing with her childhood, is both moving and terrifying. The rest follows like a comic strip adventure with many familiar pop faces, and it is never dull. Viva has an extraordinary sense of humour, the perceptions of New York and the scene in general are an important document of the sixties. I hope she continues to tape all of her experiences and gets them down for further literary achievements. The book is published by G.P.Putnam Sons, New York.

Jefferson Airplane's Paul Kantner is putting together his first solo album for RCA, an outer space adventure called "Blows Against The Empire", which will be released sometime around the end of this month. He and his lady have also purchased a big beautiful beach house outside San Francisco and are gradually moving to their new abode.

want OLD RECORDS TO PLAY. Many companies and producers are not anxious to have their old records played as part of the 30% quota in January and AREN'T making the oldies available. They feel there is enough good material coming out that the stations could (with a little effort) fulfill not only 30% but as much 50% of AM programming with new records even ignoring those not produced by the broadcasters themselves!!!!!

RUMOURS OF A VERY HIGH LEVEL MEETING... of a very secretive nature. (Ed: There are no secrets in the Canadian music industry!) and you will be reading about the results of that meeting in RPM and the dailies across Canada (if the study of mass media allows it.)

I TOOK GREAT INTEREST...in the listing of Gold Leaf Award Winners in RPM two weeks ago. Many many others saw and studied it. I bet many of them didn't know that a big record sale could be officially certified. Many of the old awards that companies made up themselves could have been

presented for selling 35 records and accepting a return of 50. (Ed: I'll have to study THAT for a few minutes!!!)

MONITOR! MONITOR! MONITOR! I have suggested that in the new year, RPM adopt the slogan "30% or bust" Like many of my suggestions, it will be ignored until there are a few "busts"!!!! Then you'll be sorry!!!

THERE IS NO TRUTH TO THE RUMOUR...that the MLS will pick three records for airplay from each voting starting in January. Although it seems logical that this is the only way to have enough product to meet the 30% the rumour no matter how well founded is not official. It is an unofficial rumour!!! (Ed: Oh! You made that all up because of your super logic. You're just trying to put a bug in the broadcasters ear (or remove some!!!).

IF YOU WANT...a reaction to how record dealers feel about our singles chart...just make the mistake of leaving out the alphabetical listing in one issue and the complaints come in by mail and telephone. Dealers threatened to cancel the subscriptions if the

listing wasn't reinstated immediately. AND WHAT...happened to the MAPL chart of Canadian pop singles. You will find the top singles (Canadian) are now part of the RPM 100 and are clearly marked with MAPL symbols.

TRAVELLIN' OLD ED: has just returned from a cross Canada tour and will probably make RPM into a paper that will ignore hogtown and Upper Canada. (Ed: Good news is where you find it! So don't get smart! The west is getting off its ass and slowly we are getting news from abroad. It's all a case of where things are happening and the production activities in western and central Canada are starting to challenge the Montreal scene where the Canadian record business is happening and will continue to happen because of a new set of rules and some advantages that the rest of Canada hasn'tacquired (That will do!). So you see the activities are getting away from Toronto and Ontario...and that is how it should be.)

largely responsible for the interest in records in Ontario. We're always telling people that records exist. And we feel that when we move into Quebec and into other provinces we can open these areas up, too.

"That is the intention of our franchise chain: to develop record markets that we feel are presently under-developed. I state emphatically that we are not going into any area to put anyone else out of business. We're only going into areas where we feel there are buyers who must be made aware of records. So we hope to make large markets wherever we go.

"I can't say what will happen to the small dealer when we move into an area because I expect the big record companies will follow us with their stores. And I don't know what the outlook of the big record companies to the small stores will be. They are much more impersonal than we are because they have to answer to a board of directors that may not even know where Canada is. I may meet the small record dealer on the street and have to answer to him if I try to shut him out."

Is Sam not concerned that the big companies may try to shut him out? "We are very important buyers and I can't see the record companies giving something to one of their stores without giving it to us first. If they put something into their stores, we are going to know where it came from."

For the moment, however, it's Sam The Chinese Food Man. Some time ago Sam bought a building up the street from his record store so he would have a tape outlet. The second storey needed a tenant. One potential tenant who approached Sam was a Chinese food restauranteur. When Sam found the restauranteur could not meet his price, Sam agreed to operate the


Of course when he leaves the record business, Sam always has the restaurant to keep him busy. But it's a funny thing; I've never met a Chinese Sniderman before.
