

A&M ALIVE AND WELL ON CANADA'S WEST COAST

A&M is alive and well and living with Bruce Bissell in Vancouver. Bissell, one of the few promotion men who believes in spreading the word through press releases, personal letters and telephone calls, has taken his promotion job seriously and is beating the A&M drum up and down the coast and throughout the interior of B.C. and into Alberta.

His most recent coup is the breakout of "Carolyn" by Terry McManus - yet to break in the east. Bissell has been drumbeating the MacManus single to every MOR and MOT station who would give him a couple of minutes of time. This has resulted in substantial airplay and heavy requests at CKVN, CKWX, CKNW, CJME, CHED, CKOM, CFCO, CBC, CKCK, CHNC and CJAT. Bissell has had McManus in close tow which has resulted in important radio and newspaper interviews resulting in good sales.

Bissell is also high on A&Mer Michael Murphy and predicts him to be a monster within the next couple of months. His single, "Geronimo's Cadillac", taken from his album under the same title, has proven Bissell right already. The single has made excellent moves up the RPM 100 Singles chart and early indications have it a top tenner before too long. Bissell became familiar with Murphy and caught his act at the Whiskey in Hollywood, so has become not only a prime promotion vehicle for Murphy but a fan as well.

CALGARY'S "EXPRESS" READY FOR CANADIAN DISC MARKET

The most recent Western Canadian group to make a bid for the disc business is Express, a quartet who have been playing Calgary's Crossroads Hotel for the past three years. Headed up former Stampeder Len Roemer, the group incorporates the sound of a steel guitar which has added to its popularity, particularly with the recent hit, "Amazing Grace". Looking after steel chores is George Planiden, younger brother of Ced, the group's bass man. Chic Nagel is the percussion man.



The group pens most of their own material and all contribute to the vocal strength, solo and as a group. They are putting the finishing touches on their first album release but no information as to where the session is being produced by whom or what release label is ayailable at time of writing.

RECORD SALES HEALTHY – STATISTICS CANADA

Statistics Canada has more heartening information for record watchers. Canadian manufacturers produced 4,331,977 phonograph records in June 1972 as compared to 3,198,559 in June 1971. Production of pre-recorded eight track and cassette cartridges climbed to 743,946 from 331,050 a year previous. Further statistical information is available from Statistics Canada in the form of the June Service Bulletin (47-003).

EVERYDAY PEOPLE KICKS OFF TOUR

GRT's Everyday People are in the midst of a two month tour which kicked off early in August at Toronto's Generator. Dates include the Toronto Fair; MacMaster University in Hamilton; Oshawa's Genosha Hotel; The Penthouse Motor Hotel in West Hill (Sept 11-16); Thistletown Collegiate, Rexdale (22); The Coal Bin, Toronto (Sept 25-Oct 7); Picadilly Tube, Toronto (9-21); and the Gasworks in Toronto (Oct 23-Nov 4).

The tour was preceded by a junket through the Maritime provinces which saw the group play to enthusiastic audiences in Halifax, Dartmouth and Moncton. The group is currently happening with their "Feelin' Better Already" single, recent winner of the Maple Leaf System vote. GRT kicked off Everyday People's tour with a press-dealer bash at the Generator (17).

RCMP ACTIVE IN PIRATE TAPE SEIZURES

The RCMP has seized thousands of pirate eight track tapes in over one hundred raids across Canada, reports the Canadian Recording Manufacturers' Association. Charges are now in progress against the unauthorized dealers and distributors involved. Under Canadian copyright law, it is an infringement of copyright for any person to make, import, distribute, offer for sale, lease or sell an unauthorized eight track tape.

According to the CRMA, a "pirate" is one who deals in tapes made from authorized recordings, or live performances. Pirates are able to substantially undercut a legitimate producer's price since he has no appreciable costs. The CRMA has been highly active in the past year in stamping out such practices.

DR. MUSIC WIND UP WESTERN TOUR

GRT's Dr. Music has wound up a very successful tour of western Canada. The recently revamped group arrived back in Toronto two weeks ago after a three weeklong junket which saw them appear at major western showplaces including Banff, Calgary, Medicine Hat, Red Deer, Edmonton, Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Regina.

Climaxing the tour was the final appearance at Regina's Buffalo Days where the group received a standing ovation from the estimated six thousand patrons in the Grandstand.

Promotion support during the tour came from GRT western reps Harry Hrabinsky and Lorne Horning. The return to Toronto marks the beginning of sessions at Toronto Sound Studios for the group's second GRT album under the direction of group leader Doug Riley. An early fall release is scheduled on GRT in Canada and Bell in the United States. The group appears at Toronto's Colonial Tavern during the last week of the month.

James Rudnick has been appointed advertising and public relations manager for Hamilton's Shining Star Associates.

J. D. Evans, director of sales and promotion for Capitol Records, has announced the appointment of Bill Bannon to the newly created position of Artist Development and Marketing Co-ordinator.

In announcing the new position, Evans stated, "Capitol in Canada has been active in Canadian artist development for the past ten years and particularly in the last two years, Capitol's artist roster has been continually expanding under the direction of Paul White, director of artists and repertoire." In recognition of steady and controlled growth, Bannon's new duties will cover promotion, artist relations, marketing concepts, liason and tour support co-ordination for Canadian artists on the Capitol label. In addition to these new duties. Bannon will also co-ordinate activity for Penny Farthing Records and the newly acquired Island line. Bannon will also be responsible for new Canadian labels currently being negotiated by the company.

Bannon has been employed by Capitol for the past tenyears. During that time he has held positions as Ontario promotion manager, Ontario sales representative, national product manager and national promotion manager. In his new position

Bannon will report directly to J.D. Evans, director of sales and promotion. A succes-

sor to Bannon's vacated position as national promotion manger will be announced at a later date.

NICOLLE DUFOUR PUSHES CTI JAZZ IN MONTREAL

Nicolle Dufour, Quebec promotion manager for Quality Records, is currently touting jazz - the CTI brand, in the city of Montreal. The city boasts several successful jazz clubs, particularly the Esquire Show Bar. Superior Sound has also had a good return on their buck for booking in jazz names.

Miss Dufour, along with Sheldon Kagan of Superior Sound decided that if Jazz Festivals worked so well in France and the U.S. - why not in Montreal. They contacted CTI's Taylor and convinced him of the potential of the Montreal market and were given a Sept 30 date for a trial run. Names coming in for the Superior Sound Show include Hubert Laws, Stanley Turrentine and Grover Washington Jr. It's expected that if the show works out another will be booked for the Christmas season at which time they will have the complete CTI crew including Freddie Hubbard and Esther Phillips.

Jazz offerings are on the increase on Montreal radio with several stations programming complete shows. These include CJFM)11PM-6AM), CFQR-FM (MN-6AM), CFCF (11PM featuring albums), and CHOM-FM anytime. The CBC will bow their jazz show in September to commence at 11PM on AM and 7PM on FM.

BARRY GREENFIELD HITTING WITH NEW YORK IS CLOSED

Barry Greenfield, a son of Manchester, England, arrived in Canada in 1967, following emigration from South Africa. Taking up residence in Vancouver, Greefield entered university where he studied law and language.

Although an honour student, Greenfield gave up his academic pursuits to take up music on a full time basis.

In the spring of 1971, Greenfield's first record was released in England, "Sweet America". It was immediately chosen as "record of the week" by the BBC, but for some reason, the record didn't happen and Greenfield returned to Canada, where he met up with Ken Lundgren and Jake Doell, two of Vancouver's best-known producers. "New York is Closed Tonight" f/s "John Roil On" is the result of that collaboration.

Greenfield compositions are published by numerous firms, including Ardmour Beechwood of England, Thursday Music of New York, and the singer-composer's own Fatty Rabbit Music. Television credits include CTV's "Jean Cannon Show" and numerous interview programs in England.

"New York is Closed Tonight" is released on the Laurie label, both in Canada and the United States. It is distributed here by Quality Records.

This is a small country. It has one tenth the population of the United States and sells about 6% of the U.S./Canadian record market. About 95% of the records sold in Canada are 100% foreign content. (That last figure may be dropping slowly, but | there are no accurate figures available at this time.)



Being a small and unimportant country on the world and North American scene, there are a few things in our favour. One of them is the topic of this article. We will be talking about a revolution. A revolution that will slow down records, but change the whole North American record scene because it can work in Canada.

Here goes! Why not stop the manufacture of all 45 rpm records in Canada and start to make all singles 33 1/3 rpm, 7" and



Because we are a small consumer country, and because the record manufacturers and pressing plants are so well organized, why not do the Canadian consumer a favour and stop making 45s?

Eventually all record players in Canada would be one speed. All records would be one speed, and the silly function of buying a 45 and having to buy an adapter to play it, would end.

Canada has contributed very little to the world record scene. We could "revolutionize" the speed of records and start the first successful movement toward making the change from 45 to 33. Critics and experts have told us for years that the two speed system is ridiculous. Many attempts to convert in other countries have failed. Why not get together and stop making

BUILDING AN IDENTITY

I recently read Bob Hamilton's column in the June 17th Record World and would like to take some exception to what he said about the attitude of some Canadian music people towards the U.S.

All kinds of people are involved in a nation's struggle for recognition, and in a sense it is similar to the black struggle. Sure, there are those Canadians who believe that we are to blame for holding back the success of Canadian records over the years. Some honestly believe that we would not want the kind of invasion from up North as we had some years ago from Britain. We all look for scapegoats once in a while. However, with Canada building more of her own identity 45s? In a few months the consumer would get used to the idea of one speed and and bless the business. I would like to see this subject discussed at the next CRMA meeting. If you can swing it, it will be another feather in the caps of the Canadian recording industry.

Since very few 45s are imported, the answer lies in the hands of Canada's record companies and pressing plants. You simply decide to go $33 \ 1/3$ rpm singles and never make a 45 again. The novelty will bring the buyers into the stores (and where else can they get a 45, if you refuse to make the them).

By the way, I have a 45 player with one of those big spindles. If anyone is interested, I am willing to part with it at a price. (Of course it's an antique and I want a good dollar for it). They are pretty rare.

and having to depend less on the U.S.A., you will find fewer Canadian music people putting down this country. It is also important for Canadian artists to make their homes in Canada instead of moving to Los Angeles. I say this as a person who lives in New York who is constantly being told I am foolish for not deserting the city and moving out west. We need people telling us that this is a great city which must be saved.

Bob mentioned that Ritchie Yorke and Juan Rodriguez of the Montreal Star are dedicated to putting Canada on the world music map, but he did not mention the two men who got Canadian music men and women to start thinking Canadian. At times they might have embarrassed Canadians for their lack of nationalism, but Walt Grealis and Stan Klees changed the face of a nation.

THE CONTINUING SAGA OF "AUNT MARTHA'S SHEEP"


Did you hear about the Newfie who sold more than 60,000 albums in less than two months and he did it all with "Aunt Martha's Sheep"? Says RCA's national promotion manager, Ed Preston, "A Newfie joke, it ain't".

Dick Nolan has become somewhat of a hero in his home province of Newfoundland although his success hasn't even left the Island, but RCA are working on it.

Last week, you'll remember, we left you with the news of the turning point in the career of Dick Nolan, father of Bonnie Lou. This quick stepping Newfoundlander had just brought more fame - and real fortune to the Province of Newfoundland than the recent Conservative victory, and it all

happened through radio. VOCM program director Johnny Murphy, included Nolan's "Aunt Martha's Sheep" cut from his "Fisherman's Bay" album in his early afternoon lineup of music - aimed at the 18 to 49 age group. No sooner had the cut been aired than the station was deluged with calls. Murphy included the "Sheep" bit in other time slots with the same results. Other stations on the Island began programming the song and Bernie McKinley, sales manager of Crawford Music Sales (St. John's) had to reschedule his whole weekend to look after the orders for Nolan's album. The newly opened MacNeill's Music Sales also experienced a heavy ordering pattern.

RCA's regional sales manager in Halifax, Hansen Josey, reported his almost unbievable find to head office and like most head offices, they almost yawned - but not quite. Here was a buck ninety eight



artist making a hell of a lot of noise in Newfoundland - and he doesn't even have a single on the market. Anyway Bob Cook and company put up the red flag at thier pressing plant and pulled the plug on promotion manager, Ed Preston, didn't even wait for proof of the "Sheep" pudding. He jumped in with both feet and has now concentrated a heavy national promotion campaign to make away-from-home-Newfies aware of the success of one of the Island's most favourite sons. Preston expects to top 100,000 units sold within the next few weeks. weeks. The album has already qualified for an RPM Gold Leaf Award but it's expected Cook will wait a little longer and certify "Fisherman's Bay" for the newly bowed RPM Gold Leaf Platinum Award.

There's a lesson to be learned by the success of Newfoundlanders, Harry Hibbs and Dick Nolan. It's called being unique - but don't tell the Canadian commercial rock, middle of the road and country acts.

GEORGE EDWARD AND HARDING PACK GEORGE'S

Edward, George and Harding returned to Toronto's George's Spaghetti House for the fifth time this month and packed the supper club every evening of their engagement. The group's manager, Mark Robbins, arranged for various key industry types to be in attendance. The George's engagement marks the beginning of the group's hectic fall schedule. They will enter the studio within the next few months to lay down tracks for their next album release.

MILLS LEAVES NAC ORK FOR CANADIAN BRASS

Fred Mills has left his position of principal trumpet with the National Arts Centre Orchestra to devote his time to the Canadian Brass – a five man brass ensemble.


Mills has been with the Ottawa Orchestra for the past three seasons, prior to which he has had a varied career. He was principal trumpet with the RCA Symphony Orchestra and the New York City Opera Orchestra. He was also a member of the Marlborough and Casals Festival Orchestra and first trumpet in the Stratford Festival Orchestra; professor of trumpet at the University of Ottawa and principal trumpet under Leopold Stokowski in both the Houston and the American Symphonies.

Whose land is this land ?

Canada is a nation struggling for identity. Over the centuries we have been dominated, economocially, politically and culturally, in succession, by the French, the English and the Americans. I say "we" in the editorial sense since I am not strictly Canadian (I can hear the phone ringing now!). In the past ten years Canada has been going through



something of a metamorphosis. There is a growing self-awareness that to be Canadian is something more than a geographical reality. This state of affairs is manifested in many ways. We have done away with the old Union Jack-ed ensign and adopted a new flag, we've made a few un-remarkable moves towards economic nationalism, we've become a bit more aggressive in promoting Canada at the international level.

The United States severed its umbilical cord to Britain by way of a war. The very nature of that separation is conductive to the kind of national pride which the Americans exhibit. It didn't matter that the Pilgrims who landed at Plymouth Rock were booted out of the old country for their own intolerance of other people, rather than fleeing persecution, it didn't matter that the reasons for the American Revolution were

In Canada we have had no honest to goodness war to give us our independence. In 1812-14 we kicked a few New Yorkers around at Queenston Heights and sometime during the same war we nipped down to Washington to commit a bit of arson. But we weren't fighting for a change, simply to maintain what we already had.

Since there has been no dramatic struggle for independence to give us a national pride and identity, it has been a sad fact of life

TORONTO MENDELSSOHN CHOIR PERFORMS WITH BBC SYMPHONY

The Toronto Mendelssohn Choir scored a first in Canadian musical history with its Aug 23rd performance with the BBC Symphony Orchestra in the BBC Promenade concert series. The choir of 173 singers, under the direction of conductor Elmer Iseler, were invited to participate in the world famous Henry Wood Promedade concerts as part of the choral group's European tour which commenced Aug 6 and ends on the 29th.

The "Proms" series, held in the Royal Albert Hall is now in its 78th season. The past 45 years of the series has been organized and financed by the BBC and is tagged the "greatest musical festival in the world". This year's festival runs from July 21st through September 16.

The first half of the choir's concert will be broadcast "live" by the BBC with Canadian audiences having their chance when the CBC, which has purchased the program from the BBC) presents the "Proms" concert Sept 15 on the FM network at 8PM followed by an AM network broadcast at 8:03 PM Sept 21st.

On tour with the Choir are the Canadian Brass and the Festival Singers of Canada. The latter form the professional core of the group. The choir will give five concerts in England, France and Switzerland with guest artists soprano Roxolana Roslak and the Canadian Brass.

The Mendelssohn Festival Singers and Canadian Brass will also appear at St. Germaine des Pres which is part of the Festival Estival de Paris, now in its seventh season.

For reasons which are obscure and almost indefinable, we have experienced in the last decade a revolution of our own. Instead of being conducted with iron-clads and muskets we're fighting it with words and legislation. It's not as awe-inspiring as a good bioody war but in the long run it may well be just as effective.

Our revolution is as real, and probably more just than the 1776 variety. Where the thirteen colonies had a stamp tax to contend with we have almost total domination of our industry by outside interests. In Canada in 1972, it's not just a matter of tea; we've got cars, iron ore, coal, tractors, television sets, phonograph records, tape recorders, finance companies, insurance companies and land, millions of acres of land, to worry about. I'd be willing to trade off the entire Canadian tea industry, and as a parallel to the stamp tax, the Canadian Post Office to gain the re-patriation of the rest of the economic structure.

In the enthusiasm of the Canadian Revolution we may tread on a few toes a little too hard. In our business, music, we have been vocal in our nationalistic feelings. The industry was and is dominated by foreign interests, and if we're a little bitter about the success rate of our home grown stuff you must bear with us.

Bob Hamilton, and there's no reason why he shouldn't exist, is one of the most vocal critics of Canadian nationalism in music. We can understand that he might grow upset over our bleatings about our supposed mistreatment in the American marketplace. To tell you the truth, we get sick of it sometimes too. But I imagine that old King George wasn't too happy when he heard that the thirteen colonies wanted to control their own affairs so we can't expect anymore than that from Bob.

YOUTH INTEREST HIGH IN CLASSICAL CONCERTS

The recent Forum engagements of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra with famous guest conductors including Seiji Ozawa and Arthur Fiedler, has revealed an increased interest by the under 25 age group. There has also been a show of "youth power" in the classics in the U.S. The recent 6th annual Mostly Mozart Festival held in New York drew an audience composed largely of those between 14 and 25. It was reported that even with the more unfamiliar works, there was much audience enthusiasm.

Columbia Records have long been of the opinion that there was a swing to the classics by the younger crowd and geared their classical release promotion to the under 25s.

The introduction, by RPM, of Lawson Cook's Classical Recommendations has stirred much interest by programmers of the light classics many of whom report an increase in phone requests by an obvious young crowd. Cook, who is manager of the classical division of Sherman's new Toronto location (Yonge and Bloor), reports increased interest in many of the light classics from the 16 to 20 age group.

RCA's Ontario promotion rep, Johnny Murphy, is currently touting RCA's Red Seal "Adagio" release which features the Baroque Chamber Orchestra with Ettore Stratta conducting. Both album and 8 track will be promoted on a national scale. Ontario programmers of the classics have been quick to pick up on this release. The recent summer music festival at Aix-en-Provence, France, has brought popular, classical and folk music together and with apparent success. Internationally known artists from all three of these fields attended the festival, many of them participating in the open air "concerts in the streets".

Karel Gott, Czech born and classical trained tenor, will appear at Toronto's Massey Hall in September. Regarded as one of the most popular European pop artists in the business, Gott has successfully bridged the gap of MOT, MOR and the classics. Boot's latest discovery, Chris Scott, is off with his initial release, "Now That I'm Back" a self penning produced by Fred McKenna.






SLIDER T. Rex Reprise R 2095-P

Let's get our facts straight

The broadcasters of Canada could do a great deal to clear up a myth that has spread around the world. The idea that 30% of all records played in Canada must be Canadian is not true. In fact Elvis Presley singing "Snowbird" is not a Canadian record, but it does constitute Canadian content.

There are many other examples of records which are not Canadian yet still fulfill the

Programmers CROSSTALK walt grealis

Broadcast Act. It is also logical, that if the FCC found itself in the same position as Canada a couple of years ago, they would have legislated a higher percentage for domestic airplay in the U.S. and we as Canadians wouldn't have blamed them.

Culture, like motherhood and the flag, is sacred. The airwaves are there for the enjoyment and enlightenment of the Canadian (or American) people. If any country finds that the airwaves become a frivolous jukebox of foreign fare, that country will legislate so that their own creative talent is not held back or forced to expatriate.

Put in the same position, I wonder if the United States wouldn't have legislated 85% completely American talent.

As for the United States, they have, over the years, set the pace of the music industry throughout the world. They have pioneered music and recording and the hardware of our industry. We have nothing but respect for the fact that their star system is something that we must envy.

CKSO READYING OLDIES' WEEKEND

Jim Thompson, music director at CKSO Sudbury, is currently putting together an oldies' weekend which he hopes to air the latter part of September. The program will be made up of hits of the fifties along with pertinent information on the artists of that era.

Those record companies, or other programmers, having biographies, historical information and records on artists who made it big from 1954 ie: Bill Haley, Elvis Presley, Gene Vincent etc. would assist Thompson greatly if they would contact him at (705) 674-0711 or send the information to him at CKSO, Box 400, Sudbury, Ont. Ask yourselves where the world music and record industry would be today if the United States hadn't pioneered recording. They gave us jazz, they gave us folk and they gave us the new era of rock and the sub-culture that has developed into the art form of the sixties and seventies.

Maybe Canada has felt a little inferior sitting back and only being a "user". The Canadian "us too" feeling shouldn't be misconstrued as being selfish or anti-American.

In the years of RPM, we have maintained a pro-Canadian attitude. We have often been accused of being anti-American. One of our staff once said we MUST be anti-American because all we write about is Canadian things. In fact, we attempt not to duplicate that which the U.S. trade press does very well. We supply Canada with Canadian news from Canada. What more can we do? Should we be an imitation of the foreign trade weeklies? What value would that be?

VOCM PLAY FORCES RYAN FANCY SINGLE

Bernie McKinley, Sales Manager Crawford Music Ltd., St. John's, reports heavy ordering on the recent Audat album release of "Looking Back" by Ryan's Fancy. Newfoundland excitement over the set came about through the airing by VOCM of the "Streets Of London" cut. Requests for more play caused switchboard problems at the station, similar to that of Dick Nolan's "Aunt Martha's Sheep". Pressure was then put on Audat's Bob Stone to release the "London" cut as a single which has already created a backorder situation at Crawfords. The Fancy album has sold in excess of 5000 units in less than one week and McKinley predicts this one to be another giant for. Newfoundland.

VOCM's "Pick The Hits" show (17) brought the "London" cut in as No. 1. Fancy have just completed their third album, "Irish Drinking Songs In Newfoundland", news of which has spread throughout the Island resulting in a healthy advance sales situation at the Crawford office. Audat is distributed across Canada by World Records.

The Fancy session was produced by the group and Bob Stone for Media Artists Services and Fivetake Group Productions Ltd., with taping at Audio Atlantic, Halifax.

The Canadian broadcaster should do everything possible to make it clear to our friends and fellow broadcasters in the United States, that Canada's 30% music ruling is very broad. A CANADIAN RADIO STATION COULD PROGRAM FOREVER WITHOUT PLAYING ONE COMPLETELY CANADIAN RECORD, and still fulfill the regulation.

Any song from "Hair" qualifies no matter who performs it or where it was produced.

Any version of "Spinning Wheel", "Snowbird" "Sweet City Woman", "My Way", "I'll Never Smile Again".

Any Guy Lombardo record qualifies as well as any Paul Anka record or composition. Guess Who compositions qualify (and they don't record in Canada, they only live here).

Buffy Ste. Marie, Dorothy Collins, Giselle MacKenzie, Mary Pickford, Lorne Green, Andy Kim, Hank Snow, Wilf Carter, David Clayton Thomas, Diana Durbin, the Beaumarks, Percy Faith, - the list is endless. The whole idea of the ruling (part of the Broadcast Act) was to assure Canadians that a portion of the music being played in Canada was, in some way, Canadian.


In fact, if any U.S. company wanted to come to Canada and buy a publishing catalogue they would be in the business of recording Canadian content no matter where the artists were from or where the production was done.

Any Canadian citizen who signs with a U.S. company and writes his own composition is. considered Canadian content. He can record anywhere in the world.

Why not assure that the Canadian content music ruling is understood by your friends in the U.S. What is the point of the battle lines forming about what is being called "censorship". It's nationalism and it's culture and it's got to do with the use of ' our airwaves.

What if 95% of the on-air personalities in Canada were foreign? How would you react as a Canadian jock?

That goes for any other profession, - craft or skill.



2) Heart Life Saver - which will be operated in cooperation with the Kinsmen Clubs. The station has secured the exclusive rights to the Heart Life Saver for the Winnipeg Area. A heart-shaped decal, endorsed by the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs, is affixed to the bedroom window of any child, senior citizen, or incapacitated person. Should there be a fire in any of these premises, the firemen will evacuate these rooms first. The Heart Life Savers are sold by the Kinsmen for a nominal amount with CKY coordinating the publicity.


