Scrubbaloe Caine: Funky, street-level band

"We're all over twenty-five", says bassist Jim Kale who most of us remember from his years with the Guess Who. Over 25 . . . is that like over-the-hill? Hardly if we're talking about Scrubbaloe Caine, and we are talking about Scrubbaloe Caine. But, with some musicians reaching international fame and peer recognition as early as 17, the dates on the birth certificates of the guys in Scrubbaloe Caine only mean one thing . . . they've had more years of playing in various bands, learning and growing musically. They've got experience.

This experience shows in the finesse of the guitar work of Paul Dean and Jim Harmata. Both these guys play lead and sometimes they'll play the same lead riff in unison. The guitar sound leaps out and takes the foreground as only a good riff should. This double lead sound adds extra punch and drive to the overall sound of the band.

And speaking of overalls, check out the little dude who wails out the lead vocals bedecked in denim overalls. Henry Small has such an incredible amount of energy that you can get tired watching him. His voice is only matched by his amazing violin work. The violin is not only a fantastic solo instrument, but it gives a depth and a roundness to the overall sound of Scrubbaloe Caine.

Gutsy... these guys are gutsy. The other gutsy lead vocals are attributable to another little guy named Al Foreman. He growls out a tune that you would swear should emanate



from a fella about 10 feet tall. He also adds the fine keyboards and the honking harmonica to the band.

Winding up the crew and thumping out those driving rhythms is Bill McBeth. In most rock bands the drummer is the man who maintains the beat and keeps the band together and headed in a unified direction. Bill handles this job admirably and is helped SCRUBBALOE continued on page 15

A&M TO DISTRIBUTE MUCH RECORDS LABEL

Much Records, one of Canada's most successful independent labels will now be distributed by A&M Records. The deal became effective on September 1, and was revealed in a joint statement issued by A&M vice-president Gerry Lacoursiere and Much general manager Brian Chater.

In its short three year history, Montreal based Much Productions has compiled an enviable track record. With the repeated international success of artists Pagliaro and April Wine, Much quickly established itself as a promotion oriented company.

Label exec Brian Chater in describing Much said: "We have a small roster of artists and we don't intend to expand it for the time being. In view of the commitment we have to our artists we want to give them the best possible coverage and this wouldn't be possible with a bigger stable of performers. We are very fortunate in being able to offer our artists management as well as publishing which we feel is very important in their development. With this new agreement with A&M we can look forward to a period of steady and continued growth".

Recording under the Much banner are Tom Kelly, a singer-songwriter who is a regular on CBC-TV's Singalong Jubilee, Mantis a hard rock band from Montreal with new product due shortly, and Pagliaro whose "Lovin' You Ain't Easy" and "Some Sing, Some Dance" were instrumental in establishing the label. Under the Sweet Plum logo are Kitchener's Copper Penny whose new single "Sittin' On A Poor Man's Throne" is currently picking up steam across the country and Tony Kingston who scored heavily last year with "I Am A Preacher" on another label. On the newly activated French label. Fleur Records is Julie Arel who is the 1973 Athens Song Festival Winner with the song "Kamaraska".

Gerry Lacoursiere concluded: "this represents A&M's first venture in straight distributing and we're extremely pleased to have an aggressive young company like Much joining the A&M family of distributors"

DICK CLARK'S "ROCK" CERTIFIES CDN GOLD

Avenue of America's two-record set, "20 Years of Rock & Roll" with Dick Clark as narrator, has certified as Canadian Gold. Gary Salter, president of Avenue, reports an initial shipment of 70,000 pieces with sales now in excess of 80,000. A heavy commitment of TV and radio time is expected to bring home more than 100,000 sales.

As an added boost to the album, Avenue have available, on an exclusive basis, a one hour documentary. This comes complete with read out sheet plus time for commercials. The tape is available through Avenue of America, 750 Supertest Rd., Downsview, Ontario.

ONT. LIBRARY REVIEW INTO CANADIAN MUSIC

The Ontario Library Review will bow a new Canadian music section in their December 1973 issue. The Review has been publishing album reviews for more than a year and have decided to concentrate more on Canadian albums and musicians. The new section will deal with musicians in all fields: classical, pop, ethnic, spoken word etc.

Records are evaluated by professional librarians who are knowledgeable about both the industry and record collection development for libraries and borrowers of such information.

Tagged The Record Track, the success of the new feature will depend on the cooperation Editor Dean Tudor receives from record companies. The O.L.R. is published by the Ontario Government for the Provincial Library Service and is a quarterly with a circulation of more than 7,000. The quarterly is mailed to every library in Ontario, plus most of the rest of Canada, as well as to the U.S., Australia, England, New Zealand and Europe.

Tudor is particularly interested in the pilot project of RCA's Ontario promotion rep, Neill Dixon and Andy Armitage, Chief Librarian Owen Sound Public Library (see story RPM Sept. 1/73.)

REBROFF TO LAUNCH TOUR WITH GLOVER INTERVIEW

So successful was Yvan Rebroff's appearance on Elwood Glover's "Luncheon Date" (CBC-TV) last year that his Canadian tour will be launched (Oct. 10) with a half-hour bit on the same show. The 6'6" Columbia giant threw the usual placid Glover production into a shambles when he calmly walked over to the piano and treated television audiences to a Rebroff musical. It's hoped he will repeat this type of impromptu concert which could create a much better sales package for promoter Marty Onrot who has firmed several western Canadian dates. These include the Jubilee in Edmonton (Oct. 11), the Queen Elizabeth Theatre, Vancouver (12), the Jubilee, Calgary (13). He will also appear at Ottawa's National Arts Centre (22) as well as Toronto dates (15-16) for Herman Luedicke at Massey Hall. His Toronto dates will be emceed by CFRB's "Starlight Concert" host George Wilson. His Toronto show will be a departure from the usual with the inclusion of several Operatic numbers, musical accompaniment of which will be supplied by Leo Barkin, official pianist of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra.

Columbia's sales and promotion departments will shortly launch a national campaign to tie-in with the concert tour with much emphasis on his most recent album release "Greatest Hits Vol. II".

EPIC RECORDS DISTRIBUTE THUNDERMUG IN THE U.S.

Epic Records of New York and Axe Records, Toronto have announced a three year licencing agreement which brings the fourman London, Ontario rock group Thundermug to the CBS label.

The first product released by Epic in the States will be the album "Thundermug Strikes" which is to contain selections from both Axe albums released in Canada including their first three singles, "Orbit", "You Really Got Me" and "Africa". Release is scheduled for the early part of September.

The quartet consists of Bill Hurst, vocals and lead guitar; Joe DeAngelis, vocals; Jim Corbett, bass and Ed Pranskus, drums. Producer Greg Hambleton says, "We feel with the combined talent of this exceptionally original group and the marketing clout of the major record company in North America makes Thundermug a winner".

Axe Records will continue to initiate recording and to market Thundermug product in Canada.


Mr. Wajnberg was former Quebec Promotions rep, a post he has held since coming to Columbia in October of 1971.



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CUSTOMERS SHOULD TAKE SOME BLAME!!

I read with interest your article in RPM (Aug. 25/73). I'm the manager of Sam the Record Man in Kitchener and I have to agree that sometimes the customer does come out on the short end of the stick when it comes to defects. But what is the store supposed to do when the record plays perfectly on their equipment. In my store we have a Lenco L-75 turntable with a Shure M-91 ED cartridge tracking at 1 gram. We also listen to surface noise complaints on headphones.

I don't agree that record pressings are getting better because they're not. The worst problems are surface noise and warpage. Something that the customer might do to prevent warpage is remove the tight plastics after they have bought the record. The tight plastic will cause the cover to bend

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when the record is out of the sleeve and when you put the record back in the cover it will assume the shape the cover is.

I think the problem of defects can be helped a lot by a little bit of consumer education. People seem to have this strange idea that diamond needles last forever. When a customer brings back a record that is supposed to skip and it doesn't on our equipment, the first question that we ask is how long it has been since they've had their needle checked. The average answer is 2 years. Needles should be checked every 6 months and replaced every year depending on their use. I've even had people ask me for used needles. People also don't know how to handle records correctly. You wouldn't believe the number of people who bring back records with a complete set of their family's fingerprints on it. Another problem is the audio expert who is trying to track at 1/2 gram with a ceramic cartridge.

I took offence to the fact that you were blaming the record store for not taking the record back because you didn't like it. Did you ask the salesman what the record was like before you bought it? If not that's your fault. I can sympathize with you on the fact that there was only one good song on the album, that happens a lot these days. The sooner songwriters get away from three chord songs the better. You could also blame radio for your unfortunate purchase. Radio should be playing cuts from the album so that people can hear what the rest of the album is like.

Correct me if I'm wrong in saying that Top 40 AM radio has appointed itself as the centre of "what's happening" in contemporary music. That is a joke. But the biggest joke of all is that they believe they are doing a good job of it. There is absolutely no creativity in today's Top 40 programming. It's the same songs over and over again with heavy concentration on 7 or 8, with oldies thrown in for good measure. Why not try playing some progressive rock, they might bet back some of the 18 to 30 age group which they have lost.

Another problem is the disc-jockey's lack of musical knowledge. Recently while listening to one AM station the D.J. said he wanted to go to the C.N.E. to see the Guess Who because he liked their rock-opera "Tommy". I split laughing when I heard this. D.J.'s

should take time to read about the music scene, it would add something to their shows. Circus and Creem are two I would recommend.

I sell a lot of records just by in-store play. This mainly applies to progressive rock such as Jade Warrior, Family, Gentle Giant, Captain Beyond and Van der Graaf Generator. (Prog. Directors scratch your heads). People come in the store and hear it and they ask what it is because they've never heard it before. They buy it and then ask if there is anything else similar. They should be hearing this type of music on AM radio.

Program Directors should spend a Saturday at one of their local record stores. It would really shock them to see what actually sells. They should also spend less time worrying about what other stations are playing and more time on what their own station should be playing.

In short AM radio should realize their responsibilities to the public and meet them. Everyone knows that there are more than 30 good songs around at any given time.

The U.S. already has many good shows. I had thought this would be a first class Canadian show. Is there no originality, or imagination in Canada? Canada is a nation on its own, and although the U.S. produces good shows let's quit imitating them. Nowhere in Canada is a southern U.S. dialect used, but on "Country Roads".

Nixon and Kissinger jokes should be heard on foreign newscasts. Two old people in a rocking chair belong on the Carol Burnett show (CBS); and we could have used some of those splendid songs, written and performed by Canadian artists. And, although Ronnie Prophet was born Canadian, I believe this was his second time on Canadian television (not counting reruns). The other years he spent as a performer were all down south. The cast was good and so were the artists including Prophet. All we would have needed and I expected, was the Stars and Stripes, then I wouldn't have felt so bad.

I'm sure the CBC must have hired an American writer for this one . . .

DOUG LEWIS SIGNS CONTRACT WITH RCA

Doug Lewis of Tidnish, Nova Scotia, is RCA's newest recording artist. His "Ballad of Don Messer" which is fast rising on country charts everywhere, brought him to the attention of the major recording companies and resulted in him accepting a contract to record for RCA on their top label.

RCA's recognition of his talent could mark the beginning of the return of country music the way it used to be and the way it should be. No fancy frills. Just straight, clean, simple, and sung with feeling. Doug's faith in this type of music never wavered regardless of the various trends country music has taken through the years, and he has remained unchanging in his style. A style people have been able to identify with for years and will continue to identify with for years to come.

Doug presently resides in Toronto, Ontario. Married to his lovely wife Audrey for seventeen years, he's the proud father of three girls and two boys. As with so many of today's artists, his love for country music stems from his childhood where he was exposed to it through his father who was a well-known fiddler in the area. After his marriage he worked for a number of years as an ironworker, but the longing to sing country never left him, it just grew. With the Canadian Country Music scene being what it was several years, and five little mouths to feed, the decision to enter the field full time was not an easy one, but with the encouragement of his wife, and a lot of determination, he left his job and devoted all his time to singing and writing country, a move which he has never regreted and which has earned him a large following of faithful fans, two albums, appearances at major clubs across Canada and the U.S., and eight weeks in Hawaii at one of their leading night clubs which was regarded as the show of the year there. Negotiations are underway for a tour of the Bahamas, and also for a return engagement in Hawaii. Doug also represented Calgary Brewers at the Canadian National Exhibition last year as one of the original "Barley Sandwich Boys" whose shows drew over a half a million people which was no surprise to this writer who witnessed many of them and watched the people come back for more show after show.

When Bob Powell of the BBC in London, England was here recently, he taped an interview with Doug to take back with him along with the "Ballad of Don Messer" for his country show over there. When not on tour, Doug's home base is the Elm Grove in Toronto where his group "The Barley Boys" draw capacity crowds night after night. Their fan club is growing everyday with more than 200 in Toronto alone, so although he didn't appear in public until some seven years ago, he is rapidly making up for it for he is in constant demand wherever he goes.

His natural talent for the real feeling of country music is evident not only in his unique voice but in his writing also, among which is his much requested "Little Jack" and his "Cape Breton Colors" which was just recently re-recorded by Diane Leigh.

His albums, "Little Jack" (Paragon ALS 266) and "Country Million-Airs" (Pickwick HI 2207) are a must for any collector.

Doug Lewis is a devoted Canadian artist whose love for country music clearly shows in every song he sings. His latest release "The Ballad of Don Messer" is his best yet. His voice is "True Country" and he puts his heart into everything he sings. This fine entertainer is a man who is respected by



fans and artists alike. He has the reputation of being one of the nicest guys in the business or out of it. He's admired by everyone who knows him for his dependability, honesty, integrity, and straightforwardness, and for being a real down-to-earth guy who will go out of his way to help someone along the way.

His life, his singing, and him, reflect what country music is all about, "Real People" and these two words more than any others tell of the entertainer . . . the husband and father . . . the friend . . . and the man that is Doug Lewis. — Marie Marsh

Doug Hutton

Selling a new history of Canada

When I asked Cantata Canada producer Doug Hutton how old he is, he glanced uneasily around the room. He consulted his notes. He leaned back in his chair. He wasn't ready for the question and I watched him grope for ways to avoid it. Finally he acknowledged,



somewhat reluctantly, that he is 33 and was about to challenge the importance of the query when the dynamics of interview diplomacy silenced him.

The question had nothing to do with Cantata Canada, of course. It wasn't important; it wasn't relevant. I knew it was one of those sneaky devices interviewers sometimes employ to throw their subjects off the track: to take a fast peek behind the solid wall of programmed responses at the human being who lurks there.

Hutton relaxed visibly when discussion returned to the business of building Cantata Canada. The idea is hit: an ambitious project that unites songwriters from across Canada in a view of this country's history that is foreign to the textbooks. Capitol labelled the disc and they're promoting it toward a September 10 release date. A second album (Volume II) with another 12 songs is scheduled for 1974. The performance is by Privilege, assisted by an uncounted number of Vancouver Symphony Orchestra musicians, and all vocals (for licensing reasons) are by Mel Degen. The music is a distillation of important events in Canada's past, colored by the perceptions of the writers commissigned for the project and by Hutton, Says the former property manager and night club owner: "The story of Canada is exciting and we wanted something that's meaningful to Canadians. We wanted to show people where we've been and who put the sweat

They succeeded. The album is a moving panorama — in fact, a parade — of the people who juggled the destiny of the young Canada. This is no eviscerated, academic view of significant dates and figures but a warm tribute to the men and women who carved their names in the land. Parts of the story are joltingly unfamiliar to anyone who has ever dozed over a history book but what emerges is a clear picture of Canada — warts and all — that serves this country and the people who invested their lives in it. It will offend only Canadians who want to whitewash the past.

Although his own involvement in the project has diminished since he first helped it lurch to its feet, Hutton is active in promoting it. He is now visiting radio stations across the country, generating pre-release interest in the disc, and he has enjoyed enthusiastic interest from everyone he's talked to.

Hutton describes himself as a musical entrepreneur and he is well prepared for the role after ten years in the music business. With his neatly-clipped beard, he has the air of a man who would be as comfortable behind a mixing board as he would be in the hushed elegance of a large corporation's boardroom. He measures his words carefully and selfconsciously, almost as if he wishes to disguise the enormous emotional investment he has in Cantata Canada. A great deal of time and money ride on the success of the idea: Hutton assembled an initial \$50,000 for the project and Capitol is rumoured to have allocated twice that amount for promotion. Consequently, all risks have to be diluted and Hutton treats each question about Cantata Canada with precision and obvious personal organization.

The idea of a new, musical view of Canada was born three years ago. Hutton has always had an interest in Canadian history; his family settled on the prairies in 1906 and his roots are still there. But he discovered early that there is often a gap between documented history and the truth: "When I started digging into the archives and talking

to people with first-hand information, I found that certain events were reported not necessarily the way they happened but the way people of the time wanted them taught. People interpret things differently as time passes. I know my head is different now from the way it was three years ago. Now that I've travelled across Canada I have a much better understanding of what this country's all about. I guess it's all a matter of perspective."

As he began to assemble stories and legends, Hutton also attempted to fuel enthusiasm for the project. He credits RPM Publisher Walt Grealis with giving him a strong boost at RPM's C-5 in Vancouver three years ago. From there it was a short step to discussions with Edmonton's energetic Tommy Banks and the duo soon signed with Capitol to produce and promote the album.

Although Cantata Canada has consumed much of his time, Hutton has somehow managed to produce a string of television series - all with historical themes - and to maintain a happy family life in Edmonton. He is married to an ex-Montrealer and their two children both attend Frenchlanguage schools. Hutton sees nothing unusual in his intention to raise his children in both languages. He has a strong affection for Quebec - and for what Quebec contributes to the unique qualities of Canada. "We're different", he says. "We're like no other country in the world and Cantata Canada is one way of building pride in those differences."

What's next for the project? "Right now we're working on a stage production of the music which we hope to take across the country, hopefully opening at Ottawa's National Arts Centre. We'd like solid French Canadian participation in the stage show to make it even more truly Canadian than the record. And the second record will draw heavily on French Canadian talent." Hutton paused here and leaned forward, ignoring his notes. For the first time in our meeting he was less the patriotic businessman than the patriotic dreamer: "It's not finished yet. The first volume is not a history of Canada. Maybe the two records together won't be a history of Canada. We'll continue as long as there's interest in the truth of our history."

Hutton intends to make money on Canadian history, a goal that some altruistic Canadians may find offensive. In fact Hutton himself is a little apologetic about his intentions for he is well-conditioned to business practices in this country. Honorable Canadians don't overtly bank on history, God and the Queen. But he is also out to assist a struggling music industry with the revenue from his projects: he wants to develop new Canadian talent and needs cash to do it. If Cantata Canada is successful it will breed other enterprises that will stimulate Canadian interest in Canada, And that goal cannot be seriously challenged by anyone who professes a genuine loyalty to this country.

Doug Hutton, with his suave boardroom manner and sharp business acumen, is little different from the pioneers that first staked Canada. He is an aggressive builder and seller of ideas. Times have changed but, fortunately for the rest of us, people like him haven't.







SCREAMS ENVELOP OSMONDS AT TORONTO FAIR AUG. 30

The audience had an average age of around 12, was predominantly female and filled with so much energy that the entire Grandstand at the Toronto Fair was close to taking off.

The occasion was the third appearance of the Osmonds in as many years and it looked as though most of the sell-out crowd had been psyching themselves up for this one all year. Throughout the crowd young bodies were bedecked with Donny Osmond T-shirts, hats and "I love the Osmonds" buttons. If these kids could have talked their mothers into it, they'd probably have Osmond tatoos as well.

Generally when the anticipation of an act is this high, it is extremely difficult for a band to come out and open the show. Canada's Stampeders must have been on the same wave length as the audience because their reception was nothing short of amazing. Kim. Rich and Ronnie got the crowd dancing, singing, clapping and screaming during their all too short opening set. A big high point in the set was a long, bouncing version of Chuck Berry's "Memphis" in which drummer Kim Berly demonstrated some of his native two step dancing abilities. The Stampeders are presently in the middle of the largest rock tour in Canada's history. The polish that a lot of performing before large crowds can give was shown during the August 30th gig.

Taking the stage next was a trio from England who happen to be the only nonfamily artists recording on the Osmonds' Kolob Record label. Called the Springfield Revival their act features two guys on guitars and banjo and a young lady. The three of them sing in close harmony and again managed to get the crowd singing and clapping along. Unfortunately their music is more adult oriented as the material leans towards classics like "Lazy, Hazy, Crazy Days of Summer".

The tension in the air was so thick that one could almost see it as the crowd of young ladies anxiously awaited the arrival of the five brothers they wanted so desperately to see in person. Any movement whatsoever on the dimly lit stage was enough to elicit a wave of screaming from the crowd. The sight of a long, black limousine gliding across the field to the back of the stage was the capper.

The screaming began and only seemed to increase in volume and incidence as the five Osmonds ran on stage amid the staccato of flash bulbs. Even with the aid of a massive amplifier system they were all but inaudible for the majority of the first number.

Of course the big star had to be Donny Osmond, though he likes to be a part of the group and remains in the background during the songs made famous by all five of the brothers. He does step forward to take the spotlight, and a number of little hearts, as he performs his solo hits "Puppy Love" and "Young Love/A Million To One".

As an act, the Osmonds are professional and exude a real showbiz pizazz. They are fresh, energetic and overall very entertaining.

Their music, like their audience is maturing and is exemplified on their latest album "The Plan". All the standard questions that play on young people's minds are examined in this concept album. The questions have all been asked before by other writers, but never by the former "Bubble-gum" Osmonds.

The Toronto Fair audience was introduced to the newest and youngest performing Osmond as Little Jimmy joined his brothers for a few numbers. Sister Marie Osmond is also beginning to sing and has a Sonny James produced album due soon. She will appear with her brothers in Las Vegas.

The forties had Frank Sinatra, the fifties had Elvis and the sixties had the Beatles. The Osmonds are the heart throbs of the ultramodern seventies. They'll no doubt give way to someone else soon, as they approach that "too old" category. For now their omnipresent, ear-to-ear grins and flashy, sequined white suits will occupy centre-stage in many young girls hearts and fantasies.



BEACH BOYS' BAD START ENDS WITH TWO ENCORES

For a show that got off on a bad foot and was plagued by extreme heat and humidity the Beach Boys September 2, concert in Toronto's Massey Hall can only be termed as a smash success. None of the problems seemed to deter the sold out crowd as they cheered and clapped along with most numbers. Voices were constantly heard shouting out requests and offering advice on the sound balance. All of this was received well by the Beach Boys who thanked the crowd for their patience and help with the sound.

The concert featured a wide range of material from "Surfin' U.S.A." to "Sail on Sailor", but the crowd was definitely in favour of hearing the old stuff. Cries went up for "Little Deuce Coupe", "Fun Fun Fun", "I Get Around" and "Help Me Rhonda".

The number of musicians on stage was a staggering 11. The extra personnel allowed the core of original Beach Boys to stroll around from instrument to instrument providing the audience with a sound that is best described as sophisticated surf music. The group has matured and developed their music to a fine level. One would expect a group that has been around all these years to be slick and real show-biz, but the Beach Boys are very laid back and at times almost too casual on stage. Certain members of the band (Mike Love and Dennis Wilson) are given to fits of clowning and downright buffoonery. How many big time bands do you know of that introduce their mother halfway through the show? How many big time bands actually tour with their mother? Of course the Beach Boys are unique in this

respect. The core of the band has always been made up of the three Wilson brothers and Mike Love is their cousin. No doubt the rest of the guys have been adopted as honorary family members.

The bad start that the show had with the group being detained developed into a big finish as they were called back for an unprecedented two encores.

The show has one big, black mark against it however, and this concerns Michael Tarry who was the scheduled concert opener. When it was learned that he planned to use a 20-odd piece orchestra to back him, he was informed that there wouldn't be time for an opening act. Tarry was handed this information just hours before the concert was to begin and after he had rehearsed the orchestra. As it turns out the Beach Boys were delayed and an opening act had to be found quickly.

On a minutes notice Myles and Lenny came on stage and were able to get in about 5 numbers before the Beach Boys arrived and they were hustled off stage. The crowd was just beginning to get into the country-folk music of Myles and Lenny when they were unfortunately shuffled off. Their music can be heard regularly around Toronto at some of the clubs.

The Beach Boys though, finishing big are not what you could consider a truly great live act. Their music gets its strength from the subtlities and perfection of sound that can only happen in the studio. Their most recent album is "Holland", on Brother Records distributed by WEA. The new Beach Boys album is scheduled for release in late fall and guess what ... it's going to be a live album. - Peter Taylor

SONNY & CHER AT CNE PLAY TO FULL HOUSE

The Sonny & Cher show at the CNE (Toronto) was sold-out but somewhat disappointing. Opening the show was RCA recording artist, Robbie McDougall from Winnipeg who performed selections from his album as well as some new material he has been working on, one in particular titled "The Theme" which is currently under negotiation for use in an upcoming film. Travelling with Sonny & Cher was comedian David Brenner who had to work on his audience to get them to respond. I noticed in a number of the CNE concerts the audiences were slow-moving. Usually by the time the headliner act appeared the audience was in the mood to participate rather than sit back and look bored.

Sonny & Cher are slick performers, right on cue and they move through their show with a sureness that comes from many years experience. Cher spent most of her time offstage changing into different costumes. The costumes were effective but I think the 20,000 people in attendance would have preferred to hear more songs from her. One of her solos was her latest single "Half-Breed" which got the loudest applause. Sonny sang most of her hit songs but it just wasn't the same sound. He also did a number in front of two giant screens which flashed a movie of their daughter Chastity. They got into their usual clowning around with one-liners back and forth with Cher getting the last

word (and laugh). Their closing number was what has become their theme song "I Got You Babe" written by Sonny when they were first breaking into the disc market as a duo.

Their latest album distributed by MCA Records by the title is dedicated to Chastity - "Mama Was A Rock & Roll Singer but Papa Used To Write All Of Her Songs" which pictures the couple in the nursery on the LP cover. - Sam Murphy

McLAUGHLIN-SANTANA TORONTO, AUGUST 29

With Toronto reeling beneath the heaviest heat wave in over 14 years, Maple Leaf Gardens was an oven as Mahavishnu John McLaughlin made his third appearance in town in less than a year.

Accompanying McLaughlin for this appearance was Carlos Santana. The two joined forces for the tour on the heels of their collaboration on "Love, Devotion, Surrender" for Columbia Records.

The heat was probably a deterrent to many fans as only just over 5,000 turned up for the show. The heat didn't deter McLaughlin-Santana as they played for over two hours. The music was excellent and the two guitarists were backed up by a hybrid band featuring members of both the Mahavishnu Orchestra and Santana. McLaughlin and Santana will complete this tour and return to their respective bands for more tour work with them.

The music was loud as the banks of Marshall amplifiers delivered an almost endless wave of sound. With only a one-third capacity audience the sound was free to reverberate about the rafters of the hockey palace. This loud, often distorted sound was an unfortunate drawback as the music lost a lot of intricacy and finesse in the melee of sounds. Basically the music was jazz oriented, but from this base it rose and soared through a wide range of musical style pausing here and there to embrace a little latin, a little blues and a little rock. John McLaughlin is without a doubt the most accomplished guitarist in popular music today. His flash,

style and amazing speed were countered with the solid, moody almost liquid leads of Santana.

Though McLaughlin and Santana have no doubt experienced more success on other occasions with their own bands, they remain total professionals. Unlike the many prima donna performers that punctuate this business, these two maintain an almost painful humility and project a calm and a joy of life and performing that can't help but be transmitted to the audience. A performance by McLaughlin is always an occasion of merit and extreme enjoyment for those in attendance. — Peter Taylor

Polydor has just sent their promo man Scoot Irwin on a northerly jaunt to talk to radio programmers. out by Kale's bass and his snappy on-stage moves no doubt cultivated over the many years he has spent performing.

All the members of Scrubbaloe Caine bring their own measure of past musical experiences spanning ten years of live work. Primarily the band was working with a fellow named Jason Hoover and after leaving him they became Cannonball. At this point in their careers they were approached by Guess Who manager and Glamour Boy Don Hunter who, along with Jim Kale took an immediate interest in the band. Cannonball played around for a number of months and then came under the management of Hunter and when their original bass man left, Kale again picked up his axe and joined the band.

The rest of the story is typical. They played around in all sorts of questionable places getting their act and their musical repetoire together until they went to Hollywood to record their first album "Round One" for RCA records. The album is now available and one listen will show you why Scrubbaloe Caine are going to be soon receiving the recognition that is finally due them.

For all their years of struggle you find no cynicism or hardness in the band. They're all fresh, energetic and optomistic and very eager to pursue their musical growth and development. Their music, as they describe

it, is rather funky, street level stuff. It's straight forward, bouncy stuff that lends itself well to dancing and good times.

The band has developed some interesting theories over the years as well, like Jim Kale's "10 Year Theory". He believes that the musical scene, if you will, works on a 10 year cycle which repeats itself every decade, give or take a margin of three years.

Right now all the guys believe that we're experiencing a kind of musical void where nothing new is happening. In their opinion the time is right for Scrubbaloe Caine. If the terrific reception they received while playing with the Guess Who in Toronto last week is any indicator, the time is more than right . . . it's perfect!

While sitting on the verge of a potentially large career, the guys remain happy-go-lucky and unaffected. They also maintain a very stringent self criticism process where they analyse and dig into every facet of their music, both recorded and live. Their music reflects them and they want to strive for perfection.

And what does the future hold for a band with the unusual handle of Scrubbaloe Caine? "To keep their lyrics uncluttered, the music high calibre and have everyone enjoy the fresh new sound".

How to become a recording artist

by Stan Klees

Recently the Saskatchewan Association of Broadcasters published a booklet for young aspiring artists. The booklet entitled "How To Become A Recording Artist" was put together with the cooperation of RPM. On behalf of the Saskatchewan Association of Broadcasters, RPM commissioned Stan Klees to write the text for the booklet.

Billboard, Record World and RPM have done articles on the booklet and a great deal of interest has been aroused by various segments of the industry. Rather than have the SAB swamped with 5000 requests or more for the booklet by insiders of the industry, we have arranged with the SAB to reprint the entire booklet here in RPM in a series of installments.

This week, the Introduction by the Saskatchewan Association of Broadcasters, A Foreword by Walt Grealis, Publisher of RPM Weekly and the first installment of the text of the booklet:

THE SASKATCHEWAN ASSOCIATION OF BROADCASTERS

Being aware of the great number of people, particularly young people, who have today become involved in composing and performing their own and other people's music, the SASKATCHEWAN ASSOCIATION OF BROADCASTERS saw the need for a manual or guide which would set out some of the do's and don'ts, some of the pitfalls and heartaches, surrounding the complicated and often frustrating business of "becoming a Recording Artist".

The S.A.B. solicited the co-operation of RPM The Programmer's WEEKLY, published in Toronto, the trade magazine for the many-faceted music industry in Canada. RPM WEEKLY was asked to arrange a text which would be of assistance to the novice performer/composer.

Saskatchewan Broadcasters, the private Radio and Television operators in your community, are interested in helping Canadian talent to develop. If, after reading this booklet, you have further questions, your local station manager, program director and other personnel stand ready to supply further information, and it may be possible in some instances that they can assist you in the preparation of a "demo" tape.

Now, here . . . introduced by Walt Grealis, the publisher of RPM WEEKLY, is a text by

Stan Klee's, a knowledgeable consultant to the music industry and expert on record production.

INTRODUCTION BY WALT GREALIS - PUBLISHER - RPM WEEKLY

This is indeed an opportune time for Canadians to become aware of one of the greatest economical potentials of the decade — the Canadian music industry, and it was encouraging that a powerful body of programmers — The Saskatchewan Association of Broadcasters have seen fit to prepare the following booklet. We are now entering a very critical stage in the recording industry and it is imperative that those who will be the backbone of this multi-million dollar industry be well-informed. They must be prepared to dodge many of the pitfalls that could lead to their early demise as recording artists.

Unfortunately we at RPM deal in the hard core day to day news of the radio and record industry which leaves very little time to become involved with artists, their problems and studios. However, because of this important area of the industry, we retain the services of a very knowledgeable consultant to the music and record industries — Mr. Stan Klees. We therefore commissioned Mr. Klees to write the text of this booklet.

Mr. Klees is one of the most capable people in the music industry with a wide and varied knowledge of the domestic and international recording scene. It was in 1964 when Klees launched the first full time effort to create a music and record industry in Canada. He has since produced numerous singles and albums, discovering and guiding many Canadian artists to international success.

Because of his pioneering in the industry there is no one better qualified to write on the problems of the struggling musician and no one more knowledgeable of the intricacies of the industry. This guide won't tell you how — but it does tell you what it is all about. Forewarned is to be forearmed. Klees has treated the industry as if it is a roulette table — and we wish you luck.

Perhaps this booklet is a tribute to one of the pioneers of Canadian music and records and, hopefully, it will reward him for his tireless efforts on behalf of Canada.

Read with confidence that the industry isn't for the "starry-eyed" and absorb the words of one of the few "pros" in the business.

HOW DO YOU BECOME ANYTHING ???

"How do I become a recording artist?" How often that question must be asked! And there really isn't a good answer. If there were, many more people would find the ladder of success very easy to climb.

There is no school that will give you a diploma in the recording arts. There is no course you can take. There is no history of artists who became recording artists overnight and successful in a few days.

These articles should answer some of your questions. After success comes, one might sit down and write a book about how to become a recording artist. Still I wonder if it would really answer the question.

CLIMBING TO THE TOP OF THE LADDER

Throughout the world, young musicians gather in basements to rehearse with only one thing in mind — to someday go into a recording studio and make a record.

The success of a few groups is the motivating force that drives these young and talented people to devote years of their lives to become recording artists.

What they have read in fan magazines and in daily newspapers, and what they hear on the radio has lead them to believe that stardom is easily attained. Press agents are paid high salaries to create an image for the artist or the group. Instant riches are promised and foremost the young musician wants his talent to be heard.

Few of these young hopefuls realize what the odds are against a hit that will lead to stardom. Few of them care to learn the truth about the record industry. This booklet may be helpful to the artist who wants to embark on a career in music and records with just a bit of knowledge of what the business is all about. This is not the story of how to succeed in the record business. It isn't a "How to make a hit" guide — only an honest attempt to explain the record business and perhaps save you a great deal of frustration and anxiety about a business that simply creates more good product than there is demand for — a case of supply and demand,

After reading this booklet, if you still feel that a recording career is for you, at least you can't blame anyone but yourself for launching a course over a very rough journey. There are tens of thousands of young musicians competing with you to become "stars". There are a few dozen who no longer compete with you because they are "stars", yet they are fighting to maintain that status.

Find a chart of one year ago, and you will find names on that chart that haven't had a hit for a little less than a year. You have forgotten who they were. Find a chart of three years ago, and you will see that the record business sustains stardom for very few. So we can say that after a slow hard fight to get to the top of the charts, the odds are, the tumble down will be much faster. But you are probably thinking of a dozen groups that have been hitmakers for years, Unfortunately, they are in the minority.

THE BYRDS Preflyte Columbia KC 32183-H







He will also tour the British Isles doing four weeks of concerts in February 1974. Last year George Hamilton IV was named the "International Ambassador of Country Music" by Billboard and for the past two years has held the title of Top U.S. Male Country Vocalist in England.

Columbia's Ottawa area promotion man, Gil Audet is preparing a warm promotion welcome for Eric Andersen when he appears at the National Arts Centre Oct. 6. He's just released, "A Fool Like You", which is expected to have hit status by the time he arrives at the Capital. He should also have an album release moving at the same time.

PRICE CODING MOVE ADOPTED BY CAPITOL

The trend in the United States to adopt price-coded albums accelerated last month with the announcement by Capitol records that all albums produced or distributed by that company would bear a code on the album spine giving the suggested list price.

Several companies in the U.S. have already adopted the practice of coding prices to eliminate confusion over prices that has been spreading in the industry. Where there once were several "price categories" adhered to by companies, new "variable pricing" policies allow prices to be adjusted up or down to coincide with consumer demand on a certain recording artist. This has often meant confusion in the retail stores as to the price to be charged the customer, especially since staff turnover is quite rapid at the retail level.

In Canada, retail price coding has not spread so rapidly since U.S. jacket artwork with American prices is not applicable and codes are often just deleted at the Canadian company. However, WEA Music shows Canadian prices in code form.

In the U.S., the following companies besides WEA and Capitol use price coding: A&M, RCA, Mercury, UA, Buddah group, Chess group, Bell, BASF and Muse.

TONY BENNETT AND THE BELLS TO PLAY HAMILTON

Due to an overwhelming demand for tickets an extra show has been added to Tony Bennett's scheduled visit to Hamilton, Ontario. This makes a total of three dates at the new Hamilton Place, September 29 & 30.

The extra date will be a matinee on the Sunday afternoon of the 29th. Backing Bennett for these appearances will be the famous Woody Herman Band.

Also due in Hamilton, this time for a week long engegement at Diamond Jim's beginning September 17, are the Bells. The Bells are currently moving up the charts at a steady pace with their latest single, "The Singer".

A new album from the group is scheduled to be released at the same time as their Hamilton gig.

RANKIN HEADS RONCO TELEPRODUCTS (CAN.)

Mr. Donald Rankin has taken over the reigns of Ronco Teleproducts (Canada) Ltd. in the capacity of National Sales Manager. He will report directly to the Chicago-based firm's president Mr. Jack Culberg. Mr. Rankin was formerly with Eatons in Toronto.

Mr. Frank Seres, who set up the Canadian operation and saw it through two successful album releases, has returned to Australia where he has set up a similar type operation flying the banner of Seres & Associates - Box 123 Cabramatta, New South Wales, Australia.

A&M SINGLES FOR CHEECH AND CHONG/MIGUEL RIOS

Last week A&M Records released the new single by Miguel Rios, famous for "The Song Of Joy" based on the last movement of Beethoven's 9th Symphony. The new single again takes its base from the classics; this time from Dvorak's New World Symphony. The single, entitled "(A Song For) The New World", has been taken from Rios' forthcoming concept album. The album will have a special sleeve that is a reproduction of a Goya masterpiece.

Also released last week by A&M was the first single by underground comedians Cheech & Chong. "Basketball Jones" is not only unique as the first single release by Cheech & Chong, but it is a song rather than a comic sketch and it is getting airplay at CKLW, Windsor. The single features an impressive list of backup musicians, listed as Tyrone Shoelaces, including George Harrison Billy Preston and Klaus Voorman.

Phyllis Brown, late of a group called Rain, has just signed with A&M and is being produced by Harry Hinde. A single release is in the offing, but the actual song has not been determined at this time.

OSMONDS BREAKING INTO THE FM MARKET

While in Toronto recently for their appearance at the Toronto Fair Grandstand, two members of the famous Osmonds were interviewed on CHUM-FM, a progressive formatted station. At the same time, the three other brothers were being interviewed on CHUM-AM. Between the five they had the city fairly well covered.

Up until just recently the Osmonds have been considered as a "bubble-gum" act and have not been recognized by the so-called "underground" audiences. With the release of their latest album "The Plan", they have been able to break into the FM market. A number of the cuts from the album have been receiving airplay on CHUM-FM, and when used in conjunction with on-air "identify this artist" contests, many people are having their eyes and ears opened to the depth of talent that the Osmonds possess.

Their latest single, "Let Me In", comes from the concept album, "The Plan" and is presently playlisted on CHUM-AM. No doubt it will take off as most past Osmond singles have done.

ANOTHER "SING-A-LONGER" READY FOR WAXING

This could be the year for CBC-TV's "Sing-A-Long Jubilee". While former Sing-A-Longer Anne Murray is topping the charts around the world, other current members of the popular down east show are showing signs of "doing it". Much just recently released Tom Kelly's "Freedom Song" single which met with strong adult contemporary play as did his album.

Fresh, and waiting for a label is pretty Penny MacAuley, a struggling young songwriter and contemporary folk singer. George Condon, who pens "Entertainment" for the Dartmouth Free Press Weekender, tags Miss Mac-



Auley as writing "very beautiful songs, and it seems only a matter of time before she too will be breaking into the lucrative national and international music scene. In Miss MacAuley's case it seems more a matter of when the music industry is ready for her, not when she is ready for the music industry - at least as far as her compositions are concerned."

Miss MacAuley's future is being guided by Barbara Bailie of Halifax who has been in contact with several major labels in Toronto. There have been some disappointments: Miss MacAuley has found that "The record companies tell me they are looking for THE SONG and most of them seem to be interested in top 40 material. So far, the ones we've heard back from say that my songs are not contemporary enough, and at this point I'm not sure that it's the top 40 I'm really after.

The young Nova Scotian singer has become well-known throughout the Maritimes where she does lounge and concert work. She received her musical training at the Maritime Conservatory of Music in Halifax where she won a scholarship in voice. She is still studying music at the Conservatory. Much of her time is spent on her own forty-acre farm, not too far from Halifax.

it's interesting to note that although her repertoire could make up an entire two hour show, she prefers to spice her show with compositions by Bruce Cockburn, Leonard Cohen, Joni Mitchell, Gordon Lightfoot and other folk greats.

Public awareness would appear to be the reason for success of Canadian talent from the Atlantic Provinces. Newspapers, who have long maintained the lead in influencing the public, could play a major role in the emergence of Canadian talent. A marrying of these two important mediums could create an explosive situation across the nation. Many observers believe that community radio has an important place in the development of Canadian talent. Radio station VOCM in St. John's Newfoundland, a top 40 radio station, took a chance on Dick Nolan's penning of "Aunt Martha's Sheep". Their concentrated play resulted in the sale of more than 100,000 albums on which the selection was contained.

More and more newspaper columnists are becoming aware of the importance and newsworthiness of Canadians on record and are not afraid to inform their readers.

The following message appeared in George Condon's "Entertainment" column of the Dartmouth Free Press Weekender:

"Everybody in the Maritimes is aware of the number of talented people from this part of the country who are making big names for themselves nationally and internationally in the music field. People like Anne Murray, Gene MacLellan, Ken Tobias, John Allan Cameron, Stompin' Tom Connors, Fred McKenna, Catherine McKinnon and so on.

"All of these people, to a greater or lesser degree, have found (or are finding) fame in the music industry. I think it is also a known fact that some Maritime talents have virtually turned the Canadian music industry on its ear, which is probably due to the fact that nobody in Upper Canada ever expected such unique and special talents to come from the eastern backwater of Canada.

"Little did Upper Canada know that the very reason for the emergence of such super stars as Anne Murray and Gene McLellan (other than their own individual superb talents) was their Maritime heritage. It's been obvious to many of us in the east for some time that there was something very special here as far as developing song-writing and performing abilities. But it wasn't until Haligonian Brian Ahern's Maritime Mafia started to take hold in Toronto that those Upper Canadians learned it too.

"After years of ignoring the talent in the east (in fact, simply not recognizing that any talent could possibly exist here) the Canadian music industry at last started to take notice of us. Recording and publishing company executives haven't exactly invaded the east in droves, but it is a fact that they now realize that the Maritime provinces could very well be from whence they get their next super star.

"What it is about the Maritimes that leads to musical creativity, I'll probably never know. But the situation does exist. And there is a surprising number of up-and-coming song-writers and performers who will soon be following Anne Murray et al into the international limelight. The time is very right for Maritime performers.

"Some of these new performers are already getting recognition. From P.E.I. young Bonnie LeClair, with dozens of original PENNY MacAULEY continued on page 27

A number of RCA artists were in Toronto recently performing concert dates at the Toronto Fair Grandstand. The large annual exhibition closed for another year September 3rd. While in town the artists were presented with company awards for Canadian sales.

The largest number of awards went to Charley Pride as he was presented with eight awards on the CNE Grandstand. Three Dog Night picked up five awards and the Guess Who were honoured with two more company awards at a reception following their successful September 26th. performance.

HAGGARTS BACK ON CHART SCENE

Jim and Don Haggart have bounced back into the singles race once again. Their vehicle this time is an original, "He" (Arpeggio ARPS 1002), which has received heavy ordering through Handleman and Crawford rack operations. The session was taped at RCA's Toronto studios with Gary Buck in as producer. Also on the session were John Arpin, Red Shea and the Laurie Bower Singers.

The Haggarts have been scheduled to headline the Canadian country contingent for the upcoming WSM Nashville Convention (Oct. 14).

Where are we on FM these days

A lot of things have been happening on the FM front in the last couple of weeks and we'd like to bring you up to date on some of the latest developments.

Even with the extra month the CRTC allowed for submission of briefs, the day of decision is nearly upon us. The FM public hearing will be held on October 24 and the deadline for accepting briefs is September 24. How-

ever, the CRTC found itself in late August with a bit of a problem ... namely, not one single brief had yet been sent in. So the Commission found itself wondering "are we really on the right track?" and set about to generate some response.

August 26 to 28, the CRTC summoned a group of twenty-two "creative media people" to Ottawa for a seminar-workshop on the FM policy. Representing the "larger creative community" as opposed to station owners, some of the murkier points of the policy were tested out on various writers. producers, actors, critics and performers. The CRTC was particularly interested in discussing new ways of developing spoken word programming, and new approaches to music programming including live music, music education and types of music to be programmed. And although the group might have been a little short of specific programming experience in commercial radio, at least the "aware, concerned listener" could present his viewpoint. At the close, the Commission staff felt that they had gone a long way in clarifying their thinking on certain issues through informed discussion.

Certain key points seemed to become apparent at the August consultations, and I'll try to recap some of the major platform planks that have now emerged in the CRTC's FM thinking.

DIVERSITY is now a CRTC "key word" in FM. Each FM application will likely involve a market survey, after which the applicant will have to show that his programming adds something new and different to the mixture of radio programming already in the market

SPOKEN WORD is another major point in FM. The CRTC isn't likely to put "needle time" ceilings into effect, but this is one way of forcing a little less music and a little more talk, which is what the Commission would

like to see. New and different forms of the spoken word (drama, humour, poetry etc.) are the preferred forms (they're not heard much now) but there is also a need for more and better talk content in the area of musical information, community affairs and news.

PROGRAMS as opposed to "rolling formats" are another CRTC desire. Programs with identifiable themes and viewpoints aren't heard much anymore, but there should be a lot more put on the air. Music radio formats will still exist of course, but in many timeblocks they should be replaced by programs.

VARIETY in music is another CRTC goal. Stations should play more different types so that all forms of music are on the air in each market. In larger cities, a higher degree of specialization will be allowed due to the larger numbers of stations, but in smaller areas, several different types should be on each station.

SYNDICATION is another area the CRTC is interested in. Since producing programs is costly, stations should try to resell them to other FMers and recoup part of their production cost.

COMMUNITY ACCESS AND PROGRAM-MING ACCESS is yet another CRTC theme. "Talented and innovative people should be given a chance to program" instead of having management set up rigid rules which everyone must adhere to. Jocks should pick their own shows and structure them to give everything a definite flow, to add verbal content so that they present a "program" instead of a "mixture" or "mosaic rolling format." This goes contrary to most present concepts of programming, which put ALL programming control into one man's hands. The CRTC wants to see MANY DIFFERENT people taking programming power for certain time blocks.

Although the FM consultations of late August helped gain input, the CRTC still felt the need of more outside opinion and purchased radio time on hundreds of AM and FM stations to appeal directly to the public. "FM is growing fast," began the announcement (written for the CRTC by Carleton Cowan Public Relations). The ad went on to state that the CRTC was developing a new policy, and asked "What do you the listener, want on FM? Should it be music? What kind ... classical? ... rock? ... country?...jazz?" The commercial then proceeded to ask a question that's in the same silly category as "Is the Pope a religious man" . . . namely, asking listeners

whether or not commercials should be restricted. It seems obvious that the CRTC's plan to prevent "strident, irritating commercials from spilling over from AM into FM" needs some support from the public before it can be put into effect, even though broadcasters feel there should be no restriction on the income-producing spot announcements.

The CRTC's concern in this area was also evident within the original FM policy, where stations were urged to seek sponsors who would present block programming in an uninterrupted form.

With the radio ads asking listeners to send in briefs by September 24, numerous radio stations were working on their own submissions, though by no means every station planned to submit a brief. The Canadian Association of Broadcasters (CAB) also presented its brief, which expressed several interesting points. The Association's proposal for an FM policy was, in most respects quite similar to the CRTC's own, but was not identical. The general objectives of "quality and diversity" proposed by the CRTC were supported by the Association, but the CAB expressed the opinion that enforcement of the policy should be on a stationby-station basis (according to community and financial resources available). The private broadcasters also felt that "the programming proposals of any existing or planned FM station should be judged first, according to the total mix of programming available in each locality, and second, according to those standards which can be applied uniquely to the FM band". This is a most interesting concept, because it says, in effect, that FM broadcasting is RADIO FIRST OF ALL, and the fact that it is FM is of SECONDARY importance

Well, what about you? Have you anything to say about FM, whether officially as a radio station employee, or unofficially (as a listener). Your thoughts could have a profound effect on the future direction of radio, so it would be worth your while to send in a brief. It needn't be long, in fact, a single page is an excellent length for busy CRTC people to read. Mail your "open letter" to the Secretary of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission, 100 Metcalfe Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0N2. Have it in by September 24 and if the CRTC really likes it, they might even invite you to speak at the public hearing on October 24. And whatever goes on at that session, you can bet it'll have a rather dramatic effect on Canadian The MAJOR MARKET Programmers CHART ADDITIONS

No one record emerged as an instant smash this week, as Labour Day holiday and a slow release week kept things pretty lethargic. However, three records spread gingerly into national status; they were War, Edgar Winter and the Allman Brothers.

War has had a funny, spread-out pattern over the last three months. CKLW and CKXL charted it this week. It's also been on the charts of CHED, CKOM, CFGO, CKLG, CKRC, CHUM and CKOC at various times in the past.

Edgar Winter is gaining quickly, this week getting full coast-to-coast action. Newly installed on chart at CJME and CKOC. Previous chart numbers came from CKXL, CFGO, CKLG and CKRC. It is playlisted at CFTR, CKLW, CHLO and CKOM.

The country-rocking Allman Brothers gained new chart positions from CJME and CKOC this week. Their previous track record of charts is: CKRC, CKXL, CKLG, CFRW and CKLW with a big pile of playlistings also reported.

Looking Glass are doing pretty well with the report this week of CKOC and CKXL charting "Jimmy". Previous charts: CKLG, CKRC and CHED.

Stevie Wonder is making gains. Charted at CFRW and CFGO this week (from last week, CJME and CKLW).

Marvin Gaye shows early promise. Charted this time at CKGM and CHED; the previous cumulative charts were CKRC, CJME and CHUM.

DeFranco Family (it's not Canadian content since it has only one part (artist) out of four) are now gaining in Canada after tearing up the States. "Heartbeat" charted this week at CKOC and CKLG who follow CKLW's chart positioning last week.

Bobby Goldsboro's "Summer" took so long to break that summer is now over. But the record is very strong anyway (especially in the U.S.). In Canada, it started to happen this week with reports of CKLG and CFGO giving it chart space. The deck is also on three major playlists: CKXL, CHAM and CFGO.

Doobie Brothers are coming through in a big way. "China Grove" charted this week at CKXL, who joins the previous chart grouping of CJME, CKOM and CKLG. The side is on the playlist at CHAM, CFR W and CKOC.

Hottest new song in airplay this week is the Osmonds ballad "Let Me In". Playlisted by CFGO, CFTR, CJME and CKXL.

Cliff Edwards has a soft-sounding side that is winning acceptance, namely at CHEC and CKWS this week. Last week at this time we had CHNL and CFJC adding it.

Cross Country are spreading slowly, but surely. Onto CHNL this week; the previous week's cumulative had shown CJIC, CKPT and VOCM.

Best of the just-released material: Isley Brothers, Osmonds and Bob Dylan. All three

gained a couple of stations. The synthesizerusing Isleys were added by CKRD and CHEC. The ballad side by the Osmonds hit CHNL and CFJC. And the artistic Dylan sound hit CFJC and CKWS.

Your friendly programming editor Daye Chadwick is taking two weeks holidays after this issue. This may result in some minor adjustments in the content of The Programmers in the next two issues.

Here's the procedure for campus stations wishing to contribute their newly-playlisted music to The Programmers. First.....no phone calls. Type or print clearly your new records, in the week they are first added to your music list. Above the titles, give your station call letters, campus and city, plus your (contributor's) name and the date. No other information need be provided, and there is a limit of ten titles (five LP and five singles, or any combination). While we can accept your complete music list for chart research purposes, just marking which records on the list are the new ones will not get them published in the Campus Additions section of RPM. They can only be printed if the ADDITIONS ONLY appear on a separate page of your playlist. And each title is only to be reported ONCE. in the week it is first aired over your station. Include any station gossip or news items. along with your new music, if you'd like the industry to be aware of what's happen-

CFRW-FM Winnipeg has been rumoured to be planning new programming for its present daytime schedule. No official confirmation, but daytime simulcasting may be dropped if the CRTC includes this in the FM policy. Progressive rock is now aired from 8PM to 2AM (seven days) on FM and is programmed by Reid Dickie. I wonder if the Winnipeg market could support a full-time progressive station?

The new Elton John double album should be released in approximately one week. Latest word from MCA is that the 2-record set will be called "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" and advance orders are reported to be huge. Elton's last album, "Don't Shoot Me" has been the label's biggest of the year, so far, but the new one, at a higher price per unit, might just beat it.

CAB stations can request copies of the radio documentary "Cantata Canada" which was just aired on eleven major stations Sunday Sept 9. The documentary, which depicts in semi-symphonic form, the people, places and events that have shaped the Canadian identity, was produced by CHUM Ltd. 

Times change, and so do the consultants employed by radio stations. Tom Breneman, of Los Angeles, has added to his Canadian client list with a new contract to consult all the CHUM stations with the exception of CHUM-AM.

Breneman specializes in music as well as general consultation, promising to get you "all the best stuff, very quickly" for music programming. Along with Canada's own George Davies, CHUM thus has the services of both a Canadian and an American programming consultant. (Davies also consults successful medium-sized stations like CFPL in Löndon and CKBB Barrie.)

CHUM's previous U.S. consultant, Ted Randall, has had increasing business from Canadian stations and is rumoured to be moving his head office to Toronto, despite the fact that his CHUM contract hasn't been renewed.

Randall consults CKSL London on their new contemporary music format and apparently feels the Canadian radio scene is ripe to utilize his programming abilities. Randall was one of the originators of the "tip sheet" concept in the early 1960's.

songs and a surprisingly big voice to put them across, is ready for the step into the big time, as long as she gets the proper advice and guidance.

"In Cape Breton Island, Kenzie MacNeil is turning heads in Toronto these days, not the least of who's is Peter Gzowski's from CBC's 'This Country in the Morning'. Gzowski has had McNeil on his show several times.

"Here in metro Halifax the music scene is virtually bursting with talented people chomping at the bit. I've talked about Robbie MacNeill several times before, and with good reason. His career has reached the Eastern pinnacle, and it will be just a matter of months before he breaks through in Toronto. His songs are already doing very well as recorded by other people. But the next step seems an obvious one — Robbie recording his own songs.

"Greg Turner of the group Goldrush has been generating some interest from recording companies in Toronto as both a performer and songwriter.

"Dale Banks, who has been writing and performing for several years, should be almost ready to make a break too. Although he wasn't too active last fall, I understand he's been writing some excellent tunes recently.

"All the above-mentioned people are in the excellent position of not only being able to write songs, but to perform them very well too, and that's one of the best advantages in the music industry today.

"But there are some other people coming along who, in time, could make some big noises too. There's a young man in Halifax named Dave Kosub who writes some fine songs, and I've recently heard of a fellow called Bill Donnolly who is stirring up quite a bit of interest, in Halifax at least.

"The exciting thing to me is that there is probably a dozen people in the Maritimes at this very moment who have what it takes to make it big. With luck, the right breaks, and the proper guidance, at least one quarter of them should be able to actually do it. And that means four people, which is a very large number to come from one small area of the country — especially an area that up to now hasn't been given much credit for anything, let alone talent.

"Times look very good for Maritime performers, as long as they have the talent, guts and sticktoitiveness that's required. They won't be able to do it without help, but now, for the first time, there are at least people interested in helping."
