WEA shows increased Cancon interest with a number of artists pressing their talents. Ray Materick shows four points Cancon on his newest album and has pulled out a single titled "Northbound Train." On a total Cancon effort, John Renton's "Half In, Half Out" album will also include his newest single "In The Middle" f/s "When I Talk."

To coincide with the summer months, a refreshing rock 'n roll single has just been released by Jessie Scott titled "Easy Summer (Run, Run, Run)", with Bob Ezrin doing the producing. With two parts Cancon, The Johnson Family have released the new single "1-2-3."

Another point of interest is the music and lyrics from the super-star studded album "Flash Fearless versus the Zorg Women, Parts 5 & 6" which were written by two Canadians.

WEA's A&R department have been busy with releases for Simon Çaine and Christopher Ward.

Jagger not regarded as perfect image for Soviets

Vladimar Kokonien, the Soviet man who decides on his country's foreign entertainment policy, has once again rejected an offer for promoting Mick Jagger and the Rolling Stones. "The group do nothing to help achieve self-perfection. They lack glamour, novelty and sparkle. They are unattractive, and they have no originality."

Soviet leader Brezhnev was not available for comment.

Columbia offers tape deal before increasing prices

Columbia's "Super Star" series will undergo a price increase from \$7.98 to \$8.98 effective July 18. They will however, offer retailers and jobbers a 10% discount, in effect from June 16 through to July 17. The tape offer of 10% free goods will be allowed on the Columbia/Epic entire tape catalogue excluding the \$5.98 line.

The "Super Star" series includes product by Chicago, Dylan, Blood, Sweat & Tears, Neil Diamond, Liza Minnelli, Charlie Rich, Edgar Winter and many more.

There's more to tie-ing down Rolf's kangaroo

Rolf Harris, recently did Toronto town, courtesy Capitol's Ontario promo rep, Scoot Irwin, and he promptly filled in members of several contemporary rock AM and FM stations, on what Rolf Harris was all about. Born in 1930 near Perth, Australia, he capitalized on that country's national sport, and became a swimming champion by the time he was sixteen. He toddled off to London a couple of years later to study painting and a few years later, while still living in London, he came in the back door of Australia with his "Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport", which became a number one record after only four weeks of play. Elsewhere in the world he didn't fare too well. Epic released the single in 1961 and, says Harris, "They sold a total of 17 copies, most of which I bought my-

An album under title of the "Kangaroo" single was released and a Denver radio personality picked up on the title song. The album broke and sold more than 800,000 copies in the U.S.

A chance trip to Vancouver landed him a job at the Arctic Club. The booking was for a week but he was held over until forced to close by a fire - thirty-nine weeks later.

Back to London, England where he starred in his own television series and where he broadened his showbiz image and became what has been described as "a typical family entertainer" - he sings, dances, shows slides, paints and does a comic routine in a unique one man show. His recent Canadian dates and the packed houses were indicative of his popularity. Where else can you find an Aussie funny man who invented and plays the Wabbleboard and also mastered the Aboriginal's rhythm instrument known as the didgeridoo? You can hear a lot of all these talents on his Capitol album, "The Best Of Rolf Harris" and in the fall, he'll be taping twenty-six half hour shows for CTV for his invasion of television early in 1976. Attic goes classical with Henig release

The scheduled release of Attic Records'
"Piano Portraits" by Sheila Henig, was produced by Mal Thompson for the Canadian
Talent Library.

All selections are deemed to be suitable for broadcasters after a consultation had been made with CFRB-Toronto's Art Collins.

The cover features an original picture by Toller Cranston, internationally successful painter and ice-skater, and Sheila Henig is due to be involved with projected radio/television interviews as well as concerts and in-store appearances.

RCA geared up for new Pablo releases

Jazzing up the market is RCA Records of Canada with five new albums on the Norman Granz Pablo label. They are: Coleman Hawkins "Sirius"; "Portraits Of Duke Ellington" by Joe Pass; The Trumpet Kings Meet Joe Turner; Count Basie's "Basie Jam"; and "Big 4" by Dizzy Gillespie.

Almost all of the previous Pablo releases will be manufactured and distributed in Canada by RCA Limited except for the Art Tatum-13 LP Solo Masterpieces Set which is available on an import basis from RCA.

Ruhnke product released on international front

In May of '74, Craig Ruhnke, wrote, arranged, sang all vocals and played all instruments in a U.A. release-single entitled "Summer Girl."

The effort became a national hit, and Craig Ruhnke was suddenly described as a "musical force to be reckoned with."

Now with three singles under his belt ("Sweet Feelin", "I Need My Woman's Love" and "Surfin' All Summer Long") plus a major LP ("Sweet Feelings"), Ruhnke has attracted the attention of the international record market.

Within the next few weeks, "Surfin' All Summer Long" will be released in England, France and Germany, and a cut from his album "Baby We Can Make It" will be released as a single in Spain and New Zealand.

Both songs are under the United Artists label and were recorded at Eastern Sound Studios in Toronto.

Essex tops U.K. poll

"Starduster" David Essex has rocketed to the top of the British Pop Polls this year, taking the number one spot in a number of categories in a poll conducted by Disc, the British music weekly.

Outdoing Elton John and David Bowie, Essex was voted the number one male vocalist in Britain and also the number one international male vocalist with David Bowie placing second and Elvis Presley, third. Essex's Epic album, "David Essex" was voted top album of the year.

Essex's acting ability brought him the number one spot for his film, "Stardust" beating "The Sting" and "Exorcist." His earlier film, "That'll Be The Day", was number four.

The East London-born singer is planning a North American concert tour in the fall, with Toronto to be included.

Warner Bros pushing James Dean generation

Like rock-personna or a fictional Salinger Caulfield, James Dean embodied the rebellious nature as felt by his society's youth culture.

His timing was right.

America was pushing through another war (Korea) and the value of a next-door neighbour service man dying in yet another foreign land had become a frustration open to scrutiny.

Teenagers were experiencing leather-jackets, tight sweaters, 'n hot-rods . . . they didn't want to die.

The parents were becoming alienated to their kids, and the kids were affecting a cultural life-style contrary to that of their parents.

This alienation and change of attitude, caused a great many kids to look upon their peers with anger and confusion. James Dean embodied the rebellious myth when he appeared in "Rebel Without A Cause."

In his trinity of roles he projected a personal intensity and sensitivity which labelled the emotions so experienced by his audience.

And then, right when it seemed that Dean would be the new Brando of the cinema, he piled his car down an embankment and died in the wreckage.

Hauntingly similar to a daredevil scene he played in "Rebel Without A Cause", Dean was immortalized as a folk-hero who threw his life away on the pursuit of fast action and kicks.

Dean has been the subject of many recent recordings, owing to the fact that America is going through more troubled times, and it is figured that any hero alleviate the emotional condition is a good hero.

Among the earliest of sound-recordings in homage to Dean was the Beach Boys' "A Young Man Is Gone" (currently available on their "Spirit Of America" release) and the recent Eagles' "James Dean" . . . "James Dean/He Said It All So Clean." Phil Ochs, "James Dean Of Indiana", is perhaps the

more serious of all songs attributed to Dean, and now in June 1975, Warner Bros. have made available the dialogue-highlights from the only 3 films Dean ever starred in: "Rebel Without A Cause", "East Of Eden" and "Giant", including the original music-tracks as composed by Leonard Rosenman, J.L. Sinclair and Dimitri Tiomkin.

America is once again looking to its marty sfor a direction towards salvation, and by dying young, James Dean enabled a generation to live fast, live hard, and die without a whimper.

Unfortunately Dean was alone when he died - chances are, he screamed when he saw it coming.

"Glitter" originator Eric Emerson is dead

The originator of what is now referred to as "glitter rock" is dead.

Eric Emerson was struck and killed by a carwhile crossing the street somewhere near his apartment at 80 North Moore Street and the Market Diner at West and Laight Streets, New York City.

He was 31 years old.

Jane Forth, the 22-year old ex-model who lived with Emerson from 1970 to 1973, and Barbara Winter, Edgar's ex (who moved in with Emerson after Jane) were interviewed about Emerson.

They talked about the "Magic Tramps" a rock group that Emerson had put together in order to feature his talents as singer, song-writer and dancer.

"It was the original glitter-rock group", said Jane Forth, "but he never got credit for originating glitter-rock . . . the original ones never get the credit. He was so over-creative that he couldn't be accepted in his time."

The Magic Tramps gigged at Max's and the Coventry Clubs, in New York, but Emerson never recorded.

"Lou-Reed will have a song written by Eric on his next album", said Barbara Winter, "but he never himself recorded. It was hard to record him right. He was a troubador. He was meant to sing on the street all the time, to make people happy."

In the course, of his 31 years, Emerson was a hairdresser, clothing designer, and star of several Andy Warhol films including male lead-roles for "Lonesome Cowboys", "Heat" and the "Chelsea Girls."

One friend from the old "Max's" club hangout, remembered Emerson as a "total extrovert." He used to hang out at Max's in hot pants and blonde hair and feathers and a big smile." Emerson was buried in Wharton, near his parents home, New Jersey following a weeklong wake. Plans were made to video-tape the funeral, but they fell through at the last minute.

According to Ronnie Cutrone, a Warhol associate and Emerson's close friend for 10 years, "(Emerson) would have wanted it taped. He would have wanted it like Candy's funeral (Candy Darling, the transvestite-star who died of cancer last year.) He would have wanted it to be an event."

Eric Emerson, through Lou Reed, is soon destined for the martyrdom accustomed to the dead among the rock stars.

ROLLING STONES - MUSIC DELIVERED IN A JAGGERLAR VEIN

Stan Obodiac, Publicity Manager for the Maple Leaf Gardens remembers the first time the Rolling Stones appeared at the Gardens. It was a day The Stones probably wouldn't want to remember. They were only capable of drawing six thousand curious fans to the cavernous home of Toronto's Maple Leafs.

Switch to the year 1975 - June 17, to be exact, and the first of two Rolling Stones Toronto concerts has attracted eighteen thousand sweating bodies, practically minimizing the size of the Gardens.

Mick Jagger and his Rolling Stones have attained the uppermost summit of rock and roll popularity and, from the standpoint of longevity itself, deserve "every bloody bob they make".

Like Mick Jagger, his audience has matured. There were a few greasers mingling with the glitter crowd, the smokers, and hustlers and there were very few in-

stances of violence. The strong arm of Toronto's law was out in force to curb any problems.

When Jagger bounced out on stage dressed in red silk pants and white silk jacket and hat - all hell broke loose. He was in true form and he played his audience front, back and side to side. Twenty-two tons of lighting and sound equipment, hanging from above the stage on nylon straps, 'strutted with Jagger and projected his every sound from "Honky Tonk Women" through to "Hey You Get Off Of My Cloud".

The tour is going to make the Stones a lot of money but they've obviously spent a good portion of it on props, sound and

lighting. The stage weighs ten tons and is circular with lotus petals thrusting threateningly into the audience. With a seventy-one foot width, the stage rises five feet off the floor and ten feet in the rear, which allows Jagger to play to the back of the house, which is one third of their

On the record scene, London has rush-released a Stones' single, "I Don't Know Why", and an album, "Metamorphosis". Both the single and album were recorded a few years ago and have never been released before. The release is on the Abkco label. WEA is enjoying heavy sales with their release of "Made In The Shade", a more current album which is released on the Stones' own Rolling Stone label.

It's expected that the twenty-one day tour, playing two continents, twentyone states of the U.S. and five countries, will gross close to \$15 million.

THE LITTLE GUYS SPEAK OUT!!!

June 12th, 1975

Your article in the May 31st issue of RPM entitled "Get Government Involved in Rock Habits" was both misinformed and misguided. According to your article, "Bruce Bell attended the recent National Entertainment Conference in Washington and was appalled to find that he, as a partner in H.P. & Bell, was the only English Canadian representative at the conference." Aside from the fact that not one of the ten attending Canadian school reps whom I polled (nor myself) ever saw or heard of Mr. Bell at the conference, Canada received very visual NEC representation both at my exhibit booth and at the Awards Dinner where my efforts were rewarded with an Associate Member Award for outstanding Promotional Services in a competition which included every major international agency and record company. Almost 2,000 United States college and university buyers witnessed this presentation. Where was Mr. Bell?

As a Canadian manager who has spent four years cultivating this market, personally visited over 600 campuses in 15 States, directly booked some 400 engagements, represented Canadian acts as diverse as Jason, the Stampeders (tour co-ordination), Ocean, Truck, Terry Dee, Chris Kearney, the Great Rufus, Road Machine, Canada and the Good Brothers, attended fifteen NEC regional and national conferences, sat on NEC committees, chaired several NEC convention sessions and seminars and enrolled in NEC Summer workshops. I believe I am gualified to enter this discussion.

How, I wonder, can an unknown, one man. Canadian management company representing (currently) four unknown, unrecorded Canadian acts afford this operation? If one were to believe your article, I am by now either irrevocably bankrupt or hopelessly government sponsored and subsidized. I regret to inform you that neither is the case. Actually I am moderately successful and to some extent (horror of horrors) even pros-

perous. And I financed the entire campaign all by myself! Nor am I the only Canadian who has taken the time, energy and expense to export out products. Talk to Bernie Dobbin, Ross White, Brian Daly or Walt Grasser. Strange, none of them are big names in the business... just hard working, hustling Canadians who get the job done. There is a world of difference between the bitchers and belly-achers whose names constantly decorate the pages of RPM and all those little guys out there who get off their ass and do it for no other reason than that's what's required to make a living. And they do!

Whatever happened to the work ethic? I haven't seen any action yet in this market that is worthy of government support. And If ever any was worthy, in this particular market it would be so successful, it wouldn't need the government.

Furthermore, the Canadian government already has the mechanisms set up to support and subsidize Canadian artists who can't help themselves. The Canada Council's National Touring Office has an entire 2" thick directory of them. However, the office specifies that artists without managers and agents and who are in the less lucrative areas of music and the arts are to qualify first. Now given that most rock and pop artists have the support of agents, managers and some, even of record companies, all of whom are in this very lucrative business, the only reason I can see for any lack of success in the NEC market or elsewhere is lack of hustle, salesmanship, motivation, willingness to gamble, confidence, professionalism and know-how. No amount of government support or subsidy is going to replace these essentials. That's what capitalism is all about. Hard work and individualism. It's always the slackers and the charlatans that promote government involvement because that's the only way they can make it.

I think it's high time RPM started supporting and promoting all those little guys and unknown artists who are out there seven days a week, 18 hours a day making it all work. And it's also time for this industry to stop feeling sorry for itself and get its own act together. Put up or shut up!



ALBUM REVIEWS

LEWIS FUREY Aquarius AQR-508-K

There's more to "glitter" than being a "street-freak" and Furey would appear to be attempting to bridge the gap between the weirdos of the establishment and the



just plain weirdos. Furey is a talent who should "straighten" it to get to an audience of general appeal. Exceptionally communicative voice and an instrumental backing that more than compliments the Furey voice, which is given a vocal assist by Cat Stevens and Tim Curry. It might be difficult to get this album off the ground without a heavy and expensive promotion trip but Furey is worth it. He has a fresh aggressive vocal approach that stamps him "Here To Stay."

MAHOGANY RUSH Strange Universe Kot'ai 3308-U

Franke Marino has got to have his day and this album could be the door opener. It's probably safe to say that he is unique in his approach to the rock guitar. He has been com-



pared to Hendrix, whom Marino openly admits to idolizing, but this exceptional Montreal talent has surpassed even this legend. He's cutting and he's hard metal all the way with an equally heavy assist from drummer Jimmy Ayoub and Paul Harwood on bass. The market for this type of album is shrinking but Mahogany Rush should manage to take a good chunk of it. Of particular interest is the title cut with Marino experimenting on the moog synthesizer and drummer Ayoub receiving an assist from Corky Laing, referred to as "A strange drummer" an exceptional cut bordering on the ethereal.





RPM MUSIC WEEK COMPLETES

SEASON ON CABLE

by Walt Grealis

RPM Music Week has just completed 40 weeks on Rogers Cable in Toronto and various other cable systems throughout Canada. The show breaks for the summer, June 20th, and is scheduled to return in September.

Anchor man for the show, this season, was Stan Klees and we took this opportunity to talk about the show and some of the impressions that came from Klees. The following is an interview that took place in mid-June.

When did the idea of a cable show about the music business originate?

Actually, Walt Grealis and I had talked about it for a couple of years, but we didn't do a thing about it. It was a surprise when we got a phone call from Doug Marr at Rogers Cable and he expressed the desire that we sit down and talk about doing a weekly show.

What transpired at that first meeting?

We had breakfast at the Buttery at the Inn on the Park and Doug left it up to us to come up with a concept for the show and he really asked us what we wanted to do. Since we had already been thinking of a show like this, we had definite ideas of what the show should be. We put forth our ideas there and then and Doug liked it. We practically arranged on the spot a first show or pilot which was going to be a dry run and if it was good enough would go on the air.

Did it work? Was it good enough?

Rogers thought so at the time and we were willing to believe them. Since then we look back at the show with some reservations.

What did the original concept consist of?

It was gimmicky. It was overdone and it was tough on all of us because we really didn't have any camera experience. I felt sorry for Ritchie Yorke who agreed to be the first guest. I was so nervous in the new surroundings that everytime I asked Ritchie a question, I really wasn't listening to his answer. I was concentrating on the next question. It took a few shows to gain the confidence of being able to create an exchange and I've always felt that I owe Ritchie an interview so that we can really converse. That first show wasn't very fair to Ritchie ... but he was a great trouper.

How long did it take for the show to take shape?

In my mind, the kind of show we are doing never takes shape. It creates itself. It's a cable show with a limited staff and each show gives us an indication of how we can improve the audience appeal. We can't sit

down with a large staff and work on the show with production meetings and after all cable is very limited. We try to work within those limitations... That brings to me a point that I'd like to make. We really feel that the show must happen there in that studio. The show consists of two people communicating. The subject is the music and record business. It's that simple. No sponsor is going to withdraw his support if the show doesn't have mass audience appeal. It's a very specialized show to a very specialized audience.

Does that mean a show like this could never go to regular TV?

It's hard to tell. With the interest in the music business, a show like this could. If the question is, "Can this show go into a network setting?" I really don't think CBC, CTV or Global could see that mass appeal in a show that goes behind the scenes in the

music industry and is designed to promote Canadian content and record sales. We don't interview artists and I think that's what they would want. One cable PD has already turned down the show because we won't book "names" and I still feel that stars are overexposed and the real eye-openers are the people who can turn the myth of records into reality. They can be interesting and the music business is becoming a big business that people want to know about.

Are there people that you would like to interview on the show that you haven't been able to get?

Yes there are. I'd like to talk to someone who has studied the motivations of the record buyer and analyzed what makes people buy records. I'd like to talk to a broadcaster

or programmer who has the answer to the Cancon problem that would make the whole thing progress. I'd like to get someone who can explain why there is a federal sales tax on records and not on books.

How about names. People you would like to interview?

Pierre Juneau, Marshall McLuhan, Hugh Faulkner, Jack Miller of the Toronto Star Allan Waters, Geoff Stirling, Judy LaMarsh.

They're all busy people and it would be difficult to get them to do a cable show.

With guests like that, the show could go to national television.

I don't feel confident that I could carry a show like this on national television. On cable it is small and intimate and very casual.

It is extremely spontaneous. It doesn't have the polish that national television demands. I don't think I could work with all those people around and all the fuss that goes into the talk shows that I've appeared on. It's a different medium and it just wouldn't be the kind of show it is.

I know there are no ratings for cable shows, but do you have any idea about who listens and how many people listen?

The only reaction I can get is from people who stop and ask me if I do a show on television and people who phone to tell me they watch. We get quite a few calls from people

who want to be on the show, but we book ahead when we can and as a weekly show we only interview about forty some people a year. We try not to have too many promotion people in a row or too many managers in a short period of time. Our biggest concern is to spread out the categories of the music industry so that we can cover as many aspects of the industry as we can.

Is there a great deal of research done on each guest?


Very little. We try to pick interesting people who can have a conversation about the industry. The listener sort of eavedrops in on the conversation. I feel that you don't have to research the next person you are going to talk to. If you have something in common, you just talk.



Can you be the victim of the CBC star system and still retain national popularity?
Big, gentle and lovable Tommy Hunter has retained his cool and sanity through a couple of producers and is the top "Tommy" of the CBC, overloaded with Tommys.

Hunter is the star of the geritol crowd (a bunch of lovable Moms and Dads who wouldn't miss the "Tommy Hunter Show" for the world) and he's also got a big chunk of the country fan-ism - and that's the all-important 18 to 49 age group.

Hunter is also a big star at RCA, where he has cracked the "sales barrier." His singles and his latest album, all produced at RCA's Toron to studios by Jack Feeney, have found their way into homes from St. John's to Victoria. He is currently riding the chants with "Love Of A Good Woman", culled from his "Tommy" album, enjoying strong national sales.

Bob Cook, Vice President and General Manager of RCA's Record Division, supplied the liner notes on Hunter's album and he revealed that Tommy's first record session for RCA was produced by Hugh Joseph, the man responsible for the careers of Hank Snow and Wilf Carter. That was quite a few years ago when Hunter was featured with the King Ganum group. A couple of labels passed under the bridge of time for Hunter and it was Cook who returned him to the RCA fold. On the "Tommy" album, Cook says: "The fine product in the grooves reflects a happy marriage, between you and RCA and most particularly with the producer and engineers in our Studio."

These conventions, or gatherings, held in Toronto for the past couple of years were established to promote Canadian Country Music. Were these communications gatherings successful? Well, last year, all the problems were brought to the fore during the panel discussions, and many suggestions and solutions were thrown into the pot, but, since then?

Let's face it. A 2-3 day convention held in one area once a year to deal with the problems across this entire country is not going to solve much. Therefore, the solution seems to be: regional meetings. Under the direction of Hank Smith, a meeting was held in the west, and from all reports was a success. That the Maritime provinces has contributed more to the country music industry than any other area in this country (especially artists), is a fact. However, representation at "BIG COUNTRY" was very discouraging. We are aware of the fact that perhaps Maritime stations cannot afford to send a programmer to Toronto year after year, and then not be sure that such a venture is going to benefit the company.

With "BIG COUNTRY '75" scheduled for Sept. 27-28, and Canadian country awards to be presented, I am suggesting the following: A one day meeting of all Maritime programmers, artists, and others connected with the country music industry be held prior to "BIG COUNTRY '75". Walt Grealis of RPM has assured me that he would attend. It is hoped that such a meeting would give Maritimers the opportunity to "speak up & speak out" for country music, and give those who attend in Toronto a better knowledge of the wishes of the whole region.

Any station or record company wishing to host this meeting would be most welcome.

Russell has, at press time, been in touch with Johnny Gold at CHFX-FM Halifax and together they are hoping to set up a regional meeting, to be held in Halifax mid-August. Further details and dates will be published as they are formulated.

CKLW FM holds opry search for talent

CKLW FM's Country Music Talent Search, in conjunction with the Grand Ole Opry, was held in a truly international setting on Bob-Lo Island on the International Boundary near the mouth of the Detroit River. The stately old limestone and oak pavillion with a dance floor the size of a football field has seen crowds of more than ten thousand dancing to the big bands of Miller, Kenton Shaw, Goodman and many others during the 30's and 40's - and CKLW FM's Croft McClellan discovered that the Browning Brothers, operators of the pavillion, would not be adverse to turning the Island into a "paradise for country folk in the hay-day of the 70's."

Country folk (more than 2000) from Southwestern Ontario and Northeastern Michigan gathered on the Island to witness the final judging of CKLW FM's Talent Search which had been narrowed down to twenty semifinalists, and an eight hour concert (June 15). Judges were FM 94's Music Director, Ron Foster and afternoon personality Ron Burgoyne; Ray Douglas, Windsor band leader and record producer; and Ron Douglas, of Epic Records, Detroit. The show was emceed by the station's Rick Hamilton. The Search was supervised by Croft McClellan, Station Programme Director.

In view of the size of the building, Al Cecille, Director of Promotions for CKLW FM, brought in sound and lighting experts:
David Tinning of St. Clair College, Windsor and A.J. Stokes Sound of Hudson, Ohio.
The show was taped in stereo for a two hour capsuled playback (June 22) on the station's "FM 94 Country Preview", a weekly outing, spotlighting new talent. Herb McCord, President and General Manager of the giant Windsor/Detroit listening post, is apparently looking at the possibility of an annual talent hunt for a "live" two hour country show, now in the planning stages as a weekly feature.

The 50th Anniversary Grand Ole Opry Talent Search was considered "an outstanding success", and ironically, thirty percent of those submitting tapes were Canadian.

Winner of the big event was Kenny Miller and the Winding Road from Southgate, Michigan. They, like CFGM's winner Rick Fielding, move onto regional finals at Indianapolis. Darrell and Jean Thybault of Rochester, Michigan placed second and Tony Myers of Windsor was third - each receiving FM 94 Trophies. Single acts were supplied backup by Casey Clark and Casey's Kids.

The station's next "live" concert will feature Melba Montgomery, Kenny Miller and the Winding Road (Grand Ole Opry winner) and the Meyers Brothers and the Jubilaires from Chatham. The setting will be Windsor's Dieppe Gardens, June 28 during the International Freedom Festival.


