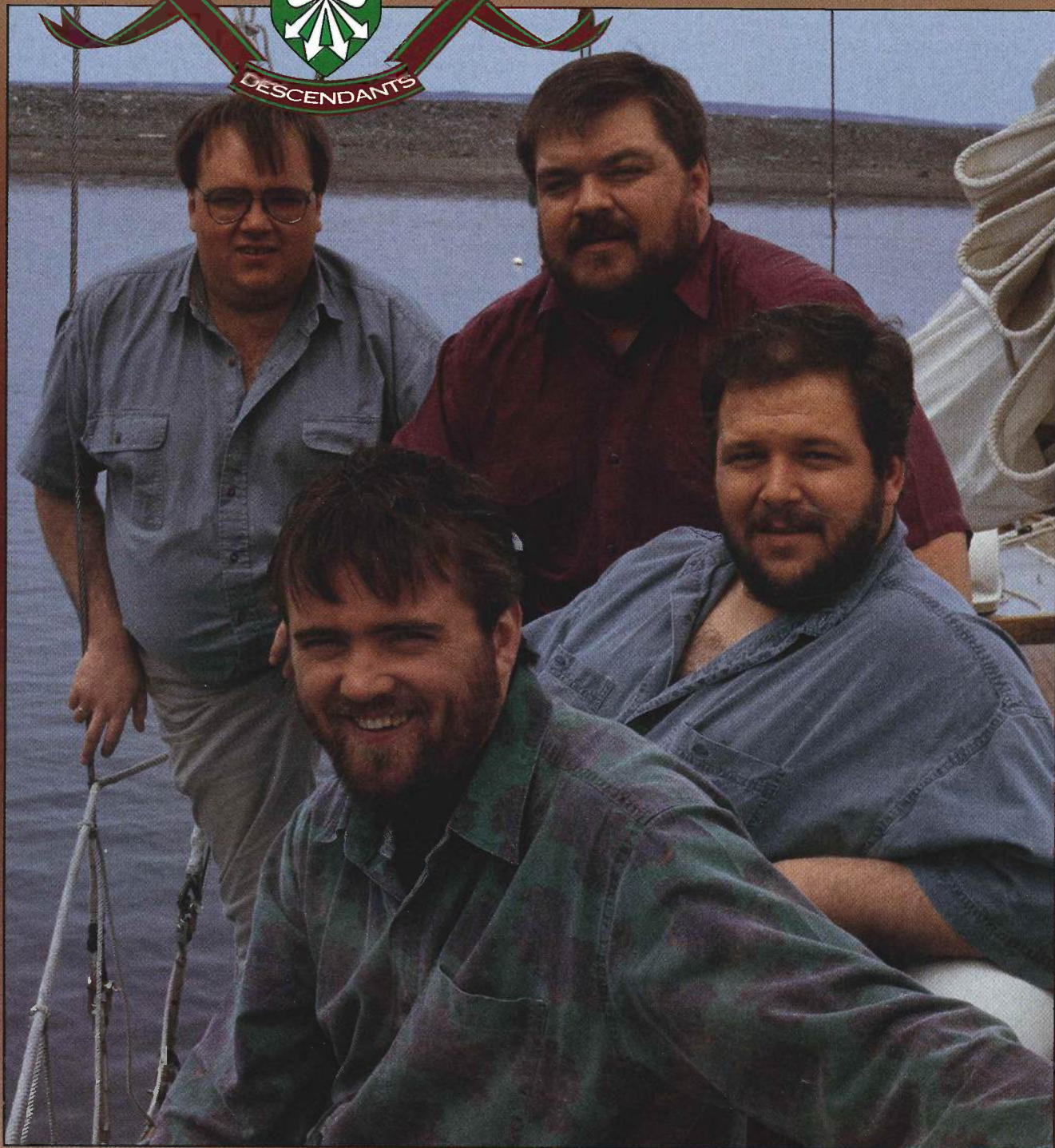

Music Retailers consider source security tagging

Major retailers have expressed their growing concern over product and staff security, which has become a major issue for music retailing organizations around the world.

Executives from a number of Canada's largest retail organizations, including A&B Sound's Chris Pope, Music World's Rick Lotman (Pindoff), Saturn Distributing's Leonard Kennedy, and HMV's Paul Alofs,

The Lowest of the Low hooks up with LSD/A&M

LSD/A&M has just released a promo CD single of Salesmen, Cheats And Liars, which came out on Shakespeare... My Butt in late 1991, to radio.

The band is expected to do a nationwide tour this fall after it finishes recording.

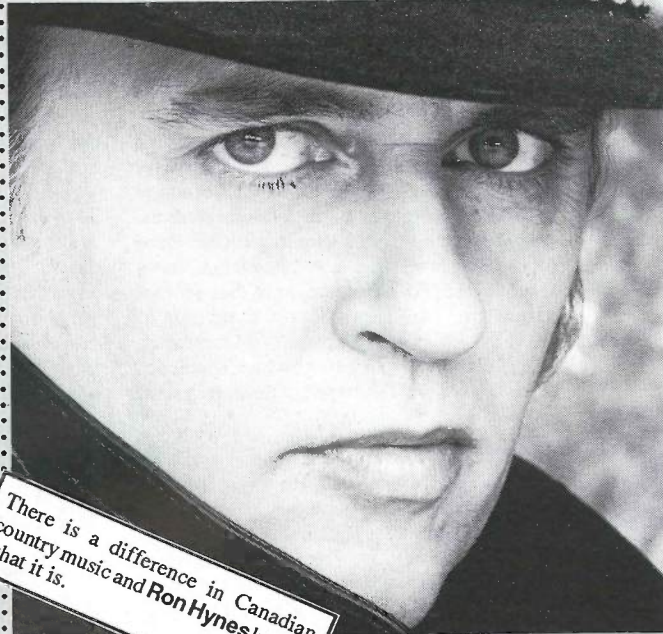

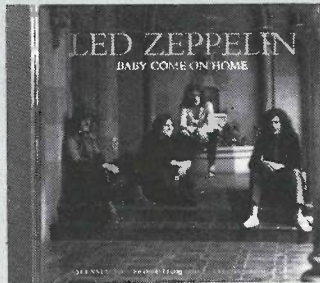

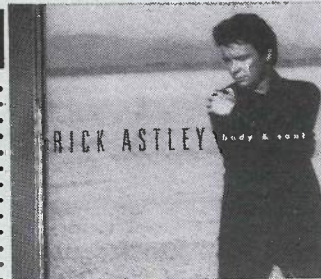

They took over a warehouse down on the waterfront and packed it with party animals from the industry. Lisa Mann apparently created a set that got everything and everybody in the right mood. The stage was littered with oil drums, stuffed horses, and bodies on crucifixes, and if that wasn't enough, topless models were seen in the dimly lit corners of the room. (EC: *Are you sure about the models . . . ?*)

Country looks good!!! Did you see that set at the CMA Awards? Wasn't that "high class." That set made the Academy Awards look bad. It was big. It was lush, and it looked like an industry that says . . . SUCCESS!!! It made all those country stars look like bigger stars. I was impressed. (EC: *You've told it . . . the way it was!!!*)

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Country looked bad!!! That quick, in-and-out, non-tribute to Frank Jones at the CCMA awards show, would have been better left out. In fact, it was, for the American audience. Frank, a Canadian, living in Nashville is a cornerstone of country music. He was instrumental in the initial progress and popularity of Nashville's Country Music Foundation, and he's been a very strong link between Canada and Nashville. He's been touting the "Canadian way" for years, right there in Music City U.S.A. (EC: *It's what he's done that really counts . . . !*)

About MIDEM!!! A reader phoned to ask about details on MIDEM and I referred him to CIRPA. But the CIRPA booth is only for members and those who want government assistance, so I gave him the address in Paris. Anyone else interested should write to: Reed MIDEM Organization. S.A. 179 avenue Victor Hugo 75116, Paris, France. I got that address out of the RadioActivité tip sheet out of Montreal. This weekly is put out by Luc Martel, who is really on top of things when it comes to events like MIDEM. (EC: *Sounds pretty exciting to me!!!*)

The beat goes on . . . ! There really is life after the record business. Have you noticed what happens to the people who leave, or are turfed out of the record business? They become video executives. At Premiere Magazine's recent video trade show, I ran into a number of old record friends, who had moved into video. There they were, all in one room: Bill McCartney, Uwe Schnack, Bill Bouvette, John Ford, and Jim Fotheringham. By the way, they're with the Shannock Corporation, and talk about a success story. Well, when the two Bills and Uwe launched Shannock a few years ago, little did they realize how big the pot was at the end of the rainbow. (EC: *Another success story from La La land . . . ?*)

A little Blue Jays' two-steppin' . . . ! Toronto's Country 59 has scored a coup with the timely release of The Country 59 Blue Jays Anthem. The station's program director, Bill Anderson, who knows a thing or three about country, wrote the lyrics. He used the music from Backroads, Charlie Major's big hit for Ricky Van Shelton. Hold on, there's no threat from the Basskinville hound. Permission to use was granted. Scotty Campbell, the station's '92 talent Search winner, supplied the vocals. The ditty was aired Sept. 30 and Broadcast News is distributing it on its satellite channel. The song is also available to subscribers on the Satellite Radio Network. All proceeds go to Feed The Children. (EC: *Who's the Basskinville hound . . . ?*)

Will that be Celtic or . . . ? Hey! Wait a minute. Mention country music today, and get ready to duck. Years ago, there was a resentment of country music because of its "hick" or "farmer" tag. Now, there's a rush to identify with "new country," whatever the hell that is, and the traditional hat acts are becoming an endangered species. To confuse matters even more, we are being inundated, even in this mag, with a guilt complex about our heritage. You know, Celtic, Irish, English, the Scots, the Welsh, all roots that are really

foreign, like you're talking hundreds of years ago. God forbid you should sing with a Canadian accent. You can be accused of being a Nashville soundalike, and a traitor to your roots, even if your mom and dad came to this country from Eastern Europe a hundred years ago. It's incredible how the Americans, with all their mix of accents, have been able to survive in country music. (EC: *It's all in the song . . . !*)

Causes can be dangerous . . . ! It seems whenever there's a cause to be mounted or a charity in need of support, a bee-line is made to the recording industry. Artists are tapped for free concerts, asked to donate their talent for recording sessions with all the profits going to some charity or whatever. And when it comes to causes, most of them don't even understand what they're signing their name to. Well, enter a street-smart manager, who saw past what could develop into a major problem down the line. He didn't like the cause, and the artist he manages, one of this country's few internationally-acclaimed stars, agreed with him. Someone is now, apparently, tagging the manager as being racist for not going along with it. Strange though, how so many others gleefully signed on. (EC: *Being a member of the new minority requires sharpened wits, not to mention tongues . . . !*)

Ron Hynes: most promising new artist??

Cryer's Paradise, Ron Hynes' debut album for EMI Music, has secured a niche in national popularity for the outspoken Newfoundland poet/songwriter. The title track, taken as the first single, has made good moves up country charts and is now gaining the attention of AC programmers.

After 22 years in the business, and now, with an album that's generating a new kind of excitement, Hynes was asked if this might put him in line for a Juno Award as most promising new artist. "If I win," he laughs, "I'm going to turn it down due to age."

Hynes has never been shy about

Another smash! Mariah Carey is quickly establishing herself as one of the most successful female singers of the past quarter-century. Dream Lover is her fifth No. 1 song and could become the biggest hit of her career. Dream Lover matches the four weeks Vision Of Love and Someday spent at No. 1 and is only one week away from matching the five-week stay of I'll Be There.

Memory test. There have been quite a few "Unplugged" albums released over the past few years. Some have had much better success than others. Name five Unplugged albums that have made it into the Top 30.

Off and running! Nirvana is quick to jump near the top of the Albums chart. In Utero blasts onto the chart at No. 3. Compare that to the band's last album, Incesticide, which peaked at No. 21. Prior to that, Nevermind debuted at No. 68, but went on to hit No. 1 in its 13th week.

Some big moves. A total of five songs had jumps of more than 30 places on the Hit Tracks chart. U2's Lemon led the way with a rise of 49 spots to No. 30. Lawrence Gowan's When There's Time (For Love) continues its impressive roll. It moves to No. 17 in just its third week. Songs from Darden Smith, Lenny Kravitz and Ace Of Base also jump more than 30 places.

expressing his opinion. He is steeped in nationalism to the point of putting his career on the line in his fight for recognition, not only for himself but for his fellow songwriters and performers.

He began plotting his career in the early '60s, playing the local coffee house circuit. "There were only two coffee houses in Newfoundland, and both were in St. John's."

He spent most of the early '70s in Toronto, "knocking on the doors of publishers and playing a lot of guest sets at coffee houses. At that time, Edgerton's was happening. Oddly enough, I did the guest set there the night (Bernie) Finkelstein and (Bernie) Fiedler showed up to hear Dan Hill, and signed him on the spot."

Hynes hit songwriting paydirt in 1976 when he wrote Sonny's Dream. With more than 30 covers of the song released, including one by Emmylou Harris, it is now established as an international folk/country standard.

Returning home in 1978, Hynes co-founded the Wonderful Grand Band, which gave him the opportunity to fuse rock with traditional music, with more than a twist of Newfoundland humour. The WGB gained a national audience in its six years of touring and released two albums and hosted a television series. The band later became known as CODCO and Hynes took the lead role in its popular portrayal of Hank Williams: The Show He Never Gave.

Hynes went on to write and produce The Lost Island Opry and toured The Ron Hynes Show the length and breadth of Newfoundland. His songs continued to be picked up for recording, including Joan Kennedy's country hit, I Never Met A Liar (I Didn't Like), which he co-wrote with his wife Connie, and three songs on Terry Kelly's last album.

He even got his feet wet in the film business. He took a principal role in A Secret Nation, writing The Final Breath, which won him a Genie Award for Best Song.

Vocally, hynes hasn't changed. His material is still as hard-driven, penetrating and lyrically explosive as it was when he began his career.

Cryer's Paradise picked up impressive adds on release. The single has now slackened off at country and is now being targeted to AC programmers. Man Of A Thousand Songs, considered to be much more countrified, is now being readied as a follow-up.

Proudly displaying a large Newfoundland medallion on his jacket, Hynes shows signs of getting his back up. "I know that EMI must have had a hard time with Cryer's on country radio. It's not a country song. But I'm really starting to resent that attitude about, 'It's not a country song... we can't play it.' They're missing the whole point completely.

"We should wake up and realize we have a much broader cultural landscape than Nashville could ever hope to lay claim to. When you look at the music from Newfoundland, from Cape Breton and the maritimes in general, Quebec and Ontario,

and western Canada -- it's all so diversified.

"People forget it's all rooted in the Celtic tradition anyway, which makes us more in line to lay claim to it -- that mantle of interesting folk music -- than the whole '50s country/western star-spangled banner kind of country that we've kinda grown up with."

"Somewhere along the way the whole Celtic tradition took a left turn. Half of it came to Newfoundland and Cape Breton and Quebec, and the other half went south. But it's all rooted in Dublin, Glasgow and London.

"When I read that they don't consider the Rankins to be country, and they're playing them on country radio because there's nowhere else to play them... that's the worst insult you can hand an artist. They should be more than proud to play the Rankins on any format."

There is more than a growing interest in music from the maritimes. It all began with Newfoundland's Dick Nolan, who, back in the early '70s sold an unbelievable 100,000 copies of his RCA single, Aunt Martha's Sheep. Stompin' Tom Connors, although he's practically blackballed at radio, has sold records in the better-than-average comfort range. The list is growing: Figgy Duff, the Rankin Family, the Irish Descendants, and the Barra MacNeils. And Sam Sniderman promises there is more coming. What's the attraction?

"I think we've remained truer to our own tradition. But it has a lot to do with isolation as well, particularly in Newfoundland. We're an island in the mid-Atlantic. There's no publishers, there's no record companies, no managers... there's nothing. It's getting better now. People are getting more and more interested, and it's beginning to open up.

"I'm not complaining. Considering the economic climate of the entire country, I'd say anybody should be glad to have a career in this country at this point.

"But I would really really like radio to stop trying to clarify everything that gets done in this country in terms of how the Americans are going to feel about it.

"We're like some guilty child who took a lot of verbal abuse from an unforgiving father all our lives. And now we feel that every decision we have to make we still have to go to that father to get his approval for it."

The climate is right. The record industry has rediscovered the maritimes, and an east/west dialogue is more likely to happen now than ever before.

Toronto's production of Phantom enters fifth year

After mounting its 1,678th performance at Toronto's restored Pantages Theatre the Toronto production of The Phantom Of The Opera celebrated its fourth anniversary on Sunday, Sept. 19th with no clear signs of when the enormously popular show will run out of steam.

To date, more than 3.4 million theatregoers have visited the Pantages Theatre during the Phantom's first four years of existence, representing a combined box office haul of approximately \$225 million.

When combined with the Phantom's touring production, which has played in major markets throughout Canada, the total gross is more than \$327 million.

Canadian productions have accounted for 20% of the Phantom's estimated \$1.2 billion U.S. world wide gross. Currently, there are Phantom productions playing in London, New York, Sapporo, Stockholm, Hamburg, Sydney and Scheveningen (Holland).

Close to 50% of the Toronto audience is composed of American visitors from the border states.

MIX 99.9 announces songwriter winners

CKFM, Toronto's MIX 99.9, wrapped its fourth annual songwriting competition on Sept. 2.

First prize winner of the \$5,000 was Ken Greer for his entry of Memphis Rain. He also received: a Porta 07 Mini Studio from Tascam; a private seminar with some of Canada's most successful songwriters, courtesy of the Songwriters Association of Canada; and a chance to compete in Canada's national songwriting competition.

Second place winner was Charlene Smith, who received \$3,000 for her entry of Sometimes.

Rebecca Timmons, who placed third, picked up \$2,000 for her entry of World's On Fire.

Among the prizes for the national winner is \$10,000 cash, a recording session with producer Eddie Schwartz and some of the best session musicians in the business, and a release on MCA Records. The winner will be announced Oct. 4.

Government sends pay audio back to CRTC

Minister of Communications Monique Landry announced that the federal government is referring a decision to grant five year licenses to Shaw Cablesystems and Cogeco for digital pay-audio services back to the CRTC for further review.

The government is asking the CRTC to evaluate the amount of Canadian content required on the proposed new format, and to determine whether greater Canadian content is possible. The government also wishes to determine why the new service is not fully utilizing Canadian telecommunications facilities, and why the services are not required to be received in all parts of Canada.

"We have a very aggressive marketing campaign that extends into the border states," said Norman Zagier, Live Entertainment of Canada's vice-president of publicity and promotion, "as far west as Cleveland, and east into Buffalo and Rochester."

Zagier also noted that the Canadian cast album of Phantom has been enormously successful, reaching quintuple platinum (500,000 units) nationally. This is well ahead of the successful Canadian cast album for Joseph And The Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, which is now over double platinum. As well, more than 400,000 students have taken part in the Phantom Of The Opera theatrical education program, which began in November of '89.

The Canadian touring production will finish its run in Vancouver Oct. 9th, and will

Jody Elle, promotion director at The Fox, reports that CKNW, the radio station that broadcasts the games, was apparently behind the move. "The response to the petition has been overwhelming," says Elle. Even Gino Odjick of the Canucks signed the petition, which now has thousands of signatures.

Mr. Fox and several disappointed fans picketed outside of the Coliseum prior to scheduled games to gather more signatures.

Larry & Willy, the Fox's morning show hosts, have taken their show on the road as the Larry & Willy Winnebago Revenge Tour. The foxy duo crashed Calgary, stalling their

Winnebago at several key locations in the downtown area where they broadcast live from 6 to 10 am. The traffic jams they caused were their "payback to Albertans, for clogging B.C. streets and highways all summer in their Winnebagos and R.V.'s, complete with their left turn signals on."

The Fox scored another first for Vancouver when the station introduced its Monday night football party time. Listeners are asked to fax the station, inviting station personalities into their home for the Monday night football game. They show up in The Fox Rock-it, the satellite van, with food, beverages and prizes, and broadcast live from the winner's living room.

"This is the first time this promotion has been done in the Vancouver market," says the station's assistant promotion director Tamara Taggart, "and so far the response has been overwhelming."

"Victory Drive has a lot of very talented clients," says Leibson. "People who have experience, but no formal background."

The second (Oct. 11) will delve into transposing instruments and score reading, followed by seminars (Oct. 18 and 25) that will examine scales, including the major/minor system, church modes, and the full diatonic history. The final class (Nov. 1) will examine time, meter and elements of notation.

Leibson indicated he has already received tremendous response from the local music community. Recently, Columbia Records' Keven Jordan expressed interest in the Victory Drive seminars.

The first day will feature 10 showcases throughout the afternoon and evening, primarily focusing on children's entertainers. Well known local artists will be featured the next day. Included will be Shuffle Demons, Colleen Peterson and the Roselawn Trio. The final day of the event will include performances by a variety of artists, ranging from the highland rock style of Rawlins Cross, and the traditional gospel sound of Gospel Heirs, to the soulful ballads of David Sereda.

Contact '93 is intended to not only present local talent, but also to encourage its development. Performing artists from across the province have been invited to attend and take part in several professional development workshops, and confer with some of the 400 presenters who will be on hand.

The initial five-part series will be ongoing throughout the year. Leibson will also conduct further series of seminars, delving into more advanced aspects of chord construction and composition.

Loren Halloran, a songwriter from Victoria, B.C., has put together a two-song CD demo of two originals that he hopes will open the door for a writing deal.

Both tracks, Will To Succeed and Orca's Correlieu (Correlieu is an Indian word meaning a place where friends meet), were produced by Bob Benson and recorded at Seacoast Sound's 24-track facility in Victoria.

The songs feature saxman Tom Colclough from the David Foster Band, who was the sax player on St. Elmo's Fire.

Also sitting in on the session were: drummer Jerry Adolphe (former Chilliwack and David Foster Band); bassist Brian Newcombe (David Foster Band); guitarist Frank Soda; and the 38-year old composer and arranger, Halloran, on keyboards.

Radio and retail in B.C.'s north and northwest have been very supportive of Halloran's release. A&B Sound is currently featuring the CD in Victoria where it sells for \$8.99.

Toronto developers launch Another Life Production

Toronto developers The Daniels Group have entered into the music business, with the launching September 23 of Another Life Productions.

Mitchell Cohen, senior partner of The Daniels Group, made the announcement at a party of over 400 people held at the Harbourfront's Brigantine Room. An album entitled Pictures by the 11-piece band Another Life will be the initial release on the new independent label.

The production company held a contest in conjunction with this, asking people what they would do if they had another life to live. The four hours of video from this will be combined with clips from the launch party and clips of the band, in a 10-12 minute video to be aired on MuchMusic early in 1994.

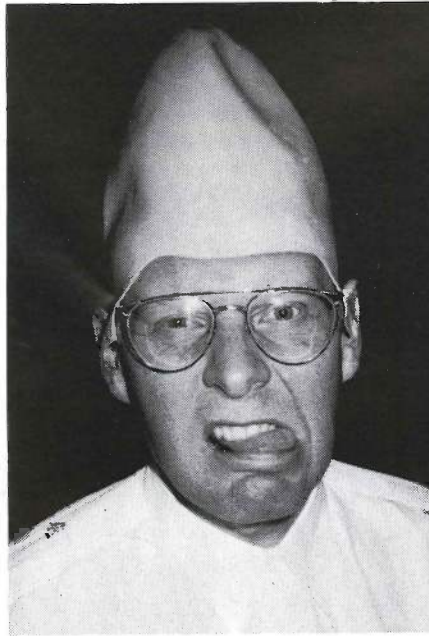
According to Cohen: "Another Life is a dynamic recording and performing band as well as a powerful concept that challenges each of us to reawaken our dreams."

The production company plans to promote acts which might have crossover elements in music, film and television. Cohen also has plans to publish a companion booklet to the new CD, featuring a collection of 'another life' anecdotes from people across the country. The CD will be released early in 1994.

"Another Life is all about challenges," said Cohen, "and we're going to challenge the status quo in the record industry in every way."

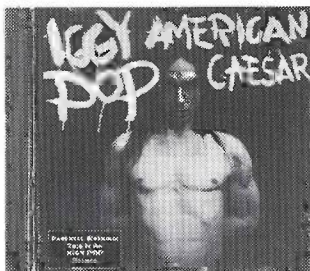


Roger Whiteman, HMV Canada's vice-president of product management, gets his Christmas goose from Warner Music's Garry Newman.

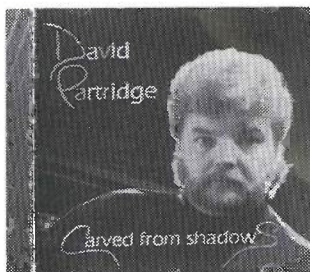
IGGY POP - Punk/Pop

The leader of the punk pack is back, but looking for a wider audience. He just might get it. It's not that Iggy Pop has tamed down, but his alternative rock and/or punk approach has obviously widened. Remember, this guy got started back in 1965, so he's been up and down and through more than a couple of wringers. He's a survivor and perhaps this is what his fans have been waiting for, and they've been waiting a long time. Iggy is up to his old tricks with *Fuckin' Along*, which isn't too bad actually, considering what's allowable today. He has a swell version of Richard Berry's *Louis Louie*, which interestingly enough fits in, kinda. Priority should also be given to *Mixing The Colors* and *Wild America*. Iggy Pop still has that magic, so a front-rack position will create consumer interest. Produced by Malcolm Burn. Pay attention to the Parental Warning. - WG

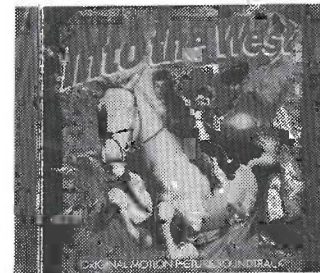
To say that these artists are established names in country is an understatement. The tracks are also well known. There isn't an undanceable track on the album. Dance, country style, is big and it's going to be bigger. This package should be priority at all dance and country clubs. Country radio programmers shouldn't overlook this one. There's a lot of good listening, boot-tapping fun here, particularly with *Mary-Chapin Carpenter's Down At The Twist And Shout*, *Ricky Van Shelton's Heartache Big As Texas*, *Joe Diffie's Honky Tonk Attitude*, *Get In Line* by *Larry Boone*, and *Texas Tattoo* by *Gibson/Miller Band*. - WG

 Carved From Shadows - Forty-Seventh and South Park Way Music-0793

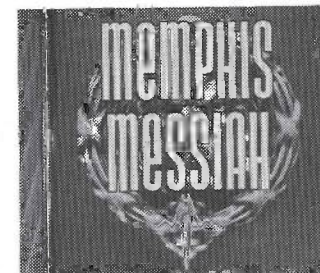
Not only does David Partridge have a great vocal projection and a cozy lyric connection, sales of his album are being donated to a worthy cause: Interim Place; emergency shelters for abused women and their children in the Region of Peel. David Mazmanian, who heads up Forty-Seventh

and South Park Way Music, could very well have a major talent on his hands. Partridge displays a memorable vocal aggressiveness whether his material is rock-edged like *Except For You*, vying elegantly with guitar as on *Just One Light*, or ballading with some very intense keyboard work as he is on *Where It Ends*. Partridge looks after the keyboard and guitar work, and he gets a very professional boost from drummer M.C. Kelly; Howard Rabkin on bass, acoustic lead and rhythm guitar, slide guitar, electric rhythm guitar and keyboard bass; and Steve Wahrer on electric lead guitar. Bob Wilburn provides a nice finishing touch with background vocals on *Carrying You*. - WG



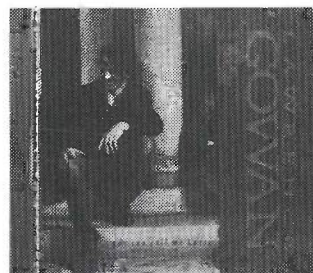
INTO THE WEST - Country

There is a lot of trade interest in this soundtrack, particularly since it has the Disney blessing. The tender, almost coddling, collection of tracks, makes it a perfect package of entertainment. *Fare Thee Well Love*, by *The Rankin Family*, will no doubt become one of the gems on this album. It's also included on their SBK U.S. release of *North Country*. *Eyes Of A Child*, the theme from the film, performed by a new SBK country artist *Garden Of Joy*, has been taken as the first single. Although very country-oriented, there's enough of crossover possibilities to attract the attention of AC and CHR programmers. Lots of punch with *Lulu's How 'Bout Us*, *Someone To Talk To* by *The Devlins* and *Clannad's In A Lifetime*. As well, *Joshua Kadison* has an interesting outlook on *Mamma's Arms*. The movie should also have an impact, so a front-rack position will obviously attract attention. - WG



MEMPHIS MESSIAH - Pop/Alternative
 Memphis Messiah
 Zaram Muzic-26993 (Trend Music)

Pigeon-holing these guys as alternative or even pop would be a disservice. But above all, don't tag them "trendy." *Derek Kai* and *Avi*, a songwriting duo from the Toronto area, who are *Memphis Messiah*, have a distinct handle on a provocatively simple vocal approach that shouldn't go unnoticed. The highs and lows that occur from track to track are rarely found on recordings today. From the raspy and tweedy *Easy Ride* and *American Jesus* to the soft purring of *Tired Of Bein' Blue* and *Look Around*, the vocal projection and lyric interpretation are balanced perfectly. There's no waste here. This is a very tight vocal and instrumental production by *Kai and Avi*, recorded at Toronto's *Wellesley Sound*. *American Jesus* is as tribute to *Elvis Presley* "an observation on the way the public has taken Elvis and made him into almost a religious idol. However, he was also one of the white originators of rock & roll who made it legitimate for white people to accept black musicians," which says it all. - WG



LAWRENCE GOWAN - Pop
 ... but you can call me Larry
 Anthem-80183

His latest album, ...but you can call me Larry, offers us a scaled-down Lawrence Gowan. The fancy instrumentation and dynamic production values have been replaced by a quieter acoustical sound. Not that some of the old art rock influences aren't still present. Gowan has brought back drummer *Jerry Marotta*, formerly *Peter Gabriel's* backup, in his first test as producer. And *Tony Levin* (*Gabriel*, *King Crimson*) is back as well, although his trademark popping bass has been toned down considerably. Gowan has made this, not only his most personal, but also his most collaborative work to date. *Eddie Schwartz* (*Doobies*, *Pat Benatar*, *Joe Cocker*) and *J.D. Souther* have co-writer credits on the first single, *When There's Time For Love*. Former *Bryan Adams* sidekick *Jim Vallance* co-wrote *Innocent*, one of the harder tracks. And *Annette Ducharme*, who wrote *Tom Cochrane's Sinking Like A Sunset*, collaborated on *Soul's Road*. *When There's Time For Love* is a well done pop song, and check out the *Jann Arden* harmonizing and *John Sebastian* (yes, the *John Sebastian*) harmonica and guitar on *Last Laugh*. Art rock dinosaur *Robert Fripp* even pops up, adding his guitar stylings to the native ode *Little Face*. The new Lawrence Gowan is quieter, more intimate, essentially, back to the basics. No longer an inhabitant of AOR land, Gowan seems destined for the mainstream. - RR



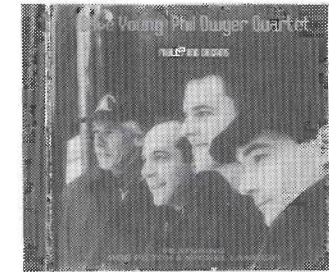
BOBBIE CRYNER - Country

Here's a new country act that's taking a little longer than expected to kick in. Her debut single, *Daddy Laid The Blues On Me*, sparked a little attention, but somehow fell through the cracks. The vocals are warm and sultry, sometimes a little sulky, but never wimpy. Cryner has a pleasant, unfettered method of lyric interpretation that should serve as her vehicle into the mainstream of country. Of particular interest is her duet with *Dwight Yoakam* on *I Don't Care*, not that Cryner needs the powerful image of *Yoakam* to centre her out, but it does help. Also key is *The One I Love The Most* and *I Think It's Over Now*. Cryer wrote six of the 10 songs on the album, which was produced by *Doug Johnson*, *Epic's* vice-president of A&R. - WG

DAVE YOUNG/ PHIL DWYER QUARTET - Jazz
 Fables And Dreams
 Justin Time-53

There's enough jazz experience here, not to mention confidence of performing to make this album a must buy for jazz buffs. There's an above and beyond professionalism displayed here with the players allowing each other their own space, kind of rare in jazz circles. The players in this case are: *Dave Young* (acoustic bass), *Phil Dwyer* (tenor sax, piano), *Michel Lambert* (drums),

and *Rob Pilitch* (guitar). *Dwyer's* sax inserts are incredibly smooth and progressively perfect, as is his keyboard work. *Pilitch's* guitar weaves a taut ribbon throughout and matches bang-on with *Young's* bass. Sometimes we take jazz drummers for granted, but *Lambert's* performance is squeaky clean. Original music here is also very important. *Dwyer* wrote *Dobro*, *Darn*, and *Shifting Emphasis*, while *Lambert* displays his writing talent with *Himm*. Also key is *Whims Of Chambers*, written by *Paul Chambers*, and what can you say about *Fables Of Faubus* from *Charlie Mingus*.



The label people obviously don't consider the *Cancon* properties important, maybe because radio play for jazz has deteriorated so badly. But yes, most of the tracks are four-part MAPL. Produced by *Jim West* and recorded at *Montreal's Studio Tempo*. The quartet is now on a cross-Canada tour, which should attract buyer attention. - WG



SADDLETRAMPS - Pop/Country
 Well Gone Bad
 Homewreckers-14

Not too much information about this release, except who the *Saddletramps* are: *John Dehaas* (bass), *Brian Duguay* (guitars, vocals), *Ken Horne* (drums, percussion), and *Andy Lindsay* (vocals, guitars), and the fact that they are very good. It's also surprising that no major connection has been made. The pop possibilities are much stronger than country, although with today's tag of new country, anything can happen. This is a very tidy and well thought-out production. Vocals are straight ahead, rock-edged at times and where necessary. Don't overlook these guys. There's no writer credits, but it's assumed that by the embracing of the lyric content, the material was written by the band members. Priority should be given to *Defending Me*, *Boat Song*, *Divine Intravenous*, with some caution, and *Bound By Love*. All tracks are MAPL. Produced by *Ken Greer* and recorded at *Metalworks* in Toronto. - WG

ONE HORSE BLUE - Country
 One Horse Blue
 Savannah - 9844-H

This colourful and energy-bound Vancouver band has plodded the regional circuit with relative success for more than 15 years. This album, which the band produced with *Bill Buckingham*, should open the door to a much wider audience. Although each track displays relentless lead vocal urgencies, the band's "big, thick textured" harmonies add a well-balanced power enhancement that lends structure to the projection and lyrical content. Starting *All Over Again*, taken as the first single, is now bulleting up the charts. Also key is *Devil's Train*, and *Bringing Back Your Love*. Includes the previously released singles, *The Man Walks Alone*, produced by *Bill Henderson*, and *Colours Of Love*. The band comprises *Gord Maxwell* (vocals, bass), *Larry Pink* (keys), *Michael Shellard* (guitars), and *Rocco Vaugois* (vocals, drums). - WG

The Bud Talent Final is more than one night's work for CCMA members

CCMA's Joe Wood says "It's cool to be country"

RDR's Joe Wood, who is also on the executive committee of the CCMA, is involved in many aspects of the country music business. As well as heading up his own promotion company, one of Wood's responsibilities to the CCMA is to act as liaison between the Bud Country Talent Search National Final winner and Sony Music Canada.

With Country Music Week '93, the Canadian Country Music Awards and the '93 Bud Country Talent Search all just wrapping up, Wood explains how he feels about a number of issues.

Being directly involved with the talent competition winner and the record label that is going to release the four tracks that were included in the first prize, Wood had some very positive and informative input about the competition itself, the winner and how he deals with the winners after the contest is over.

When asked how he thought this year's Talent Search went in comparison to other years, he said, "This year's talent search wasn't televised, which I think adds to the whole flavour and makes everybody feel a little more part of the whole thing. However, even without the ambience that I think televising it brings, the contestants managed to pull off their stuff real well. I was impressed by and felt that the fellow who won, Jeffrey Gilmer, was very good."

After the winners were announced and everyone had left the theatre with an air of completion, the competition was just the beginning for Wood. Along with the \$10,000 cash prize Gilmer won, are four spots on up-and-coming Sony compilations. It is Wood's responsibility now to make sure there is proper communication between the label and the artist.

"Hopefully this year will run a lot smoother than previous years. Simply because we've got a lot of people on the board who are geared towards grass roots, people like myself, R. Harlan and Diane Kelly who deal with

independent artists. They are really concerned with making sure that the prizes are followed through and that everything rolls really smooth for the winner.

"I will act as liaison between Gilmer and Sony. I'll make sure he knows when his tunes are going to be released and that Sony gets up-to-date bio's everytime they plan to include him on one of their compilations. I also track his records and let him know who is playing him. Because after all the hoopla is over, you just want to make sure the winner is looked after, that he is walked through it all."

Being an artist with four tracks released on a major record company's compilation in your hip pocket, a signing wouldn't appear

that far down the road. And a signing from the record company that released your material seems all the more natural to transpire, but Wood has his own ideas about that.

"Yes and no. Let's say we've done the four tracks and that's it. The contest is finished and Sony's put him on their comps like they said they would do. Their commitment is just to do that, not really to sign him to anything. It's just basically to make sure that he gets out there. It's hard to say whether Sony likes exactly what they hear and want to sign him or whether they just feel they are helping the community at large by participating in the contest. It's really hard to say."

Wood did however bring up two past winners who ended up being signed to a major label after winning the Bud Country Talent Search Competition. "The two winners who come to mind, who have really come to the forefront of country music, are Joan Kennedy and Brad Johner. They are the only two I can

think of, off hand, who are still out there successfully carrying on. We haven't finished with Shelia Deck, last year's winner. She is still in the midst of finishing her tunes."

With the success of the Canadian Country Music Awards and its sizable viewing audience, Wood felt "this year's award show was the best we've ever done. I think it was a slick production in terms of overall presentation. I've spoken to people from coast to coast who did see the show and they said 'Ya, it was great. It was really slick and it was really well done.' I was impressed."

With an estimated viewing audience of more than 110 million, Wood was asked if he thought the broadening of the audience would help generate sales or just increase the awareness of Canadian talent to both the States and Europe.

"It should increase the awareness and that should increase the sales. Everything stems from getting Canadian country music out there and getting it into the forefront. I'd say it will broaden their education and should result in some dollars and cents. We are right on the threshold here. We are stepping through to an era of 'it's cool to be country.'"

"Country music is running along the same lines as pop. You've got a Bud Talent that's breeding and hopefully nurturing a whole crop of kids who are walking into a music genre that's really cool -- it's hip to be there. So for them and the awards show, it's perfect. It's smooth. There's a transition there that's great. From Bud Talent to the Canadian Country Music Awards show, you can see it's just 'cool to be country.'"

With the popularity of Canadian country music growing astronomically, politics enter the picture with the same intensity that country music has risen. There doesn't seem to be any praise or attention given to any one aspect of this star-studded business without a certain amount of negatives to counter the praises. Unfortunately, the same is true for our country music industry. And the more it grows, the more sceptical and picky people become.

CCMA Citation Award to A Song For Brent

The Society for A Song For Brent, won the C.F. Martin Award at the closing awards ceremonies of this year's Canadian Country Music Week (RPM - Oct. 2/93)

The award is presented annually to a person or organization who made "an outstanding contribution of time and energy in the support of humanitarian causes through country music."

The award was presented by Brian Leblanc, representing Keif Music and the C.F. Martin company. Cindy Church who recorded the song, accepted the award, along with a \$1,000 donation on behalf of the society.

Previous award winners were: Wayne Rostad (1989), Gary Fjellgaard (1990), Carroll Baker (1991), and John Allan Cameron (1993).

A Song For Brent, now charting on the RPM Country 100 at #20, emerged as a charitable recording project from last year's Canadian Country Music Week '92, which was held in Calgary (RPM - July 24/93).

Calgary's Country 105, PolyGram Records, Warner/Chappell Music Canada and SOCAN are collectively funding the release of the song, which includes promotion.

The project was inspired by the story of 15-year old Brent Berezay, who was paralyzed by a rodeo accident. A songwriting workshop created the song with the intention of somehow reaching the youngster, who, although barely able to move and is unable to speak, responded emotionally to country videos.

All the costs associated with the song have been donated, and profits from the sale and airplay of the recording and music, donated to the society. The society is incorporated in Alberta to administer the proceeds of the project specifically for the benefit of brain-injured quadriplegics who, like Berezay, suffered their injuries while in childhood.

Released in cassette single and CD single format and distributed by PolyGram, more than 20,000 copies have been sold to date.

Today's country industry and particularly the artists are constantly trying to defend themselves against those who think they are in the position to say "this isn't country," or "so-and-so isn't a country group." It's becoming more prominent with the success of Toronto's CISS-FM and its interpretation of what is new country.

"I think that argument has been around ever since Hank Williams Sr. took drums onto the stage of the Grand Ol' Opry . . ."

On the subject of who is, and what is country, Wood counters with, "I think that argument has been around ever since Hank Williams Sr. took drums onto the stage of the Grand Ol' Opry, and that was unheard of. Imagine a drummer being added to a country band? That was just bizarre. So that set the temperament of what is and what isn't country music. How far do you go? Is One Horse Blue country? Is Cassandra Vasik country?"

As for The Rankin Family and the recent dispute over whether they are country or a Celtic band, Wood had a few thoughts about that.

"Country music in the United States came from hillbilly music. It modified and it changed, but basically, that's its roots. That's where it came from and bluegrass generated from that. In Canada, our country music, is really Celtic, Irish and Scottish, from our heritage. So, in some cases, perhaps what we're expecting

from our Canadian artist is for them to sound like Travis Tritt, who comes from Atlanta, which, if you think about it, is totally foreign. If Travis Tritt sounded more like The Rankin Family or Ron Hynes or The Barra MacNeils, that would probably be closer to his roots than Nashville is.

"Geez, wouldn't you think The Rankins would be more acceptable as a Canadian country sound, as opposed to being more of a negative?"

"In the long run it's like CISS-FM. Some people don't like CISS radio because they say it's not country. But what its definitely doing, is bringing an awareness to everybody out there that country music is at the forefront and is rising in popularity. For all the negative criticism that we give CISS, you have to applaud them for all their work in making an overall awareness of Canadian country music out there."

With the "new country" label, it does alienate those who have been working at creating a country star system before it was introduced. However, with the breaking of artists like Prairie Oyster and Cassandra Vasik CISS has certainly opened the field to what is considered country and they certainly make the public aware with their massive billboards.

CISS-FM may not play what established country artists might consider 100% country, but they are a contributing factor to the popularity of country music and its artists in Canada. With the positive response to the awards and Country Music Week '93, it seems the country industry as a whole is working to gain the recognition it deserves.

Billy Ray Cyrus holds at #1 with *In The Heart Of A Woman*. Try, as some broadcasters do, on both sides of the border, they aren't having much success in scuttling the career of Cyrus. His current Mercury album, *It Won't Be The Last*, continues to rack up impressive sales.

The follow-up to Ron Hynes' Cryer's Paradise, his debut for EMI Music, will be *Man Of A Thousand Songs*. The new release has a heavier country approach, which attracted the attention of several programmers who have already been airing the track. Cryer's *Paradise* is now being targeted to AC stations.

Confederate Railroad has the biggest gainer this week with *Trashy Women*, coming out of left field. This is the fastest rising single this band has had in Canada. The track was taken from their self-titled Atlantic album and is also included on Warner CD compilation 183.

Michelle Wright's Guitar Talk has the most adds this week entering the chart at #71. Country programmers are leaning on this release, probably because it is Cancon (MA). Well-known rock guitarist Colin Linden wrote the music to the song. The track is from Wright's *Now & Then* album, released on the Arista label and is also included on BMG CD compilation 21. Wright won four CCMA awards this year: female vocalist, entertainer, single and video for *He Would Be Sixteen*. Earlier this year, she captured Big Country Awards as female vocalist, top country album and single, and the *Hostess Frito Lay* Canadian country artist of the year award.

Spirit Of The West, the Vancouver-based band displays a Celtic lilt on their latest release, *And If Venice Is Sinking*, which enters the chart at #93. Written as a poem by band member John Mann, celebrating what is described as "the passions of honeymooning in Venice," it surfaced as a song and became popular in the loft of Harpo's Nightclub in Victoria. The song is now regarded as the band's anthem. With country programmers becoming more and more attuned to the Celtic roots that represent a truer Canadian country sound, several stations were quick to add the single. This track was taken from their upcoming *Faithlift* album released on the WEA label. The Celtic roots are apparent throughout the album, which was produced by Michael-Philip Wojewoda, who has produced for Jane Siberry, Barenaked Ladies and Rheostatics. The album was recorded at Vancouver's Mushroom Studios and Warehouse Studios. The band begins an extensive tour of Canada this month.

Billy Charles has a new five-song self-titled radio promotion CD which is now at radio. The focus track is a Cyril Lawson/Jackson Leap penning of *You Look Better From Behind*. Also included is *Loose Caboose*, which Charles wrote with Barry Brown. This track scored good chart action over the summer. The Barry Brown penning of *Centreville Three*, a chart happenin' in '92, is also included on the CD, along with *Tractor Man*, written by Charles

he heard and asked for more, resulting in the session being recorded at Nashville's Enactron Studio with Ahern at the board. The album includes two Greenly originals; Emotional Girl and Pray For The Family. The album is released on the Magnum label, which is based in Edmonton. Watch for an album review.

The Kinetic label is mounting a major promotional push behind the release of the self-titled album from the Underground Outlaws. A three-song CD EP was shipped to radio and early feedback is giving priority play to Put A Little Distance, written by band members Corey and Kevin Churcko and Mike Norman. The trio also wrote the other two songs; Tonky Honkin' and I Miss The Old Man. The Moose Jaw band also produced the album which was recorded at Vancouver's Falcon Studios. 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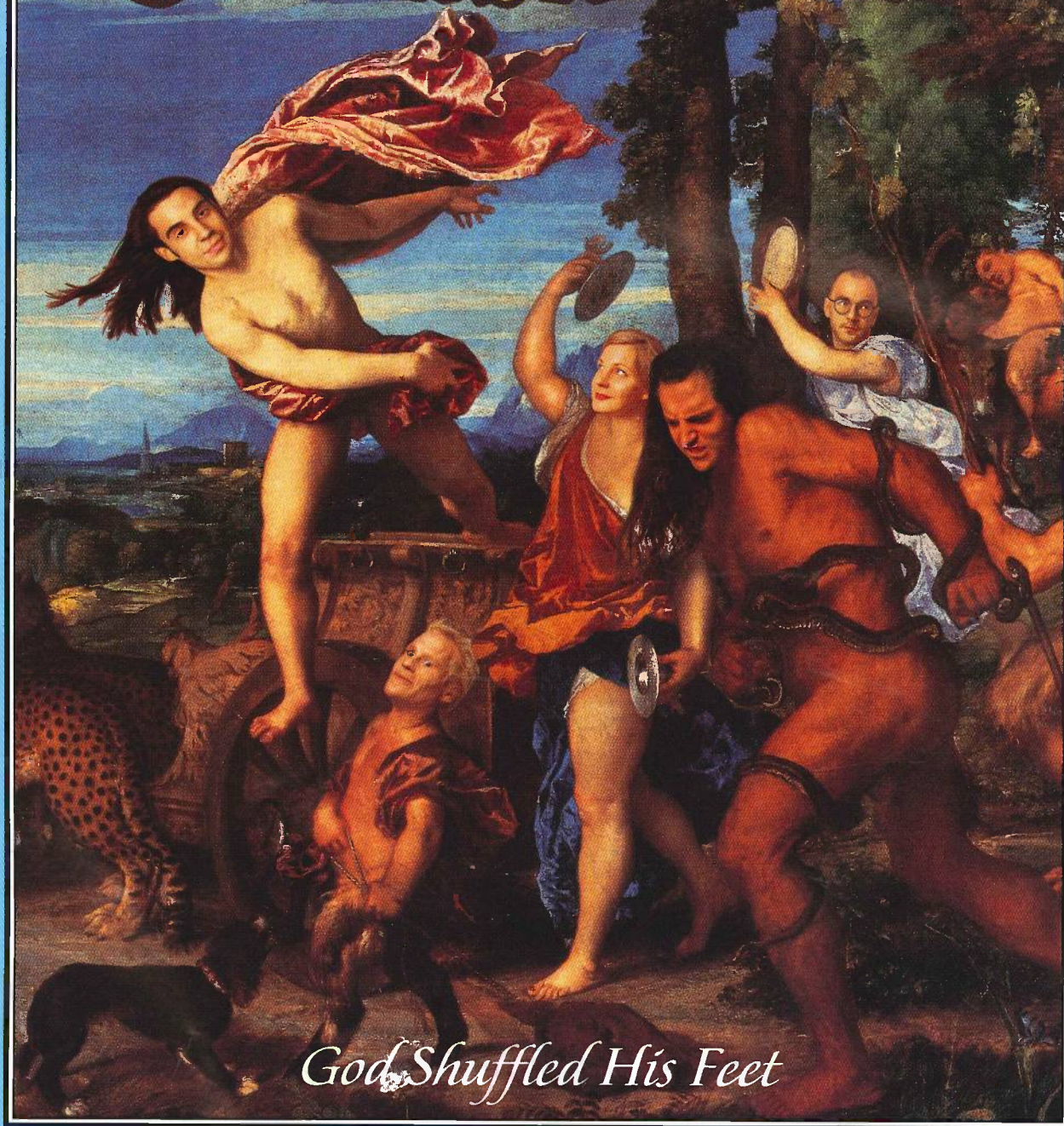
