


The compilation business comes of age

Twenty years ago, the business of mass marketing hit singles was relatively simple. You took whatever singles were burning up the charts and put them together in a handsome compilation package, the philosophy being that radio listeners marry themselves more to songs than they do to artists. The idea seemed to have worked well for some time, with generous sales coming in from strong radio promotion and record labels gaining a chance to recoup on one hit wonders.

The present climate has changed dramatically from those days, however, making the modern compilation a different entity. Far from recouping on lost sales, today's compilation packages vie substantially against releases from major artists. Sales figures as high as one million in Canada for Quality Music's Dance Hits '95 for example, are well within the scope of the market, with other

releases from dance, country and pop and specialty products from slow jam to love songs and retro music hitting multi-platinum sales figures. The difference is in a radical shift that has taken place in the way the labels view compilations, most of which are currently created around concepts with specific market objectives.

"I think at one time the philosophy was definitely to couple the biggest hits in a proven genre with some work acts, or if you want to go way back, the tendency was to fill a compilation with filler," says BMG's Dale Curd, director of TV marketing who oversees compilations for the label. "I don't think that's the case anymore, I don't think any of the majors -- ourselves included -- are about putting filler in a compilation because we recognise very quickly that the consumers just don't buy it."

At present, compilations have been developed in most genres and have occasioned an inundation

of the product at retail. Success after success of compilations like Hit Zone, NOW, Dance Mix and New Country have demanded that record companies partner for multi-artist releases and that the product be serialised, giving it an ongoing value similar to a seasonal full-length release from a major artist.

Warner Music's Alan Fletcher, a strategic project developer for the label whose New Country series has sold over 500,000 units, says that the importance of compilations for the majors will continue to increase as the economics of the industry enter into a tough future.

"For the first time in history there is no new configuration coming in," says Fletcher. "In the past twenty-five years of music at any given time there have been three configurations; there has usually been one dominant, one moving in and one moving out. You're sitting here now and CD saturation is at a key point because the pipe has been filled in terms of people replenishing their catalogues which has kept record companies

CIRPA's Chater rips RPM for CAB coverage

In the more than 33 years that RPM has been publishing, it has always been our mandate to cover both the broadcast and record industries, providing readers with news and information and even airing controversies between the two.

With the ongoing battle regarding Bill 32, and in particular "neighboring rights" which was part of expanding the Copyright Act, the battle lines were drawn. Opposing views from the creators (music publishers, writers et cetera) and users (broadcasters) were given equal space in RPM. The most recent was a same page offering in the April 14/97 issue wherein both sides aired their views under title of CAB challenges "flawed" Copyright Bill, and from the creators, which CIRPA President Brian Chater must have overlooked, Cultural sector targets Senate to pass Bill C-32, which prompted him to write the following:

I have to tell you on behalf of CIRPA that I was less than enthralled to open the April 14 RPM and read an article on broadcaster 'concerns' regarding Bill C-32. To be blunt, this was pure propaganda and, as such, had no place in a record industry magazine. At the very least you should have researched this very contentious (and we feel deliberately misleading) press release from the

CAB. A phone call to David Basskin, Brian Robertson, or myself would have done it.

CIRPA is upset that you continue to print this stuff even though it is against the interests of the industry you serve and particularly that you print it verbatim, with no backup research on the issues. Do you seriously think that Broadcast magazine publishes any press release of ours verbatim? I think you clearly know the answer and in case you don't, it's no!

Why don't you just come out and say what everybody knows? The broadcasters have used and continue to use every tactic and argument they can think of to prevent passage of the bill. Now it's the matter of ephemeral exceptions and "problems" of use and fairness. They got what they were asking for in amendments to the ephemeral exception clause of the Bill in the House of Commons. Now they say they want yet more changes to establish "fairness and access."

Why don't we just cut to the chase and make it clear that what they really want is NOT TO PAY? This has been the basis and the thrust of their strategy for years. Why not just say this instead of trying to cloak their arguments in other issues? Better still, why don't you ask them that directly?

Given the problems that will face all owners

of copyright works in the future, given that broadcasters will be major owners or copyright works in the future and given the fact that without passage of phase II we will be unable to proceed with phase III of the copyright revision process it is in their own long-term interest in this regard to effect passage. Phase III will contain many pieces of legislation that will benefit broadcasters as creators and which will have a major impact on their future prosperity. It appears to us that the current broadcaster strategy lacks thought and coherence and is clearly not in their own self interest. As I said at CMW, in our view, their approach is one of short term gain for long term pain.

Ironically, it's expected that as we go to press (April 24), the Senate will have given final approval in expanding the Copyright Act "as is". During a conversation with Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Canadian Heritage Sheila Copps at the East Coast Music Awards in Moncton in February of this year, Copps promised she would do all in her power to get the revised Bill 32 through Parliament before an election call this year.

Representatives of more than 25 Canadian cultural groups, representing artists, creators and producers are scheduled to join in honouring Copps at Sounds Interchange Studios in Toronto, Friday April 25 at 1:30 pm, providing the Bill passes through the Senate. Copps is expected to be there.

relatively profitable for the last fifteen years. Cassettes are obviously declining rapidly and there is nothing new coming in directly to the music industry per se."

Because record companies have become used to factoring the retail boost that a new configuration injects into the market, no new configuration will equal a drop in the general economics of the industry, says Fletcher. The onus is on the majors to cushion the blow any way they can, but especially by developing and capitalising on new markets.

New markets

The philosophical shift in the way the industry views compilations has allowed record labels to approach these new markets in a way that does not pose great risks of financial loss. Ironically, the biggest insight that compilations have afforded the record industry is that there is major market value in specialty, fledgling, commercially unproven or otherwise risky formats.

"I think you can divide the compilation departments in the major labels into two

categories," says Curd. "There are those companies that operate on the basis of 'I have some repertoire, I have to find a home for it,' and then there are companies which take a look at the Canadian population and take a look at it hard and fast as marketers. Where are the trends likely to be when it comes to music buying and music buying habits and is there a compilation in that future?"

With 150,000 units on their CMT compilation and 145,000 on Groove Station, BMG has reaped

Our Lady Peace, Tea Party to head EdgeFest

Initial dates on a cross country tour and a working line-up have been announced for EdgeFest, one of the principal concert attractions of the summer. The festival, which kicks off Saturday June 28th at Molson Park in Barrie, will be checking into Montreal's Blue Bonnets-Hippodrome de Montreal on June 29 before moving to the nation's capital at Landsdowne Park, Ottawa. Several as yet unannounced dates will follow as the festival moves across the country with a total of eight city stops, the first in the history of the event.

"The idea was to take it on the road and create a Canadian festival," said Steve Herman, senior VP Universal Concerts Canada, who is taking EdgeFest on this year from CFNY which introduced and maintained the concept until last year. "The idea is that it doesn't have to be Canadian meaning or strictly Canadian artists or anything, but just have a Canadian feel to the festival. And it's become an annual event and that we have reasonable ticket prices and it's a great opportunity for artists to play in front of larger crowds."

The festival attracted some 30,000 people last year, according to Herman, who expects that the numbers will be matched if not surpassed on the Eastern dates. Although places and venues have yet to be confirmed, Herman hopes the festival will see shows in Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver.

"We've certainly got work to do," he says. "Obviously in Toronto people know what it is, but we also have to communicate the message to the rest of the country. It's a big show for some of these markets and it's an expensive show to put

on. Any show that goes outdoors is expensive and you're dealing with other variables that you don't have to deal with when you're indoors like the weather. But I think the key to it all is to have a great line-up of talent which I think we have."

Three of the headlining acts (Our Lady peace, The Tea Party and Collective Soul) will be supporting new albums during the tour while a banner year for I Mother Earth and final gigs with the current line-up will heighten interest in the band. The full line-up includes feature main stage acts from Our Lady Peace, The Tea Party, Collective Soul, I Mother Earth, Holly McNarland, BTK and

second stage performances from Glueleg, Age Of Electric, Finger Eleven (formerly Rainbow Butt Monkeys), Kinnie Starr, Sara Craig and Zuckerbaby.

"The line-up will change slightly in the Western market but the key acts will remain," said Herman.

With a movement into a major Canadian festival, Edgefest ups the ante on travelling open air shows, notably Lollapalooza which is boasting a big show with the return or founder/organiser Perry Farrell.

"This event is built for the Canadian market, the lion's share of talent is Canadian and we'll have small villages that will have a Canadian feel," said Herman. "It's definitely a made in Canada event."

Jewish Film Festival celebrates 5th anniversary

The Toronto Jewish Film Festival (TJFF) is celebrating its fifth anniversary with a showing of feature length and short films at the Bloor Cinema from May 1 through May 8.

Over the last five years, TJFF has become the second largest Jewish film festival in North America and the largest independent film festival in Toronto, after the Toronto International Film Festival.

TJFF is an international festival of feature length and short films, animated documentary or fiction, that express the diversity of the Jewish experience. Scheduled are 24 - 30 films from such countries as Canada, Israel, Romania, Tunisia, Holland, France, the U.S., Switzerland and the Ukraine.

Until May 1, tickets and passes are available by calling the Festival's box office at 416-324-8600 or at the box office at 33 Prince Arthur Ave. 2nd

floor. During the festival, the box office will be located at the Bloor Cinema. Advance tickets are available one hour prior to the first screening of the day, up to 10 pm. An \$80 Festival Pass includes opening and closing night galas.

This year's festival team comprises Shlomo Schwatzberg (director of programming), Helen Zukerman (producer) and Debra Kwinter (director of development).

Quote of the year!!! Getting stolen is better than being promoted. (EC: Ain't it the truth!!!)



a sizeable profit with compilations focusing on country and dance. Their Club Cutz series, now on its eighth instalment, has had a healthy history of cashing in on Euro club music and the label is also turning its sights on the urban market with a priority release from Wu-Tang Clan, a hip hop compilation expected to be the label's major release of the year.

Warner Music Canada maintains a priority to developing compilation projects that are created and sold at their existing customer base (ie. the mainstream rock and pop of their hugely successful NOW! compilations done in conjunction with Universal and EMI). They have nevertheless felt the need to send out a few feelers into outside markets via specialty compilations.

"It's just a matter of working the corners and trying to give other listeners consideration," says Fletcher, who is responsible for the new age Escapes compilation and this year's Guitar Music For Small Rooms, both geared towards older audiences. He maintains that the surprise success of Escapes, which is currently just shy of platinum sales in Canada, is prophetic of a greater reality.

"The major thing in music right now is that there is a major demographic shift that people really aren't paying that much attention to," he says. "The younger consumer is certainly a main purchaser of music overall but they are still a limited segment of the market and the dominant demographic of the marketplace is an older consumer. Every year about 4% drops off the youth market and goes on the top end. The same group that dominate that sector are the ones that dominated the sector in the boomer generation and the boomer generation dominates the consumer sector."

With the average age in Canada averaging 41, the baby boomer generation represents a significant one third of the population. Considerations of a less disposable income for that group, as well as declining interest in music for older consumers do little to mitigate the importance of a demographic shift, says Fletcher.

"There has never a more important market force than the baby boomer generation," he says. "It's changing the way music is being merchandised, the way it's played and sold; it's changing the amount of people that buy in direct response because convenience means a lot more to an older audience."

Artist development

Along with exploring new markets, the second key ingredient in the business of modern compilations is the development of new artists. The practice of shuffling in the new with the proven, what has been termed 'piggy backing a baby act,' has become especially prominent as it allows record companies to capitalise on a market as it grows.

"There's no doubt that the majors are recognising that the key to staying in this business and making this business work for them is to develop their repertoire," says Curd. "And develop is the word, not exploit because compilations are being seen as artist development tools more so than they are exploitation of hits."

Artists that are being developed on BMG's roster include rising artists like Donell Jones, Jacksoul and Az Yet, all of whom share prominent spots alongside established artists like Toni Braxton, SWV and R. Kelly on BMG's recent Love Me Down compilation.

"I wouldn't go so far as to say that we're saying to the Canadian public, 'if you like Toni Braxton, then you'll probably like Donell Jones or you'll probably like Az Yet,' we're not going that far because we're not telling them that this is what they should like," says Curd. "But we're basically looking at it as this is a single from Donell Jones that is reacting very well in certain markets, let's see if it has the potential to react in this market and let's put it on the compilation."

Fletcher's choices for Warner's newest compilations put the accent on Canadian content, from nouveau flamenco guitarist Robert Michaels (see interview on page 7) to Ottmar Liebert, Jesse Cooke, and Brian Hughes.

"It was a big concern to me to have Canadian artists represented as a main feature," says Fletcher who is featuring Michaels for the album's promotion.

The Quality phenomenon

With approximately fifty compilation releases per year, Quality Music comes out as the most aggressive player in the compilation arena with the lion's share of their product concentrating on the dance market. As Quality's director of A&R and promotions Dennis Garces admits, dance music is a format that is particularly receptive to compilations to the extent that it overlooks full-length releases from artists.

"I hate to say it but there is more of a fickleness with a dance audience," says Garces. "You are looking at people for whom the fashions dictate the trends and as the trends change so do they and as dance music changes, so do they. I think there is a little more stability in rock'n'roll, people are a little more consistent."

In other words, for the hit loving dance market, compilations are often exclusively vehicles for new artists, many of whom never see a fulllength album and some of whom may never need it

"The compilation is the only venue that single artists can get their product out into the mass market in a way the label can afford to promote it," says Garces. "When you spend a certain amount on licensing and signing a track, the only way you can recoup your money is if you have a viable way of making it back and develop these artists in a significant way. The compilation allows us to do television and if the artist has a video, increased exposure for the track through radio and TV advertising to create the buzz which it needs to follow up to the street level promotion."

And promote they do. Ferocious radio and television campaigns for their Dance Mix series, Chris Sheppard's Pirate Radio Sessions, Destination Dance Floor, Jock Rock, Jock Jams and packages from MuchMusic and MTV have made Quality Music the largest single television advertising company in Canada. The aggressiveness has paid off in spades with recurring multi-platinum sales, diamond for their 1995 instalment of the Dance Mix series.

Quality's current push is a Made In The '80s compilation that features tracks which received strong airplay on MuchMusic a decade ago and a second instalment in their highly successful Slow Jams series.

Made In The '80s currently sits at #9 after three weeks on SoundScan's national retail album chart while Dance Mix USA '97 and Dance Mix '96 continue to sell through after eight weeks and twenty-nine weeks respectively.

New releases from the Warner Music, EMI and Universal include the second instalment on the NOW! series, expected to surpass double platinum sales of their last. Future compilation initiatives for BMG include a second volume for their top grossing CMT record of last year, set for an August release, and an unprecedented media blitz for New Country 4. Peace In The Valley, an Arista compilation, will bring together contemporary country artists like Alan Jackson, Michelle Wright and Pam Tillis for a gospel roots album. BMG will continue their joint venture with Sony and PolyTel for Hit Zone as well as the development of their hugely successful Country Heat series, which has breached sales of 800,000 units since 1991.

Robert Michaels brings passion to Small Rooms

While the ongoing development of the domestic original artist takes a central role in today's compilations, musicians like Robert Michaels get an angle in what could be their biggest break. Michaels, who is one of the Canadian features in Warner Music's Guitar Music For Small Rooms, warms up the release with Latin guitar music that has been host to a number of labels, from Flamenco Jazz to Nouveau Flamenco.

What is seldom debated about Michael's music, however, is that it is in possession of that singular power to move the spirit and evoke the passions, the secret ingredient that has given Latin music an almost mystical influence over the world. Not surprisingly, one of Michaels' two cuts from the album (his instrumental rendition of Carlos Santana's Europa is complemented by an original piece written around the release) has been chosen by Warner to introduce the compilation to radio.

A native of Toronto, Michaels spent the past fifteen years honing his craft, a creative combination of jazz, classical, pop and flamenco brought together by the matrimony of passion and technique.

"It's definitely a combined flavour, but I

The Franco-Canadian folk/roots artists will tour both Canada and the States extensively in support of the new release.



You don't come across dance music that is any poppier than this, and yet, this brunette singer songwriter manages to squeeze some interesting twists into her debut independent album. We're talking about Looped, a gutsy track with a punchy riff and no nonsense vocals couched warmly between the pop pillows of Dance Alone and Thinking 'Bout You. We're talking about a very definite potential for radio. A native of Vancouver B.C., Andréa first became a fan of her father (drummer for a band unnamed on her bio) before moving on to the likes of Elton John, Pink Floyd, Donna Summer and Barry White. The vocal influences especially have remained into the singer's twenties, and retain substance enough to flesh out some promising material from songs made from keyboard programming. The lyrical material doesn't stray to far from its intended market (that's luv, baby) without seeming pointless or trite. Standout tracks are Hear It's Love, Melting Mood, Looped, Thinkin' Bout You, Dreamer Girl and Without You. In case you haven't noticed, that's a good portion of this album; do yourself a favour and give it a -RG spin

Ahh, you gotta love those outrageous WASP fellows. No sooner had we reported on their upcoming tour in last week's RPM that we learned that the boys had actually blown up a pig on stage. Maybe they're just trying too hard but, what the hell, the kids are heartily lapping it up (grotesque pun intended). Surprisingly strong sales for a Slayer release last year proved that the metal format, even while it continues to be eschewed by the mainstream, still has commercial clout. And

with all the current interest being doubled back to the nineteen eighties, WASP stand a good chance at becoming legends in their own time, even if radio can't go with K.F.D.'s screaming chorus of 'Kill/Fuck/Die!' A nodding acquaintance with the sound of modern Satanic rock (ie. Marilyn Manson, NIN) has given Blackie Lawless and Chris Holmes an album with sales potential that is garishly vivid. Wild and heavy on Take The Addiction (Taste the affliction!), Killahead (Make your mother die!), U (You fuckin' suck!) and Wicked Love (Bitch!) will not disappoint those hapless souls who have been waiting eight year now for a follow up to 1989's Headless.

MERYN CADELL -Pop/Alternative 6 Blocks

Handsome Boy 0017

A recent signee to Handsome Boy, Meryn Cadell returns with a third alum of original music. From the out-take intro vocal and larger than life bass of the opening track, Cadell lets the listener know that she remains dedicated to keeping a strong hold on her independence even while maturity draws her closer to a form of pop that is practical at heart. That's an all too complicated way of saying that 6 Blocks is poppy enough and clever enough to catch fire with radio, and that it is one of those albums that just grows



on you. It's a pint sized grand tour involving breathy clarinet, full strings, spoken song piano ballads, cooler than cool beach ball surf and offbeat alternative tunes which add a lot to the album's currency. But detractors of Cadell's street smart narratives be warned, 6 Blocks also contains glass encased narratives that might endear you to the music. Slippery, Why Do I Do, Joe Roth, Holy Projector and Lying will appeal to the conservative alt radio programmer, all else is up for grabs. Production and performing credits for Chris Wardman as well as appearances from Mary Margaret O'Hara and Jason Sniderman (!) on piano. -RG

POWDERFINGER -Pop/Rock Double Allergic

Mercury/Polydor 314 533 153-Q

After several months tied up in red tape, Australia's Powderfinger will finally see a Canadian release of their album Double Allergic. Although the band's sophomore release it is, in fact, the band's debut in Canada. Signed to Polydor Australia in '92, the Brisbane-based group released their debut Down Under in 1994 with Parables For Wooden Ears and garnered fan attention with several Big Day Out appearances as well as extensive touring on their own. Double



Allergic brings the band's big-rock sound to North America with 12 dynamic tracks of soulful rock and introspective, socially aware lyrics. If D.A.F., the first single, doesn't impress with it's back-to-basics rock sound, it will keep listeners enthraled trying to unravel the cryptic title of the song (hint: the lyrics won't help.) Produced by Tim Whitten (the Smiths, the Mission, Underground Lovers, Clouds) and Powderfinger, Double Allergic is a highly impressive introduction to North America. Especially listenable are Skinny Jean, Glimpse, Take Me In and Boing Boing.



ERASURE -Pop/Dance Cowboy

Maverick/Mute 46631-P

If it had been up to Vince Clarke and Andy Bell of Erasure, they couldn't have chosen a more appropriately-named label to release their latest, Cowboy. As one of the founding members of Depeche Mode and one half of Yaz, Clarke was one of the true pioneers of electro-pop having penned such classic tracks as Just Can't Get Enough, Situation, Only You, Don't Go and Respect. Thus, deservedly so, the future of electro-pop seems to rest with Erasure and their patented style of infectious dance beats and highly flamboyant vocals. And the 13 tracks on Cowboy easily secure that future, practically defying you to try and sit still while listening In My Arms, the first single, not only keeps the beat grooving but draws in the romantics with its lilting and touching lyrics. And Blondie fans can check out the pumped-up version of Rapture -- which was, incidentally, one of the first mainstream pop songs to incorporate rap. Produced by Gareth Jones and Neil McLellan.



BABY CHAOS Love Your Self Abuse Atlantic 82999-P

-Pop/Alternative

By far one of this year's most clever album titles, Love Your Self Abuse marks Baby Chaos' debut for Atlantic records and the band's sophomore release. Sort of a Britpop band with a Generation X attitude and a severe shortage of Prozac, Baby Chaos is one of Scotland's most talented and boisterous exports. With song titles like Mental Bruising For Beginners, Confessions Of A Teenage Pervert and Rearrange You -- not to mention the title track -- it's a safe assumption that this isn't an album of sappy love songs. But don't be fooled into thinking this is another poor knock-off of every '70s punk band to come out of Britain. Not at all. Although the first single, Kicking Things, is every inch an anthem for a genX attitude of apathy, the songs on this album do, in fact, rely heavily on melodies. Of course the sardonic Scottish wit encountered in the lyrics as well as the metaledged aggression added to the power-pop keeps the ever-dreaded boredom at bay. -LT

CHUCK PROPHET Homemade Blood True North 0148-J

From the opening strains of the Stones-ish first track Credit, Homemade Blood marks Chuck Prophet as a truely gifted singer/songwriter, the likes usually not found in one under the age of 40. Homemade Blood is Prophet's third solo release and first album in almost four years. His earthy rock 'n' roll style is showcased with 12 unique songs of every day living and day-to-day drudgeries. His straightforward songwriting covers broken hearts, relationships and personal economic crisis in a way that oftentimes conjures up images of a vocally-gifted Bob


Kiddie market my ass! In case you've had your head stuck lamenting the death of grunge, you couldn't have missed these three kids who have charmed the hell out of the listening public with MMMBop, a tune made out of natural harmonies and rock'n'roll the way grandpa used to play it. The crazy thing is, the track was penned

and performed by bandmembers that have barely reached their mid-teens. Brothers Isaac (16), Taylor (13) and Zac (11) Hanson give a new twist to the youth market by transcending the age barrier for some music that is chock full of jubilant pop, modern rock, '70s soul and gospel. No word of a lie, these kids can kick it out in a way that makes it difficult to recognise their age anywhere on the tracks. Mercury understandably putting a big push on the release, which has had a strong early response from MuchMusic and from radio (MMMBop sits at #46 on RPM's Hit Tracks chart this week). They'll have lots



to follow up with, including Thinking Of You, Speechless, Where Is The Love, Look At You and Madeline. Produced by the Dust Brothers (Beck) and Stephen Lironi (Black Grape) with collaborations from Desmond Child, Barry Mann and Cynthia Well. No chance on ignoring this one, after it reaps a full crop on the attention it deserves.





Dylan. The country-tinged pop rock -- check out the wah-wah laced 22 Fillmore and the mandolin intro to Whole Lot More -- sounds of Homemade Blood are bound to see crossover action regardless of which tracks are released to radio. Produced by Prophet and Eric Westfall.

SISTER SOMEONE -Pop/Rock Sister Someone Ogden/McEvoy/Carpenter SS1001

Every once in a while an unknown band will appear out of nowhere and fool you into thinking you're listening to an alreadyestablished, much-lauded and famous bunch of musicians. Ontario's Sister Someone is one of those bands. Power-pop melodies and catchy guitar hooks are the key elements to



this group's attractive sound. Melissa Ogden who is also the principal lyricist -- fleshes out the Sister Someone sound with her talented and diverse vocals; she pounds out angst with Scared To Lose and Necessary Pain and at the same time reaches a poignant pitch with All I Ever Wanted. This marks the band's first release as they perform headline and support gigs around Ontario in an effort to get their sound out and make a name for themselves. CHARLIE HUNTER QUARTET - Jazz Natty Dread Blue Note Cover Series-52420-F

The thing to keep in mind when listening to this is that you're hearing a jazz cover of Bob Marley and the Wailer's reggae work. It's not an attempted reconstruction or even a salute per se. It's a cover. Accept it as such and you'll muchly enjoy some fine jazz. To be sure, the influence of Marley is pervasive, at least for those who knew and remember his work. But the album belongs to guitarist Charlie Hunter and his inventive work with Calder Spanier (alto sax), Kenny Brooks (tenor sax) and Scott Amendola on drums. As proof of that inventiveness, we commend Rebel Music (3 O'Clock Road Block). You think you're hearing an organ played a la Horace Silver inspired Big John Patton. What you're actually hearing is Hunter on guitar run through a Leslie speaker. It's cleverly artistic and artistically clever. For sheer auditory pleasure though, our especial favourite is the title track with its Afro-Cuban flavour. Fantasy is self indulgent but it's pleasant to think that somewhere in the musical ether Bob Marley is also listening. and enjoying.

CINDY CHURCH Self-titled

Stony Plain-1235-P

One thing you can be sure with this Albertan is her comfort zone whether it be traditional or contemporary. This co-production by Miles Wilkinson and Nathan Tinkham leans more toward contemporary, and Church has picked out some pretty good Canadian and Nashville writers to make her feel at home. However, a Church original, My Baby, has heen taken as the first single, and there's some pretty good guitar pickin' by producer Tinkham and Darrell Scott, who also doubles on mandolin. Also includes Bitter Pride, a penning by Sylvia Tyson and What Does She See, a duet with Ian Tyson, who also wrote the song. Also key is the Tinkham, Billy Cowsill penning of Only Time Can Cure, but don't overlook Whispering Pines, written by

Howard Hausey and the Roger Ferris penning of What We Almost Had. Great stuff, but it's Church's persuasive vocal threading that weaves the final touch. Church belongs up with the winners, and this release could take her there.

LAURA SMITH It's A Personal Thing Universal-81033-J

Smith made an impact with the release of her two previous albums. But with the release of her debut for the Universal label, there is a change, however slight in her vocal direction that labels this album as tactfully different, certainly not an adjunct to her previous releases. Smith builds her song material with an articulate free form that flows with gentleness. That vocal expression brings the listener into her own personal world, making the title appropros. The stunner here is Armistice Day, with music



by guitarist George Antoniak and words by Smith. The simple instrumentation here by Lisa MacDougall on accordion, Jamie Gati on acoustic upright bass and Antoniak on nylon string bass, adds just the right ingredient to create an aura of idyllic reverence. The poppy title track, taken as the first single, has already gained favour with A/C programmers. And then there's the gospel flavoured Tell The Truth with harmony vocals by Chris Corrigan and Moyenda Ambakisye and organist Bill McCauley adding the necessary legitimacy. Also key is the pristine production of Yes Harm done with Smith on acoustic quitar and Chris Corrigan on electric guitar, but don't overlook For Better Or For Worse, Could be a leftfielder. Produced by Smith and David Hiller and recorded on location in Hubbards, Nova Scotia. -WG

BOBBY CURTOLA - Rock 'n Roll Turn The Radio Up Rock 'n Roll Network-10301

Canada's first bobby-sox idol captured an incredible following and a fan club numbering more than 100,000 beginning in



1960. His singles and albums hit gold many years before his Canadian counterparts. He has released 23 albums over his career, and all are still active. He was the first Canadian artist to be showcased on Dick Clark's American Bandstand as "Curtolamania" took hold. He was inducted into the RPM Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame this year and is expected to receive a similar Juno honour. Producers Robert Hubbard and Curtola lined up some of the best pickers on Canada's west coast for this album, which was recorded at Vancouver's Bullfrog Studios. They include Peter Reveen (lead rock guitar), Steve Hilliam (saxes), Danny Casavant (lead guitar) Jerry Adolph (drums), Colin Wiebe (piano), Lee Oliphant (bass), David Sinclair (guitar), Jim Woodyard (acoustic guitar), Mike Sanyshyn (fiddle), and Jim Dorin (steel). Heartbreak Radio, features steel by Charlie Hase and bass by Al Rempel, Awesome versions of Dream Lover, Queen Of The Hop, Take Good Care Of My Baby, Rockin' Pneumonia (and the Boogie Woogie Flu), and his own lyrics on Detroit Diesel. VARIOUS ARTISTS - Gospel Peace In The Valley Arista-99214-N

Sub-titled A Country Music Journey Through Gospel, some of country music's biggest names add that contemporary feel to wellknown gospel works, as well as classic contemporary songs written by Curtis Mayfield, Kris Kristofferson, Bobby Braddock and Hank Williams Sr. All tracks are key. Includes a mind satisfying version of People Get Ready by Michelle Wright and Morning Has Broken by Pam Tillis, and a suave Honky-Tonker version of We're All God's Children by Alan Jackson. Newcomers, BR5-49 put on their best bib and tucker for their House Of Gold, But don't Overlook Brooks & Dunn's I Ain't Singin' That Song No More and the off-the-wall touch that Brett James gives to one of the most treasured of traditional hymns, What A Friend We Have In Jesus. It's a given that gospel music has a huge audience. With this powerhouse of country stars adding their own initiative, this one could be a barnburner. Should be frontracked and a priority for in-store play. Jimmy Scherer takes executive producer credits.

GREGG LAWLESS Greggorian Chance Grafton Music-0607

Classifying or labelling music by type is necessary for archival purposes but sometimes confounding for a reviewer. Speaking personally, there are only two kinds of music; classical and non-classical a.k.a. popular. The latter is all that's necessary to label Greggorian Chance. Borrowing unabashedly from the accompanying notes one can truthfully state that this is a "diverse collection of original songs". Some of the 16 tracks are Celtic-flavoured, some are bluesy,

a couple are funky. The band plays all over the landscape of popular taste. Mr. Lawless sings and plays a variety of instruments; all of the musicians double and even triple on instrumentation. The resultant sound is somewhere between that of an excellent contemporary bar band and the Hoosier Hot Shots with a hint of Klezmer for good measure. Best cuts? For us, they're the funky ones, Joe's Truck and Georgie -- that Georgie On My Mind. The latter is reminiscent of Winchester Cathedral and features only G.L. on lead vox and quitar with John Sheard on piano. With devent airplay, it could be a huge success. Certainly it deserves to be.

WHEELER, KONITZ HOLLAND, FRISELL Angel Song ECM/BMG-21607-N

Assemble Kenny Wheeler (trumpet, flugelhorn), Lee Konitz (alto sax), Dave Holland (double bass), and Bill Frisell (electric guitar) in a recording studio, have them perform original compositions of Kenny Wheeler, and one would expect musical perfection, and that's what one gets on Angel Song. After listening to it however, the question is begged whether it's satisfying. We suggest there will be no neutral ground of appreciation. Musicians will rate it cool to Nth: non-musicians will regard it at turgid to the tenth because there's a certain sameness about the compositions that eventually cloys. Yes, on recognizes that one is hearing sustained excellence and appreciates it, but as is so often the case, appreciation doesn't always equate with enjoyment. This reviewer must, in honesty, confess that he didn't especially enjoy Angel Song. But, and make no mistake about this, we were very much aware of the artistry offered. Prospective buyers must make their own determination.

JOEL COHEN - Other Worldly with TOD MACHOVER Angels: Voices from Eternity Erato/Warner Music-214773-P

The beatniks of Haight Ashbury and Yorkville in the '60s loved Christmas because of the opportunity to sing Angels We Have Heard On High with no fear of being busted. One wonders if any of them have survived and, if so, what they'd think of this album now that angels are commercially hot. It's an ambitious work intended to provide an abbreviated tour of the angel realms as a musical fantasy. Performed by the Boston Camerata, the Harvard University Choir and Youth Pro Musica, there's a power about it that's surprisingly robust. We use the word, surprisingly, because one has the conceived notion that angels are gentle and well . ethereal. Here they are presented as higher reflections of the human psyche with all of its virtues and none of its faults. Indeed, it's lifelike and quite literal to its intention. We mean no disparagement in passing along the comment of someone who overheard the album on our first hearing without headphones. Of track 13 she said "What in Hell is that?" The title of the track is The Hosts Of Hell. On 32 tracks divided into nine parts one thrillingly experiences Angel Of Light, Cherubim & Seraphim, Heavenly Hosts, The Archangel Michael, The War In Heaven, Declarations of the Mighty Angels, The Angel Of Death, The Consoling Angel and Paradise. All who appreciate fine music well performed, will respond to it. -BW

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
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Veteran rockers a little too tenacious to surrender

Cheap Trick fast forwards into 1997

During the '70s, strains of I Want You To Want Me, Surrender and the Dream Police could be heard pounding from just about every radio and 8-track. In 1997, the four original members of Cheap Trick -- Robin Zander, Tom Petersson, Rick Nielsen and Bun E. Carlos -- are doing things



on a much smaller scale than in the Live At Budokan days and they seem perfectly content doing so.

"We hope to headline tour eventually," says Carlos, "the better the record does, the sooner (we will)."

Recently, club dates and smaller theatre venues have given way to the hour-long opening slot on the current Stone Temple Pilots tour -- a billing that is sure to draw an interesting cross-section of fans. This, along with a recent taping of VH1's Live At The Hard Rock and a Steve Albiniproduced 7-inch on Sub Pop Records is just some of the fuel being pumped into a machine that was kickstarted

back into motion last year with the release of a four-CD boxed set Sex, America, Cheap Trick.

A change in management and record companies -- from Epic to Red Ant Records, an independent on which the band has their own imprint -- seems to have had a positive effect on the sound created on the newest, self-titled, release due out April 29. Instead of the newer, revamped-for-thenineties sound that many veteran artists have attempted, Cheap Trick, the band's 12th studio album, throws back to the classic sound that made the band a household name during its heyday. And it wasn't entirely accidental.

"We recorded in analogue instead of digital, which is how we recorded the last three albums," explains Carlos.

He adds that a warmer sound was achieved by dispensing of the keyboard players the band had been using.

"We stopped using our road keyboard player about a year and a half ago," he furthers, adding that guitarist Rick Nielsen takes over keyboard responsibilities on a few songs during live performances.

Advance preparation seems to have played quite a role in the sound achieved on this record as well. Carlos says that instead of writing while already in the studio, as was done on several previous albums, the band had everything set and ready to go before recording actually began.

"This time we basically had most of the stuff ready. I think that all had something to do with (the sound)."

In addition to exposure from a recent collaboration with Motley Crue ("We've known those guys since, like, they were just growing hair on their faces," says Carlos) and the release of Cheap Shots, a tribute album (with contributions from Everclear and Joey Ramone earning high points with Carlos), a first single from the

forthcoming album, Say Goodbye, has been a quick add at radio and is working it's way up the charts (#50 this week on RPM's Hits 100)in a way that could very well mark a strong revival for the band.

Plans for the current tour take Cheap Trick all over the States and should bring the band to Canada by early summer before heading to Europe, Japan and Australia.

"If not with (Stone Temple Pilots) then I'm sure we'll be booking something," says Carlos.

And she adds that those not already familiar

Festivities began with an industry kick-off

Virgin's Leahy launches first national tour

Leahy (pronounced Lay-nee), the nine-piece family phenomenon from Lakefield, Ontario, will set out on its first coast-to-coast tour, beginning at A.J.'s Hangar in Kingston on April 25.

Recently signed to the Virgin label (RPM - March 10/97), the band's self-titled debut album has step-danced its way into retail prominence since its release last month. Ironically, the first single from the album, The Call To Dance, has yet to go to radio, which is expected to fuel even more consumer interest.

Featured at the opening of Blockbuster's new Toronto mega-store (RPM - March 17/97), Leahy literally "blew away" the mainly video/record industry audience with their high-energy performance.

Following their Kingston date, Leahy moves on to Thunder Bay's Community Auditorium (29) where a second show has already been added, and then it's off to the west and Winnipeg's West End Cultural Centre (May 1), Louis Pub in Saskatoon (2), Regina's Blarney Stone (3), Kelowna's Flashbacks (7), Legends in Victoria (8), Vancouver's Roxy (9) and Starfish Room (10), Cowboys in Calgary (12), Fort McMurray (13), and Edmonton (14), and back east to Peterborough's Showplace (17), Wingham's Town

Hall Theatre (21), followed by three days in Chicago at the Gaelic Park Irish Festival (23-24-25). The band returns to Canada to take the month of May out at the Split Crow in Halifax (29), and two days in Charlottetown for the opening of the Confederation Bridge (30-31) with an evening performance at Myrons on the 31st.

Firmed dates for June include Cobourg's Victoria Park (June 7), the Peter Gzowski Red Barn Tournament in Muskoka (9) and that same date at the COCA National Convention Showcase in London, Montreal's Grand Prix Event (12), Aylmer's 150th Anniversary (13), Huntsville's Algonquin Banquet Hall (27), and Windsor's Freedom Festival.

July dates include Canada Day (July 1) at Toronto's Harbourfront, two days at the Winnipeg Folk Festival (11-12), and Edmonton's Klondike Days (20).

The band returns to Toronto in August for a concert in Nathan Phillips Square (Aug. 7), followed by the Gage Park Festival of Friends in Hamilton (8), the Fergus Scottish Festival (9), the Southfield Centre for the Arts in Southfield, Michigan (10), North York's Mel Lastman Square, the Owen Sound Summerfolk (16-17) and an evening performing at the Huron County Playhouse in Grand Bend. A date in Rollo Bay, Prince Edward Island (23) takes the month out.

Other notable upcoming dates include the Fort Henry Celtic Festival in Kingston (Sept. 6), the National Gallery in Ottawa (Oct. 3), and Toronto's Roy Thomson Hall in December.

The Leahys studied their craft, described as "the most energetic, disciplined and difficult free form of step dancing," under the tutelage of Ottawa's legendary Gilles Roy, a pupil of Donny Gilchrist, who is regarded as "the father" of this passionate discipline. This predominantly French-Canadian style of step dancing was born in the lumber camps of Canada's early days and is regarded as "pure in form and different from any other in the world."

Celtic fiddler McMaster captivates Vancouver Island

Cape Breton fiddler Natalie MacMaster brought her own distinctive brand of Celtic charm to Vancouver Island where she played to a SRO audience at the Cowichan Theatre in Duncan B.C. (March 22).

Appearing with MacMaster, who won three awards at this year's East Coast Music Awards (Female Artist, Roots Traditional Artist and Instrumental Artist) was Bruce Guthro, who won the ECMA SOCAN Songwriter Award (RPM - Feb. 24/97).

Taking in the concert was well-known broadcaster Dick Drew, whose series The Canadian

Achievers is syndicated across Canada and has given rise to comments in the House of Commons for its importance in bringing attention to Canadians and their achievements. Drew interviewed both MacMaster and Guthro, each of whom will be featured on Canadian Achievers episodes, May 13 and May 14 respectively.





by BMG. That's Tony Vanderburgh doing the country guitar pickin' on the session with Marc Beaulieu on keys. Voisine is no stranger to country music. Several of his past releases gained heavy spins on country radio.

CKDM's Bruce Leperre and the station's commitment to Cancon goes without saying. The CRTC has recognized that the Dauphin, Manitoba station continues to go that extra mile when it comes to supporting Canadian recordings. The CRTC had to be reminded through the station's Canadian content documentation that certain Cancon selections were excluded from the station's content analysis the week of Feb. 25 to March 2 last year. Based on the information received from Leperre, the CRTC revised the figures for the week of Feb. 25 to March 2, 1996 to indicate that out of a total of 1030 Category 2 selections, 419 or 40.8% qualified as Canadian. CKDM's Country Top Twenty for April 25 lists seven Cancon singles. Mila Mason's Dark Horse is #1, Sean Hogan's Slow Turning #4, George Fox's I Give You My Word #8, Rick Tippe's You're All I Need #10, 100 Bucks by The Mahones #13, Duane Steele's Two Names On An Overpass #19, and Beverly Mahood's Girl Out Of The Ordinary #20.

Eli Barsi makes a bid for the charts with the release of Honky Tonk Lights, the second single from her independently-released Unmarked Trail CD which was produced by Barsi and John Binet. The song was written by Canadian songwriter ElizaBeth Hill and Nashville writer Robin Ruddy and qualifies as three parts Cancon (MAP). Originally from southeastern Saskatchewan, the daughter of a farmer, Barsi now lives in Stony Plain, Alberta. Her first single, When The Coyote Howls, was released on the Westwood International Nashville Showcase Vol. II. Barsi and her band is out on the road in western Canada promoting the album and new single at radio stations, club dates, pro rodeos, fairs and other venues.

Country Music Week on the road again

The first Canadian Country Music Week was hosted by Ottawa in 1977 in conjunction with the Big Country Awards. With the advent of The Canadian Country Music Awards, the CCMA retained this connection and in recent years when the awards alternated between Calgary and Hamilton these cities hosted the event.

The CCMA has now revealed that the awards show will originate from Ottawa in 1999 and Edmonton in the year 2000, with these cities hosting Canadian Country Music Week.

Tom Tompkins, president of the CCMA, stressed that holding the event alternately in the eastern and western regions of Canada was a policy that would be continued and one that was endorsed by the organization's members. "We have had wonderful support in both Hamilton and Calgary; we know that we will get the same kind of committed, enthusiastic support in Ottawa and Edmonton when we go to those cities."

In 2001, the awards show and Canadian Country Music Week will return to Hamilton to mark the 25th anniversary of the CCMA, and in 2002 Calgary will once again be the designated city.

Monty Steele's ongoing self-promotion of Indian Woman has taken a new direction. He received news that Kiran Bhoday of Toronto campus radio station CIUT, had playlisted the single. He has now shipped Indian Woman to 54 campus stations across Canada. CHAK Inuvik in the Western Arctic, is also interested in the single. It was reported here on March 24/97 that Steele had connected with The Drake Collier Show, a highly-rated talk show on Seattle's KIRO which boasts more than 700,000 listeners. Collier had promised Steele that he would air his single. Just last week, a trucker friend of Steele's was driving south to Seattle and sure enough. Collier did in fact air Indian Woman. The single continues to pick up country stations and moves up to #72 this week on the RPM Country 100. Steele can be contacted in Dawson Creek at 250-784-8855.



Currently making headway with distribution in the US through Allegro and select gift market distributors and in Europe with Aquarius, Michaels is confident that the tide will turn at home once programmers wake up to the new music.

"I think people are hungry for this type of music and they want to hear it on the radio," he says. "If radio is trying to cater to the masses, there's got to be a point where something's got to give."
