COMMISSION ATTACKS NEW STATION PROBLEM

PACED with hundreds of applications for new broadcasting stations and for modification of existing station licenses, the Federal Radio Commission this month began a series of hearings which are expected to take it well into the winter in an effort to dispose of the demands for additional facilities which have piled up during the past summer.

Every effort will be made to dispose of the accumulation of applications with the least possible delay, both in order that the broadcasting allocations may become "set" and that, should Congress fail to renew the life of the commission before December 31, there may be little business held over to harass any control body which may succeed it.

Control Problem Soon to Come Up

With the return of the House of Representatives to Washington this month, agitation for final settlement of the perplexing question of radio control is expected to begin. Three factions will enter into the fight this winter, one desiring continuance of the radio commission, a second urging the adoption of Senator Couzens' plan for a centralized communications control commission and a third favoring return of full control to the Department of Commerce.

As the matter now stands, the radio commission is due to pass out of existence December 31. Unless its life is prolonged or provision made for a body to succeed it, control of radio automatically reverts to the Department of Commerce, in which it was originally vested. There is, however, a strong


probability that Congress will confer a short additional lease of life upon the commission, with a view to enacting the Couzens bill for a Federal communications commission, which its author has announced he will press during the regular session which begins in December.

Commission Ignores Uncertainty


Meanwhile, despite the uncertainty which shrouds its future, the radio commission is proceeding with the disposition of the applications which have been left to accumulate during the summer, while the commissioners were engaged in tours of their respective zones with a view to securing first-hand information as to conditions and the need, if any, for additional facilities.

In order to dispose of these applications with a minimum of delay, the commission has announced that hearings will be held only on demand of the applicants, and that where the applicant fails to signify that a formal hearing is desired will pass upon applications on the basis of such information and recommendations as may be made by its engineering staff.

Where hearings are held, it has been announced, all interested parties, including even broadcasters not notified, will be permitted to present testimony for or against applications, while affidavits from parties who feel their interests may be affected also will be considered. In this way the commission hopes to acquire a true picture of the situation for its guidance in making decisions as to whether the granting of applications will be in the public interest or not.

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MICROPHONE GOSSIP

Pacific Coast radio enthusiasts will hear their favorite NBC transcontinental broadcasts an hour later beginning September 29, with the return in New York to Eastern standard time. Entertainments produced in New York and Chicago studios have been released through the coast-to-coast network on eastern and central daylight saving time during the summer.

A substantial number of changes are made necessary in the time for programs produced in the NBC San Francisco studios as a result of the change in the East. The first notable difference occurs September 29 with the Sunday afternoon concert played from 2:30 until 3:30 and between 4 and 5 o'clock in-

stead of 1:30 and 3 o'clock.

KGW musicians and announcers appeared last week in uniforms. Natty jackets with blue stripes for the artists and nifty verdant green ones for the announcers (no insult intended to the latter).

Merle Matthews, continuity writer on KFRC, broke into radio in this fashion. An ardent radio fan, she felt that the quality of the programs might be improved upon. And so, when she heard, over the air, details of a continuity writing contest, she decided to compete. She won the weekly \$50 prize, and in addition the grand prize of \$500 at the end of the contest. Since then she has been devoting all of her time to building radio programs.

The Winthrop Hotel, in Tacoma, on whose roof the studios of KMO are located, is opening the roof garden ballroom this week with music by Bill Winder's band. This is to be broadcast twice a week.

Gordon Brown, formerly of KJBS, is the latest to join the staff of KDB, Santa Barbara, taking charge of their transmitter. Stephen Hobart, formerly assistant general manager of KTAB, is with KDB in the same capacity.

Bert Butterworth's untamed Gilmore Lion Tamers now run wild at KFWB every Thursday night, 8:30 to 9 o'clock. This is a legitimate offspring of the Lion Tamers' programs so long a KNX feature.

So popular did the KHQ Melody Boys prove to be at the recent radio show in Spokane that they are now appearing during the dance program at the Davenport Hotel in addition to their radio appearances. The boys are Mel Dunne, accordion, and Leo Catalano, banjo, sax and clarinet. Until recently, the boys were ABC entertainers from San Francisco.

Josephine Bartlett, who is known to the NBC audience as Helen Webster, was recently a speaker at the meeting of the San Francisco Business and Professional Women's Clubs. Miss Bartlett's talk revolved about "Broadcasting as a Profession for Women." Barbara Blanchard, NBC soprano, sang during the meeting, which took the form of a luncheon in the Women's City Club.

Another legitimate stage star has turned to radio with the addition to the NBC National Players of Stewart Wilson, former leading man for Henry Duffy, West Coast producer.

Abe Bloom's sobriquet, "The Joy Boy of KFRC," is no publicity gesture. Abe has earned it. He is one of those chaps who is always getting a great "kick" out of life. "Sing and the World Sings With You, Cry and You Cry Alone," is my motto, says Abe.

Sid Goodwin, KGW's chief announcer, doesn't find life a bed of roses, but he is assured of living the remainder of his life "pretty soft." One of his admirers has sent him the second embroidered sofa pillow in two months. Sid sits on it when he announces.

Walt and Winn, popular harmony team of KHQ, now known as the Cambern Dutch Doughboys, tried out a few special arrangements over the air the other evening. Now nearly 75 per cent of the requests which are telephoned and written to them are designated as "special arrangements." The boys are rehearsing several hours daily for their half hour program which is heard each evening except Sunday from the Spokane station.

Three evenings of perfect rhythm was the treat given KMO fans recently when Vic Meyers and his band played their farewell radio appearance on the Pacific Coast from the dance pavilion at The Oaks, Steilacoom Lake, just outside of Tacoma.

Dell Raymond, KJBS "Double-Voiced Singer," and her group of entertainers, have just completed a series of shows which were presented at Letterman General Hospital, the U. S. Disciplinary Barracks on Alcatraz Island and the U. S. Veterans' Hospital at Palo Alto.

KDB, Santa Barbara, operating on 1500 kilocycles, is on the air daily from 11 a.m. until 11 p.m., or later. Charlie Meighan, well-known San Franciscan, formerly managing director of KTAB, is directing the new KDB, whose studios recently had the distinction of being the first to originate a broadcast of a city celebration over a transcontinental network. The KDB program for Old Spanish Days went out over the NBC nation-wide network and was one of the most distinctive programs to leave the West Coast.

Eva Gruninger Atkinson, NBC contralto, is singing this season with the San Francisco Opera Company, which presents a group of grand operas during the ensuing three weeks. Miss Atkinson's first role was Maddalena in the opening performance of "Rigoletto."

KHQ listeners will soon be enjoying a series of dramatic episodes weekly. The production will be under Jean Paul King's direction, who handled this work for the San Francisco studios of the NBC for many months. Auditions are being held in the studios and many new effects, never before heard on the air, are being tried out. No one author is being chosen to write the dramas as the character is to change from week to week, a melodrama one week, a love story the next. Several members of the KHQ staff will be used and the programs are to have musical background.

John Eugene Hasty, who has written many of the "hit" continuity programs for KFRC, is now engaged in writing a series of biographical programs about living composers. It's a tough proposition, says Jack, to find out anything about the lives of composers who are still living. There is plenty of material about the "dead" ones, but not much about the "live" ones.

Two additions have recently been made to the commercial staff of KJBS, according to Ralph R. Brunton, general manager of that station.

The new members are Edward J. Ludes and James A. Fessenden. Lude's recent association with KJBS marks his return to that station after an absence of nearly three years, during which time he has acted in the

capacity of chief announcer on another local station,

Fessenden brings to KJBS a wealth of experience in the field of commercial broadcasting, with which he has had close contact for many years.

A substantial number of new artists have been added to the headliners billed each week at the San Francisco studios of NBC. The new singers and actors have been signed to insure diversified entertainment during many new programs scheduled to go on the air this fall.

In the September 15 to 21 issue of Broadcast Weekly the statement appeared "that Arthur Friedheim was the only surviving pupil of Franz Liszt." We have received a correction on this and are pleased to announce that San Francisco has a living pupil of that great musician in the person of Hugo Mansfeldt. Mr. Mansfeldt is even now one of the Pacific Coast's noted educators in music.

Carl Hayworth, the singing banjoist of KHQ, reports the following happening to brighten his life.

During the day, Carl is an oriental rug salesman at a local Spokane firm. The other day a lady dropped in to look at some rugs. During the course of the sales talk the lady was heard to remark:

"My, your voice sounds familiar. Aren't you a radio announcer?"

Carl explained that he was heard from KHQ, whereupon the talk changed from

rugs to radio.

MYSTERIES OF RADIO

No. 8---RADIO BARRIERS

STRAIGHT line is the shortest distance between two points. Euclid couldn't prove it when he wrote his geometry, so he called it an axiom and said it had to be true. Einstein agreed with him except that he said his straight line must be a part of a curved one. Neither of them, however, were talking radio.

When a radio signal travels a straight course it is an exception rather than a rule. Los Angeles broadcast signals arrive at San Francisco from two different directions, and for no apparent reason. Ever since the days of the super-heterodyne receivers with their loop antennae it has been noticed that KFI signals come in from almost due south, while KNX reached its loudest when the loop was swung nearly 70 degrees east of the maximum KFI setting. Supposedly the KNX signals were deflected differently and reached San Francisco either via the San Joaquin valley, following the course of the river, or else they were deflected westward and followed the coast line.

Since the inception of radio broadcasting, "dead spots" have become a more or less familiar phenomenon. Some of these are very local, others of much greater extent. There are spots in Yosemite Valley where radio reception is almost impossible. No signals seem to arrive there, and even supersensitive receivers will pick up very little. Other parts of the valley are fairly alive with signals, seeming to get the energy that is missing from the other locations. Probably local iron or other mineral deposits are re-

sponsible.

Radio distance reception in general seems to be limited by much larger barriers of this same character. On "good nights" one or more of the barriers will lift, letting through signals from stations which are usually not heard. Canadian stations are heard with difficulty in most parts of the Uinted States. They do not come through with the volume that they should if judged solely by their distance, and United States stations from much greater distances are received more clearly. New England is as exclusive in radio as it is socially, and radio signals from its broadcast stations rarely penetrate far beyond its borders. Yet, occasionally the curtain will lift and WBZ, Sprignfield, Mass., will be reported heard in California.

The ships on the San Francisco to New York run pass through areas where radio

reception is very changeable and a radio operator on this run has to know his radio geography in order to get his messages through on schedule. Starting south from here, it is comparatively easy to work San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego stations for the first 1500 miles. Soon after San Diego is passed, signals from Florida and the Gulf of Mexico and even from New York are picked up, and ships in this area frequently along their hydrogen with Fact Coast. quently clear their business with East Coast stations in preference to those on the Pacific Coast. Down by Acapulco things begin to happen. One day's run is sufficient to take a ship from an area where communication with San Francisco is easy to one where it is next to impossible, and from there south most of the messages are handled directly with New York. Passing through the Panama Canal and up the East Coast, there is a spot in the Caribbean Sea where West Coast signals again come through, and near Cuba communication with either Coast is easy. As soon as the ship passes the tip of Florida it is good-bye to the West Coast until the return trip.

About 300 miles north of Vancouver there is a sharply defined radio curtain. Signals from Point Estevan (VAE) can be heard all over the Pacific and particularly down this way. Sitka, Alaska, only a few hundred miles further north, is rarely heard in Central California. Other Alaskan stations that are in constant communication with transpacific ships cannot seem to penetrate to Los Angeles and San Francisco. The cause of this barrier is not known, but it must be some local obstruction in Northern Canada and Alaska, because Japanese signals, which come from practically the same direction, are

easy to get.

In receiving Australian and New Zealand broadcasting, a factor is involved which is not present in East to West reception. Except in March and September, Australian and New Zealand signals travel from summer to winter or from winter to summer when we hear them. Receiving conditions seem to be more important than those at the transmitting end, and these stations can be heard about eight months in the year, although around September and March seems to be the best time to get them.

The constant change in radio conditions is one of the fascinations that is responsible

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TOMMY MUNROE and BOB ALLEN

ASK Bob Allen about Tommy Monroe's singing and he will tell you that he has been doing accompanying for fifteen years and never found anyone, who has been so easy to accompany. He sings everything in a different manner than anyone else, says Bob, bringing out things in the songs the composer had in his heart but couldn't get on paper.

Ask Tommy Monroe about Bob Allen and he will tell you

and he will tell you that he has never been accompanied by anyone who has been so easy to work with. He plays everything differently, says Tommy, making his own arrangements. And adds that he features the bass, instead of the treble, as is usual.

We would gather from this, then, that Tommy Monroe and Bob Allen are a little

more than a singer and an accompanist. Their work joins so sympathetically neither would be the same were he forced to find another partner.

Although they have only been a team for ten months, Tommy Monroe has been a staff artist on KPO for two years and Bob Allen for nearly three. One day they just happened to get together, and together they have remained ever since.

Tommy's home town is Atlanta, Georgia, which city he still loves, even if he did leave it to its own devices at the age of eighteen when he left with Al G. Field's Minstrels to remain with them for two seasons. It was a happy lad who traveled about the country, coaxing laughs out of audiences with his black-face songs and patter. Later, he found a part in the Shogun, then in various musical comedies and in vaudeville over the Keith circuits. The black-face act has always been his specialty. On KPO he is the Lem half of the Lem and Lafe team.

Tommy's first broadcasting was over WEAF as a black-face comedian. It was very disconcerting; he felt like he was talking to himself. At first radio merely meant publicity. Then it began to be lucrative; and offered steady work without the inconvenience of traveling around the country—that is without anything except his voice travel-

ing around the country. After a four months' cross-country tour of radio stations he ended up in Long Beach. That must have been four or five years ago, because he was singing over KFRC during its Whitcomb. Hotel days. He also worked over KGW, Portland, before coming to KPO in 1927.

Bob Allen was born in Staples, Minnesota. (Yes, we might call them the Swede-Dixie duo.) He was raised in Spokane, Washing-

ton, and has never made his living in any other way than on the organ and piano. He began studying at the age of 8, and at twice 8, 16 years, he was earning 8 dollars weekly playing 8 hours daily illustrating the "Perils of Pauline," the "Clutching Hand" and other thrillers of the time at the Cinegraph Theatre, Spokane.

A boyhood chum of the time was Jesse Crawford, and it was their practice to listen avidly to all visiting organists for new ideas. Jesse Crawford, says Bob, although he never had a lesson in his life, was just naturally designed to be an organist and to burst Roosevelt Dam across his path couldn't have stopped him. Both of them played together in Pacific Coast theatres for many years.


in Pacific Coast theatres for many years.

Bob had his first band while attending Washington State College at Pullman. He was an accompanist in vaudeville for a time, but most of his work, until he joined KPO, his first and only station, has been as theatre organist. He did, it is true, accompany Maurice Gunsky for a single broadcast over KHQ, Spokane, his first time on the air. He likes radio work very much. He also teaches piano.

Outside of their music it is difficult to find similarities in these two boys. They are both genuinely fond of jazz and the popular song writers like Berlin and Donaldson. Tommy is 28 and unmarried; Bob is 37, and married. Tommy likes fried chicken and chocolate cake; Bob goes in for chese sandwiches and beer. Tommy says he likes people who can say "Howdy" and mean it; Bob would have his friends "straightforward." When it comes to read-

The Postal Department of the Australian Federal Government has instituted a campaign against unlicensed broadcast listeners, and up to the present has obtained 1707 convictions within the Commonwealth, according to reports to the Department of Commerce. New South Wales had the greatest number of convictions, 804. Total convictions amounted to \$15,168 and cost to \$6420.

American engineers have arrived in Peru and commenced work on the erection of a radiotelegraph station in the suburbs of Lima, which is scheduled for completion before December 1, according to a report to Washington from Consul George A. Makinson. Authorization for the installation of radio-telephone and telegraph stations for both national and international communications was granted some time ago. It is expected that the radio station will be used principally for press and less urgent messages while the company's three submarine cables will continue to handle the bulk of the full rate commercial traffic.



"But you know," he concludes. "It's like a show. You work awfully hard before the opening night and then that night you have a ripping time and you're ready to do it all over again."

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




