WORKERS ON THE MOVE

What makes workers leave their own countries to work in various parts of western Europe? During the past few years there has been a vast migration of workers into France, West Germany and Britain. They come from countries as far apart as Portugal and Turkey, Yugoslavia and Pakistan. How do they get on in their new countries with a strange language in such matters as housing and schooling? CHINA NOW

THE OPEN UNIVERSITY

A unique educational experiment—the Open University—began in Britain a year ago. This institution, which has been called 'The university of the second chance', is designed to enable people of all ages and backgrounds to study for a degree in their spare time and in their own homes, using BBC television and radio channels as well as traditional correspondence courses. The Open University has 24,000 students, their ages ranging from 21 to 60. SECOND LOOK AT STRATFORD

In this, the fortieth year of the Royal Shakespeare company, and the week of the playwright's birthday, World Service takes a look at the town, its industries, tourism, geographical surroundings and historical connections. You can hear the voices of leading characters and the ordinary townsfolk. Also represented will be the National Trust, who contribute considerably to the upkeep of the town and its area. 24th 0230 rep 25th 1130, 26th 1615. Also celebrating the occasion will be a production of The Tempest in Theatre of the Air.

TOMORROW'S PEOPLE

Jenny Agutter, hailed as an outstanding film actress though still in her teens, discusses her work and her world 1st. Ros Kane, 25-year-old former social worker, is one of the organisers of a pressure group called Radical Alternatives to Prison. She talks about social reform and the aims of her group 8th. Three years ago Tony Elliott, then aged 22, founded Time Out—'the Living Guide to London'. He explains the magazine's success when more established ones are struggling 15th. Sandy Denny, folk and rock singer, formerly of the Fairport Convention group, has been called 'the oddest and most important lady in the British music business'. PRISONER AT THE BAR

Lawyer-broadcaster Edgar Lustgarten continues his reconstructions of famous English murder trials as seen through the eyes of the accused in the dock.

The Chalk Pit Murder: In 1946 Thomas Ley, 66-year-old former Minister of justice in New South Wales, exmember of the Australian parliament, stands accused with a man named Smith of the murder of a London barman. His defence seems very slender—but the strange conclusion of the case established a legal principle. 3rd 0945 rep 5th 1830, 6th 2315

The Moat Farm Case: The trial of S. H. Dougal, heard in 1899, hinged on the identification of a skeleton that had been buried in mud for nearly four years. The skull bore a bullet-hole. 10th 0945, rep 12th 1830, 13th 2315, 14th 1430

Return Ticket: In 1910 a wages clerk travelling by train was shot dead and robbed of £400. Circumstances pointed to a travelling companion, John Alexander Dickman. But was the evidence strong enough to convict? 17th 0945 rep 19th 1830, 20th 2315, 21st 1430

Lady Cook Wanted: Irene Wilkins, aged 32, answered an advertisement in a newspaper. In response to a telegram, apparently from her would-be employer, she travelled by train from London to Bournemouth and was never seen again—except briefly by a passenger on that train who proved a vital witness in the case against Thomas Henry Allaway. 24th 0945 rep 26th 1830, 27th 2315, 28th 1430

YOUR VERDICT

The tenth series brings another batch of John P. Wynn's fictitious characters involved with criminal proceedings which are enacted for a panel of ordinary people from all walks of life. Members of the panel are invited to give their personal opinions. 29th 1130 rep 2nd May 0230, 4th May 2045

World Theatre on ways of life

THE PILLARS OF SOCIETY

The publication of this play in 1877 marked a turning point in **Ibsen's** writing, away from romantic verse drama to realistic exploration of the society around him. The setting is a small Norwegian coastal town where the complacency of daily life is founded on deceit and stifling restrictions. The play introduced into European theatre a profound psychological insight, a new and exact form of colloquial dialogue, and distinct structure, all of which have influenced dramatic writing ever since. 2nd 1830 rep 4th 0030, 1515, 5th 0945

THE DAMASK CHEEK

In this play, by Americans John van Druten and Lloyd Morris, Rhoda, a quiet English girl, visits her aunt in New York. Jimmy is a cousin she has known and admired for years, but he is involved with a pretty actress. Rhoda, however, is not content to leave matters there—even when her cousin gets engaged. 9th 1830 rep 11th 0030, 1515, 12th 0945

MOON ON A RAINBOW SHAWL

A brawling, laughing, bitter sense of life courses through this play by West Indian Errol John, based on living in Port-of-Spain. People hunger for a slice of the big orange moon which shines only for some or in the Promised Land of England. John creates out of the lifting speech rhythms calypso, hymn tunes and street cries. 16th 1830 rep 18th 0030, 1515, 19th 0945

LOOK BACK IN ANGER

The first production of **John Osborne's** play in London in 1956 is still taken generally to be the most significant event in post-war British theatre. It heralded the rejection of younger playwrights of escapism as the staple diet of the stage and began a new trend towards social realism, mainly in lower class settings. Above all, Osborne's play was assumed to distil the dislilusionment of the generation that grew up in the aftermath of World War II, with no brave causes to sustain it. 23rd 1830 rep 25th 0030, 1515, 26th 0945

DAVID AND BROCCOLI

Playwright John Mortimer's 'Broccoli' is a Mr Smith, the Goliath boxing instructor at a private school for boys. His nickname comes from the cauliflower ear he acquired in professional battles long ago. David is one of the boys who hates Broccoli's boxing class. Like all schoolboys he seems powerless to alter the awful inevitability of a hated part of the school routine. But his Goliath turns out to have an unusual weakness—and David may be clever enough to exploit it. 30th 1830 rep May 2nd 0030, 1515, May 3rd 0945

LAUGHTER ON STAGE

A half-hour feature written and presented by critic and broadcast Gordon Gow, in which he looks at British and American comic writing for the stage, from Shakespeare to the present day. He will include recorded illustrations from famous productions. 17th 0230 rep 18th 1130, 19th 1615

THEATRE OF THE AIR

Patrick Hamilton's Victorian thriller Gaslight deals with a middle-class man whose wife appears to be going insane—but things are not always what they seem 1st. A respectable middle-aged lady (played by-Dame Flora Robson) is arrested for shoplifting in Lesley Storm's Black Chiffon 8th. To celebrate Shakespeare's birthday, World Service presents a two-part production of The Tempest, starring the late Alec Clunes 15th and 22nd. Air force pilots die because an American manufacturer sells faulty parts to his government in Arthur Miller's All My Sons. He allows his partner to be victimised—but the truth comes out 29th. AT YOUR SERVICE

Matinee Tomorrow by Derek Walker: A nightwatchman at a theatre talks to one of the actresses appearing there—but is she an actress or a ghost? 3rd. Martin by Deborah de Vere White: Father wants to help his son with his academic career, but is jealous of him. Examinations bring matters to a head 10th. The Illumination of Mr Shannon by Don Haworth. In this play starring Milo O'Shea, a young Irishman who has come to England in search of work is introduced to the realities of life by his uncle 17th. A Matter of Grave Importance by Michael Judge: An ingenious solution to a macabre problem—how to get rid of the lodger. Burning makes an unpleasant smell, so why not try burial 24th. Verdi's opera from Covent Garden

NABUCCO

BBC's Outside Broadcasts will be joining the audience at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, for the first act of Verdi's opera with an international cast of soloists including Elena Suliotis, Maria Pellegrini, Peter Glossop, David Ward and Ermanno Mauro, and conducted by Colin Davis. Nabucco (Nebuchadnezzar) was the first of Verdi's operas to achieve great success and establish him as one of Italy's leading composers. Though the setting is Babylon and Jerusalem, the subject of freedom became identified with political aspirations in preliberated Italy. The first act is full of passionate music, beginning with the lament of the priests and people of Jerusalem that they have been defeated by the King of Babylon. The action centres round the sacking of the Hebrews' temple. 1st 1830

ENGLISH CONCERT HALL

This month rounds off the series which in conjunction with Music in England explores different aspects of English music. The month begins with a look at musical education in England and the concert is given by an outstanding youth orchestra, the Leicester Schools Symphony Orchestra, under three composer-conductors-André Previn, Sir Arthur Bliss and Sir Michael Tippett 2nd. Influence of folk music on composers is dealt with the second week, including of course Vaughan Williams. A major work—Five Tudor Portraits—is performed 9th. Next is the English choral tradition. Included is a performance of Elgar's The Music Makers 16th. The series will end with a violin concerto by Gordon Crosse, one of the most promising young English composers of today. MUSICIANS OF ENGLAND

Julian Bream, internationally famous guitarist and lutanist, began his public career at the age of 12, and was encouraged by the great Segovia. The recital in this series includes a work by English composer Richard Rodney Bennett and was recorded at the Aldeburgh Festival 3rd. Peter Schidlof is the viola of the famous Amadeus String Quartet, and a soloist in his own right. He plays Brahms's Sonata in F minor with planist Ernest Lush 10th. When Cyril Smith suffered a stroke and lost the use of his left hand, it seemed as if his planist days were ended. However, he formed a piano duo with his wife, Phyllis Seilick, and by clever manipulation built up a repertoire of piano music for three hands. They play music by Schubert and Arnold Bax 17th. Allan Wicks, organist of Canterbury Cathedral, is one of England's leading organ-recitalists. Great Discoveries (see cover picture)

With the improvement in scientific dating techniques and photography, and the ease with which remote and formerly inaccessible places can now be reached, archaeology is appealing to a growing number of people. The series looks at four different sites:

The position of Homer's legendary Troy was not finally identified until 1868 when Heinrich Schliemann started digging on the coastal plain south of the Dardanelles in Turkey. In 20 years he uncovered nine cities, one on top of the other, dating from 3,000 BC to 400 AD 3rd.

In 1939 a burlal ship with a treasure of gold, silver and personal objects belonging to a 7th century Anglo-Saxon king was found at Sutton Hoo in Suffolk. It is the most important Anglo-Saxon discovery made in England 10th. At the same time that Schliemann was working in Turkey, Henri Mouhaut, a French naturalist came upon the richly carved stone temples and city of Angkor Wat in the jungle of what is now Cambodia. These exquisite buildings covering 200 square miles represent the skill of the Khmer people between the 9th and 15th centuries 17th.

On the other side of the world, and also reaching the peak of their power in the 15th century, were the incas, living in the mountainous area of modern Peru. They left buildings of astonishing complexity, the finest example being the temple complex at Machu Picchu near Cuzco. These

buildings were not rediscovered until 1911 by American Hiram Bingham 24th.






