



Watch the Bulletin for final announcements of the above tentative date for Windfall.


The rewriting of the constitution and by-laws is continuing, and a final draft will be ready for a vote by the membership at the next Valpo meeting this Fall.

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
## Men Who Have Made Radio

#### MOHAMMED ULLYSES FIPS


Of all the pioneers who contributed to the development of the radio art, perhaps none deserves greater recognition than M. Ullyses Fips. Fips' long and distinguished radio career began in 1908, and his name is today associated with many of the key radio patents (see the review of his collected works in this issue of the **Bulletin**). In spite of his many technical achievements, however, Fips was also a prolific writer and as staff reporter for **Radio-Craft Magazine** published a series of watershed papers on radio theory. While such greats as DeForest, Marconi and Armstrong were working at the edge of technology, Fips had clearly gone over it.

The culmination of Fips' career, though, was the development of the superhetero-ultradyne seven-tube vest pocket radio in 1933 for Westingmouse Radio and Mfg. Company. The circuit diagram for this set, which is shown on



the inside back cover, of this issue, clearly reveals its revolutionary nature. It was 20 years ahead of its time (indeed it was not matched until the advent of the Regency TR-1 transistor radio in the early 50's) and was the ultimate triumph of Fips' genius that assured his undying fame in radio history.

The remarkable small size of the set was made possible by an extraordinary new vacuum tube of Fips' design, the APR-1. This tube, with its cold filamentless cathode, was less than an inch high and took the radio world by storm. It is featured on our cover since today it is a prized find coveted by the few radio collectors who are aware of its existence. Although it is extremely difficult to find any of these tubes anymore, the author is fortunate to have several specimens in his collection representing all the major types that are thought to have been manufactured. The brass-based UV type was the first made but was quickly abandoned in favor of the more common bakelite based UX socket type. Western Electric brought out its own version, the APR 100-F, with the characteristic "baseball" type envelope. APR-1 tubes are largely unknown to most collectors since the superhetero-ultradyne was never mass-produced and no other application for the APR-1 tube was found.


Frank Heathcote won the blue ribbon in Category I with his original FADA Model 43 cathedral, FADA sign, and other supporting material.






#### GOSHEN HIGH SCHOOL RADIO CLUB 1923

Goshen High School was among the first high schools in the state to sponsor a radio club. The wireless station was licensed under the call letters of 9ACM in 1916, but the government order to dismantle it came when war was declared on Germany.

The radio club was not reorganized until the beginning of the school year in 1923 under the sponsorship of the Science teacher Mr. Welty. The club built its own receiving set and taught its members how to use it.

His "inventions" were always on the edge of reality and reasonableness, and the premise was written in such a convincing manner that the reader WANTED to believe it could actually work. Now as we look back at these well-illustrated articles, we begin to wonder. With the passage of time, many of these April 1 electronic jokes have indeed become reality.

Remember the Noise Neutralizer, Electronic Razor, Radium Radio, Silent Sound, Snorekill, The Cordless Radio Iron. These gems, and 15 more, are included in this 75-page magazine reprint compilation of the best sci-fi projects of Fips from 1933-1946. Hugo Gernsback was the founder of the electronic publishing industry, and these flights of fancy still delight engineers today.


