RECORD IN RECORDS When Broadcast By Billy Browne The Past Surpasses The Present

SOME PEOPLE collect money to pass on to their heirs, but Billy Browne, Sr., collects phonograph records. The result is that Billy Browne, Jr., will have a unique and fabulously valuable inheritance, not only because the records are worth plenty of money, but because they will provide him, as they do his father, with a means of making a living.

Since the first Sunday in May, 1944, Billy Browne, Sr., has been on the air continuously with his program "Remember When", now sponsored by Little Dipper Cake Mixes.

The program is a simple one, consisting of records from Billy's fabulous collection with Billy's inimitable comments about the artists, many of whom he knew personally. But it is a program that appeals to all ages. You do not have to be ancient to enjoy a song from the nineties or early 1900's. You've heard your mother or grandmother sing dozens of them and, when you do hear them, they bring up nostalgic memories—and in any family the happiest hours are often spent in the universal game of "remember when".

Billy Browne just drifted into collecting old records. The members of his family were mostly in show business, and therefore had an even greater interest in the songs of their day than the average person. The miracle of the phonograph gave them the opportunity to collect the songs and voices of their friends and themselves, and they collected and collected. Bit by bit, Billy fell heir to these and found himself with a huge collection. Then the collecting bug hit him and he's been at it ever since.

His collection now numbers about 7500 dises. This is not large as far as numbers are concerned—but it's a collector's collection. Each record has a significance; such as one he has of Gene Austin singing, with Fats Waller doing the piano. There are plenty of Gene Austin records around and plenty of Fats Waller discs, but the combination is very rare.

Like all collectors, Billy is far from satisfied. Any time a friend leaves for the Old Country he leaves with a long list of records to keep an eye open for. Three, in particular, head the list: Albert Chevalier singing "My Old Dutch"; Marie Lloyd singing "My Old Cock Linnet", and Jack Pleasant giving with "Liza 'Ad 'Old of Me 'And". For any one, or all, of these three, Billy would reach for his pocketbook without fumbling and pay plenty. A visit to your attic could be mighty profitable, so start looking.

The record Billy values most is Marie Lloyd singing "A Little of What You Fancy Does You Good". This, along with others of his most valuable records, is in moth-balls, and when you hear him play it over the air, it's a re-recording.

Although Billy Browne considers any composition younger than 20 years modern music, some contemporary singers are making discs that are already becoming collectors' items. Gracie Fields' recordings are at a premium, and George Formby, whose platters Billy often plays on his morning program, is becoming very popular over the line, and is in short supply everywhere.

Billy has had many requests for Formby discs from Americans, but the answer is always the same—NO! The Formby discs, in another twenty years, will be part of the "Remember When" program conducted by Billy Browne, be he senior or junior.

Other more or less rare modern records Billy figures you should hang on to, if you want to lay something aside for a rainy day, are Bing Crosby's "I'm Playing with Fire" and Vaughn Munro's theme song. Both, he guesses, and he should know, will be valuable after a while.

On the last Sunday of each month, on the Little Dipper Cake Mix program (Little Dippah as Billy says it) "Remember When", Billy plays only requests. Once, he was stumped—but not for long. A request came in to play a record called "In the Valley Where the Blue Bird Sings" and be hadn't got it. But he got it pretty quick. A lady phoned in—she'd brought it over from the Old Country with her 43 years ago.

Billy has met many of the old-timers personally, for he's been in show business since he was six years old when he had a blond wig shoved on his unwilling head, and played the part of Little Eva in "Uncle Tom's Cabin".

There is one thing that Billy Browne, Sr., has in common with all other collectors—he'd like to get his hands on the rarest record of them all — a record for which the price would be thousands—it is a recording of Queen Victoria's farewell speech to the British troops embarking for the South African War. If you've got it—and it could be in Vancouver—you've got something.

"Remember When" is a program of infinite variety. Billy only plays an average of 11 records on the Sunday evening (10:15) Little Dipper Cake Mix program (CJOR). This means he could go for more than three years without repeating himself.



On Records

How Many Speeds?

The recent decision of English Decca to manufacture long-play recordings for sale in the United Kingdom is a development of vast importance to phonograph enthusiasts all over the world. English Columbia and His Master's Voice may have "gone LP" before this column can appear in print. In North America, the rich artistic and technical resources of RCA-Victor joined the LP parade last spring, while continuing to release discs and albums playable only at the "old" speed—78 revolutions per minute—or at the 45-rp.m. velocity pioneered by Victor a couple of years ago.

The situation in the War of the Three Speeds is still puzzling to many a potential customer. Gradually, however, an over-all trend appears to be solidifying. My previous flirtations with the prophet's crystal ball have not always been happy ones, but from where I am sitting it looks as if another few years will see practically all LONG works recorded on LP, and practically all SHORT works on 45. By this, of course, I mean that the day of the old-fashioned 78-r.p.m. platter may now be drawing to a close, in the sense of large-scale commercial production at any rate. The 78 may never "die out" entirely, because many a priceless heritage is still entombed there, but the wafer-thin, seven-inch, non-breakable, silent-surface 45s are so much more sensible for modern users that there is really no room left for a sustained argument. In other words, the collector will always cling to his cherished Caruso and Scotti duet or his Original Dixieland Jazz Band releases in the only form in which they are still available-at 78 r.p.m. But on future pressings, for short numbers not requiring the long, unbroken continuity of LP, the 45s certainly look like the logical solution.

The next 12 months—barring disastrous interruptions in the form of international chaos — should provide the answer in terms of clarity and finality. Meanwhile, tempting new issues are pouring from the disc-plants in an unceasing torrent. One New York reviewer recently reported, in mingled ecstasy and despair, that he had enough records stacked up in front of him for a solid year's listening and writing and more coming in by every post.

Recent & Recommendable

* * *

Mozart: Divertimento No. 15 in B-flat for strings and two horns—NBC Symphony Orchestra under Toscanini. Victor four-disc album (45s or 78s) . . . Gay, civilized, tender and witty music by 21year-old Mozart, played with precision and finely reproduced. The sound, on 45s, is particularly bright and resonant. Tchaikovsky: Serenade in C for Strings —Boston Symphony Orchestra under Koussevitzky. Victor four-disc album (45s or 78s) . . . I hope Victor releases this performance on LP as well, because in all respects except freedom from interruptions it is the finest Serenade I have heard. The main competitive version is a good LP by Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra.

Vivaldi: Gloria Mass—Italian soloists, chorus and orchestra under Arrigo Pedrollo. Vox-Polydor LP . . . Wonderful music by one of Bach's chief musical ancestors.

Elgar: 'Cello Concerto—Anthony Pini, 'cello, with London Philharmonic Orchestra under Eduard Van Beinum. London LP... A seldom-heard masterwork by the British composer whom far too many people remember only for "Land of Hope and Glory". Performance and recording: tops!

Richard Rodgers: Waltz Medley— Boston "Pops" Orchestra under Fiedler. Victor single (45 or 78) . . . Agreeable tunes from "Oklahoma!", "State Fair", "Love Me Tonight" and "The Boys From Syracuse", discoursed with apprepriate suavity and zest by the hearty Bostonians.

Victor Herbert: Naughty Marietta, excerpts — Nelson Eddy, Nadine Conner, chorus and orchestra. Columbia fourdisc album (78s) . . . Unless you're already fatigued by the over-familiarity of the material, you'll find it served up quite tastefully in this package.

Dancing Time: Stanley Black and his orchestra. London LP... Nice beat for ballroom, although a bit tame for concentrated listening. Included are "April Showers", "Desert Song". "Alice Blue Gown", "Body and Soul", and other assorted staples. Nice, clear recording.

Dixieland for Dancing: Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra. Victor three-disc album (45s or 78s) . . . As part of the current Dixieland revival, this album is a reasonably appetizing specimen. Good fun for sitter-outers, too.

Shooting Par Golf: Sam Snead, instructor, with opening and closing announcements by Bill Stern. London LP . . . Authoritative tips on the best techniques from tee to cup, by a champion who knows how to communicate his knowledge. The style is a bit dryly technical at times, but always modest and unaffected.

Tenor Jazz: Coleman Hawkins, Babe Russin, Corky Corcoran, Herbie Haymer, Don Byas, Ted Nash. tenor saxophone soloists, with orchestras. Mercury threedisc album $(78s) \dots$ Agreeable demonstrations of the fact that the tenor sax, when handled by a virtuoso, is one of jazz's indispensable participants.

I Gaze Into My Crystal Ball

One is supposed to gaze into a crystal ball to see the future. The heading for this column is not quite complete therefore, because in my gazing I am assisted somewhat by various trade publications, advices from networks and other assorted devices. With all these assembled in an untidy mess on my desk I shall try to tell you some of the things in store for you this autumn and winter on the radio . . . and some of the things which will not be there.

One of these is "Harvest of Stars", also affectionately known as the Jimmy Melton Show. The warlike situation in the world has made this program a casualty. A great pity, too. There are some others we could do without a lot better.

The old battle between the major networks will be on in full force again. In its first major assault on Columbia's Sunday evening line, NBC is now wrapping up a 90-minute package which will cost \$30,000 a week. It will play opposite Our Miss Brooks, Jack Benny and Amos 'n' Andy, and will start October 15.

The new show has been treated very much like an atomic project and has been called Project X. It will be a 26-week variety program saluting NBC on its 25th anniversary. It will feature top name stars, including seven name stars and three orchestras. Musical groups will be Vladimir Selinsky in New York and either Robert Armbruster or Lynn Murray in Hollywood plus a guest dance band of the Tommy Dorsey or Guy Lombardo calibre.

Talent will include most of the big names in the NBC stable. Fred Allen, Bob Hope, Eddie Cantor, Milton Berle, Phil Harris and Alice Faye, Jimmy Durante, Frank Sinatra, Ed Wynn and Groucho Marx. You may remember that NBC just this summer stole Marx from CBS.

There will also be a long hair department on this big show. The headliners here will include Jascha Heifetz, musical comedy stars like Mary Martin and Ezio Pinza of South Pacific fame, plus film names like Cecil B. de Mille and Henry Fonda. Hollywood would call it colossal. NBC just calls it the best that radio can offer.

ABC is launching a novel Saturday night marathon program which extends from 8 to 10 p.m. It will be called Party Night, and is slated to start on September 16.

Three of the four shows in the line-up will be new audience participation types. "Take a Stand" has a guest celebrity and a person in the news as a surprise guest. Laugh Clinic has participants bring their personal problems to Dr. Win Eliot and Nurse Bob Quigley who will have them enact roles in humorous situations to put their troubles into perspective. "Shoot For the Moon" will have an air travel question and answer format with Bud Collyer as emcee. The fourth show to fill the two hours will star Gypsy Rose Lee in something called "What Makes You Tick". All right, I'll bite . . . what does? You will be sorry to hear that another

You will be sorry to hear that another of those mouldy give-away shows almost got the ax but not quite. "Sing It Again" on CBS on Saturday nights was carried for some time sustaining. The network almost dropped it a couple of times. Then a sponsor came along ... and then another. Now the show is going on TV as well.

Most of the big familiar shows will be back at the old stands come September or October, both in Canada and the U. S. A few start in September, but there has been a growing tendency in recent years for the fall season to begin in October.

Harry Boyle has promised that "CBC Wednesday Night" will be bigger and better than ever this coming season. It never actually retires, although much of the summer fare on CBC Wednesday Night is either recorded or what is known in the trade as "small budget".

"Stage 51" and "Ford Theatre" will both be back, but so far neither AI Savage of Ford nor Andrew Allan of the Stage series have given us any advance information on what dramas will be produced.

There is still a great silence in the local radio picture. I am afraid that we are about to face still another winter season consisting of incoming network shows, the usual collection of American-made transcribed package shows, give-away programs and recorded music. Aside from the two big commercial network shows out of Vancouver, "Harmony House" and "Burns Chuckwagon", "Vancouver Theatre" on the CBC Trans-Canada and a couple of hardy perennials in the musical department at CBR, we are doomed to another winter of recorded music from Vancouver stations. Or so it seems at this date. What a shame they don't spend a little of their money on talent once in a while.

Already back on the air are two old favorites of long standing. This will be the 15th year for "Cavaleade of America" heard Tuesdays on NBC, and the 20th year for "The American Album of Familiar Music" also on NBC every Monday night. All the old regulars are on hand . . . Thomas L. Thomas, Felix Knight, Margaret Daum, Jean Dickerson, pianists Arden and Arden, and Gustave Haenschen's orchestra. The format remains the same. "Lux Radio Theatre" is also back in the same slot Monday nights, still going strong after more than fifteen years on the air.



Many people have radios in their private cars, but the people of the Alberni Valley have radios in their public buses. Station CJAV, which serves the Alberni Valley, was the first station in Canada to operate "TRANSIT RADIO" on a standard broadcast signal. All the buses of the Alberni Valley Transit System are equipped with specially built receiving sets pre-tuned to CJAV. Men going to work at the mills can hear the latest news and, later their wives, going shopping, can listen in to their favorite CJAV programs such as CLUB DIARY, which gives them the low-down on the events around the valley. "TRANSIT RADIO" is now in its second year of operation, and the people of the valley thoroughly endorse the system. Hugh Holloway, CJAV's chief engineer, designed and equipped all the receiving sets, and many broadcasting stations in both Canada and the USA have sent inquiries to CJAV about the system.

THE HATT-TRICK

DOING THE HAT-TRICK is the cricket feat of bowling out three men in a row with three successive balls. The phrase is now in general use to indicate anything one does three in a row and nicely illustrates Joe Hatt-Cook's career in radio. When Joe went to work for CHUB (a week after the station opened), it was his first job as a production manager, his first job as an announcer and his first jobperiod. Although Joe is 25, he didn't go to work until he was 24. This doesn't mean he was lucky enough to be one of the idle rich, It means he was caught up in a war. After only two years in varsity, Joe joined the navy, where he rose rapidly from the rank of civilian to A.B. After having practically sunk the Canadian Navy single handed (Joe says), he used his $DV\Lambda$ benefits to go back to UBC, where he reversed the letters of his war service and graduated as a B.A. Joe Hatt-Cook is single and his hobbies are ice skating, writing half-hour radio scripts (which, he says, no one buys, not even himself), and organizing the Community Players of Nanaimo. His show is heard nightly at 10:45 p.m. until after the last horse has taken the last shirt off our backs. When the horses have been put out to grass for the winter. Vic's show will come on at 10:30 p.m. Shown in our picture during a recording session with Hollywood's Eddie Bracken, Vic is not just another disc-jockey with a line of platter-patter, but knows his radio from one end of a wave-length to the other. At one time or another he has done most jobs around a studio and still slips smoothly into any phase of radio production in an emergency. He's been in radio since 1939 when CJOR hired him to copy coded press items. At the control board as operator-announcer, Vic used to cut off the other announcers when he didn't like them and entertain the listeners himself. After a little of this sort of thing CJOR decided he better talk under proper control and made him an announcer. He's been entertaining the listening public ever since.



TV RECEPTION IN GREATER VANCOUVER By R. V. WHEELER

Contrary to general belief, television reception is not confined to favored spots on our southern slopes. It can and has been received in most parts of Greater Vancouver.

In such "favored" areas as Marlborough Heights and the British Properties on the North Shore, reception of KING. Seattle, is frequently as clear as within ten miles of Seattle, and on many occasions stations as far afield as San Francisco have come in quite clearly. Installation problems in these and similar areas are hardly a problem and expense can be held to a minimum, but this does NOT mean that they are the only areas that can receive TV.

With proper installation and technical skill, TV can be received in most areas.

Even in what have normally been regarded as "inaccessible" areas, such as Main Street and our down-town business district, TV can be received. The important things are the selection of the proper type of antennae, the method of erection and the final adjustments. This, however, takes expert knowledge, and, unfortunately, the government's attitude towards TV in Canada has not encouraged the gaining of this knowledge by sufficient Canadian technicians.

Station KING is not by any means the only station that Vancouver see-ers and listeners can get: Dr. N. J. Blair of 1122 W. 40th, reports Seattle reception "excellent"; Mr. Cyril Woods, 3050 Capilano Road, North Vancouver, claims Seattle "excellent", and Phoenix, Arizona, "fair"; Dr. E. F. Raynor, 177 West Braemar Road, Marlborough Heights, reports Seattle "excellent", San Diego, "good", and San Francisco "good".

These installations are of course all in favored areas, where most of Vancouver's TV sets are to be found. But, you need not despair if you don't live in these areas. There are ways and means.


THE FLOWER—THE SHOW—THE JUDGE

We all have our pride about something—running all the way from family pride to pride in our possessions. There's nothing snobbish about wanting to show off our flowers. When the most convenient place to exhibit your best blossoms happens to be a flower show, why shouldn't you receive some honor by getting a prize for them?

We might point out that the qualities of a good show ROSE are: It must be sufficiently opened, but with promise of more petals to unfold; all petals must be fresh; good color is an essential, for what is a flower if it doesn't show its color?

The average gardener will have as much difficulty keeping up with changing fashions in GLADIOLI as he will following changing styles in cars. But here are some old and some new but all good GLADS: "Picardy". "Salmon Pink", "Spotlight" yellow with red spots; "Elizabeth the Queen", "Huntress" and "Lucky"—all three good mauves; "Greta Garbo"—creamy pink; "Connie G."—primrose. There's nothing tattle-tale gray about "Amybell", for she is clothed in white, pure as driven snow. "True Love" is a good pink; while two good reds are "Skyraider" and "Charm". "Blue Beauty" is violet; "Mrs. Mark's Memory"—purple. Two good smoky GLADS are "Dusty Miller"—white streaked on red lips; and "Helen of Troy"—a *(Continued on Page 28)*

peach shade with smoky lips. How I miss, at a show, the graceful Primulinus varieties, for in them I find grace instead of stiff dignity.

Some large show DAHLIAS are: "Queen Elizabeth"—yellow; "Kelvin"—pink; "Toby Temperton"—apricot; "Crydon Elite" —deep gold; "Crydon Delecata"—mauve; "Murphy's Masterpiece"—rich red; "Alice May"—white; "Colonel Rugg" crimson; and "Beau Dell"—clear pink.

In outdoor CHRYSANTHEMUMS you will find pleasure in the following: "Armore"—dark bronze; "Bronze McLeod", "Sutcliffe" and "George McLeod"—yellow; "Halo" and "Utopia" —amber; "Rose Princess", "Freda" and "Forward"—pink; "Elite" and "Challenger"—red shades; "White Lady" and "Blanche de Poitou"—white; "Primrose" and "Primrose Poitou" —in these shades.

At every show, read carefully the conditions and kinds called for in each class. A common mistake is to confuse "Annuals" with "Perennials" and so lose out in an otherwise well-grown exhibit. When a definite number of spikes or individual flowers are called for, be sure to have the right count. If a class calls for five blooms of ASTERS, he sure that number is there—not one too many or one too few—a wrong number or kind means disqualification.

A well-developed evenly-spaced stalk of three SWEET PEA flowers gets more points than a grossly-grown badly-spaced stalk of four flowers. Another failing amongst beginners is to enter flowers which have faded petals and blooms attached to them. The perfect winner—in the eyes of the judge—is the one properly opened up. It's better to err by showing an immature flower in preference to one which clearly says "It has had its day."

If you feel that you haven't the "nerve" to enter a large show, try your hand at a local Parlor Show. The entry fee is just a nominal amount. So now, folks, you have the flowers—you also know where the show is held. Enter then, but hold your breath while you find out something about the judge.



Juan (rhymes with "gone" if the title confuses you) Root is a recent and welcome addition to CKNW'S already competent staff. Like all successful business men, Bill Rea, boss of the station, knows the formula for success is to surround yourself with the best men in the business. Bill is sticking close on top of the formula by hiring Juan.

Juan Root is the rare combination of announcer and actor. He is equally at home sending blood-curdling chills up your spine as a murderer in a CBC drama or urging you to clean your spine with somebody's soap. And he is equally convincing.


It is difficult to get a clear picture of Juan from listening to his voice on the air. I had imagined him, variously (before I met him), as being tall with lean chops and a saturnine leer; short and fat and out of breath; medium height, brash and overbearing, aged anywhere from 19 to 90. It depended on what part I heard him in last.

For the record, vital statistics are: Age— 33; height—5' 10"; hair and complexion dark; eyes—a peculiar blue which isn't blue; weight—150 lbs.; married with one daughter. Judith, aged six.

The Root hobby is cooking. This hobby stems chiefly from the days in an actor's life when the kitchen cupboard contains a rind of cheese, a crust of bread, assorted ancient flavorings in rusting tins and a nearly empty ketchup bottle. As there were many such times in Juan's life, he became very adept at making something palatable out of old bits and pieces. The habit has persisted, and although he can now choose his ingredients. he still never knows quite how things are

going to turn out. Sometimes it's the mouths of his guests that water-at other times, their eyes.

Juan almost went into the restaurant business himself when he first came to Vancouver and discovered, what the rest of us already knew, that Vancouver restaurants have a standard menu which they must have got (from "How to Be An Economical Housewife") from the public library.

Juan hesitated before going to work on a full-time basis for CKNW. He finally decided "for" it because it is impossible for an actor to make an adequate living from free-lance work in Vancouver (and Juan gets more work than most).

Although he has only been with the station (at the time of writing) for a week or two, he is enthusiastic. Everyone, he says, is made to feel important and an integral part of the studio. Another thing he has found is that the station is adequately staffed, unlike some others where announcers double for office boys, and office boys double for program directors.

Juan's new job doesn't mean that we won't hear him in radio dramas in the future, for he is still free to appear in CBC's theatre programs. It just means that we'll be able to root for Root more often than before.




