

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## Why An Association?

THE question has come up many times as to why the radio industry in Southern California must spend thousands annually to maintain an association. Though its worthy purpose has often been well proven an example arose this last week which should make prominently evident the fact that the Association is needed and should be actively supported by everyone in radio.

Some anonymous person or organization sponsored a proposed ordinance which was extremely broad in its scope and could have become a most destructive weapon in the hands of malicious people.

"It shall be unlawful for any person to allow, or operate any radio, phonograph or any other sound making or sound producing in . . . vicinity . . . or surrounding neighbor-hood." Under this which is device-to disturb the quiet . . . of persons principal stipulations, your little daughter would be jeopardizing the family name and savings account by practicing her piano lesson. One would not dare let his radio or phonograph play louder than a whisper. Construction companies would have to forego riveting on steel structures, so likewise forego the structures. If the notes of your violin waft out through a carelessly opened window the police would soon arrive. Railroad signals could not longer protect you. Church bells would be forever stilled. For the legal teeth that would make your home a tomb promised to be ". . . punishable by a fine of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period of not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Such a law would make the violation a serious thing and certainly would soon be found to constitute an intolerable menace. Noise is always a nuisance and disturbing sounds of an unnecessary nature will ultimately be eliminated, especially in cities. But it will and is being done in a progressive, reasonable way.

The offices of the Radio and Music Trades Association received word of this proposed ordinance and immediately got busy. Their work was so effective that not only was voting by the Council postponed but the more obnoxious features of the ordinance were effectively killed. This last attempt to put through an ordinance controlling sound producing devices proves two things: 1. That there is a definite plan on foot by certain persons and organizations to silence in a rough-shod way all artificial sound, which includes radio sets and public address systems. 2. That the officials of the Radio Trades Association are constantly on the alert to defend the rights of the radio industry and all those interested in it.

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

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

## A LISTENER AT LARGE

## Conducted by DOROTHY HUMMEL

A few weeks ago, on this page, we dragged out the skeleton in RADIO DOING'S closet. We were tired of being maligned in each mail about program inaccuracies and writing meek little notes, consisting solely of buck passing in return; we stopped listening to the radio because of a haunting fear that there would be a change not duely listed in RADIO DOINGS; we quarreled with a more or less well-meaning room mate who gleefully chronicled each program divergence of the day; we developed a persecution complex; we were glib with excuses but our heart was heavy with self-pity and finally we jerked open the door and came clanking out in print with the skeleton! We published "hate" letters from our readers which showed that some of them didn't think too highly of the efforts of the program editor; we retaliated by apportioning the blame, polishing off with a reckless challenge to broadcasters to explain if they could, but most of all to deprive us of the well known sack, the holding of which had caused us to grow old, cynical and bitter. Jose Rodriguez, Publicity Director of KFI-KECA, was neither baffled nor intimidated but gallantly and bravely came forth with not only a satisfying explanation but a panacea for the ills. Read the last two paragraphs in his article, which follows, at least twice (in the same manner that you count ten after slamming the door on your finger) before you rise up in righteous anger at the next program change.

## **Program Problems** By Jose Rodriquez

When Robert Burns wrote down the words "the best-laid plans of mice and men gang aft a-gley" (if the quotation is accurate) he uttered a generous mouthful. He was preceded in this saying by the ancient saw, "man proposes and God disposes," and he has been proved correct to the hilt by the present-day state of radio schedules.

The complaining witnesses are three: a, the reader; b, the publication editor; c, the broadcasting station.

The reader's wail is simple and direct.

"I read in Radio Doings that John Smith would sing over XYZ at 8:00 P.M. Thursday. I tuned in. No John Smith. Instead, he sang at 8:30 the following day. Now, why can't the programs be accurate, and why don't the radio stations stick to their schedules?"

The editor deposes in turn:

"I print the schedules exactly as they are sent to me from the stations. I make every effort to check on lastminute changes. If the stations don't stick to the schedules they send me, it's none of my fault."

The buck, in other words, arrives by neat stages to the back door of the broadcaster. In behalf of that gentleman, I rise to explain. Let us take a hypothetical case.

John Smith is booked to sing at 7:00 P.M. over XYZ, on a day two weeks hence. The station schedules are made out accordingly, and sent to the publication long in advance. In the case of Radio Doings, this interval is ten days. Radio Doings must receive this copy, edit it, have it set in type, printed in a book, distributed to news stands and subscribers.

In the meantime, several things can happen in the station: a, Smith may leave town, get sick, die, or get

another job; b, the hour at which Smith was to sing may be sold to a commercial sponsor and the sponsor may have no use for Smith; c, a more important program may come up which for various reasons has the right of way over Smith; d, even if Smith sings, he may decide to change his program 30 seconds before performance.

And these changes, be it remembered, can happen and often do happen within two hours before the program is broadcast. Obviously, in the face of these eventualities, neither the reader, the editor nor the station is to blame.

One thing can be done to avoid misunderstandings. Stations can announce briefly before signing-on the program, that it is presented at this hour or day in spite of the fact that publications announced it otherwise, on account of late-hour changes. But even here a difficulty presents itself.

If the station were to announce the changes in all the schedules it sends out, the announcement itself would be too voluminous. KFI-KECA, for instance, sends out three schedules at various times; one for newspapers in the east and middle west, a second for local weekly publications, and a third for local daily papers.

Announcement of all these changes, obviously, would be too cumbrous and lengthy for the program.

The reader and editor may say: Is it then impossible for artists and stations to plan far enough ahead?

And the stations may answer: Railroad schedules, political treaties between empires, itineraries of battleships and preparations for national conventions, have been changed on the last day. Radio stations not being omniscent nor omnipotent, changes cannot be avoided.

Efforts are being made by all major broadcasters so to arrange their schedules that nothing short of the Johnstown flood will alter them between the time they are released to newspapers and put on the air. All that can be done is to be sure they are correct AT THE TIME OF RELEASE and then to announce their change just before broadcasting. But even then, readers will be annoyed and publications will relay the complaint, with variations.

This, in brief, is the case for reader, editor and broadcaster. There are, it is true, readers who complain no matter how much in error they may be themselves; there are publications, we regret some of them in this City of the Angels, which deliberately jump release dates, give false information without authority and otherwise misrepresent programs; there are broadcasters, also, who are careless and lax in their methods.

A tightening-up all around is needed. We shall gain nothing by apportioning blame, because there is no blame.

But we can all keep in mind that we are engaged in a complex and difficult job, where not only material problems are immense, but where human problems are endless in their complications. Readers can keep in mind the mechanical problems of publications. Publications can keep in mind the characteristic and seemingly unavoidable artist-trait of changing ones mind with the ease and rapidty of a child before a toy-counter.

Then by the time we shall have reached this millenium of understanding and tolerance, radio will be rendered obsolete by an automatic system of thoughttransference.

# FOR YOUR ENTERTAINMENT

The rakish young gentleman on the cover this week is some one you have been wanting to meet since the day you tuned in on KFRC and swore that Maurice Chevalier had gone radio. Charles Carter is the name and not more than nineteen years have gone by since this clever imitator came into the world. KFRC considers him a "find" and rightly so. As one incredulous listener-in remarked to another, "Why, he's better than Chevalier himself!"

KHJ brings to Southern California a season of operetta, musical comedy and comic opera; an hour of melody, romance and laughter every Wednesday night; the champion song shows of all time reduced without mutilation of music or dialogue to sixty minutes. The Mikado, famous old Gilbert and Sullivan classic, opens the season at seven o'clock October 15th. The series is well named "On With the Show." Scott Bradley will direct under the supervision of Raymond Paige, KHJ's musical director. Lindsay MacHarrie will make the continuity adaptations and a large orchestra, two complete casts, chorus and guest artists will be utilized. Early productions will bring you Love Parade, Merry Widow, Chocolate Soldier, Red Mill, and Pinafore.

The two prize radio plums are, of course, the New York Philharmonic Orchestra over the Columbia Broadcasting System, and The Philadelphia Symphony over the National Broadcasting Company System. Elsewhere in this book are some interesting details about this last named organization which plays under the baton of Leopold Stokowski. With the opening of the winter musical season, from Canada to Mexico and East to West, beautiful programs of opera and symphony orchestra music are being broadcast. For you who have endured through a summer and fall of flippant and frothy musical programs now may you settle down in your com-fortable arm chair and let these programs of classical music soothe your savage breast. Here are a few you will not want to miss: The New York Philharmonic Orchestra every Sunday from 12:00 to 2:00 p.m. Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra over NBC stations Sun-day, October 12th, between 2:00 and 3:00. All Canada Symphony concerts from Toronto over the Canadian National Railway network, Sunday, October 12th. (No time given, but probably between noon and 3:00 p.m.) The Standard Symphony Hour over NBC network ev-ery Thursday night at 7:30. And on October 4th, the Boston Symphony Orchestra reached the west coast via the NBC and through KECA. We can't be definite about whether it will be a feature every week or not but better hover pretty close to KECA on Saturdays at 4:00. And maybe KFI will broadcast an opera some time before the close of the present season. Here's a hint. If they do, it will be on Saturday night about 8:30 and KFI is sure to be the station to do it because they already have wires going to the Auditorium.

The two national chains seem to be taking most of the space but after all this page is devoted to the business of pointing out the outstanding programs of the week. Unless we have one of those unforseen things Mr. Rodriguez mentions in his article on page 14, we shall have

the great privilege of listening to Richard Bonelli, star of the Chicago Čivic Opera Čompany, on Sunday evening, October 12th, at 6:15. Bonelli, a native of New York State and a graduate of Syracuse University, started out to be a mechanical engineer but wound up in the opera houses and concert halls of Europe and America. The young baritone proclaims his voice as 100 per cent American. In his Atwater Kent Radio Hour program October 12, the baritone will demonstrate this quality of artistic greatness in one of the most varied programs he has ever arranged. It will start with the exquisite baritone aria from "Faust," "Even Bravest Hearts," and will end with the famous "Prologue" from "Pagliacci," which the composer, Leoncavello, wrote especially for Victor Maurel, the famous French baritone whom Bonelli is said to surpass in interpretive genius. Between these operatic selections will be a series of ballads and vocal tone poems that run the gamut of human emotional expression.

KHJ will hold the Atwater Kent auditions on October 26th, beginning at 9:30 p.m., and KPO in San Francisco will broadcast an audition on October 20th at 10:00 p.m. Paste these dates in your hat if you have musical aspirations.

Everett Hoagland and his Troubadors are now playing only six nights weekly through KGER at 9:00 and 11:00 for a half hour each time. The 6:30 to 7:30 Monday program is a seven day in the week affair, however.

The American School of the Air starts October 20, from 11:30 to 12:00 Noon over the Columbia network and will consist this term of five weekly programs. It is expected that among the listeners will be six million children alone. America's leading educators are behind the school. The schedule: Mondays—American History Dramatized; Tuesdays—Music Appreciation for Junior and Senior High School; Wednesdays—Literature Dramatized for Fifth and Sixth Grades; Thursdays— Story Telling and Music Appreciation for Primary Grades; Fridays—Current Events and Vocational Information.

KFWB is taking all the night football games although their detailed schedule has been quite modest about mentioning this interesting fact. On October 17th KFWB will bring you the night game from the Coliseum which will be the battlefield of U. C. L. A. and St. Marys.

The gay, care-free songs of the Spanish start the day right for KFOX audiences from 6 to 7 o'clock in the morning. While this program is entirely Spanish, from the singing right down to the announcing, it is beautiful enough to be interesting to non-Spanish speaking people. Don Julio, who does all the announcing in Spanish, has a company of instrumentalists and singers who are real entertainers. Considering the great number of Spanish-speaking people in California, it seems that this is little enough time devoted to a radio program for them. jans was Braven Dyer, a recent recruit to the KHJ sports staff. Mr. Dyer is with the Los Angeles Times and is assisted in his broadcasts by Paul Lowry, Sports Editor of the above paper.

To the listener, completely dependent upon the announcer for every move of the football game, the voice, personality and knowledge of the man describing the game are exceedingly important, for all these things give him his word picture of what is gong on in the Coli-seum. In the studio, the announcer's personality is pushed into the background; he acts only as a means of getting certain bits of important information over to the listeners. Not so with the sports announcer. He must never lose sight of the progress of the game, but the success of his broadcast will depend largely upon how true a picture he was able to give listeners. Many like their football described in technical terms with absolutely no color, but the average listener enjoys some enthusiasm along with accurate information. This, Braven Dyer can do very effectively. He knows his football and his players; furthermore his own college football days are not too far behind him. We do venture to hope, however, that KHJ moves out into the open at the Coliseum so that a little more of the exciting sound of a big game may seep through to our living rooms.

Paul Lowry and Braven Dyer are conducting an interesting sports period over KHJ every Thursday night

Frank Bull, sports announcer is on the air over KMTR in an original fifteen minutes called "Radiography" every Monday night at 7:30 P.M. in which he tells interesting notes in the history of football games, football players and recreates some of the most thrilling plays of recent seasons. On October 13th Frank will give highlights in the career of the brilliant player now on the Trojan team, Garret Arbelbide. Once in a while the athlete under discussion will appear himself, on this program. but no promises are made.

If Pop Warner or Knute Rockne ever find themselves running short of football material, they'll find plenty in the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company.

The NBC Eleven, organized the other day, and reported to be in practice on the roof of the Hunter-Dulin building, contains 2,340 pounds of man-power. The team issued a challenge to every other radio station on the coast as soon as it discovered that all its members are six feet or more in height, and more than 200 pounds in weight.

Lloyd Yoder, All-American football star of a few years ago, and now chief of the press relations depart-ment, is captain. Other members are C. L. McCarthy, NBC traffic manager; Mynard Jones, basso; Edward J. Fitzpatrick, conductor; Howard Milholland, program director; Bill Andrews, announcer; Joseph Baker, technician; Charles Marshall, guitarist; Bob Nichols, an-nouncer; Harry Stanton, basso, and Bennie Walker, editor of the Woman's Magazine of the Air.

## RADIO NEWS FLASHES

## High Power Advocates Win First Round

Another year may see the 40 cleared channels, now used exclusively or part-time by 85 stations, operating with 50,000 watts or greater power. While the Federal Radio Commission has been slow to accede to the demands of the high power advocates, the sessions of super-power hearings held during the past month left the regulatory body with little defense except the stand pat axiom: "We should make changes slowly."

Even an impartial observer would be forced to admit that the high power advocates won the first round of the five week's engagement with the commission. The secret of their success was that they united their resources in friendly fashion and turned the full forces of their combined guns on the commission order which limits the maximum power stations to half, or 20, of the cleared channels.

Should the commission stick to its announced limitation policy, only eight new assignment in the superpower field are available. But the applicants are striving mightily to persuade the commission to open up the entire cleared channel band to 50,000 watt, or greater, stations.

The most telling testimony was made this week by recognized radio experts who declared that both the listeners and the broadcasters would benefit by such a change. Receiving sets would be cheaper, they contended, because less selectivity would be necessary.

Prof. C. M. Jansky, Jr., of Washington, said that the restriction of maximum power stations to half of the cleared channels was ill-advised technically and is a "waste" of radio facilities. There is "every technical reason" why all stations operating on cleared channels should use "at least" 50,000 watts, he said.

Programs would come to the listener with much more signal strength, Dr. M. S. Kintner, assistant vice president of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company, testified.

The opening of the cleared channel band to 50,000 watt stations will not result in cross-talk or interference "in any modern receiver," Prof. Jansky added. Moreover, all of the stations whose power would be raised would gain wider coverages.

In reply to this any many other arguments, Dr. C. B. Jolliffe, chief engineer of the Radio Commission, said that the commission had not sufficient personnel to make a thorough study of the high power question and that consequently it was considered advisable to move slowly so that the effects of the change could be noted before the entire policy is altered.

## Lafount Predicts Less Jazz

A study of the programs now being broadcast by a majority of stations indicates a trend to educational subjects and a breaking away from jazz, Radio Commissioner Harold A. Lafount believes.

"It is most gratifying to note the trend of many stations from jazz to informative and instructive talks by prominent officials and experts on a variety of subjects. In my opinion, this is one of the most important uses to which a broadcasting station can dedicate itself.

"Of course, the program should not be too heavy, nor should too much time be devoted to 'timely topics,' but every program should contain these features daily."

## "Old Man Henderson" Declares Himself Millionaire

The rumor that he was bankrupt was spiked by "Old Man Henderson" himself during a hearing before the Federal Radio Commission, when the owner of Station KWKH, Shreveport, La., declared he was worth more than a million dollars above his debts and has nearly a half million dollars' worth of life insurance, which will be doubled in case he dies by accident.

Minus the special train that featured his previous trip to Washington, W. K. Henderson appeared at a hearing with his counsel, Herbert L. Davis, and a mass of evidence and testimony to convince the Commission that KWKH should be given full time with 30,000 watts power on 850 kilocycles. Representatives of Station WWL, operated by Loyola University at New Orleans on the same channel with 5,000 watts, were present to fight the application.

Any hearing in which the "Doggone Man" of radio appears is an interesting one. This was no exception. The Commission was particularly anxious to learn about his financial transactions.

Mr. Henderson readily admitted in cross examination that he was the "head man" in the Merchant Minute Men's Association, an unincorporated organization for the purpose of fighting the "chain store menace," with a membership of 35,000. Each member, he declared, paid \$12 for the privilege. About 60 per cent of these persons were signed through solicitation over KWKH, the balance by solicitors working throughout the country on a commission basis.

Henderson testified that he reserved the right to use the money collected from the "Minute Men" as he saw fit and admitted that some of it had been used to pay off losses in his iron works.

## New York Metropolitan Opera May Be Broadcast

Official confirmation is expected soon that performances of the Metropolitan Opera will be broadcast from New York.

The Chicago Opera Company has been on the air for years, and a special broadcasting installation was built into the magnificent new Chicago Opera House.

However, up to now, the Metropolitan, whose performances are considered among the greatest in the world, has been cold to radio.

The first news that there had been a change of heart was last week when Orrin Dunlap, Jr., Radio Editor of the *New York Times*, intimated that the Metropolitan might be a part of the \$250,000,000 Radio City soon to be built on Fifth Avenue across from St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Information from another source now confirms this and a definite announcement is expected to follow the return to this country of Gatti-Casazza, Director General of the opera.

In order to have more leeway in his broadcasts, Floyd Gibbons has cut loose from all newspaper affiliations.

## "California Week" in Washington

THE Press Club Building in Washington, D. C., will take on the appearance of headquarters for a California Broadcasters Convention during the week beginning October 13. The Federal Radio Commission is housed in this building and at least a dozen California stations have hearings before the Commission's examiners during the week.

The Commission wisely scheduled all of these hearings for the same week so that everybody concerned will be there at the one time, and not have to make a second trip or a prolonged stay in Washington in order to appear in the several cases in which they are involved.

Some of the applications to be heard are as follows: KFRC asks 50.000 watts in the channel now occupied by KPO. This hearing will develop into a battle between KFRC and KPO to determine which station can best serve the public interest through the use of the 680 Kc. cleared channel. KHJ has withdrawn its application for 50.000 watts.

KTM has applied for full time in its present channel. 780 kilocycles. They request that KELW be removed from this frequency. KELW will naturally be represented to protect its interests.

KMPC has made application for full time on 780 kilocycles, the channel now occupied jointly by KTM and KELW. They will attempt to show that they are better able to serve the public interest, convenience and necessity than KTM, while the latter station will vigorously oppose such a contention.

KGER requests full time in the present channel. 1360 kilocycles. They believe that their service is hindered by the necessity of shutting down twice daily in favor of KPSN's news broadcasts. They suggest that KPSN be assigned to some other frequency, thereby permitting KGER to operate as a full-time station.

KMIC petitions the Commission for full time on the present channel of 1120 kilocycles, instead of dividing time with KFSG. KFSG will oppose this by submitting evidence as to the public service rendered, absence of commercial advertising, type of equipment used, etc.

KFVD is applying for 1000 watts on 860 kilocycles. This is the limited-time channel formerly occupied by KFQZ. The latter station was removed from the air because of the financial inability of its owners to modernize the equipment.

The Commission considers many things where the relative merit of stations is concerned. Their first requirement is a strict observance of the provisions of the Radio Act of 1927 with its amendments and the General Orders of the Commission. Deviation in frequency of more than 500 cycles, failure to properly announce phonograph records as such, failure to maintain a watch on the marine wavelengths for SOS calls where required, using unlicensed equipment or excessive power, operating for the private gain of the owner, the use of profane or obscene language over the air, failure to strictly observe the hours of operation as provided by the license, and the employment of unlicensed or improperly licensed operators, are but a few of the important violations of the rules. Such violations are a matter of record with the Commission, having been reported to that body by the radio supervisors.

Stations involved in the hearings present technical

testimony regarding the equipment, methods of maintaining frequency stability, operation, etc. The programs come in for a large share of the evidence also. The station owner must show just how he serves the public interest, convenience and necessity, and just why more time or more power or a better channel is necessary to render a still better service. That more power or more time will enable the owner to increase the revenue of the station is a fact that the applicant must strive to forget while in Washington. He poses as a philanthropist whose only desire is to employ more power or time for the entertainment and education of the people, since the success of his plea must stand upon that basis.

Since the Court of Appeals has on several occasions trod on the toes of the Commission, the method of procedure before the latter body has been changed. Since the decisions of the Commission are subject to appeal, the Commission can no longer function solely as an administrative body, but must consider evidence on both sides of every case and render a decision as a judicial body.

The Commission can still order reallocations where all parties agree to the change. But where there is a dissatisfied station owner or any chance of an appeal to the high court, then a hearing must be held and the Commission must present the testimony of its own engineers, take the testimony of the stations involved and permit each to cross-examine the other.

In the past an applicant went to Washington armed with an array of letters and petitions. These were not accepted as evidence, since they were not sworn testi-So on the next trip they brought affidavits. mony. These were acceptable then, but not now. Now, the applicant must have depositions taken before a notary who legally represents the Commission, and a court reporter, and he must invite representatives of the other stations involved in the case. In this manner every witness is available for questioning by both sides. And so. all of the California stations presenting testimony at the forthcoming hearings must either take their witnesses to Washington with them, or else have depositions taken here in legally conducted hearings in accordance with the requirements of the Commission.

The hearings in Washington will be held before one of the newly appointed examiners, and possibly one Commissioner. The mass of transcribed testimony will then be turned over to the Commission for its consideration and judgment. This decision is then subject to appeal to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals.

Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, former Assistant Attorney General, who has been engaged in the solving of legal tangles for aviation companies since her resignation, defended her first radio case this week before an examiner of the Radio Commission.

Appearing as the counsel for Station WCAU. Philadelphia, in its request for 50,000 watts this week, she attracted a great deal of attention.

Walter Damrosch, having returned from his vacation in Europe, the impression is that he will again conduct a series of orchestral concerts, on Saturday nights, under the auspices of the General Electric Company.

## Why DX Conditions are Improving

**P**REPARE for a RADIO WINTER! That is, it is going to be bigger and better than ever, as they say in the show business—and radio during the next few months—and for a term of years—is to be filled with especial thrills for new and old devotees.

The fine entertainment offered, of course, will be the primary consideration—brought in by superior sets, with tone quality (or what we term "fidelity of reproduction" in the laboratory) the predominant factor in satisfaction, augmented by remarkable sensitivity and selectivity.

That sensitivity, by the way, through the use of screen grid tube circuits, will bring its attendant problem, for with vastly increased signal strength and the enormous amplification of these tubes real selectivity, to prevent overlapping of stations and distorted reception, is absolutely necessary.

This great signal strength will be due not alone to increases of power on the part of a number of stations. Far from it. Our old friend the sun is the honeyboy in this delightful transaction for the listeners-in. Sol is shedding his spots—and the experts in such matters are united in the opinion that this will work marvels in clarifying and intensifying wireless communication.

So the general prediction is for a revival of the DX fad. Personally, I do not believe that the thrill of distance reception has ever died out. For various reasons, it has not been so much discussed.

Distance reception is now a regular thing—even in the summer. Everyone knows that it is possible, under normal conditions, to bring n stations at a considerable distance away, and with very good effect on the ear if static is reduced to a low level. The main stations carry the chain programs and that therefore there is little incentive to bring n broadcasters more than a hundred miles away, in most localities. Naturally one prefers the finer quality reception from the home station.

Just the same, we still hear listeners talk of stations in other states heard the night before and most of them wax decidedly enthusiastic over coast-to-coast reception.

There are probably millions in the West who have never heard New York or Pittsburg—more that have never picked up Hartford or Boston. It is thought that under the revival of fine radio weather which we are to enjoy that these fans will join the throng boasting that they belong to the "we got the East Coast" clan. Perhaps now, when people have become so accustomed to scientific marvels, they won't start neighborhood parades about it, as probably happened in those hectic early days of broadcasting, but we who receive so many letters from in and out of the radio trade can safely state that there will be more interest in radio than ever as a result of this "kick" for those who like to twist the dials and tour the nation by ether.

Broadcasting started just about the time that radio reception conditions were changing—for the worse. In 1920 and 1921 signals were strong even from the weakest stations.

That Heaviside Layer which reflects radio waves a hundred miles above the earth's surface has been falling during the last few years. Its height determines the extent to which radio waves "bound" in point of distance. Sun spots are credited with contributing largely to these electro-magnetic changes. Some sun spots are so large that the earth could be dropped in any of them.

Dr. J. H. Dellinger, chief of the Radio Section of the Bureau of Standards, reports that the trend of observations on radio since 1926 indicate improvements. In that year he wrote the following:

"It is now well established that the vagaries of radio wave transmission are determined by the varying conditions of ionization (division of the air atoms into electrical particles) in the atmosphere up to about 100 miles above the earth's surface. At the top of the atmosphere particularly, the conditions of ionization favor the carrying of the radio waves to long distances but also produce the imperfections manifested as fading and static.

"When there are large sunspots this ionization is increased, the upper atmosphere is made more turbulent, and the effects of the ionization extend clear down to the earth's surface and produce magnetic storms, disturb the working of telegraph lines, etc. This may or may not be accompanied by aurora (northern lights); it usually is not but it has become common to speak of these telegraph line disturbances as due to aurora; this is an error. The effects on radio reception are much less definite than those on telegraph lines. Ionization disturbances which knock out wire telegraph operation and produce an increase of static may make radio transmission actually better at some frequencies while blanketing all transmission at other frequencies.

"Sunspots are areas on the sun which throw out extraordinary volumes of electrical particles and disturbances. When they occur in winter they can make the static and other radio conditions as bad as are ordinarily met in summer only.

"When the sunspots are particularly intense, radio reception is apt to be disturbed and poor. This has not been conclusively proved but seems to be indicated by such observations as have been made. The sunspot cycle is 11 years, that is, there is a minimum of spots on the sun for a time after which they gradually increase and pass through a maximum and return to a minimum, the whole occupying a cycle of 11 years. The last sunspot minimum was in 1922 and it would be inferred, therefore, that radio reception was at its best in 1922, should be progressively worse from 1922 to about 1928 and that in succeeding years reception conditions should improve and be at their best again in 1933."

The prevalent report is that the National Broadcasting Company is either buying up or leasing small stations throughout the country for the purpose of broadcasting specially made records over them.

A further deduction is that Station WOR at Newark, will eventually become the key station of the proposed record-playing chain. Page Twenty

## FINAL SURVEY RESULTS!

THE tremendous task of enumerating the votes in the Radio Doings Station Popularity Survey was completed just at the hour of going to press. We are therefor able to indicate the relative position of the stations in public popularity, without, however, specifying the actual numerical relationship between their positions as determined by the votes. Next week, this numerical information will be given fully.

A realization of the magnitude of the tabulation is had from the fact that approximately 105,000 individual station votes were contained in the ballots received. The public response to this survey has been very gratifying and we are thankful to our readers for cooperating so whole-heartedly in a movement which has for its sole purpose the improvement of radio broadcast conditions in Southern California.

A brief history of the survey is timely. The Federal Radio Commission recently requested the Radio Division of the Department of Commerce to compile a survey of the broadcast stations of the country with regard to their program service to the public, relative merit, etc. The Division instructed the radio supervisors of the various inspection districts to gather the necessary information. California is in the Sixth District. The radio su-pervisor is Bernard Linden, with head-quarters in San Francisco. A branch office is located in Los Angeles, in charge of James M. Chapple, radio inspector. When instructions reached Mr. Chapple relative to the survey required by the Commission, Radio Doings volunteered to assist by obtaining the opinion of its large family of readers. Survey forms were printed in the magazine for several weeks and our readers were asked to thoughtfully and carefully number the stations in the order of their comparative value to the individual listener. All of these signed forms will be delivered to Mr. Chapple this week and the information gained from them will be used by him as a supplement to the other material which he has gathered. This survey included all of Southern Cal-

This survey included all of Southern California, or the entire territory served by the stations listed on the ballots. It was not concentrated in any one locality where any one station may enjoy strong coverage. Radio is for the enjoyment of ALL the people, and those who reside outside the densely populated districts must be served as well as the city dwellers.

Let us see what the readers of Radio Doings think about the broadcast stations of Southern California. Bear in mind that our readers are the live, keenly interested fans who use and enjoy a radio and program magazine. They are not the casual listeners who cannot identify stations by call letters or frequency. They KNOW their broadcast stations.

KHJ KFI KNX KGEF KFWB KFOX **KECA** KTM **KMPC KMTR** KFSD KFSG KGER KFVD KTBI KGFJ **KMIC** KELW KGB **KPSN** KFXM

The stations are arranged in the center column in the order of their standing in the final tabulation of the survey. Thus KHJ is the most popular station, KFI is second, KNX is third, etc., on down through the 21 stations which were listed on the survey forms. Some comment should be made regarding certain of the broadcasters, particularly those serving limited areas. A summary of the survey follows:

KHJ is very decidedly at the head of the list, followed by the two 5000 watters, KFI and KNX. These two stations with their cleared channels and high power cover a far greater area with a strong signal and good quality than does KHJ, who is heterodyned fifty miles from Los Angeles by WKY. This fact makes KHJ's leading position still more noteworthy.

We now come to another group of three 1000 watt stations, KFWB, KFOX and KECA. While KECA should rate high in popularity because of the NBC chain programs, the fact is that their coverage is limited because of the frequency used, and KFWB and KFOX are able to serve a larger number of listeners throughout Southern California.

Three more seem to be grouped together, all on 500 watts at night: KTM, KMPC and KMTR in the order named. KFSD would rate very much higher in a survey of San Diego county which constitutes their immediate service area, but are naturally handicapped in a general Southern California survey where a great mass of population is in the service areas of other stations on the same chain.

KGER is a station which is steadily strengthening its position and a similar survey several months hence would no doubt rate KGER higher in the spectrum. Now we come to KFVD, a 250 watt station, followed by KGFJ with but 100 watts. These stations are handicapped in a general Southern California survey by their limited service area. The higher powered stations cover a great territory where the smaller stations do not reach. They would rate higher in a survey restricted to their own service districts.

KMIC, KELW, and KPSN, seem to rate about in the same order as their proportionate number of hours on the air. KFXM is a small local station in San Bernardino, and in a survey of the territory which they serve would probably rate well to the top of the list.

The number of votes received by the church stations, particularly KGEF and KFSG, is amazing, and proves that they have great and interested audiences.

Watch next week's issue for the full and final details, with the relative station popularity indicated numerically as required by the Commission in their instructions to the radio supervisors.

KFKB, KFAB, JODK and JQAK came through with splendid modulation and volume, with little or no interference from static.

When you do so display your courtesy by inclosing a Coupon Response International, which are obtainable at the P.O. or substations. They cost nine cents each. Enclosing a coupon usually insures a verification. At any rate I always enclose a coupon when requesting a verification from any foreign station. They are good the world over if used within six months. You will find the Kwantung Government very prompt and courteous in granting a verification; at least I found them so. 
## The 1931 Ultra-Five Super

## By H. G. CISIN, M.E.

THE Ultra-Five circuit has always been a favorite with the set builder and experimenter. This type of super-heterodyne is remarkably selective and still eliminates the weakest point of the ordinary super the matched intermediate frequency transformers.

Although originally a very efficient circuit, the 1931 edition, utilizing screen-grid tubes, is more powerful and greatly exceeds in sensitivity all previous models. This circuit will bring in greater distance than most of the old-style eight or nine tube supers.

The 1931 Ultra-Five utilizes a screen grid tube (6) as a mixing tube or modulator. This has its grid coupled to the antenna through a Silver-Marshall plug-in type antenna coupler (3). The receiver is tuned to the desired signal by means of the variable condenser (5). The grid condenser and grid leak are not necessary here, since the plate of the mixing tube is connected through the primary of the long wave coil (15) to the grid of the



oscillator tube and not to any positive point of the "B" battery. Hence the plate potential of the mixing tube is alternately positive and negative, since it varies in unison with the potential of the oscillator grid. As a result, the plate current flows only at intermittent intervals in the mixing tube and it is possible to regulate the frequency of the positive potential application to the plate by tuning the grid circuit of the oscillator tube. This is done by means of the Hammarlund variable condenser (11). Through this method, the incoming signal is caused to "beat" with the intermittent surges of current through the mixing tube. Therefore, the plate current flowing through the mixing tube is modulated by the incoming signal at the desired frequency.

The Silver-Marshall long wave coil (15), consisting of primary, secondary and tickler, is used instead of the intermediate transformers found in the ordinary superheterodyne. The coil selected for this purpose is a

The coil selected for this purpose is a plug-in type coil, having a six terminal base. A small adjustable neutralizing condenser, having a maximum capacity of .001 mfd. is used to tune the primary, while two Flechtheim midget condensers (16) are connected across the secondary.

The detector (20) uses a screen grid tube. The use of regeneration here adds to the effectiveness of the set. Regeneration is controlled by the midget variable condenser (17) in series with the plate of the detector tube.

Volume is controlled by means of an Electrad Super-Tonatrol potentiometer (14) in the double grid circuit of the screen grid tube (6). The first audio stage is coupled to the detector by means of resistance coupling, this being necessary because of the use of a screen grid detector. Durham metallized resistors are used, together with a Flechtheim midget stopping condenser. A Thordarson R-400 audio transformer couples the first audio stage to the output stage. A tone control system is incorporated in the last stage. This consists of two metallized resistors and two Flechtheim midget condensers. The resistors tend to eliminate the lower notes, while the condensers take out the highs.

Amperites are used to insure long tube life and to give correct operating current to each tube. Moreover, if it is desired to change the set over to dry cell operation and use the new two-volt tubes, it is only necessary to substitute other amperites of the correct values to control the tubes.

In the second article on the 1931 Ultra-Five, instructions will be given for winding the special oscillator coil (8), for assembling and wiring the set and also for constructing a simple but efficient "B" and "C" eliminator for the receiver.

The prediction is that the National Broadcasting Company, with new studios claimed to be the largest and best equipped in the world now about ready to use in Chicago, will soon distribute almost as many programs from that point as from New York. Many of the commercial programs will change over from New York to the Chicago studios within the next few weeks.

The NBC does not own a station in Chicago but has distribution arrangements with KYW, WIBO, WENR, WLS and WGN.

One hundred and eighteen stations are expected to broadcast a record of the speech of former Senator James A. Reed, of Missouri, on the "March on Monopoly," in what is promised to be the largest "hook-up" of its kind. When Senator Reed broadcast his monopoly speech last summer, an SOS closed down the Atlantic Coast stations. The SOS came before the Senator had finished the section of his speech devoted to the so-called radio trust. A record was made of this part of the speech by the Radio Protective Association and offered to independent stations throughout the country for rebroadcast.

## Complete Parts List For Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra

Modern Spanish and French compositions, by four of the most notable musicians of recent years, will be presented by Leopold Stokowski and the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra in a one-hour concert for radio listeners to be released over a coast-to-coast network of

The distinguished conductor, who will direct a series of four radio concerts to be broadcast under the sponsorship of the Phila-Storage delphia Battery Company. has chosen two Spanish compositions — Albeniz' 'Fete Dieu a Seville'' and Manuel de Falla's '' El Amor Brujo"—to begin the program. He will conclude

it with two French works-Debussy's "La Cathedrale Engloutie" and the much-discussed "Bolero" by Ravel.

'God's Holiday in Seville'' is the translation of the title of the Albeniz compositon, taken from his "Iberia," It is a vivid musical description of a celebration held on the streets and in the cathedral of the city. Sounds of revelry mingle with chants from the church as the happy people make merry.

Inspiration for "El Amor Brujo" came to Manuel de Falla from an old Andalusian gypsy tale. Written for the stage, the piece describes a gypsy woman who is haunted by the sinister spectre of her dead husband, which prevents her from finding new love and romance with an ardent youth. The latter persuades a young girl to tempt the ghost, which finally yields to her charms and thus ends the spell.

Debussy's "La Cathedrale Engloutie" (The Submerged Cathedral) is also based on a legend. Mysterious music suggests the story of the ancient city of Ys, which is said to have sunk off the coast of France when a princess of Ys drowned herself after betraying the city to her father's enemies.

"Bolero" is remarkable for its steady. unchanging rhythm and single theme, which is played in turn by all the instruments of the orchestra. It works up gradually to a most exciting, irresistible climax.

## British Short Wave Plans

## By ERIC H. PALMER

BROADCASTING system of its own, for worldwide transmission, is to be installed for the British Empire by the British Broadcasting Corporation —twin wave-length short wave stations at Daventry, to be erected at a cost of more than \$200,000.

This announcement is of significance from many viewpoints. First of all, it is of political moment—an answer by the authorities to the demand of the dominions for recognition on the ether as well as in everything else, and from the standpoint of the government an effort to link the commonwealth of nations more closely, at a time of considerable stress. It is, in the second place, a distinct scientific achievement, after years of experimenting, during which the B.B.C. experts, then headed by Capt. P. P. Eckersley, contended that high frequency transmission was too unstable to warrant a series of regular broadcasts. Further, it is a challenge to America's pioneership in broadcasting internationally. Now WGY and KDKA's short wave auxiliaries will have real rivals, for whom millions will be listening in.

In 1929 a more favorable report on the general plan was made, based on tests through G5SW, the shortwave station at Chelmsford. This report was made by the B.B.C. at the request of the Colonial Office, which in 1927 set the wheels in motion toward acceding to the demands of Australia, South Africa, and India for British programs. However, the first recommendations with regard to the Empire broadcaster were rejected, because of anticipated difficulty in raising necessary capital and maintenance costs.

Last June a less ambitious proposition was outlined, meeting with favor of the Colonial Office, which will foot the bill for engineering construction and maintenance, while the programs will be furnished by the B.B.C. without charge, out of the funds raised by the listening licensees within the British Isles. These licensees, on account of the skip distance proclivities of high frequencies, will find it difficult to hear programs they are actually paying for, if they desire to tune in on the shortwave stations. There is agitation on that score but protesting arguments on the methods of financing are being frowned down.

In a statement issued in November, 1929, the B.B.C. made clear that "an outgoing service for Empire listeners" would hardly be a fair charge on British listeners as they would not receive reciprocal treatment from the rest of the Empire. In the 1930 report, the B.B.C. softened that situation by offering programs free of cost for a term of five years.

The well-known young British wireless experimenter, Alan S. Hunter, in a letter to Alfred H. Grebe, American engineer and manufacturer, puts the case humorously, in these words:

"A transmitter to link up the Empire in a way that is more completely embracing than the best built tariff wall of the Beaverbrook Crusade! All the British Empire wants to hear the chimes of Big Ben—heaven knows why, for, when broadcast, it sounds like the cracked bell of a village church. All the British Empire wants news of doings at Westminster—in spite of the fact that the mother of parliaments has become a mothers' meeting, all talk and no action. All the British Empire wants to hear our international sporting events, in spite of the fact that we are nearly always beaten."

In his analysis of the forthcoming around-the-world broadcasting for Great Britain, Mr. Hunter continues:

"Opinions have been canvassed from all over the Empire, showing that the most urgent desire is for the reception of home news and the broadcasting of special national events. There is no widespread demand for the relay of ordinary programs. This is due, probably, to the fact that the individual units of the Empire are quite capable of entertaining their listeners by local transmissions.

"Some parts of the Empire have better facilities for rebroadcasting short-wave transmissions from the Old Country, while in other parts of the Empire direct reception by means of short-wave sets is undertaken.

"As news seems to be the most important transmission, it is proposed to have three Empire news bulletins, one radiated at 12 noon, the second at 6 p.m., and the third at 12 midnight. During the experimental part of the G5SW transmissions no news was permitted, so this development will be welcomed in all parts of the Empire.

"One of the difficulties in Empire transmission centers around the widely differing times or reception required. Suggested program hours are as follows:

"One hour between 10 a.m. and 12 British Standard Time for Australia. Two and a half hourse between 2 p.m. and 6 p.m., for colonial requirements. One or two hours during the normal British program for South Africa. For Canada, 1 a.m. to 2:15 a.m.

Listeners in the United States will be able to pick up the British Empire station, but as indicated, the news will be decidedly British in tone and not dealing with international happenings in general. The relayed programs, however, are expected to be of highest order, musically and dramatically.

I received a verification card Sept. 5 from the Siberian station in Khabarovsk which indicates that their call has been changed from RA97 to RV15. I received another Australian station Sunday morning, VK3ME, Melbourne, 31.56 meters; signed off at 3 a.m. They are much weaker than VK2ME in Sydney. Short wave DX is coming through much better now.

The new Vatican station will use a power of 12 kilowatts and operate on 19.84 and 50.26 meters. The Pope will speak from a studio within his own apartments. The station is nearly ready for operation.

For those who know code, another short wave station of tremendous interest will soon be available. under most favorable conditions. The British Arctic Expedition will transmit on the call GKN on 20.97 meters, from the base at Angmagsalik, Greenland. The University of Michigan expeditions to Greenland will not use a transmitter this year.






# RADIO GOINGS ON ABOUT TOWN

## Looking Backward ...

With R. B. YALE

**TINETEEN HUNDRED and TWENTY-TWO** -and the world woke up one morning to find that all one needed to actually receive music and speech out of the air was an oatmeal box wound with wire, some galena crystal, a few taps and a head-set. What a mad rush to procure these essentials ! The wonder of it was in everyone's mind-it was the chief topic of conversation among school boys and men of all ages. The amateur wireless enthusiast came into his own. He was the chief neighborhood advisor and in many cases assumed the title of radio engineer. Everybody was doing it—and that was the birth of an industry that has grown by leaps and bounds, that has far outdistanced in a shorter space of time in popularity almost any other new discovery.

Manufacturers of radio parts, distributors and dealers sprang up over night—to many it seemed a gold mine of opportunity. The public wanted it. Every kitchen table became a workshop; new circuits were invented hourly. More than fifty radio magazines and pamphlets appeared on the news stands and all of them enjoyed a ready sale. Nearly everyone applied for a license to broadcast. Shoemakers, plumbing shops, drug stores, chain stores—yes, and even real estate operators and undertakers hung out signs "Radio Supplies for It was then more or less impossible to buy a Sale." finished radio set-you simply had to "roll your own."

In Los Angeles during the period from January to the last of May, 1922, more than four hundred retail and wholesale purveyors of radio came into existence. And then, for some unknown reason, in July and the early part of August everyone seemed to decide that radio was only a fad and would not last. From four hundred persons and firms dealing in radio supplies the number dropped to approximately thirty-two. The names of some of those old timers come to mind-Gans Bros., on Spring Street near Eighth; Electric Lighting Supply Company, on Third Street: The Leo J. Meyberg Company, and of course Western Radio, which was then located on Flower Street. These firms were the main wholesale source of supply in the early days. Among the retailers will be remembered Sam Scott opposite Manual Arts High School, Stone Electric on Pico, Newberry Electric, Beacon Light Company, and of course a host of others. Many of those who started are still with us and have built real business institutions around what was thought to be a schoolboy fad.

Well, that's the way things go. Today's plaything may be tomorrow's wonder of science. A few short years hence television will undoubtedly come into its own, and when it does-well, what's the use prophesying, everybody in the game and a great many newcomers will be ready and waiting to furnish this newest visual form of entertainment to an expectant and waiting public. New fortunes will be made and lost, and undoubtedly some wise bird will be heard to remark that "After all, television is only a fad and can't last."

Nevertheless, Ingagi Harold was sold on the idea that it was a genuine picture so he had no difficulty in selling others on the idea. Yes, sir, he is a real salesman and he has pointed the way to all who aspire to sell-first sell yourself and the rest is easy.






