SUPPOSE the records "Heartbreak Hotel," "Move It," "Tutti Frutti" (Little Richard's), "Bye Bye Love" and "Sweet Little Sixteen" were issued now, for the first time, just as they were originally but without the boost of the established names of their performers. 





musician, yet emotion is at all times stronger than sheer proficiency. His singing is as down to earth as the leaves of New Orleans, yet appeals to hundreds who don't understand jazz at all.

Mose likes to think of himself as a composer, and at least four of the tracks are from his own hand. Promenade, Devil In The Cane Field, Spires, and the title number, Autumn Song, are all his.

There is a certain sameness about his work, and one could probably truthfully say he was "stylised." But then people have been saying that about Louis, Kid Ory, Hodges and dozens of jazz greats!
