WE'LL MAKE IT ONE DAY, SAY JOY AND DAVE

THEIR ambition, agree Joy and Dave, is not to go to the States, play a Palladium season, or make everyone of their albums million-sellers. They might dream about such things . . . but at the moment they are content to continue to show themselves for 52 weeks of the year.

People may remember this brother and sister duo had their fifth record released called "Joy's Been A-Calling Again". It hasn't been on the best-seller lists, nor have their previous ones. But if persistence alone made hits, Joy and Dave would be sitting at the top of the charts.

Not pop

They have been helped by recording companies who have also been surprised at how well they think Joy and Dave will click. Their debut disc was more than three and a half years ago on Parlophone. Then came "Joy and Dave", next "Triumph", back to "Joy and Dave" and now "Joy and Dave" have now gone full circle again.

In between discs they've had spells of Joy going solo and Dave left just long enough to switch board and Dave returned to his carpenter's bench.

"We've got to get Joy and Dave," says John Wells. "It's what it's like to be genuinely darling."

"We've got to get our old jobs twice so far . . . we wanted to eat! It's still great to go home again after a hard day's work and feed-up with Mum's cooking."

Their records are Country and Western, the latest more rockabilly. "We just aren't capable of sing-

ing pop songs," explained Dave. "We like to always sing the songs we record and have a thoroughly happy session. We don't try to sing what we know we're not. It just wouldn't work."

John Wells, RGM Sonics, has shown his respect for Joy and Dave, not only with his endorsement of them but by making all their records.

He's always had faith that "we'd make it one day." Joy and Dave, and her son, Terrie Davis, apart from making our discs for us, also give us much advice on how to do it. We're a lot of demonstration for him and help out whenever he's always on at us to keep on trying.

Comedy

Joy and Dave could be typical of any brother and sister trying to make it in the music business. Their advice to any wannabe is to give it a try. Don't be afraid to start small. "If you're going to do it, come up with a winning disc we're going to need a few more than you probably have in the people who have had faith in us right from the start."

'FLU-HIT' PRESLEY DISC IN

TRUE long-awaited "Rock-A-Hula Baby" by Elvis Presley, held up by illness at Decca, has finally found its way into the charts. It was not without difficulty, which explains why the number one slot is only at number 9.

Initial orders for this disc were very poor, but by the end, Decca had managed to send out only 200,000 copies. Presley's manager says he is not worried, as retailers should now be in possession of their orders.

There are new entries from new artists Danny Williams with "Jeannie," and another return from Chubby Checker with "Twist-A-Long." Coming in at number 18, but shows

every sign of climbing fast, while the future of "The Twist" will have to be left to fate.

Checker's other disc, "Let's Twist Again," has risen five places, and now stands behind "The Young Ones," steadily holding top slot.



. . . just another name for rock?

YES! SAYS DON LANG

WHEN I first heard Twist music, and realized the craze was creeping up on us, my immediate thought was: "Here we go rockin' again!"

Then when, just a week or two ago, Decca phoned and said their offices and it wasn't long before all concerned were in agreement: "We'd better do something to look far for material; it was near enough ready-made for the old rock hits that had last five years."

We started sifting through them at the deejays. We picked "Dance With Me," "Dance With You," "Dance With Me Again," "Dance With You Again," "Twist and Go On." Finally we had enough for the LP, "Top Twenty Dance With You Again Decade's Ace of Clubs" label.

Now rock and Twist affects me in exactly the same way when I'm listening to it with excitement. I set about recording these 20 numbers at top speed.

Ravers

They were all ravers, and they kept me working day and night. I worked right through from 8.30 in the morning till midnight. Couldn't sleep, either.

Of course, you can't adapt all rock numbers. For example, "Heads Up, Honey" won't do. Got too fast. You can't hear the funny coming from me! I mean too fast for the musicians.

Then there's "Rock Around the Clock," "Rock Around the Room," except it's now "Dawn and his Twisters" instead of "The Four Lovers." Still good, though.

Hopefully you will bow my LP and that you'll agree with me. In fact, I'm sure you will. I've been trying to get it accepted when I last had a release, but I can remember thinking I was the last person to believe in the Twist.

Why is the Twist so different from the old rock? Why, for instance, aren't we all slopping around?

NO! SAYS JESS CONRAD

SORRY! I can't agree with you. Maybe that's because I look at the Twist mainly from the point of view of a man dead keen on living; used to do demonstrations at one time. Now he's retired.

Well, I grant you some of the old rock favourites can be much prefer to dance it in new tunes like "Runaround Sue" and "The Wanderer." And I feel more and more new numbers

will be written for the Twist—rather than a revival of rock "standards" coming into existence.

And twisting is so different from rock live. In some ways this is obvious, but not in others. For instance, in the Twist and doing special movements like the Lasso, the dancer is so trying to get musicals like "Carousel," "Pal Joey," "Oklahoma," "South Pacific," big rooms, leaving the lounge for the cabaret performers. 'All Night Long' GOOD JAZZ, BUT PLOT IS WEAK



Bobby Vee gets a pleasant shock at British TV

HERALDED by more than 200 members of his British fan club, and backed by officials from the Liberty Recording Company, Bobby Vee flew into Britain from Amsterdam last Saturday night, to face a very tight and firing schedule.

His first engagement after arriving here, was a trip to ABC's Birmingham studios to record "I'm Gonna Make You Stars," which will be going out on the NBC-TV network on March 3, and to receive our award of a Silver Disc for the sales of "Take Good Care Of My Baby." Brian Matthew handed it over to him during the show.

One of the facts that he'd never even seen was the inside of a British TV studio in his life and performance was polished and well balanced.

Unheard of

"There's no comparison between an English and an American TV show," he told me afterwards. "Over here they all want to do things for you. We were asked after our show if we wanted to go backstage, but practically unheard of back home and all the technicians and working people are very organized."

Bobby admitted the "Lucky Star" show is "better" than the Dick Clark show, but pointed out one big difference.

"On the American Dick Clark, I get to the studio at about 3:35, do my act, and am out of there at 4:30. On the British show, all that's expected of me. Settings on that show are almost non-existent, you just go on and that's it."

"But it's terrific fun, and I'd like to do it again," he said. "I could probably help it."

In fact, television is a medium of which Bobby Vee is very fond,

and he'll better miss out on any opportunity to guest in a programme.

He says that appearing on TV does the sales of my discs the world of good," he said, "but the trouble is I have little time to tour much. I'm still touring, making records, so traveling across country just to travel around in a disc store unless it can be fitted into my schedule."

Bobby Vee has had five consecutive hits in a row, yet the famous Golden Disc still eludes him. "On Silver Discs, we've had five now," he said. "Over here they all want to do things for you. "He's a great guy that found me and signed me up," said Bobby. "He's my greatest friend and a real good person. He's a real pal of the late Buddy Holly, I really thought he was fabulous, and so do I."
