Fast going? Certainly. But I'm not grumbling. And neither are the boys. Not when the money adds up to £35,000!

GREAT FRIDAY NIGHT AT THE COUNTRY CLUB, HAMPSTEAD, N.W.3. 6.30pm. Park Station Lane, Greenford, Middlesex.

That's what we're getting for the film. Which works out at over £11,600 a day. So who worries about lack of sleep? We can always catch up on that!

Our time schedule works out this way:

#### 6.0 a.m.

Mike Smith, Denis Payton and I are sharing a bungalow at St. Anne-on-Sea, and we asked the phone operator to call us at this time—and at quarter-hourly intervals for an hour. You can be sure we only get up on the last ring of the phone!

For remember, we can't possibly have settled down for the night's sleep until 1 a.m. We end our shows at the theatre at 11 p.m., but by the time we get away and back to St. Anne's, it's usually around 12.30.

We like to have a coffee and sandwich, so if I get to bed at one, I'm lucky.

#### 8.0 a.m.

The film company have laid on a private charter plane which leaves Blackpool at 8 a.m. So a car calls for us at the St. Anne's

bungalow in good time to catch that plane. And we have to be ready.

Rick and Lenny are luckier than Mike, Denis and me—they are staying nearer the airport; but they still have to get up early.

We all pile into the "Dove" de Havilland plane, plan our two road managers, John Burgess and Mike Hewittson. Not forgetting the pilot, of course!

#### 9.15 a.m.

We should arrive at the air-strip at Elstree. But if we run into any headwinds, it may take longer. There, cars are waiting to dash us to the studios. I wouldn't mind having my new E-Type Jaguar on hand here—but it's safely tucked away in my bungalow garage.

#### 5.0 p.m.

By this time, we are due back in Blackpool. And we just have to be. For we go on at 6.45. Naturally, we need time to get ready, washed, changed, and so on. It would be no good hitting that stage out of breath!

## TONY TAKES OVER— FROM SEARCHERS!

**E-SEARCHER** Tony Jackson and his new group—to be called Tony Jackson and The Vibrations—last week cut their first single and by a fantastic coincidence they had The Searchers to thank for it!

Pye's studio at Marble Arch had been booked by The Searchers, but when Mike Pender went down with a tooth abscess the boys had to cancel recording plans for future single, EP and LP releases . . . and so Pye asked Tony if he was ready to cut his disc.

Together with organist Martin Raymond (18), guitarist Ian Boisell (20), and 15-year-old Paul Francis on drums, Tony—who had not long chosen the boys after days of arduous auditions—slipped along and recorded four backing tracks, one of which is their debut disc.

## Seasons sizzle up charts with 'Doll'

**T**HE Four Seasons are not newcomers in the charts by any means. They made it big with "Sherry," "Big Girls Don't Cry," "Walk Like A Man" and "Ain't That A Shame" piled up some solid sales successes.

But since those hits there's been a lapse as far as the hit parade is concerned. And all the students of the scene had written them off as has-beens until "Rag Doll" entered DISC's Top Thirty last week at No. 20.

The Four Seasons are Frankie Valli, Bob Gaudio, Nick Massi and Tommy DeVito. Frank, Nick and Tommy originally belonged to an outfit called The Four Lovers, and the Seasons came into business following a personnel shuffle which brought Bob into the team.

### Major part of success

The group invariably includes "the sound of Frankie Valli" in its selling, and this sound is certainly a major part of their success.

Frankie's voice is described as "a fine tenor" one, but actually it sky scrapes into the soprano range more often than not, putting the finishing edge on the Seasons' sound.

Bob was born in the Bronx, and the others boys all hail from nearby New Jersey. As you can guess from their surnames, Italy is the common factor in their ancestry.

They hit the No. 1 spot in the States with "Rag Doll," and they're going to make the British hit parade sizzle with the song as well.

I love sunbathing, swimming and fishing.

I love bird-watching. And, by that, I mean the birds that really fly!

I am just buying a camera, so I shall be able to take pictures of some natural life—if I can work it quick enough.

I shall certainly take my camera to Algiers when I go there on holiday next Saturday. I don't know why, but Algiers has always fascinated me.

I shall make a trip into the Sahara—and I reckon that means going by camel. That should be quite an adventure—I can't quite see myself sitting on one like Lawrence of Arabia!

Reading interests me a lot. I read anything I can lay hands on—particularly books about Black Magic and the Hitler regime of

## Hermits go after a surfing sound

HERMAN'S HERMITS are planning to be the first British group to build their stage act round the "surfing" sound, as well as bringing it into the hit parade with "I'm Into Something Good."

The song shot into the charts last week to make a hat-trick for their recording manager and not a bad start for the three-month-old group.

"Lots of people actually think the record sounds very like the American 'surfing' songs," Herman told me when I spoke to him last week.

"I think it's because of the harmony and the chanting backing. As a group we'd like to enlarge on this surfing idea and build ourselves round it, and so become the first group here to produce it on stage and record."

Herman and his Hermits come from Manchester and are very young. Herman himself is only 16; Keith Hopwood, lead and rhythm guitar, is 17; bass guitarist Karl Green is 17; drummer Barry Whitwam is 18 and Derek Leckenby on lead and rhythm guitar is 21.

"We are so knocked out by the success of the disc," Herman said. "The Animals A and R man Mickie Most saw us at a club in Bolton one night, went to London and the following week had fixed a recording session," said Herman.

# Honeycombs for States if disc goes well

**Jack Good to tape Beatles for U.S.**

JACK GOOD, who produced the "Around The Beatles" show for Rediffusion last April, plans to go to Britain in October to tape a Beatles insert for his Hollywood show "Shindig."

Jack Good aims to include many big British stars on his TV programme which has already netted leading American artists.

**Ria Bartek on 'RSG'**

FRENCH pop star Ria Bartek arrives in this country for an appearance on "Ready, Steady, Go" on September 11.

IT'S all happening for The Honeycombs, who last week smashed their way to the top of DISC's chart and notched up their first Silver Disc award. This week, sales of "Have I The Right" hit the half-million mark, and the single seems poised to repeat its success in the States, where it has just been issued on the Vee Jay label.

American DJs are already raving about the disc, and if it takes off in the States, the Honeycombs may follow through with a promotional trip later in the year.

Currently the group are playing a series of ballroom dates, which include first-time trips to Ireland and Scotland.

They appear at Kidderminster today (Thursday), Lydney tomorrow, Gainsborough (Saturday) Manchester (Sunday), Stourbridge (Wednesday), Stoke-on-Trent (Friday), and Rawtenstall (Tuesday).

They go to Ireland for four days from September 21, and then fly to Scotland until September 28.

Their first LP is expected to be released at the end of September, and at press time there were plans for them to appear in a musical film written by their managers Ken Howard and Alan Blakley, who wrote their hit disc.

On October 17 The Honeycombs join the Millie-Applejacks-Lulu tour which opens at the Finsbury Park Astoria. They have already been signed for a pantomime season at the Stockton Globe.

## Charlie, Inez here

AMERICAN R & B duo Charlie and Inez Fox return to Britain tomorrow (Friday), to appear on "Ready, Steady, Go" the same evening and start a tour with The Rolling Stones on Saturday.

Plans to release a new disc by them to tie-in with the tour have been cancelled and instead their U.S. chart-climber "Mockingbird" will be re-released.

Charlie and Inez will do two weeks of club dates after the tour which ends on October 11.

## Pacemaker marries

A LARGE number of fans turned up at a Liverpool church when Fred Marsden, drummer brother of Gerry, married local girl Margaret Naylor last Saturday.

Gerry acted as best man and the rest of The Pacemakers were also present. The couple are honeymooning on the Costa Brava.

## BIG TOUR FOR DUSTY

DUSTY SPRINGFIELD seen here being presented with her award of a Silver Disc for her latest hit by DJ David Gell, will make a three-week tour of Scandinavia, Germany and France from October 12.

The tour is to promote her records and also to do TV and radio dates. She will spend two weeks in Scandinavia, two days in Germany and four days in France. Dusty—who flew to America on Tuesday—is scheduled to make a guest singing only appearance in a large scale screen musical, and she will film in Hollywood on September 16 and 17. She will sing one song.

At the end of her American appearances she goes to Hawaii and Honolulu and returns home on September 24.

On October 3 she goes to Amsterdam for an appearance on Dutch TV.

Dusty starts her three week tour with Brian Poole on November 11 and goes to South Africa on December 11 for 11 days.

## Ring-A-Ding Ding Adam

A DAM FAITH will appear on the first of the new "Ring-A-Ding Ding" shows on BBC-TV on September 10. He also appears on "Juke Box Jury" on September 19.

His next single will be released on September 11.

## Millie gets Down Under tour in New Year

While she is "Down Under," she may also play dates in Singapore, Japan and Hong Kong.

After her three-week Stateside tour, Millie will fly to Germany to star in a musical film. She will then spend two days in Amsterdam on October 2 and 3 to appear in an international TV show, returning on October 4 to record a "Thank You Lucky Stars" show for transmission the following Saturday.

## Berries with Haley

THE Rockin' Berries—whose new disc "I Didn't Mean To Hurt You" was released last week—have been signed for the Brenda Lee-Bill Haley tour which opens on September 20 at the Birmingham Hippodrome.

On November 9 the group travels to Stockholm for a nine-day tour of Sweden.

HERMAN'S HERMITS, who this week shot up to No. 9 in DISC's Top Thirty with "I'm Into Something Good," will do a major British tour in November. No dates have yet been fixed.

The group goes to Ireland on December 19 for five days and will appear in pantomime at Hanley.

"I'm Crying" cannot be compared with "House Of The Rising Sun" and I rate that as a good thing. But it does retain the distinctive Animals sound—personality organ noise from Alan Price, Eric Burdon's bouncy vocal and an sailing background from the other members.



"Well, we are and we aren't really," said bass guitarist Mike Wakelin. "I mean basically the melody line was the same, of course, but our arrangement was entirely different—much faster and higher."

"I Should Have Known Better" is the boy's second disc.

The Naturals have been formed for a year. They are Bob, Mike, lead singer Ricki Potter, lead guitarist Cort Creswell, rhythm guitarist Doug Ellis and drummer Roy Heather.

They are The Beatles' biggest fans. And have an extraordinary number of connections with them.

## I'M 'KIDNAPPED' BY THE BOYS!

I'M just recovering from one of the most thrilling moments of my life—I'd been "kidnapped" by The Beatles at the end of a chaotic Press conference in New York's Delmonico Hotel!

The Beatles hit New York at 3 a.m. on Friday to be welcomed by at least 3000 fans. And there were more crowds outside the hotel even at that early hour.

The Press conference, called for 5 p.m. was a riot, with cameras flashing, radio news reporters did live shots to listeners already on the air, and the Press asked a succession of questions, ranging from

"What do you think of the topless bathing suits?" to which Ringo replied, "We've been wearing them for years"—to their opinions on the American politics, and The Beatles' effect on the American electorate.

### On the platform

I managed to edge my way to somewhere near the front and stood on a chair. Then, wham! Paul saw me, and all the boys yelled, hello. Their road manager, Ned Aspinall, jumped off the stage, and somehow managed to get through all the people milling in front, grabbed my hand, and took me right on to the platform. I stood there until the conference was over, then one by one, The Beatles came over and gave me a giant smacker of a kiss, grabbed my hand, and led me through the side door and up six flights of stairs to their suite.

We had an hour to spare before the limousine picked them up to take them to a private helipad on the East River, for the helicopter which was to take them out for their first concert at Forest Hills.

They looked tired and as if they'd lost weight, and didn't talk till we got settled in

the suite and had ordered dinner.

"Please send up orders of hamburgers and chips," yelled Ringo to room service. "And some tea, we're thirsty, and it's very hot in here." We were in the living room of their suite, which was completely littered with presents, letters and half their gear.

"It's been really great," said George. "We had no idea we were going to get this much of a reception wherever we went. There have been loads of people, BUT no serious riots."

### A little tired

Ringo said he's feeling a little tired and really wishes he was going back home for some rest.

"Some of our best times have been in the plane," he said. "It seats 50, but there are only 40 of us travelling, which gives us all plenty of leg room. We really enjoy the flight."


"The best bit on the whole tour was the private time we had for two days in Bel Air," said Paul. "We just tired around and relaxed by the pool."
