

Australia's King of the Pops, Normie Rowe, arrived back in Australia to spend Christmas at home.

With no big publicity build up, Normie arrived to see an enthusiastic crowd at Sydney, but was welcomed by only about 400 fans at Melbourne. However, lack of numbers did not, on this occasion, mean lack of enthusiasm and at Melbourne, all policemen and security guards available were needed to safeguard Normie from his ever loving fans. A new confident Normie answered a barrage of hard hitting questions from reporters, and newsmen with ease. Colin and I spoke to Normie at his home the following day surrounded by thousands of Christmas cards. Normie was obviously ecstatic spending Christmas with his parents.

TYPICAL DAY IN LONDON

A typical day in London for Normie consisted of rising at 8 a.m., a visit to the music publishers to go through recording material, then to a musical arranger and perhaps a press interview. At night, it was invariably to

Wasn't Normie ever slightly scared that the reaction to him back home might not be as great?

"Not when I heard how Ooh La La was selling 421/2 thousand in four weeks"

Normie did not feel that being Australian was an obstacle to him - he said. "Australians have always taken a long time to make it in London. Although probably had I been English, it would have helped me, but being Aussie didn't hold me back"

MANY NEW STAGE IDEAS

In London, Normie gained a lot of experience in recording sessions, and on stage Although he did not do very much stage work he has many new ideas. Normie has also developed new confidence in handling repor-

ters. "I was very well prepared for my English press interviews, as I think the Australian press the hardest in the world".

Normie left Australia for London on Wednesday, December 28. The day he arrived in London he was booked to do a television show . . . "the pilot of the new series of Thank Your Lucky Star, compered by Ken Dodd"

He also has another recording session with the Playboys and John Carter and Jeff Steren of "Semi-Detached Suburban Mr. James" and "Winchester Cathedral" fame.




