

It is obvious that he does not realise that Redding's version was recorded as a tribute to the Rolling Stones in return for their recordings of two songs that he originally re-corded — namely "Pain In My Heart" and "That's How Strong My Love Is". RECORD REVIEW

"Peggy Seeger and Tom Palay" (Elektra — originally on British Topic). This little known record is one of the outstanding folk releases by non-traditional singers, in recent times.

Tom Paley (ex.N.L.C.R.), and the great Peggy Seegar.

folk releases by non-traditional singers, in recent times. Tom Paley tex-NL.C.R.1, and the great Peggy Seegar, prove, once again, the value of a serious approach to traditional music, in comparison with which the popfolkies superficially, glibbeas and boothy covirous. In every way this is an excellent record. Their singing is very fine, both together (e.g., "Who's going to shee your pretty little foot") and individually. The instrument work is awe-inspiring but always musical it.e., more than technical brilliance and, if accompani-ment, always complementary, to the vocal. And there is an excellent variety of songs performed — hoedowns, ballads, bawdy songs, tuliables, etc. Paley demonstrates his production and "Pretty Polly" (typical Paley vocal style against a snapping banjo ac-companiment). He also gives a bouncy instrumental "Buckdancers Choice" as learned from Sam McCibee. Some of Peggy Seeger's performances on this record are superb — in particular the broadside ballad "Loving Reilly" in which a magnificent sustained banjo accompani-retinforces Pegg's sensitive vocal. Her volce has lost the barsh edge of many of her earlier English records, and

reinforces Pegg's sensitive vocal. Her voice has lost the harsh edge of many of her earlier English records, and her singing is extremely expressive (without being lastantly theatrical) The Callid Ballad "The Lass of Loch protest song "Englewood Mine" (music by Peggr herself) which is accompanied by a good example of her quiet but firm guidar playing.


The cover notes are, of course, scholarly and informative without being obscure. Altogether this is a record which really deserves superintives.





Tony Worsley started singing because of a jour allment, which he was afflicted with, a child . . . he couldn't whistle! Whereas as a critic . . ne countr't wristle! began singing. Eight years ago, the whole Worsley family (which is made up of Mama and Papa Worsley, and six little Worsleys) were deported to Australia, and consequently made their home in Brisbane. Since then Tony has made a tremendous impact on the Australian Teen Scene. He has recorded six singles, two L.P.'s and appeared on another dozen assorted L.P.'s. All of his singles have made the charts, and his latest record, released on the Sunshine label about two weeks ago, is sure to do as well.
