Storer Puts TEN-Q UpForSale

In a surprising move, Storer Broadcasting has placed KTNQ/ Los Angeles on the block, asking approximately \$10 million for the AM facility. The announcement comes only weeks after Storer Radio Division Vice President Neil Rockoff disclosed plans to flip-flop formats by September on Storer's AM-FM conbination, so that KTNQ would become Country KXAM, and KGBS-FM would turn into a Top 40 station, KHTZ. The circumstances of that announcement were also unusual, as the format switch was announced about three months before it was scheduled to occur, with both stations maintaining their present formats through the summer, causing some advertiser confusion.

Terry Lee, Storer Executive Vice President, Broadcast Division, explained Storer's reasoning for the proposed sale. "When we got looking at our hole cards," he told R&P., "of how long it was going to take to pull this thing out, what it was going to cost, we decided it was more of an investment than we were willing to make. After Neil (Rockoff) had been on deck long enough to analyze where the station stood and how much it would cost to turn it around in the market, he sat down with me and Peter (Storer President of the Company) and we talked about it for two days

We decided we had better things to do, more profitable and more beneficial. Neil thought he could do it. Neil is the guy who changed his mind."

Unanticipated Promotion Problems

Detailing the Storer change of attitude, Lee commented, "The reason that we changed our minds on it is that going in to do all the things we wanted to do turned out to be far more expensive than we wanted." California election campaigns, including the furor surrounding Poposition 13, apparently caused unforseen promotion problems. "You can hardly buy a television spot or a billboard the rest of this year," Lee comments. "If you buy it, you're buying premium rates. It was going to cost us twice as much money as we had budgeted when we went in. We did not anticipate the heavy political year out there or the extremely strong selling on television. The L.A. market is totally saturated.'

Lee stated that TEN-Q would retain its Top 40 format until a sale is completed, which with FCC approval and other potential complications considered, could take some time. Questioned about the (Continued on Page 18) stay since 1961, will switch to a Country format Monday (8-21). The move, which according to General Manager Larry Kirby was a year and a half in the making, follows the most lucrative billing month (July) in the station's history. But according to Kirby, the switch away from Top 40 was inevitable in the long run.

'Take a look around the country," he commented, "and find me a 5000-watt directional AM Top 40 station that is a solid number one in teens and 18-34. And if you can, then let's forecast three years from now. The good ones can hang on longer than the bad ones, and the 50 (thousand-watters)'s may be able to hang on forever. But fidelity and signal strength is a problem. You can either switch from a position of strength or one of weakness. Why not go when you're strong?" Kirby also mentioned that one consideration on the part of WSAI owners Affiliated Broadcasting was the possibility that WKRC in town (recently joined by Randy Michaels, Program Director at successful Kansas City Country outlet WDAF) might switch

The printed news shortage has affected television more than radio, according to several stations contracted by R&R. WNEW-FM news reporter Robin Sagon stated that the station (which simulcasts its news with WNEW-AM) hasn't had to increase newscasts, "because they are already more than ample. They may be a minute or two longer. On the other hand, the local TV affiliates have gone hog wild with news." At 99X, Vice President/ General Manager Erica Farber reports the station began, immediately following the strike, a feature called "99 Seconds of News" in the afternoons. Farber described the feature as "recaps of what's going on." Other stations have added "Broadway hot lines" and similar information services

Advertisers accustomed to newspaper spreads are expected to flock to radio and TV if the strike wears on. At this point, relatively early in the strike (which started August 9), a surge already seems noticeable. WNEW-AM Program Direct-(Continued on page 18)

'unaffected," being Corporate Program Director for Affiliated; he told R&R he planned to relinquish his day-to-day WSAI duties shortly in any case to devote more time to the company's recent acquisitions, KMPS/Seattle and KRAK/ Sacramento.

Kirby added that WSAI's celebrated morning man Jim Scott would probably benefit from the Country format's relative freedom. As for music content, he stated, "We'll probably be as modern as anyone in the country as far as musical selection goes. We'll play anybody on the pop side who has a country-flavored hit."

At 8:03 Sunday night (8-13), KCKN/Kansas City's "Community Hotline" talk show was interrupted by a dozen or so youths armed with clubs and iron pipes. The intruders, who entered the station through an apparently unlocked side entrance, smashed windows and equipment, attacking station personnel as well as the show's featured guest, Michael Breda, an organizer for the neo-Nazi American White People's Party. Breda medical required emergency attention as a result of the beating.

The entire incident was broadcast live, to the horror of KCKN's listeners, who heard approximately 60 seconds worth of metal crashing against metal, glass breaking, muffled grunts and groans, and a barely audible threat ("next time we'll bring a gun'') followed by a curt "let's go." Along with the horror, there was also some confusion, as police who were reportedly listening to the program initially thought the incident was a dramatization similar to the "War Of The Worlds" furor of 1938. According to KCKN Program Director Chris Collier, it wasn't until the police switchboard became jammed with calls that police hurried over to investigate.

Although Breda was rushed to Bethany Medical Center for treatment, he returned to the air about an hour later to complete the program, during which he expressed his belief that "the non-violent repatriation of dark-skinned subhumans would wipe out 90 per cent of the violent crimes in this country."

Also present in the studios at the

time of the assault were an unidentified member of the AWPP, KCKN staff members Roger Collins and Dan Roberts, and the show's host, News Director Mark Elliott, all of whom sustained mild injuries.

While police are still investigating the incident, several news organizations have reported receiving anonymous phone calls from a person identifying himself as a member of the International Committee Against Racism and the Progressive Labor Party, who claimed credit for the assault, which police now say was carried out by an integrated group, including at least one woman. However, because the assailants entered through an unlocked door, there was some suspicion that the incident was a setup by Breda's organization.

At a news conference Monday, Verl Wheeler, General Manager of the Country-formatted station, issued the following statement: "In the area of public affairs and news, we feel today, as we did yesterday, that we have an obligation to present programs from all walks of life and not from any specific groups. We are sorry that some people seem to feel that it would be right for them to have freedom of speech, but not others."

Chris Collier added, "In our public affairs programming, we've always operated on the theory that we'd let them hang themselves. When Breda returned to the show, most of the people were calling up and laughing at him. What's frightening to me," he continued, "is that this attack came in the heartland of America. Not in New York or San Francisco, but here in Kansas.

KDAY Joins Radio Ranks Of Stones "Some Girls" Protesters

KDAY/Los Angeles joined a lengthy list of Black-formatted radio stations and other organizations protesting a line in the title track of the Rolling Stones' "Some Girls" album, and learned that the group's label, Rolling Stones Records, would be releasing an edited version of the song with the offensive line omitted.

KDAY News Director Roger Aldi fashioned a two-part special on-air presentation on the controversy. One part began with the music to the "Some Girls" cut. Aldi in a voiceover stated, "If you thought the 'Short People' was offensive, listen to this line," and played the couplet in question: Black girls just want to get (bleeped) all night/I just don't have that much jam." Aldi's comments resumed: "That line is pure racist, sexist stereotyping ... at least that's what a lot of people are saying. They're saying we don't need any more of that kind of garbage on the radio . . . We here at KDAY are not uninvolved with the controversy; in fact, we thought it might be wise not to play anything from the Stones as long as they refused. to recognize and care for other people's sensitivities." Numerous other Black stations had also instituted partial or total bans on Stones product.

Just A "Joke"

Rolling Stones Records President Earl McGrath was then presented by Aldi, explaining: "None of it was meant to be serious . . . It's just a little song that's a joke about men's attitudes about women." Aldi cut in at this point: "But as can happen, jokes backfire. Remember, Earl Butz told a joke and lost his job as Secretary of Agriculture." McGrath then resumed: "We're terribly sorry if we offended anybody. We're doing an edit on it, and the line will be out."

McGrath confirmed to R&R that the edited version of "Some Girls" will be available next week, and added, "Out of context, the line is horrible. In context, I think it's complimentary."

Earthquake Rocks Santa Barbara; Radio Responds

An earthquake measuring 5.1 on the Richter scale rocked Santa Barbara, California at approximately 3:45pm, Sunday (8-13). Although a train was derailed and a reported 100 people were treated for injuries, only about ten of those were seriously injured. Local radio personnel were considerably shaken up, however.

"It felt like a sonic boom," said KTMS Music Director Mark Giles, who was on the air at the time. "Sometimes," he continued, "there's a big boom and things jerk a little

San Diego Broadcasters Worried Over XTRA Competition

XTRA-FM, located south of San Diego's Mexican border, apparently plans to boost power to 100,000 watts and rock the city's airwaves by September 15; and local broadcasters are generally upset. An organization called CERF (Committee for Equality in Radio Frequencies), headed by KSON President Dan McKinnon, has been formed to combat XTRA-FM's entry into the market.

100.000-WATT MEXICAN ROCKER

The committee is preparing to petition the FCC on several points, including a section of the 1934 Communications Act requiring an FCC permit to transport programming across a border for rebroadcast into the U.S. They also cite a recent U.S.-Mexico treaty which stipulates that FM stations be operated "for the basic purpose of providing an effective service to its nationals within its frontiers. 
problem, as KCBQ General Manager Mike Stafford puts it, is XTRA's Mexican licensee status. "The problem transcends XTRA-FM having a lot of power. The problem is it's a Mexican radio station and it's not going to be sanctioned by the same requirements we are. It could conceivably become very difficult to compete with them. They won't be regulated the way we are."

"Philosophy" Of Opposition McKinnon provided R&R with some background on the case, recalling that CERF was formed in 1972 to combat XHIS and XHERS, two border stations aiming for the American market which soon went out of business. He stated, "It's nothing against XTRA. It's a philosophy. The San Diego broadcasters feel that Mexican stations are licensed to serve Mexicans. All we're asking is for the FCC to see to it that XTRA-FM conforms to that." McKinnon added that the Mexican government often interprets the "service to Mexicans" concept as bringing in maximum dollars, which U.S.-slanted formats tend to do

McKinnon claimed "unanimous" support from San Diego broadcasters, adding, "There's not a dissenter there." KGB-AM-FM General Manager Jim Price's response was less impassioned. "Why react to something until it's real? But if it becomes reality, KGB will individually meet the challenge."

John Lynch, former KFMB/B100 General Sales Manager and GM of Noble Multimedia Communications, XTRA's new owners, is trying to assure San Diego broadcasters that XTRA will play by American rules. In interviews with several publications, he stressed that the station is an NAB member and will abide by that organization's code, and that XTRA will "contribute to bit, and that's what I figured it was. Then everything started shaking around. Then it really started shaking and records started falling all around, a large piece of equipment almost tipped over, and some of the dangling speakers started shaking. Then I realized that it was an earthquake. Our AM station immediately went off the air and our FM continued broadcasting. So I tried to get the AM back on the air, and a few seconds later the PD (Bob Senn) came back in-he was just across the street shopping-so he came rolling in on the air saying we've had an earthquake and to keep calm.'

KTMS news director Tim Yearwood said that while damage to the station was "nothing serious—a little bit of cracked plaster," the transmitter at their AM tower (Continued on Page 18)



Cooper, Beer Resign At 20th

Harvey Cooper, Senior Vice President for A&R/Promotion at 20th Century Fox Records, and three other label executives have resigned from the company. Cooper commented to R&R, "I've got an office in Beverly Hills now, and I'll probably be going to New York soon. What I'm looking for is my own label or production or publishing company, or a control situation ..." A statement from 20th President Alan Livingston ascribed Cooper's

resignation to "policy differences." Also resigning were Vice President of Promotion Lenny Beer, National Singles Promotion Director Toni Profera, and National Publicity Director Marian Kornicki. No replacements have yet been named for any of the four resigned executives, although newly-appointed A&R Director Harvey Bruce is supervising A&R activities.

Buddah Sues CBS, Gladys Knight

Buddah Records has filed suit in New York against Gladys Knight and her new label, CBS Records, seeking an injunction against CBS releasing Knight product. Knight's affiliation with CBS was announced at the company's recent convention, but Buddah claims to have a valid contract with the singer, who sued Buddah and its distributor, Arista Records, for breach of contract recently. Buddah is contemplating further suits against Knight and CBS for restraint of trade.

Pushing PSA's

Should licensees receive special credit for broadcasting public service announcements in drive time? That question was raised again last week during a regular Commission meeting. The Commission is asking its Policy and Rules Division of the Broadcast Bureau to look into this and make recommendations. The Commission is curious as to the number of announcements stations air, their length, time aired, subject matter and source

The Commission decided to study PSA's because of suggestions from public interest groups claiming that the bulk of them are broadcast when listenership is minimal, even though stations are under an obligation already to demonstrate that PSA's are relevant and beneficial to the community. Also heard frequently from public interest groups is a cry criticizing broadcasters' reliance upon national campaigns produced by the Advertising Council. But smart radio people have used national material after localizing it to give a well-produced boost to community groups.

PSA's & Public Affairs Programming

What should be the relationship between PSA's and public affairs programming? Supposedly the Policy and Rules Division will also examine this issue. Already, FCC Chairman Charles Ferris has requested that the Broadcast Bureau note times when public affairs programming is locked into graveyard hours. According to Neal McNaughton, Assistant Chief for the bureau, nothing to date has been completed on this request. Possibly also the Policy and Rules Division will make recommendations along the line of giving a station that is deficient in public affairs programming credit for its PSA record. If that were the case, for example, it would help station WQAL-FM/Cleveland, which is in trouble with the Commission for failure to meet its proposed public affairs programming goals, but claims to have aired numerous PSA's the majority of which it says were locally produced. Heading the investigation for the Commission is Bonnie Lea, Legal Branch Chief of the Policy and Rules Division. What radio broadcasters have to fear is a recommendation from Ms. Lea's shop that might turn out to be some sort of a guideline resulting in increased paperwork for radio licensees

Tools Of The Trade

"Griffin Bell should be sent to jail," the President of the Radio/TV News Directors Association said last week. Ernie Schultz, who also runs the news operation at KTVY-TV/Oklahoma City, made the remark last week after suggesting that a New York Times reporter be freed. "Of course we do not really advocate that Bell be jailed," said Schultz; but, he went on, "both men have disobeyed court orders for what they believe to be constitutional reasons" and Myron Farber, the Times reporter, is injail

Farber is a name that should be on the tongue of every broadcaster. What is at stake is the confidentiality of reporters' sources versus the courts' abilities to make reporters turn over their lists of news sources. Farber commented initially that "a reporter only has so many tools to use." Confidentiality is as essential as a notepad, pencil, or microphone. Farber's refusal to obey the court order to turn over material has landed him in jail. Bell on the other hand has committed the same offense, the RTNDA notes, by refusing to turn over to a judge a list of informers which he says would violate the constitutional separation of powers, in a recent case involving the Socialist Workers Party.

FCC Chairman Criticizes Rewrite

It was more of the same when FCC Chairman Charles Ferris went back before Cong. Lionel Van Deerlin last week to talk specifics relating to H.R. 13015 - the proposed new rewrite of the Communications Act. To date, Van Deerlin has been unable to muster much support for his bill. It is no longer being referred to as the Communications Act of 1978, and publicly Van Deerlin admits that he'll have to wait until next year and try again

Chairman Ferris was participating in the latest round of hearings which dealt with domestic and international common carrier regulation provisions. Testimonies didn't involve discussions concerning broadcastings; however, reading between the lines, one could easily see in Mr. Ferris' remarks lip service being given to the bill's philosophical premise of greater reliance upon marketplace forces and less upon regulation, while advocating "new regulatory solutions for new regulatory problems." The emphasis we feel was on new regulations. A second overall concern of the Chairman's also would have impli-

cations for broadcasters. Ferris is concerned with provisions in the new bill which would transplant policy-making authority from the FCC, which is answerable to Congress (a broad base), to a new agency, the National Telecommunications Agency, which would answer only to the Executive Branch of government (a narrow base)

Hear No Evil . . . Speak No Evil

Suppose that you're used to buttonholing FCC commissioners or staff at conferences, or if you're really upset, just picking up the phone and calling someone at the Commission, to let them know what you think of a proposed rule. Chances are that for the past year and a half, your comments haven't been too well received. Now, they're forbidden unless you make them in writing and only to the Secretary of the Commission, or unless you are willing to first submit in writing a memo summarizing your points (if you plan to call, you must first mail in your summary). At that point, you will be permitted to review orally the points that you would like to make with the individual to whom you are talking. But, if you stray from your original subject, then the commissioner or staffer must report the additional conversation.

Right now this rule applies to issues like clear-channel, PSA's and third class requirements. Probably very soon it will also apply to remarks you might like to make regarding AM stereo and FM quad. Why? Because certain court cases have clouded the relationship between the regulators and the regulated. Therefore, the FCC was asked to clarify its position and in so doing has placed strict requirements on broadcasters and Com-mission employees. The change is a far cry from the days when former Chairman Richard Wiley would tell radio people, "My door is open." It's hard to determine, however, if even Wiley's philosophical commit-ment to "open government," which won him a great deal of personal respect among all factions of the communications industry, could have withstood current pressures.

The case in favor of this decision is not so clear as the case that can be made against it. By restricting communication, say the Commission's critics, the FCC is 1) ignoring that there is no history of abuse, 2) placing a burden on smaller operations that don't have time for additional paperwork, and 3) overenforcing its policy with broadcasters who have taken time to submit written comments.

Arkansas Broadcasters Fired Up Over Razorback Football

"We're going to raise all the hell we can." says Buddy Deane, president of KOTN AM-FM/Pine Bluff, Ark. Deane, along with 98% of Arkansas broadcasters, has aired University of Arkansas football games over the past years. Now, with Mutual Broadcasting Co. having bought rights to all the Southwest Conference games, including Arkansas, radio sta-tions in that state will find out how the "network" game is played in most states. Mutual, which distributes games to over 200 Southwest affiliates, is lining up stations for exclusive coverage, with stations in six markets being required to carry the "game of the week" regardless of the teams playing. That also upsets the Arkansas broadcasters, who last week heard a recommendation at their annual association meeting which included asking the state legislature for help in protecting stations who will lose the games

Mutual's Executive VP Gary Worth is calling the association's attempts "smokescreen," noting that there will be .io loss of coverage to the public."Ninety-nine point six percent of people in Arkansas," he claims, "will still receive the games." But the previous situation was one of the university providing any station wishing to carry the games the right to do so at a minimal cost. For example, in Pine Bluff, five stations carried the games last year and all five sold out their entire advertising schedule. "It doesn't matter what station you hear the game on," said Deane, "there was cooperation among all the stations."

on 3rd class exams in order to study harder when retaking the test. R&R walked this one over to the Commission. Commissioners promised to check into the question, recalling that persons taking a bar exam are usually told which questions are missed. We also talked to Joe Casey of the FOC's Field Operations Bureau who supervises the admin-

istration of the tests. Casey says that since announcers are often the only people around to perform the meter readings that the Commission feels compelled to license them. As for telling broadcasters what they missed, he says that the FCC is not in the education business and that he doesn't have the staff for that. Moreover, the real answer appears to be twofold: 1) the Commission's attitude remains one of "that's

the way it's always been done" and 2) lobbying against any changes by professional engineering societies who fear that if 3rd class requirements are done away with, that the Commission might also consider doing away with 1st and 2nd licenses, thus reducing the number of dues-paying members

However, NAB and others have urged the Commission to examine doing away with licenses entirely as is the case in most every country. The FCC said okay to looking at the elimination of the 3rd class ticket. comments were filed in January, and radio broadcasters are waiting to see what the Commission will do. Part of that inquiry deals with having two types of licenses - one for routine operations and a separate license depending upon the engineering characteristics of individual stations that deals with maintenance.

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Arguments in favor of no requirement hold that a station licensee is ultimately responsible for what goes over the air and should therefore be left alone to hire the best available people regardless of whether of not they are licensed.

Washington Street Talk

The FCC disciplined one of its employees last week by forcing his early retirement. R&R has learned that the Commission's Public Information Officer, Sam Sharkey, was caught leaking an advance text of the Commission's agenda to a Washington-based trade publication. Sharkey had held his position for four years. Rumor has it that the Chairman's office, out to stop all leaks, wanted Sharkey fired; but that calmer heads prevailed and he was permitted to take an early retirement.

With the Billboard International Program Forum pulling only an estimated 300 or 400 participants last week, mostly from the record industry, look for NAB, which has a preregistration approaching 800, to widen its margin in the battle for attendees with a large gate crowd. Wayne assumed responsibility for the conference upon being named VP for Radio three months ago. The NAB sessions kick off this Sunday at the Downtown Regency, Chicago. Cost for 3-day event is \$140. Pat Brame, who for awhile worked for the House Subcommittee on Communications, and was later fired

from NRBA over a rift with Executive Director John Richer, will join San Francisco based Jennings Broadcast and Creative, Inc. as Assistant VP of Administration. The Jennings company is an aggressive sales marketing consultancy firm. Kim Haggard, a recent U. of Maryland communications graduate joins the Radio/TV New Directors Association as Assistant to Managing Director Len Allen. Kim replaces Marion Mattenback, who will become News and Public Affairs Director at WKMS/Murray, Ky. Following FCC refusal to intervene in the Stoner case, in which the Georgia gubernatorial candidate's

commercials using the word "nigger" were aired over local TV stations, Georgia St. Senator Julian Bond and the Atlanta NAACP have sued the Commission. The suit contends that if the FCC can ban "seven dirty words," they can certainly ban racial slurs as well.

NBC Study Of Working Women Boosts Radio

NBC Radio has compiled a study of working women and their increasing impact on the job market and spending patterns. The study indicates that almost 54 percent of women 18-64 work outside the home at present, and the company projects that figure to reach 60 percent in 12 years. The study points out increased income for two-paycheck families, and substantially higher levels of purchasing of major items by working women than housewives. And, tying the figures into radio, the study claims that working women watch much less TV than their stay-at-home counterparts, but listen to radio more often. Only 8.4 percent of working women watched TV between 10am-4:30pm, compared to 18.2 percent for housewives, according to Nielson figures from November 1977, while in prime time 44.8 percent of workers and 48 percent of housewives were viewers. The study estimated that TV reaches 91 percent of the weekly cumulative audience of working women, while radio reached 97.2 percent.

Sears Advertising Cutback Feared

A number of advertising industry observers have pointed to a possible massive advertising cutback by Sears, Roebuck & Co. Sears has announced a large-scale reevaluation of product promotion and media scheduling, and certain sources have claimed that the end result will be a cutback of up to \$100 million. Sears spent \$650 million in advertising last year. Most of the projected cuts would affect print and TV.

FCC Ends Inquiry Into AT&T Wire Service Rates

The FCC has ended its inquiry into **AT&T**'s phone line rates for wire services. The Commission had ordered AT&T to halt its lower rate system for wire services in 1975, claiming it was discriminatory, and after court battles had been resolved, higher rates went into effect this January. The FCC opened its latest inquiry in order to let wire services attempt to prove the higher rates affected their news delivering ability, but the services declined to pursue the matter, citing the costs of the FCC proceedings and their hopes that satellite transmissions would end their need for private phone lines.

TV News

NBC, "Holocaust," "All In The Family" Among Emmy Leaders

Emmy Award nominations were announced last week, with NBC leading all networks with 123 nominations for 13 programs and 110 individuals. ABC garnered 92 nominations for 10 shows and 82 people, while CBS received 88 nominations (10 programs, 78 individuals). PBS and syndicated shows accounted for 45 other nominations. The actual awards will be given out during a September 17 telecast from Pasadena.

The NBC special series "Holocaust" won 16 Emmy nominations to top all other programs. CBS's "All In The Family" led all regular series with nine, trailed closely by "MASH," "Saturday Night Live," and "Carol Burnett." "Holocaust" competes with NBC's "King," ABC's "Washington: Behind Closed Doors," and two PBS specials for the Outstanding Limited Series award. In the comedy series field, "All In The Family" battles CBS's "MASH" and three ABC series, "Three's Company," "Soap," and "Barney Miller." Dramatic series nominees are "Lou Grant" (CBS), "Family" (ABC), and NBC's "Quincy," "Rockford Files," and "Columbo." Comedy-variety series in competition include "The Muppet Show," "Carol Burnett," "Saturday Night Live," and "America 2Night."

Music On TV

A special featuring acts filmed at Billboard's Disco Forum earlier this year has been developed in association with the J. Walter Thompson agency's production arm. Artists include Donna Summer, Andy Gibb, Tavares, Peter Brown, Chic and the Village People... On the subject of disco, the new syndicated series "Hot City" (R&R 8-11) featured air personality Shadoe Stevens as host, and its theme song was co-written by songwriter Alee Willis... CBS will present a two-hour special based on Ray Charles's autobiography, "Brother Ray, Ray Charles' Own Story"... The Pat Boone family has agreed with ABC to do two holiday specials and a possible weekly series to develop out of them. The first special will air during Thanksgiving ... And, ending on an extraterrestial note, "Close Encounters Of The Third Kind" has been sold to ABC for an undisclosed price.

ABC, NBC In Virtual Tie For Nielsen Lead

ABC and NBC ended up in a dead heat for the lead in Nielsen's ratings for the week ending August 6, with ABC just edging NBC in average share tabulations. ABC and NBC both had 14.7 average ratings, while CBS fell to an unhealthy 12.7. Interestingly, CBS boasted four top ten entries (including two of the top three), while NBC mustered only a ninth place ranking, with ABC mopping up the rest of the positions.

"One Day At A Time" (CBS) led all contenders, followed by 2) "Three's Company" (ABC) 3) "Alice" (CBS) 4) "Charlie's Angels" (ABC) 5) "Starsky & Hutch" (ABC) 6) "Laverne & Shirley" (ABC) 7) "MASH" (CBS) 8) "Carter Country" (ABC) 9) "Quincy" (NBC) and 10) "Barnaby Jones" (CBS).

Arbitron's rankings for the week ending August 4 showed CBS taking seven of ten placings for New York, but failing to qualify for one top ten berth in Los Angeles, where ABC nearly pulled off a total sweep. CBS's "The Jøffersons" and "One Day At A Time" tied for first in New York with ABC's "Love Boat," followed by 4) "MASH" 5) "Fantasy Island" 6) "Good Times" 7) "Alice" and "Lou Grant" tied, and 9) another tie between "Charlie's Angels" and "Switch."

In Los Angeles, "Charlie's Angels" ruled the roost, followed by 2) "Laverne & Shirley" tied with "Three's Company" 4) "Love Boat" and "Starsky & Hutch" tied 6) "Fantasy Island" tied with independent Metromedia station KTTV's broadcast of a Dodgers game 8) "Carter Country" and 9) "Happy Days" tied with NBC's "Quincy."

California Courts Continue Coverage By Broadcasters

Following the recent Pasadena Municipal Court decision to permit broadcast coverage of court trials (R&R 8-4), an L.A. Superior Court judge has declared California's Rule 980 (which prohibits such coverage) to be unconstitutional, and has allowed broadcast equipment in his courtroom. Judge Harry T. Shafer also ordered the release of audio recordings of a 1977 trial for broadcast, and stated that the Rule was "constitutionally defective" on First and 14th Amendement grounds. Judge Shafer added that despite the dangers of media coverage, the public's right to know was of paramount importance.

San Juan Racing To Sell WTMI/Miami

San Juan Racing Association has entered into an agreement to sell WTMI-FM/Miami, a classicalformat station, for about \$1 million to a group called Marlin Limited Partnership. The buyers are headed by WEFM/Chicago Sales Manager Howard Philip Tanger.

Sonderling Shows Substantial Income Increase

Sonderling Broadcasting reports significant increases in both profits and gross income for the first half and the second quarter this year. Net income for the first half reached \$1.42 million, a 43 percent jump over last year's first half figure of \$992,000. Revenues climbed from \$13.8 million to \$18.9 million, a 37 percent rise. For the second quarter, sales were up 35 percent from \$7.7 million to \$10.4 million, while profits rose a corresponding 34 percent, \$789,000 to \$1.06 million.

Buick Buys Into CBS Radio NFL Broadcasts

Buick will be a participating sponsor for the CBS Radio Network's fall schedule of 26 regular season and 10 postseason NFL football broadcasts. Buick spots will be heard in each game starting September 4.

CBS Cofounder Leon Levy'Dies

Dr. Leon Levy, one of the founders of the Columbia Broadcasting System and a radio pioneer, died last week at 83. He became President/General Manager of WCAU/Philadelphia in 1925. overseeing the first major league baseball broadcast and a number of other radio innovations. In 1926 he helped form a network of radio stations which would become CBS, and he served as CBS's Secretary/Treasurer for eight years and as a board member until 1977.

RAB Reports Radio's Reach Tops All Media

Radio reaches more adults in a day or week than any other major daily advertising medium, according to **RAB** Senior Vice President of Marketing & Research **Richard J. Montesano**. The organization used several disparate measurement sources to determine its figures, which claim that in a week radio reaches 95 percent of adults (18 plus), compared to TV's 90 percent and newspapers' 84 percent. In a day, radio reaches 81 percent, while TV reaches 76 percent and newspapers 69 percent. Montesano commented, "This documentation is the latest indication to advertisers and agencies of radio's ability to get their message out rapidly to more different consumers than newspapers or TV."



More PD changes ... Bob McClain leaves as PD of WTMA/Charleston to take over AM drive for Pop/Adult KULF/Houston.


Is Martin Mull going to sign with Elektra/Asylum? Does anyone still have their Martin Mull socks?

The consensus seems to be that music is getting great again! It does happen . . . music goes in cycles. There are times when programmers cannot find the kind of music they want to put on their radio stations and then suddenly along comes a flurry of terrific new releases that are literally screaming for airplay. We seem to have entered just such a period with new releases from major acts dominating the national airplay activity. But look back for a moment, then glance at the calendar and it all begins to look familiar.

In 1977 the song of the year was Debby Boone's "You Light Up My Life," which hit number one on the R&R National Airplay/30 in October. Two years ago in 1976 the song of the year was "If You Leave Me Now" by Chicago, which topped our National Airplay/30 in September. For the last two years the eventual winner in the number one song of the year derby has been released in late summer or early fall. This broke a four year trend dating back to 1972 when the song of the year came from late winter or early spring.

A lot of factors come into play regarding the release of records. Concert tours during the summer, the timing of a release to coincide with kids going back to school — and of course it's always nice to get your new release out and established before the dreaded fall ARB. Whatever the reasons it looks like some good music is again upon us. That's certainly the readout I've been getting on the phone from our reporting stations over the past two weeks. Do I dare predict another great book for Top 40 radio in general this fall? Sure . . . the music's getting better by the week, and besides, I am a total optimist!

This week: a welcome to our new reporting stations, some dock-side diplomacy in San Diego, the chain of command is fully explained, and those promotions just keep on comin'

Next week, we take a look at "Teen Music" for better or for worse. Why some stations refuse to play it and why some record companies are getting nuts over records that sell big but can't get on the air. It's a problem we all deal with and should make for some interesting reading.

Chain Of Command

In every organization from Exxon to RKO there exists a certain order, a ranking, a chain of command. Now since many of us enter at (shall we say) the lower levels of this chain of command and then attempt to ascend I thought it might be helpful to more clearly define just what sort of behavior differentiates one position from another within the fun realm of broadcasting.

With tongues firmly planted in our cheeks and a creative tip of the dunce cap to G100/ Mobile copywriter Les McDill, let us examine (from the top down) a typical radio station. THE OWNER: Leaps tall buildings in a single bound. Is more powerful than a loco-

THE PRODUCTION DIRECTOR: Rolls near the side of station van. Is run over by locomotive. Can sometimes handle a gun without hurting himself. Walks on puddles left by passing dogs. Talks to animals.

THE SALES MANAGER: Can enter buildings with the aid of a doorman. Recognizes locomotives two times out of three. Is not allowed to handle live ammunition. Can hold breath for a long time under water. Talks to walls.

THE COPYWRITER: Gazes in awe at revolving doors. Says, "Look at the choo-choo!" Aspires to position of dart catcher. Plays in mud puddles. Mumbles to himself.

THE AIR PERSONALITY: Lifts buildings and walks under them. Kicks locomotives off their tracks. Catches speeding bullets in his teeth and chews them up. Freezes water at a glance. He is God!

If things aren't just like that at your radio station then there's no time like the present to get right to work on it. And good luck!

Hands Across The Ocean

Everything about the written request received at KMJC/San Diego was unusual. The letter was addressed to "The Most Popular Radio Station, San Diego, California, USA." Apparently the person at the post office who received the letter was a big fan of Magic 91 because KMJC's PO box number was written on the envelope and the request was on its way to Roger W. Morgan, the station's Program Director.

It was an invitation for the staff of the radio station to join the crew members of the HMS Juno, a frigate of the British Navy, on board for a celebration of their arrival in San Diego. Along with the invitation was a request for the station's staff to bring along "30 females between the ages of 25-30."

Now right away you figure you've got a potential international incident on your hands, right? Not so. Roger knew exactly what to do, and immediately called Rhonda Bosworth, the leader of the San Diego Chargers' cheerleaders, The Chargettes. After a fast clearance from the Chargers front office, it was arranged that the girls would join the KMJC crew abroad the Juno. or Dean Tyler cited a "substantial" increase in advertising. Farber commented, "Up until this last week, we didn't really see anything happen, because people still didn't have an indication of how long the strike was going to last.... The first thing we did was call our regular advertisers and our reps to make sure they'd be treated fairly."

NYMRAD, the New York market radio broadcasters association, has also mailed a letter to newspaper advertisers detailing radio's reach and other strong points, with an attached list of NYMRAD stations and their sales managers.

99X is apparently virtually sold out for the summer already, a condition shared by other metropolitan stations. That circumstance has forced advertisers to seek suburban radio stations, a situation which has worked to the benefit of stations such as WBAB/Long Island. News Director Joel Martin told R&R, "There has been a significant increase in advertising. We're all sold out. Advertisers are clamoring to get time on the air." Long Island faces a different news situation, as the area's largest daily paper, Newsday, is unaffected by the strike. However, the spinoff from the metropolitan newspaper strike has still proved a boon to the suburban advertising picture.

future of air personalities and other staffers now with (or recently hired by) the station, Lee said, "We have not said we're selling the FM and we think the FM is good in the market. We plan to be there. I think you'll also find we have a good reputation for taking care of our people." Contrasting reports in the broadcast community indicate that Storer would be willing to sell the FM along with the AM if the right deal came along. Sources quoted the FM premium at 2 to 3 million dollars. Commenting on reaction to TEN-Q's availability, Lee said, "There has been a surprising amount of interest at surprisingly high dollars. We've had very good response."

Storer's announced intention to sell marks the end of a stormy attempt to gain Los Angeles Top 40 supremacy. TEN-Q started up in December 1976, and the experiment resulted in several shifts in its Top 40 orientation, changes at the Program Director and General Manager levels (Jeff Williams has just been appointed GM for KTNQ/ KGBS), and the recent confusion over the format flip-flop, before Storer finally decided to surrender.

San Diego/Mexican Standoff

At this point, the situation for San Diego broadcasters is at an impasse. McKinnon explains that XTRA-FM does not presently penetrate San Diego sufficiently to allow the FCC to "accept our filing." But, he adds, "As soon as they go up in power, XTRA can count on us knocking on the FCC door the next day."

> Jock Takes Classical Powder

Across town at KTYD News Director Jerry DeWitte reported: "There was very minor damage everywhere and nobody got hurt. We're on the top floor of the tallest building in town (eight stories) and we had a few record racks dumped over. The person who was on the air put on a long piece of classical music and left the station until he found out how bad things were going to be. But we weren't knocked off the air and were back on very soon trying to alleviate panic, giving out phone numbers like who to call and when to call where. Basically we tried to keep the music going and broke in when necessary.

According to David Oeberst, news reporter at KIST, Santa Barbara's Top 40 station, "Most of the damage consisted of all the equipment coming off the walls. Jack Kinney, the jock who was on the air, was bruised up pretty badly and we went off the air for about 10 minutes-just long enough for us to put things back together."

Coping With The Quake

When KIST returned they immediately sent their mobile units, (station cars equipped with twoway radios, which they call KIST Cruisers) into operation. Acting News Director Joanna Van Dyke went to the County Sheriff's Department and set up a mobile command center for information which sent live reports to the station, where **Music Director Dick Williams had** set up an informal news central. Through this, they were able to dispatch cars into the various areas, sending in reports after almost every record.

Oeberst described the situation: "I went out to Goleta, the community just north of us, which was the hardest hit, and taped interviews with everybody from the tower controller to the public works people to the fire department. I was basically following trucks around covering all that for stories. We were on the air all night-we

usually go off at 12 or 2 o'clock, but we stayed on the air all night. Things calmed down after a couple of hours but we were still on the air," as the area finally returned to normal.

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The New Generation

Speed

I'd like to thank all of you who have called or written me. It's good to know there are so many of us that feel the same way about Black Radio's future.

One thing I'd like to bring to your attention is the excellent August special Issue of Ehony, which contains a wealth of insights into the "New Generation" of blacks, focusing primarily on the 18-30 demographic groups which make up about 65 percent of the current black population. It's a potential \$80 billion market, which if it were a separate country, would be the eighth largest in the world.

The Ebony article points out, "This generation is a product of a completely new situation and is therefore a new and different generation, not in the sense of a new variation on an old theme, but in the more fundamental sense of a new theme with new music and new rhythms."

Many of you program directly to this group daily and probably have some insight as to what they're about. If you look closely, these findings may help you understand them. "New yet old, powerful and yet powerless, the new generation is a generation looking for a purpose, a theme, and a unifying idea. It has no voice yet. The nearest thing to a generational voice perhaps is **Stevie Wonder**, who was four years old when the **Supreme Court** abolished legal segregation. However, the new generation is economically oriented; they are an optimistic, pragmatic, and materialistic group." The common approach to reach this segment of the market has been "to put **Bill Cosby or Sammy Davis**, Jr. in a commercial that will appeal toblacks and whites."

Because of their recent emergence, this new generation has been one of the harder groups to penetrate. Part of the reason has been the myths surrounding the black consumer, the most persistent of which are "blacks are exceptionally brand loyal." The reasoning behind this myth was that blacks have historically tended to trust what they know, but now, with increasing sophistication and mobility, they are more willing to try new products. That openness to new things applies to radio, too. Much of the success of new formats playing a wide variety of music like those of WBLS and other radio innovators is down to the "New Generations" changing musical tastes and willingness to accept new radio approaches. One survey, by the way, has indicated this age group spends about 40 percent of its time listening to radio.

A second myth is that "blacks are less style conscious." All you have to do is walk down Madison or Park Avenues and look at your black professional men and women. I would go so far as to say that during the last decade, many major style trends have originated from the black community. The new black generation overwhelmingly prefers "soul music"; jazz is second. But in third place comes rock (38 percent) a predominately white kind of music, ahead of the blues.

Roper Survey Sample

The Ebony article featured detailed surveys from the Roper organization. Here's the music survey:

Q: Which two or three of the kinds of music on this card do you like best?

This foundation began when most of us in the 18-30 group were in adolescence or high school. At that time the music and issues of the day were incubating the crossfusion of cultures. The Temptation and Supremes (among others) were as appealing to whites as Blowd, Sweat & Tears and Chicago were to blacks (both were original cross-barrier music forms). AOR radio at the time (the 60's) was the outlet for more progressive methods. This vehicle allowed many of the more popular black acts exposure to a totally different but receptive audience. This was the beginning of a fusion that today celebrates Stevie Wonder as the highest paid entertainer in music history and a black woman as a "Bunny" in the current issue of Playboy.

Eugene D. Jackson, President of the National Black Network, a nationwide radio network aimed at the black audience, said, "Advertisers have for the most part neglected this vital segment of the economy, which last year amounted to \$80 billion. One approach to this group is to assume there are certain unique elements in the black experience, then focus on these elements." Here's where specialized programming comes in, dealing specifically with your particular market.

Futhermore, Jackson says, "There are some instances where a single approach works; for example, a beer commercial which shows a racially mixed group of construction workers. Since this situation is common to the black male, he can identify with it. But commercials pitched to middle income suburbia totally miss the majority of blacks, who are by and large either urban dwellers or rural poor." Ebony backs the statement up: "There can be no complaceney about this cohort of young blacks. The largest proportion of the income spectrum for this age group (18-30), 44 percent, is found in the under \$7000 a year level and the \$15,000 and over portion is only 16 percent, leaving another 40 percent in the \$7000 or \$14,999 segment.



The **Big Switch**

Bill Stambaugh compares his radio career to a Horatio Alger tale. He started some two-and-a-half years ago as an overnight jock at KRST/Albuquerque but worked his way into programming within six months, where he took the station from acceptable ratings (4.1 overall 12plus) to the most recent book's enviable results, an 8.2 overall 12-plus. Along the way he has proved himself to be one of AOR's most involved and interesting programmers, staying out of the industry limelight to put his energies where he knew they belonged; into carving a permanent niche for KRST in the Albuquerque community.



It came as quite a surprise to hear that Bill has now chosen to leave programming behind, opting instead for the bottom of the sales ladder at the station as an account executive. He told us why: "There were a number of reasons. First, there was some fine tuning that had to be done on the programming end here that I feel I have accomplished as PD. Now we have reached a certain programming and ratings plateau and I felt perhaps someone new could offer input to give us another shove up the ratings ladder and bring in some new ideas as well

"Additionally, as a PD I have found that while I was in on many management decisions, some decisions that affected the station's programming were still out of my hands, and that was frustrating. I'm intrigued by the thought of the challenge of being responsible for the really major station decisions that are made solely by management. And sales is the only ladder that can take me there.

Now that Bill has switched to the sales department he can see their own particular problems more clearly. "Now I can understand why sales guys always got so angry when spots are missed overnight because that last-minute-arrival tape hadn't been dubbed, which was always an annoying task to me. Now my check at the end of the month depends on stuff like that being done. Ideally, I think it would be wise for every PD to spend some time as a sales person just as I feel every sales person should get a 3rd class and do a shift or two to understand the programming side of the station better. I'm in the unique position, having built up this radio station, of understanding just exactly what sort of commercials I'd want to write and produce for our sound, and if I can teach that to the other sales people we can make this station sound that much better.'

Bill continued, "Strictly speaking, there isn't a sales department and a programming department in my eyes; they're two interconnected pieces. If you run a station as if programming and sales were separate the station will sound like it: the spots won't be in sync with the station's musical policy, the promotions will be out of whack and the jocks won't give their best for them. The more people know about each other's jobs, the better the station should sound."

Still, the transition from programming to sales was very real for Bill, who found the switch a trying one. "It's a big switch and I have had some trouble adjusting; I'll be the first to admit that. I miss the music in particular and the decision-making power I had as PD in general, but I think those feelings will only last awhile. I plan to keep a weekend airshift so I don't get completely rusty. And sales can be just as creative a gig as being a PD in its own way. Creating a spot for a client can be a real challenge, as is producing the spots themselves, which I'll still be doing.'

There seems to be a current radio trend of PDs emigrating to record company promotion jobs. Does Bill think his switch will start another radio trend: Programming to Sales? "I certainly don't see myself as any sort of trendsetter," he replied, "but I would encourage anyone who is looking for a different sort of radio challenge to give it a try. I think it could only be to radio's benefit in general. I see radio as entering a period of fermentation in these last few years of the Seventies. Some new energy and creativity on the sales and management end of radio could provide radio's spark for the Eighties.'







You might notice a few changes this week in the R&R. What you will see in this week's Country section is intended to help make it a more useful tool for you. You may have to hunt a couple seconds to find some of the regular information you use weekly. We did relocate a few items.

In the past year or so R&R Country has gained a great amount of new readers, so with these changes it might be a good idea to go over the section to explain the information you see. Starting with the "Chart Page" – The R&R Country Airplay/40 lists the 40 most played current singles nationally as determined by the 130 R&R Country reporting stations. A four-week trend is listed. Those records with a black circle indicate records that show continued upward movement from a least 60% of these stations. The "Breakers" are those songs that have shown the greatest amount of new activity during a week. This is based on airplay, requests, individual market surveys and any other information provided by the reporters. The "New & Active" are those records that show strong early airplay and activity in all regions. "Others Getting Significant Action" records are listed in alphabetical order, and are newer records or those gaining good regional response. "Most Added" is a tabulation of the records that have been added at the greatest number of stations. "Most Requested" is tabulated from stations who calculate incoming calls for current product. "Active Recurrents" are also listed in alphabetical order, and provide information about records that are dropping off current airplay charts, but still show some activity, such as sales or requests.

Other music information found in the Country section includes the records added by the different reporting stations in our "Country Regional Adds" section, and the "Country Singles" graphs. These are now located just below the "Country Regional Adds," and are based on station adds and chart movement. They're graphic illustrations of the progress of newer records; reading across the graphs, you can check the progress of a single from week to week visually, while more detailed information about the same record may also appear in the "New & Active" or "Others" sections. Records which make the Country Airplay/40 do not appear in the graph section. On the page featuring Biff Collie's column you will also find the "Country Albums."

On the page featuring Biff Collie's column you will also find the "Country Albums." a listing of album tracks showing early signs of audience response because of airplay. With much talk in the last year about AOC (Album-Oriented Country), a phrase we first used in print a couple years ago, we have found more and more radio stations and record companies are using this section as a good indicator for future single releases.

All of us at R&R hope these changes will make this section easier to use and read. As has been said, "The only thing permanent is change." R&R will continue to be an industry leader because of our understanding of the need for constant change. As always, your input is the main reason for what you see.


Disc Jockey Award Finalist Named


