Despite Sales Success, Beasties Still Tough Sell For Some PDs

Cha-ching. That's the sound many Beastie Boys fans heard two weeks ago as they laid down the money for the new album "Hello Nasty." In an era when such modern rock stalwarts as Pearl Jam, R.E.M., and Smashing Pumpkins have decent but not stellar opening weeks, the Beastie Boys moved 681,500 albums out of the gate. That's not only the most sold in an opening week for 1998 SoundScan figures, but the highest single-week sales figure racked up since a little-known soundtrack, "Titanic," began sinking into consumers' wallets.

So has modern rock found its new poster child just in time to rescue it from modern adult assaults and accusations of eschewing artist development for song-focused flavor-of-the-month programming? Most everyone we spoke with showed the same amazed reaction, and while they embrace what one PD called the "exclusive edge," Beasties can lend a modern station in 1998. no one's quite ready to offer the rappers the throne in the house that Nirvana built.

WRZX Indianapolis PD Scott Jameson says the "sales story made me think twice. It opened my eyes. It sold over 6,000 in my market alone, and we're market No. 37. It really took me by surprise. I didn't think that style of music was that mainstream. With this album, you can't call them a white rap or an East Coast kind of deal."

Modern WNNX (99X) Atlanta PD Leslie Fram notes that the Beasties' opening count of 16,000 in Atlanta beats the recent 10,000-unit first week figure by core act the Dave Matthews Band. Fram says, "It was definitely a long-anticipated CD, and it definitely shakes things up in the mix of what we have available to play." She calls the sales story a wake-up message from the audience.

Fram adds, "We're all talking about artist ownership and the problem with the amount of sharing, and this is something that's totally exclusive. If you're serving any kind of young demos or 18-34, you can make them an integral part of the station."

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Capstar Buys Triathlon's 32 Outlets

Capstar's buying spree this week begins with the \$190 million purchase of Triathlon with 32 stations in six markets, giving Capstar entree into Washington markets Spokane and Tri-Cities and further bolstering the company's Midwest presence. The deal includes Triathlon's Pinnacle Sports, home to University of Nebraska football, and its Omaha, Neb., Muzak franchise. The deal puts classic rock KKZX Spokane; album KRZZ Wichita, Kan.; classic rock KTGL/album KIBZ Lincoln, Neb.; and classic rock KEGX Tri-Cities on the Capstar books. But look for the company to divest itself of properties in Wichita and Colorado Springs, Colo., to keep in line with ownership caps.

Meanwhile, Capstar's Albany, N.Y., group picks up triple-A WXLE from Foley Broadcasting in a deal valued at \$2.6 million. It will become sister to album WPYX and four other signals in the market.

And The M Street Journal Reports that the Capstar Texas Limited Partnership has filed to buy Austin, Texas, modern rock sign-on KFMK from Steve Hicks. That station debuted July 27 as the Planet.

Finally, Capstar plans to flip country KBUY Amarillo, Texas, to rock before the close of the month.

In other ownership news, Chancellor, which recently acquired a bevy of Mexican radio stations, is looking into Puerto Rico. A San Juan paper reports that Chancellor will buy Primedía Broadcasting Group's three FMs in San Juan.


Bloomberg reports that Hicks, Muse, Tate & Furst has expanded its reach into Mexico through MVS Comunicaciones SA's purchase of Radio Grupo Met SA. Hicks, Muse holds a 20% stake in MVS.

American General Media picks up the seven Rocky Mountain Radio Colorado stations, including moderns KSNO Aspen, KSMT/KZYR Breckenridge and KIDN Hayden.

SFX Entertainment is acquiring the Marquee Group in a \$100 million stock merger. Marquee does event management, TV production, marketing, talent representation, and consulting in various sports, news, and entertainment sectors.

MANAGEMENT: CONNOLLY EXITS
Jacor Atlanta market manager Tom Connolly has left the station. Connolly is a 14-year veteran of Atlanta radio and was GM of album WKLS (96 Rock) when Jacor took over the station two years ago. Jacor senior VP John Hogan is relocating to Atlanta and will conduct the search for Connolly's replacement and serve as

Capstar's Fresno, Calif., regional manager Steve Miller exits; overseeing his duties in the interim is KBOS GM Mary Lou Gunn. The group includes album KRZR.

PROGRAMMING: SORENSEN MOURNED

Monitor is deeply saddened to report the death of Doug Sorensen, a veteran album programmer, most recently Journal Broadcast Group director of rock programming and PD of classic rock KKCD Omaha. Sorensen was 43 and left behind a wife and three children. Veteran rock programmer Ted Edwards, who left his national promotion director gig with Virgin last week, returns to radio to helm album WCKW New Orleans. GM Sid Levet had been overseeing the programming of the station.

Modern KXTE Las Vegas PD Mike Stern joins album sister WKRK Detroit as PD, replacing John Gorman.

Album WDRK Panama City, Fla., PD/afternoon driver Addison Wakeford joins album WMFS Memphis as PD.

Modern WXSR Tallahassee, Fla., acting PD/morning man Scott Pettibone gets the nod as PD.

A bum KKEG Fayetteville, Ark., PD/afternoon host Dave Jackson heads east for the PD seat at classic rock WXCR/sports WTMM Albany, N.Y. Jackson's first job will be finding the replacement for legendary Albany morning men Mason and Sheehan. WXCR has bought out their contract less than a year after they signed a five-year deal with the station. Their last day is Aug. 31. Meanwhile back at KKEG, Mark Morgan joins as PD.

Dave Alexander, VP of operations for album KZHQ and top 40 sister KHTO Springfield, Mo., heads to co-owned top 40 KCHZ in Kansas City as operations director.

Classic rock KBUS Paris, Texas, is no longer simulcasting on AM sister KGDD.

Aerosmith Awarded Airpower On Two Charts



Aerosmith has the only Airpower track on the mainstream and active rock charts this week with "What Kind Of Love Are You On" (Columbia) from the "Armageddon" soundtrack. A 20-15 move at mainstream is fueled by a nearly 200-spin increase (29%). At active rock, a 27% climb boosts the track 26-16.

Germany's Rammstein vaults 12-10 at active rock this week with "Du Hast" (Slash/London/Island), the lead track from the album "Sehnsucht," thanks to a 9% increase. The group continues to grow at mainstream rock, where detections increase by 7%; however, "Du Hast" is pushed back 22-24 due to heavy traffic in that area of the chart.

It's a slow week at triple-A as far as chart movement, but the Brian Setzer Orchestra gets a 14% increase to nail down Greatest Gainer honors and a 12-8 jump with "Jump Jive An' Wail" (Hollywood). The track achieves Airpower status this week at both triple-A and modern AC, where it sees an airplay increase of 21% over 32 stations.

This week's No. 1 modern rock track is crossing successfully to active rock and mainstream rock. Eve 6's "Inside Out" (RCA) jumps 29-23 at active and 37-30 at mainstream, with 16% and 17% increases, respectively. And Harvey Danger's "Flagpole Sitta" (Slash/London/Island), a top five modern rock track, debuts at No. 40 this week at active rock with a 29% gain. Also new at active rock is the Mayfield Four's "Always" (Epic), which bows at No. 39.

PANEL CHANGES: After a one-week absence due to technical difficulties, WONE Akron, Ohio, is re-added to the mainstream and heritage panels and WNVE Rochester, N.Y., is re-added to the modern panel. Additionally, WROX Norfolk, Va., exits the modern rock panel due to a format change. Current panel sizes: mainstream, 110; active, 50; heritage, 60; and modern, 81. Geffen's former national alternative promo man David Grant joins Maverick as marketing manager.

ONSTAGE: The Murmur launch the Rock Out Against Rage (R.O.A.R.) tour in mid-August. The seven-city tour will raise money for shelters for battered women and domestic-violence service organizations. Billboards Bulletin reports that Toad The Wet Sprocket has broken up after 12 years and six albums. All four members are expected to stay in music. Danzig leaves Hollywood Records. The band is currently recording "Danzig 6."

ern WKQX (Q101) Chicago home, he picks up the station's Brian The Whipping Boy for traffic, according to The Chicago Tribune. Chicago Tribune columnist Jim Kirk reports Mancow Muller is talking with TV producers John Davies and David Salzman to create a syndicated late-night talk show. Top 40 KHFJ Austin morning man Allen Price moves to classic rock sister KPEZ (Z102) and joins Darren Todd in mornings.

Ex-KPKN (the Planet) Houston morning hosts Jerry Hart and Jaine Coffee sign on at

modern adult KZZO (the Zone) Sacramento, Calif., replacing Kim Kaplan, who's now handling nights. Marshall Phillips stays on the morning show.

Classic rock KRW Houston welcomes MD Bobby Duncan back to the fold. He rejoins from jazz KCJZ San Antonio, where he was APD.

Modern WEND Charlotte, N.C., names Mike Sherman marketing director. It's the first gig for the former art director in a graphic-design house.

Oldies WSRZ Sarasota, Fla., overnighter Dexter crosses the hall to album WYNF for the same.

MONITOR PROFILE

99X Atlanta's Leslie Fram Strengthens Heritage On The Cutting Edge

How does a heritage radio station remain commercially viable while staying on the cutting edge of its format? At WNNX (99X) Atlanta, PD Leslie Fram attributes the station's success to continuously reinventing itself.

"I am a total believer in constantly changing the vibe of the station," Fram says. "We may drop a feature that has been on for a long time—even if it's still successful—just to do something different. It's even good to take risks that don't always work out to your advantage, because at least you took the chance."

Fram, who formerly programmed mainstream top 40 WABB-FM Mobile, Ala., came to Atlanta in 1990 to co-host Rick Stacy's morning show. At the time, Stacy was PD of then Top 40 WAPW (Power 99). When it flipped to modern, Brian Philips assumed the PD post. Fram became APD, then succeeded Philips when he was promoted to VP of programming for Susquehanna in June 1997.



'Taking chances makes 99X special'

"Time flies when you're having fun," she says. "Brian is definitely a visionary, but every PD puts his or her own personality into a station. Actually, Brian and I have the same roots, so our musical tastes are similar. We both love big, fat guitars. However, I did change our presentation just because it hadn't changed for so long. Our new creative director, James Fairey, uses multiple voices and, being a former musician, records his own beds. That has definitely freshened the overall sound."

Fram says her "amazing staff" has spurred the constant reinvention, in presentation as well as music. "Taking chances makes 99X special," she says. "It could come from an exciting morning-show stunt or from music that's totally out of the blue. In fact, we recently added local artist Shawn Mullins, who has our biggest song next to the Beastie Boys. Middayer Steve Craig brought it in. I heard it once and put it on-air that day. It was one of those magic moments. Not only do we help the career of a local artist, but we create a buzz for the station."

That couldn't be more important, considering 99X's competitive situation. "It's a three-way battle," Fram says. "People button-punch between us, album WKLS [96 Rock], and top 40 WSTR [Star 94]. Being in the middle is a dangerous place to be, because you can set yourself up for never being No. 1 with women or men. Fortunately, we've been No. 1 with men, but Star 94 cherry-picks hit songs on our playlist after they've been on for three months."

"Even with all this sharing, fortunately for us, no one else is embracing swing. Atlanta is the biggest market for it, which gives us a few artists to call our own."

Fram is a firm believer in artist ownership, even though "some labels insist on releasing most records to pop at the same

time, which is a mistake," she contends. "It hurt Natalie Merchant at modern. We had nurtured her since 10,000 Maniacs, yet we didn't have the opportunity to let our listeners hear it first."

Here's a recent hour on 99X: Dave Matthews Band, "Stay"; Echo & the Bunnymen, "People Are Strange"; Big Bad Voodoo Daddy, "You And Me And The Bottle Makes Three Tonight (Baby)"; Smashing Pumpkins, "Ava Adore"; R.E.M., "Radio Free Europe"; Shawn Mullins, "Lullabye"; Pearl Jam, "Alive"; Garbage, "Push It"; Depeche Mode, "Strangelove"; Grant Lee Buffalo, "Truly, Truly"; Everclear, "I Will Buy You A New Life"; and Guster, "Airport Song."

"There is a danger of playing too much unfamiliar music, even though that pleases the core who drives the station," Fram notes. "We can never play enough new music for them. We aim for a happy medium where we can please our core while we increase our cume by playing brand-new songs next to more familiar records."

Fram continues to be an integral part of the "Morning X" show with Barnes and producer Jimmy Baron. "We bring different things to the table," she says of their chemistry. "We all lead different lives, which creates three unique personalities, each with a distinct point of view. I react to the guys the same way on the air as I would off. If they say something stupid, I nail them. Jimmy's a bit more wise-ass on the air because he's the instigator."

"The show is very spontaneous and topical. You have to pick moments of when to create talk and what subject to highlight. I have to credit Jimmy Baron, who is the hardest-working guy I know. At any given time, he has 12 VCRs taping a variety of TV shows so we can have audio of them for the next day."

Of course, once the morning show is done, Fram has to deal with the normal business every programmer faces. "You find yourself, saying no a lot to certain situations," she says. "You really learn how to schedule your day. I even have to schedule 10 minutes each day to go to the ladies' room."

99X boasts a very high profile promotionally, featuring its collector-quality "Live X" CD series and special event concerts, which benefit a variety of charities. "People anticipate the CD every year," she says. "We press just 10,000 copies of each 'Live X' CD with a specially made cover. One year, we had Peter Max do it; last year, it was David Bowie, and it completely sold out in 10 days."

Now the station is diving headlong into the Internet. "We're constantly working on it," she says. "We just put a camera in the control room, so when artists come in for an interview, listeners can see them on our Web site."

"We're also setting up our first cyberfest," Fram adds. "It will be less about exhibit booths and more about user interaction. We plan on setting up the radio station so people can see how the digital systems work, how music is recorded, and have live online chats with artists. There will even be a gaming section."

As for the future, Fram looks forward to more of the same. "I love Susquehanna because the owners and GM Mark Renier are proactive. They give people within the company a chance to move up," she says. "I love the being in the trenches day to day, but I could see myself overseeing several stations in the future."

Despite Sales Success, Beasties Still Tough Sell At Modern Radio

the Beasties to related artists like Crystal Method and Propellerheads to expand the exclusive base even wider.

"I really do believe there's a phenomenon," says KROX Austin, Texas, PD Sara Trexler. "It is a record for us to play and a band to support. It's one of the few heritage bands that really exists for alternative."

To WRAX Birmingham, Ala., PD Dave Rossi, the sign is clear. "Beasties are a big artist that does need to be dealt with."

For his part, Capitol's Brian Corona is almost as surprised as everyone else about the sales story, but one thing the label was clear on was giving this act to modern rock first. "Modern rock has basically owned this band. We went to modern rock first on this," Corona says. "We wanted this to be a modern rock band."

FIGHT FOR THE RIGHT TO RESEARCH

If the sales story has people scratching their heads, the song "Intergalactic" can prove nearly as confusing. Jameson was skeptical about the record, but after playing it, he says, "The phones are huge. There's something about this that's unique."

WXDX Pittsburgh PD John Moschitta adds, "I've seen very few songs react like 'Intergalactic' on the air."

WNNX's Fram adds, "Typically, I wouldn't expect this type of record to be a call-out song, but after one week in our call-out it was No. 1. It flew past everything else." And to those who might offer that the sales are all from teens, she counters, "Our phones indicate people from offices calling all throughout the day."

Fram points to 99X's artist of the week feature. "Out of all these core artists, like Pearl Jam, Dave Matthews Band, Sarah McLachlan, and the Cure, the biggest one so far has been the Beastie Boys."

Trexler calls the Beasties a band with wide demographic appeal. "They're going to be very appealing to a younger audience and the core—people who liked them when they were 20."

Programmers are also finding the act's library researching very well. In Cleveland, WENZ PD Dan Binder "tested three Beastie Boys songs, and they came back Nos. 1, 2, and 4. You can't go wrong."

Moschitta says WXDX was missing out on the Beasties before his arrival. "After doing some research and music testing, we found that a lot of the material did very well. We won't say they're a core artist, but they're an artist we own, and if they want to hear it, we'll play it, and we play it at a decent rate that the listeners would be satisfied."

And that gave Moschitta an inkling that something big might happen with "Hello Nasty." "When we started playing this stuff, we would see 'License To Ill' spike in SoundScan. We knew there was a following here in Pittsburgh."

Corona says he's noticed more and more stations calling for catalog on the band. "There's a lot of new moderns out there and a lot that have switched gears. When they do their research, they realize these guys are huge," he says.

Corona reports that modern KROQ L.A. is spinning 10 Beastie Boys library tracks and half of those turn up in the top 50 best-testing tracks.

And perhaps that's part of the quirkiness of the equation—all these songs are coming back in the library and testing strongly, even though the group never had huge radio success on many of those tracks. The band hasn't had a radio hit in years, says Corona, and he recalls the trials VP of promotion Brian McDonald endured working previous Beastie Boys records. "Radio has never wanted to play them," says Corona.

THE 'SEINFELD' OF RADIO

WRAX's Rossi isn't too concerned about what his library is doing Beastiwise. He'd rather "concentrate on the new stuff. This is the biggest record out of the box for them ever. Let's just stick with this."

Rossi calls Beastiemania modern rock's equivalent of the final "Seinfeld" episode. "There's a lot of buzz and a lot of hype, and for once it's about the music," says Rossi. "We've given something that's a phenomenon. We need to take advantage of it . . . It's the goose laying the golden egg for radio and our format specifically."

Rossi continues, "Any alternative station should attach itself to this. It's something we haven't had in a while—something this big and something so out of left field."

POLAR SCARE

Many we spoke with were worried about the polarizing nature of the act. Despite being handed an exclusive artist that a modern adult neighbor might avoid, some programmers looking to build a wide coalition are skittish. Modern WGRD Grand Rapids, Mich., PD Marisol Smith is mindful of her female audience. "I would have liked to have dealt with the Beastie Boys, but based on the perceptual study we had just done, with over 40% of our audience women modern AC listeners," she prefers to lean "more toward the pop alternative."

While KROX's Trexler embraces the Beastie Boys, she's concerned. "It's a very exciting time to have an artist like this, but it's a dangerous thing for me to play the new single . . . A record like this is rough. It's rough to play in all dayparts. A time may come when I expand it a little bit more, as it becomes more mainstream."

"One of my fears about this kind of music is it's going to do to alternative what rap did to top 40—kill it," says Trexler, remembering when too much rap scared top 40 partisans away. "All of a sudden, all the pop went to country."

Trexler has seen enough sound-alike signing frenzies and says, "I'm concerned that now we're only going to get bands that sound like 'wish we were Beasties' and alienate people that can go to the hot ACs."

Trexler says one lesson she's learned in her 15 years in radio is "people would much rather be bored than to hate a radio station. If they're punching back and forth between my station and the Mix [KAMX] and hear the Beastie Boys, but they hate the Beastie Boys, they will go away for a long time." Trexler is quick to point out that phenomenon is not relegated solely to the Beastie Boys. It could be something too rocky, too soft, any extreme.

But that doesn't stop her and others from exploiting the event. Although she handles "Intergalactic" with kid gloves, KROX has been digging into its library for more familiar Beasties titles.

WRZX's Jameson agrees that there are other ways to get on the Beastie bandwagon, such as featuring the song prominently in hook promos. "We play that a lot to give the impression that we're playing [the song] more, because of the sales story."

To those naysayers, and especially those who are dayparting the cut, Fram says, "If people were calling at noon from their office, there's no reason you should not be playing this record . . . That kind of thinking reminds me of when I was in CHR and we were always second-guessing ourselves."

Capitol's Corona agrees. He's heard a lot of hesitation from programmers who are not spinning it or heavily dayparting the record. "It's like they have their own rule book," he says. The lesson he says they should draw from the sales story: "This is working. My audience wants to hear it."

Corona admits, "It's not the most radio-friendly song, but sometimes you've got to throw out the book and say, 'Something's bigger than me here.'"

Trexler isn't ready to revamp her entire format yet. She remembers when metal albums were selling in huge numbers with no airplay whatsoever. "Some radio stations that decided to start playing them didn't do very well," she says.

And Jameson isn't holding his breath for the core coronation. Sure, he says, the last Pearl Jam and Smashing Pumpkins releases can't hold a candle to the Beastie Boys' opening-week figures, but "those bands are for a mainstream modern rock station, because they cross a little bit more of an 18-34 audience. They're a little bit more appealing to a 30-year-old woman."

Then come the questions: "Are the Beastie Boys' sales all to 15- to 21-year-olds? Does the figure plummet next week? Did their core buy it all and now they're done?"

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His (Eagle) Eye Is On The Radio

Try as he might, Eagle Eye Cherry ultimately couldn't buck the family trend. The youngest child of late jazz trumpeter Don Cherry and half-brother of late-'80s pop star Neneh Cherry, Eagle Eye had sidelined his drumming talents and musical inclinations and spent his formative years studying acting at the New York School for Performing Arts. After graduation, he achieved a modest level of success in theater and commercials, including an appearance on "The Cosby Show."

"In one way, I think I needed to step away from the music because it was such a big part of my family, so I was kind of doing something that was my own," explains the 28-year-old native of Sweden. "But also I started realizing theater and film is much more of a writer's and director's medium, and I was feeling a need to express something that was more personal."

Ironically, it was the downtime that often marks an actor's life that rekindled Cherry's desire to write music. His Brooklyn apartment soon began to be filled with recording equipment, samplers, and an acoustic guitar. Though a neophyte guitarist, Cherry began to channel the observations of years of living amid the frenetic pace of the Big Apple into stories about the people and situations he encountered. "Not until I left New York and moved to Stockholm did I actually sit down and write some songs that I felt like, 'All right, here we go; now we're talking,'" says Cherry, whose first musical inspiration was Jimmy Cliff. Contemporary favorites include Beck, Sheryl Crow, the Verve, and Ben Harper, whose airy, folk/soul blues seem to inform Cherry's music.

Cherry is a fan of Harper's and owns all three of his albums. "When I started working on the record, I hadn't listened to him, but people heard some of the demos and were like, 'Have you checked out Ben Harper?' So I checked him out," says Cherry, adding that his own sound differs from Harper's in that Harper takes a more traditional approach to the blues.

Cherry has seen both sides of musical stardom. Hanging with his father and the jazz community ranked high. "We traveled a lot. He brought the whole family on tour with him," says Cherry, who was put on a drum stool by his father as soon as he exhibited enough balance to sit on his own. "The traveling was very exciting, and there was a very good vibe among the people and players in the whole jazz scene; [there was] a lot of love."

But watching his older half-sister Neneh, with whom he had grown up, become an international star in 1989 with the top five pop hit "Buffalo Stance" was an eye-opener. "When she first hit I said, 'This is not for me; this is crazy,'" recalls Cherry. But from Neneh, her brother says, he learned the importance of "not rushing and taking your time. You only have that one chance at a first impression, so you got to make it right."

Cherry's own first impression on the world has been very good so far. His debut set, "Desireless," has already grabbed a handful of Swedish Grammys, and the single "Save Tonight" entered the British pop chart at No. 6. He will make his stateside debut Aug. 16 in San Francisco; a 10-date major-market club tour will follow.

Spurring the bittersweet, blues-inflected "Save Tonight" has been its unique videoclip. Cherry plays each of the main characters in a succession of events that happen to him while he goes to buy a bottle of wine and some flowers on his way to his girlfriend's place. The charm of the clip lies in the flair Cherry exhibits in assuming character roles in a sort of one-man skit and in its simplicity. "We didn't want lots of cuts; snazzy, hip clothes; and booty—I'm sick of all that. We just decided to do the opposite, which is how we came up with the idea not to do any cuts." Working on a shoestring budget, Cherry crammed in seven shots with costume changes beginning at 8 a.m. and finishing at 5 that afternoon, just beating Stockholm's early sunset.

While the video performance is evidence of Cherry's acting talent, the drive to express himself musically turned out to be too strong to resist. Cherry recalls an epiphany that occurred during high school while playing drums in a progressive jazz/rock situation. "One day I was jamming out with my friends and I closed my eyes and when I opened them again, we'd be gone for 20 minutes jamming this groove. Suddenly, everything my dad had been talking about hit me at once. Because as a kid, you can't really teach that. You can teach a kid how to play an instrument, but it's harder to kind of get into feeling what you're playing and getting connected to that." Surely his father is smiling.

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

MOST READ




Question: Which do you read regularly; that is, at least 3 out of 4 issues?




