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# KID CONTRACTS DOUBTFUL

## Billion a Year for Amusements, Sports, Exclusive of Niteries

WASHINGTON, Peb. 13.—American public is spending a billion dollars a rear for sinuscements and sports through the country, or approximately 830 per smitly, according to report of U. S. Bureau of Censes of the Department of commerces. From 1835 to 1833 the survey shows an increase of 2.2 per cent in number of commercial strussment places operated, bringing fluxes to 44,217 each sport. Increase in recoips over same period showed 42.4 per cent, or sees 079,000, compared to 8686,012,000 in 1830.

Picture houses, including those with stage and vauseville shows, get two-thirds of every amusement dellar spent, receipts amounting to about 200 per lamily, or more than 85 per person. Legitimate theaters increased revenus from 185 to 231.

Amusement pasts docreased by 55 in number, but increased in revenue

Antisement parks decreased by 58 in number, but increased in revenue from \$8,982,000 to \$10,123,000.

Big gain was shown in howling, billinits, and pool halls in number and business volume. In live years this combined total jumped from \$43,271,000 to \$47,550,000 and from 12,000 to 17,000 in number.

Average of 223,723 persons were cusplayed in all amusement branches, 34,561 of these part time. Thirty-three thousand nine hundred and seventy-one proprietors gave major part of time to operating. Pay roll, eminative of operations, gave \$325,481,000 to employees.

Efficientional institutions; religious, charitable, or fraternal spendes; governantal or vivis bodies, and non-profit organizations were all excluded from the survey, as well as gambling spots, golf and other private clube, fishing and pleasure records.

## Yvette-Duke Case May Be Test of Validity of Pacts With Minors; Previous Decisions Favored Kids

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—The disclosure that Yeekis, singing star of the Camel Program new at the Strand, is being seed for beeach of contract by Mauric Duke and Bob Lee, her former managers, is causing local agents to wonder observer whether any contract with a minor is worth the cost of the contract form. The talk has exued both sitorneys and agents managing minors to start-reeding up on contract law, especially in regard to tometers. What they have found is giving them little comfort. Even if a parent of legal guardian signs a contract in conjunction with the minor, in such cases where infanny has been entered as a defense the court have rised that contracts with Infants cannot be enforced unless there has been enabling legislation passed by the Stale.

In previous cases the court has taken the position that neither the parents nor guardian may bind an intent to a couract. Even in instances where the courts have found the contract to be fair and equitable, they have been unable to intervene because the necessary

to intervene because the necessiry stratutes have not been passed by individual States. In New York States there have been only two cases in the theatrical field in which minor contracts have been ruled upon by the State Supreme Court. ## BMI and Canadian Society Ask More Radio Royalties

OTTAWA. February 15.—Applications by the Canadian Performing Rights Society, an affiliate of the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers, for an increase in radio music royalty rates from 8 cents to 14 cents per radio set, and by Broadcast Music of Canada, Inc., to obtain half of the present 8-cent rate collected by CPMS, were heard Thursday (13) by the Copyright Appeals Board.

Col. O. M. Bigger, representing the society, told the board that the increase in royalties was being sought because "sines 1935 the situation in relation to radio invesdensiting throut the world has greatly changed." At the same time, Joseph Sedgowick, representing BMI of Camada, said, "If the present rate stands, then we consider we are smittled to 4 cents on the book of our used and usable repertore."

BMI stangaged.

BMI attempted to enter the royalty field in Canada when it appeared before the board in December, and asked permission to collect royalties at the raise of I cent per set. In Canada, the entire performing rights resulties are based on the number of sets in Canada, unlike in the United States, where ASCAP collects on radio time sales.

CPBS received \$159.181 from 40 radio CFBS received \$159.181 from 40 radio-stations in Canada last year, and Coloned Biggar told the hearing that the pro-posed increase would bring the Society about \$100.000 additional revenue this year. 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



# lew Employee Injury Law

At various times considerable controversies have been written in these pages recative to avoidance of Hability for injuries sustained by paterns of streams, narrivals, and other traveling shows. However, little has been said about the law pertaining to injuries austained by employees of amusement pilose. It is true that the modern law on this subject is both interesting and starting when compared with similar laws a few years ago. Therefore, in order that readers may comprehend the presently established law on this subject we shall review late and isoding higher court cases which illustrate various phases of these legal controversies.

#### When Employee Is Negligent

The circumstances are numerous un-The circumstances are numerous un-der which amusement employees may recover payment for injuries under Blate Workmen's Compensation laws and, also, under federal laws. And, sgain, in many instances employees may sue and recover damages, from the employee instead of sempting compensation payment under fittie or federal laws.

First, if is important to know that irrespective of when or how an em-ployee mutains an injury, he is not emitted to recover damages from his shapleyer if the restreony shows that impayer it into restrictly shows that the section toutle have been stooded had the employee used "ordinary care" to protect himself against the imjury. This is known as the law of "contributory negligence." This form means that the employee suitained an injury as a direct result of his own carelesses.

For illustration, in Guthris v. F. H. Company, 41 Neb. 746, the court said: "Dontributery negligence is conduct for which one is responsible, amounting to a breach of the duty to which the law poors upon persons to protect them-res from injury." her Saton v. Marritt, max N. W. 600, in

But, before we begin discussion of higher court cases of partitudar interest involving damage suits, readers should resilter that white on employee who eterains an injury as a direct result of his own cass-bessess or negligence may not recover damages yet he may recover compensation under State or federal laws. BUT nevertheless, such employee cannot recover damages from his employee nor can be recover compensation under State or federal laws if the lestimony shows that the fajury was suitained while the employee was performing acts "outside the acope of employment." For enample, in a late case the higher court refused to allow damages or compensation to an employee whose dury was to assist in erecting a tent, seats, sic, where the evidence showed that the supployee was strutch by an automobile while he was crossing a street to purchase as soft faink. On the other hand, in another case the court allowed compensation to an employee who was injured while pasing from his regular work to a tolles on the grounds. #### Concurrent Negligence

In many hitigations involving con-tributory negligence the testimony may indicate that negligence of both the indicate that begingence of both the employer, resulted in the injury Under these circumstances the one whose begployer, resulted in the injury. Under these circumstances the one whose negligence was greater is the party at fault soid, therefore, liable for the some-quences. For illustration in Munit v. Chicago, 286 N. W. 601, it was said. If plaintiff (employer) is guilty of negligence directly contributing to the injury, he cannot recover, even the defendant (employer) was negligent, unless the contributory negligence of plaintiff (employer) was signit, and the negligence of employer was gross in comparison therewith."

Also, see Juseph v. Hedge, 44 Neb, 448, in which the court said. "Two sets of independent source are not consurrent in extending an injury if one of them marrly furnishes a contition by which such injury is one of the court injury occurs thru the efficient, self-setting and independent operation of the other. In such tase the latter and not the former is the proximate cause of such injury."

damages.
In Winterson v. Bantal Realty Com-pany, 282 N. W. 383, the employee con-tended that the injury resulted from poor illumination at a place of danger.

However, the higher court refused to hold the employer liable because the employee failed to prove that the lack of lights was the proximate cause of ma

In Sodomka v. Duc. 183 N. W. 800, an employee who backed into a shaft without looking was held not entitled to recover damages because his negligence was so gross that a recovery barred.

In Schabel v. Onserga, 231 N. Y. s. 280, as employee fell down at a dark and dangerius place. This court said that 'danger lurks in attending place in derinates" and that a greater duly restaupon the employee under those circumstances to exercise care than on the employer is make the place perfectly safe.

In Benton v. Watson, 211 Mass. 582, the court held that "one who walks in the total darkness is likely to encounter obstructions to his passage and

In Weller v. Communescope, 55, the employee proceeded into a dark-ened tent and sustained an injury. The ened tent and sustained an injury. The In Weller v. Consolidated, 198 N. Y. court held that he did so at his own tak and that since he falled to exercise an ordinary degree of curs he was not entitled to recover damages.

#### Federal Law Applicable







#### Legal Rights of Employee

Legal Rights of Employee
Generally speaking if an injured employee applies for compensation under State or federal laws he cannot subsequently sue and recover damages from his employer. In other words, making an application for compensation insurance is the legal equivalent of abundoning rights to sue and recover damages from the employer. In fact, the only good reason employers pay compensation insurance promining a sevolfance of damage suits by infured employees. Nevertheless, circumstances may note, as where an employer falls to provide safety devices required by law under which the employee has the privilege of electing to sue the employer instead of hecepting State or Federal compensation allowances. 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

# Northwest-

Minneapolis convention will focus attention on the important work done by a live trade association

The Northwest Coin Machine Show for 1941 has been announced for March 25 and 28. It may be called the next big event in the coin machine industry because it represents all or parts of half a dozen or more States and even a section of Canada.

The event is sponsored by the Minnesota Amusement Games Association, Inc., and the exhibits will be at the Radisson Hotel, Minneapolis. Distributors in that area always have co-operated in making the exhibits a success and they are co-operating again this year. The displays of

the latest coin machines are made by distributors at the Northwest show. It is always an excellent demonstration of the business spirit of the distributors in that area. They really have business push.

This is the third show or convention spensored by the Minnesota Amusement Games Association and serves to bring the activities, the men, the committees, and the general program of this organization into national prominence. The fact that two previous shows have been held means that much experience already has been gained in conducting such exhibits. Like the national shows in Chicago, the Northwest show this year will be "bigger and better than ever before." The two previous shows

have been highly complimented by industry leaders who attended them.

The success of the first Northwest show was so evident that is was said by many to be the beginning of regional shows in certain well-defined market areas. The Northwest territory is a very definite market area, has many operators in the smaller cities and towns througt the area, and many of them feel they cannot attend the national conventions. So a regional convention meets a real need in the area.

The Pacific Coast region held a successful regional show in November, 1940, and tentative plans are to hold the next show in October of this year. Apparently the industry will thus have two regional shows as a part of the industry program.

The work of the Minnesota association is not limited to holding a regional show by any means. Our files have many interesting news items covering a period of years which show many problems the association has had to face. Its success has not been a rosy path by any means. With the cooperation of the officials of the organization we may be able to compile an interesting history of the organization which would be helpful to associations in other States.

Perhaps the association's work on the legal front should be listed as of primary importance. The association worked for the passage of a license in Minneapolis and other cities and did secure the passage of a license for amusement games in Minneapolis in 1935. The license plan is considered favorable for the area and the association has demonstrated its greatest work in promoting the strict compliance of Minneapolis operators to the law. The fact that the association has

> worked so hard to secure compliance with the license law has won the respect of officials and of the newspapers. One local newspaper published an editorial (April 20, 1940) which has a place in our bulletin on the outstanding newspaper editorials of the country favorable to pinball games.

> The Minneapolis local association is a part of the State organization and also the largest group in the State. The Minneapolla license plan like the license plans of many other cities, has had to face more than one attempt to secure its repeal. The city and State organizations have in every case conducted a wise and successful defense. The license has even been made a campaign issue. It has stood up under

the crusading charge that students used pinball games to gamble. About every attack that can be made has been leveled against the license plan, but it still works to the satisfaction of the city revenue department and the operators.

The association has also carried on a successful public relations and publicity program. Some of this material and the ideas followed by this association will be used in a hulletin on publicity plans which we will publish at an early date. In fact, we have reproductions of some of the publicity ready for distribution now.

While the association has been carrying on publicity and public relations work, also legal defense, it has been at the same time educating its members how to carry on like business men. Its officers have also been gaining valuable experience in leadership and the total result has been beneficial to operators through the region.

The industry as a whole will naturally take great interest in the forthcoming Northwest show. March 25 and 26. The various kinds of work done by the association will encourage other associations all over the country.
