NBC's Television Playhouse came thru with an exceptionally projected Sunday (16) evening hour. Writer Hoffman Hays devised an interesting, if not particularly novel script, called "Three Letters." based on the premise that the far-off hills are always greener than the one at hand. The yarn concerned a spinsterish schoolteacher convinced that life has passed her by, after 20 years of small town pedagogy, and is envious of the reported successes of three ex-school mates. The real facts behind these glowing success stories were then brought to underscore the final discovery that her own unexciting career was the richest in fulfillment.

The notion has been explored dramatically many times before, but "Three Letters" gave Judith Evelyn fine opportunity for an hour's tour-de-force, as the slightly frustrated schoolmarm, as a fading and rapacious Broadway star, as a nagging, would-be entrepreneur of local culture, and as a rich, neurotic middle-ager who has espoused a penniless young philanderer. The material ranged from bitter satire, thrucharacter comedy to pathos, and Miss Evelyn again demonstrated her ability by taking it all in stride. It was an over-all excellent performance.

Sharp camera work and direc-on likewise brought out all the Sharp camera work and direction likewise brought out all the best in a strong supporting cast. Margaret Barker made a fine foll as the practical friend of the inhibited teacher. Anne Burr scored solidly as an innocently involved bystander, and Constance Ford more briefly and as effectively as a nice, ambitious young actress. Edward Andrews was outstanding as a rich but harried Babbit, and there were further solid assists from Walter Brooke. Orson Beane, Ben Lackland and Maurice Burke. The whole-projection smacked of people who knew their business and were doing it well.

The interpolated plugs for Goodyear products were crisp and to the point. John Cameron Swayze gave a fast run-thru on the use of nylon in cord tires, and Durwood Kirby demonstrated the efficiency of pre-polished, rubber tile flooring. The messages came over, without undue intrusion on a generally well-plotted script. "Three Letters" was the kind of TV that shows awareness of real dramatic values.



DEALER DOINGS

Price Cutting

The price war in New York has brought us a number of letters from dealers. Here is one from Herbert Gray, of The Music Box, Westwood, N. J.: "Most of the dealers in this section of New Jersey have cut album and LP prices 25 to 30 per cent. When a woman buys a large box of soap powder it costs less than a corresponding number of small ones that make up the same weight. Why is the record customer who buys an album of three to seven rec-ords penalized? Things are al-ways cheaper in quantity, everywhere else but in the rec-ord business!" . . . We would like to have the opinions of other dealers on the record price war.

Trade Talk

D. A. Soliday, of Modern Electric, Vermillion, S. D., asks, "What are we supposed to do with all the Columbia Records that are defective and scratched when they come in to us? Seven out of the 10 LP's we get are defective, and when the sales-man finally does give you defective, and when the salesman finally does give you credit for them he acts as if he is doing you a favor. Are we supposed to sell these records to the public?" . Salem Record Shop, Salem, Ore, has the same gripe. "What are the manufacturers going to do about the large number of flawed I.P records that are now being shipped to the dealers? Bubbles and small scratches on records are too communiplace nowadays. Something should be. Delly, manager of the record department store, Nashville, writes, "Why do the deejary receive new records before dealers can stock merchandise? This is one of the biggest gripes that the dealers an stock merchandise? This is one of the biggest gripes that the dealers in this area have. And why do the disk jockeys plug just one particular artist on a soing rather than let the public hear each of the various versions?" . Dorothy H. Richards, of Richards Music, Safford, Ariz, says." We wonder if other dealers got bad pressings of the Four Aces' "Two Little Kisses' and "Who's to Blame" on the Flash label? Ours are so bad that we cannot sell that at all the everyone agrees it should be a good record. We have had too much of this kind of trouble with indie labels."

Makela. of General Appliance Company, San Antonio, for doing a topnoith job of servicing his station with Decca diskings..., and The Record Bar. Comwall, Ont., Can, would like regular contacts with dealers in the U. S. to provide shopping service for "obscure, discontinued and unavailable Canadian-wise" disks.". Glen Hall of Hall Brothers Sales Company, Jasper, Ala., thinks the idea of a National Smile Week is a good one. He says, "Let's have more of it to keep people happy."


H. Blumenfeld, Agency Exec, Passes at 64

NEW YORK, March 22.—Herman Blumenfeld, 64, well-known booking agent and member of a once-famous European circus family, died at his home in Jackson Heights here, Tuesday (18).

From the time of his birth, Blumenfeld had circus in his blood, his family once owning and managing the famous Blumenfeld Circus in Germany. His mother was reported to have been a Russian counters.

mother was reported to have been a Russian countess.

Directly related to hundreds of circus and other outdoor performers, Blumenfeld first came to the United States in August, 1914. From England, where he had been manuging the H. B. Marinell Lalent office. After leaving Marinelli, he formed the Blumenfeld. Lowenstein-Johnson agency, as it was then known, in New York. Later, he became partners with Frank Wirth in the Wieth-Blumenfeld booking office. Some time after that he sold out his interest to George Hamid, and went with the Gus Stan talent agency in Springfield, O., setting up an outdoor department for Sun. He then joined Barnes-Carruthers, after which he lent his talents to the George Hamid Company, an association which was to last for over 20 years. He resigned from the Hamid office a short time ago due to ill health.



In the big plants, however, the situation is reversed, as even a one-day shutdown, or layoff of 10,000 men can mean a substantial loss. Actually, it is the larger operators who have these big plants, and they are able to absorb what would be a staggering loss to a small operator.

No basis for comparison of various types of vending operations is given by available reports. Beverage venders, and even more notably ice cream, have not started to enjoy an antieipated seasonal sick-up. The only certain conclusion is that volume is dependent on the number of workers or location patrons present. Since products vended are usually actual or near-necessities, people are continuing to buy them, despite careful spending and selection of product.
