United Press Movietone clit ents get nearly 100 minutes of top news film a week - the equivalent of the production of a major Hollywood studio. Newis ts filmed and processed at such high speed that much of it is on nowhere if it more than one day old. With new stations due to come on soon in large numbers. United Press and Movictone have big plans to supply the de mand for news film, news re
ports and spot news pletures.

The Press-Radio fight and the overwhelming demand for news, once its value to broadcasting was apparent, are now history. No important radio station today is out of touch with the world for a second.
