PARIS. Sept. 27.—France's radio and television people are dancing in the streets this week for finally the two State-run inter-connected organizations are getting government attention and facilities that they have been screaming for since the end of the war. In Strasbourg, Secretary of State Raymond Marcellin opened a brand new super duper radio. TV studio, and came out with the announcement that France has finally restored its radio transmissions to the state they were in during prewar times. The ultramodern establishment, which coke 15 months to construct and operates on emission of 300 kilowatts, boasts a modern process of lamp refrigeration, done by vaporization instead of the old method of hydraulic heating. The Strasbourg station will carry mainly the Paris chain and National chain broadcasts, and is powerful enough to be heard all thru Europe, including Scandinavian countries and Russia. This is the first in a series of stations, with the Marsellic and Lyon ones soon to be inaugurated, carrying thru on TV as well. Radio-TV has also been granted by the government property to creet a radio house in Passy, which, besides diffusing programs, will be the printing center for an official radio publication. Program-wise, when radio starts to function again in mid-October, 28 new shows will have been added to the dellas. The Parisian station will stay in line with variety shows, while Paris Inter will handle the music department. The newest novelty programs to be introduced consist of two shows dealing with animals. 

The development of television for the products of the skills of the men and women who have made the American Motion Picture Industry the greatest medium of mess communication in the history of the world. Our unions which represent these people are desirous of having these skills utilized to the fullest possible extent.

When the television industry first began to face the problem of an expanded program schedule and the resultant demand for good program material, the leaders of that industry rejected the motion picture industry as an impractical source of such supply. The fabulous wage and salary schedules, the categories with the second control of the motions with which they were only vaguely familiar, would destroy this infant industry, they firmly believed.

But the public soon grew tired of the makeshift type of pro-

they firmly believed.

But the public soon grew tired of the makeshift type of program that characterized the early television programs. Quiz shows and guessing contests grew boring as the novelty of this new gadget wore off. The public began demanding better programs and they began to compare the scope, the quality and the perfection of television, which was, to them becoming a and the perfection of television, which was, to them becoming a new kind of motion picture, with the same quality that had become standard on the screen of the American motion picture theater. It was at this point that television began looking seriously at motion pictures and began seriously to contemplate becoming a part of this industry. As they hegan reamining the

becoming a part of this industry. As they began examining the industry they learned quite to their surprise that the motion picture industry was not the inefficient, "ally si'od" type of operation that they had pictured it from information they had previously received from inadequate sources. True, it was expensive, but from a technical point of view, it was also most qualified. It soon became evident that it could be efficient if quality were given a full mea-

dent that it could be efficient if quality were given a full measure of consideration. The unions in the motion picture industry have welcomed this new program of production. They have not saddled the industry with demands for residuals and extra compensation. They have asked only that they be paid for their skills in accordance with the rates which they have established thru years

The web exect see numerous reasons for this resurgence. One is that the old belief that it's easier to clear time on a spot rather than network basis is proving less true today, and station reps are hardly better equipped than the networks to arrange clearances. Along this line, some webs already are placing sponsors' film shows in certain otherwise unnatainable markets on a spot basis in addition to markets which are cleared on a regular network basis.

Rely on Webs

Another factor is a growing feeling of responsibility to the networks by affoliates, especially in one and two-station markets. The outlets, which hitherto have been having a field day, recognize that with the ending of the freeze, they will lean more on the webs as competition comes into their cities, and now are more co-operative about clearing time. They know the time is coming when they will be basic affiliates of a single network only in their city, and will rely more on the web involved.

American Video Market Views Europe as Major Film Source

The production of television films in Europe for the American video market has meant many things to many people. The cost-cutting promise of fered by foreign film production hasn't always been fulfilled, but producers and distributors are still looking to the Continent as a major source of both theatrical and specially produced for television films. Looking far into the future, American TV braze also thinks of Europe as a market for its locally produced products.

From a round-up of TV film

rope as a market for its locally produced products.

From a round-up of TV film production in Europe as compiled by The Billiboard correspondents in Paris, London, Rome and Copenhagen, it is evident that TV film has made some deep economic impressions on the various countries there. The smaller independent French film producers were given the long awaited chance to make some money. Italy sees TV film production as a major new industry. England has become heavily involved in the field, while the Scandinavian countries and other European nations are still in the early stages of investing time, money and effort. America still sees Europe as a major, untapped source of film product for TV use here but only a few large outfits have been willing to attempt any real tapping of the source.

TV film action in Western

TV film action in Western Europe ranges from actual full scale production to wild pipe dreams, and includes a batch of new firms, new studios, concrete plans and the usual wildcatting attending a new industry. Major activity in many nations has centered around the release to television of theatrical films from large studios in England, France and Italy. The latter action has created a mild boom in the re-dubbing business. At the moment, for example, a batch of 52 French films are being negotiated for in this country, with Marlene Dietrich involved in the proposed transaction. As the major Hollywood studios continue to hold off releasing their films for TV, film buyers are being forced to deal more frequently with foreign firms. An unusual switch in the film TV film action in Western

Irequently with foreign firms. An unusual switch in the film business, and one which may portend similar actions in the future, was the recent deal made by Sheldon Reynolds, "Foreign Intrigue" producer, who has released his TV films for theatrical distribution in Europe. And a few weeks earlier, Italian video brass picked up telecasting rights to a large group of American products for use on Rome's TV outlet.

Using all-British casts and production crews, Fairbanks has completed three pilot films which National Broadcasting Company is said to be ready to piek up for network use and syndication. The Fairbanks' pilots are "Foreign Leglon," an adventure story, directed by Daniel Birt and written by Anthony Bartley. "The Accused," a semi-documentary thriller, from a screenplay by John and Gwen Bagni with additional dialog by Robert Westerbey and direction under Lawrence Huntington, and "Silent Man," a dramatic film directed by Terence Fisher and written by Lewis Rosoff, Herman Blazer was co-producer and Alan Gray music composer for all three films.

Fairbanks plans to produce the remaining films in each se-

films.
Fairbanks plans to produce the remaining films in each series whether NBC buys the pilots or not. If the web goes along, then he will be backed to the extent of \$2,240,000. If not, he will use his own money. In either case, the production program calls for one half-hour film each week. Other Fairbanks plans for TV film include the release of several of his father's theatrical films after some re-dubbing and editing.

Among the smaller producers of TV film now operating in England are Harry Alan. Towers, who just six months ago said he had little or no interest in TV films. Real Films of Vienna is now tied up with a British film producer and is ready to dump \$350,000 in Austrian film funds into TV production. Recently, too, J. Arthur Rank shot a TV film series based on stories from the Bible.

And the most of the execs are

And tho most of the execs are happy with their present activities and future plans, British Actors' Equity is disturbed by these same plans. The union worries about its members being raid flat rates for work in TV films, and being unable to check the number of uses to be made of the films in America. They are concerned, too, over whether they are getting proper cilling here in the United States. In all, well over \$1,500,000 has already been poured into the TV film production business in England. If only half of the firms who've announced plans to produce additional films in England actually come thru, then the figure will top \$5,000,000 within the next six months.

In France, according to Bill-board correspondent, Anne Michaels, the production of TV films eased a major problem for some independent producers. Strict government regulations imposed on the making of Eng-lish-speaking films covered such lish-speaking films covered such a key element as percentage of French actors and technicians to be used. As a result, the small firms have found it uneconomical to get involved in producing theatrical products for American use. Television films, however, come under the heading of short subjects. If the producer can guarantee lummediate export of the films, he is fairly free of production regulations. He must guarantee hat the film will never be shown in French territory.

As a result, there has been

As a result, there has been much activity among the smaller firms in France. The two basic types of production companies are those who stick to producing films for American TV, and those producing films in French for later re-dubbing into English. Last year, for example, Englishman John Nasht shot his Dolores Gray series in Paris using French nitery and vaudeville stars. Of late, Shedon Reynolds has shifted a major portion of his filming to Paris from Stockholm. Major business being done in TV in France is still the selling of theatrical films for use on American video stations. Deeply involved in the latter field are such firms as Signa-Vog and Cine-Doublage. Former turns out theatrical shorts and documentaries while the latter handles a large share of the redubbing of French and Italian films. The filming of series for American TV usage is still in the early stages of development. Tele-Films in Paris started to produce a half-hour series based on 'The Three Musketeers,' but didn't get very far. Bill Marshall Productions is currently casting in Paris for a series of 3 detective story films scheduled to go into production in August. Souvain Selective Pietures, an American firm which has been buying theatrical films for American TV abowings, also plans to start producing a detective series and one based on he adventures of an American

has been buying theatrical films for American TV showings, also plans to start producing a detective series and one based on the adventures of an American couple in France. The firm recently shelved plans to turn out a TV film series using the Grand Guignol plays.

Affecting the future plans of many potential film production units in France is pending governmental restrictions on TV film production. Currently, for example, the government forbids the showing on TV of any theatrical film under five years of age. There is some expectation that the same ruling may be applied to French films on American TV.

The New York Daily News started off this new vote-chaser show in a big way, bringing in two of the top foreign policy spokesmen of the major parties and plugging the preem with big ads in the daily papers. The show is an adaptation of a feature that regularly appears in the News itself. The format worked out for the program was simply a hybrid of the systems used on several network discussion shows. Essentially it was nothing other than an argument between the two principals, John Foster Dulles and W. Averell Harriman, with moderator Cecil Brown stolidly presiding between the two with moderator Cecil Brown stolidly presiding between the two combatants. But to make sure that things kept moving and that several facets of the subject, foreign policy, were covered, two journalists and two politicos were on hand to serve up questions to the guest stars.

Can't Go Wrong

This arrangement was certainly adequate. Indeed, how could it go wrong in view of the caliber of personnel involved? The board of interrogators actually was not in the pleture too much. Each of them simply took turn to give either Dulles or Harriman a question. The two gentlemen answered them directly and with no apparent attempt to filibuster.

Dulles and Harriman have appeared together on another discussion show since the current campaign began. This time Harriman seemed to come off the bet-ter. He smiled affably on several ter. He smiled affably on several occasions, while Dulles remained rather grim. Harriman furthermore got in a few good digs. He pointed out for instance that the Soviet hate campaign against the U. Altho Jimmy Durante made his TV debut less than two years ago (November I, 1950), he already has undisputed ownership of "Most lovable guy in TV" title, both by right of showmanship and a consistent show of good sportsmanship toward visiting artists. The "Schnozz" is always a personal success, whatever the caliber of his program in general.

Last Saturday's "All-Star Revue" was a case in point, with Durante scoring his 'usual personal triumph despite so-so material, less than sparkling production numbers and disappointing performances by Margaret Truman and Phil Harris.

The fact that the daughter of the President of the United States can participate in a song and dance number with a slapstick comedian on TV is a wonderful, truly American phenomenon, and certainly nothing to write a bardeview about. However, let's face it, Miss Truman is no Ethel Merman (or Helen Traubel for that matter) and shouldn't be presented as such. She's a remarkably relaxed, pleasant girl, with a nice sense of comedy timing and somewhat less impressive vocal gifts. Her previous strut-away comedy bits with Durante were acceptable as a novelty, but the prospect of Miss Truman playing musical-comedy-vis-a-vis Durante on a regular basis is a dismal one. NBC is doing Miss Truman a diservice by casting her in roles that demand an Ethel Merman, Mary Martin or Martha Raye.

For instance, on the show caught (20), she appeared in several comedy skits with Durante and Harris, topped off by an elaborate political satire production number, involving the candidacy of Durante for president, with Miss Truman as his running mate a la "Of Thee I Sing." She tried hard, but ever Durante's exuberant cover-ups couldn't conceal the fact that she was out of her class, particularly on the musical sequence. In all fairness to Miss Truman, NBC should spot her in less demanding roles on future airers.

On this show, there seemed to be a plethora of missed opportunities for even greater-laughter than was drawn. But there were sufficient belly-ticklers to keep the fans satisfied, and it is tough to find a critical Martin and Lewis fan.

Empty Kick-off

A brief opening sequence in which the duo were tossed onto a couch at a psychiatrists' conference wound up somewhat emptily just as it seemed on the verge of building into something truly hilarious. A sketch detailing a visit by the pair to an Italian town whence sprang the Martin family was, in the main, a dud. Another, dealing with Jerry as a private eye guarding the silver at Dean's wedding, was in the riotous tradition of the team, if uneven in production. There were missed lines and goofed-up cues, but the fluffs only gave Lewis an opportunity to mugg and ad lib, and this never hurt the stature of the comics with their following.

Nalsh, in the Luigi role he has so successfully portrayed on radio these many years, is superb, and limited only by the more maudlin and asinine portions of the script. Here, at least in episode one, lies the show's major weakness.

Writers Benoff and Derman overdo both the plottling and the individual dialog badly, which results in unattractive performances even by the most able of the actors and pitiful presentations by the players who are not too apt at their trade to begin with. As previously noted, however, Cy Howard and his crew, thanks to Luigi's happy spotting, have time to correct the faults in the show. Now the film could have evoked much more interest if the business with the courier were presented visually only. The specifics of the plan might have been kept from the audience, as well as from 'Adams, until the end when the thunder claps and the mission is completed.

With Du Pont sponsorship and with the wealth of history as its theme, this TV film series presents an opportunity to try some of the different approaches people in the industry sometlmes talk about. Du Pont has used three different film companies on the first series of 13. Midst all this film talent there must be an idea someplace.

Extensive doctoring is needed to get "Bernardine." Mary Chase's new comedy, in shape for the Stem. She has written a play that is at once original, amusing and frequently touching—as well as being formless, undeveloped and brimful of a vague boozy philosophy more suited to the character of Elwood P. Dowd than the problems of adolescence. Her theme is the sulf of feeling.

Her theme is the gulf of feeling that exists between youth and age. The central character is an 18-year-old lad, plagued by the discovery of sex, a child merged with an adult, In a city of the Far West, he pals with a gang of kindred spirits who serenade Bernardine. a dream girl from "Sneaky Falls, Idaho, and the only word she knows is 'yes'."

Mrs. Chase undoubtedly has an

Mrs Chase undoubtedly has an ear for the speech patterns of adolescence, and she has captured the phrasing and rhythms of such talk with amazing fidelity. However, she does not use much selectivity in her dialog, and the constant repetition of certain key words tends to become as tedious as it is in life. The boy is well drawn, but the other members of his clique are shadowy and without motive. We are told they come from the country-club set, and they like to hang out in the Shamrock saloon and drink 3.2 beer, but little else explains their strange behavior.

The play's conflict becomes more sharply defined when Bernardine finally shows up as an older woman, a friend of the lad's mother, and invites the boy to her hotel room. There follows the death of the dream but a growing understanding of himself. Again, Mrs. Chase's craftsmanship is dubious. It is difficult to believe an experienced woman would respond so completely to the lad's humbling advances. Indeed, this lack of comprehension extends to all her adult characters. The boy's mother is surely one of the most witless matriarchs on record, without a glimmer of common sense or understanding, much too credulous to be accepted.

Johnny Stewart's performance as the perplexed Wormy is adroit and authoritative, highlighting the humor without losing any of the pathos of his role. Irene Hervey, despite the thinness of her part, does some personable thesping. John Kerr, as Arthur Beaumont, the leader of the gang, makes an auspicious debut onstage, and the remainder of the cast is excellent. Only Beverly Lawrence, playing a floozie rather than a divorce of sensibility, seems miscast.



1952 Grosses Vary

In those sections of the country where such factors as weather, public health and general prosperity were evident thru most of the recently concluded season, operators reported increased grosses over their 1951 figures, with the average increase running about 20 per cent.

Some operators, especially those in portions of the Midwest, were hard hit during the summer by fluctuating weather which found the thermometers soaring well over the 90-degree mark for days on end, and by one of the most severe polio epidemics in years. In these areas the average gross plunged about 25 per cent as compared with the previous year.

Strikes were an important factor in the over-all gross picture, with areas where steel mills were closed, shipping and building rades were shut down and local labor difficulties were noted, causing serious crimps in the box office.





No Vote Needed

The ASCAP membership is not required to vote upon the adoption of the new distribution plan. Approval of the classification committee and action by the board is deemed sufficient. This has already been accomplished. The Society now, on both the writer and publisher levels, is on a performance pay-off basis primarily. This virtually negates the old machinery of appeals boards and arbitration panels. Should the plan prove workable in its essentials, it will be considered a notable accomplishment—for althoit streamlines the pay-off plan, it, nevertheless, clings to philosophies which the Society has considered very essential—availability and seniority. These have been modified so as to fit into a performance framework. Most ASCAP publishers, at this stage, feel the accomplishment has been a tremendous one, with the Society motivated by instincts of fairness and benevolence.

by numerous independent producers. Italian theatrical films, of course, have already found their way to American TV screens, including such flicks as "Bicycle Thief" and "Open City."

From Copenhagen, Biliboard correspondent, Ted Volfram, reports that there is still limited activity in the Scandinavian countries because of a shortage of studio equipment and a dollar shortage which prevents the purchase of such equipment. In Denmark, Norway and Sweden, the state operates the radio and TV systems with the result that expenditures for TV have been slim.



Born Frederick Ferber, in Alsace on May 28, 1871, he grew up in relative comfort as the son of a burgher. As a cavalry officer he saw and fell in love with Ella Bradna, a great equestrian and member of an old circus family who was then starring in Paris. After a lengthy and frustrating courtship lasting several years, the tribulations of which would have discouraged a less ardent sultor, Fred married Ella and adopted her family name when his own father discowned him.

For some years he worked outside the star's spotlight that Ella had carned and was unhappy in this minor role. His knowledge of five languages and the mixed assortment of imported circus features uttimately led to his appointment of equestrian director, a post that he held for 31 seasons until September 12, 1945, when he was injured in a hlowdown at Dallas.

The so-called modern circus is not that at all, according to Bradna. Streamlining has been added, but the nucleus remains the same. The progress has been good, he says, crediting John Ringling North and Arthur Concello with more ingenuity and showmanship than all of the former's forebears.

In his role as director of more than 27,000 performances under canvas alone, Bradna had ample opportunity to fashion opinions on the relative value of acts. These he lists, with his reasons why, and it is unlikely that many readers will disagree with his judgment.

A special section contains 31 photographs, most of them of historical interest. Many of the pictures are credited to Harry A. Awell and the Burt L. Wilson Collection.

(Editor's Note: Coin machine games manufacturers will need to study the bill carefully since the term "immediate and unrecorded" is vague and might unlinientionally make all free play lilegal in States where the model bill is evantually adopted.)

The District's proposed bill, based on the bar association model, provides stiff fines for professional gambling; provides for the confiscation of gambling equipment and for the revocation of leenses and permits of any establishment found to have gambling devices.




