EDITORIAL **Playing With Fire**

While Capitol Records was buying radio spots on a New York station to air its product, a deejay on that station was urging his listeners to have their tape recorders ready. "We're going to play the entire new Beatles album at 10 p.m. he said, thereby luring his insteners to tape the performance rather than buy an album.

This is mischief of the most devastating sort, and it is a sample of what is happening at many stations across the nation. It symbolizes a policy which is at once immoral and unethical; a policy which can corrode the very fabric of the record-music industry.

If unchecked, such irresponsible use of the airwaves will prove damaging to the copyright interests of publishers and writers, to royalty payments accruing to artists. It will undermine the basis upon which the present profitable record-music industry has been built. Ultimately, radio itself will suffer, inasmuch as its health is largely dependent on the prosperity of the record business.

This threat comes at a time when sales of recorder equipment, largely cassettes, have reached a high.

A campaign to de-emphasize the destructive off-the-air recording capacity of recorders is clearly indicated-and the Record Industry Association of America is clearly the agency to spearhead the move.

Stations, Mfrs. Battle Over **Breaking of Release Dates**

Recorded Sales Head For Peak; Tape 20% of Mart

NEW YORK - Recorded music sales are expected to reach an all-time high this year. One of the important highlights of the year's recorded music sales is the exploding tape cartridge market. According to a Billboard survey of record labels, sales of prerecorded tape cartridges and cassettes could near the quarter-of-a-billion-dollar mark (20 per cent of all recorded music sales) by Dec. 31.

With 10 of the year's 13 four-week periods tallied, Billboard's Record Market Research division projects the total record industry dollar volume from LP's and singles to reach \$1.1 billion. This compares with last year's \$1,051,000,000 - an increase of 4.7 per cent.

Sales of prerecorded tapes,

however, are expected to at least double the 1967 peak, and according to some industry observers, this year's volume may near 150 per cent of the 1967 year total.

A survey of several disk labels show that they are averaging 20 per cent of their total recorded music dollar volume in sales of tape cartridges.

Finkel Overseas to Set Int'l **Trade Parley Wheels Rolling**

LONDON-Coleman Finkel, executive vice-president of James O. Rice Associates, Inc., producer of the International Music Industry Conference, arrived here this week on the first leg of a European tour devoted to meetings with music and record industry executives.

The Rice company, in conjunction with the editors of Record Retailer and Billboard, is selecting industry leaders who will conduct the seminars and address the various sessions. The International Music Industry Conference will be held at the Paradise Island Hotel and Villas, Nassau in the Bahamas, April 20-23. The event is cosponsored by Billboard and Record Retailer.

The agenda of the Conference was published in last week's issue of Billboard, along with details concerning registration.

In addition to meeting with industry executives in London, Finkel's tour on this side of the Atlantic will include conferences with music business leaders in Paris, Milan, Rome, Zurich, Hamburg, Amsterdam, Baarn, plus additional meetings in London.

NEW YORK - A battle is brewing between record manufacturers and radio stations over release date restrictions on airplay. Radio stations contend that they are free to play a record as soon as a piece of material is licensed by BMI, ASCAP or SESAC, while the record manufacturers insist that it is illegal for radio stations to violate their embargo.


The so-called breaking of release dates was sparked by stations in highly competitive mar-

kets out to "scoop" the rival stations. It has gotten to such a point, the manufacturers say, that copies of the records are "pirated" from pressing and distributing facilities ahead of their planned release date.

One radio station manager said, "As far as I'm concerned, more power to a radio station if it can get its hands on and utilize any material it deems instrumental in bringing it above the competition."



NEW YORK-A campaign to raise \$250,000 for an addition to the Bertha Foster Music Building is under way by the University of Miami School of Music, according to Dean F. Lee. The drive is the first project in a \$2 million long-range campaign to expand the music school's facilities, and is part of the University's \$93 million Golden Anniversary Development Program. The University has received approval from the U.S. Office of Education of a federal grant of \$84,369 for the addition; but the University must have matching funds on hand before January 1, 1969. Other funds have also been contributed.

Leadership for the campaign is being provided by Joseph Handleman, pioneer of the record merchandising field, serving as campaign chairman; Joseph Sugarman and Dr. Alfred Reed, Mrs. Cal S. Kellogg, William C. Miller and Dean Lee.

Plans include additions to the Albert Pick Library of a record archive and listening laboratory toward which Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Handleman of Detroit have pledged \$45,000, and Dr. Andre Ross of Toronto \$5,000. This will provide a facility to house Dr. Ross' record archive collection valued in excess of \$225,000.

The University's school of music offers undergraduate study in Applied Music, Music Education, Conducting, Theory-Composition, Music Merchandising, Music Therapy, Music History, and Literature, Studio Music and Jazz and Church Music. Graduate study is offered in Performance, Music Education, Church Music, Musicilogy, Theory-Composition and Conducting.

Pocket Disc as Single Aid Seen

LOS ANGELES-The fourinch Pocket Disc may be one solution to the many problems now plaguing the singles market. That's the opinion of Bob Yorke, vice-president of Capitol Records Distributing Corp.

Capitol is interested in the growth and development of the 49-cent 331/3 single and was among the first companies providing its masters to American, developers of the Pocket Disc concept.

Recently returned from a visit to the Seattle area to analyze

ness is guilty of a terrible distortion," he said.

Yorke said that the movement he saw of Pocket Discs through vending machines proves that the product can be successfully sold this way. He even saw Pocket Discs outselling regular 45 rpm singles in areas where both products were placed sideby-side.

The quality of a Pocket Disc. Yorke feels, is every bit as good as a regular 45 single. "The Pocket Disc is not fragile and it can be shipped in envelopes. American can press 9,300 an hour; I can hold 500 in my hand. In a suitcase I can hold enough stock to service 50 accounts." Yorke believes Capitol must adventurously pursue the future. He sees "self destruction" built into the industry's singles business. "Many people just won't believe the singles business is sick. And there are companies that supply their music for duplication in the Pocket Disc configuration. Yorke sees the vending of Pocket Discs as an answer to what he feels is an indifference and ignorance of retail clerks to work with singles merchandise.

Moving from Decca to Kapp, along with Goldberg, who takes over as vice-president and general manager, are Louis J. Sebock, who becomes director of sales, and Jack Kiernan, who becomes national sales manager. In the Kapp to Decca move are Jack Wiedenmann and Tony Martell. Wiedenmann becomes artists and repertoire executive administrator, and Martell will be director of marketing.

NEW YORK-Amos Heilicher, veteran distributor-rack jobber, received the Israel Prime Minister's Award at a "tribute" dinner Sunday (1) at the Pick-Nicollet Hotel in Minneapolis. The award was made in recognition of Heilicher's "devotion to the Jewish people and the State of Israel."

Britain Hit by New Tax Hike

LONDON-Purchase tax on records in the U. K. was increased for the second time last week.

The tax was increased by 15 per cent to 55 per cent in a series of tax increases and other financial restraints announced by the government following a run on the franc and the European monetary crisis.

The tax will add 3 cents to the price of a single and 11 cents to a pop album.

In March, the purchase tax was raised from 271/2 per cent and is now double the rate at the beginning of the year.

Initial industry reaction is that the increase will not affect the Christmas sales boom but in January the over-all clamp on the economy may filter through to record sales.

Under the terms of the agreement, Stereo Dimension will also have Athena's product for tape and tape cartridge duplication globally.

Essentially, the pact gives Athena, a Nashville label, widespread distribution without the financial burden of disk promotion. D. Kilpatrick and his staff will concentrate on production. Athena's range of repertoire will expand to encompass pop, rock and underground "progressive rock" music, in addition to country.

First product under the arrangement will be released in January, Athena will release this year a minimum of 12 singles and six albums.

NEW YORK - Julie Rifkin of Guardian Productions has formed a new label called Event Records. The formation of the label was sparked by Rifkind's acquisition of the master, "Sweets for My Sweet," by Central Park West.

The recording is now part of a package production deal between Event and the writingproducing team of Cahman, Pistilli and West. In addition to Event, Guardian also has the Spring label.

Bell Offers Int'l Hookup To U.S., U.K. Producers

NEW YORK - British and U. S. independent producers who lease product through Bell Records will be offered international release through what Bell President Larry Utall calls "a trans-Atlantic traffic of product."

Utall recently returned from a 10-day European trip, visiting radio stations and executives of Bell distributors in England (EMI), France (Pathe Marconi) and Germany (CBS-Schallplatten). In these three countries the Bell logo is established. The company will also be cutting local talent there, CBS-Schallplatten has appointed a fulltime promotion, sales and a&r man to work on Bell in Germany and Utall is planning major promotion in Frankfurt and

Paris to launch Bell officially in these countries. Bell appeared under its own logo in England in March.

Said Utall, "With the trans-Atlantic traffic we are able to offer, the independent producers whose product we distribute will have the strongest possible world-wide release. The music and record industry is international and we are putting the same personalized emphasis on promotion merchandising and sales overseas as we do in the U. S."

Utall announced that Bell's fiscal sales for 1968 rose 70 per cent over 1967. During 1968, Bell has had 39 chart singles and 7 chart albums, he said.

UA Key to Int'l Gold Strikes

NEW YORK-United Atists Records is seeking to reverse the international flow of gold. Within the past few weeks, the company has received six gold record awards from four countries-England, Canada, Argentina and Australia-in addition to the three gold disks it received in the U.S. and two others it has applied for in Canada.

Key factor in UA's gold rush has been the worldwide success of Bobby Goldsboro's "Honey." With the Bobby Russell-penned tune reaching the top chart spot in more than a dozen countries, Goldsboro received gold records in Australia, Canada, Argentina and England.

In Canada, UA recording artist Gordon Lightfoot received a gold record for the only Canadian artist ever to achieve 125,-000 sales on an album, "Lightfoot." According to Ron Eyre, operations director for the label's international division, UA is about to apply for two more gold records for Lightfoot's second and third albums. Canada's gold album awards represent 100,000 sales.

In the soundtrack category UA's "A Man and a Woman" received a gold record in Australia.

Two albums in the series, Louis Armstrong's "Disney Song the Satchmo Way" and "The Kids of the Kingdom," are packaged without books.





BMI, Stations In Fee Accord

NEW YORK - Broadcast Music Inc. will get more money from radio stations in an agreement reached with the broadcasters last week. The agreement effects about 1,000 radio stations.

Under the agreement all stations whose "net receipts from advertisers after deductions" are less than \$80,000 will initially pay 1.25 per cent of the receipts to BMI. Stations having net receipts in excess of \$80,000 will pay initially 1.48 per cent, but costs will increase about 1/5 of 1 per cent in the final three years of the five-year contract.

Under the old license, stations with net receipts from advertisers of \$100,000 or over were paying 1.35 per cent.

AFM 28-Day Strike Over

NEW YORK - The 28-day strike by the American Federation of Musicians against the three major broadcasting networks ended Thursday (28) when affected musicians in New York, Los Angeles and Miami voted to accept a new two-year contract and return to work.

Under terms of the new contract, which is retroactive to Aug. 1, casual musicians won wage increase of 10 per cent for both rehearsal and air time, and network staff musicians won a weekly increase of \$23 to a base of \$280.70. The union had sought an immediate increase of \$64 a week.

is unknown or overdone that the audience/consumer interest begins to diminish. "The standard artist," said Gold, "must deal in repertoire that people have heard recently and want to hear now." By giving the established artists the repertoire of today, he added, we can attract both the adult and the youth markets. "The record buyer likes these standard artists even more than before," he said, "as we can see by the sales figures of their albums that feature contemporary music."

It's Gold's belief that contemporary music applies to all things "that exists and flower today" and should not be pigeonholed into one particular category of artist.

Although the market appears to be wide open for renditions of current pop clicks by standard artists, Gold finds that he's still "throwing out about 90 per cent of the hits." He explained, "A hit song that is to be recorded by a standard artist has

Kay Starr, Count Basie to Make LP Music Together

LOS ANGELES—Kay Starr and the Count Basie band are scheduled to record their first LP together next month in New York, marking a return for the veteran singer to the milieu of jazz bands.

"It's been about 24 years between jazz band dates," Miss Starr recalls. Her last major association with a jazz band as its featured singer was with Charlie Barnett. For two years Miss Starr traveled with Barnett, recording such songs as "You Always Hurt the One You Love" and "Share Cropper's Blues."

Miss Starr went to Barnett's band after four years with jazz violinist Joe Venuti's band, her initial exposure to the world of bands, standup performances night after night and the world of the blues.

The LP is titled "How About This?" The project is also the fifth Basie has done for Dot, including two with the Mills Brothers.

Repertoire for the LP will utilize new and established songs Miss Starr with Basie belongs to her manager, Bill Weems, who says the album was a factor in signing with Dot. Many Factors

There are many factors that come into play before Gold and the artist decide upon the songs that go into the album. The sales of the pop hit, the longevity of the song on the charts and the "rightness" of the song for the artist and the concept of the album are weighted carefully before a song is selected. The importance of this selectivity has been figured out by Gold to mean that one wrong song in an album can knock off 10 per cent of its sales.

"The album business has changed so," Gold said, "that publishers, writers and even artists can no longer say to an a&r man, 'if you can't put the song out as a single, put it in an album.' An album is like a motion picture, everything has to fit."

The contemporary music project with Miss Streisand is still "a work in progress," with album title and songs still to be decided upon. It's being prepared even though her soundtrack album of "Funny Girl," the movie offshoot of the Broadway musical that dwelled on the 1920's career of Fanny Brice, is shaping up as her all-time best-selling album. The figure becomes more dramatic when placed in perspective of 1967's year-end reports from the Harry Fox Office, publishers agent and trustee, and the Record Industry Association of America. According to both sources, last year's tape sales approximated 10 per cent of total recorded music sales.

Industry leaders are quick to add that the cartridge concept, mass market merchandise for only three years, has yet to more than indent its full market potential. Only in the past few months have tape cartridge and cartridge equipment manufacturers begun to actively promote their wares on the consumer level.

And another major stimulus this year has been the increasing availability of tape cartridge counterparts of the top LP's, coupled with simultaneous album and cartridge release.

According to the RMR survey, the 8-track configuration claims the lion's share of total tape sales. While no precise information could be ascertained, 8-track cartridges are believed to represent about 75 per cent of the tape market.





Garrett Acquired by Omega for \$3 Million

LOS ANGELES — Snuff Garrett Productions, a complex of record and publishing companies, has been acquired by Omega Equities Corp. for \$3 million in cash, to be spread over three years. The company will operate as a subsidiary of the publicly owned diversification company.

The two principals, Snuff Garrett and Ed Silvers, have also been given a stock option in the conglomerate which also has tendered an offer to buy Roulette Records and its subsidiary labels and a score of publishing companies. In the tape field, Omega owns the North American Leisure Corp., a relatively new cartridge duplicator.

Garrett and Silvers will remain as autonomous leaders of their company. The two have been partners for two years, with Garrett forming his independent production company one year earlier after having left Liberty Records. Involved in the purchase, which gives Omega its first West Coast music company, are Viva and Bravo Records and the following publishing companies: Viva, Zapata, Stone Canyon, Gringo and Baby Monica Music.

Concurrent with the purchase, Silvers and Garrett have purchased another publishing company, Cricket Music, owned by Bonny Curtis and Jerry Allison. Silvers and Garrett also administer two companies, Hombre, co-owned with Trini Lopez and Cinco, co-owned with the Lennon Sisters.

The Garrett-Silvers operation estimates its net profit before taxes at the end of its fiscal year in April will reach \$600,000.

There are around 600 copyrights controlled by all the Garrett-Silvers publishing companies, 300 in Viva, the top publishing firm which owns hits by the Union Gap and Vogues, among others.

22 Writers Are Enrolled in BMI's First Theater Class

NEW YORK — A group of 22 writers is meeting at regular intervals as the first class in the BMI (Broadcast Music, Inc.) West Coast Musical Theater Workshop. Lehman Engel, director of the project, is conducting the sessions.

Engel will make a series of visits to the West Coast to meet with the group at Universal Studios. Included among members of the current workshop are Don and Dick Addrisi, writers of "Never My Love"; Jimmy Griffin and Mide Gordon, writers of "Apologize"; Jerry Capehart, writer of "Turn Around, Look at Me" and Ernie Shelby, who has just completed his first picture assignment, in collaboration with Quincy Jones, with whom he wrote the title song for the current MGM release, "The Split." The West Coast Workshop is an offshoot of BMI's Musical Theater Workshop which was founded eight years ago by BMI to expand opportunity for creative and experimenal activity in the theater by composers and lyricists. Participants include persons affiliated with BMI, as well as those who are not. No charge is made to any

persons attending. Director Lehman Engel's approach at the workshop is similar in concept to that of the Actors Studio, with its membership meeting professional audition requirements.

All writers, lyricists and/or composers who wish to join the workshop must first submit material. This can be on tape, recording or in manuscript form, showing some indication of potential for writing for the musical theater. Engel makes the final selection of participants in the class.

The "Rudolph' color spectacular with Burl Ives and score by Marks will have its fifth annual showing Friday (6), on NBC, presented by General Electric. The sponsor has renewed for three more years. Decca again will promote the soundtrack album.

Mitchell Gives Lustre to Gems

NEW YORK — Some of the top songs of the decade were beautifully performed by Chad Mitchell in his one-man show, "Counterpoint (Songs from the New Renaissance)," which opened at the Bitter End on Monday (25). Material included compositions of Bob Dylan, Paul Simon, Jake Holmes and Tim Buckley.

From his offstage opening number, Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind," it was evident that the Bell artist was in top form and the line-up of sensitively delivered meaningful selections bore this out. Reaching the stage as he concluded the opening number, he quickly went into Dylan's "The Times They Are A-Changing."

Another Dylan high point was the tender "Sad Eyed Lady of the Lowland," while the soft verion of "Mr. Tambourine Man" also hit the mark. And, the folow-up number "Just Like a Voman" continued the high levof Dylan interpretations. The other two Dylan numbers were blockbusters as Mitchell ended the first half with a fierce, bitter "Like a Rolling Stone," and humorously made the point with Rainy Day Woman No. 12 & 35." In the latter he went up and down aisles and jumped onto a bench, but still emphasized the song's sardonic message.

Another fine, bitter number was Holmes' "Genuine Imitation of Life." "Wish I Was Anywhere Else" was a good comic selection by the same writer. Another bitterly comic song was Simon's "Big Bright Pleasure Machine," which followed Simon's slower meaningful "The Dangling Conversation." One of the few optimistic segments was Simon's "The 59th Street Bridge Song (Feelin' Groovy)."

Even the Doors' "Light My Fire" had added meaning when done by Mitchell. Gracie Slick's "White Rabbit," which was paired with the Mick Jagger-Keith Richard "Sing This All Together," was strong building number. "Goodbye and Hello" of Buckley and Larry Beckett with its dramatic impact and changing tempos was a powerful closing selection.

During the evening, Mitchell frequently turned his back to the audience or faced his supporting musicians to help create mood. Lights and movement also were effectively used. The show's musicians were Monte Dunn on 12-string guitar, electric guitar and six-string accoustical guitar; Warren Bernhardt on organ, keyboards, acoustical guitar and flute; Hal Gaylor on electric bass; and Joe Hunt on drums and incidental percussion. The outstanding job Mitchell did on the material of the program could indicate repertoire ideas for recordings for his new label. Bell. FRED KIRBY

Montenegro in 'Foreground' With Switch From 'Background' Music

LOS ANGELES—"You can't sell background-type music anymore," said arranger-composer Hugo Montenegro, who discovered music with a young sound and recorded his first major hit, "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly."

An arranger since 1945, Montenegro had one album commitment left for RCA when he cut the LP of themes from Clint Eastwood Western films.

"I had never really listened to contemporary music before," he said. His albums were all of a large orchestral nature with sweeping strings and a sweet sound. On what was to be his last RCA project, he decided to develop a different sound, use different colors. "I got hold of the top 10 records my kids had bought and listened for how to utilize electric guitars and what the contemporary drum patterns were."

Montenegro broken has through into the motion picture scorer's fraternity and begun to work steadily in this medium. For the Columbia Pictures feature, "The Wrecking Crew," which he just completed, he utilized a "small" group and nine voices working with a rich sound reminiscent of the Mamas and Papas. A small orchestra group for Montenegro numbers 35 men; he generally records with as many as 70 men.

Montenegro set up the vocal




HENRY JEROME, artists & repertoire director of United Artists Records, discussing a recording project with Page Morton, who is debuting on the label.

Montenegro's first film was "Hurry Sundown," for Otto Preminger, for which RCA obtained the soundtrack LP. Montengro spent three months on location with Preminger watching the filming. He credits Preminger with helping teach him how "not to Mickey Mouse a film score" how to avoid placing musical emphasis in the wrong places. He has since scored "The (Continued on page 18)



Fillmore's House-Full of Talent

NEW YORK — Whenever the Youngbloods chant "Let's Get Together," the hippie peace anthem, crowds sway, sing along and jive like kids do on the last day of camp to "Friends, Friends, Friends." But no sooner had nostalgia settled over Fillnore East Friday (22) than Canned Heat hit the patrons at the seams with their heavyweight country blues, electrified for city swellers, Iron Butterfly, Atco heavies, also shared in the three-way mind-demolition derby.

The Youngbloods, now a trio minus lead guitarist Jerry Corbitt, worked up to their "Let's Get Together" epic with songs

from an upcoming RCA album and two earlier LP's. Led on vocals by bass Jesse Colin Young, the San Franciscans featured the straight-ahead chimes and tremelo organ of Banana, who doubled on blues guitar with his Chuck Berry apings. Joe Bauer handled the stickwork with energy and precision. "Sugar Babe," "Saturday's Child," "The Wine Song" and a new tune, "Darkness, Darkness," brightened the group's lyrical rock repertoire, while "Beautiful" stood out as the jewel of the lot. But without guitarist Corbitt, whose simple, ringing riffs dressed up the group's honky-tonk, un-psychedelic rock work,

Seasons Create Own Climate: Pure Pop

NEW YORK—The Four Seasons opened at the Waldorf-Astoria's Empire Room Monday (25) with an act that was pure pop—untouched by soul, psychodelia, underground or any of he trendy sounds of today. And who needs it when the quartet, sparked by Frankie Valli's high pitched voice (which occasionaly only dogs and a a&r men an hear) possesses one of the really distinctive sounds of the 60's, with a whole string of Philips goldies to back them up.

However, hit records do not nightclub act make. But the beasons get across to the supper lub audience as four separate nclividuals, each with his own part to play in the guartet.


The audience gets a sample of his via a pop lesson the Seaons deliver, based on their hit, "Cherry." Each man offers his own part of the number first and then they put the different —and often highly detailed components together for a driving version of the tune.

Much of the material is, of course, familiar - "Walk Like a Man," "Can't Take My Eyes Off of You," "My Mother's Eyes," and even "Don't Think Twice" (with Valli sounding like Rose Murphy). Their closing item, "I've Got You Under My Skin," managed to get close to the highly complex single of the song that the Seasons made, Interesting too was Valli's burlesque female version, "I'm in the Mood for Love." He went into the King Pleasure "vocalese" adaption of the number which was a sophisticated hit of IAN DOVE the '50's.

the Youngbloods are only threefourths of the fine group whose "Earth Music" album is required listening in top pop circles.

Canned Heat, on the other hand, was decades away (in the past) and fathoms deeper than the friendly rock personality of the Youngbloods. Five blues scholars whose study habits are early-Neanderthal, cavorted and bounded to the beat of the new urban blues. Ground up in the rock wringer and sifted through massive amplifiers, Canned Heat adds a new aspect to country blues - high electric bills. But like the Salem ad, they may take the blues out of the country, but not the country out of the blues, Elmore James' "Dust My Broom" classic, written by Robert Johnson in 1936, and Sonny Boy Williamson's "Help Me," joined the quintet's "On the Road Again" hit as the best white blues to grace Fillmore. Their virtuoso instrumentals and power-plays to the wailing of Bob "Bear" Hite have made the Liberty Records blues belters just about the top group in the revival of pure rural rock and country soul.

Canned Heat's boogie series --- "Fried Hockey Boogie," "Boo-gie Music," "Refried Boogie Parts I and II" and "Parthenogenesis," the last two featured on their new "Livin' the Blues" double LP-has given blues revivalists more musical history to jam and gig to today than any group in the U.S. Bassist Lary Taylor takes the bass out of the class of a lowly support instrument, Henry Vestine caresses and coaxes incredibly exciting licks from his guitar and Al Wilson shows off an old-fashioned finesse on the slide guitar, rhythm (Continued on page 20)

Sinatra was in top form and only on the "Carousel" piece, a very dramatic, demanding composition, did he stumble once. Otherwise, the singer's phrasing, his ability to sing behind the beat, with the tempo and to stretch words over several musical bars were all remarkable.

Sinatra sang 15 songs fully and combined portions of seven others for a happy medley of reminiscences. He stayed away from the very fast tempo tunes on which he has to stretch his voice, so that "Moonlight In Vermont," others for a happy medley of My Years," "All The Way," and "Nancy with the Laughing Face" were gems of sophistication and meaningful statements.



Davis to Head Jazz Festival In San Diego



Custom Duper

LOS ANGELES — Magnetic Tape Engineering Corp. has been formed as a custom duplicator. It will begin operation next year. The company is the second to announce itself in recent weeks, Jubilee Industries setting up a tape duplicating factory near its Monarch Record pressing plant.

Magnetic Tape Engineering (Magtec) is comprised of a number of former executives from Magnetic Tape Duplicators (MTD), which was purchased by Certron last April. Certron is a local manufacturer of blank tape.

Magtec is being established in a 30,000-square-foot warehouse in North Hollywood. The facility will house a projected 56 slave units plus a new automated duplicating system. The facility will also act as a distribution point for custom clients. Magtec will duplicate 4 and 8-track plus cassettes.

Key executives include Alan Clark, president and chief executive officer. Clark is also president of Alto Fonic Programming, a local supplier of automated tapes of music for radio stations.

Clark's staff includes Ken Goates, executive vice-president (Continued on page 24)

STORK WAITS IN

Tape CARtridge Motown's 8 at 250,000 Mo.

By HANK FOX

DETROIT—Although Motown Records is shipping 250,000 8-track tape CARtridges each month, it is still back-ordered. So said Mel DaKroob, the company's national tape and album sales manager, as he disclosed to Billboard that 8-track cartridges now account for 20 per cent

of Motown's total recorded music sales. This does not include sales from the label's 4-track and cassette product, which are licensed to Muntz Stereo-Pak and Ampex, respectively.

"We're at the point," the executive said, "where we can produce almost enough cartridges to fill our orders." Before Motown assigned its 4-track duplication to Muntz in August, it was shipping about 80,000 4 and 8-track cartridges per month, DaKroob said, At that time, Stereodyne was duplicating all of Motown's 4 and 8track cartridges.

"With our marketing and production restricted to 8-track cärtridges," DaKroob said, "we upped our production to 110,000 pieces in September and October. In November, we shipped 250,000 tapes, with about the same amount this month."

To meet its exploding demand, Motown has contracted RCA Records' custom tape duplicating division to supplement Stereodyne's 8-track production.

Ampex Bonus For Micro 85

LOS ANGELES — Ampex is marketing a new prerecorded and blank tape package as a premium with the purchase of a Micro 85 stereo cassette recorder/player. Kroob said, "we will have sold more than 1.5 million 8-track cartridges," This figure more than doubles Motown's 700,000 8-track number for 1967.

Motown's increased emphasis on its tape cartridge product can be seen by its current release. With 11 new cartridges marking its Christmas offering, the company is issuing more titles at one time on tape than in the past.

The 11 titles include two tapes by Diana Ross and the Supremes, the Marvelettes, Marvin Gaye, Marvin Gaye and Tammi Terrell, the Four Tops and Smokey Robinson and the Miracles. Motown's 8-track catalog consists of 103 cartridges, representing its Motown, Tamla, Gordy and Soul labels.

The Audio Track line retails in the U.S. for \$2.98, and Katz estimates his catalog can reach a 1,000 title peak

Finally, with music blaring from the player, the couple dashed off to the hospital.

CHICAGO—Globe Glass and Trim Co., Inc., with nine outlets in Illinois, has entered the tape CARtridge retailing field and will sell and install hardware and prerecorded product. The 15-yearold diversified firm, as some other outlets in the automotive service field, was initially approached

The Pentangle (Reprise 6315)

The Pentangle, like Music From Big Pink, is a musical experience which has its own identity, unlike most "pop music" today. The reason for this is simply that the musicians involved are professionals and their musical tastes and abilities have guided their careers, not dollar signs or star status.

A good stereo system is essential for fully appreciating this album, which was produced by Shel Talmy, wellknown in England as a producer (the Who, the Kinks, etc.). He has done an excellent job on this album, especially since the only amplified instrument in the group is Danny Thompson's bass. Probably he used pickups on the acoustic guitars of Bert Jansch and John Renbourn on several cuts. The production job of recording the drums of Terry Cox is great and compliments the two guitars beautifully.

The fifth members of the group is

singer Jacqui McShee, whose voice reminds us a little of Marianne Faithful. Her combination of Blues and Folk stylings merge in a unique delivery, however, and one has the feeling that he's listening to a great sexy female voice.

Her stylings are best heard on the first minute of "Pentangling," which is also probably the best group effort, on "Mirage," and on "Hear My Call," a Staple Singers song. Her Blues phrasing is great on "Way Behind The Sun," "Let No Man Steal Your Tyme" shows her ability with a folk song. She also harmonizes well with Bert Jansch on two cuts.

Bert Jansch was the one responsible, more than anyone else for forming this group. He has been well known to folk enthusiasts for many years as an excellent guitarist and songwriter, Donovan has recorded some of his material and claims to have been influenced by him. He and John Renbourn, another wellknown guitarist, form the backbone of the Pentangle. Together their guitar work on this album explores untapped areas of the instrument's potential: they make this album a tribute to and a high point in the history of the Guitar. One can find traces of Blues, Folk, Jazz and Classical forms all through the album and especially on "Pentangling," a 7-minute-20-second excursion into many areas of music by each member of the group and also collectively.

The guitars can be heard on every cut complementing each other, sliding off, or calling and responding to one another. The best individual licks can be heard on "Bruton Town," "Bells," and "Waltz," a jazz-like instrumental which has an inspired bass solo by Danny Thompson, hand clapping, and a triumphant yell signifying the end of the album.

The other half of the rhythm section,

drummer Cox, has been like bassist Thompson a respected studio musician for years and really proves it on "Way Behind The Sun" and "Bells" with exceptional brush work.

Every cut on the album is good, with the group arranging most of the material. The material consists mainly of arrangements of traditional folk and blues songs and original group compositions. There is also a group adaptation of a Bert Jansch tune, "Mirage," and an excellent version of the Staple Singers' "Hear My Call."

It's refreshing to hear the clean sound of this album, not cluttered by powerful amps or added instrumentation. One can feel a closeness to the instruments that, heretofore, was a hard task in the pop music field. It is one of the best albums one will ever hear, and as the liner notes say, "Play this record to those you love."

Drusky, an auto-racing enthusiast, is the Tennessee representative for Firestone racing tires. He said he could not at this time identify the sponsor of the show. Among drivers already committed for appearances on the program are Darryl Darringer, LeRoy Yarbrough, Bobby Isaacs and Buddy Baker.

The artist feels there is a strong tie between auto racing fans and buyers of country music records. Cramer: BMI in Open Framework

NASHVILLE — Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI), has operated within the basic fundamentals of the copyright law by enabling more people to enjoy music of all types according to a seminar talk given to the Nashville chapter of NARAS by Edward M. Cramer, president of BMI. It was the second in a seminar series by the chapter.

Noting that BMI is "not a society" but an organization, Cramer said the "establishment" with a society has tried to maintain a permanent status quo, and and has been unwilling to accept contemporary advances. A society, he said, is restricted.

"The BMI objective has always been expansion, not restriction," Cramer added. "We want to make more music available to people, and offer greater diversity." He cited figures to show that most of the music being programmed today is BMI-licensed.

He said the organization has forced other societies to open doors and thus to fulfill the human need for additional music. Cramer suggested a strong need (Continued on page 30)

Radio-TV programming

Makes Spot Music a Specialty

By CLAUDE HALL

NEW YORK-Music, one of the most important tools of the advertising world, is no longer being left to chance by most of the major Madison Avenue agencies. The commercials slated to be exposed on most of the major radio stations and TV stations nationwide are too important to trust to anyone other than the originators themselves, according to Herman Edel, head of Herman Edel Associates.

Edel operates a firm that specializes in creating and producing music for radio-TV commercials. He has signed such big record names as John Barry, Dick Hyman, and Neil Diamond to exclusive contracts in the commercial world.

And the key emphasis is on talent. For example, Edel signed Emuir Deodato, a Brazilian composer-arranger-guitarist. "Just signed to A&M Records, Deodato has worked with Luiz Bonfa. He is extremely knowledgeable in the bossa nova sounds," said Edel.

Seeks Out Talent

More important, perhaps, is that Deodato's signing for commercials "goes hand in hand with my theory-that if you want exciting music in commercials, you can't be content with established music sources. . . you have to seek out the people who are making today's music.

"There are about 9 million commercials out with a 'Herb Alpert' sound. . . and Madison Avnue is still doing this type of sound. The agencies uite often have definite opinions of what they

want. Sometimes they will even bring us a record, asking us to create a similar sound for their commercial. But we don't copy; we try to get some of the personality of the artist involved."


Among the names working with Edel are Stewart Scharf and Bob Dorough, Herbie Hancock, Horace Ott, Milton Delugg, Bob Maxwell, Walter Raim, and Bob Freedman. These men all specialize in composing, except for Neil Diamond, who has done vocalizing as well as composing under Edel's auspices.

Edel also sets up announcers for commercials and is always looking for more "voices." Primarily, though, Edel Associates works with composers. And the prices for a good composer vary. . . it can go as high as \$15,000 for the talents of a name composer, arranger, producer -plus production costs.

12 "Cleos"

Edel Associates did the music for 12 "Cleos" last year. The Cleo is the "Oscar" of the commercial world. Remember the "Second Summer" commercial? That music came from Edel Associates, as did music for commercials for Banker's Trust, Chevrolet, and Oldsmobile.

There is a trend toward more originality in music in commercials, Edel said. "You can't fault the advertising community for copying . . . because everybody copies, but I think the agencies today really do want something new and fresh. We're even getting into electronic music."

Our udience ranges anywhere from 4 to 35. Agencies need to hink in terms of 'psychographcs' instead of age demographics.

"We're programming for the outh culture. Progressive rock rogramming has nothing to do with age. It's where your head s at, not what age you are that letermines if you are a progreslive rock listener," Harlib said.

Underground Agency

Manson said, "I guess what ve really need is an 'underround' agency, although I will idmit that most agency people ire hip to progressive rock. It's ust hard to communicate this ack through the total agency nd then to the sponsor."

WOPA's AM programming directed at ethnic audiences. ogramming is in Croatian. ierman, Greek, Hungarian, Italin, Irish and eight other lanuage groups. WOPA-FM's proramming is 17 per cent simulast and the 100,000-watt outat will soon be broadcasting in ereo.



and in some cases we're almost covering all our boxes with such singles as Bobby Vinton's 'Senumental Me' and 'To Each His Own.' " Cannon, regarded as largely responsible for the recent jukebox programming/one-stop service seminar at MOA's convention, said, "There is a difference between standards and oldies. You also have to program this older material correctly." Rousseau touched on the subtle difference between a standard and an oldie. "Eddy Arnold recently recorded "Then You Can Tell Me Goodbye.' Several locations wanted what I call the oldie version, by the Casinos on Fraternity. This record is maybe two or three years old. "I dug through my library and found three or four copies of the Fraternity recording and quietly put it out. This record has been turning the popularity meters around for three or four weeks now." Rousseau said he had to be discreet about programming the Fraternity record because he has been unable to get more and doesn't want his locations to start complaining about not having the record.

Supplying copies of older material is often a problem, according to Evelyn Dalrymple, Lieberman One Stop, Omaha. "We accidently got our hands on 700 copies of 'Paper Doll' by the Mills Brothers not long ago and sold them out immediately," she said. Mrs. Dalrymple also reported having sold "hundreds of copies" of the late Red Foley's "Salty Dog Rag." The MOA seminar was enlivened at one point when Mrs. Dairymple challenged Mort Hoffman, director, sales and distribution, Epic, about her difficulty in obtaining Bobby Vinton's "I Apologize." She said, "We were getting this record 124 at a time and selling right out of it." Since that time, she reported, the record has been readily available.

know where you could program it and actually distinguish the separation of sound. At 99 per cent of the locations you couldn't distinguish stereo. I just prefer a good clean sound. You're better off with a good monaural."

Robert Rooney, of State Novelty Co., Inc., Baton Rouge, La., calls stereo singles a "damn good idea, but they haven't gotten here yet. I think stereo singles will improve the sound and mean more play. We're trying to program better music, and I think stereo singles would help us. In the long run, there would also be more profits."

at all," said Mrs. Dorothy Christensen, of O. W. Christensen & Co., Malta, Mont. "I would have to buy two sets of records. Stereo records play on newer machines, but they just don't play on older machines. Stereo is fine in the living room or den, but the sound is lost at most locations."

Samuel Keys, of Apollo Stereo Music, Inc., Denver, said he would like to see more stereo

singles: "In fact, very few are available in our area. I would estimate that the sound of stereo singles would be effective in 20 per cent of the locations. As for an increase in profits, I don't think there would be any great increase-perhaps only with good artists."

Harry Schaffner, owner of Schaffner Music Co., Alton, Ill. and president of the Illinois Coin Machine Operators Association. doesn't think stereo singles are that much of an improvement:

"What is needed is simply good music and I'm happy with what we're getting. The only stereo single which would really be noticed would be a gimmick record with great separation. Anyway, 90 per cent of the people think stereo jukeboxes are playing stereo records."

designed like a roulette wheel.

Most simple new machine of all was the Droppa Coppa, a cabinet with five shelves and no mechanical parts at all. Coins are simply dropped through a slot onto the shelves and any any pennies dislodged either fall to the back of the machine, where they are retained, or to the front where they are paid out to the player.

This disarmingly simple machine, which poses no decimal or foreign coinage problems, attracted tremendous interest from overseas buyers and is available in single console units, wall models and units of three, with three banks of 10 coin slots,

Pugh also introduced a new reaction test, an amusement-only game called Battle Royal, for two players. At each end of the field of play is a fleet of nine model ships. The insertion of a penny causes a green light to flash spasmodically at each end. The first player to press the button each time the light flashes sinks one of the ships in his opponent's fleet.

Pat Bolen Reports Promising Future For Bulk Vending in Foreign Lands

MORRIS, Ill. -- The growth picture of bulk vending around the world is very good, with Japan repersenting the greatest potential. This is the report of Northwestern Corp. president,

Pat Bolen, who has just returned here from a 34,440-mile globeencircling trip.

The most advanced countries are Germany and the Benelux nations, where Bolen, who has

now made five overseas trips, said bulk vending is as sophisticated as in the U.S.

"The major difference in vending on the Continent, and really around the world, is that most locations are outside. This is particularly true in Scandinavia where they have six months of very cold weather."

Bolen, who kept a meticulous log of his trip, pointed out that Sweden, on a grid map, would fall in a line that would cross north of Hudson Bay, "They have to bring in all the machines and weatherproof them each year."

Mentioning another country where bulk vending is fairly advanced, Bolen said: "In Australia there are supermarkets that exceed ours in scope. There you can find 30-unit stands just as you do here."


As to the type of goods, vended, Bolen said Australia allowed no commingling of edibles and charms, "They do allow commingling in Sweden but you find more capsules there. The European Continent is much like the U.S. in terms of merchandising but in England there seems to be more gum than charms.

"Chewing gum in public is frowned on in several countries, including Germany and Japan," Bolen related, "But this doesn't discourage the youngsters."

Bolen, who flew over South Vietnam and observed ground fire from the Italian plane he was flying in, said that bulk

tional field with a home tutoring question and answer amusement device.

Hailstone said there are plans to increase the sales personnel and add to the firm's distribution network. With about 43 distribution points, Nutting plans to explore several new markets, including outlets in New Mexico, Montana, Arizona and Mississippi.

"as-is" and "reconditioned" equipment varies-sometimes drastically -from market to market due to strictly local conditions. Important variables include transportation costs, labor and parts costs and demand for a particular piece or type of equipment. Therefore local value will regularly deviate from the national averages published here. Such deviation should be considered the rule rather than the exception.

may be more closely linked to sales, for a higher percentage of jukebox patrons are record buyers than are radio listenres. (The act of looking at title strips is indicative of an interest in records, while the act of switching on a radio is not.)

· The jukebox permits "double exposure" of a single artist. Rarely does a radio station include two releases by the same artist in its playlist, but the jukebox programmer doesn't hesitate to hold an established hit on the box (it's probably still playing well) while adding the same artist's new release. Both get play, freguently back-to-back.

 Sales to jukebox operators generate momentum at the onestop level which results in increased sales to racks and dealers · The jukebox previews the stereo single in true stereo fidelity, whereas AM rock radio does not.

· Songs with lyrics that are objectionable on radio for one of many reasons (sex, controversy, length, etc.), can only be exposed on jukeboxes. And the creative license given to the artist by the label today is resulting in an increased quantity of this type of material.

As record industry promotional techniques mature and evolve, this list of jukebox promotional pluses grows. Much progress in this area has been achieved by Bill Cannon in his liaison with the labels.

Now that the ground is broke again, it is time for every operator to get in touch with all his local label promotion men. get acquainted and place the jukebox's "long playlist" at their disposal.



BILLBOARD SALUTES TEX RITTER AND HIS 40 YEARS IN SHOW BUSINESS

Law's Loss Is Country's Gain

EX RITTER IS ON THE THRESHOLD of celebrating 40 years in show business. As a youngster, however, his idols were attorneys. "I was always going to hear lawyers speak in court," he once said.

These were in the formative years after Woodward Maurice Ritter was born, Jan. 12, 1905, at Murvaul, an East Texas town named by his grandfather for a friendly local Indian chief.

"When Tex was a boy, he was always found making speeches from a stump, pleading law cases," said his eldest sister, Mrs. W. K. McCarley of Houston. She said that had he become a lawyer "he would probably have gone into politics, because he loved that too."

In high school he became a skillful debater and excelled in such subjects as Latin, Spanish, ecology, physical geography and physiology, ancient history, medieval and modern history, and common law. He was graduated top student of South Park High in the spring of 1922. In college, at the University of Texas, he became an expert in the subject of Southwestern history.

During his five years at college, Tex led a campus quartet. He had earlier taken vocal lessons, as well as studying both the guitar and trumpet. Unable, because of the depression, to finish work on his law degree, Ritter turned to entertainment.


He landed his own Saturday program over Houston's KPRC radio singing original cowboy ballads, and supplemented his expense money by directing local church choirs on Sunday. Ritter is credited with being the first major singer of cowboy songs on radio.

A traveling musical troupe took him to Chicago that year and he entered Northwestern Law school with renewed legal aspirations. But show business claimed him again, and in 1930 he was in New York with \$30 and high hopes. He joined the New York Theater Guild and, in 1931, landed a featured role as "A Cowboy" in Lynn Riggs' Broadway play, "Green Grow the Lilacs." In his role he sang four songs. Later, of course, the play was to become "Oklahoma,"

The young Texan was called upon to give recitals at Eastern universities on the subject of the American cowboy and his music, and he earned the title of "The Singing Lecturer."

In 1932, Ritter played another Broadway Western, this one called "The Roundup." He received top reviews. His other stage role came when he portrayed a character named "Red Dog" in the 1934 Broadway play, "Mother Lode."

Radio executives had heard him and watched him entertain at the Madison Square Garden rodeo, and signed him for New York's first Western on radio, "The Lone Star Ranger." The 1932 WOR program lead to other things. A year later for CBS, and New York's WHN and WMCA, Ritter, Pawnee Indian Chief Joseph Shunatona and George Martin created and co-starred in "Cowboy Tom's Roundup." For three years it was the most popular children's radio show in the East.



Ritter made his film debut in 1936. When Gene Autry introduced the motion picture trend of the singing cowboy, Ritter was brought to Hollywood. He signed his first movie contract in September 1936, thus becoming the nation's second singing cowboy star on the screen. Working for Monogram, Columbia, Universal, and Producers Releasing Corporation, Ritter made Westerns for nine consecutive years, seven of which he was ranked among Hollywood's "top-10 best money-making" stars. His Westerns were the first to be televised on the British Broadcasting Corporation network, and they first appeared on American TV channels in 1953.

His movies were used as vehicles for programming top songs. In his first film, "Song of the Gringo," opened with Ritter singing "Rye Whiskey." Ritter had revived the old folk ballad of Western vintage for modern treatment when he was in New York and recorded it with "Goodbye Old Paint" on the Columbia label in 1933. With the release of the movie, "Rye Whiskey" became popular all over again. Its original title, by the way, was "Jack O' Diamonds."

During the 1940's Ritter recorded his first chart hits, among them "I'm Wastin' My Tears on You," "New Moon Over My Shoulder," "Jealous Heart," "You Will Have to Pay (For All Your Yesterdays)," "Deck of Cards," "Rock 'n' Rye," "Life Gets Teejus, Don't It?" and "Daddy's Last Letter."


LAYING ONE-NIGHT STANDS, he became known as Hollywood's most traveled entertainer. Spud Goodall, his old-time lead guitarist, recalls that Ritter songbooks also were a profitable sideline during the tours.

From 1937 to 1939, Ritter recorded for Decca, virtually all of it Western material. One of the top records of 1937 was "The Hills of Old Wyoming."

It was in 1942 when Ritter began negotiating with Capitol, and he was to become that label's first recording artist—25 years ago. His first tune was a hit, "Jingle, Jangle, Jingle," cut with "Goodbye My Little Cherokee." It was for Capitol that he recorded "High Noon" in 1952, and also recorded such classics as "Buffalo Dream," "Long Black Rifle" "The San Antone Story," "Brave Man," "Bandit of Brazil," "Prairie Home," "The Marshal's Daughter," and "Wichita" in the early to mid-'50's.

He continued with one hit after another, such as "Remember the Alamo," "Gunsmoke Trail," "The Wayward Wind" (which was to become his musical introduction on tours) and "Trooper Hook."

Ritter's first long-playing album, "Songs From the Western Screen," was released in April, 1957, and contained 11 title songs made popular in sagebrush films of the period. In August of that same year, an LP was released featuring songs and artists familiar on NBC's "Town Hall Party" TV series. Ritter did a version of "Wagon Wheels" which has since been considered a masterpiece.

In 1960, Ritter revived his old cowboy hit from 1945, "Blood On the Saddle." It was the opener for an LP of Western music that included "Sam Hall," "Bury Me Not on the Lone Prairie," "Little Joe the Wrangler," "When the Work's All Done This Fall," "Streets of Laredo," and three recitations: "The Face on the Barroom Floor," "Billy the Kid," and "Sam Bass." This album still was being sold eight years after its release.

For six years Tex Ritter turned down recording the song "(I Dreamed of a) Hillbilly Heaven" because it gave him an eerie feeling when he thought about singing of country music greats who had died or would soon die. Finally, he decided to record it, and it became a million seller. It now is his most requested number. This was cut at the same time Ritter cut an LP entitled "The Lincoln Hymns" which was a financial disaster for Capitol. "Hillbilly Heaven" more than compensated for this.

In 1963, Stan Kenton, the second artist on Capitol, was inspired by the idea of doing an LP with his close friend. Tex Ritter. The result was "Stan (Continued on page 46)

Billboard Salutes Tex Ritter

Living Legend Honored

T WAS IN 1962 when Tex Ritter was named to the Aksarben Western Hall of Fame. To the uninitiated, the Omaha-based Aksarben organization gets its name from spelling Nebraska backward.

Ritter, Roy Acuff, Webb Pierce and the late Cowboy Copas were the four original persons elected to the Western Hall of Fame during World Championship Rodeo festivities held in Omaha in September, 1962.

But it was two years later when the greatest achievement of his life occurred. Tex Ritter was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame Nov. 6, 1964. He followed such luminaries as the late Jimmie Rodgers, Fred Rose and Hank Williams. He was the first living person so honored.

The announcement came on the stage of Nashville's Loew's Theater during the premiere showing of the film on the life and career of Hank Williams, "Your Cheatin" Heart."

Frances Preston, then chairman of the board of CMA, read this tribute about the man:

"This year's choice is one of the most worthy that will ever be made in the annals of our field of endeavor. His story can never be completely told because it would take more hours than we can count to praise his artistry, his contributions, and his devotion to his chosen work.

"He has inspired and shaped the lives of many young entertainers, not only with a kind word, a bit of advice or a helping hand, but by setting an example that could only be an inspiration to anyone who is fortunate enough to know him. Outside of the fact that he has excelled as a performer in every facet of show business and is one of our great living legends, his personal dedication to his fellow artists is a beautiful thing to behold. . .

"... He is powerful, yet gentle. He is commanding, yet attentive. He is forceful, yet compassionate. When you talk, he listens-when he talks, everybody listens. If personal problems are being discussed, they are never his. If there is an inconvenience, it is never his. But when you need him, he is always there."

Helped Launch Capitol Records

EX RITTER AND A COWBOY song he popularized over an Eastern radio station years before helped launch one of the most successful of recording companies, Capitol Records.

"Way back in the '30's I heard Tex sing 'Chisholm Trail' on NBC or CBS-or some radio station-and 1 never forgot it." recalled composer Johnny Mercer, one of the founders of Capitol.

"He was as distinctive as Bob Nolan of the Sons of the Pioneers, and when we started Capitol, I signed him even before I met him. Fortunately, he was even nicer than I had anticipated. . . ."

Tex Ritter became the first artist signed by the label when it was formed, and not only was the young Texan the company's first Western-style artist, but its first superstar. This paved the way for strings of hits for such musical greats as Stan Kenton, Nat King Cole, Tex Williams, Hank Thompson, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Merle Travis, Jimmy Wakely, Peggy Lee, Frank Sinatra, Ray Anthony, Faron Young, Jean Shepard, Sonny, James, Ferlin Husky, Buck Owens, Les Paul & Mary Ford, Margaret Whiting, Wanda Jackson, The Lettermen, The Four Preps, The Beach Boys, Nelson Riddle, the Kingston Trio, Merle Haggard, Glen Campbell and others.

The Bands Play On

W HEN TEX RITTER FIRST went to Hollywood he hired for use in his Western films and his tours a band billed as the "Musical Tornadoes."

The members of the premiere musical group were mostly musicians who were out of work and needed a break. Their name was the inspiration of a movie press agent.

The "Musical Tornadoes" later evolved into the highly skilled backup group which would accompany their boss on records in the 1940's under the heading of "Tex Ritter and his Texans."

co-wrote such songs as "Two Hearts Are Better Than One," and "Let Your Conscience Be Your Guide."

Ritter renamed his troupe the "Western Revue" at the turn of the decade. A large show, it numbered more than a dozen performers, including Ritter's own horse White Flash and an active chimpanzee named Cheetah.

During the mid-1950's, Tex formed a new band, which included Maurice Anderson on the steel guitar. Jerry Dykes, Johnny Smith and Doug Coats on guitars, Lonny Campbell on drums, and Jess Hudson on steel guitar and electric piano. The band was called the Western Ramblers, Tex's band today consists of young, musicallymodern members who jointly call themselves the Boll Weevils. Lead guitarist is Wayne Gray, who also is a leading writer; Kent Westberry, another guitarist and song-writer, with 103 recorded tunes to his credit; on the drums is Billy Sprout who, more than coincidentally, also writes.

Membership in the "Texans" varied, but some of the names which came to be identified with the band were those of Spud Goodall, lead guitarist from 1944 to 1951; Pete Partinez, a musician who later went into the nightclub business in Wichita Falls, Tex.; Bob Morgan, musician-brother of singer Jaye P. Morgan; Slim Andrews, fiddler-comedian from the days of Ritter's early Westerns; Tommy Durden, steel guitarist and featured soloist: Boots Durden, featured vocalist and bass-fiddler: Rusty McDonald, guitarist; Paul Buskirk, guitarist, and the Sky Line Boys, a musical quartet. Joe Allison was prominently featured for several

years as announcer for Ritter's touring shows. The two



Tommy Floyd, now with Sure-Fire Music as a material reviewer was formerly associated with Ritter's Boll Weevils. A bass guitarist, Floyd was with the group for three years beginning in 1964.

Tex's Permanent Co-Star

ON THE EVE OF HIS wedding on June 14, 1941. Tex Ritter wrote a song to his former leading lady, Dorothy Fay. Titled, "In Your Lovely Veil of White," it later became a hit single. That night, however, it was intended only for his wife-to-be.

The wedding took place in Dorothy Fay's native Prescott, Ariz. Those in attendance gave mute evidence of the popularity of Tex and Dorothy Ritter. They included the late Buck Jones, Dick Foran, Colonel Tim McCoy, Big Boy Williams, Bob Baker and Raymond Hatton, all film stars; composer Everett Cheetham, and hosts of others.

Mrs. Ritter's background was such that few would have expected her to co-star in Western movies. She obtained her education at the University of London, the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts of London, University Hall of Oxford, the University of Southern California and the Caroline Leonetti School. She later held an associate professorship at Southern California and was director of tutoring at the Leonetti school.

Aside from "Lovely Veil of White," which Ritter and later Bing Crosby recorded, Tex helped compose at least one other song to his wife. When she spent six months in the South Pacific entertaining American troops during World War II, Tex wrote "Long Time Gone."

The Ritters are parents of two sons, Thomas Matthews, 21, and Johnathan Southworth, 19, both brilliant collegians.

Golden Era of Success

MANY HAVE REFERRED TO the 1940's through the early 1950's as the Golden Age of Country Music. It also was a Golden Era for Tex Ritter.

During this time, when Ritter was recording mostly danceband music and songs of romance, he turned out some of his most powerful and most memorable hits. Though he laid the foundation for his future success in this realm of music with early Capitol recordings such as "Jingle Jangle Jingle," "Someone," "I've Done the Best I Could," and "Have I Stayed Away Too Long," it was not until 1944 and his release of "I'm Wastin' My Tears On You" that Tex reached the style of rhythmic tune that would assure his musical stature.

"I'm Wastin' My Tears On You," a composition by Frank Harford and Ritter which sported catchy phrasings about a girl who had been untrue, was embellished with some fancy sounds on a trumpet for an opener. The tune took up a steady residence on a newspaperprinted review of Billboard's "most played jukebox folk records" and raced off to occupy the No. 1 Position on the chart.

Concurrently, the flip side—the now-better-known "New Moon Over My Shoulder"—and a third cut—the equally classic "Jealous Heart" were rated on the same chart as the number two and number three songs. Spud Goodall of San Antonio, lead guitarist for Tex from 1944 to 1951, recalls it was the first time a recording artist had taken the top three spots at one time on a Billboard chart. At any rate, the Ritter accomplishment created such attention that Tex was soon being referred to as "the jukebox king."

Ritter returned the following year to head the charts with another number one recording, "You Two-Timed Me One Time Too Often." Again the flip side, "Green Grow the Lilacs" in this case, would go down in country music history as the more famous of the two songs. The tune was so popular at the time of its release, in fact, that Herald R. Goodman, a former "Grand Ole Opry" performer with the Vagabonds, included a photograph of Ritter with publicity on the song in a 50cent edition of his then-current "Saddle Mountain Roundup" program-book which sold 10,000 copies. with another Ritter selection called "Merry Christmas Polka.")

Some of the superior records by Ritter for the period included "We Live In Two Different Worlds," "Love Me Now," "From Now On," "San Antonio Rose," "Try Me One More Time," and "Long Time Gone."

(Ritter's recording of "Have I Told You Lately?" enjoyed special favor with his fans. It was still frequently requested on his personal appearances into the 1953 period and was sung by request during a performance swing Tex made into his native East Texas in the summer of 1967.)

After a dry spell in 1947, Ritter entered the next year with a burst of new successes. He scored with such top ten winners as "A Deck of Cards," "Rock 'n' Rye," "Life Gets Teejus, Don't It?" "The Pledge of Allegiance," and "Ole Shorty." And he scored, too, with sellout personal appearances.

Following his tour in Washington, Ritter and his Western Revue received reviews from the local newspaper columnists which were impressive. Oscar Davis of the Washington Daily News, comparing Ritter with other musical cowboys, wrote on July 23, 1948: "We're stringing along with that old Southeast Texas cowpoke currently occupying the Capitol Theater stage. Tex Ritter's his name, son, and he plays the meanest gittar (sic), and sings the best songs, and owns the purtiest horse this side of the Rio Grande."

Other rave reviews came from all sources.

When Ritter got back to recording he cut slow ballad-types and animated up-tempo numbers, among them "Dallas Darlin'," "Lovely Veil of White," "Some Sweet Day," "You're Always Brand New," and "Teneha, Timpson, Bobo, and Blair," the latter a bouncy tribute to placenames and customs of the Texas Piney Woods where he was born and reared.

In 1948 Ritter cut an album with the Dinning Sisters. Although then not fully appreciated and soon out of ready circulation, the Ritter-Dinning album contained some strong material, including "Trouble In Mind," "Cattle Call," "Down In the Valley," "Cool Water," "The Prisoner's Song," and "You Are My Sunshine."

One of the final songs Ritter recorded in this musical

Kenton!-Tex Ritter!" a classic of 10 Western and two popular selections with modern jazz-band accompaniment. Now out-of-print and much in demand by Ritter fans, the LP displays Kenton's masterful direction of a contemporary orchestra and Tex's rugged Western accent on such excellent renditions as "Home on the Range," "Cool Water," "Red River Valley," "Boots and Saddle," and "The Last Roundup."

Equally rare is Ritter's "Border Affair" LP of 1964. Recorded in Mexico, the album is completely in the Spanish language. It included such numbers as "El Abandonado," "La Cucaracha," "Las Golondrinas," "El Vaquero Triste," "Cielito Lindo," "Guadalajara" and "Alla En El Rancho Grande." The accompaniment, provided by two stylistic Mexican musical groups—the mariachis and marimbas—was under the direction of Ralph Carmichael, who had conducted the orchestrations for "Hillbilly Heaven" and "The Lincoln Hymns."

With the release of "She Loved This House" in January 1965, Tex started a new trend of countrysoul. He concluded the year with such tunes as "Take Him Fishing," "The Men In My Little Girl's Life," "Custody," and "Mommy, Daddy, Tell Me." Ritter reached a milestone in this brand of music when his recording of the Jeremy Slate composition "Just Beyond the Moon" was released by Capitol in February 1967.

When the LP "Sweet Land of Liberty" was released in May of that year, Dallas' KBOX Radio, in conjunction with Capitol, conducted a patriotism contest with Tex to appear at the Dallas station's country music show to award the prizes. Shortly afterward Ritter recorded a religious album entitled "Just Beyond the Moon."

On Feb. 5, 1968, Ritter's album of Cindy Walker compositions, "Bump Tiddle Dee Bum Bum," was released. The album presented Ritter at his best on such Walker-written favorites as "You Don't Know Me," "Blue Canadian Rockies," "China Doll," "In the Misty Moonlight," "Distant Drums," "Down in Old Matamoras"; "Two Glasses, Joe," and "Jim, I Wore a Tie Today."

Called "the most beloved man in the music in-

A yuletide season recording in 1946, "You Will Have to Pay (For All Your Yesterdays)," gave Tex another number one chart song to his credit. (The flip side, "Christmas Carols By the Old Corral," would see an extended destiny several years later when coupled idiom was "Dear John (I Sent Your Saddle Home)" which he had written with Aubrey Gass.

The lively tune ranked as a recorded hit for the late Hank Williams in 1951. And since he had a hand in the writing of it, it also made it a hit for Tex Ritter.

High Noon Sets Film Pace

EX RITTER AND HIS WIFE Dorothy, on tour in Europe, walked into a theater in France. The picture playing was "High Noon" and Ritter, who had not yet seen the classic Gary Cooper western for which he had sung the mood-creating title song, was anxiously waiting to hear if his voice had been dubbed in the French language.

Ritter sighed with relief when the picture flashed on the screen with the distinct sound of his voice in English.

The story of "High Noon" and Tex Ritter is one of the richest in the history of American music. The movie had already been filmed and during a phase of editing it was decided that the picture needed something to set it apart from all other Westerns.

Elmo Williams, involved in the editing of "High Noon," had previously worked for Capitol Records and was acquainted with Tex and his work. It was Williams who had a great deal to do with selecting Tex Ritter to sing the theme song. "Tex Ritter," Williams was to recall later, "has the kind of earthy Western voice that I thought was perfectly suited to the 'High Noon'

Dimitri Timokin, who had composed the theme with Ned Washington, phoned Ritter to come over for a recording session. "They showed me a few shots from the picture.... The picture was already over when they got the idea for the ballad," Ritter once explained. "It wasn't supposed to be Gary Cooper's voice necessarily; it could have been his thoughts. But it was used instead of (intrumental) music to create the mood. And I would say that it was the first time that a song had been used in this fashion in a picture."

After reviewing the stills and learning what was desired of him, Ritter cut the song for the Stanley Kramer-United Artists production.

Both the film "High Noon" and its title song in the recorded version became entertainment successes of 1952. Gary Cooper won an Academy Award for acting and the picture received another Oscar for its music. The song was being played on virtually every jukebox and radio station and topped the pop charts. In addition, Ritter was called upon to sing the title song during the presentation of the Academy Awards in March of 1953.

Many agreed that Ritter's singing of the title song had helped make the film a box office winner. If there was any doubt that Tex had kicked off the motion picture trend for title songs, the new Westerns in this vein which sprang up following "High Noon" settled the question. Newspaper reviews of the time attest to the film vogue. Some of the others quickly utilized to sing title songs were Rosemary Clooney, Frankie Laine, Gordon MacCrae, Robert Horton, the late Nat King Cole, Stubby Kaye and Johnny Cash.

dustry" by Kelso Herston, Capitol's man in Nashville, Ritter has served on the board of governors of NARAS and of the National Committee for the Recording Arts.

Tex Sets Standards

ONE EVENING IN 1957 in Birmingham, Tex Ritter stopped at a Bessemer, Ala., all-night diner for supper. Henry Strzelecki, then a 17-year-old who was in the diner that night, never forgot the image of Ritter.

Strzelecki, now a bass guitarist with the Chet Atkins-Boots Randolph - Floyd Cramer Show, sat down and wrote a familiar pop tune about a country-western legend called "Long Tall Texan."

Since Jerry Adams, Leon Ethridge and the Four Flickers featuring Strzelecki made the initial recording in Memphis in 1958, "Long Tall Texan" has been recorded some 28 times and has been included in some five million dollars' worth of singles and albums sold. The hit single was cut by Murry Kellum on MOC Records in 1962. It has been placed in two albums by the Beach Boys and in the Kingsmen's "Louie, Louie" LP which was on Billboard's surveys for four years. Also recorded by such country artists as Leroy Van Dyke and Judy Lynn, "Long Tall Texan" has lately been recorded in German under the title of "Der Lange Toney."

But "Long Tall Texan" is only one of many hits carrying on the story of Tex Ritter. Many of his hits and standards have been revived by the top artists over the years.

Among the most recent of these are "Have I Stayed Away Too Long?" recorded by Glen Campbell in his number one album "A New Place in the Sun"; "We Live in Two Different Worlds" by Jerry Lee Lewis in his top five chart LP "Another Place, Another Time"; and "Just Beyond the Moon," recorded by Capitol newcomer Dick Miles in an album which made Billboard's charts, "The Last Goodbye."



HROUGH THE YEARS Tex Ritter has been the first to lend a helping hand to numerous persons in the music industry. One of the first recipients was Joe Allison, a radio announcer in San Antonio in the mid-1940's. Allison was devoted to jazz and opera until he met Ritter coming through on a tour.

Ritter awakened an appreciation for country music within Allison and channeled the disk jockey's talents accordingly. Allison joined the Ritter show as emcee, staying with the group for several years and collaborating on songs with Tex. Allison continued working in country music, and he has turned out such hits as "He'll Have to Go" for the late Jim Reeves.

In 1945, Tex discovered Hank Thompson, who was working as "Hank the Hired Hand" at a radio station in Waco, Tex. Capitol Records had requested Ritter to be on the lookout for new talent to add to the company roster, and Tex put Thompson in his stage show. He then obtained the young singer his first recording contract, and help launched another successful year.

In tours that followed, Ritter spotted other promising talent, including the late Moon Mullican and Jim Reeves, Charlie Walker and Jan Howard, And Tex Ritter and Johnny Bond worked together in getting Buck Owens his Capitol recording pact.





NEW YORK — Christmas sales should again profit from material issued previously that either has special seasonal significance or is ideally sets of gift giving. In the latter category are multiple sets of varying material and price.

Columbia Records has a series of specially priced sets that usually has a Yuletide sales spurt, while London Records expects renewed interest in its \$100 set of the complete "Der Ring des Niberlungen," the only complete "Ring" cycle on disk. This 19record set features Birgit Nilsson, Kirsten Flagstad, Wolfgang Windgassen, Christa Ludwig, Hans Hotter, George London, Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Regine Crespin, James King. Set Svanholm, Gerhard Stolze, Jean Madeira, and Gottlob Frick with Georg Solti and the Vienna Philharmonic.

"Missa Solemnis"

Beethoven's "Missa Solemnis" is slated for seasonal business, especially in versions on Deutsche Grammophon with Gundulla Janowitz, Miss Ludwig, Walter Berry and the Berlin Philharmonic under Herbert von Karajan; Angel with Otto Klemperer and the New Philharmonia Orchestra with soloists Elizabeth Soedestroem, Marga Hoeffgen, Waldemar Kmentt and Martti Talvela; RCA, a monaural set with Lois Marshall, Nan Merriman, Eugene Conley, Jerome Hines and the NBC Symphony

Bach Sets

Bach religious sets slated for spurts include the "St. Matthew Passion" on London with Peter Pears, Hermann Prey, Tom Krause and the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra under Carl Muenchinger on Archive with Irmgard Seefried, Herta Toepper, Ernst Haefliger and Fischer-Dieskau under Karl Richter, and versions on Columbia, Angel. and Vanguard; "St. John Passion" on Archive with Jaefliger, Prey, Kieth Engen, Eveyln Lear, Toepper and the Munich Bach Orchestra under Richter, and on Telefunken with the Concentus Musicus of Vienna; "Christmas Oratorio" on Lndon with Elly Ameling, Helen Watts, Pears, Krause and the Munich Bach Orchestra under Muenchinger, and Archive with Miss Janowitz, Miss Ludwig, Wunderlich, Franz Crass and the Munich Bach Orchestra under Richter; and several versions of the "Mass in B Minor."

Mercury's specially priced two-LP sets, "The Heart of the Ballet," "The Heart of the Symphony," "Tchaikovsky's Greatest Hits" and "The Heart of the Piano Concerto" are gift geared as is a package of four violin Istvan Kertesz and the London Symphony, and a six-record set of Tchaikovsky's six symphonies with Lorin Maazel and the Vienna Philharmonic.

Handel's "Messiah" also draws Christmas interest with action especially expected for the versions by Colin Davis and the London Symphony on Philips; Sir Adrian Boult and the London Symphony on London; Charles Mackerras and the English Chamber Orchestra on Angel; Richter and the Munich Bach Orchestra on DGG; Hermann Scherchen and the Vienna State Opera Orchestra on Westminster; the Robert Shaw Chorale on RCA; and Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic and Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra, both on Columbia.

RCA also anticipates sales for its two-LP "Mass in Memory of John Kennedy" with Cardinal Cushing and the Boston Symphony. "The Horowitz Collec-tion," a two-LP monaural set, also does well during the season as do packages by Artur Rubinstein, especially the Chopin sets and a collection of Beethoven concertos. Viennese Music

RCA also has a six-record specially priced package "The Musical Magic of Vienna" conducted by Robert Stolze. Two Philips Johann Strauss sets, one with the Vienna Choir Boys and the other with Wolfgang Sawallisch, conductor, also draw seasonal interest as do London's many albums conducted by Willi Boskovsky. 

CONCERT REVIEW **Miss Somer's Sterling Act**

NEW YORK - Challenging material is Hilde Somer's forte, and the Viennese pianist gave a strong recital of just such material at Carnegie Hall on Sunday (24). Gospel Music

WSJC Adds to Gospel Format And Power; Adds to Revenues

MAGEE, Miss. — A radio station here has increased its gospel music programming along with its power increases, and the result has been profitable, according to its owner.

Marvin Mathis, a past president of the Mississippi Broadcasters Association, heads the Mathis Stations, one of which is WSJC.

When this station went on the air in 1957 as a 500-watt daytimer, 75 minutes was set aside for gospel music each day, with another 6 hours devoted to various gospel groups on Sunday.

Today, with a 50 kw, full power signal reaching 1,250,-000 throughout all of central and south Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi, the station broadcasts more than two-anda-half hours of religious music during week days, with 10 hours on Sunday.

A popular gospel music program, "Hymns of Praise" from 10 a.m. to noon, Monday through Saturday, brings mail from listeners throughout the area. The station has one of the largest libraries of religious music in the nation.

Typical Program

A typical program, according to Mathis, will feature such artists as the Swanee River Boys, the Statesmen, Jimmie Davis, the Sego Brothers and Naomi, Carl Storey, the Florida Boys, Tennessee Ernie Ford, George Beverly Shea, Red Foley, the Sullivan Family, the Blue Ridge Quartet, the Chuck Wagon Gang, the Lewis Family. Smitty Gatlin, Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs, and the Happy Goodman Family. The station also includes other popular and little-known artists. It makes a special effort to expose recordings of new groups, and helps promote their personal appearances as a public service.

WSJC promotes from two to four gospel concerts each year in this town. The last one, featuring the Florida Boys, Little Steve Sanders, Sego Brothers and Naomi, the Chuck Wagon Gang, Wally Fowler and the Sunshine Sisters, attracted more than 3,000 fans, which is more than the town's population.

In addition to more than 26 hours of recorded gospel music each week, the station's over-all religious programming includes "Back to the Bible," "The Children's Bible Hour," "The Voice (Continued on page 55)

(serving all of metropolitan Chicago); WDCX-FM, Buffalo; WDJC-FM, Birmingham, and KELR-AM, El Reno, Okla., serving all of metropolitan Oklahoma City.

Now the Crawford Co. has purchased, subject to FCC approval, WWGM-AM, a former good music station in Nashville, and WKTX-AM and WAQB-FM, Atlantic Beach, Fla., serving the metropolitan Jacksonville area. Gospel and sacred music is featured strongly on all the network stations. Listener response in each broadcast area determines, to a large extent, the groups and artists featured by the station. Crawford says that the 20,-000,000 potential listeners in the network's broadcast area present a tremendous responsibility. "We program our stations with as much dynamic and creativity as possible," he said. "We attempt, at all times, to serve the individual community by ascertaining the need and desires of each locality, and to formulate constructive and religiously oriented programs to meet those needs."



of Truth," and a new program titled "Harvestime." The station also does live broadcasts of Methodist and Baptist church ervices.

So that all churches and religious organizations might receive some service, this gospeloriented station has set aside time for a program each day promotion of church tor notices, revivals, gospel singing and the like.

"Gospel music fills a great public need," Mathis said. "Every person needs a constant message of hope and inspiration, and gospel music, properly presented, can deliver that message in a way that all people can understand.

Gospel Promo Test Set on Programming

FORT WORTH - A promotional experiment in gospel music programming will be presented at the Will Rogers Auditorium here in March with a "Parade of Quartets," a weeklong festival of gospel performances.

W. B. Nowlin, Southwest gospel promoter, said nine major gospel groups will appear here during the six-day presentation. They are the Imperials, the Oak Ridge Boys, the Florida Boys with Steve Sanders, the Thrasher Brothers, the Blackwood Singers, the Happy Goodman Family, the LeFevres and the Speer Family.

WVNJ Plays It Loose -Quality Accented

NEWARK, N.J.-By throwing the shackles off its music list, WVNJ pleases both listeners and advertisers, stated general manager Milton L. Lubow. Lubow has been spreading the word from New York, which the station serves, to Chicago and Detroit that the station is "the most contemporary in New York. The only thing is that we don't play garbage."

The change in the sound of WVNJ has "been an evolution," he said. "It started in 1966, but received its greatest emphasis when we recently acquired Bob

Taylor as music director." Taylor joined the station in June 1968, with specific responsibility to keep the sound in the foreground.

In the past, especially prior to October 1966, when Lubow joined the station, the station played:

No brass. - No upbeat music. - Only 22 original cast albums, although it has 183 in its library. - Banned such artists as Sinatra and Johnny Mathis. - Only background music. -Albums end-to-end and one after another.

"Can you imagine: WVNJ is supposed to be the first station to play a full Broadway original cast album and we've established the image of playing a Broadway show LP each night at 8 (9 on WVNJ-FM). Yet, if there was a bad word in it, like in 'West Side Story,' the whole album was banned." Now, of course, WVNJ has increased its library enormously in original cast LP's and plays them all on the theory that people who like Broadway shows like them all.

But the greatest change has been in the music throughout the day. WVNJ now plays a balanced hour of music and the artists range from Ray Charles to Mantovani to Harpers Bizarre, Glen Campbell and Eddy Arnold. The first record is announced, the rest are recapped. Each hour is a blended show in itself, production and all. Most of the programming-about 95 per cent-is from albums.

"I believe in foreground music," said Lubow, "because, as an old salesman, I know that if people don't listen to the music, they don't hear the commer-cials."

In this respect, whenever a record gets on the chart that fits the sound of WVNJ, the station plays it. But not strictly because it's a hit; more because it has proved popularity. The station pays no attention to hits per se. It seldom repeats a record. Taylor said that he may program "The Shadow of Your Smile" again during a day's time, but not by the same artist. Thus, the station might play one particular tune five times in a week, but not by the same artist. The variety includes soul and country, as well as easy listening.

"My theory is that there's been an enormous revolution in music the past three years. The





U. K., Italian Plants Aid Philips' Order Overflow

PARIS — Philips, whose sales this year have made it the No. 1 French record company, is being forced to seek custom pressing facilities in Britain and Italy in order to cope with large orders.

Working round the clock at full capacity, the Philips pressing plant at Louviers in the Eure department, west of Paris, is producing 60,000 7-inch records and 42,000 albums a day. But this is still not meeting the demand, says Philips' commercial director Jacques Caillart.

Caillart has, therefore, placed orders with sister companies in Britain and Italy for 500,000 disks, 80 per cent of which will he pressed in Britain.

Philips, France, does custom pressing for a number of other French record companies, including Polydor, Barclay, CBS, Disc'AZ and Erato, "But because we don't want to lose these contracts," said Caillart, "we are quite happy to go abroad to fulfill our commitments even outside the Common Market."

New Link

A new link between Philips and Polydor in France is the rebuilt joint recording studio in the rue des Dames, Paris. The building houses two studios, one capable of accommodating a 45piece orchestra and the other to be used for pop groups and other small combinations.

Philips now has three studios in Paris, but one of these will be closed shortly and the other will be used principally for rehearsals.

The new studios in the rue des Dames, which have been reconstructed from the old Poly-

AMSTERDAM — Iramac has acquired distribution rights for Holland, Belgium, Luxembourg, France and Great Britain for the full-color LP's produced by a new Dutch company, Ring Productions Ltd.

Ring Productions has the Benelux, French and British manufacturing rights of this German process, which enables full-color pictures to be printed direct onto an LP record.

First full-color album to be released is a special children's musical composed by Theo de Vos and Jaap ter Haar, called "Lotje" and based on ter Haar's series of children's books which have been translated into German, French, English, Danish and Swedish.

Iramac also plans to introduce full-color records to the British market. "The new system," said Iramac president Willem Duys," will be an excellent way of promoting new artists. Records need not have expensive color sleeves if the LP's themselves are in full color."

Duys said that special designs could be used to produce eye-catching effects when the record was actually playing.

Iramac is selling the color LP's at the same price as its normal middle-price albums.

CNR Growth Due on Distrib, Site Levels

AMSTERDAM — CNR Records will move from Scheveningen to Leiden in January and, at the same time, will take over Dutch distribution of product from Barclay, France, which is at present handled by Bovema.

CNR will thus acquire a much bigger interest in the classical market since the Barclay contract carries with it the repertoire of the Erato label, which Barclay distributes in France. Erato recordings, plus material from Barclay's own Classic line, will be added to the Russian Melodia catalog which CNR already distributes in Holland.

FRENCH SALES IN QUARTER JUMPED 47.86 PER CENT

PARIS—Sales of records in France for the third quarter of 1968 showed a 47.86 per cent increase over the figure last year. For the first nine months of the year, sales average out at 25.11 per cent higher than for the January-September period in 1967.

These figures have been announced by the Centre d'Information et de Documentation du Disque, the body set up by the French record manufacturers association (SNICOP) to promote and publicize the activity of the French record industry.

The CIDD points out that the statistics were compiled from figures supplied by a proportion of the 36 member record companies of SNICOP whose sales represent 51 per cent of total industry turnover.



Argentine Cos. Seeking Foreign Artists, Spanish-Speaking Disks

BUENOS AIRES — The Argentine record industry is asking companies in the U. S. England, Italy and France for Spanish versions of chart hits — but performed by the same artists as in the original recordings.

At the moment selling well in the Argentine are Spanish versions of "Those Were The Days," by Mary Hopkin, Sandie Shaw and Matt Monro. Also selling is a Spanish version of "This Guy's In Love With You," sung by Herb Alpert, plus Spanish versions of original hits by Italians Gianni Morandi and Gigliola Cinquetti, Nicola di Bari, Los Panchos, and French singer Herve Vilard.

Inspiration for the recent vogue was the success of Matt Monro with his Spanish version of "Alguien Canto" ("The Music Played"), reported to have sold over 100,000 copies in the Argentine. Previously, the late Nat King Cole, Eydie Gorme Charles Aznavour and Los Panchos scored with Spanish-language material.

Large sections of the Argentine record-buying public prefer to hear material in the Spanish language although product in English, followed by Italian and then French are the top-selling for-

Pama Exec Ends Talks

LONDON - Harry Palmer, managing director of Pama Records, has returned to London from Paris after a week of talks with Jean-Luc Young, head of Young International and Byg Records. Palmer has signed to distribute in Britain some of the Byg label American product to which the French company has European rights. In return Byg will issue Pama material in France and Switzerland. Palmer is now completed plans for a world tour, taking in the U. S. and Australia, and ending at the MIDEM in Cannes in January. He will be seeking product for British distribution.

A final reason for the success of Spanish-language material is that all the big hits of the year in the Argentine have been Spanish-language product whether performed by Matt Monro, Jimmie Fontana, Adamo, Jose Feliciano, Raphael, Armando Manzanero or local artists such as Palito Ortega, Sandro or Leonardo Favio.

Saturday: U. K. Digs Copyrights



LONDON — Saturday Music's general manager Larry Weiss, who flew here Oct. 31 with more than 70 copyrights, flew back to New York Nov. 24 after reporting "a very high rate of acceptance" by British producers.

First results of Weiss's trip are the recording of the Larry Brown-Raymond Bloodworth song, "Goodbye My Old Gal" by Solomon King, the record of "To Give," by Shirley Bassey, and a recording by Australian newcomer Glen Weston of the Bob Crewe-Larry Weiss song "Lights of Night." During his stay in London. Weiss met with Mickie Most, Norman Newell and Larry Page and producers from Decca, Philips, CBS and Pye, and also had lengthy talks with Ardmore and Beechwood professional manager, Phil Greenop, regarding strengthening of ties between the EMI publishing company and Saturday Music, "One result of this," said Weiss, "is that our writers will now be working directly for artists in Britain." Weiss also met EMI and

Paramount executives to co-ordinate DynaVoice releases and to prepare for a promotional visit by Bob Crewe and the Glitterhouse. To coincide with the visit EMI will release a new Bob Crewe Generation album and the "Color Blind" album by the Glitterhouse. Meanwhile a single from the album, "Tinker Bell's Mind" is being released here.

Weiss said he planned, when he returned to the States, to set up deals for British independent producers in connection with the placing of masters and to arrange for Saturday's producers to go to Britain to produce artists. Weiss said he found the British market in a very healthy state and full of potential. "It is the jumping off point for Europe and presents a fantastic opening for copyrights which have not made it big in the U.S. "The only problem is one of exposure because of the radio setup in Britain. It certainly stimulates competition, but, on the other hand, it can make things very hard when it comes to breaking new talent." Weiss added that the British market still had a powerful influence in America and that he felt that there was a lot to be said for an American publisher starting a record off in Britain and, if it becomes a hit, bringing it into the States.

Pathe-Marconi Sales Lunged

PARIS — Pathe-Marcon's sales for the four months July I to Oct. 31 was 36 per cent higher than that for the same period last year.

Minchin said the record market was thriving and affirmed Pathe-Marconi's determination to work in the closest possible collaboration with French record dealers. "Records," he said, "are becoming an increasingly important part of the French way of life and the prices of both pop music and classical records put them within the reach of all income groups. With Minchin at the reception were Jacques Helard, Pathe-Marconi commercial director, Claude Commeau, head of provincial sales and Jacques Duchein, regional sales chief.

MFRS. IN BRAZIL REJECT REPORT ON PRICE FIXING

By HENRY JOHNSTON

RIO DE JANEIRO — Record manufacturers in Brazil are denying reports that the government is considering a return to price control.

The newspaper Journal do Brazil stated that "the Interministerial Price Commission is going after the record industry now." The newspaper added. "Record prices which were freed, may return to be controlled. It all depends on the understanding which the manufacturers reach with the Commission."

Manufacturers said they had not been approached by officials. One representative leader of the industry said: "But the government already decided that record prices should not be controlled because records are not necessities. And the government tries to control the prices of necessities, like food, only."

Another manufacturer's spokesman commented: "If the government tries to go back to the old price control system, the public will lose. If prices can not accompany the rising costs of materials and labor, economies will have to made in quality."

Price controls were removed from the record industry last year. Inflation during the present year is estimated at about 25 per cent, the same as last year. However, the government is raising public employes' pay by 25 per cent, a step that is expected to set off another round in the wage-price spiral. The situation came to a head recently with a letter to program directors from Ken Mansfield, national promotion manager of Capitol Records concerning the new Beatles album on the Apple label which is distributed by Capitol. The letter stated: "As you know, the selections contained in the album have not been cleared for airplay, and unauthorized premature broadcast would be

Airplay will be authorized as of Friday (15) at 4 p.m. Again, I appeal to all broadcasters to respect the rights of the music publishers, record dealers, the Beatles, Apple Records, Inc., Capitol, and other co-operative and ethical broadcasters by abstaining from premature airplay."

No Discussion

It's understood, however, that the Beatles' attorneys in the U. S. gave the word of the tunes' licensing arrangements to BMI several days before Capitol's Friday (15) playtime and that all BMI would say if broadcasters called was that the tunes in the album were licensed by BMI. It was pointed out that there was no discussion of playtime restriction between the Beatles' attorneys and BMI.

A further irritant to broadcasters was that radio station programmers did not receive copies of the album until five days after the release date.

One radio station programmer summed up the problem this way: "It would be best for all concerned if record companies concentrated on the best possible distribution of their material to radio stations instead of intimidating them with release dates for its product."
