

A Supreme Court Decision.

That the Supreme Court of Wisconsin recently rendered an important decision relative to the height of fences and hoards, which is in every way tavorable from a bill poster's point of view, is a matter of far more than passing comment to the craft, and especially so now, in the light of the adverse decision of l'ircuit Judge Ross, of Los Angeles. ing is a copy of the text of the Wisconsin State decision:

METZGER VS. HOCHREIN.

(Supreme Court of Wisconsin. June 21, 1900.)
Plantiff possessed an attractive house, surrounded by lawns, on a village lot. Defendant, owning the adjoining lot, built a fence four feet from plantiff's house, but entirely on defendant's land, consisting of rough tamarack posts, from 8 to 16 feet high, and oid, unsightly, and partily decayed lumber, of varying lengths, and extending about 90 feet back from the street, and supported by wires strung from the tops of the posts to defendant's house. It did not Interfere with plantiff's use of his property, but partially shut off a view of the street, and depreciated its rental value. Held, that plaintiff could not abate the fence as a nuisance, though defendant wilfully and maliciously built it to annoy bim.

Marshall, J., (after stating the facts): The question presented here is, may a person rightly use bis own land as he sees fit, regardless of his motives, if that use render adjoining property less valuable and desirable for dwelling-house purposes, merely from d minished heauty of surroundings and access of light to the property, and opportunity to see it from the surrounding territory and to freely view such territory therefrom, there heing nothing projected from the adjacent land causing any injury to such property or its occupants? It will he noted that it is not claimed the acts complained of caused any physical injury to plaintiff's property or two the occupants thereof. The sole complaint is that the heauty and cheerfulness of the property has heen injured by defendant's conduct, and that the structure complained of was erected unreasonably and with malicious motives. So the case comes down plainly to the inquiry stated.

It is not an easy task to define with clearness what constitutes a nuisance, so that each case, as it arises, can he accurately tested thereby. Probably the language of Wood on Nuisances, at section 1, often quoted with approval by this court, comes as near strict accuracy as the nature of the subject will permit: "Every unlawful use by a person of his own property ling such a way as to cause injury to the property rights of another, producing material annoyaoce, inconvenience, discomfort or lurt; and every enjoyment hy one of his own property which volates the rights of another in an essential degree, constitutes an actionable nuisance."

In applying that to any given state of facts, it must be kept in mind that the injury referred to, whether to property or two occupants thereof, is pbysical. A trade may be carried on in such a way, either hy poliuting the atmosphere or by creating such disturbances as to cause physical Inconvenience to

the occupants of adjoining property, as to constitute a nuisance within the rule stated; hut acts which do not reach the adjoining property in a physical sense, yet diminish its value and desirability for a particular use, as for dwelling-bouse purposes, have not been supposed to constitute an actionable nuisance. The Toledo Trouble.

Toledo, O., July 26.—(Special.)—The chances are that no more hill boards helonging to the Bryan Company will he torn down by the health officer or policemen until the court has passed on the question. Henry Stautzenbach appeared before Judge Barber this morning with a netition, asking for an injunction. He told the judge that the police heard had assured the company that they would tear down no bill boards until the matter had been laid hefore the court, but at the first opportunity, Mr. Stautzenhach said, the police demolished them and endeavored thus to destroy a legitimate hushess.

"If it is shown here," said Jidge Barher, "that the hoards were endangering life or were a source of disease, I would grant no injunction. If they are not, then certainly an injunction would be granted. There is no evidence hefore me, and this matter should have a speedy settlement."

"I had these boards examined," spoke up Mr. Bryan, "by several competent architects,

and they pronounced them perfectly grie. Health Officer Grosh thought he would make a pretty play, and so took an axe. Inself. We knew nothing of it. If he will assure you that he will not allow more boards to be destroyed until the matter has been determined, then an injunction will not be granted. If he will not give the assurance, then you may have your injunction."—This was very satisfactory to Mr. Stautzenzach, and so he deferred filing his petition until he had seen the solicitor, but he has no fears now of the autherities taking further steps until the court authorizes them to do so. The solicitor said: "Let the rourt grant as injunction. We don't care. We are expecting it. "Bill" Show in a Wreck.

Detroit, July 29.-Section 1 of the Ituffalo Bill Wild West Show's train suffered a severe collision near Milwaukee Junction short-ly before daylight to-day, resulting in the mashing of the show employes' sleeping car, containing some forty inmates. One of the latter is dead, and nine others are in lietroit hospitais suffering from more or less serious

The dead: Edward Sullivan, aged 37, of Bridgeport, Conn., porter of the canvas car, who dad from internal hemorrhage after reaching the hospital.

The injured: Henry Eastman tulekname. Nish, aged 26, of Rochester, N. Y.; one of the processes of spine broken off, but spinal cord as yet unaffected.

A. J. flurkholder, aged 21, of Bradford. Pa.; crushed and injured very scriously, injured internally, back and leg cut by window glass. Recovery hoped for.

At the time of the collision the train, consisting of twenty wagons and stock cars, four of the show's sleeping cars and a Grand Trunk caboose, was being transferred from the Michigan Central to the Detroit, Grand Haven & Milwaukee Road. The train was being pushed backward from the "Y" at the Milwaukee Junction, when it was struck by an outgoing Grand Trunk freight train. The abcose was jammed into and forced on trof the Buffalo Bill employes' sleeper, No. 28, which was filled with sleeping tent and canvas men. When the uninjured men had recovered from the shock, the wrecked sleeper was chopped open and the Injured graduatiy gotten out. The car is a complete wreck, excepting at one end. All the viet ms will recover shortly excepting the three mest seriously injured.

Circuses in Iowa.

Des Moines, la., Aug. 1.—(Special.)—We are to be well favored with the beggest and best shows on the road this year. Rengling's has come and gone; Buffalo Bull's Congress of Rough Riders of the World is to be here some time during the season, presumably on Sept. 8, the Sedis-Forepaugh combination is to he a stellar attraction during the State Fair, provided the city council will accept the \$200 for a street parade and the usual license fee and the directors of the State Fair can be led to see that the show will not interfere with the patronage at the colossal hippodrome three miles east of the city; and latest of all, the big Wallace Shows, which made the town last year, are coming to Ites Moinca agalu. This means that practically every big show in the world with but a single exception is to make as Moinca before the leaves fall in the autumn and the menageries go into winter quarters, and the actors hie themselves to variety show houses. The single exception is Itarnum & Bailey's Show, and it is now traveling in Europe, and will not make the United States this season. Wallace's hill men are already inside the borders of the State and may arrive to Des Moines at any time. It is presumed that the show will come to Les Moines in September, probably after the willy William F. Cody and his hand of whirling dervishes have pulled down their lithographs and left the field clear.

The regular advertisers for the Wallace people are not yet in lowa. It is only the "opposition" men. To most people that term has no special significance; to showmen everywhere it has a peculiar and a particular use. It means a gang of men who travel as regular passengers over all railway lines, and who are subject to telegraphic orders from the manager of advertising, who are sent out to oppose other shows. Showmen while extending the courteries of the profession to each other, stoop to almost anything in their methods of covering territory. Spies are constantly on the alert, and whenever the advertising manager or from th

all the sides of old buildings and harns in consp.cuous places obtainable the leases being made conditional that no other show paper shall be allowed upon the boards until after their performance in the city. Then they scour the business houses and secure the large windows in the same manner. Cash is pad for the big hill boards and available advertising spaces for the larger posters; tickets only are given for the right to hang lithographs in the windows. If they are in town a day ahead of the other show they have effected a "scoop," and the only way for theseond show to get in is to build hoards of their own, or take what has been left over by the "opposition" gang, which is usually not very much. The "opposition" gang operates entirely separate from the regular advertising cars of the show, which go on their way working in a more thorough manner, rending out advertising wagons to bill the country, and they are, in their turn, beset by "opposition" gangs from other shows.

This decision, wever, by no means can be accepted as a final disposition of the question, for the case must be appealed, and it is the duty of the national organization to take the matter in hand promptly and bring it to a speedy finish.

No sooner land the adverse Los Angeles decision been announced than many of the leading dallies of the country joyonsly took the subject up and paraded it in sensutional style with scare-heads and double leads, accompanied with columns of congratulatory editorial gush. This merely added further testlmony to the fact that the activity and influence of the press are at the real root of the trouble and shows that they are determined to create as much more prejudice and antagonism as possible.

On another page of this issue will be found the text of a favorable bill board decision, handed down by the Supreme Court of Wisconsin only a few weeks ago. Every bill poster should read carefully this important document, as much comfort and luformation can be derived from it. As a precedent and gulde for future action it contains many valuable points and suggestions.



The Modern Bill Poster.

Twenty, fifteen or ten years ago, the average bill poster used ald fences, barns, sides of houses, bridges, btc., and posters were put up without any system, says Sam. W. Hoke in "Information." No list of locations was furnished the adverliser, and no guarantee of time was furnished. When the bill poster hand bill hunds they were usually of rough of houses, tridges, etc., and posters were put up without any system, says Sam. W. Hoke in "Information." No list of locations was furnished the adverliser, and no guarantee of time was furnished. When the bill poster had bill heards they were usually of rough lumber which cracks half an inch to an inch beliween boards, and the posters had very little chance for life. But we are now talking of the modern bill poster. In the prominent claes of the Union, the bill posting business represents investments ranging into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, and the annual business done in such eities as New York of Chicago will probably amoint to a quarter of a militon dollars, or more. The modern bill board is about 9½ feet high and in varying widths. The inodern poster is composed of sections, each section being about 3½ feet wide and 3½ feet high, and combisting of 1. ur sheets. An eight-sheet poster is made of two of these sections, and is seven feet wide; a twelve-sheet poster is fourteen feet wide; a sixteen-sheet poster is fourteen feet wide; a sixteen-sheet poster is fourteen feet wide; and a twenty-four-sheet poster is twenty-one feet wide. The cost of lithographing an eight-sheet poster in quantities of 5,000 varies from 16 cents to 32 cents per poster, according to whether it is a plain poster or an exceedingly artistic poster. Posters can be had for less money, and higher prices have been paid, but the man who contemplates a bill posting compaign can reasonably figure has expenditures to come between the two extremes mentioned above. The cost of posting an eight-sheet in New York is 32 cents per week, and a judicious advertiser will use 500 of this size to cover New York amounting to \$160 per week.
