

Los Argeles Cal.—(Special.)—With astonishing rapidity the city councilmen changed their minds as to the maximum height of toll boards, and put through an amended ordinance lixing the maximum height of the structures at ten fect instead of six feet. Last Fr.day morning there was every indication that the rounnimen would favor a change as to the beight limit. Then, Friday afternoon it seemed that the opposition of Messes. Toll, Silver and litanchard had succeeded and the amendment would not be passed. This opinion still prevailed until yesterday afternoon, when the board of public works recommended the passage of the amended ordinance in the following report: "In the matter of the petition from the Los Angeles Itill Posting Company your committee would respectfully recommend that the ordinance regulating hill boards be amended to provide that the height of bill boards shall not exceed ten feet. Political Posters.

When Williams Jennings Bryan rode through the streets of Indianapolis recently bis eve met with some old familiar sights. The Republican committees arranged to plaster the bill hoards with large posters. Some of them were after the style of those gotten out last year, showing William McKinley in the act of addressing a delegation of citizens with these words: "I do not know what you think about it! but I helicve it is a good deal better to open up the mills of the United States to the labor of America than to open up the mints of the United States to the silver of the world." The American Bill Posting Service has 155,000 running feet of hoards; 1,600 locations, on which a 24-sheet stand of paper can be placed. Can you realize it?

This firm does not know really how many feet of boards they have. They could lose 5,000 feet and not miss it. I wish to say Chicago has no opposition. Some time ago the "Chicago American" advertised for locations on which to post its own paper, hut did not contract, for the American Posting Service does its work, besides distributing it to about 100 outside towns.

I had a very pleasant chat with the members of this firm (American Posting Service) and was informed that things looked rather rosy and that this year was a record-hreaker. This firm uses tweity-five barrels of paste a day; has sixty men on the pay-roll, and twenty-five wagons. The gross receipts for the year ending July 1 was a shade better than \$25,000. On local work, \$175,000 was realized, while national husiness brought \$75,000. Yearly rentals cost \$45,000.

Old Posters.

Old Posters.

It is most unfortunale that so very few of the earliest bills should have come down to us, for they would have been most curious and instructive documents. Itut, when we think of it, it is almost impossible that such should have survived. Once the play was over, their use was over; they were certain to be thrown away, or, if brought home, would be lost or torn up. Even now we can see the floor and seats of the pit and stalls strewn with these abandoned sheets of paper in the old writers, such as Stryne, there are several allusions to "the bill" and in "the players setting up their bills inviting lo plays." Northeote says, about 1579, that "they used to set up their bills upon posts some time hefore, to admonish people to make resort to their theaters." The most curious proofs are the allusions in the Stutioners' Itall records to certain privileges for "the only imprynting of all manner of Itills for plays." And in 1620 we find a patent to one lloger Ward for printing on one side "all hills for Plays, Pantomimes' and shows." From these notes we can gather what was the origin of the familiar "poster," that is, a bil affixed to any gate post. In the country even now, we see little notices of sales of helds and inclosures. The description will be noted—"all manner of Bills for plays," which shows that they were in various forms, large and small.—Gentleman's Magazine.

Advertising by Suggestion.

Sometimes he wasks up Washington street past the skyscrapers, sometimes he promenades out among the big residences on Beacon street, sometimes he is in the crowd at a wharf or a ra-lread station and sometimes he leans the sign conspleuously against an ailey wall and retires for an appearance of eight men run plump against him ard are steepped in full flight. AN UNPREJUDICED VIEW.

From the standpoint of the daily press, bill board advertising is of course a very wicked thing, for the business office of every newspaper is epenly competing for and striving earnestly to regain much of that advertising patronage which the bill beards have turned aside from its coffer. It is positively refreshing, howeye: to notice that one or two of our leading dailies have had the hardihood and temerity, when occasion demanded, to come forth with delectable frankness, and admit that the bill paster after all is not a robber nor a desecrator.

So many columns of inane reportorial vaporings have recently appeared in the public prints about the alleged "billboard nuisance" that a bold protest from one of the editorial ilk in high anthority comes with the welcomeness of a gentle gale after a protracted period of parching heat and sweltering lumidity. The "Boston Times" is the labest to make a candid confession. In its issue of Ang. 12, it had many pleasant things to say about the bill poster, some of which were as follows:

"Here in Boston, the crusade against bill beards is only another excuse for the gathering of persons like Edwin D. Mead-those who must have emsades and topics for reform, or they perish. Therefore the crusade must have something inherently and fundamentally wiring about it. The bill poster is a man of nerve and andacity, but he is not raining the country. It is not right that he plaster the front of the State House or Fanenil Hall, and usually he knows enough to keep away from such places. We have toierated the bill poster for a hundred years or more and watched the steady growth of his bills in an artistic direction with an admiring eye. It is a

shame for good people to arise now and deelare him and his boards public unisances. The boards should not be erected in public parks, for that Is giving the advertiser an unfalr advantage, as well as interfering with the contour of the landscape which in city places is safe-gnarded by law. What is the harm in creeting boards in lots traversed by the railroads? They relieve what in many cases is a monotcoons landscape and afford food for contemplation. Who has not turned his head to observe an enterprising hill locard which has suddenly burst into view after a dull stretch of traveling? What is more important, the bill heards sell the goods advertised. For some articles they are superlor to the newspapers and magazines, because they reach people who do not read, or are not impressed by newspaper advertisements. If they dld not sell the goods, they would not continue to be emplayed. Another proof is found in the pains and money spent upon the designs for the posters. Imagine a country barn without its circus posters, for which the farmer receives the welcome "skulls" which give hmocent enjoyment to himself and family. The good people who are so suddenly and so dreadfully agitated over the bill beard will find, we fear, that it can not be reformed out of existence. In its proper place it is all right. It is seldom employed by Immoral and swindling advertisers. On the contrary, articles of household use which are found to be of full value. and indispensable, are advertised by bill boards. The bill board is a sight much ideasanter than the platform appearances of chronic reformers, who flit from one reform to another as the seasons go by, but who never do anything, but always talk, and are deceived perpetually in the simplest mat-

Strong and sensible arguments are also contained in the following remarks, which appeared in a journal supposed to be devoted exclusively to newspaper advertising:

"Here are a few points which have been argued in favor of bill posting. Bill posters lease property which would otherwise lie ldle. Imy lumber, lardware, employ mechanics and lalearners to build their fences, ald paper mills and urinters by their consumption of the output of those trades; also poster printing and lithograph establishments, use the work of high-priced arosts and designers, and consume an amount of tlour in the manufacture of paste that would surprise anyone not aconainted with the details of the business."

Circus Terrors in Trouble.

Circus Terrors in Trouble.

Cloquet, Minn., Aug. H.—(Special.)—In the hours of darkness Sunday night a highly dramatic scene was trausacted here. From all reports the English-Aunerican Syndicate Shows, which has been holding forth in the various towns in this section of the State, had been committing all sorts of depredations and high-handed proceedings, assaulting of heers, making Jail deliveries, inciting riots and raising pandemonlum wherever they chanced to be. At Cass Lake the circus people distinguished themselves especially by brutally assaulting Sheriff Rombaugh and Deputy Alexander, both of llubbard County, and rescuing certain men whom the officers had arrested.

As the show was to pass through this place Sunday night, it was determined to apprehend the ruffians at any cost, and consequently Gov. Lind was whred to, and three companies of militia from Duluth were sent by special train to hold the circus train here and arrest the men wanted. The special Northerr Pacific train with the troops arrived about II o'clock, and a few minutes before reaching the station all lights were extinguished, and the men ordered not to speak above a whisper. At that time the show train, which was coming from Virginia over the Eastern Minnesota, had not arrived, the train men having received orders from the State authorities to hold it hack until the arrival of the soldlers so as to intercept them. About 12 o'clock it pulled into the station, shrouded in darkness, and everyhody apparently asleep. It was taken down to the old Winnipeg spur and stalled for the night. A "council of war" was held by the sheriffs and militia officers, and the troop train was ordered backed up on another siding a few rods from the elreus train. A line of pickets was then thrown out around the latter to cut off any possible means of escape on the part of the show men. At daylight the oificers routed out the circus crew and secured twelve men, who were handcuffed together and taken up town, and the circus train, as well as the troop's special tra

One goes in through a dormer window in the attic and finds everything upside down. Under foot are what appear to be the ceilings, spouting chandeliers like glant toadstools, and overhead are chairs and tables and all the other ordinary furniture of a house, miraculously clinging to the reversed floors. There are even books and small articles scattered about on the carpet and sticking to them as if by magic, and on some of the tables lamps are burning, top down. Everything about the place contributes to one of the most be wildering Illusious imaginable, but the really amazing feature of the house is the view through the windows. They command a considerable expanse of the expositiou grounds, and, incredible as it may seem, everything is upside town. One sees all the familiar buildings, standing on their heads, throngs of reversed people walking to and fro and the sky yawning where the earth ought to be. The effect is indescribably puzzing. I puzzled over those windows for a long time, but I finally discovered their secret. The Illusion is produced by means of two mirrors, both set at angles in the casing, and one reflecting the other. By that means the outside scene is turned about topsy-turvey and cast back into the room with all the realism of an open-air view. Visitors are not allowed to go very close to the windows for fear, as the attendants say that they will fall down into the sky.'
