

The President and Secretary of the association were anthorized to confer with the Excentive Board of the 1. A. of D. and the Board of Directors of the Associated States and Cauada at the next uncet'ng in October for consolidation of all three as-

sociations into the Associated Bill Posters and Distributors of the United States and Canada. It was also the sense of this meeting that this association act in con-junction with the other associations, look-ing towards the opening of an office in New York City exclusively for the purpose of taking National contracts for distributors and the furnishing of advertisers with such information as may be useful to them in the distribution of their advertising matter.

Fraud Orders Issued.

The Postmaster General has issued fraud orders against the American Advertisers' Association, Newport, Ky., for using the mails for frandulent purposes. The scheme of the concern, it is alleged, was to adver-tise in the papers for men to distribute eir-culurs, samples, tacking signs, bill posting, for a weekly remuneration of \$20. In the advertisement the concern asked for two stramps for portleniars. To those who were attracted by the advertisement and wrote for further information two circular letters were sent. The one, it is alleged, describes the business of bill distributors, etc., as pleasant and profitable, and solicits the pa-trons to join the American Advertisers' As-sociation.

The second circular stated: "We ure ex-ceedingly anxious to seenre an agent in your locality without delay, and have con-cluded to send you a \$2 special ecoupon, which, if signed, will be accepted as \$2 toward the menubership fee of \$4 when ac-companied by \$2 in cush. In ordering in-close this coupon with \$2," etc. On receipt of the \$2 the concern sent the patrou a small directory containing the unmes and addresses of certain mail order establishments in different parts of the United States, and circular matter telling him how to apply for work, etc. In the investigation made by the Assist-ant Attorney General for the Postoffice De-partment it was brought to light that the concern gave no euployment, that, in fact, there is no such organized association, one U. G. Dunn using the above mentioned name.



due almost entrely to had weather. There is considerable room for improve-ment in their conduct, but hetter managemeut can be expected now that it is proved to be worth while. The function will change somewhat in

eharacter. Wherever It becomes established as an annual event, it will gradually assume the characteristics of the old-time "Jahr Markt." Immoral features and eluch games will have to be eliminated. But this will all come in time. and

In not one has been heard the faint-est whine of a calamity howler. The uni-versal expression has been one of prosper-ous anticipation. In about 80 per cent. of the letters came the information of extensive improvements on grounds, enlarged fa cilities for entertaining patrons, and the an nouncement that a greater number of higher-priced attractions would be used as drawing cards than ever before. In nearly every instance the premiums for this year are anounced to be in cash, not as used to

be the custom, diplomas, plckle dishes, imitation cut glass match safes and red rib-bon badges. The greater number of fair associations have so developed their enterprises that to-day, instead of the stock being far below par and high at any price, the shares stand usually at a premium, and are recognized to be good marketable property. It may be taken that the County Fair is an index to the county's financial condition: that a successful exhibition, large cash premiums and healthy purses in the speed ring prove the very strongest ad-vertisement of the native's energy and the county's resources. The careful render of the fair department in this issue of "The Billboard" can not fail to be impressed with the truth of this article, as he sees the reports from a limited number of the great mass in our possession, all of which brings the same story of improved devel-opment, financial strength and prosperons promise.






