

## WISCONSIN BILL POSTERS.

### Annual Convention Officers Elected—Delegates Named.

Fond du Lac, Wis., May 19.—The annual convention of the Wisconsin Bill Posters' Association was held in this city May 14, with a fair attendance of the members. The association has doubled its membership in the past two years, and is in excellent working order. The opening or preliminary session was called to order at the Palmer House at 11 o'clock this morning, at which time committees were appointed and matters which were to come up at the afternoon session discussed in an informal way.

Those present at the morning session were: H. W. Wilson, Beloit; E. A. Hartman, Madison; Karl Stussy, Eau Claire; H. F. Larson, Green Bay; John D. Lawe, Kaukauna; Will Lansing, Menasha; J. E. Williams, Osh Kosh; W. C. Tieke, Racine; E. J. Kempf, Sheboygan; John Leaver, Waterloo; E. E. Davis, Winona; C. A. Marshall, West Superior; William T. Seeger, Ashland; J. T. Larson, Marquette; W. E. Carpenter, Winona; Henry Carlson, Grand Rapids, Mich.

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:30 o'clock and reports were heard from the committees on license, assessments and the executive committee. Twelve new members were received, making a total of 62. The committee on license recommended a form of license which was adopted by the association. The committee on assessments recommended a readjustment of the assessment of dues, taxing the members according to the population of the town in which they reside. \$1 for the first 1,000 population and 15 cents for each additional 1,000 of population. The resolution was adopted.

Officers were elected as follows: President, P. B. Haber; vice president, Karl Stussy; E. A. Hartman; secretary and treasurer, E. J. Kempf, Sheboygan. P. B. Haber and Karl Stussy were elected delegates to the National Convention of Bill Posters, which will be held at Milwaukee July 8.

Before adjourning the association voted to accept the invitation of C. A. Marshall to hold the next State convention at West Superior. The convention will be held on Wednesday, May 13, 1903.

### TROUBLE COMING.

At their meeting held Sunday, May 11, the Billposters' and Billers' Union of Chicago voted that after June 15 a day's work shall consist of eight hours. It is said that this virtually means only six hours' actual work as they use, as a rule, an hour in the morning to get to and at their work, and most of them (except the center routes) take an hour at night to drive to the barn.

They now get \$12 or \$15 work or play and double time for overtime. The union will not permit any new men to be broken in, and it is said that they have no provisions for apprentices.

One correspondent writing in regard to the situation says: "The American is now compelled to use all the old bill poster they had formerly fled or refused to hire, in order to get men to do their work. They are enjoying a tremendous boom."

Another correspondent says: "I wonder what Campbell will do about it? At the time the union was formed several of the theaters held out for a time until they found Bob was bucking the men in their efforts to form a union. Then they fell in line. Now, they declare that they will not assist the American in case of a strike, and the union is so strong that it can dictate terms."

Another correspondent writes: "I predicted at the time the union was forming that Campbell was building a club to kill himself with. He evidently thought at that time that the theaters could not afford to keep billers at a straight salary and that they would have to come to the American. Hence, his reason for urging them to organize."

Another correspondent says: "Campbell is cool and confident. I believe he has the situation well in hand. At any rate, he is not worrying any. He left for Indianapolis to-day to help harmonize matters down there."

### AT INDIANAPOLIS.

R. C. Campbell attended the meeting at Indianapolis largely for the purpose of uniting the Empire and Indianapolis plants. Now that John Whallen is interested with the "Big Four" he is anxious to get his friend, Fennessy, into the fold. Bob went over to help the game along and engineer the deal, as it were.

Of course he is a member of the Association, too, by virtue of his Indiana plant, but his chief business was to harmonize the warring Indianapolis plants.

### LEVYNE'S LETTER.

Cincinnati, O., May 19, 1902  
Editor "The Billboard."

Dear Sir: A great many prominent bill posters, and several of the solicitors, have written me in regard to my letter, which appeared in "The Billboard" of May 10, asking if my figures were correct regarding the 97 contracts of new advertisers that appeared on the boards since Jan. 1. Some wanted to know where I gained my information, which to me seems impertinent; but my figures were correct, only they would not average \$5,000, as was stated, but would average about \$3,000.

Mr. Editor, it seems as if in the past few months that our bill posting friends have retired to the land of oblivion. I can remember when those boys occasionally contributed an article, and I think they need a stirring up, as probably they are of a retiring disposition and somewhat backward to speak of their plants and their prosperity. I will say a few words for them, as an incentive for them to make their old contribution to "The Bill board," their old stand-by.

Bushy Bros. wrote me that they have 3,000 running feet of boards in Clinton, Ia., and 2,000 at Marshalltown, which is a remarkably good showing for these two cities.

Frank Myers, of Danville, Ill., whose town has 23,000 inhabitants, can put up 45 24-sheets without placing two on a board. He reports that business is exceptionally good, but not quite equal to this time last year.

G. W. Stark, of Jacksonville, Ill., has increased his plant this year with nine new locations. Stark is a perfectly reliable bill poster, as far as my five years of business experience with him is concerned.

R. H. Taylor, of Moline, Ill., had a letter of recommendation from Dr. Pierce, thanking him for the good display made in his town with his paper.

G. B. Bowman, of Quincy, Ill., informs me that he is still at the old stand; or I should say, new stand, as he has in the past eighteen months demoralized his bill boards.

W. Y. Horn, of Springfield, advises advertisers to speak quickly for his space, as he will be short on that commodity in fifteen days.

Evansville Bill Posting Company, per F. M. Greves, writes that in consideration of the amount of boards that he has in his city, he can not get quite sufficient paper to do his plant justice. The advertisers should realize that Evansville is the metropolis of Southern Indiana and Illinois.

The Iowa Posting Service has informed me, through Mr. Chamberlin, of Burlington, that notwithstanding the increase of locations built within the past six months in their various plants, they are just about at this time time crowded for space. This shows what a steel plant will do.

W. P. Dermer, of Ft. Dodge, Ia., whose population is 13,000, recently sent me a communication, stating his country route, but as I mislaid his letter I can not give it to the advertisers.

G. L. Orting & Son, of Newport, Ky., has added 750 feet within the past sixty days to their plant in Newport, Bellevue and Dayton.

John Donnelly & Sons, of Boston, have a hustling outside man to take charge of their plant. The gentleman in question is Geo. Pulifer, and as Mr. Donnelly is very precise about the appearance of his boards, he could not find a better man.

Received a letter from Geo. M. Leonard, of Grand Rapids, Mich. He did not say anything about his aspiration to become president of the association, but I read between the lines that he has placed himself in the "hands of his friends."

The Gunning System, of Chicago, are doing an exceptionally good business just at this time.

The Big Four have their eyes on Cincinnati. They expect to get hold of it in the near future.

The El Paso (Tex.) Bill Posting Company report that they are having all the business they can handle.

Mr. O. P. Falbrekild, the Covington (Ky.) bill poster, is sending out a neatly printed list of his new locations.

Sun Prairie and Columbus, suburban towns, are now being covered by John Leaver, bill poster at Waterloo, Wis.

J. H. S. Ellis is manager of the Ellis Opera House and Ellis Advertising & Bill Posting Company, of Rensselaer, Ind.

E. M. Fritz, of Okaloosa, Ia., and H. C. Ernlech, of Ft. Scott, Kan., report a big business in bill posting in those cities.

The Attorney General of Massachusetts has declared that bill boards are a nuisance, and can be legislated out of existence.

The annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Bill Posting Association will be held at Reading, May 23-24. John H. Mishler is president.

W. A. Meuday, the bill poster at Rock Valley, Ia., is booking the tour of Mr. and Mrs. Tugan in "Sandy Bottom," a drama of Southern life.

An awful row is on at Cedar Rapids, Ia., regarding new bill boards now in course of erection. Some citizens are shooting about with their hammers aloft.

The annual meeting of the Iowa State Bill Posters' and Distributors' Association will be held at the Grand Hotel, Cedar Rapids, Thursday, June 5.

Charles H. Atkinson, formerly with the Auditorium Bill Posting Company, Peoria, Ill., has severed his connection with that firm and started in the same business for himself.

The New York situation is apparently no nearer settlement than it was a year ago. True, there is no spare war on, but even on this issue both parties are sleeping on their arms, as it were.

Delegates to the big Milwaukee convention of bill posters, to be held July 8-12, will establish headquarters at the Hotel Pfister, an up-to-date fire-proof hostelry, managed by Mr. A. L. Severance.

On Wednesday, May 7, Mr. Thomas Post, manager of the Elizabeth (N. J.) Bill Posting Company, and Miss Kate Fagan, of Fap River, Mass., were united in marriage in St. Mary's Church, Elizabeth, N. J.

The Chamber of Commerce at Albany, N. Y., has employed the city bill poster, F. E. Flitch, to advertise good reasons why manufacturers should locate in that city. Flitch has his boards covered with showy illustrations.

Business Agent Dave Howard, of Billers' and Billposters' Union, No. 1, of Chicago, is now located at his down-town office, 124 East Washington street. The meetings of the union are still held at Fitzgerald's Hall, Halstead and Adams streets.

Colonel Burr Robbins is fast losing interest in the game. His attention is so completely monopolized by new ventures that at times he can scarcely believe he was ever showman, poster printer or bill poster. Off with the old, on with the new. Twas ever thus.

Manager Hollaud, of the Southeast Texas Advertising Company, Beaumont, Tex., is kept busy these hot days with local and foreign business. His boards are now covered with Floradora Cigar posters, Preemo Cigars, Wilson Whiskey, Gold Band Hams and Bacon, etc., besides paper for "America."

The Big Four formally assumed the management of the Consolidated, of Louisville Monday, May 12. Their purchase of the stock of Ramsey & Robinson was made on a basis of \$24,000 for the plant. The purchase money is now in escrow, awaiting the settlement of judgments and attachments on the stock.

The Montgomery Advertising Company, Beaumont, Tex., is a new concern recently launched, and is out for business, having at its head an old timer in general advertising lines. They will build several thousand feet of artistic bill boards during the summer, preparatory to handling a large business this winter.

The Eastern Bill Posting Company, at Eastport, Me., was recently organized, with James A. Minahan manager, the latter being one of the leading bill posters and advertising managers down East. The towns of Lubee, Perry, Pembroke, East Machias, Machias, Robbinston, Ring, Princeton, Milltown, St. Stephen and Vinalis are covered.

C. F. Bangasser & Co., bill posters and distributors of McMinnville, Ore., report that they have on their boards at present Lash's Bitters, Export Cigar, Diamond C Soap, President Suspenders posters, and about 200 sheets local. They have also established a bill posting plant at Newberg, Ore., and have on hand ten 8-sheet stands and more to put up.

The billboard companies of the Twin Cities and Indiana and one of Chicago have incorporated in order to be able to fight the movement to do away with the so-called billboard nuisance. The City Council of Minneapolis took up the consideration of this matter recently, but has formulated no definite plan of action as yet. It did, however, order all billboards removed from the unlined sides of the new court house, at Fourth street and Third avenue.

Since the Sam Hoke financial troubles Mrs. Hoke has, at the suggestion of the committee appointed at Cleveland, been sending out orders on her own account. The bill posters all know Mrs. Hoke, and are doing the best they know how to give her fine showings. She has been in charge of the bill posting orders for the past six years, and probably knows more bill poster than all other solicitors combined. Sam's indebtedness to bill posters is only \$9,000, though at times he has had out ten to thirty times that amount of business. It is confined to less than one hundred association members.

Clarence E. Runey, the only official representative of the association who did not boast a side line of advertising, such as billboards, signs, etc., has gone the way of all the rest. He has added newspaper and magazine advertising to his line. Bob Campbell now most nearly approaches the ideal solicitor, but even he is so thick with thinning that he can not land a knockout blow when billboards are under discussion.

Mr. J. F. Clark, bill poster at Conway, Ark., reports the following posting done in May: 75 1-sheets, 2 8-sheets, 2 20-sheets for the Sterling Remedy Co.; 30 2-sheets and 3 12-sheets for The American Cigar Co.; 25 2-sheets and 6 8-sheets for The Continental Tobacco Co. Have distributed 125,000 pieces of advertising matter. Still it comes. Mr. Clark has enough paper on his boards to keep him busy for three months.

John A. Valentine, distributor, has removed from Cambridge, Mass., to Saugus, Mass., where he will continue in the distributing business.

Jas. E. Humphrey, of Winnebago City, Minn., has distributed the following matter recently: 4,000 books to men, 1,000 perfume books, 500 Shoope's; also local work.

### ADVERTISING TIPS.

The "sandwich man" method of publicity is dying out.

At Scottsdale, Pa., the merchants have combined to protect themselves against fake advertising schemes.

W. R. McDonald, of Atlanta, Ga., is to succeed Walter B. Calloway as advertising agent of the C. H. & D. R. R.

Eaton's Medicated Salt Co., Bainbridge, Ga., are getting estimates on posters. They will also tack water proof signs.

Peter Schnyder Cigars, with a handsome 8-sheet poster of original and striking design, are on the boards in a selected list of cities for a three months' billing in each.

Suppa Camera is also now on the boards in the West with 8 and 2-sheet posters. Saratoga Adirondack Water, 16 and 8-sheet posters, goes on the boards in New England and New York on June 1. This paper is in the hands of the bill posters.

Ayer & Son have just completed a heavy display of painted signs for Uneda Biscuit in Atlantic City, N. J., among which are three swell bulletins, two of them over 150 feet long, on the meadows approaching this famous resort. They are also erecting on the meadows two immense bulletins, 200 feet long, exploiting President Suspenders.

N. W. Ayer & Son, Philadelphia, have closed a contract for bill posting, covering a year's display throughout the South, advertising Nubian Tea for the Spence Medicine Co., of Chattanooga, Tenn., and using 8 and 1-sheet posters. The State of Georgia is to begin at once, and advance notices have been sent out to all good bill posters in that State.

Men engaged in trying to pull apart overalls in one of the principal streets of Joliet, Ill., recently formed one of the exciting features of an advertising scheme by W. H. Scott, advertising manager of Sweet, Orr & Co., makers of union made garments and overalls. Crowds filled the streets all afternoon watching the parade and listening to the band. The firm recently started its Western factory at Joliet, and took this means of arousing great public interest.

Ayer & Son have a heavy billing of International, 16 and 8-sheet posters, for the National Biscuit Co., on the boards, beginning May 15, and covering nearly 200 of the largest cities in the country. Their con-

tract for the Hirle's Root Beer posting includes nearly 500 cities and towns, and covers the United States thoroughly from Los Angeles, Cal., and Portland, Ore., to Portland, Me., and Florida. The posters used are 8 and 2-sheets, and the showings are for one and two months, according to circumstances. This firm is also placing President Suspenders on the Pacific Coast and in New England, 8 and 1-sheet posters. Uneeda Biscuit, 8-sheet posters, is now on the boards of Georgia and Iowa, heavy billings reaching every town in which good bill posters are located. Both of these States will be covered again with Uneeda Biscuit in the fall.

### PRESSMEN WIN.

New York, May 16, 1902.—(Special Correspondence to "The Billboard")—The strike of the pressmen in the New York poster printing plants is over. It resulted in a sharp and decisive victory for the strikers. The lithographers granted their demands May 15, viz.: ten per cent. increase in wages, with a minimum scale of \$22 per week, time and a half for overtime and double time for Sundays and legal holidays.

The men were out only eight days. They are much elated over their victory. The feeble show of resistance made by the shops has excited much comment, in view of their defiant declarations at the beginning.

It is not to be wondered at, though. The shops are kept apart by jealousies and animosity, while the men are united.

There could not have been any other outcome under the circumstances.

### INKLINGS.

The Gillin Litho Company granted the demands of the striking printing pressmen, and therefore suffered no inconvenience from the strike.

The Donaldson Lithograph Company added a complete photograph gallery, photo-engraving department and electrotyping outfit last week.

The Massillon Show Print. of Massillon, O., expect soon to install special machinery that will enable them to greatly reduce the cost of programs, heralds, couriers, etc. They are making tentative offers as follows: 50,000 quarter-sheets, 14x21 or 10x28, both sides, \$47.50; 100,000 quarter-sheets, 14x21 or 10x28, both sides, \$90; 50,000 half-sheets, 14x28 or 21x28, both sides, \$85; 100,000 half-sheets, 14x28 or 21x28, both sides, \$175; 50,000 one-sheets, 28x42 or 21x28, both sides, \$180; 100,000 one-sheets, 28x42 or 21x28, both sides, \$340. These prices are for heralds, without special dating. Where special dating is required, the price is to be 10 cents per 1,000 extra for quarter-sheets, 15 cents for half-sheets and 20 cents for one-sheets.

## RIOTERS

**Attacked the Barnum & Bailey Show in France.**

Barnum & Bailey's Circus was the cause of a serious riot at Beziers, France, last week. The crowd seeking admission to the performance was greater than the tent could accommodate, and those who were unable to enter began stoning the circus employees, five of whom were injured. One had his skull fractured, and will probably die. Several thousand persons forced their way into the arena. The police were powerless to check them. Troops were called out and restored order, finally driving the rioters away. The performance was concluded, but at its termination the tents were taken down, and arrangements were made to start immediately for Carcassonne, the next place on the route. The circus had similar trouble at Clith and Narbonne.

## IN A WRECK.

**Forepaugh-Sells Employees Were Badly Injured.**

The canvas and wagon train of the Forepaugh-Sells Bros. Circus was wrecked May 15, at Marysville, near Harrisburg, Pa., and six canvasmen were seriously injured. The accident occurred at 5 o'clock in the morning, and was caused by a broken truck under a car carrying a large canvas wagon. Behind the wrecked section were the cars carrying the performers. A delay of several hours was occasioned.

Those injured were: Columbus Davis, colored, of Martin County, North Carolina; Charles Berkley, Louisville, Ky.; Harry Sheaver, Springfield, Mo. They are hurt internally. The others are cut and bruised about the head. They are: Robert Clark, of Altoona, Pa.; Edward Bargin, of 8400 First Avenue, New York, and James C. Bradshaw, Richmond, Va.

## OPENING

**Of the Great Buffalo and Wild West Shows at Helena, Montana, July 4, 5 and 6.**

The Great Buffalo and Wild West Shows consolidated will open the season at Helena, Mont., July 4, 5 and 6, and will travel thence toward the East, playing only the larger cities.

The show carries a magnificent herd of buffalo, which are unique specimens of the monarchs that once swept the vast plains, now marked alone by their whitening bones.

The cook house in the permanent quarters is now open, and the work of preparation is going on in earnest. Manager Geo. F. Hutchins has signed up a long list of specialties, and on the opening day Missoula will send forth a train of cars that will grace any big show enterprise.

## A HOT CLEM.

(Special Correspondence.)

Charleston, W. Va., May 16.—The Model Plate Shows (J. August Jones, Mgr.) gave an exhibition at Mammoth, a mining town on Kelley's Creek, last night, that ended in a riot, in which over fifty shots were fired, six people being wounded, some seriously.

Juba, Charles and Preston Elswick, Wm. Black, Wilbur Price and several others, drunk on mountain whisky, became angered because they were ejected from the show for not paying the admission, and, going to the railroad track, started to loosen the brakes on the show cars, which would have caused them to run down a heavy grade.

The show people attempted to drive the gang off and the riot followed. Four employees of the circus were injured, one man being shot in the face and another in the arm, while the other two, one of them a woman, were struck with clubs and seriously injured.

Charles Elswick, one of the gang, was badly wounded by a shot in the body, and Richard Mann, a bystander, was seriously wounded by a stray bullet. Several members of the gang are in custody here, and Elswick is under guard at his home.

Manager Jones says that although some of his people are pretty badly hurt, there will be no fatalities.

The circus folks were quite generally commended for the stand they took in protecting their property.

## SYNDICATES AND TRUSTS.

Whenever a poster prints has a customer suddenly grow cold on his hands and a promising order goes glimmering, if he can not account for it in any other way he is pretty apt to ascribe it to the rates for posting. So he damns the bill poster and inveighs against trusts. Circus agents, advertising agents, and, of course, independent bill posters are much given to the same practice. The tendency, owing to the yammer of cheap scribes, in cheaper papers, has become general. Like the gamin who, from a safe distance, howls nigger! nigger! nigger! So the unthinking crowd is ever ready to shout trust! trust! trust! Imagining that they have summed up the whole of opprobrium in the one word.

And yet the trusts go on serenely; the old ones waxing greater and new ones forming daily. If they are one-tenth part as bad as they are painted; if they are infamous, iniquitous and altogether vile, as the calumniators assert, and many misguided people believe, then truly is the devil holding high carnival on earth just now.

In simple truth, though, nothing could be further from the fact. The trusts have come because they were needed. They came in spite of the protests of those who opposed them; yes, even in spite of those who thought they planned them; and they continue to exist because they are indispensable—because, in the vernacular, they are a "good thing," and the people know it. The people made them, and should they ever become an agent of oppression, or should it ever appear that they are not an improvement on conditions prevailing prior to their advent, the people will unmake them.

Innovation has ever been hampered by ignorance. In the sixteenth century, when the simplest form of business combination, as we know it now—the partnership—first came into existence, there were ignorant people to oppose it, writers to denounce it as wicked, illegal and opposed to the best interests of the people and legislative assemblies to enact laws against it. In those days a business man was supposed simply to make or buy things and sell them. It was uncommendable, if not actually unmerciful, for him to receive any aid or help outside of his own immediate family.

In London, even as late as the seventeenth century, a law was rigidly enforced

which provided the punishment of the stocks for men convicted of pooling their efforts and dividing the profits. Men who formed a partnership were guilty of conspiracy, connivance and contravention.

"What stupidity!" you say. Yet the argument was the same as the one in use today, viz.: "It's an attempt to stifle competition." And this cry has been raised at each advancing step that progress has made in the commercial world. When partnerships co-operated with one another in attempting some work of unusual magnitude, or in an effort to eradicate evil conditions which they could not combat single-handed, the same old cry was heard.

When the temporary co-operative partnerships were found of such worth that they incurred greater stability and endurance, and associated partnerships or associations came to take their place, another howl went up. When the syndicate succeeded the association, when the corporation succeeded the syndicate, and finally, when the trust succeeded the corporation, it has been ever the same. "Thy are stifling competition."

There has been a lot of mischief made by proverbs. The basest one of all the bunch is, "Competition is the life of trade." This fool saying, handed down from father to son, and religiously believed, has come to be considered almost a law of nature. A great many people, and fairly intelligent people, too, so consider it. But it is not. "It is no more a law of nature," in the words of Elbert Hubbard, "than is hate."

What is competition, that it should be so carefully safeguarded? "Because it cheapens things," some one answers. Yes, it does. It cheapens the prices of things, and it cheapens their quality also. It cheapens the merchant engaged in it, and it cheapens the labor he hires. It does cheapen everything and every person that comes within its influence.

That is the one and only thing that can be said in its favor, and it is precious little. It gives the palm to the cheapest, which is never the best, and seldom, if ever, even economical. Over against this one very doubtful credit can be set down countless debits. For instance, it incites strife, gives rise to envy, engenders hate, fosters jealousy, places a premium on misrepresentation and mendacity, creates malice, causes bitterness, etc.

Talk about trusts being grinders of the individual; they simply are not in it with competition. When competition, unbridled, is lashed to fury and driven to its utmost, there is but one goal—destruction and utter ruin. Sometimes the men engaged in the mad race discern it in time, stop and get together.

That is what the bill posters did. They did not form a trust. They did not seek to stifle competition, but to curb it. They determined to try co-operation in lieu of rate-cutting. They did try. They succeeded. If you doubt it, contrast conditions which obtained before the association was organized with those that obtain now. Compare the service then and now. Look how they have elevated the business in the estimation of commercial advertisers.

Instead of kicking, cursing and trying to taunt them, the show printers could be much better and profitably employed if they went and did likewise. The modern way is the better way. Of course, there is nothing to prevent people from clinging to traditions of the past, for no one has cornered the market on stupidity. We are simply interpreting "the handwriting on the wall," which, being translated, reads, "You will have to, bye and bye."

## JAMES M. DISHON.

Few men in the business can claim so extensive an experience as has been that of James M. Dishon, the pioneer bill poster and distributor of Terre Haute, Ind. And furthermore, it is safe to say that no one in that following is more generally respected than he.

Mr. Dishon has been in the business many years, having, in 1861, made his first distribution, which consisted of programs for the Metropolitan Theater at Indianapolis. Finding this occupation exceedingly to his taste Mr. Dishon, who was then a mere boy, secured other distributions of like character, until, in 1863, the bill posting plant at Indianapolis being offered for sale, he invested his savings of the past three years and became its proud proprietor.

Later he purchased the plant at Terre Haute, Ind. His work was always executed scrupulously and conscientiously, and in the ensuing years he did much to raise the business of bill posting to the prestige it now enjoys.

He it was who first adopted the principle of rendering his boards slightly and even

picturesque by decoration and artistic embellishment, and the practice so inaugurated has spread until (despite occasional cries to the contrary) the bill boards of a city or town are often features that contribute as much as any other single influence to its native attractiveness.

Such is the fact of Terre Haute, and Mr. Dishon may justly be proud of his system. In 1871, thinking himself tired of the business, he disposed of his boards; but the posting of bills had become so closely associated with his daily thoughts and habits that after sixteen days he bought them back again.

His marked and continued success is assuredly the result of irreproachable service and strict devotion to business. In a word, it has been his avocation as well as his vocation.

## TRAIN JUMPED TRACK.

Kane, manager, knee slightly bruised; C. R. Coleman, boss bill poster, deep gash in chin; R. W. Perkins and G. E. White, legs severely bruised; balance of party only slightly shaken up.

## OBITUARY.

Antonie Bamberg, a playwright of note, killed herself in Austria last week. Her most widely known work, perhaps, was "A Marriage for Love." The failure of one of her dramas caused her to become despondent.

Capt. A. B. French, the well known river man, is dead. He gained considerable note in years gone by as the owner of show boats, carrying companies playing small river towns. He left an estate valued at \$100,000.

Geo. Pritchard, an actor, died last week, of typhoid-pneumonia at St. Joseph's Hospital, Denver, Col. He was the leading comedian of the Denver Theater Stock Company when stricken with illness. He was 31 years of age, and a young man of many good qualities. Peace to his ashes.

Henry Parmyer, better known to the professional world as Hank Parmyer, 67 years of age, died recently at Newark City Hospital, Newark, N. J., of acute intestinal trouble. He was, in the early part of his life, manager of the G. L. Fox Show, Booth and Barrett, Haverly's Minstrels, and was the first man to go ahead of "Uncle Tom's Cabin." He was known as one of the highest salaried agents in the country, and was always in great demand. In the height of his prosperity he was taken sick in Texas, and from then on his health failed him. Two years ago, when he came to Newark, Mr. E. M. Slocomb, secretary of the Newark Bill Posting Company, gave him a position ostensibly, but in reality a home. When the sad news of his death reached the Newark Bill Posting Company, its employees made up a subscription list, and with the assistance of numerous theatrical friends, buried him in Woodlawn Cemetery, Newark, N. J.

## MUSIC MEN

### Of Cincinnati Endeavoring to Secure National Convention Next Year.

There is a movement in foot among the music dealers and the manufacturers of musical instruments in Cincinnati to form a trade association, the idea being to effect a social and business organization through which the members can be benefited mutually, with regard to prices and general matters appertaining to the trade.

The music men of Cincinnati are also endeavoring to raise a fund of \$2,000 to defray the expense of entertaining the National organization, should that body, which meets in this year's session at Baltimore this week, decide to go there next year. Nashville, Tenn., is also making an effort to secure the convention, which will bring together over 1,000 representative men of the trade throughout the country.

### "A CHINESE HONEYMOON."

Philadelphia, Pa., May 19.—The theatrical season is practically over, as many of our theaters are closed, and the rest of them are only waiting the arrival of a few warm days before closing up for the summer. The Broad Street Theater, Standard, National, People's, Star, Auditorium, Eleventh Street Opera House and Empire have all closed their doors, and will not reopen until fall, except at irregular periods for comic, concert exercises and other sure thing affairs. The Garrick will have Mary Manning and Viola Allen, each for one night's performance, and will then close for the balance of this season. Our managers are continuing to appreciate the fact that business is mighty hard to get at this season of the year, and as we have a number of first class parks who play the best of attractions, it is getting harder every year to get any business. It is the united opinion of most of the managers that there is more money in opening early than there is in trying to force people to come to theaters when the weather gets pleasant enough for outdoor amusements.

"A Chinese Honeymoon" came in unexpectedly to the Chestnut Street Opera House last week, on account of some difficulty about their time at the Casino in New York, and made a hit. It will be continued this week. Al. Aronson has made a hit with "My Autolinette," at the Walnut Street Theater, and it will be continued for some time. Business is very good. Fans have been placed in the theater, and will be put into practical use when the weather gets sultry. The return of "Miss Bob White" to the Chestnut Street Theater has been marked by good business, and the prospects for a summer run are good. "Lover's Lane" continues to turn people away every night at the Park Theater, and it will run well into July. Forepaugh's and the Grand Avenue Theater continue stock productions, with fair audiences at every performances, and the Lyceum, Kensington and Trocadero Theaters are all doing well with burlesque. The Grand Opera House continues with vaudville at low prices, and Keith's Theater is doing as big as ever with the best bills of vaudville ever seen in this city.

Buffalo Bill's Wild West opened for a week last Monday, and did an enormous business every night, though the nights were very chilly. The matinees were not so well attended, but the results for the week were very good. There were several accidents during the week, but they did not result in any serious injuries.

Conrad Jacobs, the popular advertising agent of the Walnut Street Theater and Garrick Theater, will take a short trip to Europe as soon as the former house closes. He will have charge of the billing for Woodside Park during the summer, but has his plans all laid so he can take a six weeks' vacation, the first he has had in seven years.

Panels Bros. are booking stock companies in seven parks for dramatic performances, in addition to the big vaudeville circuit they control.

George R. Lukens will have charge of the vaudville entertainments to be given at Chestnut Hill Park during the summer.

Henry Lindham, who has been running a dramatic school here for a couple of years, attempted to put on a series of legitimate plays at the Broad Street Theater last week. The engagement was brought to a quick ending on Wednesday by the alleged sickness of the star. Business was very bad.

S. Lubin had his operators present at every performance of the Buffalo Bill Wild West Show last week, and secured a number of extra good films of that performance.

Washington Park, on the Delaware, opened on Saturday, and drew large crowds. Shad fishing by mammoth seines is the principal attraction, but the band is playing, and all of the amusement features are open.

A large consignment of animals arrived at the Zoo last week. The Gardens have been placed in first-class condition, and the patronage is improving. Quite a little revenue is now derived from the sale of animals bred in the Garden.

Both Pawnee Bill and the Main Show will play in Camden, a town separated from this city by the Delaware. The Ringlings would like to play Philadelphia, but Bailey has the most available bill leased for the year. It belongs to the city.

Will Canning Sites, who has been with Al Martin's Western "Uncle Tom" Company, has returned to his home in Norristown for a rest. He will produce a new monologue in a few weeks, and play parks during the summer and in the fall will go to the coast, having contracted to play all the leading vaudville houses.

Thomas Hargreaves will open his circus in Chester on Thursday, and I will send full particulars next week.

"Loc" Long has not yet started work on the new burlesque house he has threatened to build in Camden, but he declares that it will be ready in time to open in September.

Keith's new theater on Chestnut street is progressing nicely, and they will be able to start the decorations in a few weeks.

Yiddish performances by New York companies are given every week at the different halls in the city, and business is good.

Contorno's Band will be the attraction at the opening of Woodside Park, and they will feature the "Battles of Our Nation."

M. W. Taylor, of Camden, will have a number of attractions on the road next season, but will continue to manage the theater in that city.

Sam Sanford, the oldest living minstrel, is arranging for a grand minstrel performance here in September.

This city is the proud possessor of the oldest theater in the United States, the Walnut Street Theater, erected in 1808, and the oldest bill poster in the United States, "Dad" Miller, who is now in the employ of The Bill Posting Sign Company. "Dad" has charge of the stock room, and he amuses all circus agents with stories of the older times.

### NEW YORK LETTER.

Raymond Hitchcock Preserves King Dodo Hearts Aflame Does Not Set Broadway Aflame.

New York, May 19.—"King Dodo," a musical comedy, which Henry W. Savage first presented in Chicago last summer, and which has since been cruising through the provinces, has finally come to anchor at Daly's. The Windy City hailed it with an ovation to "the Geisha," "San Toy," etc., as one of the finest things which ever occurred in the musical comedy line; but as for Gotham's gumption, "King Dodo" only appears to strike a metropolitan audience as an ordinary conventional affair, more or less depreciated by Savage's venerable aggregation of show ladies, who in an Amazon march carry one back to the matinée days of Edward E. Rice's earlier productions, when heavyweights in the front rows were the recognized thing for any well regulated corps de ballet. However, the crime of octogenarian can not be laid at the feet of the young women who figure in "The Bumble Bee" song, and certainly they are not so broad across the narrow as the Amazon ladies previously referred to. That "Bumble Bee" song and the "Diana" song, together with Raymond Hitchcock, who rules by divine right only as King Dodo, probably will secure for this production a New York run. Miss Cherliah Simpson figures in the cast as Ploia, the dashing hero, and figures on the stage as a striking example to young soubrettes of what may happen within a few years of being led to sign anti-fat testimonials. The one bright and saving grace of "King Dodo," apart from its two pretty songs mentioned, is the excellent work of Raymond Hitchcock, but "King Dodo" as a whole is provincial in many respects, and if it enjoys a long run at Daly's the management should doff its Knox's best silk to King Dodo I.

Garrick, "Hearts Adame," in four acts, and called "a play of social life," is now being presented for the first time upon any stage. It is an adaptation by Mrs. Genevieve G. Haines of a story by Miss Louise Winter. The play is fairly good in patches, but those parts being few and far between the reception is of a somewhat dubious character. The piece is certainly too long, and there are certain episodes in it intended to be serious, which, however, are received just the other way. For instance Paul Chateris, played by Robt. T. Haines, takes Mrs. Harmony (Dorothy Dorr) the other man's wife, in his arms, and after kissing her asks her for forgiveness. The audience was sufficiently interested in the kissing part, but the request for forgiveness set them all a laughing. Again, when Mrs. Harmony, in an hysterical mood or fit of anger, smashes a doll dressed to represent one of the other characters, and then calls in her maid to gather up the fragments, pretending it was an accident, she states in a light declamatory tone, "I broke her face," to which the audience responded by a heavy outburst of laughter. The play is disappointing in that it contains so much that is effective alongside so much superfluous that is the reverse. Whether Mr. Walter N. Lawrence, who presents the production, will have it made subject to revision, and in the bolling down make certain scenes stronger, is a matter of surmise. Certainly "Hearts Adame" contains the elements of an interesting play if drawn together more closely, with not so many dreary bad breaks between the effective parts.

"Forget Me Not" is the revival for this week at the Murray Hill Theater. "The Two Orphans" will be revived at the American. "All On Account of Ellza," with Louis Mann and Clara Lipman, is the play at the Halfway Square Opera House. Plays that continue are "Soldiers of Fortune" at the Savoy, "A Modern Magdalene" at the Bijou, "The Importance of Being in Earnest" at the Empire, "The Sleeping Beauty and the Beast" at the Broadway, Kellar at the Victoria, "Du Barry" at the Criterion, "The Hall of Fame" at the New York, "Foxy Grandpa" at the Fourteenth Street, "The Diplomat" at the Madison Square, Mrs. Fiske in Rosen's "Troll House" and "Tess" at the Manhattan, "Quo Vadis" at the Academy, "Holly Varden" at the Herald Square, "The Wild Rose" at the Kulekerbocker.

Duss, with his band of sixty players, is favorably anticipated to make his appearance in New York City at the Metropolitan Opera House, May 25. On Monday evening, May 26, he begins an engagement of sixteen weeks at the St. Nicholas, Columbus avenue and Sixty sixth street. No expense has been spared to make the St. Nicholas the most tempting resort for the habitues of Manhattan Isle during the coming summer. If Mr. Duss and his eminent soloists only play half as well as their manager, K. E. Johnston has played in creating publicity and curiosity for the event, then the St. Nicholas is safe to gain the stay-in-town crowds during the hot weather.

What might have been a serious accident occurred to Norris & Rowe's train last week. While coming down a steep mountain grade, en route from Missoula to Helena, Mont., an axle broke on one of the flat cars, and although it tore up the ties for nearly a quarter of a mile, the train kept on the track, and no serious damage was done. While the wrecking crew were putting in a new pair of wheels one of the railroad employees, who had crawled under the car, was instantly crushed to death by the giving away of a jack. Accident No. 2 occurred after the train had started for Helena. One of the new wheels became heated and broke in halves, but the train was again stopped in time to prevent a wreck. The show did not arrive at Helena until too late to give the night performance. They remained over and showed Wednesday; showed Bozeman one day behind the paper; canceled Livingston, and made Billings on time. This is the third accident the show has had this season. A locomotive which was hauling the show to Seattle, recently, broke down, giving the train a severe shock, but no damage was sustained except the loss of time, which was made up for by two performances on Sunday. A few days later, while rounding a curve going into Olympia, Wash., they had a head-on collision with a freight train. Fortunately, the train was moving very slowly and nobody was hurt. Two cars were badly damaged and several wagons smashed up.
