MOUNTFORD AT HEARING TELLS OF WHITE RATS' MONEY MADNESS

Throws Much Light on Nature of Investments

Tells Freely of Many Luring Transactions

Says Secret Strike Fund Was Maintained

New York, Jan. 11.—Henry Mountford, secretary-treasurer of the White Rats Amalgamated Union, who has been under arrest at this week's inquiry into the financial transactions of that organization, has revealed to the grand jury which the White Rats had made investments which resulted disastrously. Much of his testimony was of a sensational nature, especially his confession that a secret strike fund had been maintained. The latter confession, however, Mountford said had been told him by the money belonging to the Associated Amateurs had been taken to help the cause of the strikers. The referee then inquired if the union had any right to take this money. Mountford replied:

"Well, all the dues they collected were put in their own fund. That was a reserve fund that we use now anywhere else. I don't know how much there was, exactly, but was kept secret. It was the strike fund and we didn't want any of our enemies to know anything about that fund."

It had been intended yesterday to continue the interrogation of William W. Trause, one of the original organizers of the White Rats' Rascally Corporation, who was on the witness stand when court adjourned last week Friday. It was announced, however, that Mr. Trause had been suffering from nervous prostration since the last hearing, so that the court was obliged to remove his name and call Mountford to the stand.

Before the hearing and Attorney John T. Rappley began by questioning Mountford regarding the various corporations in which the Amateurs Union was interested.

Mountford said that The Associated Amateurs had been the mother company and all the subsidiary companies were made. Among them were the Elks Club Amusement Company, the Lawrence Amusement Company, the International Booking Agency of New York, the Independent Booking Agency of Chicago, and the Pennsylvania Amusement Co. GEORGIA STATE FAIR GROUNDS AT MACON HARD HIT BY TORNADO

Loss Estimated at \$40,000 in Various Buildings

San Bros' Circus, Wintering There, Loose Animals

Grand Stand and Other Structures Will Be Rebuilt

Macon, Ga., Jan. 11.—The Georgia State Fair Association and the San Bros' Circus suffered a heavy loss Friday afternoon when a terrific tornado struck this section of the country. The damage to the State Fair grounds is estimated at over \$40,000, while the San Bros' loss runs into several thousand dollars.

The new track, grand stand, utility sheds and the hotel building had been wrecked, while the main entrance building and the beach grand stand, where the New York Tenthredine show just, was badly damaged. Many beautiful pigs and oak trees in the grounds were also blown down.

All of the animals of the San Bros' Circus were quartered in wood-shed buildings, which was one of the best built.

EARLY CLOSING ORDER VIEWED AS REAL BLOW BY THEATER MEN

Bay State Order Threatened Now in New York

Will Not Show Proceeds 25 Per Cent, It Is Said

New Yorkers Will Not Patronize T O'Clock Shows

New York, Jan. 11.—At this writing there is every indication that if a matter will come a few days before New York will be subjected to an early closing order which would also amount to a ban on all shows already going on in Massachusetts. The theater men will be obliged to comply with an order compelling them to close at 10 o'clock less five minutes with four shows, and many of them predict that such an order in New York would cut theater receipts twenty-five per cent.

New York, January theater men, as well as early theater towns, and no prediction in the world can make it sure. The industry has all been made to make the opening hour at theaters late instead of earlier. Once 11:15 was the accepted time for all show openings, but the increased hour of opening is now 11:15 with many of them. This tendency to late theater going is so pronounced that efforts made to bring it back to an earlier hour are being made. The organized New York theater men to longer over his dinner. Under a 10 o'clock closing order for instance it will become necessary to begin a show promptly 7:15 at the latest. Under such a state of affairs the theater men who want to take in a show before 10 o'clock have but four hours to his dinner, eat his dinner short and leave home in the theater. Those who try to get back earlier on that matter are in a great deal of trouble. The fact is that New York will come to look upon threatening to enforce an advance hour instead of opening.

Now the New York theater men view the situation as indicated by the following interview with Owen Lee and J. J. Shubert, when they learned of the order issued by the Post Administration in Boston and of discussion which had taken place at the advisability of taking similar measures in New York. The Shuberts are:

"The ten o'clock closing order in Boston will probably work on harmful, as the Boston theater men have done earlier there than in New York.
