### Saving Money and Wasting Men

If we had to confine ourselves to a ten-word telegram in recording the economic history of our country during the late lamented year of Our Lord 1930, we should do the summing up in this way:

**"The year was spent in saving money and wasting men."**

Could most of the waste have been prevented? It certainly could. As a matter of fact, most of the waste of machines, materials, money and men would have been avoided if commerce and finance had been based on one of the principles laid down by the American Federation of Labor.

For generations, Labor leaders and social workers demanded a "living wage." Economists, statisticians and arbitrators were all the time tediously figuring in order to determine how much it costs to maintain a family "in health, decency and security." All they ever arrived at were opinions. Necessarily so, because there was and still is no quantitative definition of the terms "health, decency and security." These opinions, however, were brought forward as sufficient grounds for quantitative wage demand.

Such demands have no economic basis. For the purpose of fixing wages it does not matter how much income is necessary in order to maintain a given standard of living. It does not matter what anybody thinks about wages. The wages which a given employer or a given industry is able to pay at any given time and place is a question of fact. In the long run real wages—standards of living—are determined by production, not by opinions.

About five years ago the American Federation of Labor at the convention in Atlantic City took that fact fully in account. It declared that increases in the real wages of Labor should keep pace with the increased productivity of Labor. That, in our judgment, was the most important decision ever made by organized labor.

In making that decision, Labor leaders took a position which employers will have to take eventually; for capital, as well as labor, can continue to prosper only if real wages—that is to say, standards of living—increase at the same rate as the output of labor. In other words, employers of labor can prosper only if they can find a market for the products of labor; but for a market, employers must look chiefly to the laborers themselves.

All that is now commonplace. Nearly everybody accepts it. And it may well turn out that the general acceptance of that truth is the greatest gain that the economic world has made in this generation.

#### "Plenty of Cheap Labor"

What, then, shall we say of a recent Chamber of Commerce advertisement?

"Establish your business in this progressive city," reads the invitation. "We offer free factory sites and plenty of cheap labor."

That takes us back to the dismal years, before the American Revolution, when England had "plenty of cheap labor." For half a century wages did not rise above a week. The workers were kept in poverty "for their own good" by deliberate intent of the upper classes.

Thomas Mun voiced the common belief of the time. "Plenty and power," he said, "to make a nation vicious and improvident; so penury and want do make a people wise and industrious."

"Hard times are a benefit," declared Sir William Temple, "because they encourage industry in the poor."

"All manufacturers agree," asserted the Rev. Joseph Townsend, "that the poor are seldom diligent, except when labor is

cheap and corn is dear." And Josiah Tucker spoke for all the lords and landlords when he said: "It is greatly for the public good if the price of labor is continually beat down."

So they were kept poor. And, therefore, hopeless.

This lead naturally to widespread drunkenness, a breakdown of sex morals and enormous increases in sloth, obscenity, arson, robbery and murder. It was in this "pigsty" era that the English working classes reached the lowest depths of degeneracy.

But that is nothing to brag about!

Nearly everybody in the United States now knows that a city should be ashamed to advertise "plenty of cheap labor." Except, indeed, as a means of abolishing cheap labor by increasing the demand for labor!

Some day before long we expect to find a Chamber of Commerce so enlightened that it will proclaim: "This city pledges itself to use every effort to increase production and equal effort to increase wages at the same rate."

#### The Much-Maligned Malthus

A century ago the world feared that population would grow faster than food. Widespread poverty, therefore, seemed inevitable. This was the best known part of the famous Malthusian theory. Malthus contended that a rise in wages could not take place unless the tendency to increase among the laboring classes was checked.

This theory was generally accepted. Accordingly the belief prevailed that "the great masses of laborers never could rise far above the lowest level of subsistence." Shrouded in such black robes, economics came to be called the "dismal science."

And now what has become of the Malthusian theory? Today the world fears not surplus population but surplus food. The bogey of the farmer is overproduction. Since the days of Malthus population has greatly increased. Still there are not enough mouths to feed!

Everybody has heard of that part of the Malthusian theory on which Malthus was 100 per cent wrong. Few people are aware that Malthus taught anything else. Yet, Malthus was 100 per cent right on his "Theory of Consumption." This theory, however, was almost universally scouted or ignored:

Fate has a way of playing tricks like this on prophets.

Malthus held that higher standards of living depend on increased production and that increased production can not be sustained without increased consumption. He exposed the fallacy in Adam Smith's praise of parsimony. National saving, said Malthus, has its limits. It is folly for a nation to save more in productive equipment than the markets require. Consumer demand fixes the limits of sensible saving.

"To create this demand," declared Malthus, "there must be an adequate consumption, either among the producers themselves, or other classes of consumers."

Why did the ruling classes accept the false Malthusian theory and ignore the true one? Because, in spite of some appearances to the contrary, the ruling classes were composed of human beings and it is human nature to accept only

those views which appear to justify prejudices.

The ruling classes made the mistake of thinking that they could keep themselves rich only by keeping the working classes poor. So the ruling classes were quick to believe any doctrine which seemed to show that the poor never could be anything but poor.

The true Malthusian theory, on the other hand, held that prosperity depended on increased consumption by the working classes. That idea ran counter to ruling class prejudices. It was ignored. Not for a hundred years did it get a fair hearing. It is only within the past decade, as a matter of fact, that the views of the much-maligned Malthus have come to play a leading part in actual business practice.

#### The Present Business Depression

It is too bad that these views did not play a dominant part during the period from 1925 to 1929, the years of our greatest production. For if business, politics and finance had been ruled by such views, the present major business depression might have been prevented.

The cause of this depression, we are told on every hand, is "general overproduction." Does it not seem incredible? Our chief economic aim is increased production. Yet the moment we begin to succeed, we fear that we are about to fail. If we do what we are trying to do so well that we are producing steel at 85 per cent of capacity, we regard that as a sign of impending trouble. In Wall Street it is a bear argument. Indeed, one statistician says that the record of the rise and fall in the number of blast furnaces in operation shows that a rise above a certain per cent invariably forecasts a recession in business.

What does this mean? Does it mean that the country already has all the bridges and subways and machines that it can use? Does it mean that all the houses are adequately heated and the farmers supplied with all the plumbing and all the tractors that they can use to advantage? Far from it. It means only that the country has not yet found any way of distributing to those who would like greater wealth, all the additional wealth which they are able and willing to produce.

Indeed, throughout the world the conviction prevails of a limited market, a market which can not possibly expand rapidly enough to absorb all the enjoyable things the world can produce, a market so limited that increased production breeds increased unemployment.

This is the only sense in which general overproduction is possible. Consumers as a whole, as a result of their joint productive efforts, never produce more goods in general than they would like to consume. All that they ever succeed in doing is to produce more goods than those who want the goods have the money to pay for.

General overproduction is nothing but general underconsumption. The only cure for that is a general increase of consumer income.

#### An Orgy of Saving

According to one patient compiler, the present business depression has been ascribed to 118 different causes. We have examined the list carefully. We find that most of the powerful factors in this long list can all be summed up in one factor: Total payrolls of labor did not increase

as rapidly as the productivity of labor. That fact is shown in the monumental and scientific study of Paul H. Douglas, published this year under the title of "Real Wages."

Even before the stock market crash the people as a whole were saving too much money and paying too little in wages. Since the crash, the country as a whole has made matters worse by saving still more money.

There has been an orgy of saving.

The Federal Government saved so much money that in the past year of depression it actually paid off 745 millions of debts. That is a larger amount by 72 millions than was paid off in the previous year of prosperity. During this period of unemployment, the banks increased their hoards of idle gold by over 300 millions. Many corporations, too, have held on to huge surplus funds which might have been put to work. When business was at the height of prosperity, corporations were lending not far from four billion dollars in the call money market. The least we can say is that all that money was in circulation. When the crash came, the corporations took the money out of the call market, but they did not distribute much of it to stockholders. They spent some of it on campaigns to induce wage-earners not to save so much; but most of it they saved. At the same time more money has been saved in bank deposits than the banks have known how to use. The lowest interest rates in all our history tell the story. The recent Treasury loan was floated at less than 2 per cent. Yes, we have saved enough money to warm the heart of a miser.

But while we have been saving money we have been wasting men.

Nobody knows how many millions of men we have wasted through our failure to give them any work to do. But it is clear from the Federal census, when properly interpreted, that every day of the current year at least four million willing workers have been out of work. At least three million of them would have been at work if enough money had been spent to provide a demand for their products. And enough money would have been spent if total payrolls had increased fast enough.

That waste of men is a national loss which never can be made up. It is water over the dam. No matter how much these workers produce in the future, they will never produce anything in the hours that are gone. They might have created wealth to the value of at least five billion dollars. Actually, they created nothing.

Is it possible to prevent such a waste? It certainly is. If war were declared today, we should immediately mobilize our national resources—our materials, machines, money and men. We are prepared to do exactly that. For that purpose we keep constantly at work a national war-planning board.

If war were declared today we should put to use our surplus materials.

We should put our idle machines in motion.

We should put our hoards of money in circulation.

We should put our jobless men to work.

In short, we should all but solve the problem of unemployment overnight.

As a result we should increase our output at least 40 per cent above the current volume. We should produce enough wealth to maintain the highest standard of living ever enjoyed by any people in the history of the world. Everybody knows that our national resources at this very moment are sufficient to achieve all that.

Happily we shall not declare war today against any nation. But we can achieve the same productive triumphs by declaring war against the present business depression. It is an enemy worthy of our steel—and of our gold. The sinews of war are ready. Everybody is at our command—everything that we would mobilize, if necessary, against a foreign foe: Materials, machines, money, men.

Everything is ready except a "National Peace-Time Planning Board," with knowledge and power enough to influence expenditures, both public and private, for the common good. With such a board permanently on the job expenditures would be increased promptly with the first certain signs of deflation and decreased promptly with the first certain signs of inflation. That would be enough to prevent another national tragedy like the one from which we are just beginning to recover.

We need never suffer another twelve months saving money and wasting men.

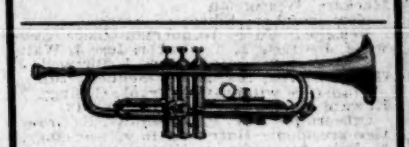

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### "The Old Order Changeth"

A NOTABLE commission, appointed by the National Civic Federation, of which Matthew Woll is acting president, of which Elihu Root is honorary president and of which Secretary of Labor Doak is honorary vice-president, has just produced a notable report, based on a year's hard study.

Labor's anti-injunction position is sustained by the 100 members of this commission and its hatred to the yellow dog contract is given their approval.

A fitting third recommendation in a magnificent trinity is one for amendment of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, a fossilized piece of legislation that belongs to the "horseless carriage" decade, deceased some twenty years ago, if it ever belonged anywhere.

When the Sherman law was enacted there was a great clamor against trusts which were said to destroy competition and so bring the people to the knee. To such purpose and by such distance has opinion changed that this notable commission, having among its members leading lawyers, outstanding trade unionists and big business men, probably speaks for a majority of thinking Americans when it says, in a bill prepared for introduction in Congress:

"The public welfare is best promoted not only by a proper safeguarding of consumers against excessive sales-prices as aforesaid; but also by a proper safeguarding of American industries and the producers, workers and all other persons engaged in such industries, from the effects produced by excessive or ruinous competition."

The bill strikes out for "preservation" and "welfare" of industries and "a proper livelihood" for the workers therein.

"The old order changeth" because of man's ingenuity and the rules must be changed to conform. We seem to be headed for changes all too long delayed. Labor's voice long cried in a wilderness of silence. But it cried to a purpose, as this commission's notable report shows. How long will it take legislators to catch up with the facts of industry and with the conclusions of those who know most about industry?

### Nation's Idle Army Grows

UNEMPLOYMENT has increased since December and 5,700,000 wage-earners were out of work the first part of January," says Wm. Green, president of the A. F. of L.

This is a preliminary estimate and compares with 5,500,000 unemployed in December. Farm labor and office workers are not included. The figures, he said, pointed to a decline of part-time employment and an increase in idleness.

"The increased number of out-of-works is partly explained by the fact that many firms, who were keeping their forces on part time, laid men off altogether. A number of unions report this fact, especially in the garment, metal and other manufacturing industries. In building, many wage-earners who had temporary or part-time work in December had no work the first part of January.

"In the country at large there was less part-time employment and more were entirely without work. In December 20 per cent of the union membership were entirely without work; in the first half of January, 18 per cent.

"This decrease in part-time work and increase of unemployment sounds a warning to the American business world. Thousands of firms have been keeping their men at work, at least part time if they could not give full employment. This has been one of the most important

measures in meeting the national unemployment emergency.

"Now is no time to abandon this barrier against depression forces. Already there are 2,300,000 more out of work than there was at this time last year. Every employer who keeps his men at work, at least part time if he cannot give full employment, is doing a national service by helping to pull the country out of depression. Every layoff helps to drag business backward.

"Our figures show that the increase in unemployment from December to January of this year was larger than usual. In November and December the number laid off was larger than usual.

"Widespread relief has undoubtedly prevented the situation from becoming far more serious, but relief cannot possibly meet the need. There is much illness, eviction from homes, undernourishment and even starvation which never comes to public notice. This crisis falls on every citizen to do his part for the unemployed."

### Can Henry Be Embarrassed?

MR. HENRY FORD is not helping the situation in Detroit by his publicity stunts through interviews or ghost-written articles in which he is saying that in 20 years wages will be \$35 a day.

Recently Mr. Ford gave his employes a long "vacation" without pay. It was a shut-down that stripped workers of their savings, plunged many of them into debt, some of them hopelessly. A correspondent tells us he has worked in Mr. Ford's factory fifteen years and that his wages are now \$24 a week and his family had to live during the period of the closed factory and as a consequence he is several hundred dollars in debt.

It would be difficult for this man to cash in some Ford predictions at his grocery store or to pay a doctor's bill with them. One wonders why some of these intelligent interviewers do not have on tap some concrete cases of this sort and put a real question to that glibulous gentleman in the course of an interview.

That is probably unlikely to happen. Those interviews are largely framed and faked up and nothing so untoward as an embarrassing question is likely to confront a billionaire manufacturer whose products are so extensively advertised in all these publications.

## Labor Queries - - -

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers, etc., etc.

Q.—Who said: "To the worker organization means bargaining power, security, self-respect. So long as he continues unorganized, he must accept terms of employment just as they are tendered"?

A.—Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York, during the debate in the Senate on the nomination of Judge Parker.

Q.—Is William N. Doak the first Secretary of Labor to have been born in the United States?

A.—Yes. The other two secretaries were born abroad, William B. Wilson in Scotland and James J. Davis in Wales.

Q.—Who is M. H. Hedges?

A.—Director of Research, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

Q.—Who said: "The only entirely reliable 'Friend of Labor' is Labor itself"?

A.—Walter MacArthur in "Trade Union Epigrams," published by the American Federation of Labor.

Q.—In what European country is the five-day week reported making considerable progress?

A.—Czechoslovakia, where 60 per cent of the workers in the shoemaking industry will soon have the shorter week. The five-day week has also been introduced in a chocolate factory and it is reported that the question of introducing it into the government tobacco factories is under consideration.

Q.—What was the first labor paper in the United States?

A.—The Workingmen's Gazette, published by Evans brothers, English labor reformers, in New York in 1825, is said to have been the earliest labor paper.

Q.—Where has a law recently been passed forbidding the eviction of unemployed persons from their homes?

A.—In South Australia, a state of Australia, where a new law prevents landlords from evicting or taking legal proceedings against unemployed tenants. The tenant has only to satisfy a magistrate that, by reason of his unemployment, he is unable to pay his rent and that he is making every reasonable endeavor to obtain work.

## Out Beyond the Surf--

Where thought, unhampered by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

Doctors of all kinds are poking around in the innards of the social system and producing various prescriptions, each doctor holding out for the value of his own cure.

Some of the doctors are pure metaphysicians, defuding themselves and a part of the public. Some have their hands on solid things. Some fish in the waters midway.

Some of the prescriptions are sensible; some are tripe.

Louis Stark, one of the ablest reporters in America and an authoritative writer on labor questions, discovers, in the course of a lengthy article, that some are looking forward to an industrial parliament. He draws heavily upon speeches made recently in Philadelphia at one of those interminable meetings of the American Academy for Political and Social Science.

Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, known as the Rockefeller pastor, makes page one by declaring that capitalism is to blame for our woes and may be replaced by communism if it doesn't mend. We give Fosdick the raspberry and turn again to that report by Stark.

If the present trend of evolution in industrial affairs continues we shall have something like a parliament of industry. The idea was not discovered in Philadelphia. The idea have been groaning for lo, these many years and it was written into words and adopted as the official declaration of the American Federation of Labor in convention in Portland, Ore., nearly a decade ago. So nearly are the good doctors up to date!

Many, many years hence sociologists will turn back to the pages wherein is written the record of that convention and they will wonder that it took so long for so many to discover the profound truth and the sagacious foresight therein set forth.

The American Federation of Labor has reaffirmed that declaration and in all its long life it has never uttered an official word in conflict with the great goal therein set down. It is perhaps the nearest thing to a declaration of ultimate aims ever written by American labor which, in the main, believes in shaping each day's battle lines to meet each day's battle, advancing step by step.

All of the talk of the day about stabilization of industry, about stopping future unemployment, about the whole question of maladjustment, leads to labor's doctrine of readjustment.

Other things can be tried and for all anyone can say they may be tried. The human race has not always gone forward in a straight line.

But we shall move toward an order in which industry governs itself, or else we shall probably take that other road muddy with the thought of those who are all wet that leads to a dominant political machinery infested with bureaus and bureaucrats, the sure meaning of which is loss of freedom for the masses and a card in a big index file for every man, woman and child.

Nobody can make a chart of what manner of social order we shall have ten or twenty years hence. Anybody can try.

But it is possible to determine upon a desired direction. Having done that it is possible to grapple with events as they come in an effort to make progress in that desired direction.

This nation is democratic. Its people want to continue the practice of democracy. Democracy today does not work sufficiently in any industry and it does not work at all in most industries. In Portland, labor said "this must be otherwise before life becomes fullest and most fruitful." It saw the issue clearly and it marked the direction unerringly.—C. M. W.

### The Wickersham Report

PERHAPS because something totally different was expected, there was much initial disappointment with the Wickersham Commission's report.

But careful analysis shows much gain in that report. When only two out of eleven stand unreservedly for continuance of the present fiasco some substantial gain has been made.

The bulk of sentiment for modification has grown tremendously and it will be encouraged to take a more aggressive position on the strength of this report. That the report shows some confusion of thought is but the reflection of the play of politics. It is fair to assume that had there been no politics, therefore, the report would have been even stronger.

Gain has been recorded. Gangland will be bitterly disappointed. Decency in government, in civic life and in home life has gained enormously by this report.



## OVER FEDERATION FIELD

(By CHAUNCEY A. WEAVER)

A distressing news item showing that the depression is still on is the dispatch that Mr. Hammerstein has dropped one and one-half million dollars in ill-starred theatrical ventures in recent months and is going to spend the next two years in securing a "much-needed rest." Perhaps if he would try using a receptacle of pure "canned music" for a pillow it might be conducive to coveted repose.

One of the best known and best liked musicians of Local No. 40, Baltimore, recently passed away in the person of Brother Fred W. Heller, one time Recording Secretary. Many delegates to the Baltimore convention in 1927 will recall him. Brother Heller was born in Milwaukee, August 10, and was sixty-three years old when he passed away. At the age of eight his father presented him with a long model cornet. Thus began an active musical career which lasted more than fifty years. At the age of eleven he was a member of the famous Milwaukee Juvenile Band, which had 72 members. He rendered high-class service in Madison and St. Paul and finally landed in Baltimore, where he played cornet and violin at various times for many years. He was also a member of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Brother Heller was one of the men who have helped to give character and strength to the American Federation of Musicians, both locally and nationally. He will be sincerely missed by a wide circle of friends.

We are enjoying the Roxy Theatre concerts coming via radio every Sunday morning—designed for the specific purpose of helping the unemployment situation. Our tip concerning what was going on came in a letter from President Edward Canavan, Local 802, which reads:

About three weeks ago I took the matter up with Roxy, and his idea was to take over his theatre every Sunday morning and give a concert with an orchestra of about two hundred men. He was also willing to go to the limit of \$1,500, if the Local would do the same, and put thirty extra men to work steadily at the regular union rate, for the minimum of \$90 per man. On January 4 we put the extra men to work in the Roxy Theatre, under the weekly scale, and on Sunday, January 11, the first Sunday concert took place. The concerts will be broadcast from coast to coast. These concerts strike Des Moines, Central Standard Time, between 10 and 11 o'clock. Those in other time periods can figure accordingly where the arrangement has not yet been noted.

Roxy is thus making a worth-while contribution toward the relieving of an acute industrial situation. May his fine example result in much widespread emulation.

We suggest that Federation members who expect to attend the Chattanooga Convention next June take time to brush up their Civil War history a bit. They will find themselves in the very heart of that historic war area. From the point of Lookout Mountain, where was fought "The Battle Above The Clouds," there will also be visible the battle grounds of Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, Stone River—and with a good field-glass a far wider range will be possible. Those using a day-light train over the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Paul Railroad will see east of Nashville one of the largest cemeteries created by the Civil War—acre upon acre of white marble slabs marking the final resting place of men who fought and fell in defense of the cause they thought was right. Only a handful of those involved in that sanguinary conflict remain to tell the story; and the

healing touch of time has done marvelous things in cementing the bonds of unity between North and South. A most interesting and picturesque spot has been chosen for the Thirty-sixth Annual Convention.

We have had many calls for copies of the Iowa band law. It has been used as a basis for similar legislation in other States. As originally enacted it does not apply to cities of over forty thousand population. Sioux City musicians—Local No. 254—are, through their representatives in the General Assembly, seeking the following modification or amendment:

That cities having a population of over 40,000, when authorized as hereinafter provided, levy, each year, a tax not to exceed one-half mill, for the purpose of a fund for the maintenance or employment of a band; and, be it further enacted, that the council of said city or town, in its discretion, may appropriate not to exceed one-third of said fund for the support and maintenance of one other recognized musical organization.

We have observed that business depression never becomes so pronounced in San Francisco but what the Musical Times and News, official organ of Local No. 6, can come to the front with a red-letter Annual Edition. The January issue is a fifty-page affair containing a fine assortment of reading matter and a liberal display of advertising. We are mighty glad to see it.

Eight New York magistrates have resigned "on account of their health." Doubtless the Greater New York health authorities will do everything possible to encourage that kind of an epidemic.

The Springfield, Mass., Republican reports the death of Thomas Vowler Short, composer of band music, soloist, teacher and conductor. He was prominently identified with New England music affairs for many years, but passed away at St. Petersburg, Fla., where he had sojourned recently. He was a native of Victoria, Australia. Before going to New England he was a leader in New York band circles and appeared with Levy, Liberati, Innes, Baldwin, Reeves, Victor Herbert and leaders of that class. The older generation of band musicians will readily recall the frequency with which his name appeared on band musical compositions. One number particularly recalled will be the brilliant polka duet for two cornets—"Short and Sweet." When Mr. Short first presented this number at Daly's Theatre Band in New York the other player was a fellow named Sweet.

Local No. 8 is mourning the death of Secretary Max Strnad of the Milwaukee Musicians' Association. He passed away as the result of a sudden heart attack on December 29. Brother Strnad was a delegate to the Boston Convention last June and looked the picture of health. He was an ardent union advocate and held the office of secretary for sixteen years. He was a native of Wisconsin, having been born near Prairie du Chien.

Announcement is made of the death of C. G. Conn, known throughout the musical world as a manufacturer of band instruments. He died at Los Angeles, where he had resided since 1916. He was a native of Ontario County, N. Y., and moved to Elkhart, Indiana, when seven years old. He was a veteran of the Civil War. He served as mayor, state legislator and member of Congress where, after one term, he declined renomination. He was a great advertiser and the name of C. G. Conn will not be soon forgotten by musicians.

Senator La Follette informs us that "the Senate is the bulwark of the nation." If he had said "bull" works we would have been disposed to agree with him.

Comes now a breezy bulletin from Lincoln, Neb., calling attention to the fact that Local No. 463, A. F. of M., will officiate as host to the 1931 Mid-West Con-

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ference which convenes in that city April 12 and 13. As a generator of Federation enthusiasm these annual gatherings have proven highly advantageous to the Locals of the States embraced within this particular jurisdiction—Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska and Iowa. This quintet of prairie commonwealths have their own peculiar problems—somewhat distinguished from those States dominated by huge urban centers. It will pay every Local in the States named to be represented, and if the boys—or girls—from some of the other States other than those named drop in we can assure them a pleasant and profitable time. Lincoln is one of the most interesting cities in the Middle West and the Local musicians are expert in making visitors feel at home.

The Wickersham Report required an expenditure of nineteen months' time on the part of a dozen men and a monetary cost of \$500,000. As a cross-word puzzle it is considered one of the biggest successes of the year.

## As the Worker Sees His World

Summary and Digest of Important Events Here and Abroad.

Increasing unemployment and business depression has caused President Ayora of Ecuador to call a conference of bankers and farmers to discuss measures of relief.

Dispatches from Manila report that efforts are being made to turn a strike of dock and sugar workers into a general strike involving all major industries in the Philippine Islands.

Successful in their strike against a wage reduction, 1,800 employees of the Duplan Silk Company, Hazelton, Pa., who walked out November 17, have returned to work.

"Government by utility magnates must not be substituted for government by the people," Governor Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania said in his inaugural address.

An increase of approximately 6.3 per cent in employment since the first of the year was shown January 27 in reports from ten Buffalo, N. Y., steel mills, machinery and automotive plants.

Dr. Sherwood Eddy, long prominent in the Young Men's Christian Association, surprised conservative leaders of the organization by announcing recently that he is now a full-fledged Socialist and proposes to work with the Socialist party "for economic justice."

The Carpenters' District Council of Chicago, with 27,000 members, has made an agreement with the Builders' Association providing for the five-day week and has served notice on independent contractors that five days will be the work week hereafter.

The sixth annual conference on the Cause and Cure of War ended its session at Washington with the re-election of Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt as chairman, and an appeal for Congress to meet in extra session for consideration of the World Court protocol.

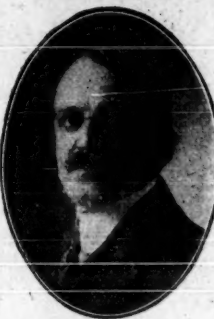

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Mayor Hefferman thinks we are all committed to the "dominant ideal of getting money" and that "Caponeism is the beautiful flower of our national philosophy."

The mayor is right when he concludes that certain laws cannot be enforced, but he is wrong about the reason.

The American people have not gone mad over money-getting. The great masses of the people have never had enough money to breed among them the idea that larger amounts of money can be got either easily or quickly. Only a few have money and they are not numerous enough to create a national psychology.

Caponeism is not the flower of a national philosophy, nor is it in any sense the result of any national feeling or national will.

The people today violate laws because they have been sleepy enough to allow minorities to write laws with which the majority never agreed.

Wherever minorities press down upon majorities and by power of tricks deny them what they believe to be basic rights, then there will be law violation.

Capone "gets by," not because he is admired, but because of a legislative repression for which he supplies a sort of antidote.

The industrial life of the time contributes its share of resentment. Here again there is despotism—as in Danville—and resentment is the result. There is an effort to break through the bonds. In reality the effort that Mayor Hefferman finds disgusting is in large part the expression of a craving for normal living, for freedom from bondage, for a chance to hold up the head and make decisions.

That the reaction against bondage goes "too far" may be admitted. The repression is abnormal; the reaction is abnormal. The autocratic employer mows down and destroys a beautiful human heritage. Somewhere there is going to be a penalty to pay for that destruction. Philosophers and mayors do not always get things straight. Quite often they fail to see the roots of things because they are looking in the clouds.

People are just as "good" today as ever, but every age has had its own definition of what is "good" in people.

And in any age various layers of people have various ideas about what is meant by "good."

Mr. J. P. Morgan thinks one thing is good. Mr. Average Workers thinks that very same thing is absolutely bad. The mill owner thinks one thing is good, while the mill worker finds that thing very bad.

Our way of living and of making things has raced away ahead of our ability to make rules for its operation. So we have these terrible bulges in the legal structure and in relations between employers and employes—these mighty sore spots.

It is natural that resentments should operate. Mayor Hefferman has found out merely that people won't be good, as he sees being good, just because of laws. There must be a reason back of the laws and the laws must relate to the life and the ways of today, not of yesterday.
