DETROIT—1936 Convention City

ON a broad, level expanse, by the bank of a deep blue river, sits Detroit, the world's most modern metropolis.

Her site and traditions are a heritage from the hardy explorers of the Seventeenth Century; her greatness of today is a tribute to the industrial era of the Twentieth.

There is an art center of unusual completeness, and one of the best symphony orchestras in the land. Detroit's huge industrial plants are open for the inspection of those who like to see how unusual products are manufactured. Detroit was founded in July, 1701, and has since been under the flags of three nations—French, British and American. NOTICE

To All Locals and Members:

As the 1935 Convention decided to license bookers, agents and representatives, members of the Federation cannot, from January 1st, 1936, on, unless otherwise advised by the President's Office of the Federation, play traveling or out-of-town engagements negotiated for them by a booker, agent or representative who does not hold a license from the American Federation of Musicians, or does not represent a booker, agent or representative who is licensed by the American Federation of Musicians.

Local Unions are hereby requested and instructed to be helpful in the enforcement of this rule to the extent of ascertaining from their own bands and orchestras playing out-of-town engagements of any kind, or from traveling bands or orchestras appearing in their jurisdiction, as to what particular booker or agent negotiated or arranged for their engagement. If the booker does not hold a license from the Federation, then Locals are to call the attention of the bands or orchestras involved to the fact, and advise them that they will immediately report the case to the President's office of the American Federation of Musicians, giving the full name of the orchestra, as well as the booker, agent or representative who negotiated the engagement.

Compliance with these instructions by all Locals will give to the Federation the opportunity to, within a short time, make members of the Federation playing the engagements in question, as well as bookers, agents and their representatives, realize that the Federation will only permit its members to fill such engagements as are negotiated by licensed bookers, agents or representatives and that members can accept out-of-town or traveling engagements from none other.

The question has been asked many times as to whether bookers, agents or representatives negotiating engagements for bands and orchestras to be played by them in their home town will have to be licensed by the Federation. The answer to this is that for the present the Federation will concern itself with the enforcement of the rule as above explained, but the ultimate purpose of the Federation will remain that eventually all bookers, including those who merely negotiate for local engagements, are to be licensed.

The full co-operation of every Local of the Federation is positively necessary for the purpose of the enforcement of the licensing policy by the Federation and it is not only in the interest of the Federation as a whole, but in the interests of every Local as well that such co-operation

be given to the Federation to the fullest extent.

In due time a list of licensed bookers will be forwarded to every Local Union and said list will be added to as the occasion or the development of this policy may require. The list will appear each month in the INTERNATIONAL MUSICIAN with additions and with proper notice if a license is cancelled, so that members may keep themselves at all times fully informed. For this purpose it is necessary that the officers of Locals carefully peruse each month the list of licensed bookers.

It is to be understood that this policy is inaugurated by the specific instructions of the Convention of the Federation, at which Convention many hundreds of Locals were represented. The carrying out of this policy is meeting the wishes of the Locals and, therefore, it is consistent to expect the continued assistance of the Locals to make same effective.

There is no charge to bookers, agents or representatives for a Federation license. However, application must be made in writing by such bookers, agents and representatives to the President's Office of the American Federation of Musicians.

The license expires on December 31st, 1936, unless cancelled by the American Federation of Musicians before that date. Application for a new license can be made at any time after December 1st, 1936.

J., June 14, 1935, all the locals and members constituting the American Federation of Musicians are hereby notified that the Forty-first Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians will be called to order at the Hotel Statler, Detroit, Mich., on Monday, June 8, 1936, at 2 P. M. Delegates to be chosen in accordance with the provisions contained in Articles V and VI of the Constitution, which are as follows:

ARTICLE V—Representation and Delegates

All Locals of this Federation of one hundred members or less shall be entitled to one delegate. All Locals shall be entitled to one delegate for each one hundred members or a majority fraction thereof, not exceeding three delegates for any one Local, but each Local shall be entitled to one vote for each one hundred or majority fraction thereof, but no Local shall cast more than ten votes, and the number each Local is entitled to shall be computed from the last report made on January 1st before the convention by the Local, according to the books of the Treasurer. On questions affecting a change in the laws, each Local may, upon roll call, cast as many votes as it has members, as per book of the Treasurer, A. F. of M. All laws so passed shall be referred to a convention committee consisting of the Executive Board, A. F. of M., and chairmen of all committees, who may sanction or veto same, their action to be final. Roll call shall be demandable and had under this Article on demand of ten delegates or five Locals.

ARTICLE VI—Delegates—How Elected.

Section 1. Delegates to the convention shall be elected by the Locals, either at annual, regular or special meetings, or at regular or special elections. If elected at annual meetings or regular elections, the usual notice to members, in vogue for such meetings or elections, shall be sufficient.

If elected at regular or special meetings or special elections (which cannot be done earlier than 100 days preceding the convention), every member of the Local must be duly notified of such meeting or election.

Elections held in violation of this law are null and void.

Sec. 2. No member shall be permitted to represent more than one Local, nor shall any member be permitted to act as delegate for a Local unless he is a full member in good standing in said Local.

Sec. 3. In the event of protests being filed against the seating of delegates, such protests must be accompanied by a certified copy of the minutes of the meeting at which the election of delegates took place or the official returns of the election at which the delegates were elected (or certified copy thereof), together with the ballots cast if necessary to prove the facts, under seal, which shall be furnished by the Local Secretary. All other documentary evidence must be duly sworn to before a notary public. The contestant must notify the accredited delegate at least forty-eight hours before the opening of the convention of his intention to contest, and either party may submit his evidence in person or by proxy.

Sec. 4. Alternates may be elected for those delegates who may be unable to attend the sessions. It shall be the duty of Local Secretaries to notify the Secretary of the Federation of the delegates and their alternates immediately after such election.

Sec. 5. The title of Honorary Delegate may be conferred by the majority vote of the delegates in Convention assembled, but the compliment shall not entitle such delegate to any privileges vested in the delegates of the different Locals, and only the hotel expenses shall be borne by the Federation.

Sec. 6. All hotel accommodations of delegates to a Convention of the American Federation of Musicians shall be placed in charge of a committee consisting of five (5) members from the Local in whose jurisdiction the Convention is to be held.

The committee, however, shall be guided by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the American Federation of Musicians regarding the amount allowed for such expenses, and no arrangements so made shall



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conflict with the interests of any organization affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

Sec. 7. The hotel accommodations of the delegates to the Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians and of such as may be summoned to appear shall be paid from the funds of the Federation and the amount so paid shall be the basic rate per delegate as contracted for by the committee under authority of Section 6, in addition to this each shall receive a per diem of \$6.00 for each full day in attendance and a corresponding fraction thereof for a

fraction of a day, such computation to be based on a time commencing no more than twenty-four hours prior to the stipulated opening of the Convention and ending not later than twelve hours after adjournment providing the delegate was present at such time. Should he arrive later or leave earlier than the above stipulated time payment shall be on the basis of arrival and departure.

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Concerning Certain "Gifts"

LUCIUS N. LITTAUER is "giving" \$2,000,000 to found at Harvard a graduate school of public administration "to promote the science and art of government administration."

Even the staunchest advocates of the New Deal will admit that public administration could be much improved, though they would have little difficulty in proving that some examples of private corporation administration treat the consumer worse than any government bureau dares to do. But to praise Mr. Littauer for philanthropy in this action is entirely out of place. He is merely returning in a roundabout way a part—probably a pretty small part—of the vast sums which he made by reason of government favors.

Littauer has been a glove manufacturer most of his life. Gloves have always been "protected" by pretty high tariffs. In the campaign of 1908, Littauer fattened the Taft campaign fund with sizeable sums; and the Dingley tariff passed the next year boosted that protection.

Cotton gloves under the Dingley dispensation paid 50 cents a dozen as a specific duty, and from 40 to 50 per cent ad valorem, that is, according to the value. Leather gloves under the same tariff paid from \$1.25 to \$2.50 a dozen, and \$1.00 extra if the gloves were lined.

In 1918, the duty on cotton gloves was cut to 35 per cent, and on leather gloves to \$1.00 a dozen, with a 25-cent penalty for every inch of length above fourteen. Mr. Littauer was not driven out of business by this tariff cut. He did business at the old stand, and waited.

In 1922, his protection was raised to \$4.00 a dozen pairs on women's gloves and \$5.00 per dozen on men's, while the penalty for length was raised to 50 cents an inch. Cotton gloves were boosted from 35 per cent to 50 per cent. In 1930, the duties he was interested in were raised again; cotton gloves to 60 per cent, and leather to \$6.00 per dozen pairs for men, and \$5.50 for women. And Mr. Littauer never has been accused of paying wages above the wretched rates which prevail in all textile industries.

Two millions to educate men for government service? He ought to make it twenty.

Labor's Property Right in Job

OHIO Custom Garment Company, Cincinnati, objecting to jurisdiction of National Labor Relations Board in its labor relations, brings suit for an injunction in a Federal court, claiming that its right to deal with employees is a property right.

It is hoped that this very issue will reach the Supreme Court in the testing of the Wagner Act, for that court has already stated, in its decision rendered on May 26, 1930, in the case of Southern Pacific (Texas & New Orleans Railroad Company) vs. Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, in which an injunction was granted to the labor union against the company's interfering with its collective bargaining operations, that " . . . if it could be said that it was necessary in the present instance to show a property interest in the employees in order to justify the court in granting and injunction, we are of the opinion that there was such an interest, with respect to the selection of representatives to confer with the employer in relation to contracts of service, as satisfied the statutory requirement."

The interest of the workers in their work and their wages, and the terms on which they are to be hired, is a property interest, too. And when the matter is boiled down to those terms, the equality of bargaining position is something that cannot be evaded or refused.

Half the Truth

OPPONENTS of the work the Tennessee Valley Authority is doing in permanently improving the conditions of thousands of people do not hesitate to make glaringly erroneous statements regarding that organization.

One of these fables is to the effect that Norris, Tenn., built by the Federal Government to provide living quarters for workers employed in constructing the Norris Dam, is a "godless town."

This canard has been given wide circulation. Governor Eugene Talmadge of Georgia recently added impetus to its journey by citing it as proof that the government had imposed Communism on the residents of Norris "by refusing to permit denominational churches to be built."

Poor Richard said, "Half the truth is often a great lie." This maxim applies to Talmadge's brainstorm.

The statement that there are no denominational churches in Norris is true, but it is only half the truth. The population of the town is about 2,000. TVA officials asked them whether they wanted a community church or separate churches. The residents voted overwhelmingly for the community church. Furthermore, the community church is always open for any sect that wishes to hold its own services. TVA spokesmen have explained this many times. Following Governor Talmadge's diatribe, Arthur O. Morgan, chairman of the TVA, repeated the facts.

There is another aphorism to the effect that a lie will travel very far before truth overtakes it. It is, therefore, more than probable that the opponents of the TVA will continue to howl themselves hoarse about the "churchless" and "godless" town of Norris despite the fact that there is not a scintilla of truth to warrant the charge.

Benito Changes His Views

THE People's Press of Chicago has reprinted a speech made by Benito Mussolini, in 1911, when the Italian government was invading Tripoli. Here are some parts of that speech:

"Why do we waste our time in passing resolutions (against the Tripolitan war)? We must stop war by deeds, not words.

"Have we no dynamite to put under the trains intended to take the soldiers to war? Cannot we destroy the bridges, the roads, the railroad tracks?"

"How can we civilize other people? You know that the capitalist government does not care for your welfare.

"Have we not misery and slavery enough in our own country? Have we not enough people who do not know how to read and write? Have we not people starving at home and in the streets?"

The speech was addressed to a gathering of Socialist workmen, who were protesting against the war. It is not yet possible to say whether, in spite of the censorship, this speech is being circulated in Italy.

Q.—What are the two oldest railroad labor organizations?

A.—Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, founded in 1863, and Order of Railroad Conductors, founded in 1868.

Q.—Are the Socialist mayors of Reading and Bridgeport members of organized labor?

A.—J. Henry Stump, elected mayor of Reading, Pa., is an active trade unionist and was for years president of the Reading Trades and Labor Council. Jasper McLevy, Socialist mayor of Bridgeport, Conn., is a union roofer.

Q.—How many persons were still unemployed in private industry?

A.—There are only estimates of the number. The American Federation estimates unemployed in October at 11,650,000.

Q.—Has labor taken any stand on the use of tin cans for beer?

A.—The executive board of the Union Label Trades Department, American Federation of Labor, recently condemned tin cans for beer on the ground that the cans are not manufactured by union workers, but are the product of cheap labor and unfair manufacturing plants. The board called upon all trade unionists and friends of labor to support the continued use of glass bottles for beer, ale and porter, pointing out that the bottles are made under union conditions and entitled to the use of the union label.

Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, un-
hastened by necessity or
trepidation, sometimes
penetrates to truth.

Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

If some bright chap with a great longing for coin—a younger H. C. Hopson, for instance—wants to make a pool on what the Supreme Court will do to the AAA, he has the chance of a lifetime. Of course he would go to jail—and should. But here is a coming event in which millions are interested; and there is nothing but a guess to go by. Under such circumstances, many people will pay to get some other fellow's guess.

The fact that the Court in this case would not allow the processing tax to be collected until the legality of the levy is settled means nothing as to the final disposition of the case. It merely means that a solvent firm, charged with a debt, need not put up the cash until the matter is settled.

There are two groups of people who are perfectly certain that the court will knock out the AAA, or at least the processing tax. One group consists of Big Business and its adherents. It is a fixed idea of these birds that the law, the Gospel, the Ten Commandments and the Constitution—especially the Fourteenth Amendment—were created for their especial benefit; and there is no use in telling them that they know nothing whatever about it.

To those liberals, however, who wish the court would sustain the law and fear that it won't, one may say a few words which will at least make him regard the great court with less gloomy eyes.

The sick chicken case, as General Johnson persists in calling it, was incredibly botched from the side of the government. The present case, there is every reason to believe, has been most carefully prepared. The court must take the facts as presented; and the AAA case is reputed to be crammed full of facts—which were almost totally absent in the sick chicken case. And that, no matter what the decision may be, makes a great big difference.

In the New York Bakery case, many years ago, the Supreme Court knocked out a law which limited the hours in bakeries to sixty per week. The Justice who read the decision said: "Clean and wholesome bread does not depend on a baker working only ten hours a day or only sixty hours a week." Obviously, he knew nothing whatever of the subject, and decided on precedent.

Some years later, a law limiting hours of work for women came before the Supreme Court, and that court, without saying so, knocked the opposition to the law into a cocked hat. The lawyer defending the statute in that case wrote three pages of legal argument and a hundred pages of facts, facts, facts. He piled facts showing the bitter need of the law so deep that they smothered all precedents.

What has happened once may happen again. Who knows?

James M. Landis, chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, will be one of the most important figures in the news of Washington for some time to come. Part of this is due to his position at the head of the SEC, which appears due for a gruelling battle on the utility holding company bill. Part is personal.

Landis is a man of small stature. He was born thirty-six years ago in Japan, where his father was a Presbyterian missionary. He was preparing for college at Mercersburg Academy when the war came on; and at sixteen, Landis was in the British Y. M. C. A. He came over to our own "Y" when we got into the scrap; but used all his pull to get into the actual fighting. His enlistment papers came through just about the time the war caved in; so he got no part in the fighting.

Landis had looked forward to entering the ministry. The war probably ended that. Landis took his A. B. degree at Princeton in 1921, and went to the Harvard law school. Here, he made the best record since the days when Louis D. Brandeis was a student, and won the coveted prize of a year as Brandeis's secretary.

He was one of the charter members of the Brain Trust, denounced so savagely by the large number of reactionaries who think brains are a reproach. He served in the FTC, then in the ranks of the SEC, and then was made chairman.

"Finlandia" will ever stand as a beautiful testimonial of his undying love for his native land. His "Valse Triste" probably ranks next in popularity, although he has written seven symphonies which will have a permanently high place in symphonic literature. He is still composing and further musical enrichment may come from his mind and heart and hand.

There is something quite en rapport with the spirit of the holiday season which brought the old year to a close to read about the fashion in which the musicians of Local 111, Canton-Massillon, Ohio, rallied to the support of a young musical genius of that city and helped to pave the way for him to receive recognition in his chosen profession.

The young man in question was Otto Monnard, a flute player, whose talents were attracting wide attention. The bands of the city arranged a massed concert, and the citizens accorded an enthusiastic and substantial support. The bands represented were Thayer's Military, 135th Field Artillery, American Legion and Nazir Grotto.

Those who had had opportunity in recent months to hear Goldman's Band in New York, or perhaps over the radio, have been impressed by the fact that someone was doing some wonderful trumpet work. This new and rising star is another Canton boy named Frank Elsass.

It is a tragedy to permit these youngsters to fall into the class of "flowers which are born to blush unseen;" it is to the lasting credit of a community which sees the possibilities and waters the plant from the well-springs of public beneficence so the mission which nature intended may be fulfilled. Stricken with a heart attack Friday, November 29, while visiting friends, Frederick J. Leibold, 67, veteran secretary of the Denver Musical Protective

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Association, No. 20, died before medical aid could be summoned.

With the exception of four years in which he was a member and librarian of the Frederick Nell Innes Band, Mr. Leibold served as secretary of the Musicians' Union since 1903.

Three weeks ago he returned from a six weeks' vacation in Southern California, where his wife, Mrs. Bertha M. Leibold, was staying at the time of his death. She made a hurried trip from San Diego to make the funeral arrangements.

Mr. Leibold was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., on September 20, 1869, where he received a university and musical education. He was married while there, and arrived in Denver in mid-summer of 1895. He was an accomplished player of both the piano and trombone and at different periods conducted a private school for a limited number of pupils. He played in orchestras in the Brown Palace and Adams hotels as well as several leading downtown theatres.

Shortly after the ending of the World War he was a member of the Frederick Nell Innes Band of Denver that attended the International Boy Scout Jamboree held in London, England.

During his tenure in office as secretary of the Musicians' Union he was always selected as a delegate to the National Conventions of the American Federation of Musicians.

Funeral services were held at the Olinger Mortuary Wednesday morning, December 4, and entombment was made in the Tower of Memories mausoleum in Crown Hill Cemetery.

The pall-bearers, headed by Michael Muro, president of the Musicians' Union, consisted of Charles S. Keyes, James Gould, James H. Burke, John S. Leick and Horace E. Tureman.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bertha M. Leibold.

President Muro writes us that the music at the funeral service was furnished by a string orchestra of twelve pieces directed by Fred Schmitt, a leading orchestra leader of that city. The compositions rendered were the following:

"Andante Cantabile" by Tchaikowsky and "Ave Maria" by Schubert.

Thus passes another Federation stalwart who served the cause of music well both as an instrumentalist and an administrator of its governmental affairs.

Mrs. Leibold will receive the sympathy of a wide circle of Federation friends.

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
