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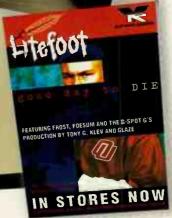

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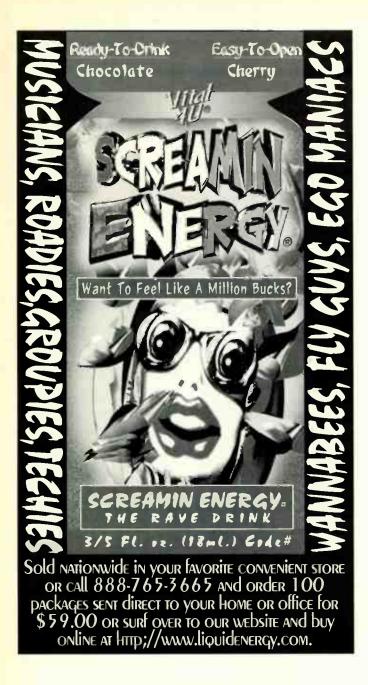
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# LP Records.com

The company now known as LP Records.com was launched as a formal North Hollywood rehearsal studio in the mid-Eighties, evolved into an eclectic, Internet-marketed indie record label in 1995, and is currently launching a one-stop, vertically integrated Internet hosting service for local musicians seeking such an outlet.

Founder Gary Patterson was content for several years with the studio and label until he took some time off to become a trader in the stock market, making a killing with Internet companies involved in musical promotion. By combining his Internet and trading knowledge he was able to fund his own online music label.

"We were fine just selling our handful of signed artists, but then I came to realize that there was a type of exposure online that musicians couldn't achieve anywhere else," he says. "Our plan is to host LP advertises a one-stop recording and rehearsal studio featuring 24-track digital recording and editing systems, three different-sized rooms totalling 3,500 square feet, and full, multi-media production facilities.

There is also an inhouse travel service and studio furniture manufacturer. Long before Patterson was a stock trader and Web master, he was a naturally gifted audio technician who claims to have designed one of the industry's first digital studio layouts and digital workstations. Having renowned engineer Zach Kirkorian on his staff has also helped LP Studios become one of the most popular in town.

"I know some studio owners are content with just building that business, but I heard a lot of great music here and thought it might be a challenge to launch a label of artists and bands that I personally developed," says Patterson.



everything for the artists and musicians out there, from streaming videos to MP3s, audio tracks and files. We'll even do the Web site graphic design and do what's known as 'e-commerce,' which is handling their merchant accounts and inventory. It's fully catering to the undiscovered, deserving musicians out there."

The Internet hosting service is a logical branching out from LP Records.com, which has for several years been in the business of inhouse recording and marketing via the Internet. Among the artists in LP's current stable — samples of whose music is available on the Web site — are Drifting Son, Dan & the Contractors, Full Metal Racket, Brain Food, 4 or 5 Dopes, Ovalteen and the Roach Brothers.

Each artist has been discovered, signed and executive produced by Patterson, and their music is recorded at the company's full-service recording and rehearsal facility.

"I called it LP Records as an ode to the past, because it's my belief that vinyl never truly dies. I worked on various forms of distribution before hitting on the idea of focusing on Web site marketing. I've allowed my artists full, creative freedom, and it's been a successful venture.

"The rehearsal studio is still thriving, but I've used it also as a door to other ventures and opportunities," he adds. "When I formulated the Web hosting plan, I sought and secured investors for the venture. I did research and realized how much professional Web site builders were charging. I realized I could set up a system to help musicians bypass that and the typical servers, save them time and offer an amazing package at a reasonable price. The Internet has revolutionized the industry, and the possibilities are endless."

BACKGROUND: Tim DeWitt is a classically trained singer who makes his living singing show tunes. sometimes performing at Disneyland in their Animazement show. His wife and business partner, Sheila, holds a Ph.D. in Economics and an MBA in Finance. So what are they doing heading up a record label dedicated to hip-hop and rap?

"We did hip-hop and rap because I think it's the only genre where an indie can achieve a lot of success," says DeWitt, who knows what fills a dance floor and also what fills a business plan.

The Business Side: Code Green Records was going to be the business component of a public company. Sheila and I had an Internet company (RapAmerica.com) to go with this. That was Russ Regan's creation. What happened was that with the FCC rules and things that have come of the people who were involved in the investment banking part of it, had some shoddy history. They had a thing called Quality Records and they had a company called Tampa Bay. These are companies where investors lost some money. Once we found that out, the FCC attorneys said, "Don't do this. Get away from these guys." So we did, but we kept what was Quality and that was Russ Regan.

Russ Regan: This guy named the Beach Boys, brought Elton John to this country and has had incredible luck picking acts. When we met Russ he was working with a company called Starbound Records. At that time, Russ had an opportunity to pick up an act called the Backstreet Boys for \$150,000. This was maybe three years ago. John said, "No, I just want to do cata-

logs," and Russ said, "I want to get the hell out of here because these are great opportunities." So that's basically how we got Russ. He was disenchanted and disenfranchised from Starbound Records.

The Joys of Indie: I know the majors say they want to see sales of 5,000 units in five markets before they'll get in bed with you. That's not where I'm at. That's where they're at because they can do that. They know there are a lot of indies running around, a lot of producers running around who are willing to do all the leg work for them. So they're sitting back saying, "I've got the checkbook. You show me what you can do. If I like it, I'll write you a check." That's where we're at right now. The record companies really don't have the time or the energy or the inclination to commit to an artist's career.

Defining Rap: Rap has very little to do with music except for this song that came out is very musical and I think it's what people look for in crossover rap and that's a hit song from a long time ago that somebody breathes life into and adds a killer rap to. That's what Trig has done. They've ripped off a Sister Sledge tune and done their street rap to it. Their rap is real, it's from the 'hood' and it has teeth. We like that about them. And the people who are in their market are really going to like that about them, that these guys are the real thing.

Empowerment: The artists are as much involved in their own careers as they want to be. That's where my wife Sheila comes in. She can analyze the business aspects of anything and she helps our artists make the right decision. If an artist says, "We want to do this," Sheila can tell them how much something will cost and present options.

A lot of record labels don't talk to their artists that way; it's always yes or no. With us, it's "If you do, that's okay, but it's going to cost this much money." Then we go back to basic accounting principles. I open my books to artists and let them see first-hand where I'm coming from and what things are costing.

We Are Family: We knew there was another market we could tap into with "We Are Family." That's people who are still singing that tune. It hadn't been redone since 1979 and we went back to Trig and asked if they couldn't do us this one favor just this once and write us a set of clean lyrics. Take out all the profanity and all the violence and all the reference to your neighborhood. They grumbled a little bit and said, "We'll do it, but we don't know why we're doing it." Trust us on this one and we won't do this to you again. At the same time, we licensed all of Funkadelic's tracks. So we got the mechanical on

Sister Sledge through Sony and we got Funkadelic. Then we went ahead and recorded them.

Label Plans: My long-term plans for this year are to develop two other artists, but that's as things develop. We're committed to Trig's success even if that means having somebody bigger and stronger take over. If I have a band that becomes a household word and a recognizable name, that's really worth a lot of money to me as far as future acts.

We've got an Hispanic female rapper named JV. She used to be on Thump. We have her record contract right now, so she's next. I'd do more if I could but I'm not Interscope. I'm just one guy. We have to build a foundation and then build the walls and so forth.

Future Economics: Basically, thanks to the Internet, an artist will be able in the future to put together a deal with a phone company and offer an album of his music for two dollars to every customer of that phone company and put it in their bill or offer it online or however he can communicate with them. He may not be making a lot of money per unit, but he may have five million customers right there who will send him a dollar. He'll split the money with the phone company. In that way, artists will be determining the price of their music and right now that's completely up to the record labels.

San Bernardino Sound: There's a whole brood of rappers out there in San Bernardino. It's an untapped market that we've discovered. Trig

pretty much controls these guys because they're the #1 hip-hop act out there. So when they do shows out there, they've got a lot of guys who try to get their songs on so they've got a lot of rappers in training. We've got an eye out on a couple of them right now.

If you listen to Wu Tang Clan or any of these groups, they have a specific kind of sound. These guys (in San Bernardino) have a brand new sound that is indigenous to their area. You'd have to listen to it to really get a feel for it. If I had to say what it is, it's a little more user friendly, it's a little more straight ahead. It's on the beat and it has a direction to it. It's like there's a parade going by and It has that drive to what's happening.

Unsolicited Demos: If I had to put what I'm looking for into one word, it would be intelligence. If it's something that makes me listen to it and understand, that's good. I also listen for a sound. If they've got a sound and a great hook and it's saying something, I'll look to my toe. If my toe is moving, then it's got some potential. That's basically where you have to start with everything. If the sound isn't any good, then all the genius in the world isn't going to help it as far as manufacturing it and promoting it and distributing it and advertising it. For instance, radio people aren't stupid. They're going to play something that's good and something that gets people to listen to their station. If there's nothing on that will motivate people to listen to their station, they won't give you another spin.

wenty-year-old Michael Fredo is moving from the pages of Tornmy Hilfiger ads to the CD trays of America's female adolescents. His light pop offerings range from typical teenage themes — heartbreak, young love and making up — to losing a parent to drunk driving. His path to a recording contract was paved with legitimate skill, connections and fortuity.

"I met Quincy Jones at a Los Angeles hotel party in 1997, actually," Fredo says. "I knew Kidada (Quincy's daughter) for a couple of years before that. My manager Andy Hilfiger (brother of Tommy, clothing designer and Uncle to Fredo) introduced us and I asked if he'd come up to my hotel room and listen to me play the guitar and sing. Unexpectedly, he said yes.

"After that I cut a demo for him with money I borrowed from my mom and he liked it. He was more interested in me singing pop, though, rather than the folk and rock I had been working on. We started working on an album in mid-1998 and it was released in October, 1999.

"Warner Brothers picked up on my album just about the time we finished it," Fredo continues. "Their pop repertoire was a little thin; fortunately they liked my sound and came on board."

Reaching a target audience is, of course, critical to the success of an album. Warner Bros. was on top of their game when they proposed a middle school tour for Fredo. "We'll start that in February along with SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions). My father died because he was driving under the influence and I really want to let people know that this type of behavior does kill people."

Fredo describes his music as "dudequake." "When we play it makes the earth shake; when I sing I feel so many vibrations going through my booy. It's just a funny word we use to convey that feeling.

"My manager Andy Hilfiger has taught me to be a professional," Fredo reflects, "he showed me the importance of being prepared and that's helped me a lot."

There are basically two ways to get the attention of the A&R community. One is to play out a lot, building a loyal following and filling clubs from one coast to the next

But that's not now Mollys Yes got the attention of Republic/Universal's Avery Lipman. Despite the two-year-old band having played some 200 dates in and around their native Oklahoma, neither Lipman nor the band's management had seen them play live until after they were signed to the label.

Mollys Yes came to Lipman's attention the other way. They had released their own independent record in February of last year. The album was called *Paper Judas*, seiling about 2,500 copies in Oklahoma and online. There was also radio play though geographically limited, thanks to an indie promotions person from

Tulsa's The Edge radio also picked up on their local heroes' efforts, and put one of the songs into rotation. In turn, that got the band's name into a couple of the trades, most notably R&R and Gavin.

Mollys then began popping up on the Tulsa station's playlist and landed them on the radar screens of several industry insiders. Avery Lipman happened to be one of them.

"Lipman started corresponding with our guitar player Mac," says lead singer and keyboardist Ed Goggin. "I think actually Avery's wife had something to do with it. I think she dug the record quite a bit. So he met with us."

Mollys Yes also attracted the interest of a couple other labels, but it was pretty much a foregone conclusion that they would sign with Republic. "Our negotiations consisted of, "We like you. You like us. Let's fly you to New York and let's have some fun and we'll make a deal," says Goggin.

"We set out to make pop music we like, with an edge. We make songs we want to hear on the radio, so a major felt like a good fit for us."

t's not often that an artist can trace the roots of a label contract to a chauffeur, but that is exactly how Real Deal recording artist Oliver started the process. Oliver had been producing other artists and was ready to do an independent project of his own. His friend, the aforementioned chauffeur, recommended Oliver to a passenger, Eddie Gilbert, in 1998. Eddie just happened to be the assistant to the CEO of boxer Evander Holyfield's Real Deal Records.

Eddie came to the studio to check out Oliver and his production company, Mystic Moves. The timing was perfect for Oliver, who had studied music at Berklee. From the start, the Trenton, New Jersey, native's easy-on-the-ear ballads and funky dance tunes were appealing to the startup label. Before long, Oliver was signed and his CD was released last October, making the Top 40 new release list in *Gavin* and *R&R*.

It seems like Real Deal and Oliver make a perfect match since they're both interested in producing positive, upbeat music. Real Deal artists do not preach "doom and gloom" and Oliver appreciates the creative freedom they give him. "The label gives me creative control," he says, "and Evander lets me be me."

The "me" Oliver is talking about sings of good love. Songs like "Somebody to Love," "I Sing This Song For You," and "Shadows of Love" are intimate and seductive — the kind of songs one plays when one wants to take the courting process one step further. All the tunes on the CD are written by Oliver, who also performs all the vocals and plays all the instruments.

Oliver appreciates Holyfield's easy going style and acknowledges his sports legacy as a positive. "Of course he's into sports," says Oliver of the former Heavyweight Champion of the World, "but he's really into music. He's real serious about this." Oliver has a three-album deal with Real Deal Records.

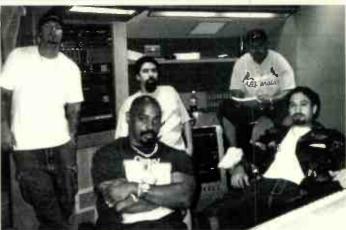

# New Statutory Rate Effective 1/1/00

Edward P. Murphy, President and CEO of the National Music Publisher's Association Inc. (NMPA) as well as the Harry Fox Agency Inc. (HFA) have notified all publisher principals and manufacturer clients of the new statutory mechanical rate.

The new rate will be 7.55 cents per song or 1.45 cents per minute

of playing time or fraction thereof—whichever is greater. This is an increase from 7.1 cents per minute. The increase is per the "physical phonorecord" royalty rate schedule adopted by the Library of Congress, as of January 1, 1998.

The new mechanical royalty rate will be applicable to all phono records made and distributed on or after January 1, 2000, regardless of the date upon which the recording was first released, unless other contractual arrangements apply.

Per the 10-year royalty rate schedule adopted in 1998, the next increase is scheduled to take place on January 1, 2002.

# David Robbins

A Composer Rocks
The Cradle

n the late Thirties, various artists

fell under the suspicion of the anti-Red hysteria fermenting in the American consciousness. Composer Marc Blitzstein's musical, *Cradle Will Rock*, commissioned under the Federal Theatre Project, was actually shut down on the eve of its opening by armed United States soldiers.

A pivotal collision of the art, theater and political worlds of New York, involving Diego Rivera, Nelson Rockefeller and Orson Welles provides the premise for the most recent Tim Robbins film. *Cradle Will Rock*, a play within a play, stars Hank Azaria, John Cusack, Bill Murray, Susan Sarandon and Vanessa Redgrave.

In envisioning his score, composer David Robbins first drew on the music of Marc Blizstein. "Blizstein had influences of the German theater — Kurt Weill and Bertolt Brecht — that were vitat," he explains. "I came up with a score that would harmonize with his music."

Robbins was also influenced by the American music of the times — Duke Ellington, Billie Holiday, and Ella Fitzgerald. The immigrant streets of 1930's New York provided another key. "I listened to a lot of Klezmer," Robbins recalls. "I also liked the German, gypsy and jazz influences. I wanted to mix it all up and put it together, which was a very fruitful way of writing."

David and his writer/actor/director brother, Tim, grew up in New York's Greenwich Village. Their father, Gil Robbins, was a member of the Highwaymen folk group. It was a fertile time for music. Robbins reminisces, "People like the We Five and Ian & Sylvia were friends of the family. Dylan was around. Jimi Hendrix was a local. I saw him play at the Cafe Wha? when he put his guitar through the ceiling."

Robbins began to rock. "I started listening to Black Sabbath and it would drive my parents crazy," he laughs. "I had a Marshall stack in my bedroom and my dad would come home screaming 'I heard it all the way home from the subway!"

After playing guitar for a series of rock bands, Robbins fell into creating music for the live stage. "Theater was an answer for me," Robbins reveals. "You're in control of your destiny and every project tends to be different. The musical landscape is wide open. With a band, you write songs and play them to death. I like a new, different thing every time. Then, I got an opportunity to do a movie. I've been doing it ever since."

Robbins' film credits include *Bob Roberts*, a film for which he and his brother co-wrote parody folk songs, and the film *Dead Man Walking*, that paired Pearl Jam's Eddie Vedder with the late Pakistani *Qwalli* master, Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan. "We came through the back door," Robbins remembers. "We tried the typical ways — religious music, Southern Gospel, New Orleans — but it closed it off. The content of the movie was so oppressive and claustrophobic that when you hear the type of music we ended up doing it gave you a sense that everything was going to be all right.

"Nusrat was partial to this one melody I'd written and suggested that we develop it into something for the opening. It became 'The Face of Love.' We turned down all of the lights in the studio, threw a bunch of pillows and a rug on the floor, and sat in a circle: Ry Cooder, Eddie Vedder, Nusrat and his family, myself and Tim. We started playing with this melody and Tim and Eddie were writing lyrics and Nusrat was writing lyrics in his head for this trade-off, in English and Qwalli. It ended up being very similar in what they were saying, which was scary. We rolled tape: that one take is the take"

Though Robbins has written conventional orchestral scores, it seems to be his vast knowledge of popular and world music idioms that places him in the musical forefront. His recent score for *Savior* utilized the Belgrade Symphony Orchestra, a classical choir and local musicians on handmade flutes and sheepskin bagpipes.

"I'm not worried about preconceptions about the way music is supposed to be in a movie," Robbins relates. "It's a matter of trusting the drama and the acting. If you've got good acting then half the battle is already over."

# A CONVERSATION WITH THE WHISKY'S TISA MYLAR



Starting March 7, the Whisky a Go-Go will resurrect No Bozo Jam, the immensely popular night which packed houses with its free, multi-band concerts up until its closure nearly a decade ago. The event, which always packed the Whisky to full capacity, was a Monday night free (if you were over 21) gig that usually featured around 10 bands, each playing three songs on a pre-set backline in order to expedite changeover times.

The Jam was an excellent opportunity to view a variety of emerging and established local talent as well as being the ultimate hangout. But will they be able to resurrect the night's popularity amidst the sluggish L.A. club scene? We recently spoke with Whisky a Go-Go manager Tisa Mylar, who came up with the idea to bring back the Jam:

Music Connection: Tell us about the new Whisky No Bozo Jam.

Tisa Mylar: We're going to try and book seven to nine bands every night. Free for over 21, \$3 under 21. Same idea as before, give the band free pizza, etc. It's just going to be a place where the bands can come and play. Hopefully, it will turn around. Plus, we're going to try to get some of the bands who played the original No Bozo Jam to come back and play.

*MC*: Some of our newer readers may not remember the original No Bozo Jam. You want to refresh their memories?

TM: Well, I was working up the street at the Rainbow at the time, so I was wasn't working at the Whisky a Go-Go then. But I remember going to them, and there were always a lot of great bands getting together and playing and having a great time.

MC: And playing to completely packed houses.

TM: Oh yeah. The No Bozo Jam would always pack the place to the rafters.

MC: Will the backline and drum kit already be set up for quick changeovers?

TM: We're still discussing what we're going to do, but we're probably going to get a backline, yeah. Drum kit, too. So bands would only have to bring in their guitars, or whatever they feel comfortable bringing in. Most of the stuff we'll probably have here. We're trying to get someone like Guitar Center or another local music store to get behind it for us.

MC. And since Music Connection has a ton of top notch musical equipment stores advertising with us, I guess we should let them know if they're interested in getting behind the No Bozo Jam they should give Tisa Myler a call at 310-652-4202.

TM: That's it. We're really trying to hype it and get as many people involved in the No Bozo Jam as sponsors.

MC: What kind of talent are you looking for?

TM: All kinds of rock. The normal type of bands that would play at the Whisky a Go-Go. We're offering it up to pretty much everybody if they have a pretty good draw. We don't want it to be a thing where they just come in and rehearse, 'cause that's not good for us or the bands. We really want them to go out and hustle and bring in people.

MC: What kind of numbers are you looking at in terms of draw?

TM: Realistically? About 25.

MC: Who will be the bookers involved in putting together the No Bozo Jam?

TM: Leah Bonaventura and Mike Wilson.

MC: How does a band get booked at the Whisky a Go-Go No Bozo Jam?

TM: Just call Leah at the Whisky at 310-652-4202, extension 13.

MC: Just call? That's rather unusual. Wouldn't you rather have them mail in a package?

TM: Most of the bands that want to play the No Bozo Jam, or know of the Whisky, have probably played here in the past, so we're going to know who they are right away. The good thing about our bookers, since I've worked here for a while now and I see what's going on in the past, is the fact that they co-ordinate the music pretty well together.

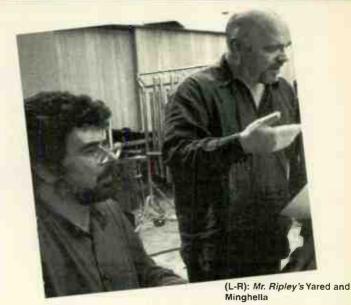

Of interest to musicians is the MP3 section of the site (http:// www.kanoodle.com/mp3), which gives bands free Web pages, unlimited MP3 uploads, and 100 percent of the selling price of all artist's music paid directly to them (they'll even do it all for you for \$15). While Sony is enthusiastic that the Atrac3 will safeguard content, others are afraid the use of this technology will divide the market, which is now centered around MP3 technology.

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AOL & Time Warner -Good For Who?

The latest jaw-dropping announcement from the technology and entertainment fields is the announcement that AOL will buy Time Warner, the largest media and entertainment corporation in the world. This transaction (if approved by the Justice Department and the FCC) continues the trend of greater consolidation of media distribution and ownership by fewer companies, fueled by those huge online profits. How will this affect music and indie musicians?

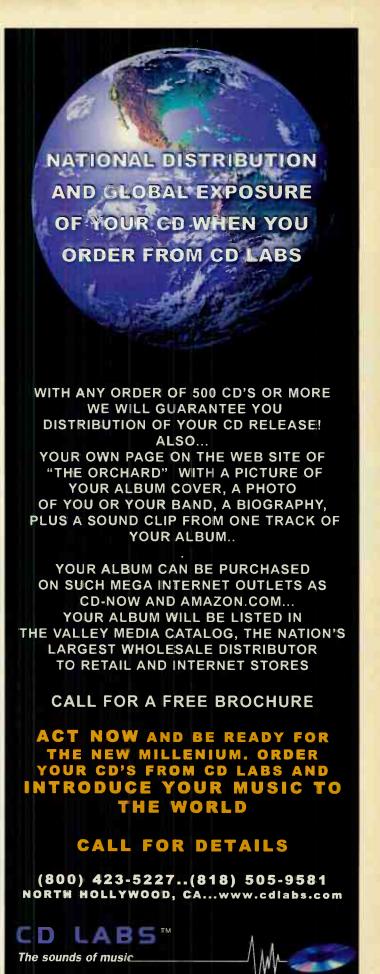
The oldest line in the book is that the free market and competition are key to success, and mergers give consumers more choices and make the market more efficient. But major record labels really want only their music played on commercial radio, thus limiting consumer choices and selling more units by fewer artists; and the bigger a company gets the more attention it pays to dominating a market and eliminating the competition (Microsoft, anyone?). No one is really interested in sharing any market, and hope to corner it with a product or service that no one else can sell. How does this relate to indie music makers?

Many AOL users, usually firsttime online surfers, aren't even aware that an Internet outside of the AOL universe even exists. And that's fine by AOL, a company that has strived over the years to be a complete source of info for their users (no AOL keyword? You must not exist...). With Time Warner's products to sell, you can bet AOL's movie, TV and music sites won't be featuring Disney movies or Polygram Recording artists as much as the latest Batman sequel or Madonna CD. And who will get top listings on AOL's search engine? Indie artists not even on a major label? Don't even think about it.

We need more choices, not less. And if you want a career as an original artist, you need to connect to as many potential fans as possible. Encourage your AOL friends to surf around more. Diversity is the lifeline of anyone trying to do something new. Mergers are not.

Keep the faith.

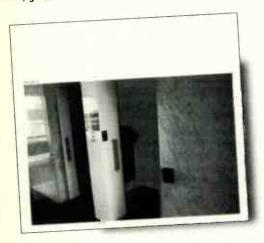

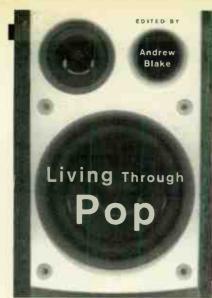

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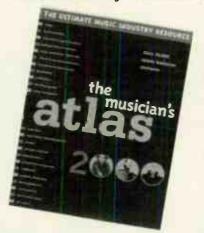

go up against that? But they'll be no arguing this March when Run-DMC drop Grown Royal, their first album in

seven years, which is gonna hit harder than Mark McGwire and blow up bigger than a 4th of July

**Armageddon** picnic at Los Alamos. Make no mistake — the band that put rap on the map, earned the genre its first

gold album, and debuted beats to MTV is back. And boy are you gonna know about it.

# It's Like This

In 1982, high-schoolers Joseph Simmons, Darryl McDaniel and Jason Mizell rose up from the freshly manicured lawns of Hollis, Queens, to form what would become the definitive rap group.

At the advice of Simmons' older brother Russell (who had just formed Rush Productions to deal with the burgeoning rap genre), Joseph became "Run," Darryl McDaniel became "DMC" and Mizell became "Jam Master Jay." Neither were really thrilled with the moniker "Run-DMC," but that's what adorned their 1983 debut single, "It's Like That," for the upstart Profile label.

Within one year, Run-DMC was at the top of their genre. By 1986, their third album, Raising Hell, brought rap to the masses and smashed the color barriers like a roundhouse left from Lennox Lewis. Their breakout collaborative, "Walk This Way," blew the band up from jump and helped to resurrect the flagging career of rock stalwarts Aerosmith, all while marrying rap to rock like bacon and eggs.

Run-DMC were the rule for the rest of the decade; but when rap swapped its untied Adidas and Kangol hats for Uzis and scowls, the Kings from Queens saw their

gles were mere background music to the rat-a-tat-tat of the new multi-platinum scary crew of hip-hop. By 1992, the group's decision to convert to Christianity (specifically Run, who became an ordained minister) was a mere footnote to the antics and album sales of the new breed of Left Coast misfits.

"I've been ministering the gospel and ministering the people forever through my music," recalls Run. "Several years ago, I started going to church a lot, and I became a deacon, then I became a minister. It wasn't anything I went there to do, I just gradually went up the ladder." Their 1993 album, Down For The King, touted their new faith and went gold, though it was the last loud blip on the rap radar screen.

But that was then and this is now. It is seven years later, and Run-DMC is ready to pop with a new album that has more legit guests than a Puff Daddy birthday party. Talking with him by phone, the 35-year-old Reverend Run is on the move again.

"I gotta pick up my kids, then I got a show in Florida tonight," he sighs. "Plus, I gotta get this album out, y'know?" His frustration is palpable — and perfectly understandable. The new album, Crown Royal, was set to drop a full six months ago. "There's still a lot going on with Run-DMC, situations that are not in my control," he

says so, the album will come out, and it will get its proper criticisms and love."

And props and love it will receive. Crown Royal is badder than Reservoir Dogs-era Harvey Keitel and packed full of more wicked rhymes than a Chris Rock rewrite of Mother Goose. In addition to the clean pop tunes that provide the solid backbone to Crown Royal, the group has made a successful foray into Nineties hip-hop and kicked it into the 21st century. Tunes like "Ahh" and "Goodbye" show Run rapping with a fresh sense of delivery, timing and complexity unheard of on previous Run-DMC records. It's the difference between Michael Jackson and Samuel Jackson. Their

reign go away in favor of the gangsta rap flavor. "I watched it grow, and people bought the N.W.A albums 'cause they was good," Run comments. "They talked about what was going on in their hood — I liked it for what it was. You take it for what the context of it is — if it's going down and people are going to see it, fine."

# Three The **Hard Way**

Run-DMC entered the Nineties quietly battling personal demons, but their strug-

explains. "I can't get a single out, and I think it's God's will that He's just doing what He does — maybe He has a different time for me, a different month for me to drop."

Over bursts of static, Run continues the flow of frustration, which he keeps thoroughly in check with the patience of Job. "Let me wait and see when my time is. I believe deeply in God just giving me my time. When it's your time to shine, you'll shine and I don't think it was time for me to jump out there — I've been tap dancing since September, October, November, December, January, February; but when God

current rap delivery employs more of a jab sensibility than the heavy thud of their early days. Run-DMC may be a bit older, but on Crown Royal they're bolder — a lean, mean hip-hop machine. For the most part, the heavy barre chords now share the CD with an ominous dose of hip-hop, all fronted with a staccato rap style delivered with the precision of a Dave Weckl snare solo.

# **Royal Delays**

So why all the delays? Taking a second to get his kids in the car, Run excuses himself

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to wish his daughter's friend a happy birthday. "Hang on a sec, 'kay?" Run shifts from king rapper to ace father, as his blockrockin' delivery fades to his Daddy voice.

Once the kids are buckled in and birth-day wishes handed out, Reverend Run drops back to the matters at hand. "Sorry about that," he offers while pulling back into traffic. "Where were we? Oh yeah, getting the single out. A lot of people that we did collaborations with were putting out albums and singles, so we weren't able to take any of those records, everybody was doing something so important at the time that we couldn't get singles out — that's the problem — that's the only problem. We couldn't get single and video rights. We'd do the song with the group, and then we'd say, 'Can we do a video?' and they'd say

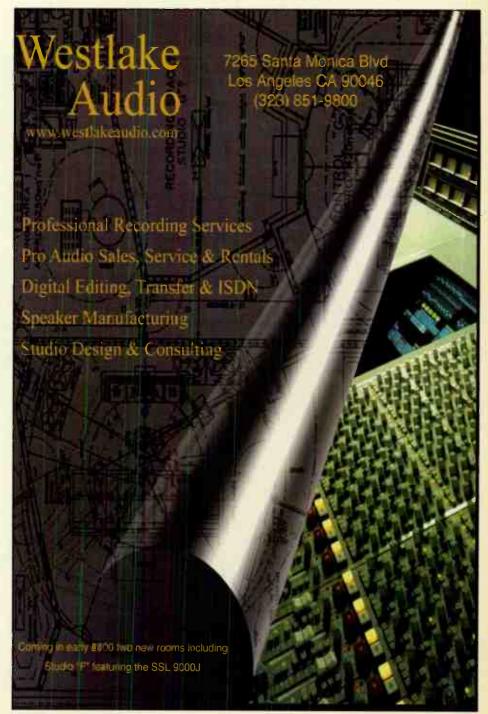
'No, you can leave it on your album, but it can't be your lead-off single, 'cause we're doing something now, and if we put out this single with you, it might interrupt the focus of our band.' Everybody was in the midst of something important at the time, but I think we're working it out."

Still, Run-DMC pulled in major names, including Sugar Ray, ODB, Kid Rock, Nas, Everlast and Fred Durst to throw rhymes on Crown Royal. "I was just seeing people I like, and saying, 'I'm doing an album; you wanna work with me?' I like your work, let's see if we can make something happen.'

"So I ended up, me and my brother and Clive Davis, executive producing an album that consisted of a lot of vibrant collaborations. Then it got serious. Then I got another guest, and another."



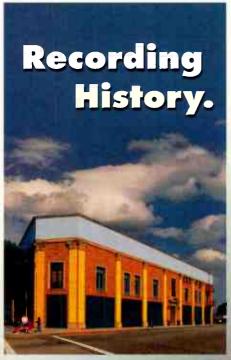

on the making of Grown Royal

we read a ton of press material on artists, like Lauryn Hill or Dave Matthews, who said they would not be making music had it not been for the records they grew up listening to by Carlos Santana.

"We were reading similar things," Ganbarg continues, "six months later, that Kid Rock was saying about Run-DMC. It really seemed to make all of the logical and creative sense in the world to try and get these guys in the studio, because you're dealing with a style of music that would make an inspired pairing for the artists they've influenced over the last 15 or 20 years. Obviously, you can't get every possible pairing, but you try."

Run sheds more light on the process. "I picked Nas when I was making a Queens album, and it seemed like the best thing to do," he recalls. "Then I got Mobb Deep, who are also from Queens. Sugar Ray — did a concert with them, saw them, liked them, had a good time with them. And Kid Rock, well Kid Rock is the obvious choice."

Of equal significance were the guests who were supposed to be on *Crown Royal*, but faded. After Run-DMC's MTV reunion



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with Aerosmith for an updated version of "It's Tricky," most Run fans began throwing Internet rumors about another studio collaboration, which was scheduled to fly, but never got off the ground.

"It didn't happen and I stopped calling them, but there's no beef," Run emphasizes. "We started to do it, they said they would do it, but I just left it alone — maybe it will happen in the future. They're nice guys and there's no beef; I just didn't finish it."

The Beastie Boys, who many feel owe major props and a tip of the Kangol hat to Run-DMC, will have [as we go to print] a slim appearance on the album. Although one member of the pale posse kicked some beats for the background music of "Them

Girls" [which features cameo rapping by major flavor Fred Durst, and, as we go to print, may not make it onto the album], their vocal absence on *Crown Royal* amidst the perennial sea of guest artists is as conspicious as an "I'd kill Flipper for a tuna sandwich" T-shirt at a Greenpeace rally. So what the hell happened?

"We chose the Beastie Boys, but they acted funny," Run tersely explains. "They were the only people who didn't show up and didn't want to do anything. On the MTV Awards, they said that we were the ones who helped get them in the game, but then they acted F-U-N-N-Y. I have no idea why, and I don't mind if that goes in the article," he sighs. "I'm hurt. They are very wrong for that. But I'm moving on, and I'm not going to say any more."

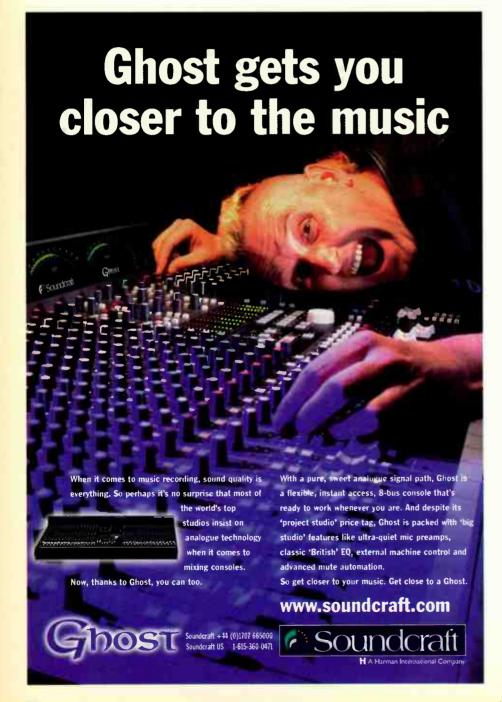
One thing Run is talking and talking loud about is the new alliance between venerable rap label Profile Records [their ongoing home since 1983] and major label batting champions Arista Records. The new Arista/Profile imprint will not only release the first Run-DMC album in seven years, they are also re-releasing the entire Run-DMC catalog. Run is especially enthused about his hands-on vibe with label chief Clive Davis, who has pretty much done for Arista Records what Run-DMC has done for rap.

"It's the greatest thing ever," Run beams. "I talk to Clive Davis on the phone every day — me and Clive, plotting and scheming and figuring it out, and loving it to death. I can't wait for the album to drop and watch that machine go into motion. Thank God the company [Profile] was sold to a great label and that Profile went over to Arista and kept their integrity. I'm glad Run-DMC is benefiting from it."

And everyone will benefit from it, specifically the listeners, who are going to hear that Run-DMC have done with *Crown Royal* what Dr. Frankenstein did with some spare body parts. As for Arista/Profile, Pete Ganbarg points out, "We're going to do with *Crown Royal* what we did with Carlos Santana's *Supernatural* album," which hit #1, big time. "Everyone who reads this article will know that this album is out."

According to Arista/Profile, Crown Royal will be released some time in March.

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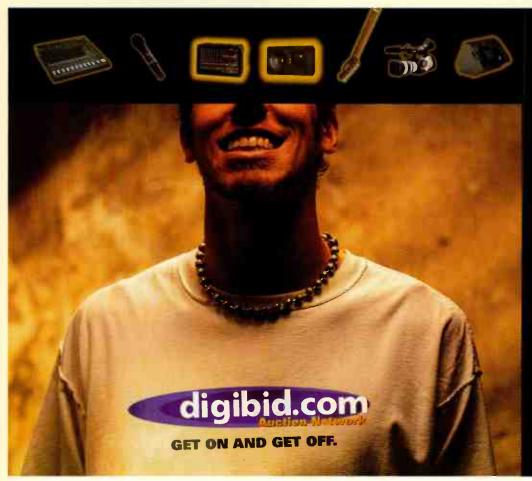

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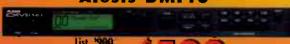
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Most musicians are familiar with the "price game" and some are even willing to assume the inherent risks of an online purchase. But by utilizing the Internet wisely, many artists find that they can save significant amounts of money and get exactly what they want. So that you can benefit in a like manner, MC talked with retailers and artists who are as familiar with the online world as they are with the instore scene.

OUR BANDMATE JUST TOLD YOU that a new Web site is offering tremendous bargains on music gear and you're tempted to log right on! But are these cyber offers something you should take advantage of, or should you simply use them to get a better deal offline, at an actual music store? Once again the World Wide Web has expanded the marketplace and opened the way for smart musicians, who use it wisely, to benefit greatly if they make the right choices.

With competition for an artist's dollars at an all time high, music retailers are finding new and dazzling ways to entice a sale, including Web sites. Online, you can find slashed discounts, matched prices, grey market vendors, auction sites and sale sites devoted exclusively to bargain table sales of instruments and equipment. In fact, some of these sites are selling musical products just slightly above cost. Of course, you have to realize that it's not quite the same in cyberspace as it is in the real world, since there are risks involved that you have to consider when making any online purchase.

# THE CYBERSPACE MARKETPLACE

Nearly every manufacturer of musical instruments and equipment has a Web site up and running. Even most of your neighborhood retail dealers have sites that may offer "online only specials." Everyone, it seems, is into e-commerce these days and the beneficiary is the musician. It's like having your own personal electronic catalog delivered right into your home. Some of the sites will even remember your name and greet you when you revisit them.

As you sit and comparison shop until your eyes turn red and your computer screen starts to blur, what you will find are some pretty good deals, a few remarkable ones and quite a few that will save you hundreds of dollars in sales tax. Many of these deals are presented via attractive, full-color images.

But not every musician wants to buy a picture. "Instruments and amps are just too personal and no two sound alike," insists John Zell, bass player for L.A.-based band Francesca & The Flames. "I like to feel it and hear it before I buy it and you can't do that online. Maybe if it was a Signature Series or a vintage piece of equipment, then it might be different if you purchased it just to add to a collection. But I need to know what a bass sounds like before I use it for a performance or play it on a recording."

Zell certainly isn't alone in his desire to see it, feel it and hear it, because there are too many variations between handmade instruments. Jeff Sazant, General Manager of the Guitar Center in Hollywood, maintains, "It's a personal and subjective choice. If the product is 'tactile' it's usually one that a musician will want to experience and handle. If an instrument has unique qualities and sounds they'll want to come into the store so that they can feel it and hear it."

But according to Greg Carter, Marketing Director for Musicians Friend, there are plenty of others who will buy gear without the need to touch it. "We founded our company with catalog sales over 17 years ago and have been online for a little over four years. We found that musicians will buy instruments and equipment if you give them enough good information, a great selection and good prices."

While it's true that those are the things

most musicians look for when buying musical gear, the same approach doesn't work for everyone. "A couple years ago, several manufacturers tried to sell their products directly online to cut out the retail dealers," says Glenn Noyes, Drum Manager at West L.A. Music. "It didn't work because the artists wanted to talk with someone about it. They had questions that needed answers and they wanted to hear what it sounded like. But," Noyes states, "if you're selling a 'box' of electronics, accessories or a software package you can probably find plenty of potential customers on the Web."

Indeed, there are some retailers who maintain that both electronic equipment and software sales will be entirely Internet-based in the very near future. "Eventually," Brad Hagen, Audio Manager for Sam Ash believes, "the Net will control software and electronics sales. In three to five years, the Internet will be the main outlet for those products, complete with tech support and everything you need to make them work."

However, Guitar Center's Sazant contends, "Not all artists are connected to the Internet, or are satisfied with an impersonal purchase. There are those who like to come into a store for the human connection. They want to have an association and relationship with a dealer so that they have someone they can talk to, ask questions of and help them out with any problems they might have."

West L.A.'s Noyes agrees, "It's all about customer relations. That's a very important aspect of our service. We know all of our customers by name and greet them when they come in. We want to know what's happening in their lives, how their band is doing and how things are going for them. You won't get that online."

# WHO HAS THE BEST DEALS?

But, in the end, will price determine who makes the sale? Sometimes it's awfully hard to pass up some of the discounts you see online. "All customers want value," says Sazant, "but in today's marketplace, on- or offline, that's fairly simple to find because

Vendors' on the Internet," claims Sazant, ("Grey Market Vendors" refers to people who are not authorized dealers of specific brands) "and there's nothing to back them up. If you have a problem with a product you bought from them, you could have a serious problem trying to get it corrected."

In that regard, Noyes relates, "A few years ago there was a guy who operated a

tomers had problems which he either could not — or would not — respond to.

But there is a way to use the prices you find online to your benefit, if they are legitimate. Most of the retailers contacted will match the lowest price you bring to them. Noah Clark, of the L.A. band Organik, likes to look for electronic products at retail stores first, "To see the product and compare

the market has a way of leveling itself out. And unless dealers can match their competitors' price, they won't compete for very long." But, some Internet sites offer such great deals they're tough for anyone to pass up.

However, it seems that the old adage, "If it's too good to be true, it probably isn't!" applies to cyberspace as well as the real world. "There are quite a few 'Grey Market

Web site out of his house. He took the orders online, took the customers' money, called the manufacturer and had them deliver it directly to the buyer. Naturally there was no real dealer who could match his price since he had no overhead and sold the products for just a few bucks over cost." Noyes reports that the gravy train stopped for the grey marketer when cus-

prices. Then I'll go online and see if I can beat it," he says.

Another factor Clark uses when negotiating a purchase price is the sales tax. "There are many states that have no sales tax at all and that alone can save you hundreds of dollars." In fact, Noyes explains, "Sales tax is a biggie! Many times a musician will buy something out of our store and have it

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When Clark has calculated his final figure, minus the tax, he'll go back to the stores he knows and talk to them about it. "If they can match my best price, I'll buy from them. If they can't," he relates, "I'll buy it online."

Other musicians use the Internet as a primary step towards their purchase. Nick Mc-Donald of the Brit-rock band, Climb, likes to visit e-bay.com, an auction site, to see if they have what he's looking for. "I've gotten some great deals there," he asserts, "and even if I don't buy anything I get a good idea of the current market value."

# IT'S BROKEN AND CAN'T GET FIXED

Every musician has had the experience, at one time or another, where something doesn't work. You just bought a brand new rig and it blows out at your first gig, or your new guitar won't hold a tune, your Midi won't program right, your synthesizer won't do what you want it to — if it's not one thing it's another. Well, when those things occur it's nice to know whether or not the seller will exchange it or fix the product.

With real world retailers there shouldn't be any problem returning the item and having them take care of it. And the same terms generally apply if you buy off their Web site and have to return it to their store. But problems could occur if you buy from a site that

Pelletier (Cyber Music columnist for Music Connection magazine), says, "I use the recycler.com, an online site for a regional paper, to check out prices. It's the first step to see what stuff is worth and what is available." And, he says, you could get a jump on other buyers since the online ads are published before the paper is distributed.

Both Clark and Pelletier also check out the manufacturer's Web site to see the specs and use of the gear, which they say is a lot more informative than going into a store because there are too many new products for most sales reps to keep up with.

Pelletier further maintains, "If the product is foolproof, like some electronic equipment or an accessory, where one is just like another, there is no difference between buying online or off. And," he adds, "many times the store doesn't stock a product and has to order anyway. So, you should try to get the best price you can, wherever that is."

Just as Clark does, Pelletier also uses his online research to barter with dealers on the final purchase price of any item he wants. "After checking around I discovered that I could get a mic I wanted for much less than the asking price at my retail dealer. So, I walked in and said, 'If you can match it, I'll buy more than one.'" That tactic got Pelletier a \$200 microphone for a little over \$80.

doesn't have an outlet to go to, or simply doesn't respond to your request. In fact, not one cyber vendor (who existed solely online) responded or agreed to be interviewed for this article even though it meant publicity for them. That sort of non-responsiveness could cause major headaches for you, not to mention damage to your pocketbook.

Carter of Musicians Friend recommends, "Check out the company you want to order from and make sure they have the longevity to provide service 'after the sale.' You should have access to service reps (look for 24-hour availability), which tends to be the biggest problem with most Internet operations."

Indeed, it's a good idea to see if there's any infrastructure set up that will provide service should a problem occur. In fact, it is simple, common sense to check out the background and track record of any vendor you're buying a major purchase from. "Because," according to Carter, "with such a passion-oriented product as a musical instrument or a piece of equipment, no human interaction between buyer and seller will make a good price a bad sale no matter what you paid for it."

Sam Ash's Hagen adds to that caveat, "You better know what you want if you buy online and what you'll do if the sale goes bad, because in most cases there won't be

# THE INTERNET IS CALLING

Every music dealer contacted for this piece has a Web site, though not all of them are selling products on it. West L.A.'s Noyes confirms, "Rather than complaining about all the competition on the Internet, we decided to join them. The Internet is the wave of the future and we, in the real world, have to deal with that."

Nevertheless, Hagen reveals, "Many of the larger retailers don't put much emphasis on Web site sales. They don't see it as a necessity or a viable alternative for their marketing. They believe that most musicians want to personally handle their product before they buy it; and unless you're a professional player you probably won't have enough information to make an informed purchase by yourself."

But there are musicians who use the Internet as an educational and research tool, which gets them good deals. Buying online is a lot like buying a pair of pants without trying them on. "But," says Pelletier, with strings, accessories and electronic equipment, you could do very well and not have to worry too much about any major differences. And for the more important purchases, there's nothing like a little homework to get you the best deal possible."

As for the dealers, Glenn Noyes has some sage advice, "The Internet is not going to go away! You can't just ignore it. And why should we? After all, it opens up our marketplace tremendously. We have customers from all over the world who can purchase from us without having to come into the store. And for those artists who might live in an out-of-the-way place, it's the only access they might have. The World Wide Web has opened up a door for everyone, dealers and musicians alike. We just have to learn how to use it in the right way."

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# **DJ Sasha**

# Riding the Trance-Atlantic Express

J Sasha is giving new meaning to the word jetsetter, or for that matter, jet lag. How this artist is capable of being a superstar DJ in every time zone is amazing. He will spin an all-night party in London, then board a trans-Atlantic flight to do the same in New York City, after which he'll trek to Mexico City, Houston, not to mention a brief stop at Hollywood's Palace, where his set runs from 6-10 a.m.!

It's no wonder, then, that on the eve of the Palace gig, when an interview with him is set up for 5 p.m. PST, he is only just waking up. However, at 4 a.m. on show night the crowd outside the Palace stretched all the way down Vine Street and wrapped around the corner onto Hollywood

Boulevard. What is it about this DJ that had L.A. – Ecstasy kids as well as suits and media mavens — out of bed and on their feet at four in the morning?

DJ Sasha (a.k.a. Alexander Cox) is perhaps the higgest of

Coe) is perhaps the biggest of the "Superstar DJs" to emerge from Europe's burgeoning progressive scene. Originally from North Wales and inspired by Manchester's Hacienda (the famous club that housed talents such as Paul Oakenfold), Sasha, along with friend and set partner John Digweed, is creating new forms of dance tracks that are nothing less than mesmerizing. He not only pushes the envelope of sounds yet to be heard on the dance floor, but he is also reviving music from our not-so-distant past

As early as four years ago, saying the word "trance" to describe one's music became as cheesy as saying "disco" in the Eighties.

Now elements of Trance are back under the banner of "progressive." Call it progressive-techno or progressive-house, Sasha does not spin your played-out ravers' kind of trance. "It's a much deeper thing than trance," he insists. "Trance is just so formularized, you know, it's so obvious what's going to happen; it's build-ups, breakdowns, drum rolls, and they all seem to use the same keyboard sounds." Instead, he has updated the genre by taking it out of its musical bubble, admitting that he's "really influenced by the way the breakbeat DJs have evolved."

Flying all over the world playing records might sound exciting, but it's also taxing, especially if you are the type of DJ who also has a need to express creative urges in the studio. "The two careers that I have running conflict with each other quite a lot," says Sasha, who, while there is exhaustion in his voice, will not be derailed from his inspired agenda. In fact, Sasha has found a way to bring what he does in the DJ box into the studio, as if what he does live in a club is the creative impetus for his studio work. With his regular gigs at one of New York's club Twilo, his response to the crowd's reaction to him has direct ramifications when he's creating new wax tracks. In fact, Sasha says his marathon sets at Twilo sparked his new EP *Xpander* (named after the Oberheim Expander, one of the many vintage synths in Sasha's arsenal). "A lot of the really amazing clubs seem to have a sound that really works," he notes. "There are certain records, or certain build-ups and breakdowns that work well in Twilo."

One might consider it terribly self-aware, but Sasha gives the folks what they want as he tailors his effort to the venue. It also unifies him as a performer and musician, because, as he says, it's "the journey as a DJ" and "the places that you could take somebody when they're on the dance floor for a long period of time," that is his ultimate inspiration when creating original music.

It is a new era for the superstar DJ, and as Sasha puts it, "The crowds have become much more aware of who's DJing nowadays than, say, five or six years ago." More than ever, DJs are being treated like rock stars. As much as Sasha wants to be known, however, don't expect him to come out centerstage playing air guitar. "It's a mental battle I have with myself, really. I want people to be aware of me and what I'm doing, but at the same time I don't want to be wearing a shirt with flashing lights on it."

# Crossover Rock That Penetrates

ngland's Delirious? is a Christian-influenced, Brit-pop band presently touring in support of *Mezzamorphis*, their maiden release on Virgin Records. Their music is reminiscent of early U2 and has much of the raw vitality of Radiohead. With a new label and an impressive new record on the market, these guys are ready for the mainstream.

"We signed a deal with EMI and Sparrow [Records], which serves the Christian market in the U.S.," says keyboardist Tim Jupp. "Part of the deal was that we wanted an agreement in the U.S. which had an opening to the mainstream. We didn't want a deal with just a Christian label. We needed to know that we had a mainstream vehicle because both marketplaces are important in the U.S. Virgin and Sparrow are both owned by EMI. They set us up with Virgin and we're really excited about it."

The rise of Delirious? to semi-stardom echoes advice often heard in the music industry: develop a fan base and the labels will follow. "We released our first album, *King of Fools*, in the U.K. in 1997," Jupp explains. "We toured a lot and built up our fan base. We released several singles and since then we've had three in the Top 20. That's by and large due to our fan base. Following the success of our singles, people in the industry came onboard."

In 1992 the band spearheaded the Cutting Edge festival, which attracted the attention of many listeners in a relatively sparse English layout. "That was a monthly event we put on for people in our area," Jupp says. "It drew about 1,300 kids per month and for the south coast of Eng-

land that's quite significant."

Delirious? eventually released several EPs to accompany the festival shows, aptly entitled *Cutting Edge One through Four*. "They're kind of new for people here, but a bit older for us. It's been a bit of a catching up process for people in America, But we've sold about 170,000 of the *Cutting Edge CDs* with Sparrow in the U.S."

Ironically, being classified as a "Christian rock" band has been a help and a hindrance to the band. The propensity to classify groups is fundamentally human and the music industry is not above such categorization. On one hand, without its Christian fan base Delirious? might not be where they are today; and now, because of the Christian element they're having trouble finding space on the airwaves. "We just see ourselves as a band out there trying to write great music and we just happen to be Christians," Jupp says. "I think often you get tagged with this label of 'Christian band,' which is a little strange for us because if you're a Christian fireman you don't get labeled a Christian fireman. A lot of our songs have that kind of focus because that's who we are."

It is clear from the band's recent U.S. tour, which included a sold-out, headlining show at L.A.'s Wiltern Theatre, that for a relatively unknown act this group seems to be doing something right. "We've been received well," Jupp says. "What we're trying to do now is encourage the media to come along. Obviously, radio is such a key thing in America."

Delirious? has a striking sound and catchy, radio-ready hooks, but will their Christian message keep them from getting heard? "We feel as a band that we can make a difference in whatever platform we get to play on and that's what we want," Jupp says. "Everybody does what they're called to do."

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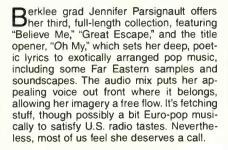

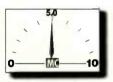

# **DEMO SUBMISSION GUIDELINES**

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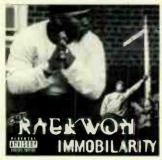

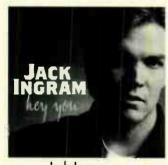

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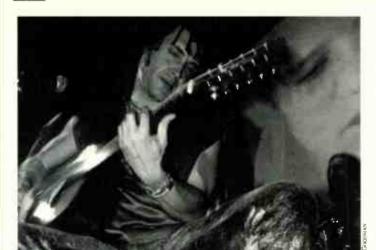

Material: A short acoustic set of what are supposed to be pluggedin rockers, Twisted Roots' songs are interminable one- and two-riff takes on roots rock and power-pop that leaves this disgruntled listener unsettled. Without any key, melody, or dynamic change, the songs all sound pretty much the same throughout. On a good note, if you like one tune, you'll probably like them all.

Ebs sings like David Lee Roth in his lower register and Gary Cherone from Extreme in the upper. His voice isn't bad, just somewhat dated. The playing is solid but, unfortunately, the songwriting is weak, particularly the lyrical content, which seems to fall into unoriginal river beds laced with depressive imagery and lazy phonet-

Musicianship: Twisted Roots are strong, energetic, technically assured players. They fall together well and complement one another, from the percussion's syncopated pop to Ebs' confident vocals. The only fault was the singer's distracting, off-key whistling in several songs, which acted as jarring bumps that derailed the fluidity of the compositions. Still, this is a tight and attentive rocking quartet with a familiar fire in its belly.

Performance: The band drew a nice-sized group of enthusiastic

listeners, though the majority of the crowd seemed to be made up of friends and well-wishers. Ebs's stage prattle, however, seemed overtly aggressive and at times inappropriate and very archaic. At one point, Ebs commented, "There's a lot more beautiful women than I've seen in a long time here tonight." Greeted with silence, he repeated the statement, then added, "Hey, you're s'posed to acknowledge that." As expected. few did and that about summed up the cultural gender transitions between what was and what is no longer considered coal from the rock & roll stage anymore.

Summary: Twisted Roots is what happens when a rock band with impressive musicianship does not take the time to deliver contemporary material. Still, this band has chops - now it's up to the songwriter to write songs worthy of his musicians.

# **Jody Whitesides**

Material: Jody Whitesides has a typical alternative rock sound that has been heard a hundred times before. A generic version of the Goo Goo Dolls, their music is full and pleasant, but lacks the intangible essence that grabs your soul and hooks you. The lyrics addressed significant topics such as time travel, the digital age and how man has lessened God's vision of the universe, but the attempt to make profound statements about them was hampered by simplistic insights and trite poetry. As a result the songs missed their mark and had little emotional impact.

Musicianship: This group is comprised of competent musicians who have adopted a contemporary sound by mixing electronic samples with organic instruments. Instead of giving them an edge, however, this technique made them sound ordinary and derivative. Whitesides and Hellstrom shared revolving leads which worked well for them and Roberts' drumming kept the group in sync, making them proficient players with good potential. There was nothing that stood out enough, however, to make them unique.

Performance: While playing well enough as a group, a lack of personal interaction between the players, coupled with a total lack of energy, ensured that involvement from the crowd was not forthcoming. Perhaps more movement onstage would have helped them inspire the crowd as well as each

Summary: Jody Whitesides is an alternative rock band comprised of decent musicians who are hampered by lackluster material. Because of their inability to produce distinctive signature hooks, unfortunately, they come off sounding like so many other bands whose shortage of originality separates them from the leaders of the pack.

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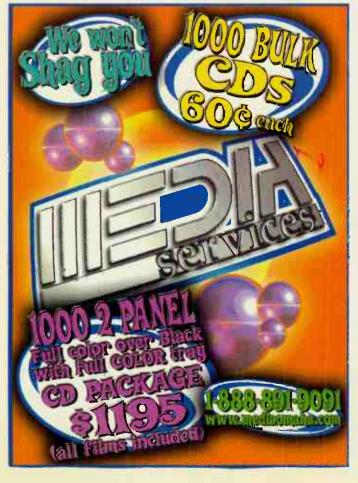

# Lumirova

The Players: Ween, lead vocals; Evan, lead guitar: Aldo, guitar, keyboards, samples; Scott, bass; Mick, drums.

Material: Playing moody trip rock, Lumirova are alternative technopunks who like to mess with your mind as much as tonality. This group weaves some of the strangest noises you've ever heard into a tapestry of sound that creates dizzying effects that left conflicting results with the crowd. Lumirova's penchant for playing dissonant chords while lead singer, Ween, sings slightly off-key clearly appeals to some in the audience while distracting others.

Lumirova's music has a punklike attitude, as if they were rebelling against the very concept of tonality; and though proper pitch wasn't obviously essential to their music, it appeared that a dark perspective certainly was. Most of their songs had a somber, foreboding feel about them. If you're looking for something vastly different than the usual fare, you might find this band to your liking.

Musicianship: This is a good group of players with Evan and Aldo supplying the foundation for all the musical experimentation. With samples, voices, guitars and even a transistor radio blaring at this gig, they managed to keep it all in check, giving the songs a rather restricted alterna-rock structure. Filling in the sound as well as propelling it, Scott and Mick kept up rhythmically, using beats that came from samples and loops as well as their own instruments. On top of this curious, cacophonious wall of trippy sounds, Ween contributed effectively pungent vocals that were off-key as much as the music was off-center.

Performance: Ween is effective as a singer because her stage persona is so strong. Engaging, sinuous and sexy, she could have sang the yellow pages and the audience would have loved her. Her bandmates, however, were not quite up to her level of intensity and simply appeared to be drones in the shadows, with no interaction between themselves or with the crowd. That wasn't necessarily a bad thing with this sort of ambient music, but it added nothing to spark it either.

Summary: Lumirova are alternative punks in trip-rock trappings, and they certainly have a loyal fan base. This gig started over two hours late (through no fault of their own) and they still kept the crowd. Their music may not be for everyone, but they are offering something different from the norm, with atonal songs that will challenge your expectations.

Material: Tribe of Gypsies could be the act that breaks through the paralysis in the music industry to become the next hot band out of the L.A. scene. With Santana recently garnering 10 Grammy nominations, TOG may be in the Zeitgeist at the right place and the right time to get the kind of recognition they deserve. Their Santanalike blues are soulful, smooth and sensual without sacrificing the rock & roll edge that embodies the material. Their songs have a salsa flavor and a hard rock demeanor that deliver on every level, with the only weakness being an occasional and unnecessary - Seventies influenced riff.

Musicianship: TOG is a well-seasoned band, having just returned from touring South America. Their level of play is phenomenal, encompassing both technique and passion. Roy Z integrated rock, blues and salsa styles, arriving at a unique Rock en Espanol sound. Rodriguez supplied a distinct R&B feel to the music while Balladares pumped out world rock backbeats, giving the songs soulful support. Behind them, the rhythm section of Perez and Ingraham created a solid wall of hard rock tempos that urged your whole body to move. Analla's vocals had a range and holding power to die for, as he sang with the sweetest, purest and strongest voice heard since AxI Rose was at the top of his game. Performance: This group filled the club to capacity and had everyone

dancing in a frenzy. There was so much heat in their performance it scorched everyone. Singer Greg Analla reached out while standing atop a monitor, causing the crowd to swoon beneath him as they strained to touch his hand; Roy Z stepped up and created a stampede to his side of the stage. Emotions and passions built to such an extent that you could practically taste the hormones in the air

Summary: This is a group that has borrowed from the best of rock and salsa and has incorporated their influences into the contemporary Latin crossover market. Tribe of Gypsies has it all and they blow you away with their dynamic stage show. Industry representatives are encouraged to check out this act.

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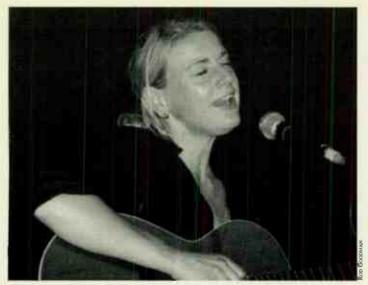

# Anouschka

The Players: Anouschka, vocals, guitar; Allen Hinds, guitar; Arno Lucas, percussion.

Material: Anouschka writes about lost love, broken hearts, and the bad blood that is born when the bottle runs dry. She plays crystalclear, AC, Rickie Lee Jones-style lounge pop with country/folk/ torch blues ballads. At times reminiscent of a female Shawn Mullins, her vocals are good (think an older Jewel), but the sliding guitar lines and leads are fine, particularly on the slower songs. The songs are good, sturdy compositions, nicely arranged - but they somehow lack the ineffable spark that makes a song great.

Musicianship: Anouschka's voice is good, but she needs to learn how to back off a microphone when she sings louder. She's an accomplished guitar player who uses chromatic chord changes, subtle underscoring, and lots of surprising dynamics that homogenize her airy compositions.

Anouschka really wants to be a singer, and she is a solid vocalist, but she should develop the wonderfut voice she gives her guitar. Allen Hinds on lead guitar was outstanding, draping the songs with soft, taffy-like embellishments. solos, and counter-melodies. Arno Lucas's percussive contributions blended in so well with the compositions that they threatened to go unnoticed.

Performance: A personable performer, Anouschka will only benefit from more gigs. Her stage banter consists of flowery, off-centered polemics that are at odds with her low-key stage presence. Because this was a folk-style, acoustic show, the trio just sat and played. Arouschka seemed a bit nervous at first but loosened up as the set got rolling. A small, but enthusiastic, audience applauded loudly after each song.

Summary: Anouschka is a likable singer. Her songwriting produces crystalline, jazzy torch tunes that could be better, and probably will get better with time. She's a strong vocalist, but a surprisingly fine, subtle acoustic guitarist who really should check out the ways her guitar can aid and abet her voice. With her current backing band, in a year or so, Anouschka could be an AC favorite.

Material: Widget is a rock noir act that can best be described as a cross between the Doors and the Chemical Brothers. Their material has an updated *Strange Days* feel for the new millennium. This genrebending music blenos eras and decades, with influences from the Sixties, Seventies and Nineties evident in almost every song.

This group has taken on the challenge of assimilating several different styles into one coherent sound and they've managed to meet the task rather well. Their songs are strong in structure, though you couldn't hear the lyrics very well.

Musicianship: An excellent group of musicians, Widget interwove homemade samples effectively into their music, using short bursts from television programs, wailing sirens and commercials. Their musical style was on the hard rock side, but had the techno sense of glam. The players built a wall of sound that didn't differentiate the instruments but did give the music a larger-than-life feel. Bates's vocals were eerily like Jim Morrison's in timbre and range, which added to the spaciousness of the music. This band created a musical ambience in the room that was as palatable as it was inviting.

Performance: There was an odd vibe created by Widget and most of it came from lead singer and frontman, Bates. It was as if the group was isolated from the rest of the room and the people in the audience were simply voyeurs at a peep show. Absolutely no attempt was made to connect with the crowd, especially by Bates; but rather than turning the audience off it seemed to draw them in. Part of the reason was that Widget put on a great show without the need for audience interaction. You couldn't help but wonder, though, how much better it all might have been had they simply acknowledged the crowd's presence.

Summary: Widget is a unique band in both their music and their presentation. Their rock noir style liberates rather than restricts them, while their techno-glam grace inhibits their accessibility. Widget is onto something that could make them the retro-darlings of the techno-glam set and, if they continue to improve, could find success sooner than later.

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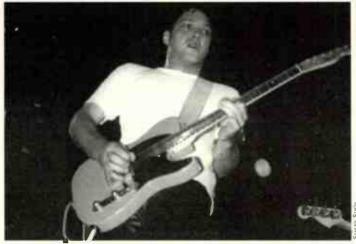

The Players: Shawn Davis, lead vocals, guitar; Rick Berthod, lead guitar; Gregg Buchwalter, keys, back-up vocals; Coy Garcia, bass, back-up vocals; Mike Petted, drums.

Material: The Road came out hard and fast with a fistful of country rock songs that sounded an awful lot like the Band. They had a real feel for this kind of material and instilled it with a passionate intensity that made its mark on the crowd. But then they alternated various styles of music into their show, including Fifties pop songs, and continued to bounce back and forth between country-rock, pop and even world-rock in what seemed like a never ending search for an identity.

This band was strongest, by far, in the country rock vein but they chose to show their versatility rather than connect with any signature style. This might have been an impressive display from an artist's point of view, but it left most of the audience wondering who this band really was.

Musicianship: The musicianship was top quality for a band that felt more like a houseband than a showcasing act. Their jams were tight and solid while their solos soared. Berthod was especially noteworthy with a blues-rock style that gave the music a harder edge than your typical country rock while Buchwalter's keys added that Southern rock flavor.

The other members were always right on with the ever changing styles and never lost their tightness. Davis's vocals had a warmth and intimacy to them that supported the songs, making the performance one that drew the crowd into the music.

Performance: This was an extremely strong area for the Road. Their connection with a jaded Hollywood crowd was awesome. At one point they even had the room clapping their hands over their heads in a display that was so rare it took your breath away. That reaction was even more impressive when you consider that this was not some familiar houseband, but rather a group that doesn't play out

Summary: This is an act that is close to its goal, but needs to focus a bit more to nail its vision. When they finally decide who they are and what direction they want to go, the Road will be a band that should create quite a buzz.

# Balm

Material: Balm is a modern rock band with quirky songs and a seemingly haphazard approach to their music. Songs like "I Feel Like Van Morrison Ona, Ona Bad Acid" pretty much says it all. Their lyrics seem to be random streams of consciousness - poetic and intellectually exciting, but a little on the screwy side.

Their rhythms are short, fast and choppy as are the songs themselves with lightening fast finishes that bring you to a frenzied peak and stop - just before you exhale — catching the audience, more than once, in mid-breath. This group was so strange they walked a fine line between a novelty act and a serious cult favorite, consolidating both worlds into a kaleidoscope of sounds that entertained and challenged you.

Musicianship: This group can play, and it was especially noticeable with all the rhythm and tempo changes their songs went through. For the seemingly unstructured

material they did, this band was amazingly tight and always focused. At times Fay's vocals and phrasing were so like David Bowie that if you closed your eyes you'd swear that Ziggy Stardust was onstage. Meanwhile, Arnold, a demon on guitar, sounded like Ray Davies one moment and David Gilmour the next, with the rhythm section of Guecia and Benton supplying the ever changing meterperfect tempos.

Balm possesses what the industry always asks for, the talent, energy and emotion of rock legends combined with a contemporary edge that speaks to today's audience.

Performance: This was a high energy performance, not so much from the players' movement, but rather from the intensity of their music. By employing antics such as using a megaphone to distort his voice, Fay did whatever it took to give the music a unique edge, but he had a tendency to rush things a little too much and would have been more effective had he occasionally downshifted to allow the audience a moment to savor a response. In fact, the pace of the whole set was always one step ahead of your thoughts.

Summary: Balm's quirky style, exceptional talent and abnormal skew on life provided an evening of entertainment that only comes along once in a blue moon, leaving a Hollywood crowd asking, "Who

are these guys?
