

The Record World Rocked To Its Very Soul in '67

R&R Albums and R&B in General Among Year's Success Stories

A lot went on in the music industry this past year.

In the way of trends there were any number of notable develoments — and counter-developments. For instance, first there was the influence of drugs on teen music (e.g., the thread of LSD-talk through the Beatles' "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band") and then there was the sudden disavowal of drugs (e.g., the Beatles' swearing off the stuff and Donovan's stand against their use).

And then there was that proliferation of long, long singles at the end of the summer. Things like Bobbie Gentry's over-four minutes "Ode to Billie Joe" and the Doors' oversix minutes "Light My Fire."

The counter - development here was that radio stations put their turntables down and said nothing doing over 3:30 unless it's already in the Top 20. Almost from that date, the long record had had it.

Rock Art

This past year was the year of the emergence of the rock album as an important art form. In fact, the increasing legitimacy of rock might be the trend story of the year. As all things, the development can

be traced back easily to Capitol's "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band," from continuing trendsetters, the Beatles. The response to this album, most notably from the press reviewers, was overwhelming and even over-intellectualized. Although it was not really the first time the Beatles had tried something extensive on albums, the scene-watchers felt it was since the diverse ditties on the album were bracketed by a set-piece song.

Albums of a Piece

And the next thing, everybody was creating albums of a piece—concepts, not entities, as the Rolling Stones put it recently. And spending increasing time and money in the recording studios. And taking sabbaticals to give the muse a break.

Among the results of this emphasis on albums were that radio stations started playing many more album cuts than had been previously the case. And this resulted in more singles being released out of albums than had previously been the case.

Groups experimenting in newer ideas became the cynosure of all companies and the recipients of unprecedented advance monies.

In San Francisco, where there suddenly seemed to be more groups starting out, a new sensibility emerged — Flower Music, which was no more and no less than a catchall title for love-spouting groups making new music. Other generic words that were in constant use to describe the people were "hippies," "psychedelic," "love."

Because at one point many groups were calling their music "psychedelic," the connotative confusion with drugs coagulated, and in the spring there was a rash of scares over insidious lyric contents. Some stations were worried that, unbeknownst to them, rock and roll songs might be proselytizing for drugs in one form or another. (Indeed there was basis in fact, because certain groups

were admitting to the use of drugs and/or marijuana.)

And there was even a resurrection of such ditties as "Yes, We Have No Bananas," when word suddenly spread that frying banana peels and smoking the remains caused an hallucinogenic stimulation.

Mysticism Contemplated

As December rolled around, however, fascination with drug and with non-addictive musical translations seemed to be fading as a new interest, again a new enterprise fostered by the Beatles, grew—mysticism, the allure of the contemplative life. The focus of attention was Indian mystic Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, who cut his own album for World Pacific and appeared on the back cover of the new Donovan album package, among other honors.

Rhythm and blues was an important commodity in the 1967 market. Without question the girl singer of the year was r/b proponent Aretha Franklin. who under the supervision of Atlantic's Jerry Wexler, cut a number of million-selling singles and albums. Other r/b artists-many of them from Atlantic/Atco, Tamla/Motown, Jewel/Paula — clicked heavily. R/b became increasingly successful overseas as well. The Stax/Volt artists, Sam and Dave, Arthur Conley and the late Otis Redding staged wellattended tours.

(Unfortunately television prime time exposure has remained elusive to most Negro artists, a situation Record World deplored in a series of editorials recently.)

Hollywood Goes Rock

This past year, more than previously, Hollywood looked at rock for background sounds and title songs, and the songs were frequently successful, such that the impending Oscar race, for the first time in many years, may include more than one tune that reached the top 10—the Supremes' "The Happening," Lulu's "To Sir, With Love," both of which were highly-successful.

A number of other sound-tracks were important, too. Decca started the year with the blockbuster Julie Andrews tracker, "Thoroughly Modern Millie." The year is closing with the release of "Doctor Dolittle," which, along with "Valley of the Dolls," gives 20th Century-Fox two big soundtrack packages. UA's "A Man and A Woman" also broke records during the year.

The usual unusual novelties sparked the year also. Politicians Adam Clayton Powell and Everett Dirksen waved for Jubilee and Capitol, respectively.

Comedy Resurgence

Comedy also made a resurgence on records. The butt of much of the political humor was Lyndon Johnson, although Robert Kennedy came in for his share of knocks, too. Cameo / Parkway's "Hardly Report," Worthit Atlantic/ "Lyndon Atco's Johnson's Lonely Hearts Club Band" and "Here Comes the Bird" were among the political funnies pulled by the industry.

Merger Fever

Aside from what went on in the grooves, a number of things went on around them. Merger fever hit the industry and hasn't subsided yet. Gulf and Western bought Dot; Seven Arts bought Warner Bros., becoming Warner Bros.-Seven Arts, which, in turn, bought Atlantic; Uni bought Kapp; Trans-America bought United Artists.

Independent producers multiplied also, as indicated by Record World's recent independent producers issue. And a new trend grew out of the increasing importance of the indie producer. Labels inaugurated subsidiary labels with indies. Lou Adler's Ode for Columbia, Jeff Barry's Steed for Dot, Bob Crewe's Dyno-Voice for Dot and Koppelman-Rubin's Hot Bisquit Disc Company for Capitol are just a few of the highly-capitalized new labels that have appeared in the recent months.

In other words, the industry, as always, digested new ideas in its forward march in time.

Wall Street Journal Confirms Record World's Stand On Fan Mags' 'Jim Crow'

During the past summer, Record World published a series of editorials attacking the exclusion of Negro artists in the pages of the national teen fan magazines. We received from the magazines several letters, some challenging our attack, some agreeing that the situation was indeed sad (without mentioning any effort they might make to correct it) and some promising revisions in their editorial policy, with specific articles mentioned. That was last summer.

This winter (the winter of our continuing discontent), a major article appeared in the Dec. 14, 1967, issue of the Wall Street Journal on teenage magazines. A separately boxed item in the story is significant. The headline reads "Negroes Rarely Appear in Teen-Age Magazines." The item goes on to detail the attitudes of certain magazines toward Negro artists, and contains the astounding line, "White teenyboppers don't idolize Negro pop music stars." That isn't the impression we got when we heard the screams for the Four Tops last week when they appeared on the "Tonight" show (one of the few network variety shows that books R & B acts—and there's another discontent of ours).

It certainly isn't the impression an objective observer

would get by sitting in the audience of a James Brown concert at Madison Square Garden, or at summer R & B festivals in New York or on the West Coast.

The story goes on to detail several attitudes towards Negro performers and fashion models by various magazines. We refrain from printing them here because they are, we think, in poor taste. Readers so interested may find the article on Page 34 of the Journal if they would like to partake of entrenched inertia.

Encouraging, Distressing

The Wall Street Journal's confirmation of Record World's stand on the Jim Crowism of fan magazines is at the same time encouraging and distressing. Encouraging by virtue of a powerful and influential newspaper taking up the cause, and distressing because of the revelations the article makes about settled dust—which has settled, in some cases, exactly where it was before.

There has been, in all fairness, some improvement in the fan magazines' attitude towards R & B acts and the space they are given. But there is always room for improvement. We intend to continue providing the editorial room in Record World to give that improvement momentum.

RCA's Racusin NARM Keynote Speaker

(NARM), to be held March 17 through March 22, 1968, at the Diplomat Hotel in Hollywood, Fla.

In celebration of the Association's 10th Anniversary, the theme of the convention is "NARM's Golden Decade, Volume II"

Racusin's Keynote Address will highlight the Opening Business Session of the convention (Monday, March 18), and set the convention course. An anticipated audience of more than 800 will make this the largest single gathering of phonograph record and tape industry executives ever to assemble together.

Transcontinental Acquires Recordwagon of Boston

NEW YORK — Transcontinental Investing Corporation announced last week it has agreed to acquire Recordwagon, Inc., a Boston-based phonograph record distributor and service organization with annual sales in excess of \$20 million generated by operations in 20 states East of the Mississippi River.

Robert K. Lifton, President of TIC, noted that this was the second acquisition move made by his company into the record distribution business in the past five days. Joint volume for the two firms is over \$40 million

The previous week, Trancontinental announced its agree-

ment to acquire Tip Top Record Service, Inc., another record distributing firm with sales over \$20 million, headquartered in California and operating in 24 states West of Chicago.

The total purchase price involved in both transactions will be in excess of \$10 million in TIC stock.

Like Tip Top, Recordwagon not only distributes records, but also handles musical instruments, tapes, tape cartridges and related automobile equipment to play the cartridges. Cecil Steen, President of Recordwagon, will remain as head of the new Transcontinental subsidiary.



ABC's Newton Re - aligns **Consolidated Distribs**

President of ABC Records, announces a re-alignment of Consolidated Distributors, Inc., effective Jan. 1, whereby Lou Lavinthal is promoted to President of the organization and its subsidiaries which include 11 branches of New Deal Record Corp. throughout the nation, as well as Billinis Distributing Co. The ABC Records subsidiaries involved are rack jobbing and one-stop operations,

Lavinthal was upped to his new title from that of Executive Vice-President of CDI. At the same time, Newton announced that Al Levine, formerly Vice-President of New Deal, is promoted to Executive Vice-President of the aligned CDI.

Although based in Seattle, Wash., Lavinthal will spend a considerable amount of time in New York where he will report directly to Newton, President of CDI's parent firm who will also remain on CDI's board of directors. Plans for continued expansion of CDI and its subsidiaries will be on the agenda

'Levine Invaluable'

Newton stated, "Consolidated Distributors, Inc., and its subsidiaries are so active and represent such a vast complex, that I feel the necessity of turning over the immediate responsibility for its operations to someone who will be able to devote his full time to its detailed functions. I'm pleased to name Lou Lavinthal to this post. I also am secure in the knowledge that Al Levine will be invaluable in the administration of CDI."

Consolidated Distributors. Inc., upheld the reputation of its vast scope by reporting combined sales at this year's end of 32 million dollars.

Lavinthal, in commenting on the future of the CDI organization, predicted a considerable increase in sales based on a number of circumstances including the re-alignment of the tremendous consumer interest in pre-recorded tape.

London Concord Meets Feature Seminars

London Records this week finalized details of two special seminars to be held on the final day of the company's forthcoming national sales convention at the Concord Hotel, Kiamesha Lake, N.Y.

The seminars, covering pop radio programming practice and modern techniques in sales and merchandising of classical product, are regarded as an innovation for a record company product meeting and are definitely a highlight of agenda. The seminars, set for Monday, Jan. 8, cap the gala London affair, which commences Saturday (6).

Commenting on the classical symposium, Herb Goldfarb, London's National Sales and Distribution Manager, said that the panel will consist of six representatives of the distributor-dealer structure, in addition to moderator Terry McEwen, manager of the classical division of London Records.

From the distributor ranks will be Bob Hausfatter of Roberts Distributors, St. Louis; and George MacDuff of Radio Distributors, Detroit. Among the dealer representatives participating will be Art Grobard, Los Angeles; Dave Shabim, Chicago; and Martin Perlick, Cleveland. In addition to several basic topics on classical merchandising, the panel is also expected to discuss questions raised from the floor.

On the pop programming front, Bill Gavin, veteran programming exec of San Francisco and publisher of the Gavin Report, will join Walt Maguire, London's National Singles Sales and A&R Manager, in discussing a host of key topics in connection with current programming practices particularly relating to the home office and distributor level role in station contact on London, Parrot, Deram, Coliseum, and Hi labels. A discussion is expected to take place.

Close to 250 persons are expected to attend the London convention, which will kick off the company's 21st year and which will feature the largest single LP release ever to be issued by the company. Those attending will be drawn from the rank of distributor execs and key sales personnel, the entire London home office executive staff as well as regional sales and promo men, and representatives of a number of major retail outlets.

NATRA Continues To ASCAP Steps Up **Build Regional Concept**

The National Association of Television and Radio Announcers (NATRA), in a continuing effort to strengthen its position in the music business, is in the process of adding and setting more solid foundations to its regional chapters. In recent weeks the organization conducted two regional meetings, a Southwest meet in Charlotte, N.C., and a Gulfcoast confab in New Orleans, La. In a departure from NATRA's former practices, the organization invited Record World to cover the New Orleans sessions.

The meeting of the Southeastern Region convened at the White House Inn. More than 75 regular and associate members attended.

Chatty Hatty, of WGIV, Charlotte, N. C., was the hostess with Charles Derrick, Third Vice-President of NATRA, WOIC, Columbia, S. C., presid-

The theme of the meeting "A Stronger NATRA Makes a Stronger Industry.' Del Shields, Executive Secretary, made the principal address.

Aim: Regional Chapters

E. Rodney Jones, President, WVON, Chicago, stressed in his introduction, that one of the aims of NATRA was to set up regional conferences in the hope of establishing regional chapters across the country. Communication has long been one of the pressing problems of NATRA in not being able to keep members properly informed and actively motivated since the organization was meeting just once a year.

Togetherness Shields pointed out was the evidence of the large number of persons in attendance. All the members of NATRA are waiting for a direction to lend themselves to and a a program that will propel the organization forward.

Jones elaborated on the increasing influence of the organization, and the recognition of the organization. He stated the organization was gaining stature and becoming a force in the industry.

There was also increased cooperation and support for the organization coming from managers of radio stations.

The Gulfcoast sessions, held at Mason's Americana, were presided over by Executive

Secretary Del Shields. Board Chairman Jack Walker stated at one of the meetings, "One of the reasons we're here is to try to bring together all of the local and regional factions.' Walker said that "The theme of these meetings would be 'Taking Care of Business."

Achievements Stressed

Stressed during the meetings were the achievements the Organization has already made, including an insurance policy for all paid members and its scholarship fund of almost \$45,000. Also stressed was the fact that NATRA is solidifying its job placement program.

During one business session Shields informed, "We're here to talk, to find out what your local problems are." Shields cited "communication" as one of the main reasons the organization was formed. Emphasized was the fact that the reason NATRA is receiving more coverage from the press than ever before (Newsweek, Broadcasting, the trade press, etc.) is because of the importance of R & B music on the current music scene. According to Shields, "40% of Top 40 programming across the country is R & B music."

The overseeing of Marshall Sehorn of Sansu Productions and WYLD radio personality Larry McKinley was a contributing factor to the success of the meet.

Harvey Lippert and Mark Meyerson are indicative of our commitment to get the facts about ASCAP to this important new generation of composers and lyricists. We care about writers and publishers and the advantages of ASCAP membership reflect this concern. It will be these important facts that Meyerson and Lippert are to explain in frank and realistic terms."






Elvis' Gold Caddie On Aussie Charity Tour



The Beach Boys received a standing ovation from the audience for their performance. Brando, a fan of the Beach Boys, has invited them to appear with him in Japan for another UNICEF benefit concert. In addition, the Beach Boys have been invited to appear at the inaugural festivities for the 1968 Winter Olympics in France. It is most likely that they will accept this invitation.





Promo Men at Radio Stations

Some key stations have restricted the visits of local promo men to their stations. In talking to some program directors, they make the following criticisms of a very few promo men: Do not have proper deportment in the station which is a big business. Help themselves to the phone for personal calls. Sit on desks. Horse around. Get overly familiar with the recptionist. Come dressed in sweaters and in some extreme cases they wear very extreme psychodelic clothes and accoutrements, which the stations feel is a very bad image for sponsors and for the station. One PD says there are 27 local promo men in his city, every regional man comes through, the national men call, the publishers, writers, producers, artists, managers and sometimes relatives and family friends of the artists. He has counted 50 people waiting in the lobby. Most people repeat the same info about a record, all of which he already knows, because he reads everything there is to be read and talks to many of the other PDs.

We are sure promo men have a long list of faults for the PDs. Most PDs blame the industry for not training their promo men better, or moving them into a bigger job as soon as they learn how to be a successful promo man. There should be continuing discussion about relating the needs and problems of radio station programming in a particular market with the

problems of local record promotion.


The NY Times describes the Buffalo Springfield as basically a "soft" group, but say they can do everything else. They call the LP "Buffalo Springfield Again" "one of the most varied and weird and beautiful things" they've heard. NEW YORK — In support of their belief that Kenny Rankin is rapidly developing into an artist of unquestioned artistic and sales potential, Mercury Records recently hosted a party in his honor at the Bitter End.

The Greenwich Village nitery was closed to the public for the evening while a crowd of close to three hundred was feted to cocktails, buffet dinner and Rankin's performance which included several selections from his Mercury album, "Mind-Dusters."

Rankin was introduced to the VIP audience by Mercury Vice President and Director of Recorded Product Charles Fach. Fach had seen Rankin innumerable times on the Johnny Carson show and admired his work. Upon inquiry he found that the young singer/writer was being managed by Monte Kay and Jack Lewis. Fach and Lewis had been associated in many projects in years past when both were employed by RCA. Negotiations and production of the album by Lewis marked a reunion for the two.

Product Manager Alan Mink flew to New York from the

label's Chicago headquarters especially for the occasion and was on hand to greet the various Merrec Distributor representatives who converged on the Bitter End.





Epic Increases Sales Volume For 6th Year in Row in 1967

For the sixth consecutive year, Epic-Okeh Records has increased its sales volume from the previous year. According to Leonard S. Levy, the label's VP, Sales and Distribution, this has been another "record" year in sales of the Epic-Okeh single and album product.

The end of the year highlight to this successful sales pattern has been the new Donovan LP releases, "A Gift from a Flower to a Garden" (the two record set), "Wear Your Love Like Heaven" and "For Little Ones." These albums, especially the deluxe two-album set, are among the hottest holiday gift items on the market and have received unusually heavy sales response across the country for the last few weeks their since release.

According to Levy, the information received by Epic indicates that these albums are running neck-and-neck in sales with the new Beatles album.

The success of Lulu's first album "To Sir With Love," featuring her No. 1, million-plusseller single of the same title and her current hit single. "Best of Both Worlds," shows that this young singer, signed by Epic in June, is and will be consistently strong in sales. Her single recording of "To Sir With Love" was certified by the RIAA for a gold record over a month ago and is still selling in very heavy quantities on a daily basis. As the film of the same title, in which Lulu appears and sings, continues in popularity, it looks like Lulu's recording may hit the two million mark.

"Please Love Me Forever," Bobby Vinton's new album, which includes his hit single of the same name and his current single "Just as Much as Ever," is receiving outstanding sales reactions, an indication of the resurgence of popularity for Vinton which has been building all through 1967. This has also been reflected by an increase in sales of his previously released albums.

The Hollies, one of Epic's major acquisitions in 1967, have been major contributors to the sales success over the past year. Their current LP, "Dear Eloise/King Midas in Reverse," featuring their two hit singles of the same titles, has generated very heavy sales. The Tremeloes and the Third Rail, also new Epic acquisitions, have been consistent contributors to the

best-seller charts, as have the yardbirds and, of course, Donovan with "There Is a Mountain" and his current hit, "Wear Your Love Like Heaven."

Clark Five Scores Again

The Dave Clark Five, one of the most consistently selling groups, is scoring again with their latest single, "Everybody Knows," a Top-10 hit in England. The Staple Singers voted by NATRA the Best Gospel Group of the Year, have increased their audience with the success of their single "For What I's Worth," which was on the pop as well as R&B bestseller charts. Itis interesting to note that the success of these singles by the DC5 and the Staple Singers has given rise to increased sales of their extensive Epic LP catalog albums.

Other important Epic albums in 1967 include "Side Trips" and "Beacon From Mars" by the Kaleidoscope, a West Coast group with a strong underground following, and the Prague National Theatre's recording of Janácek's opera, "The Makropulos Case."

The singing duet of producer Larry Williams and Johnny Watson recorded one of the big R&B and pop singles of the year with their vocal version of "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy" on Okeh. Currently their recording of "Nobody," done with the Kaleidoscope, is receiving hefty sales.

Walter Jackson, another mainstay of the Epic/Okeh labels, achieved consistently high sales, and his current single, "Everything Under the Sun," has established a strong re-order pattern.

Firm in Country Market

During 1967 Epic also became firmly established in the country music market. Top artists such as Tammy Wynette, David Houston, Jim & Jesse, Charlie Walker, Stan Hitchcock, Lois Johnson, Lucille Starr and Mac Curtis, combined with the writing and producing talents of Billy Sherrill and Glen Sutton, have enabled Epic to emerge as a top country label.

David Houston and Tammy Wynette, individually and as a duet, have made major contributions to Epic's success. "You Mean the World to Me," Houston's current album, has established a strong sales pattern, and his single by the same title is currently high on country and pop charts. Tammy Wynette's current single. "Take

Me to Your World," shows every sign of achieving or passing her No. 1 country single, "I Don't Want to Play House."

As a duet, Wynette and Houston had great success with their recording of "My Elusive Dreams," and their LP by the same title is increasing in sales every day. Their current single, "It's All Over," from their "My Elusive Dreams" album is already starting to move up on the country charts.

Other new acquisitions for Epic include the October Country, the Band Wagon and Sly and the Family Stone.

According to Dave Kapralik, Epic's Vice President, Artists and Repertoire, "Our interest is in communication. We are rapidly broadening the spectrum of Epic's A&R representation to include artists who will communicate to every segment of the many publics who make up the overall public of the music industry. The new year will see more of this expansion for Epic, with the signing of some very distinctive and extraordinary artists."

Mathis Goes Rock

HOLLYWOOD—Johnny Mathis, after more than 10 years as a top recording artist, has finally succumbed to the "rock" influence with his latest single for Columbia, "Among the First to Know." Concert audiences in Los Angeles will hear the new Mathis sound when he performs at the Music Center opening Dec. 26. He'll be the first pop vocal artist to appear there in the theater's history.

Over the past few years
Mathis has

has had four albums listed simultaneously as best-sellers on the national charts. In 1966, his "Johnny's

Greatest Hits"

recorded some

35 albums and

became the first album to remain on the charts for 400 consecutive weeks. It's still a strongseller today.

Mathis' early training as a singer was exclusively classical, although Johnny's original intention was to be a physical education teacher. The switch to singing was purely accidental. He dropped into a Sunday afternoon jam session at the 440 Club in San Francisco and some friends invited him to sing. George Avakian, a Columbia Records exec who was vacationing in Berkeley, heard him and one hour later telegramed his New York offices: "Have found phenomenal 19year-old boy who could go all the way! Send blank contracts."

Film Review

'Dolittle' Filmusical Does Much for Kiddies

They've got Rex Harrison, of all people, lifting his left leg and talking to pigs in "Doctor Dolittle." The same method applies for cows, as I recall, and there are sundry grunts and whines and limbs for other members of the animal kingdom—what he has got definitely is not a failure to communicate.

What we have got is a surprisingly effective Dolittle and film. Oh, probably not as effective a kindly English country doctor who devotes his life to animals as we would have if, for one, Edmund Gwenn were still with us and playing the gentle old weirdo. Of if Cecil Kellaway had been allowed to ride the tiger. Still, Star Harrison—too sophisticated to be ideal in this kind of thing no matter how high he gets that leg-does a remarkably creditable job. Restraining his natural urbanity much of the time in a foggily academic approach to the good doctor, he makes Dolittle a very amusing, even occasionally disgruntled figure in his single-mindedness, a first cousin to Harrison's phonetics teacher of "My Fair Lady."

If Harrison misses the warmth a true character actor might have brought Doctor Dolittle (and he does, and so does the movie as a whole), the children aren't going to mind. Make no mistake about it, "Doctor Dolittle" is their biggest boon since "Mary Poppins."

20th Century - Fox should have a gold mine in this costly film distillation of Hugh Lofting's children's novels. It has been lushly produced on at least two continents, and contains such kiddie-appealing items as the pushmi-pullyu (a two-headed llama); a whale pushing a floating island; a giant pink snail, all embroiled in the adventures of doctor and pals Anthony Newley, an Irish cat meat vendor, and Samantha Eggar and William Dix, a young woman and lad intrigued by the Dolittle who went all the way to Africa to treat a crocodile with a toothache.

Bricusse Tunes Fine

Leslie Bricusse's songs are all tuneful, and some better than that. They already are

much-recorded, including the 20th Century - Fox Records soundtrack LP. Bricusse also wrote the screenplay which director Richard Fleischer keeps moving colorfully, and is one of the heroes of the hour —or, more correctly, three hours. So, to a lesser degree, is Richard Attenborough, as the portly circus proprietor who takes on the pushmipullyu. While his role is brief, Attenborough, in his musical comedy debut, bolts his padding around with magnificent gusto in his number, "I've Never Seen Anything Like It in My Life."

The others are mostly adequate, although the insipid Miss Eggar doesn't seem to know whether or not to respect Harrison's age or throw herself at him.


"Doctor Dolittle" has the common contemporary film malady of overlength (the abrupt ending is not the answer), as well as the also farfrom-obsolete practice of hiring the biggest boxoffice name possible for a top role, whether he's right or wrong for the part. This time, things have turned out happier than usual, and the screen just may have a new classic. And Rex Harrison, the erstwhile Prof. Henry Higgins, definitely has hung out a new shingle (if not exactly enlarged his acting scope) by which to be known henceforth.

Another casting thought: I wonder what the late W. C. Fields would have made of Doctor Dolittle?

Also on the Schickele agenda is the formation of a musical group, that he describes as not quite rock and roll, called the Open Window. And it's a sign of the times that a former Juilliard teacher should be considering a (partial) career as a rock performer.

Gospel Time

The credit for the introduction of spirituals to the American public and the world be-

longs to Fisk University.

ers that first made this country and Europe conscious of the beauty of spirituals. The

story of the struggles and successes of the Jubilee Singers, as told in the Fisk collection of spirituals, reads like romance. The first impetus upward was given them in New York under the powerful patronage of Henry Ward Beecher. With far-reaching wisdom. Fisk University devoted itself to the careful collection and recording of the spirituals. and so the work of Fisk University was quickly followed by Hampton; Calhoun School in Alabama; Atlanta University; Tuskegee Institute, and other schools. These schools have for more than two generations been nurseries and homes for spirituals.

Today, the spirituals are in vogue. They are beyond the place where the public might hear them only through the quartets of Fisk or Hampton or Atlanta or Tuskegee. There are quartets, choirs and gospel groups touring the country today spreading God's messages through spirituals and gospel songs. Today, the public buys the spirituals and gospels and takes them home, plays and sings them. This has been brought about because the songs have been put into a form that makes them available for singers and music lovers

A number of white persons aided in securing the general recognition which the spirituals now enjoy. Several white musicians have made excellent arrangements for some of the spiritual songs.

Stirred to True Evaluation

The present regard in which this Negro music is held is due overwhelmingly to the work of Negro composers, musicians and singers. It was through the work of these Negro artists that the Negro people themselves were stirred to a realization of the true value of the spirituals.

The older generations have played a part, too. They are responsible for having kept spirituals alive by singing them at prayer meetings, class meetings and revivals, while the choir with the organ held sway on Sundays. As a result gospel hymn book agents reaped a harvest among Negro churches, basically in the South.

Today this all changed. There is hardly a choir among the Negro churches that does not make a specialty of singing spirituals and gospel songs during their services. The awakening of the Negro to the value and beauty of this music has begun an entirely new phase of race consciousness. It has marked a change in the attitude of the Negro himself toward his own art material, the turning of his gaze inward upon his own cultural resources, and all the other artistic activities of the Negro have been influenced. At last America is beginning to see in him the divine spark which may glow merely for the fanning. And this change of attitude with regard to the Negro which is taking place is directly related to the Negro's change of attitude with regard to himself.

As Marian Anderson once said. "Music mirrors the thinking and feelings of societies. Much that is greatest and richest in a nation or community is preserved through its music. Across barriers of class, race and nationality music speak from heart to heart."

This holds true of Negro spirituals. Truly spirituals reflect the hearts, the souls and faith of Negroes. Most successful R&B singers of today and of the past basically got their foundation in a gospel group or a church choir. This is why most of them have so much soul. Many of the blue-eyed sisters and brothers have gotten their style from our soul sisters and brothers so this is indeed a credit to the Negro.

All four of the principals connected with Producers, Inc., will be involved in A&R. In addition to a production deal with Jubilee, pacts with other diskeries are being negotiated.

Bill Gavin Conference

We've Had the Talk, Now for Some Action

By DEL SHIELDS

We had an opportunity to attend the recent Bill Gavin Radio Conference as an "unofficial observer," and like the majority of those who attended felt strongly that the meeting pointed out a need for some kind of action to begin improved dialogue between radio programmers and the record industry.

If there was any dissent on the part of those who attended, it might have been due to many making the trip and hopefully looking for some quick answers to a number of problems that has faced the industry for a long time. Unfortunately there were no quick answers given.

It is important, however, that in this area much was said and possibly will give hope to those who felt that some changes might be forthcoming.

A review of the organizations in the record industry shows that there is currently no active group addressing itself to the problems of better relations between the secondary level of the radio management and the record industry.

Record Industry More Realistic

As we look at the list of record industry organizations we find the recording industry has been far more realistic in trying to improve its relations and add stature to the field.

In the radio field, other than the NAB, little is done by the broadcasters to become leaders in a field where there is what might be called by some an unwanted marriage between radio and recordings.

The irony of the situation is that the recording industry understands this sensitive relaship and seeks to make it work, while radio refuses to even admit to such a relationship.

In the National Association of Television and Radio Announcers, many of the problems have developed because radio management dislikes the close association of disk jockeys and record industry. Yet, how can one do without the other?

Since the radio industry has never clearly defined what role

it intends to play with the record industry, much of the confusion is left to be cleared by the record industry.

Even if the radio industry desires to lead, rather than follow or be a compatible partner to the recording industry, it must decide to sit down and face this problem.

It is alarming to hear some radio men cry that they do not need the recording industry. And others say they are not in the business of making records. I have yet to hear a record man say he did not need the radio station does not need the record company, fine. But can't we work together?

I cannot see any radio station decrying his need of the recording industry unless there is an all-news format; and even then he must seek the company's health in the area of production. So, therefore, the stations are not entirely without the need for help or assistance from the recording instry.

A Philosophy Needed

Perhaps there has to be a philosophy developed by the leaders of the radio industry on what role they want the radio stations to play in this area. Until this is done, there will be more and more conferences and little accomplished in solving the problem.

The Gavin conference, we feel, was a significant and broad step taken. That so much was said in such a short period of time was amazing, and the fact that it was said and heard in Las Vegas was even more remarkable.

Whatever personal rewards Mr. Gavin received, we feel that the meeting can prove to be a bold step forward to bring together some of the best minds in the business to air as well as solve some serious problems.

The calibre of speakers including the address of Whitney Young of the Urban League should have given all the delegates much food for thought. Now, of course, the question is whether there'll be any action.



NASHVILLE—The recent disk jockey convention's first 24-hour message center was so successful that its sponsor, Acuff-Rose Publications, has announced plans to offer the service again next year.

Scores of the 5,500 registrants for the four-day Grand Ole Opry 42nd Anniversary celebration used the Acuff-Rose facility to leave messages, receive telephone calls, obtain information and as a central meeting point, according to Wesley Rose, President of the firm.

"We were highly pleased with the response to the message center," said Rose. "We hope to make some additions that will make it even more of a service at next year's celebration."

The message center was located inside the main entrance to Nashville's municipal auditorium, the hub of the dj convention's activites. Attractive hostesses, attired in plaid jackets and ties, were at the booth from 8 a.m. to midnight. After midnight, the phones were switched to an answering service, and messages left through the night were posted the following morning.

The telephone number for the message center was highly publicized prior to the convention through both advertisement and editorial coverage. On the eve of the convention, cards listing the number and explaining the functions of the functions of the message center were placed in mail boxes at hotels and motels.

While the annual country music confab had never had a central communications facility. Rose said, "The need for one was very evident. People stayed at motels and hotels scattered all over the city, and they attended functions in widespread areas of Nashville. We felt that there needed to be some way to help these people stay in touch with each other and also to reach them in the event of an emergency."

Popular with Secretaries

The message center proved to be especially popular with secretaries of Nashville music business evecutives who were attending the celebration. Unlike out-of-town convention participants, local executives were usually not registered at motels and there was no other way to reach them.

Most telephone calls to the message center were local, although long distance calls were received from such cities as Providence, R. I.; Austin, Tex.; Atlantic, Ga.; Washington, D. C.; Los Angeles, Calif.; Forest Park, Ill.; Philadelphia, Penn. and Huntsville, Ala.

Some celebration registrants used the center as a means of getting messages to their favorite entertainers. Messages were received for such personalities



Produced by Paul Leka, the Lemon Pipers are currently cutting their first LP, with rush release scheduled for mid-January. Bogart says the album already contains "several potential hit singles. It'll be a happy problem to choose which one to release next."

Smack on Charts

Buddah's also smack on the charts with "Something's Missing" by the Five Stairsteps & Cubie, and yet another single has been forced out of their deluxe Buddah album, "Our Family Portrait." Being rushreleased in response to phenomenal reaction to their LP, the new single is "A Million To One." Cecil Holmes, Buddah director of R & B activity, in

coordination with Action Talent, Inc., is concentrating his efforts on a mass drive for The Five Stairsteps & Cubie, using large size, in-store, window displays and national advertising via radio and trade and consumer magazines.

Penny Nichols Introduced

Supplementing the Kama Sutra and Buddah staff, Barry Lane has been added as a promotion and production assistant, working in the Buddah promotion department and reporting to Bogart.

Art Kass, Kama Sutra vicepresident and controller, reported that the first quarter for Buddah Records showed a profit, and that with the activity on the Lemon Pipers, the second quarter earnings should outdistance the first.

On the Kama Sutra scene, the Lovin' Spoonful have released a new single this week, "Money", penned by John Sebastian. A new LP, tagged "Everything's Playing," will be issued within the next seven days and features a Sebastian

cartoon on the cover.

Working closely with Lenny Scheer, MGM-Kama Sutra general manager and Harold Berkman, national promotion director of MGM-Kama Sutra, the Kama Sutra promotion department is planning the most extensive campaign since The Lovin' Spoonful, for the deck debut of Anders-Poncia. The first single from this producer-writer team is "So It Goes," with an album set for January.

"The name of the game is action," said Artie Ripp, Kama Sutra President. "Kama Sutra and Buddah are showing every kind of action—on the charts, in the studio and in sales."



Larry Newton, President of ABC Records, announces the signing of Tom Wilson to produce recordings on an independent basis. Wilson's product will be his own Rasputin Productions and will appear on the ABC label. He will turn out both singles and albums with the first two singles scheduled for Jan. 2; one by a new group called the Bagatelle, the second by a group named the Fraternity of Man. Both groups will have LPs in March, 1968.

Wilson has one of the industry's best track records: he produced Bob Dylan albums and singles, including the smash "Like a Rolling Stone"; Simon & Garfunkel recordings, including their hit, "The Sounds of Silence"; the Mothers of Invention are a Tom Wilson discovery, and he produces their recordings; he is responsible for the Velvet Underground; and he has produced records by the Animals for the past two years, resulting in four top twenty records, and sales of almost two million albums.

Harvard Graduate

A graduate of Harvard University with a major in economics, Wilson turned his talent to music when he started the Transition Records label in Cambridge, Mass. The label

discovered Odetta and recorded such jazz greats as Donald Byrd, Yusef Lateef, Curtis Fuller, Cecil Taylor, Sun Ra and made some of the earliest recordings of Cannonball Adderley and the late John Coltrane.

From his own Transition label, Wilson moved to United Artists Records for two years doing Artists & Repertoire duty and producing records by Art Farmer, Coltrane, Cecil Taylor and Brock Peters, among others. Two years in jazz A&R work with Savoy Records followed before he was named recording director for the Audio Fidelity label which resulted in the pop hit, "Somewhere in the Night," by Teri Thornton.

During a stint with Columbia Records, Wilson worked with Pete Seeger, the Clancy Brothers, Eddie Harris and Herbie Mann, in addition to Dylan and Simon and Garfunkel. His association with MGM Records for the past two and a half years has produced records by

Connie Francis, dramatic and spoken-word recordings, as well as the Mothers of Invention, which Wilson claims as his topranking achievement. His records with the group helped put the psychedelic music trend in motion in 1966.

Will Emphasize Young


Wilson's philosophy for his Rasputin Productions is based on the overwhelming percentage of population under 25, and his releases will emphasize young ideas and young sounds. He says, "This is the most adventurous period in the history of recording because music is now incorporating all styles into the young sound. Young people are playing from a total musical experience that dwarfs the imagination of musicians who were leaders in the field even as recently as 10 years ago. Rasputin will try to discover important new acts that will say something different, advancing the entire scope of modern popular records."


In line with his outlook, Wilson points to his group the Bagatelle, lead by Lee Mason, featuring three singers. The group hails from Boston and Wilson describes their innovations as being "to rhythm & blues what the Mothers of Invention were to rock music." They have expanded the R&B concept and Wilson adds, "they are an integrated group because the music business is ready for them."

Second for Rasputin Productions

The Fraternity of Man is the second Wilson group for Rasputin Productions. Originating on the West Coast, the group plays the entire range of music from basic blues to psychedelia, featuring a witty and sardonic type of original material. The leader is Elliot Ingber, former guitarist for the Mothers of Invention.

Wilson will operate from his home in Brooklyn at 361 Waverly Avenue. Rasputin Productions will also maintain management and publishing branches, representing total involvement with artists in all areas of the music business.



Lowdown on Platters

Dec. 26 through New Year's Eve will find the Platters sharing the bill with Woody Allen at the Westbury Theatre In The Round in Long Island, New York. The Platters appeared on a recent college date with the comedian.

Jean Bennett of Personality Productions, manager of the Platters, just returned from an eastern tour with the group and reported complete sell outs for every show at the Cellar Door in Washington, D. C., where they were appearing for the third time. Even an eight-inch snow storm which closed most clubs in the Baltimore-Washington, D. C., area failed to dampen the ardor of the act's Washington fans. Their most distinguished admirer that very evening was Elvis Presley's famous manager, Col. Tom Parker!

The group's personnel has changed. The act has been kept up to date with the changing sounds of the music world, but they can't leave the stage once they start singing "Only You," "The Great Pretender," "Twilight Time," "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," "My Prayer," "The Magic Touch," etc.

Few people realize that the Platters' secret of success is due to an unseen force who has been mostly behind the scenes since the Platters' inception. With the exception of the professional music men in the industry, few people realize that veteran composer Buck Ram has ingeniously created the image of the Platters or that he is responsible for writing and arranging most

of their hits. He found the remarkable lead voice of Tony Williams, built the group around him and added the first girl for spice and flavor. The Platters were the first and only group to step out of hundreds of R & B groups with choreography which Burck Ram taught them. He developed the style of Williams' voice and found the gimmick that was used in "Only You" which brought the first golden hit to the group. They were the first group to have a large strings section used in the background of a hit called "My Prayer" that has sold over five million records.

Another important person who is contributing to the musical success of the present group is their musical conductor, Duke Hall. Duke is not only contributing with his ability at the piano and conducting the band, but he is also writing and arranging some of their future songs for recording. He is now right hand to Buck Ram in preparing their recording schedules and their stage appearances.

Canned Heat Raise Temperatures

LOS ANGELES — Canned Heat, Liberty's "hot" blues group, electrically opened up at Doug Weston's Troubadour on Dec. 19. A diversified audience ranging from collegians to the older set patronized the fivemember blues band.

Canned Heat warmed up with four of its hit elements, Filo De La Parra on drums, Henry Vestine on lead guitar, Alan Wilson on bottleneck and rhythm and Larry Taylor on bass. Their first two numbers were mildly successful. Then it happened! The group's bearded wonder stepped on to the stage. Known as Bob Hite, the lead vocalist, he grasped the mike and explosively belted out the Elmer James tune, "This My Burden." That did it. The audience melted into the hands of "Heat."

Liberty has a winner on their hands. The group delivers the blues message in Mississippi Delta vein. Other numbers of impact were "Sweet Sixteen," the Muddy Waters classic "Hoochie Coochie Man," and, of course, their own last single, "Bullfrog Blues."





single, "Sunday Mornin'," and achieved strong identification with their chart-click "Sunday Will Never Be the Same."


C&W Background

Stage Review

Roberts Stands Out In 'Dow Jones'

NEW YORK-It seems rather easy, in criticism of "How Now Dow Jones." to respond "'Dow Jones'?-average," but it would just be answering the thinking behind the new musical in kind.

For the David Merrick-produced show at the Lunt Fontanne, which uses Wall Street as a backdrop, has almost nothing-outside of an affable new leading man (Anthony Roberts)—to recommend it, and, on the other hand, nothing to get agitated about, unless you can get agitated about nothing to get agitated about.

"How Now Dow Jones" is a formula musical in which all the ingredients, instead of blending together, slump at different parts of the bowl eyeing each other passively.

The program notes that the idea for the show belongs to lyricist Carolyn Leigh, whose usually adroit work is way off form. It's unlikely that her initial notion was merely to set a musical in the famed New York financial hub; so she was probably the one who came up with the show's clumsy plot twist, which is this: Our heroine (played blandly by Marlyn Mason), who has become pregnant (!) by our hero, announces over the speaker at the Exchange that the Dow Jones average is up to 1,000 (?). She does this so that her other boy friend, an ambitious analyst, will marry her and make something of an honest woman of her (!?).

Oh well.

The other people tied up in this enterprise, which RCA has already recorded, are Brenda

Vaccaro, who plays a brassy, fidgety would-be mistress to Hiram Sherman's Wall Street mogul; George Abbott, who directed with his usual eye for fluid movement; Oliver Smith, who designed what must be his most unattractive group of settings; Gillian Lynne, a routine choreographer; and Elmer Bernstein, whose first Broadway score must displease

Back to Anthony Roberts. As a broker who turns his gangling folksiness into a style for selling stocks to ladies clubs (and this is the show's one clever satirical conceit), Roberts is low-key, at ease and able. He's got a distinctive gruff, straight-forward delivery and a limber manner. Certainly his stock deserves to soar.

RCA has already gotten some yield out of Marilyn Maye's waxing of "Step to the Rear," the spritely but conventional highpoint melody, but whether the caster will pay off is doubt--David Finkle

The end of the year is here. What kind of year did jazz have?

A review of the year notes many changes. Jazz had its best sellers. A few promising artists came to the fore. Jazz clubs continued to close at an alarming rate while jazz men found new bookings on college campuses.

Madison Avenue continued to be alert to the sound of jazz as it used more and more jazz tunes to help push their products



The festivals by and large continued to be successful. From Newport to Monterey, jazzmen played to thousands. And

Del Shields behind the iron curtain they are still trying to figure out why they tried to prevent Charlie Lloyd from playing.

The Randall's Island Festival promoted by Teddy Powell proved to be another success while Herbie Spivak's Quaker City Jazz Festival pulled 17.000 in one night at the new Spectrum in Philadelphia.

Jazz disk jockeys continued to be the greatest jazz promotion men. And the jazz A&R men made history in the change of musical chairs.

The perennial chartmakers Jimmy Smith, Ramsey Lewis, Wes Montgomery welcomed back Julian Cannonball Adderley with his "Mercy, Mercy."

Biggest Surprise

The biggest surprise of the year no doubt was the success of the Young Holt Trio. Shifted from the Ramsey Lewis group, they were successful in hiring talented Do Walker and recorded their first hit with "Wack, Wack" on Brunswick. It was just a matter of time before they became one of the most sought after new groups in the business.

Buddy Rich's Big Band continued to be a sensation. Don Ellis' big band made their Newport debut and were a treat. They stopped off briefly in New York and convinced the staid New Yorkers that their musicianship was legitimate.

Critics continued to question why Gerald Wilson's big band stays comfortably on the West Coast leaving the eastern and midwestern audiences to mull over his records.

Thad Jones and Mel Lewis took their big band to the Pacific Jazz Festival and astounded the West Coasters. Here in New York they are proving that the band is far from an experimental one. They have put togther a superior musical machine.

George Wein probably made the most important jazz story in his convincing the Schlitz Brewing Company to participate in the Newport and other festivals.

Ballentine Brewers sponsored the jazzmobile, the only people to people jazz program. This year, the jazzmobile rolled across the five boroughs of New York playing jazz on street corners, at projects and community houses.

The Rheingold Festival, with Ron Delsener as producer, played 15 dates in New York's Central Park with jazz artists. Most were sellouts.

Various community action agencies in the big cities began talking with administrative heads about the lack of jazz being programmed for the youth of the ghettoes. They pointed out that cultural bankruptcy was being practiced on these youths. It was to no one's surprise that the city fathers were surprised.

Labels Gave Consideration

Various record company heads began giving serious consideration to the lack of merchandising and entered serious discussions on what was happening in the jazz picture. The fact that millions of dollars in product was gathering

dust on the shelves, same of the companies attempted new innovations.

Atlantic hired Joel Dorn, a long-time aware jazz jock on Philadelphia's WHAT, to head their jazz promotion department.

Blue Note Records, the oldest independent jazz label, sold out to Liberty Records for a handsome \$1 million plus sum. New packaging and a realignment of distribution brought them an increase in sales.

John Coltrane's untimely passing shocked the jazz world. But his funeral was so tastefully conducted that we hope this will start a trend for dignity for jazz men at the last rites

Billy Strayhorn, Stuff Smith and Red Allen were among the leading jazz men whose last chord was sounded.

Riverside Records leased their masters to ABC, and the promise is that many of the great sides will become available in 1968. Much of the credit for the revival of the label is due to the herculean efforts of young Otis Smith, Vice-President of Operations, who promoted the Johnny Lytle "Village Caller."

The Jazz at Home Club in Philadelphia honored Horace Silver with its annual Jazz Culture Award. It was a momentous occasion for one of the most respected men in the business.

New York had a jazz day. The first time in the history of the Empire City that the city fathers elected to note the importance of jazz. With the Jazz Interactions group spearheading this phase, it was a beautiful beginning.

Hollywood tapped another fine jazz writer and composer in Oliver Nelson. Jazz made its presence felt with Lalo Schifrin's brilliant scoring of the popular "Mission Impossible."

Most Important Event

Possibly the single most important event of the year was the fact that more of the pop, R&B and other artists forced the return of the beat to jazz. In addition, jazz achieved a tremendous shot in the arm when these youngster's proclaimed loud and clear that they listened to the jazz men and derived much of their inspiration from them.

The avant-garde movement probably suffered most from the unlicensed commercial promoters who could not wait for







Jack Clement & The Art Of Producing Hit Disks

For Jack Clement the art of producing a hit record is an exciting and creative process, one which is just as invigorating as one of his daily runs at the YMCA!

A result is his acceptance as one of the most successful independent record producers in highly competitive Nashville. Tenn.

Evidence of his success is strong. The Stonemans, recently named Vocal Group of 1967 by the CMA, reap combined benefits from Clement's many talents. As co-manager of the popular group, he produces all their sessions and writes much of their material, such as their recent single, "West Canterbury Subdivision Blues," also published by Clement's Jack Music.

Worked on Pride Hits

In conjunction with RCA Victor A&R producers, he has worked with Charley Pride whom he also co-manages on each hit: "Just Between You and Me," "I Know One," both written by Clement and most recently "Does My Ring Hurt Your Finger."

A long list of successful artists who rely on Clement's abilities confirm his standing as an individual producer able to compete successfully with the major labels. Among the many are Hank Williams, Jr., and brother - in - law, Lamar Morris, Tompall and the Glaser Brothers, Sheb Wooley and his comic counterpart Ben Colder, all on MGM, the Willis Brothers for Starday and Bob Beckham for Monument.

Part of Clement's success comes from his belief in complete freedom from conformity when it comes to creating a sound. Johnny Cash presented him with a special plaque for his assistance on "Ring of Fire," a landmark session in country recording because of the unorthodox adding of trumpets to the traditional guitars.

Although Clement takes advantage of the seasoned professionals who form the elite group of session musicians, he never hesitates to bring in a young, unestablished musician unfamiliar with the art of working a session. "These young pickers can come up with some really good ideas," he explains.

Musical Pioneer

Clement has always been something of a musical pioneer, beginning with his Memphis

days where he worked under Sam Philips at Sun Records, with such non-traditionalists as Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins, Johnny Cash and Dickey Lee

His later development as a producer in Beaumont, Texas, was conducive to experimentation with new artists and new ideas within his own studios. When he did come to Nashville about two and a half years ago, his reputation as songwriter was soon bolstered by his growing name as a music publisher and, most significantly, as the highly successful C&W indie producer he is recognized as today.
