

Roulette Expands On All Fronts

There's so much going on at Roulette Records these days, you need a map to scout the territory. President Morris Levy has just announced a new sales peak for Roulette as well as wide-sweeping advances in several areas highlighted by new executives appointments.

Coming off one of the big singles, plus a top 10 LP, "Crimson & Clover," Tommy James & the Shondells, Levy reports they are off on another that looks set to go all the way, too, "Sweet Cherry Wine." Esther Phillips' "Too Late to Worry,

Too Blue to Cry" is making it in both R&B and pop markets; while Ila Van's "Keep on Laughin', Baby," a new Roulette release, is picking up national R&B play and creating sales excitement all over the country.

Levy detailed that sales volume for the first two months of this year for Roulette has already topped six months of '68, and when the tallies for March are in Levy expects the first three months of '69 will top all of '68.

But Record of Year Award Held Until NARAS TVer May 5

NEW YORK — Emceed by Steve Lawrence, the Record Academy, NARAS, presented its annual Grammy Awards last week (12) at the Imperial Ballroom of the Americana Hotel here, with presentations also going on simultaneously in Los Angeles, Nashville and Chicago.

Speeches in New York were given by Father Norman O'Connor, New York Chapter President, and NARAS' National President Mort Nasatir, who announced that the Best Record of the Year award would not be revealed until the Academy's annual TV show, "The Best on Record: The Grammy Awards Show," is telecast on May 5 over NBC, "so that the entire country can share in the excite-

ment of discovering the winner."

Total Involvement Set of ABC Depts.

Sales Manager Smith Also on Methods Used Selling Diverse Roe, Laine Hits

NEW YORK—"Total involvement" is the key phrase at ABC Records these days, according to Otis Smith, label's Sales Manager, who revealed to Record World last week plans to bring the sales, promotion and publicity departments at the diskery closer together.

Especially on albums. Said Smith: "In the area of LPs, we're trying to pull publicity in with our sales and promotion departments, so everyone will have a better picture of what's happening. We're setting up several new procedures. A lot of LP sales are word-of-mouth, and a lot of that will have to come from our Publicity Director, Ken Kendall."

Kendall has since stated, "I am delighted that Otis has decided upon a total involvement record promotional activities, something I have been striving for for a long time. The field has changed so drastically that the scene today is completely foreign to what it was three years ago. Today's publicity calls for specialized underground and college activities, in addition to the regular channels. I personally feel that our policy here at ABC of total involvement, instead of each department going its own way, results in sure coverage for the artist and provides a healthy sales appetite in today's recordbuying market.

Two ABC Single Smashes

In the singles department, ABC is currently hot with two big ones. Tommy Roe's "Dizzy" and Frankie Laine's "You Gave Me a Mountain," which demanded different methods of selling from the label. Reported Smith: "The Laine appeals to the older buyer—the initial airplay on a 'pop' station is nil, though: it's not really top 40 or teenybopper material. The same goes for Sammy Davis, Dean Maritn or even Frank Sinatra -it has to be a large record, unit-wise, before they'll play it. The Laine sold about 10,000 singles here and in Chicago before 'pop' stations would touch

"The advantage is that now you have more of an undertone; you have created a market for it. Whereas on a 'pop' record, you start out cold. If a record is a hit, say, in Chicago, you can put it on radio, but there is no undertone—the 'pop' station has to create the calls. You have to sit back and wait till it catches on and hope it does so before they drop it.

"Take 'Dizzy,' which has now sold over a million and is still selling. It broke in Texas. Once a record happens in a market, we generally go in and spread it. We usually use three markets to test a record. Sometimes a market will come on its own—a music director will pick a record on its own, and then we'll go in there, too."

Smith noted that the amount of singles sold on a "Dizzy" differ from the amount sold on a Laine. "As a single, a 'Dizzy' outsells a Laine 2-1. But the Laine LP with the single in it will probably sell more. When the tennybopper hears the 'pop' record, he'll buy it, and that can be it for this record. But the adult will buy the single and then the album, too. It's an economic thing. (This doesn't hold true for jazz and underground—they're more LP markets.)"

Both Laine and Roe have new LPs coming shortly, too. titled after their hit singles. "Laine's is in his standard 'good music' bag; but Roe's is both 'pop' and underground, the latter something different for Tommy. Our thinking is to sell more LPs this way," explained Smith.

The exec reported further: "There's more glory in promoting a Roe record; but what we hope for with a Laine single is that it will create interest in his catalog and also his new album. A lot of 'pop' LPs don't become catalog items. But a Frankie Laine LP can sell indefinitely."

'We Have Changed Style'

ABC also has been beefing up its promotion force. George Morris and Barry Lane are doing dual national promotion on singles, while Moe Preskell does national LP promotion "and is influential with singles, too. We have become more selective in our product. We have changed our style, are putting out much better product. We have added Bill Szymczyk, who is the first 'contemporary' A&R Director on staff here. We're buying less and less masters now, and are trying to get a sound relative to ABC itself.

Of course, if there's a master that we feel relates to ABC and can be a hit, we'll buy it.

"We're also expanding our R&B A&R department. We've put on Willie Hoskins on the West Coast, and an East Coast R&B A&R exec will be announced shortly."

"Coming from an independent [Riverside] to a major label as I did not long ago has been a very different experience; but the amount of learning I have absorbed from Larry Newton, President of ABC, and Bud Katzel, VP and General Manager," Smith stressed, "has been fantastic." Fantastic also would seem to be the word for ABC's prospects.

Traymon Heads Ambassador A&R

NEWARK, N.J.—Dolph Traymon has joined Ambassador Records as executive producer, heading a new A&R department which has launched a program to move more heavily into the record market.

Traymon has been active in the music field

the music field since age five, when he began a series of piano concert tours. Before his ninth birthday, he had his own NBC network radio show. He is a gradu-

ate of the Julliard School of Music. Later he arranged musical scores for a series of Carnegie Hall "pops" concerts, wrote dance arrangements for the Ray McKinley Band and, during his Army service, was featured with his own band on the Mutual Network.

He has been the conductor for Kitty Kallen, Don Cornell, Rudy Vallee, Denise Darcel and Dorothy Lamour. In the record field, he was producer for Uptite and Jaguar Records.

A Masterpiece

The Beethoven D Major Piano Concerto is a masterpiece and one of the great transcriptions of all time. It is not merely a rearrangement of a violin piece for piano. It is a recomposition of the work with new thematic and motivic material, new instrumental pairings, and unlike the Violin Concerto it contains Reethoven's own cadenzas. Accounts of the time indicate that the piano version was much more popular during Beethoven's day than the violin version; it may be a superior work. The magnificent cadenza to the first movement in terms of harmonic and rhythmic daring more closely resembles the style of Beethoven's late piano sonatas (the variation movement of Opus 109, for example) than that of his middle orchestral works.

Another Beethoven record exposes us to a marvelous E-flat piano concerto, the piano part of which was composed when Beethoven was only 13. Side two contains a one-movement fragment, the main theme of which is based upon the finale of Mozart's Piano Sonata in C, K. 330. It is a wonderful and curious blending of the styles of Beethoven and Mozart.

Lovers of romantic music will enjoy the record devoted to Albeniz and Arensky piano concertos. Both are excellent pieces, and the performance by Miss Blumental and the Brno Philharmonic under Jiry Waldhans is superb.

May It Flourish

One can only wish the best for this new project. May it flourish and continue to fill the many gaps in the recorded orchestral repertoire, and perhaps, by so doing, inspire our conductors to be a bit more adventurous in their program-

NEW YORK - Jerry Schoenbaum, President of Polydor, Inc., has announced that the newly formed operation will be the future source of Polydor's three classical labels, Deutsche Grammophon, Archive and Heliodor. 





If there remains any doubt about the impact of alternative (underground, hard rock, free-style, mostly FM) broadcasting on the music business, take a look at the sales charts. If you've been bemoaning the risk of bubblegum lately, you've been missing the point—which is that Top 40 radio has retreated to its original formula; consequently, the singles market is bullish again. Alternative radio, offering good album programming creatively aired, has forced Top 40 back into dependence on its true nature.

In last week's 100 Top Pops, 38 of the Top 50 records could be legitimately considered designed for the singles market. Of



the 50 top LPs, on the other hand (in the running with all kinds of album product, including original case, comedy, soundtrack and MOR) 25 were "hard rock" or folk—LPs that without question fit an underground radio format.

So, as MC5 says, kick out the jams. Underground radio has made it.

Dylan's suggested title for his new album, which includes two duets with Johnny Cash and is to be released in approximately two weeks, was "Nashville Skyline." But then he changed his mind . . . Taj Mahal, whose latest Columbia album, "The Natch'l Blues," is already a contemporary classic, may be producing soon. He is conferring with Howard Stark, head of Impulse/Bluesway, on several possibilities . . . The ABC hard rock chain of FM stations is attracting listeners by offering "Stone Beatles" blocks of programming, featuring strings of Rolling Stones and Beatles cuts as delightful surprises sprinkled liberally throughout the time prior to the debut of their Love concept . . . Al "Jazzbo" Collins has left Metromedia's KMET-FM to join another L.A. station, KFI, which reportedly is adopting a MOR format.

HOT FLASHES: If you want to find out what the hippy movement is "really" all about, you can get the hot skinnies by writing to radio evangelist Walter K. Armstrong, P.O. Box 111, Pasadena, Calif. His latest pamphlet lays it all out. You may receive "Hippies, Hypocracy and Happiness" and a free copy of his magazine, "The Plain Truth," along with other tracts printed under the umbrella concept "The World Tomorrow" absolutely free and with no further obligation (except that your name will be added to a wild mailing list).

And, if you feel the need for blessing, by writing to Faith Healer David Eppley, P.O. Box 323, St. Louis, Mo., you may receive a small patch of prayer cloth clipped from a prayer jacket worn by the Rev. Eppley himself in the performance of many of his Acts of Faith.

You hear the most bizarre things on religious radio.

Tim Hardin has been almost set to write the title music for "The Christian Licorice Store," which goes into production later this year, and from all reports promises to be enormous . . . Earth Opera's second LP for Elektra, "The Great American Eagle Tragedy," will be released soon . . . A Rolling Stone report, this one from Jon Landau in Boston: A Byrd's reunion took place in Boston a couple of weeks ago, when the most recent incarnation of the Byrds (only leader Roger McGuinn remains) appeared on the same bill with the Flying Burrito Brothers, whose personnel include former Byrds Chris Hillman, Michael Clarke and Graham Parsons. There was a short jam session. Gene Clark, David Crosby and Kevin Kelley missed the function . . . Open City, the number two underground newspaper in L.A., has folded.

Veteran, Versatile Phil Moore Helps Artists to Stardom

By DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK — Phil Moore, the compleat (not to mention complete) music man who has written numerous hit songs ("Shoo Shoo Baby," etc.), worked in Hollywood during the Golden Age of the Movie Musical and conducted/arranged for many artists on record, radio and TV, is also an all-purpose coach.

It is in the latter capacity that Moore is most active today (although he continues to write -more about this later). He has helped Lena Horne, Marilyn Monroe, Dorothy Dandridge, Diahann Carroll, Patrice Munsel and others achieve the maximum in professional potential; and of late he has been aiding O. C. Smith, Gloria Loring, Jerry Butler and the Free Design. "We try to keep their natural ambiance," he told Record World last week, "not give them phoney things, We have clients over a period of years, usually. We're like a doctor to them. When they need me, they call or come over."

Moore added that record companies sometimes send artists to him for help on their stage delivery—"but they don't send enough." he opined. His son, Phil Moore III, run his West Coast office.

Great Contemporary Problem

One of the great contemporary problems in show business, according to Moore. is that "the poor kids don't have any way to make it nowadays. It's all expensive; although the rewards are great. Time was if you wanted to get into show business you could try out with a band or sing in a little joint. Now there's no place you can learn your trade: when a vocalist comes out, he has to be ready. So you start out on TV, where more people see you on a show in one night than would see you in a club in 10 years.

"But how does the poor kid go about it? Records are one way to get your foot in the door. But so many make one record and then disappear. They have to learn how to dress and behave on TV. So they're starting to come to guys like me. It's short-sighted of the managers not to develop them as all-around performers as they go along, and short-sighted of our communities not to provide ways for them to get an education in this area. I'm working on a formula now to

help this situation, but I don't have it completely worked out."

Currently, Moore is also writing the music for an LP of Langston Hughes poetry and has a tune called "Cold Water Flat" that is getting recordings.


Choice Tales to Tell


Although he doesn't like to dwell on the past, he has some choice tales to tell of his Hollywood days. He worked at MGM Pictures in the '40s for five years, as well as RKO and Columbia, and recalls that "A lot of the pictures I worked on I never saw. I was too busy, and I couldn't really enjoy them anyway, I worked so closely on them. I saw the rough cuts only, usually. Now, I see a lot of the ones I was on when they turn up on television.

"I remember one day back in the early '40s I was working on one stage when I heard someone tapping away on a nearby set. I wandered over to see what was going on, and there was Gene Kelly who had recently come out from New York. I asked him what he was doing, and he said he was keeping in shape in case the studio gave him a dancing role. Signed as a dancer, MGM had brought him out but so far had cast him only in war pictures.

"Another time, I was recording what was supposed to be an intimate night club type number at Metro with Lena Horne and a few musicians. All of a sudden I looked up and there was L. B. Mayer, the Boss the World, wandering among us. As if in a daze, he said, 'This can't be MGM. Where am I? Is this the biggest studio in the world?' I didn't

And to show its interest in the jazz world, its third anniversary will be celebrated with a concert (as it has in the two previous years) at Carnegie Hall in April. The proceeds will be used to establish a musician's emergency fund to assist indigent musicians in time of need. NEW YORK — "My most important instrument is splicing tape," Vanguard's electronic musician Jean Jacques Perrey told Record World last week.

Perrey, who is 40 and said he's been interested in electronic music for 41 years, has just released his third Vanguard elpee, "The Amazing New Electronic Pop Sound of Jean Jacques Perrey," which took eight months of work.

"I refer to my music as science music," Perrey said, "although I like to have humor in it because humor is what is going to save the world. I want my music to be part of popular music because popular music is an art form and not a pejorative term."

Cutting up tape and splicing it together (editing, in other words), is what Perrey spends most of his time doing, and it pays off in records and, right now, more importantly, in commercials. Perrey has composed the electronic jingles for Peter Paul almond clusters, Hush Puppies, Q-tips, Clark candy bars, No-Cal and Contac. His composition, "Visit to the Stars," is currently Esso Humble's "An Extra Gas."

Pickwick Tape Sales Soar

"We sell all the Pickwick tape product we can get. It's a great line and they have great packaging. We have to constantly re-order to meet the demand for Pickwick 8-track." That quote comes from Al Levinson of L & F Distributors in Atlanta, Ga., when asked about Pickwick International's economy-priced 8track tape line.

Dan Gittleman of U.S. Distributors in Fall River, Mass. reports, "We've had great success with the Pickwick 8-track tapes. One of the reasons for this is simple economics. Pickwick offers a line that is comparable with the major labels for approximately two dollars less. As far as what type of tapes are selling best I'd say that generally trends in tape very closely follow those in records."

Since September, 1968, reports Pickwick Chairman Cy Leslie, 8-track sales have doubled with the cartridges now accounting for approximately 10% of the company's total recorded music sales.

Much of Pickwick's success in the field is due to their creative merchandising at the retail level. "Previously," Leslie states, "tapes were not displayed as prominently as albums, in fact tapes were simply stacked on shelves." To combat this Pickwick has made use of what they call a browser box which features ten selected 8track tapes. This display technique has proven particularly successful with impulse purchasers and at the same down has cut down on pilferage.

Each box incorporates four color artwork on the full face of the display packaging and the list price of \$4.95 is prominent. Leslie says, however, that he has seen them sell at retail for \$3.95 and less. "By using the price of our cartridges as a leader for all of the tape lines," Leslie commented, "dealers are now beginning to apply the same economics to the cartridge business as they do to records.

Kasenetz, Katz Get World High on Bubblegum Music

NEW YORK - In less than two years, the youthful (24) team of Jerry Kasenetz and Jeff Katz has created one of the most successful forms of popular music in history, bubblegum music, and been called "legends in their own time."

And their creative processes are far from tapped out. The new single "Mercy" by the Ohio Express, which K&K's firm produced and belongs to their Kaskat Music, is a fastclimbing hit.

Kasenetz and Katz Asociates has already accounted for seven gold records: "Little Bit O' Soul," Music Explosion; "Mony, Mony," Tommy James; "Simon Says," 1910 Fruitgum Co.; "1-2-3 Red Light," 1910 Fruitgum Co.; "Indian Giver," 1910 Fruitgum Co.; "Yummy Yummy Yummy," Ohio Express; and "Chewy Chewy," Ohio Express. Kasenetz and Katz have had about 35 charts records, accounting for more than 30 million records sold throughout the world. Their latest group is Crazy Elephant, out on "Gimme Gimme, Good Lovin'."

The Kasenetz and Katz musical empire includes Super K Records, Kaskat Music and Super K Productions, all under the corporate umbrella of Kasenetz and Katz Associates. Kasenetz and Katz record as artists for the new Super K label; and the Shadows of Knight have switched from the Team label to Super K.

Shadows' Underground LP

According to Jerry Kasenetz, who dropped by Record World last week to bring things up to date, "We've been working on an underground LP for the Shadows of Knight, and we'll be bringing out an album and a single in a couple of weeks. Other Super K artists are Mark, lead singer of the Fruitgum; Bud, lead singer of the Ohio Express; Question Mark and the Mysterians; the Outsiders and Bobby Bloom."
Super K has been called a

youth label by Kasenetz and Katz; and, Kasenetz went on, "Through our youth program, 'It Takes Talent to Find Talent,' we have more than 20 young adults throughout the U.S. working exclusively for Super K. We are planning to have the label reach into all areas of music."

Jeff and Jerry have also toured colleges and universities giving talks on rock and roll.

Kaskat Music's success has closely paralleled the success of Super K Productions. Related

Kasenetz' "Kaskat has been on the charts 101 consecutive weeks and has many valuable copyrights, which include 'Simon Says' which had sold five million records throughout the world and was the first bubblegum song. Hy Gold is General Professional Manager."

Into Writing More

Furthermore, Kasenetz and Katz are getting into writing more-their first effort was the top 30 hit. "Goody Goody Gumdrops." They now have out "Loving Cup," Charles E. Funk Rebellion; "I Got Troubles," Queen's Nectarine Machine; and "Hurdy Gurdy," Detroit Roadrunners. And other things are in the works. "Our greatest accomplishment as songwriters," said Kasenetz, "is a song in the Brooklyn Bridge LP titled 'Free as the Wind.' Paul Anka and Steve Rossi, among others, are recording it. We want to write more 'good listening' and standard-type songs."

Kasenetz and Katz, whose theatrical flair was exhibited last June in Carnegie Hall via the Kasenetz-Katz Singing Orchestral Circus, are becoming involved increasingly in television production. A recent "Upbeat" TV salute to Kasenetz and Katz garnered high ratings. Among other TV ideas they are presently working on is a documentary called "We Get High on Bubblegum." So does the whole world.



NEW YORK - Already the center of widespread government and organizational attention, Skye's just-released album, "America the Beautiful, An Account of its Disappearance," by Gary McFarland, has been chosen to spearhead the Artists' Resistance Movement. Wm. Bell Expands Interests

NEW YORK - Stax Records' William Bell originally planned to become a doctor. Unfortunately for the medical profession (and fortunately for the music business), he started singing in high school for P.T.A. and school activities, and entered a Mid-South talent contest with his group, the Del Rios. They won second prize, a recording contract with a small Memphis label and bookings in a local club.

However, from there to his current success was not a smooth trip. He and his group worked various clubs during high school and toured with jazz pianist Phineas Newborn, Jr. They worked out of New York for about six months (where he wrote "You Don't Miss Your Water"), but it wasn't long before his group was drafted out from under him. Chips Moman approached him about recording "You Don't Miss Your Water" as a solo artist for Stax (which he did), after which he traveled for about a year and a half before he, too, was tapped for service in the armed forces.

While in uniform, Bell wound up in the Special Services (not a commando unit), where he studied acting. In September of this year he will enroll in the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York to further his acting involvement. This will leave him weekends for

personal appearances, when he will concentrate on college shows and nightclub bookings.

In Demand Everywhere

Previous to his latest smash, "I Forgot To Be Your Lover," most of his bookings were in the South, Now, however, he finds that he's in demand in every part of the country.

In addition to his crowded PA schedule, William writes all his own material, and is deep into producing as well. He heads his own label, Peach Tree Records, based in Atlanta. Among the artists recording for Peach Tree are Mitty Collier. Johnny Jones and the King Kasuals and Emory and the Dynamics.

His new album (just finished) will be released on Stax in about a month. Tentatively titled "Bound To Happen," the LP will include his next single release, "Happy."

She came off rather well, struggling through "Summertime," and that's where it started. She and Tenison worked piano bars, etc., always progressing to better clubs and bigger jobs.

However, somewhere back in the early days, an album was recorded, "long before I was ready for it." As a matter of fact, Rhetta feels that it took at least three or four years to find her own style.

So the recording end of her career was pretty much ignored after that, as she concentrated on her performing, working toward her goal of being a visual performer. She added two other

voices to moke a lounge act, and finally wound up at Redd Foxx' Club, where Bill Cosby discovered her.

Now signed with Tetragrammaton, Rhetta has a hit single, "Light My Fire," behind her, and an LP, "Re-Light My Fire," climbing the charts. She says her biggest influence has been her producers, Jo Armstead and Mike Terry, and considers it very important to have all kinds of material in her repertoire, to be a "well-rounded entertainer." She can sing anything with soul and credibility.

After her Felt Forum engagement, she'll leave on a short tour of the Midwest, to be followed by work on a new LP. Her latest single-"Hip Old Lady on a Honda" b/w "His Happiness."—Andy Goberman.



The Roulette head man also announced the widest expansion program in the history of the company is already underway, with appointments along top executive echelons in effect, plus additions in promotion and other departments, all of which will have a positive effect on the growth and development at Roulette on all levels with all labels of the company.

Levy announced that Bill Leo has been appointed Administrative Vice President and Treasurer of Roulette, and Sid Schaffer has been named the new Director of Sales for the company and all labels under the Levy aegis.

Leo, formerly a top executive at Columbia Records, will coordinate all the financial functions and tighten inside structure at Roulette. Schaffer, Vice President of Sales of Kapp Records prior to the MCA takeover, will be in charge of all sales and promotional activity at Roulette and all the labels of the companies.

The promotion department now consists of Al Silver, who formerly owned the Herald and Ember labels, who now heads up the R&B division for Roulette; Danny Fortunato, National Promotion Manager R&B Product; and Ron Merenstein and Mike Kelly, handling promotion under Schaffer's supervision.

Howard Weissman has been named publicity and public relations counsel. Weissman worked with Schaffer at Kapp.

According to Levy, expansion of the companies will cover not only existing and new artists, but a wide swath of new product, and will continue to extend into foreign operations for recording as well as publishing.

The publishing domain, under the direction of Neil Galligan, General Professional Manager of The Big Seven Music Corporation, has achieved a separate and distinct operational status, publishing material using its own writers for Roulette, as well as for many outside labels as an individual entity. The continuity of expansion calls for additional personnel to better service outside labels and companies on an independent basis, as Galligan guides The Big Seven towards its own autonomy.

Levy pointed out that the foreign expansion of Roulette covers publishing companies, Planetary, Ltd., in England, Germany, France, Australia and South Africa, plus affiliates on

a global basis.

Roulette of England has also been established, with a 50/50 deal with Major-Minor now in effect, and there has been considerable action in Britain as well as the rest of the Continent and around the world, with the James smash single going over 2.1 million in the $\bar{\text{U.S.}}$, plus an additional $1\frac{1}{2}$ million throughout the world, while the LP showed strong domestically and throughout the world as well. Levy said that the English Roulette operation has already turned a profit for its first two months of existence.

Roulette's recently - established ethnic tapes continue to blossom, and the new label, Tomorrow's Productions, keyed by Shadow Mann, also has a burgeoning future.

The Latin labels Tico, Allegre, Mardi Gras and Swinger, with Arthur Kapper at the multiple helms, are also enjoying wide-open movement with new artist and new product on the immediate horizons.

Kapper said that production featured Pete Bonet, Hector De Leon, and Nydi Caro with Richie Ray and Bobby Cruz, is now hitting the market and that new LPs are forthcoming for La Lupe, "The Queen," and Pete Rodriguez, while Celia Cruz has a new LP, as has Tito Puente a big new one in "Puente en el Puente" ("Puente on the Bridge"). New talent includes Jimmy Sabater, as well as a new romantic duo, the Carr Twins, who are up with an LP, "Luck Shall Be With Us."

Nate McCalla, who heads the Calla label, pointed out that they were adwyancing as a separate and distinct entity and broadening their production base, utilizing talented young people like Tommy James in a production capacity. McCalla announced that Johnny Thunder, a new artist for Calla, has kicked off with a strong new pop hit, produced by Tommy James, based on his number, "I'm Alive," which is currently making the pop scene heavily; and new artists have been lined up and are being signed, also to be produced by James for Calla.

Bill Leo, assistant treasurer at CBS, went to the Columbia Record Division in 1963 and directed all credit and collection activities for that division, before becoming part of Lieberson's staff on the CBS-Columbia group.

Leo was quoted as saying: "I think Roulette is at a point in its development when it is ready for dramatic upward growth. It has great artistic leadership and has demonstrated that it is tune with what is happening in the record industry. I hope to make a significant contribution to its continued growth."

Sid Schaffer started with Capitol Records in 1947, joined Mercury in 1954 and became District Sales Manager for Warner Brothers Records before joining Kapp as Vice President in Charge of Sales in '66.

Schaffer said, "Coming into Roulette Records while it is enjoying an upward cycle of sales combined with an outlook of expansion and growth makes my position a challenge to which I look forward with much anticipation."

Levy also stated that he was negotiating for a third floor in the present Roulette building (17 West 60th St.) to add to the two floors now occupied by the firms.

London Releases New LPs, Heads for Record First Quarter

London Records, now on the threshold of the biggest single first quarter sales level in the company's history, has kicked off a special March LP release, which incorporates three new phase 4 stereo albums and three key new artist packages. The impending new first quarter sales record was indicated earlier with a record January sales month with an important measure of the sales explosion due to the surging activity on the product of Engelbert Eumperdinck, Tom Jones and Mantovani.

Humperdinck, already the owner of one gold LP resord for his original album, 'Release Me," was certified for two more gold LPs last week: "The Last Waltz" and "A Man without Love." Meanwhile, the singer's newest LP, "Engelbert," and containing his new smash single, "The Way It Used to Be," and the recent hit, "Les Bicyclettes de Belsize," has generated a sales pace that's expected to bring it within the charmed gold circle in short order.

Presentation of the new gold disks to Humperdinck is expected to take place during his forthcoming first American night club tour, which opens

April 17 at the Riviera Hotel, Las Vegas.

Also contributing greatly to the London sales surge is the current 18th annual "March is Mantovani" Month promotion, which incorporates a new LP, "The Mantovani Scene," and deluxe repackaging of two of the most popular all-time sets for the British maestro, "Continental Encores" and "American Waltzes." All 49 of the current Mantovani catalog LP's continue to sell actively. A rew American tour is already being blueprinted for Mantovani next September.

Meanwhile, Tom Jones' catalog on London's Parrot labe is selling at a faster pace than at any time since Jones joined the label, partly as a result of the current success of the weekly network TV "Tom Jones Show." The artist's current LP, "Help Yourself," is now in the top 10.

On the new release front, London is issuing three phase 4 LPs, incorporating two timetested sellers and three rew star names. First up is "Silk and Satin," highlighting Caterina Valente with the Edmundo Ros Orchestra. "Be In," a song from the score of "Hair," and included in the LP, has also

ful "Era: The '50s" series comes a new album by veteran pianist Frankie Carle, who offers "Lullaby of Birdlard," "Nina Never Knew," "Hot Toddy," "Night Train" and 'So Rare."

Hank Thompson represents Dot's C&W roster with the album "Smoky the Bar." Sp∈aking for the rock buff is an eectric new group called Womb. They debut this month with an album simply titled "Wonb," which has already created a stir in the underground. Mount Rushmore, who debuted late in '68 with the album, "High On Mount Rushmore," is out with a follow-up LP, "Mount Rushmore—'69."

Completing the release for March is the premiere all um of a new group on Jeff Barry's Steed label, the Illusion, which is the title of their swinging new offering. It contains such tracks as "Talkin' Sweet Talkin' Soul," "Just Imagine," "I Love You, Yes I Do," "Alone" and a half-dozen more.



The Louisiana Hayride will celebrate its 21st anniversary on March 22. The Hayride, produced by Frank Page, the Operations Manager of KWKH, which sponsors the Hayride, will have one of their biggest shows to celebrate the occasion.

Headliners will be Ray Price, Ernest Tubb, Willie Nelson, Henson Cargill and Johnny Roberts. This show, as have all Louisiana Hayride shows since the beginning, will be held at the Municipal Auditorium in Shreveport, La., with a perfomance at 7 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. The show, held monthly since changing from the original weekly format in 1960, is always viewed at both shows by the capacity crowd at the Auditorium of 3,500.

The initial Louisiana Hayride in 1948 headlined Johnny and Jack, Kitty Wells, Hank Williams, Sr., and the Bails Brothers; however, many stars have made their debuts and gotten their start on the show. Johnny Horton, Jim Reeves, Jimmy Newman, Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash and George Jones began their careers on the Hayride.

From 1945 until 1952, Hank Williams did a 15-minute show (7:15 to 7:30 a.m.) on KWKH for the Johnny Fair Syrup Co. The show was done with Hank and his only accompaniment, his guitar. Red Sovine took over

the Johnny Fair Syrup Company's spot in 1952 and was immediately known to all as the "Syrup Sopper," a nickname he still carries.

The list of talent who have "come into their own" on the Hayride is too numerous to mention; although there Webb Pierce, who at that time was a boys clothing department manager at Sears and his band which included Floyd Cramer, who soon became a popular star in his own right. Pierce was responsible for bringing Faron Young to the Hayride where things began to break for the "Sheriff." Goldie Hill and Tommy Hill also came to Louisiana to join the Webb Pierce show about the same time. Slim Whitman, who was a mailman prior to joining the Hayride, had his own band with a young fiddler named Sonny James.

The Wilburn Brothers, the Browns (Jim Ed, Maxine and Bonnie), Billy Walker, Jerry Kennedy (now A&R man at Mercury), Claude King, Jimmy Day, and Red Sovine were all at one time regular members of the Hayride.

Most recently, stars that were spun from the Hayride are Nat Stuckey and Cheryl Poole. Information on the 21st anniversary show can be obtained from Frank Page at AC318, 422-8711.

So I called the whole orchestra and we did it, but mostly I just had them sitting around and we got our intimate—but very expensive—sound anyway."

He recalled further, "We had an arranging pool set up. The producers and directors could choose the arrangers they wanted. Most of them were plutocrats and didn't know names, so when they were asked who they wanted, it was easier to say, 'Get that colored fellow.' I got plenty of work that way."




