HITS OF THE WEEK

SINGLES **JOHN LENNON, "MIND GAMES"** (prod. by John Lennon) (John Lennon, BMI). Long awaited single from Lennon is one of his best songs in the post-Beatle period. Title tune from forthcoming album should be on top in no time. The "Games" people play will be this one. Apple 1868.

SLY & THE FAMILY STONE, "FRISKY" (prod. by Sly Stone) (Stone Flower, BMI). "If You Want Me To Stay" brought Sly back to hitsville, and this chunk o' funk should keep the hit string going. From "Fresh" lp, cut should have a lively chart run. Stone smash! Epic 5-11060.

TONY ORLANDO AND DAWN, "WHO'S IN THE STRAWBERRY PATCH WITH SALLY" (prod. by Medress & Appell) (Levine & Brown, BMI). From their "Ragtime Follies" lp comes this perfect follow-up to "Sweet Gypsy Rose." Another bit of cute rag rock. It's the berries! Bell 45,424.

JOE SIMON, "RIVER" (prod. by Brad Shapiro) (Lonport, BMI). Simon has a streak alive which was bolstered by "Theme from Cleopatra Jones" last time out. This Eugene McDaniels tune should break quickly both pop and r&b and flood the airwaves. Spring 141 (Polydor).

SLEEPERS **ROGER DALTRY WITH THE LONDON SYMPHONY ORCH., "I'M FREE"** (prod. by Lou Reizner) (Track, BMI). From Lou Reizner's production of the rock opera "Tommy" comes cut featuring the Who's lead singer with symphony orchestra and chorus. The right track! Ode 66040 (A&M).

RAY STEVENS, "LOVE ME LONGER" (prod. by Ray Stevens) (Palladium, BMI). Stevens hasn't had a huge pop hit since his Grammy-winning "Everything Is Beautiful" in 1970, but this beauty should change all that. Great hook and performance clinch it! Barnaby B 5028 (MGM).

BARRY GOLDBERG, "(I'VE GOT TO USE MY) IMAGINATION" (prod. by Wexler and Dylan) (Screen Gems-Columbia, BMI). Former leader of the Electric Flag returns with a tune he co-wrote with Gerry Goffin. Produced by Jerry Wexler and Bob Dylan. Goldberg gold! Atco 6946.

PHILLIP GOODHAND-TAIT, "SUGAR TRAIN" (prod. by Robin Geoffrey Cable) (Dick James, BMI). Dick James' latest discovery is a fine singer-writer whose debut album is forthcoming. From that lp comes this highly commercial opus that should have a long chart ride. 20th Century TC-2059.

ALBUMS **RINGO STARR, "RINGO."** All the anticipation about the other Beatles playing with Ringo will give way to greater appreciation of Mr. Starkey's own talents. Ringo's warmly plaintive singing shines in front of all those HEAVY sidemen. Lennon's "I'm the Greatest" is genuinely Beatlesque and the "Photograph" single is a beauty. Apple SWAL 3413 (6.98).

THE WHO, "QUADROPHENIA." After a 2 1/2 year wait the Who have returned with another masterpiece in hand. "Quadrophenia" is a two record concept album telling of the breakdown of an alienated English middle class teenager. Superior songs like "Real Me," "Cut My Hair" and "Love Reign O'er Me" tell the tale with realism and compassion. MCA 2-10004 (11.98).

DAVID BOWIE, "PIN UPS." Bowie's new album is filled with solidly Bowieized versions of some of the best British rock songs of the mid-60s. "Here Comes the Night," "Friday On My Mind," "Don't Bring Me Down" and the new single "Sorrow" are but a few of the flashy, explosive cuts. Incredible vocals and guitar work. RCA APL1-0291 (5.98).

JACKSON BROWNE, "FOR EVERYMAN." Premier singer/songwriter follows his extraordinary debut album with another evocative collection of musical poetry. Magnificent songs include "Colors Of the Sun," "These Days," "Ready Or Not" and "Redneck Friend." The entire album is aided by superb backup from David Lindley. Asylum SD 5067 (5.98).

Blue Thumb Reorganizes

■ BEVERLY HILLS, CALIF.—In a joint statement made by Blue Thumb Records, Inc., and Bob Krasnow, Blue Thumb has announced the realignment of its executive structure, effective immediately.

Krasnow will now become chairman of the board of directors and has announced that Sal Licata, formerly Vice President and general manager, will become the new President of Blue Thumb, a subsidiary of Famous Music.

Tommy LiPuma will continue in his position as Vice President in charge of a&r.

In addition to his administrative function, Licata will be restructuring Blue Thumb, bringing in additional people in areas previously unexplored by the company. Under the new structure, employees will report to Licata on all decisions, both creative and business oriented.

Krasnow's primary responsibility as chairman will be finding and cultivating talent.

Pablo Casals Dies

■ RIO PIEDRAS, PUERTO RICO—Celebrated cellist and conductor Pablo Casals died last week (22) at Auxilio Mutuo Hospital of complications from a heart attack suffered several weeks ago.

He was 96 years old and lived in nearby Santurce with his wife, Marta. The world renowned musician and humanitarian had received the United Nations Peace Medal two years ago, at which time he had been hailed as a man who had devoted his life to "truth, to beauty and to peace."

The famed cellist had recorded for Columbia for the past twenty-five years on a strictly verbal agreement.

RIAA Calls for Congressional Action In Vinyl Crisis

■ With the industry facing shortages in petroleum-derived materials essential to production, the Recording Industry Association of America is calling for Congressional action this week aimed at gaining favorable treatment in the allocation of basic material.

Conferees from the Senate Interior and House Commerce committees will meet at midweek to reconcile S. 1570 and HR. 9681, bills concerned with the mandatory allocation of crude oil and refined petroleum products.

RIAA has initiated steps to encourage inclusion in the ultimate conference report of language ensuring that the recording companies will have fair access to adequate supplies of polyvinylchloride (PVC), a key ingredient in record manufacture.

Stanley M. Gortikov, RIAA President, encourages prompt action by all recording industry companies and key executives in contacting their Congressmen and Senators. Gortikov urges immediate wires to Washington to include these elements:

(1) Tell your Congressmen and Senators how the material shortages affect you, your company and your employees.

Vinyl Crisis Continues; Some Labels Cutting Back

■ NEW YORK—The serious shortage of vinyl continues as an industrywide problem, amid reports of projected or planned price increases, cutbacks of releases and losses of sales. At present, there is still no definitive word on how long the shortage will last.

Important developments in the crisis this past week:

- Pressing plants continued operating on shorter work weeks.
- A number of labels are talking about price increases to cover added manufacturing costs (see separate story).

- Reports reached **Record World** that the cutout and over-run market seems to be drying up. Sources explained the reason: it has finally become necessary to use recycled vinyl in pressings, and more pressings plants are switching away from virgin vinyl to mixtures of various vinyl compounds. (Manufacturers reportedly can get two new albums from every three recycled).

- A number of labels have postponed some of their releases, while others are spreading out their release dates so as not to be caught without adequate supplies due to heavy backorders. One label vice president told **Record**

World he turned down a rack jobber's order for 25,000 catalogue albums on a guaranteed sale, because he wouldn't be able to get them pressed.

In describing the Columbia situation, Cal Roberts, Vice President of Columbia Records Productions, stated "We are in a constricted situation. We've told our clients that we can't press everything they want. They have to decide what their priorities are." Roberts confirmed that Columbia's plants had

Price Increases Seem Imminent

■ NEW YORK—In an effort to recoup a near-25 per cent increase in the cost of manufacturing an album, a number of record labels have either made plans to raise prices soon, or are projecting price increases in the near future. The increases will most likely come in list price, with plans underway for a return to selective pricing — \$6.98 for established, best-selling artists, as opposed to \$5.98 for newer, non-established artists. This decision, reached or contemplated by a number of labels, tends to end speculation that the increase would come in the wholesale price of albums, and would also seem to indicate that the industry is moving toward a standard \$6.98 list.

Among the upcoming releases at \$6.98 list for single albums are Ringo Starr's "Ringo" and A&M's "Carpenters' Greatest Hits." Some retailers have also pointed out that MCA has prepared for raising the price of its established artists to \$6.98 by having two separate numbering systems. (A few years ago, when MCA went from \$4.98 to \$5.98, they had to renumber some albums in their catalogue).

A number of retailers report they have been told that major price increases will not come until after January 1. Any move to the contrary, especially a rise in wholesale prices, they warned, would cause havoc on their Christmas business, because of possible indecision on whether or not to pass the increases on to the consumers.

Bob Hope Records LP for Spear

■ NEW YORK—Bell Records President Larry Uttal has announced that Bob Hope will record a series of albums for the newly formed Spear Records label to be exclusively distributed by Bell. Mark Anthony, who is Bob Hope's business manager, is the label's Vice President.

"Bob Hope is one of the great institutions of show business," Uttal stated. "Although his career spans every other area of entertainment, he has never made a record. This is truly an event. We are delighted and proud that Bob Hope has chosen to make his record debut with Bell."

The first Hope album, titled "Thanks For the Memories" (A Holiday Collection), produced by Pete Bennett and Mark Anthony, will be released in November. Hope will personally make both the television commercials and radio spots for the album in addition to plugging it on the four television specials he will do for NBC-TV this season, including one on November 13.

Spear Records expects to release material by other artists as well as additional albums by Hope. The label will be specialized, involved primarily with big name entertainers and taking special approaches.

Jo Bergman To Warners Post

■ BURBANK, CALIF.—Bob Regehr, Warner Bros. Records' director of artist relations, has announced the appointment of Jo Bergman to the post of director of special projects for Warners' artist relations department.

Ms. Bergman, who is probably best known as the former right hand, tour organizer, and logistics engineer for the Rolling Stones, will make her headquarters in Warners' New York offices and report directly to Bob Regehr in Burbank.

Atlantic Inks Charisma



Ahmet Ertegun, President of Atlantic Records, has announced that he has closed a deal with Charisma label head Tony Stratton-Smith to distribute Charisma's product in this country. The first release will be a new album by Genesis entitled "Selling England By the Pound." In addition albums will be forthcoming from Monty Python, singer/songwriter Clifford T. Word, and Bert Jansch. 'Seagull' Changes Ordered by Court

■ NEW YORK—"Jonathan Livingston Seagull," the Hall Bartlett-Paramount film, opened its world premiere engagement at the Sutton on October 23, with the following notice on the screen: "By agreement of the producer, the author of the book, Jonathan Livingston Seagull, and the composer of the music, certain changes are now being made in dialogue and music in the picture you are about to see."

The reason for this is that Neil Diamond, who wrote the soundtrack score (also released as his first lp under the Columbia label) and Richard Bach, in separate legal actions against Hall Bartlett, claimed the producer-director of the film, violating contractual agreements with them, had altered both music and dialogue, and sought to enjoin the film from being shown. Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Campbell Lucas ruled on October 19 that the film could open in New York and Los Angeles with the above disclaimer, and that all parties were to return to court on October 29, at which time, if their differences have not been resolved, he would rule on further exhibiting of the film.

Pickwick Ups Leatham

■ WOODBURY, N.Y.—Ira Moss, President of Pickwick International (U.S.A.) Inc., has announced the promotion of John Leatham to Vice President and general manager of Pickwick International of Canada. Leatham was formerly general manager of Pickwick's Canadian division.

Ochs Upped At Playboy

■ LOS ANGELES — Ed Ochs has been named director of creative services for Playboy Records. Ochs has commissioned Fohat Studio, Hollywood, to handle album and advertising graphics for Playboy Records.

Ochs joined Playboy Records in November, 1972 as director of publicity, adding director of artist development to his duties. In his new capacity, Ochs will assume responsibility for all album art, advertising and merchandising while continuing to direct Playboy Records' press and publicity department.

A Dynamic Mail Order Company

■ NEW YORK—"Record companies tend to regard mail order package record marketers as some sort of unknown enemies, but to do that is to ignore the tremendous good that mail order does for the entire industry," says Lawrence Crane, 37 year old President and founder of the rapidly growing TV record marketing firm Dynamic House/Tele House.

"We have found out that the vast majority of our customers would never go into record stores," Crane told **Record World**, "because if they did go to record stores they would never wait 4-6 weeks for our mail order albums. Our customers are mainly people that don't listen to top-40 radio but like music, and we feel that we are working to a market that really has never before been properly approached by the record business."

Crane believes that a marketing company like his can, in addition to selling its own product, be effective working with record manufacturing firms to promote both catalogue albums and new artists through the use of TV. He is adamant about the value of TV advertising for selling records.

"Radio isn't the important place to advertise," Crane contends, "TV is. TV is where the people are. The record companies should be spending their bucks on TV, developing new markets and creating demand for their good established artists and best new artists."

By his own admission, Crane is a marketing man, not a record man. He believes that at many record companies, marketing experience has been principally related to retail store sales.

"We've looked into the TV ad rates that the record companies have been paying, and they are incredible. They've been getting raped on their ad rates! Record companies think they can just

put together a TV commercial and buy some time and do great, but it's a lot more involved than that. They've even been getting raped on radio time, paying full rate cards and the like. We have pro time buyers who really know how to negotiate, and not only through large package buys.

"Some of the companies have seen the success we have had with our special packages and tried to do the same, but they haven't come close to equaling our performance. In the last TVB rating (Television Bureau of Advertising) we were listed as the 24th largest spot time purchaser in the country. In the next rating we'll be in the top 10. Record companies shouldn't do their own TV marketing, if they'd work with a Dynamic House. They'd sell 100 times as many records and we'd take all the risk! Record companies shouldn't market their own packages any more than Macy's should manufacture dresses."

Crane, a native New Yorker who came into record marketing from a background that included media buying for large toy corporations, film syndicating and commercial film writing and directing, now writes and directs all of his company's commercials. He maintains that early TV record ads were static affairs that had

WCI Income Down

■ NEW YORK — Warner Communications Inc. has reported that third quarter 1973 net income declined to \$12,682,000 from \$13,227,000 in the comparable 1972 quarter. Due to a reduction in the average number of shares outstanding during the current period, fully diluted earnings per share increased to \$.57 from \$.54 in the third quarter 1972. Operating revenues increased to \$131,796,000 from \$118,676,000.

For the nine months of 1973, fully diluted earnings per share rose to \$1.73 from \$1.56 in 1972. Net income increased to \$39,867,000 from \$37,820,000 and operating revenues increased to \$401,321,000 from \$355,394,000.

Rinaldo Upped at CBS

■ NEW YORK—John T. O'Connell, Vice President and Controller, CBS Records Division, has announced the appointment of Lou Rinaldo as director, management information systems and procedures, CBS Records Division.

Rinaldo will report directly to O'Connell and will have complete responsibility for all CBS Records Division systems and procedures. He will take over the duties of James Judge, who will now serve as staff assistant to the Vice President, finance and planning, CBS/Records Group, working on special project groups.

Labels, Replying To Questionnaires, Deny Wrongdoing

■ WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Senate Copyright Subcommittee, chaired by Senator John McClellan (D-Ark.), has been receiving scores of completed questionnaires from large and small record companies throughout the United States following the committee's entrance into the investigation of alleged unethical and illegal practices in the record industry. The investigation is concurrently being conducted by the state of California and a Federal grand jury in Newark, New Jersey.

All the questionnaires returned so far carry flat denials of any forms of payola, plugola or organized crime influence within the individual record companies. Field investigations of record company promotional activities may occupy the next segment of the committee's study. Many of the major record companies report having completed internal investigations of their employees, while other companies report that investigations are still in progress.

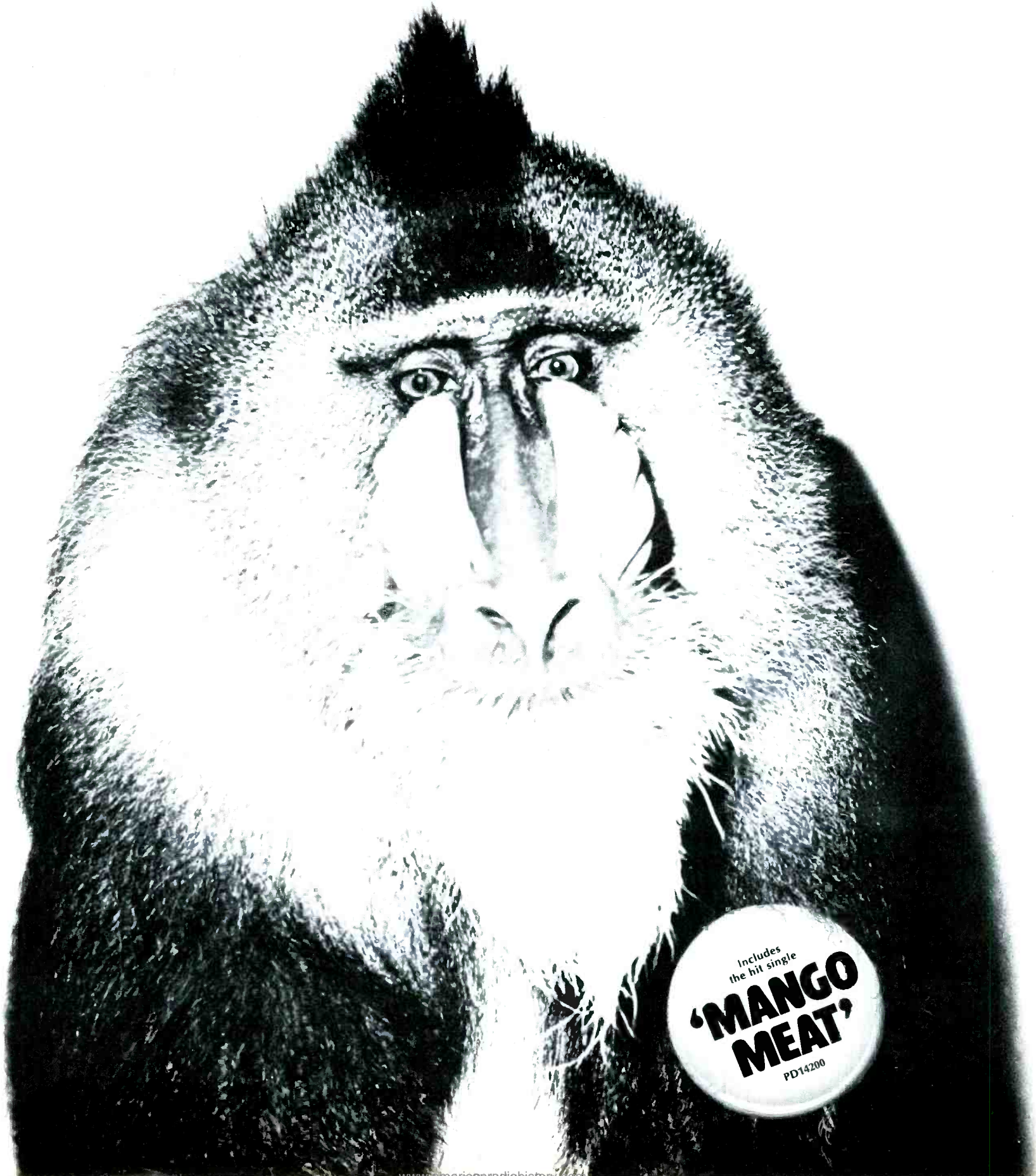

Clarence Avant Speaks His Mind

By ALLEN LEVY

■ Clarence Avant, President of Sussex Records, wants nothing more in his biographical sketch than that he was born in America, pays taxes in America and plans to stay in America.

Record World: What projects other than Sussex are you involved in?

Clarence Avant: I'd like to think I'm involved in total entertainment, through Sussex, through motion pictures, my involvement at various times in looking for employment for black cats who find it difficult to find other than bullshit jobs and my involvement with my publishing company.

RW: Do you have any plans to go into book publishing?

Avant: I don't think I'd ever want to go into book publishing because there are too many publishers around that I could deal with, like Viking Press and Johnson Publications. At Sussex we did do something a little odd this year. We released a record called "Phonetic Rock." This was about phonetics and this, to me, would be a hard grind in terms of selling it through record distribution because it was an educational item. It had far more depth, as far as I'm concerned, than "Sesame Street" or the "Electric Company."

RW: Did you have a book associated with that?

Avant: We have a book in there that tells you all about it and we publish that, naturally.

RW: Do you view Sussex not only as an entertainment media, but as an educational media, a socializing media?

Avant: True. That's why I named it Sussex. It sounds like success and success means a lot of things. When people ask me about the name, I tell them well, it sounds like success and like sex and those are the two most important things in life. If you live, you gotta have some kind of success doing something and sex has got to be involved, because how did you get here—which came first, the chicken or the egg?

RW: Do you view the record industry as being separate from the rest of the world's social or political activities or does it reflect those activities?

Avant: There's a song—I don't know who it was written by—it goes, "without a song, a man don't have a friend." I think, when you look at this industry, it has a great moral responsibility. All the bad things you're hearing now, all the investigations going on, that's all minor. America went through a total social revolution during the fifties and sixties with Dr. King, Whitney Young and Roy Wilkins, the kids at SNCC, and one of the groups of people that they were able to attract was the entertainment media. Without their support, financially, and visibly, I doubt whether Dr. King would have been as successful in attracting the kind of attention he got from the news media.

RW: Do you view that contribution as an ongoing contribution or responsibility?

Avant: Sure. You're dealing with human beings and to me they're not something you put into computers, push a button and say, "Shit." My views are that I look at myself this way—I'm not concerned about what my next door neighbor is thinking about what I'm doing. I could care less, as long as the guy respects me. I have to say, as a black man, there are few of us that get into the large corporations and, when we do, we're put in a corner with a pencil and a pad. Very rarely do you see them making the top echelons, the private clubs, vice president or president. The most important areas, to me, of social responsibility are economics and politics. Those are two areas that are most important to black survival.

The entertainment industry is one area in which we've made some strides—very minor. Not great at all when you stop to look at it. Let's just take the record industry, for instance. With the exception of ABC, Atlantic, Polydor, Bell, I don't know of any other white companies that have a black vice president. Most of the blacks hired by those companies, their titles are specialized product, r&b product, etc., etc. All euphemisms. And the thing that bothers me is that I don't understand how white guys can produce a black record, promote a black record, and think a black guy is incapable of doing the same thing for a white artist. I mean, what the hell's the difference? I don't want Ronnie

Mosely or Wendell Bates carrying just Bill Withers to a radio station. Shit, if I release a country and western record, if I release the Gallery, my men promote that also.

There's no reason why there have not been more black executives in the record industry with some responsibility. And I'm not talking about specialized. Can you show me an art director, a vice president in charge of public relations? I doubt that. Can you show me a vice president in charge of marketing? I doubt that. The myth is that black guys must take care of black product. I'll never forget when I released the Gallery record, a black guy called me up and said, "I thought your company was black." Well I said, "I am. But what has that got to do with the damn record?" I mean, do you call up Jerry Wexler at Atlantic and say, "Aretha Franklin is Black. Don't release her"? Shit, where are we going man. I can't go to the airport and get on a black plane and fly to New York.

RW: Are you saying that the music industry, as a microcosm of society, reflects society and, if it does, should the music industry be more of a leader and less of a reflector?

Avant: I can't say. Again, you're dealing with human beings. I don't know how you pick any one industry and say it should be a leader.

RW: What can Clarence Avant do to implement that desire to get more black people into positions of more responsibility in music or in politics or any other field?

Avant: I do that on my own terms. I was very much involved in Tom Bradley's campaign in Los Angeles. I was very much involved with Yvonne Braithwaite's campaign in Los Angeles, with Andrew Young's campaign, with John Connolly's campaign.

RW: Now, when you say involved, in what sense?

Avant: Doin' whatever I can. Giving concerts, making artists aware of their responsibility for supporting these people.

RW: So from your viewpoint, in your own activities, you can implement your own idea of political progress through the use of your own entertainment contacts and media.

Avant: True. But I also talk to the black businessmen about their responsibilities. I can't go into a white guy and say, "Look, give me \$10,000 for Andrew Young" unless I can do the same with a black guy. My theory in life is very simple—if you wake up in the morning and

can live through the next 24 hours, you're a lucky son of a bitch. Very, very lucky.

RW: Do you think investigations into the record industry's practices reflect Watergate in terms of corruption?

Avant: The record industry is small potatoes compared to Watergate. But I do think there are a lot of good things that have happened in the record industry that we're not getting credit for. Everybody, man, doesn't take dope. Everybody doesn't go into a radio station and say, "Here's a dollar. Play my record." Are we going to allow our asses to get kicked because of a few things that have happened? Man, that's not my problem.

I am concerned that we don't let this thing stop us from functioning. I mean, I want to make a living here. I tell you right now, a lot of artists have done a lot of things and some of them should come out and say some things. I think Carole King should give her viewpoints. I think Harry Belafonte should give his. I think Chicago and the Temp-

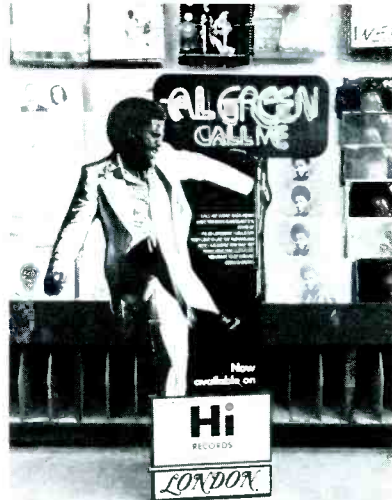

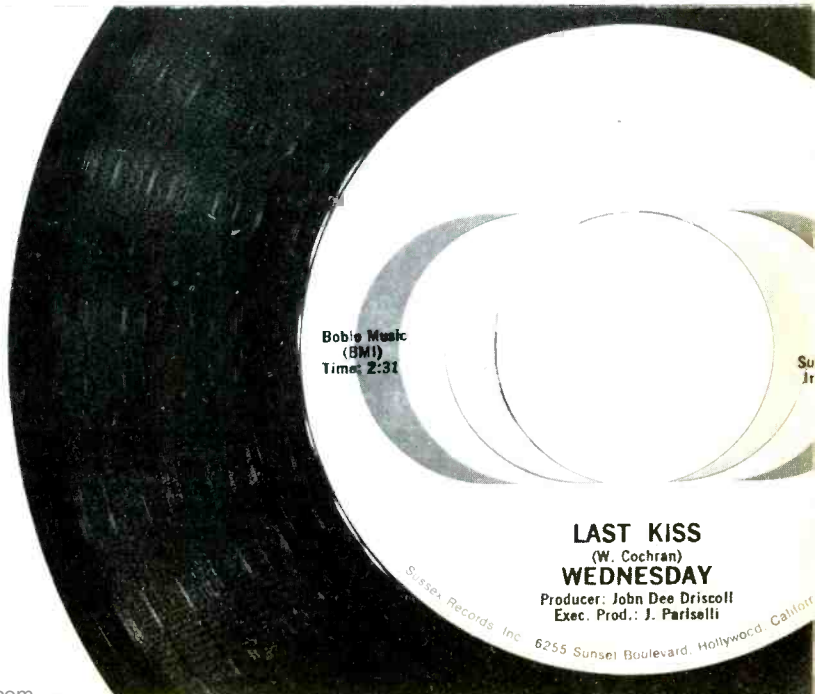

Impulse Artists Delight Carnegie Crowd

solos, as he soared above the pounding rhythms and flutes. He showed his lyrical side on "Michellina" (named for his wife) and had the audience on its feet at the end.

Alice Coltrane materialized next, playing her peculiar brand of celestial music that combines eastern mysticism with a little bit o' funk. Her reading of "A Love Supreme" was highly effective, as was her last tune, a superpowerful rendition of her late husband's zodiacal zinger "Leo." Jimmy Garrison on bass turned in an especially melodic solo on this one, but the group's sax man screamed along with no respite, and so was ultimately boring.

All in all, however, Impulse and New Audiences did themselves right proud. Simply splendid contemporaneous.

Bye Says Hi

■ NEW YORK—New rock group Barnaby Bye (Atlantic) was the premier attraction at Huntington Hartford's new Showcase room last week (23) and, though the innocent and exuberant rock band seemed totally out of place in the slick upper East-Side confines of the room (being much more suited to a high school gym or a more down home and loosely-ambience room than to the plush highly styled atmosphere of the Showcase), Bye revealed itself to be one hell of a talented band.

No Pretensions

The group puts out good happy rock n' roll with no amount of great subtlety, no great symbolic messages, no pretensions. The group's strong points begin with a knack for writing good melodies that are complex while remaining eminently singable, and a talent for combining their youthful voices in delightful three and four-part harmonies, most evident on "Laneya," a tune off their new Ahmet Ertegun produced album and "I Think I'm Gonna Like It," their current single. Another highlight was a short tuneful vignette, "I Won't Step On Your Shoes," a modest and absolutely lovely song.

The group was hampered by the fact that there was no room to dance among all the tables, velvet and eye-shadow — and Barnaby Bye is definitely a band to dance to. All night long.

Cover Story:

The Newest Osmond Superstar

■ It's not unusual to find the name Osmond on the single and album best-seller lists, but the listings for "Paper Roses," both single and album from MGM Records, are slightly unique because the artist in this case is the internationally-acclaimed family's only sister, Marie.

The 14-year old Miss Osmond makes her recording debut with the tune, produced in Nashville by country master Sonny James, and the unusual aspect is how quickly it made the cross-over onto the charts here and abroad.

Marie has a major hit on her hands, and somehow it makes up for having spent the past few years smiling in the shadows while the world lavished attention on her six brothers, when she's now with their major tour of Britain and the Continent.

Country Feel

The beautiful teenager always had a feeling for country music and, when MGM Records suggested she join her brothers on the recording scene, there was an immediate move in that direction. The label's Don Ovens helped select the tunes, leading off with "Paper Roses," then helped convince James to share in Marie's debut.

Marie, meanwhile, had made her entry into the professional world about six months earlier. Following a period of preparation, she started singing a number or two during Osmonds' concerts and, when the group played Las Vegas twice earlier this year, the program included a song by Marie.

Mercury Rushes Reynolds Album

■ NEW YORK — The Mercury label of Phonogram, Inc. is rush-releasing "Ask Me What I Am," the debut album by popular movie star and media personality Burt Reynolds. The album was co-produced by Bobby Goldsboro and Buddy Killen.

An extensive advertising campaign is being planned, according to Lou Simon, Senior Vice President/director of marketing, including television spots tied to an upcoming NBC-TV Special in November for Reynolds. There will also be heavy radio and print advertising for "Ask Me What I Am."

The album was recorded at the Sounds Shop in Nashville. Following the recording sessions, Reynolds left immediately for Georgia to begin work on his next film, "The Longest Yard."

It was "Paper Roses," of course, and during that last Vegas stand in October, the single was released and began its race toward the top of the charts, where **Record World** has the single bulleted at 5 and the album in the 68 position with a bullet.

Marie's records, along with those by other family members, are marked by MGM on the Osmonds' Kolob label.

McGuinn Drops In

■ NEW YORK — Roger McGuinn (nee Jim) presents an unusual personality for someone who has been a musical success for as many years as he has. A recent visit to the **Record World** offices was proof enough that a great deal of musical talent and a little bit of healthy insanity can be combined into long term success.

Stopping around on the eve of an appearance at Avery Fisher Hall (known as Philharmonic in the good old days), McGuinn espoused a great deal of self-satisfaction about his recent work, including his recent album, "Roger McGuinn."

McGuinn and his band, consisting of Mike Woolford on keyboards, David Vaught on bass and Steve Schaefer on drums, are heading back to the studios to cut a new single sometime in November, and by the time a new lp gets together, the band will have a new name, according to the driving force behind the various permutations and combinations that were known as the Byrds.

"We'll probably call it 'The Adventures of Roger McGuinn,'" said McGuinn straightfaced.

"The album?" I queried.

"No, the band," he responded.

"Why?"

"Why not?"

McGuinn then picked up his portable telephone, dialed our office number, climbed into the elevator, made his way to the street (conversing over the phone all the way) and said, "Some cops are looking at me pretty strangely down here!"

It went on the chart at WFIL at #30 even though it will not be released for another two weeks according to a phone call that I just received from Jay Lasker, President of ABC/Dunhill Records. In addition, it is the station pic at WIBG Philadelphia with PD Jerry Del Colliano, and is getting heavy play at WIP Philadelphia with Dean Tyler, both of whom have been playing it for many weeks. Jerry Del Colliano of WIBG went especially out of his way to compliment veteran super ABC/Dunhill promotion man, Matty "The Humdinger" Singer, for his promotion of this album cut from the album, "You Don't Mess Around With Jim." This will be one of the biggest selling Christmas singles of all time!

Todd Rundgren We won't tell you much more about this record. It's a smash hit.

Loggins and Messina "My Music." A few PDs do not like the saxophone portion of this record, but we got very heavy vibes and radio station additions this week. At this point, I am prepared to predict that it is a hit. New: WRKO at #26 where PD Jerry Peterson told me: "It is a smash single, but I do not like the saxophone portion."

Al Wilson We have been telling you week after week that this would be one of the few soul crossover records out of the many soul monsters. Rosalie Trombley tells me: "CKLW is pulling top ten phones and it is #2." Marge Bush, WIXY Cleveland, informs me that it went from extra to #11 to #6 within just three weeks. It exploded 28-18 at KJOY Stockton, California, according to PD Dave Kraham. WHHY Montgomery, Larry Stevens, tells me: "It is a hit." New believers: KJR Seattle, WAKY Louisville, WQXI Atlanta. It came on the chart at #29 at WMAK Nashville according to PD Scott Shannon. It is on WCOL Columbus and WGOW Chattanooga.

Crossover tip of the week: Smokey Robinson "Baby Come Close." R&B sales are already huge in Chicago — in fact it is about the hottest new soul record in the Windy City where the Hawk will soon start to blow in from the lake and bite off everybody's nose. Smokey Robinson without a doubt deserves the title Poet Laureate of all contemporary lyric writers. In pure white areas such as Boston and Northeast Philadelphia, Smokey Robinson hits have always sold and acted like pure white records. We trust that Mort Weiner, Phil Jones and Ewart Abner of Motown will back this record 1000 per cent.

Stylistics This record jumped 22-18 at WDGY Minneapolis and exploded 36-27 WIXY Cleveland. It is #34 at KLIF Dallas. It debuted on the chart at WPGC Washington at #28 and Harv Moore told me it is a monster r&b and is starting to cross over pop. We have just confirmed that it is an r&b sales Leviathan-Monstrosity in the huge Chicago market. It went on the chart at WCOL at #28 and jumped to #21 at WRC Washington. New believers: Jerry Rogers at WSGA Savannah, Georgia; #25 WCAR Detroit; 23 WVIC Lansing (a key barometer) and went on key secondary station KQWB Fargo with Brian Cummings.

Steve Miller Band Some smart money still does not believe that this will be a hit. Well, they are

CLUB REVIEW

Yarrow Pleasing

■ NEW YORK—All things must pass, and where once we had Peter, Paul and Mary, we now are blessed with Peter and Paul and Mary. Peter Yarrow, the driving force behind much of the folk trio's golden music, has, as have his cohorts, emerged as a successful musical entity beyond the bounds and limitations that being part of such a multi-talented group presented.

Yarrow's appearance at Max's Kansas City (14), highlighted by a guest visit from John Lindsay (during an interlude in his love affair with the Mets), further established him as a performer who is comfortable in more than one musical milieu. Backed by the talents of Brian Cuomo, the brothers Scance (Peter and David) and Paul Marchetti, Yarrow and his band put forth folk, rock and some unusual reggae rhythms in an extremely coherent manner.

"Oh Happy Day," though a bit over-embellished, was evidence of precision vocal work, and "Questions Follow Questions, Answers Follow Answers" was a pretty tune, sometimes almost fragile to the ear. Adding a mellotron spices up quite a few numbers, and demonstrates Yarrow's willingness to work with new ideas. It was interesting to note that, in spite of a desire to remove the stigma of past associations that might stereotype his new music, Yarrow knows enough to throw in a "Puff the Magic Dragon" when the occasion warrants. His appearance, on the heels of his latest album, "That's Enough For Me" (WB) should pave the way for much more fine music for those with a yearning for Yarrow.

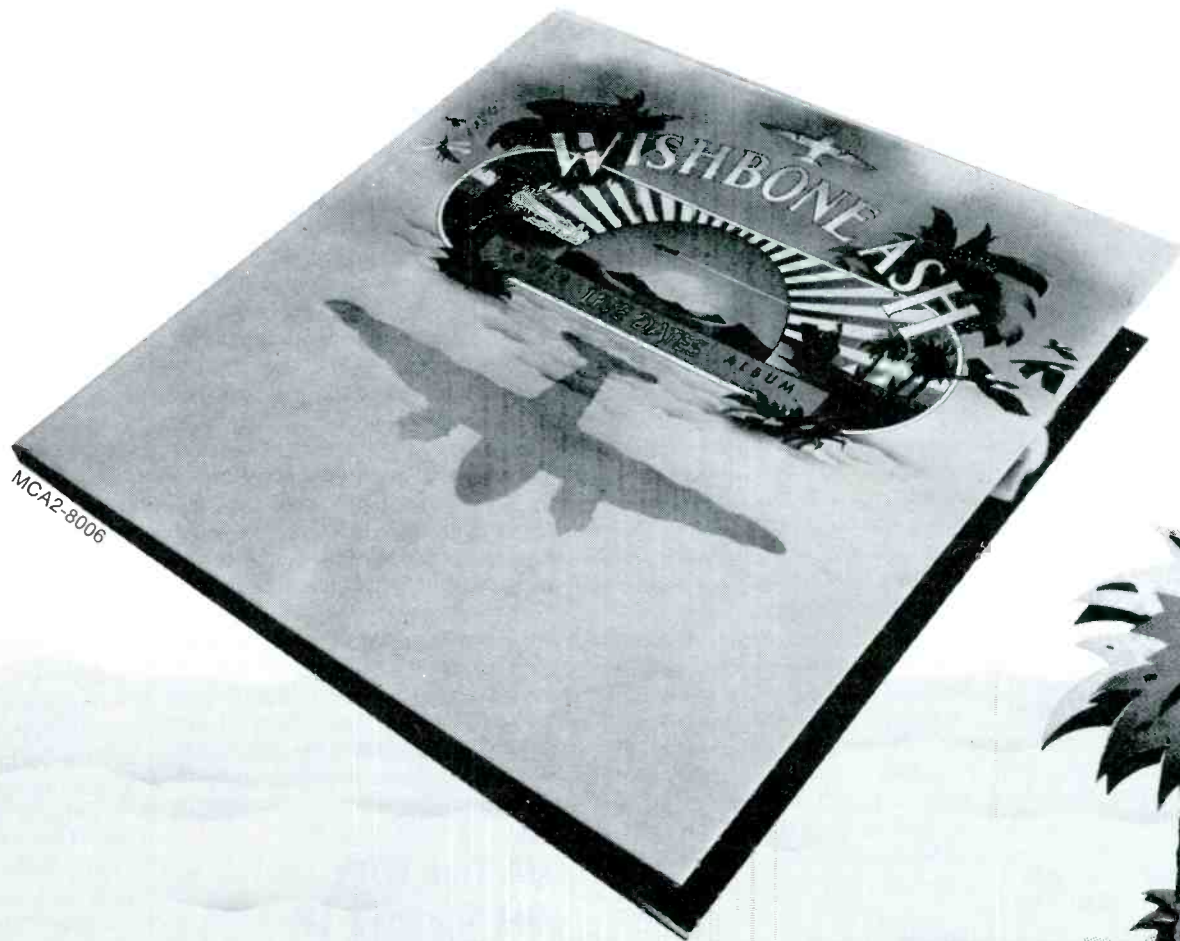

David Gates-On His Own

■ David Gates' new solo album, his first venture since the lamented breakup of Bread, has demonstrated that the dissolution of something good can sometimes lead to something even better. Gates' new album was the major topic of conversation when the Elektra artist paid a recent visit to the offices of Record World. Although somewhat reluctant to compare his solo venture to Bread's collective works, he was unable to hide his delight with this first opportunity to make the music just the way he wanted to.

"When we were in Bread, everybody expected a particular type of song, and I guess we all felt it was becoming pretty repetitive after awhile." Gates sang lead on most of Bread's biggest hits, as well as arranging and playing some guitar and piano. On his new album he has written all the songs and has also performed the producing and arranging chores. He is most pleased with the fact that he has been able to include some tough rock songs like "Do You Believe He's Comin'" in addition to lovely ballads like the singles "Clouds" and "Sail Around the World." Another side of Gates' Oklahoma-bred musical personality can be seen in a country

flavored tune like "Soap," which would probably be a strong country chart record. "Clouds" has been taken out of an ambitious 8-minute piece entitled "Suite-Clouds, Rain," but Gates said that he was not upset about having to take the tune out of its original context.

"I just wanted to turn as many people as possible on to 'Clouds,' and if they get the album because of the single it will be worth it."

Gates hopes to put together a short west coast tour next month with the musicians who played on the album, including Larry Carlton, Larry Knechtel, Russ Kunkel and others.

It will be tough to set it up in time," Gates explained, "but one of the things that will be best about being a solo is the chance to get out and do more performing. The trouble is, people don't really know who I am yet, they only knew us as Bread."

Once people hear some of Gates' music, they'll see that he is finer than ever.

UA Out With Del Shannon LP

tations should give theirs.

RW: The point is though that with the people you mentioned, white as well as black, do you think it would be to their advantage to be that visible?

Avant: Why not. What do they have to hide?

RW: Well, that's what we don't know.

Avant: Well, just because a few guys at CBS did some things, that's no reason for the whole industry to get panicky.

RW: Alright. Then you are saying that the whole industry should become more visible, go on a pr campaign to show the good that they have done.

Avant: You're damn right. I presume that in order to water Watergate down, somebody had to come back with another scandal, to try to take pressure off. And I'm saying that it's bullshit. I read an article in the Times about a guy from Metromedia saying that they weren't going into r&b music because they didn't want to get involved in the payola. I don't think he was watching Watergate, do you? There wasn't a black cat involved in it. What does he think we do, man? What does he think black music is about? That's the only art form we have in this country that's original, at least that I know of.

RW: Western civilization, though, from the Greeks on, has always felt that the black man is different. We're seeing it in the microcosm of the music business; some people are convinced that all you have to do to get a black record broken is to party all night, which isn't so.

Avant: All I can suggest is one thing. Motown records is a large black company, God bless them for being able to survive—I have the highest respect for Berry Gordy and my good friend Ewart Abner, who is President now. Then you look at the other two or three companies—Stax, Philly International, Hot Wax, Sussex and a couple of others—those companies, when you total them up, would not represent one per cent of the record business financially. However, according to your competitors and your own paper, black artists represent on a yearly basis, I would say, in '72-'73, 45-50 per cent of the business artistically. Now looking at that, man, I don't know where there's payola. Who's paying, white folks? Well, you ain't givin' them black folks nothin. I read in the paper where some s.o.b got \$7,000 for a tip sheet. I think I should start five of them. I'd make much more money. What I'm sayin' is that this whole payola bullshit with black people has got to go. We don't represent the record business. And the radio stations—I owned one, but there ain't 20 more owned by blacks. Out of 7,000.

RW: You talked about groups like Gallery. How does Sussex go about doing things with a group like Gallery in the attempt to get that rounded involvement? Someone once told me that Sussex views itself as a little A&M, that is very independent, going its own way, signing whatever it likes, etc.

Avant: I view myself as Sussex records. If the Carpenters became available and it wouldn't cost me a lot of money—I can't steal them—I would certainly make a pitch for them. They wouldn't get much money 'cause I ain't got none.

RW: You're out of the womb now because you're totally independent now that you've left Buddah. Why was that?

Avant: Because I felt that it was time, that if I'm going to make decisions, I'm going to make them totally. I have a good relationship with Buddah. I got a lot of respect for Art Kass and Neil Bogart. I felt like I wanted to be the same as Buddah. Own my own. Same as CBS.


I want to build a company based on my beliefs, based on what I feel. I don't believe independent distribution won't survive. It will only survive if the industry wants it to survive. If the few independent companies that are left out there and the ones that are owned by the large companies decide that they want to keep independent distribution, it's gonna last. But independent distributors must say to themselves, "Do I want to be forced out of business by UDC or CBS or MCA or Capitol." If that's their desire then I won't have any problems making a deal with some big company. But I don't want to do that. I could've made a deal with any company I wanted to, but I made my decision. And I probably could've been very happy financially. But I didn't want that. I saw reasons to do what I did. I discussed this thing with Jesse, Al Bell, Abner, George Johnson and others and we all felt that, "Hey, man, if you got the balls, try it." You never know until you try it. I think it was great to have been with Buddah. But, I also think the industry is big enough for me to come in and make a responsible living. I don't regret I've made that decision and I'm very proud of what's happened.

RW: In other words, you do not agree with what seems to be the prevailing view of larger and larger conglomerates.

Avant: No. You know, I knew Berry Gordy when he started—and some people say they could've done it 10 years ago but not now—and I don't believe that another CBS couldn't be started now. I certainly wouldn't want to believe that there couldn't be another Motown Records. I would hate that. If we represent so much on the charts and so much on the buying end of it, then we must, so far as I'm concerned, be able to own a piece of it.

RW: Well, let's talk specifically about the lever that you have, aside from your political and social understandings and interests. How do you view the record industry's and also your own activities in black films?

Avant: We don't own MGM, or Warner Bros. or Columbia. And you ask yourself this question: Until Melvin Peebles came out with "Sweet-back," did you think that black people did not go see John John Wayne or Frank Sinatra? Did you think that Sidney Poitier represented the whole 22-25 million black population? Man, we had no choice. If you're talking about black films, and I presume you're talking about films like "The Mack" and "Superfly" and whatever else is out there; I don't really even know. I just went to see "Paper Moon." I thought it was pretty. I didn't see no black cat in there. Let's don't get that myth that black folks just go to see black films. Now let's go to the economics side of this motion picture business. If the industry had been concerned about black films, about black talent, black writers, black cameramen, etc., there would have been some. There were none, man. And when Berry Gordy did "Lady Sings The Blues"—hell, there was only one black cameraman in the union. Now whose fault is that? I mean, I have submitted things to every major studio and got turned down, champ. There is a very simple reason that black oriented films have been released. Your real estate man handling your cities was dying for lack of business—I'm talking about your theatres—from your white-oriented films, because they weren't doin' any business. Sure, they had "The Godfather," we went to see it too, by the way. And "Love Story," we saw all that. I loved both of them. But, you see, the Apollo Theatre was uptown on 125th Street. That's when we were not allowed downtown. Washington, Detroit, Baltimore, L.A. or what. They had theatres there. But what happened was very simple. The industry realized that there was a vast black market that was untapped. And you know what you all do when you all get excited. You come out with just droves of shit. All one point of view. Black folks shoot dope, black folks sell dope, black folks run whores. Ya'll do too. That's not where we are, man. You go back and count all the black films that have been released in the last four years and see how many black folks own them and how many black folks directed.

RW: So your view of the exposure of black films is basically financial. That is, they're doing the business now, and that's why they're being produced and that's where people are spending their money.

Avant: Let's face it, that's what makes America go.

RW: What about your own film?

Avant: Well, "Save The Children" is a film that will benefit Operation Push. It was made primarily with black people manning the equipment, thereby giving jobs to a whole lot of people. You see, just as the executives in the movie business are mostly white, so are most of the technicians, which is a damn shame, and something that has to be rectified. The film was financed through a loan which has to be paid back, by the way—we don't want somethin' for nothin'!

RW: Do you consider the film a black film?

Avant: Well, the majority of the artists in the film are black, but I don't see it as a black film at all. Like I said before, just as black people go to see Glenn Ford and John Wayne, we hope that white folks will go see our film, for many reasons. If they don't, well, it's their loss. Really has nothing to do with us.

RW: Do you see the film as part of your own involvement in social action?

Avant: Definitely. Listen, man, I don't ever get involved in anything that doesn't have something to do with humanity. I'm a man. Not a black man or a white man or a red man, but a man. I was born, I sleep, I eat, one day I'll die. But before that happens, I gotta do somethin', in fact every man should do somethin', to let people know that he was here.

Hamilton Explodes

■ NEW YORK—Veteran jazz man Chico Hamilton (Stax) played at Mikell's here last week and once again proved that he is truly a giant on the drums. Hamilton, whose music has gone from cerebral to latin to funky and back again, has settled into a truly contemporary groove that combines rock rhythms, blues, a little bit o' latin and some incredible musicianship.

Hamilton, backed by a group of young all-stars (Arnie Lawrence on reeds, Barry Finnarty and Nathan James on guitars and Mike Richmond on bass) flew through a bunch of tunes including the ever-green "Satin Doll" and originals "I Woke Up This Mornin'" (a blues on which Hamilton took a superb vocal), "First Light" and "The Street Musician."

The cozy environs of Mikell's echoed with Hamilton's explosive drum tone—and he drove the band into great performances. Lawrence played several especially powerful solos with the two guitarists riffing in harmony behind him. A really good evening of music.

Dick Gregory's Mission

■ NEW YORK — "Some people think that because the college kids don't make as much noise as they did, that they aren't doin' anything anymore, but that's not true. They're dealing with problems that affect their lives. They're winning victories in new areas."

So says Dick Gregory, near-legendary civil rights activist, lecturer, comedian, author and recording artist. Gregory has recently released a double album on Poppy Records, "Caught In the Act," which contains Gregory's farewell nightclub appearance. Henceforth he will devote his time to over 300 college dates a year, in addition to selected TV and radio gigs. Gregory's reasons for leaving the lucrative nightclub field are as direct and sincere as Gregory himself.

"I talk against drugs and alcohol all the time, because I think that they're so dangerous for people, and working in nightclubs doesn't fit in with that too good. I truly believe that one day some universal force will balance out our ledgers, and he's gonna ask one simple question. He's not gonna

ask how much money you made, where'd you live, where'd you play, was you good, did they laugh. He's only gonna ask one question: How much service did you give to your fellow human beings. Just that simple. And if I work nightclubs, it cuts down on the amount of service I can give."

Gregory will also avoid concert dates because they demand that he be funny all the time, and he feels that his major efforts must go towards educating, lecturing and meeting people. "Even when I'm talking at colleges it comes out funny cause I'm a funny cat anyway, but when I speak at colleges in small towns I get to say things people there have never heard. Sometimes they do radio broadcasts of the talks that reach a lot of people wouldn't normally get to hear this kind of stuff."

Gregory has long been associated with the peace movement as well as with civil rights, though he feels that the peace movement should become far more active now that America is out of Vietnam.

"Peace movements have to be strong and active during peacetime to keep peace. If they wait till we find another war somewhere then it's too late."

Gregory is also a busy author with several books to his credit. His latest is a nutrition book called "Dick Gregory's Natural Diet For Folks That Eat." (Harper & Row). He is also working on a book with collaborator Jim McCraw that interprets Bible stories through Gregory's perceptive eyes.

He feels that his main work must be carried out on college campuses, but that records will help him keep in touch with many more people. Reaching people is always on Dick Gregory's mind, because he carries a great mission—to bring word to all Americans of what we can be if we try.

no movement and did not hold viewer interest. Crane decided to add more movement for the ubiquitous celebrity announcers and use more special effects and costumes. A pleasant side effect is that the tremendous exposure of the ads boosted the careers of several artists.

"Chubby Checker's club appearance fees multiplied following his ad exposure, and the same happened to Louis Prima," he says. Crane, who had met with some resistance from performers offered announcing roles, now finds that artists approach him for the chance to make a commercial.

Crane also contends that his commercials have helped create interest in record company catalogue product. He cites the example of Capitol Records' release of Nat King Cole material to special packaging companies. The tremendous TV exposure given to Cole has helped boost sales for Capitol.

According to Crane, special package ads will continue to help record stores by "cultivating now dormant markets," and saturation market retailing through major chain stores has become a large segment of his business. He believes that the next major step will be association with record companies supplying professional marketing guidance and ad campaign development.

ALBUM PREVIEW

Derringer Album A Superb Effort

■ In putting together his first solo album, "All American Boy," Rick Derringer has chosen, as is often the case these days, to back himself with some premier talent, including Bobby Caldwell, Joe Vitale, Edgar Winter and David Bromberg. What's different about Rick's effort, however, is the fact that the "sidemen" do not steal the show, and what emerges is pure Derringer—eclectic, exciting and extremely well thought out.

The lp, co-produced by Derringer and Bill Szymczyk, opens up with the same fine uptempo chooglin' on "Rock and Roll Hoochie Koo," backed with nifty drums by Bobby Caldwell. On two separate occasions, "Joy Ride" and "Time Warp," Rick returns to short instrumental cuts as a forum for his own fast-fingered virtuosity on guitar, the latter's rhythmic nuances being unusually intriguing. Jumping from one milieu into another seems to present no problem for Rick, and aided by some slippery dobro work from David Bromberg and his own penchant for pedal steel, "Cheap Tequila" emerges as a definitive example of country-tainted rock.



Side two, featuring a smattering of keyboard work by Rick's musical cohort Edgar Winter, goes beyond production and performance in establishing Derringer's lyrical writing ability. "The Airport Giveth (The Airport Taketh Away)" is a deftly handled, tongue-in-cheek rock 'n roller's lament, and "Slide On Over Slinky" incorporates earthy straightforward lyrics with good, tough, gritty rock 'n roll.

As one of those rare albums that contains not a single "throwaway" cut, the first release on Steve Paul's new Blue Sky label should, with a minimum of exposure, shotgun Derringer right to the top.

Deodato, Flash Just Fine

■ SANTA MONICA—Eumir Deodato, Brazilian superstar and keyboardist extraordinaire, rocked the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium recently with an eight-piece orchestra backing him. Consisting of two congas, sax, trombone, two horns, drums and a distinctive lead guitar, the band provided the famed pianist with strong support. Their music, at times, might remind the casual observer of a somewhat more powerful Santana—without vocals—since they often took flight to a Latin beat, with the horn players exchanging their horns for wood blocks and other percussion instruments. Deodato opened with "Rhapsody in Blue," which immediately established the tempo for the remainder of the show. Particularly crowd pleasing were his versions of "Nights in White Satin" and, of course the number that left most of the audience screaming for more, "Thus Spoke Zarathustan."

There is no getting around the fact that Deodato is a man to be respected and enjoyed. He is a legitimate talent. Yet, when viewed jointly with his 2001 Space Orchestra, he wasn't really overly impressive. Maybe more polished intricacies will be forthcoming as the tour proceeds and the members of the group get to know each other better musically.

By comparison, Flash, an English group whose members perform with an almost erotic frenzy, were so tight that it would have been hard to slip one of your \$6.50 tickets between them. An innovative hard jazz-rock sound, held together with solid and often exciting and unpredictable performances by each member were the ingredients which combined to produce this refreshingly entertaining and distinctive concert act.

John Wesley Jackson opened the show with a short, but effective warm-up monologue.

■ The death of **Sister Rosetta Tharpe**, noted gospel singer and guitarist, came as a shock to many. On Monday, October 8, **Fred Mendelsohn** of Savoy Records and a group of musicians were awaiting Sister Tharpe's arrival to do a recording session when they received a call telling them she had been rushed to the hospital. She died Tuesday morning, October 9, in Philadelphia, Pa., at Temple Hospital. The funeral was scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 16, at the Bright Hope Baptist Church, 12th and Columbia Streets in Philadelphia.

Sister Tharpe was born **Rosetta Nubin** in a town in Arkansas called Cotton Plant. She learned religious songs from her mother, **Katie Bell Nubin**, and sang them as a child, frequently together with her mother.

For a while, Rosetta Tharpe travelled with **Lucky Millender's** band, and received notable acclaim. Her marriage to **Russell Marrison**, in the ball park in Washington, D.C., made headlines across the country.

Sister Tharpe travelled all over the world spreading gospel throughout Europe and America, from the largest concert halls to the smallest Churches. "Strange Things Are Happening Everyday," "Precious Memories," "Walking Up The King's Highway" and "Peace In The Valley" were some of the popular recordings done by Sister Tharpe. For a number of years she shared the spotlight with **Sister Marie Knight**.

Angel's First Angel

■ NEW YORK — In the record business executives tend to move fairly quickly from one job to another, but few if any can rival the variety of endeavor accomplished by the present managing director of the Metropolitan Opera Guild, Dario Soria. He has founded two well-known and important record companies, created the Soria Series for RCA, a line of recordings that has never been forgotten for its unique appearance, extraordinarily expanded RCA's outlets overseas and now has embarked on a course to make more vital America's oldest and most prestigious opera guild. Stricken by a severe heart attack in 1972 Soria has gradually pulled back to good health and now radiates the same drive and determination as before. **RW** talked with him on a sunny autumn day last week on the occasion of the issue of "The Angel Album," a two record set celebrating the twentieth birthday of one of his children, Angel Records. The album contains an informative, witty articles by Dorle Soria, Dario's wife, telling how they founded Angel and of the first four years until they sold their interest to Capitol.

Soria, now back with "live" music for the first time in twenty-five years, has a fund of stories on his career—in records and out. He emigrated to the United States before World War II and worked with the Office of War Information, then with CBS. Serving there as an assistant producer, he once caused a minor flap. "My accent was much heavier than it is now," the spare, animated executive recalled, "and one day I had to give the station-break over the network. It was wartime, and my boss called me in—immediately. I expected to be praised; it was, after all, the main function of my job to be ready to step in and give a station-break. He pulled up a chair, and said, 'Dario, sit down. I heard your break, and I have had quite a few calls. In your case we'll just forget the requirement of announcing. You know, we're at war, and people get worried...'"

As a part of a postwar cultural mission to Italy, he made contact with Cetra Records and arranged to release opera recordings in the United States under the name Cetra-Soria. As soon as the long playing record was invented, in 1948, the Cetra catalogue went wild, and by 1953 it contained

over forty complete operas.

The contact with EMI and the decision of Dario and Dorle Soria to create Angel as EMI's American outlet is told too well in "The Angel Album" to repeat, except for one point. The Angel symbol—an angel tracing sound with a stylus—is older than Victor's dog, dating back to the English Gramophone Company in 1898; Soria found it and convinced EMI of the wisdom of the name "Angel" and the trademark.

The Sorias had a problem at the beginning. Most of the greatest artists available to them from the English company — Elisabeth Schwarzkopf, Walter Gieseking, Herbert von Karajan—had somewhat uncomfortable connections to wartime Germany. To make sure that there were no political problems, the Sorias through EMI's Walter Legge negotiated an exclusive contract with La Scala, Milan (which gave the world much of the art of Maria Callas) and another exclusive with the Israel Philharmonic, just then beginning its distinguished career. Angel also soon won a contract with that bitter foe of Nazism: Otto Klemperer.

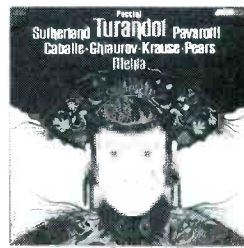
The birth of Angel in November 1953 saw a distinguished first release, some of which can be sampled on "The Angel Album," and soaring sales. Soria sees two major advances from his first year at Angel: "We originated the factory sealed record. This took courage in 1953, because no one believed that anyone would buy a record they couldn't test. However, the record stores were in pain. In the old 78 days, a customer could listen to a record in three minutes; now they were sitting in the booths listening to whole operas. And the lp record was more fragile, much more susceptible to scratching than the 78, so the manufacturer was getting more records turned back. The funny thing was how fast the new idea caught on. The freshness of the product turned people on, and we never had to argue for it." Interrupted by a quick visit from an Italian delegate to the United Nations paying a call at the Opera Guild, Soria returned, picking up the sentence where he left off. "Our second advance was a contract negotiated with Ricordi for royalty payments for orchestral parts, librettos and music rights

■ Final nominees for the Fourth Annual World Popular Song Festival have been announced by the Yamaha Foundation for Music Education. This year Yamaha received 37 applications to enter songs from 30 countries, including 63 songs from America, 57 from England, 55 from South Africa, 54 from France and 33 from Italy. The festival schedule will be: primary contest part I on November 16; part II on the 17th and finals on November 18. Master of ceremonies will be Japanese singer **Kyu Sakamoto**, famous world-wide for his hit "Sukiyaki."

On October 3, TV channel 12 in Tokyo started the "In Concert" rock series, featuring such names as **Alice Cooper**, the **Allman Brothers Band**, **Poco**, **David Bowie** and **Curtis Mayfield**.

Report On Top 100 Singles And Album Charts

In the top 100 singles chart, rapid movement is more common in the upper ranks than in the lower 50 spots. In the upper half, it often happens that the most popular singers remain on top. In fact, **Mari Amachi**, **Megumi Asaoka**, **Hiroshi Go** and **Goro Noguchi** stay there almost continuously, competing with one another. An interesting sidelight is the fact that they're all teenagers. Singers in the lower ranks are always striving to reach the top. Presently selling well are "Aoi Kapitsu" by **Momoyo Yamaguchi**, **Junko Sakurada's** "My Blue Bird" and "Chigieta Ai" by **Hideki Saijo**. All of them are increasing in sales because they supposedly reflect our times and because they have the advantage of pretty, charming faces and modern sense, but we wonder if their songs are really that good.

Trends in the album charts are not always as clear as in singles. If record buying trends remain slack it is natural that the album chart will remain stable. But if even slight movement is apparent the most popular records will decline in ranking due to changing public taste. One example is **Mari Amachi's** "Wakaba no Sasayaki." It was the most popular lp ever in Japan, but has now dropped to lower rank. This is consistent with our analysis.

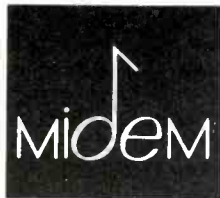

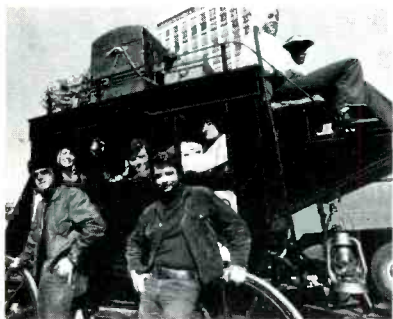

(2) Ask him to contact Representative Harley Staggers, Chairman of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee; or Senator Henry M. Jackson, Chairman of the Senate Interior Committee.

(3) Request that the Senate/House conference committee be asked to insure that the recording industry receives fair treatment in the allocation of petroleum-based materials.

Gortikov indicated that RIAA expects later to undertake a series of steps aimed at alleviating complex industry supply problems. "This immediate contact with House and Senate conferees," he stated, "offers an early, definitive opportunity for individuals in our industry to encourage helpful action."

gone to a 5-day week, and that Columbia was not accepting any new pressing business. Roberts hinted, and other sources confirmed that Columbia was in effect using an allocation system in its plants.

Retailers throughout the country, both large and small, have already told **Record World** they are beginning to feel the pinch, as shipments from branches and factories had slowed down considerably; "we're going to get killed at Christmas" was the way one retailer put it. And label executives confirmed in off-the-record discussions that there are orders for millions of albums backlogged at their plants—orders that they are unable to fill. One sales manager revealed that he told his salesmen to "take it easy" in writing their orders. All admitted difficulty in filling orders.

In a related development, informed sources have told **Record World** of the appearance of signs in record stores, warning customers that because of the vinyl shortage and resultant problems, the stores will no longer accept returns on warped albums. Last week **Record World** noted that defective albums would probably increase because of the use of recycled vinyl.

The vinyl shortage was also reported by Newsweek as primarily affecting small manufacturers, who do not have stocks of vinyl. One reason given for the shortage was heavy Japanese purchases of vinyl.
