NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The tax articles which appeared in the previous issues of The Billboard were intended to acquaint the reading public with the principal changes made by the new tax law, which became effective November 1, 1951. WASHINGTON, Jan. 5—The Federal Communications Commission proposal to order annual filing of unexpired patent agreements by firms in broadcasting telephone and other services brought an outcry this week from industry representatives and patent attorneys that FCC would gain authority and power not authorized by law and in violation of "fundamental concepts" of the U. 





It was reported that more than four NFB films are being televised every day to American audiences over the networks or on individual stations. There were a total of 1,523 bookings of the Canadian films while receipts were \$14,243.

# Surveys Show Sets Tuned, Despite TV

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The Bill-board's Radio-TV Show Charts which have appeared in this department the last nine weeks have pointed up that the radio's head may be slightly bloody, due to various onslaughts, Il's still far from bowed. Statistics in these charts have demonstrated that, in cities enjoying the services of television stations, people do not chuck their radio sets into the garbage rans. They listen to them.

Pulse share -of-total-audienes studies have been published on eight multi-channel TV cities. In very case, radio had a greater share of the audience over the entire week than video had, ranging from 63.6 per cent for radio in Cincinnati to 87.9 in Birmingham, Ala. During daylight hours, Monday to Friday, radio's share was even greater, ranging from 75.2 per cent in Cincinnati, to 81.5 in Birmingham.

Even a Los Angeles origination, "Colgate Comedy Hour," starring Donald O'Connor, when it was seen there early in the day so that it hit New York in an evening slot, was much weaker in the West than in the East. However (aside from possible goodwill involved), it's dobatable if these aircrs ever pack any real entertainment value for dialers. Exception, of course, is when radio seg of such shows are treated as separate entities production-wise and completely divorced from the regular auditorium prefentations (a la Jack Benny's hilarious half-hour for the Friar's). In view of Hope's sock talent line up, this show was a disappointment, Hope and Crosby indulged in their usual insult routine about latter's excess profits and poundage, but the gags were pretty stale. With the exception of Crosby's vocals, the rest of the show was equally dult, Billed as a "turprise visitor." Sinntra didn't show up until the last three minutes of the broadcast, and then he didn't have anything in do. Trensendous applause of the grafeful patients only served to emphasize pallid quality of the jokes preceding it.

### Regular Viewers of Top TV Shows. New Sets vs. Old Sets

... According to Videodex Reports

THE longevity question is frequently raised by the broadcasting industry. It is asked "Is the program a superficial flash in the pan, or does it have a solid base?"

Analysis frequently look to figures on viewing among homes in which sets have recently been installed as distinguished from homes that have had a television set for some time. The implication is that if the program is viewed by the older TV homes, there must be a solid base. But if the program tends to be viewed only by recent purchasers, the inference is drawn that this is a novelty effect and the program's audience will drop. Some segments or the industry have also used figures showing that older television set purchasers, ontinue to do a large amount of television viewing so that we should expect retings to remain at a high level.

ments o the industry have also used figures snowing that vince television set purchasers ontinue to do a large amount of television viewing so that we should expect ratings to remain at a high level.

The truth of the matter is that original television set purchasers were TV enthusiasts and do a large amount of viewing for that reason. Recent television set purch ers represent a different type of group. They will do a large amount of viewing for the first 8 to 12 months, but then this viewing drops off. Differences between old set purchasers and new set purchasers should be interpreted in terms of differences in the characteristics of these two groups of homes, rather than answering that differences at a due to the "longevity of the program."

Another approach to analyzing the audience foundation of program involves the "leaky bucket" analogy. The sponsor should be interpreted in knowing how many homes are being poured into the leaky bucket and how many immediately leak out, contrasted with the number of homes that remain in the leaky bucket and can be classified as regular viewers.

This study considers the regular viewers of the top 10 programs for July, 1951. The figures apply to the proportion of television homes in each group that viewed two out of three telecasts of each show based on April May and June, 1951, viewing in Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, New York and Philadelphia, all multi-channel markets.

The table shows that 47.3 per cent of the homes that bought sets before the Korean war (June, 1950), viewed two out of three segments of "Talent Scouts." Flynn is cast as Christopher Casanova, 'a direct descendant of the original' and some of his lines are downight fatuous. One might feel sorry for the actor if it weren't for the announcer's revelation that the series is 'based on an idea by, and starring Errol Flynn."

If the type-casting was actually his own idea, Flynn will have to bear the burden of sounding foolish. In all fairness, tho, the flicker star does try to imbue his role with the proper egree of tongue-in-cheek delivery, but the heavy-handed triteness of the script usually defeats him.

The only time you have a capital loss is when there is a closed or complete transaction. You cannot naticipate a loss and claim it as a deductible item, nor can you claim a loss because there is a shrinkage in the value of the property you own.

Then you will find skaters who have patronized a rink for a number of yeaps. Most operators can recall cases of former skaters visiting the rink after an absence of a few years and commenting on the change in patronage. Some operators tend to work with the skaters they have and neglect the cultivation of new patronage. Personally, I believe that for every 100 skaters you have in one year, fully 75 per cent of them will not be skating regularly a year later. Thus a constant effort is necessary to keep patronage at a good level. Sure, advertising and parties are sure to pick up some new skaters, but they won't pick up enough to keep business on the increase. Hence some plan, such as I have outlined, is necessary for the operator."

# Maestro Swaps Baton For Wild West Operas

(This is another of a series of articles on little-known facts about people prominent in outdoor show business.)

GORDON KIBBLER didn't give up his kingdom for a horse, but he did leave a varied career as band leader and talent booker to direct eventually a passel of equines und cow pokes in Eastern rodeos.

# German Act, Set for R-B, Killed in Fall

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Arno Wickbold, German motoreyelist who worked a bottomless wall of death and was scheduled to appear this season with the Ringling - Barnum circus, died here December 20 from injuries received while performing December 26 from injuries received while performing December 26 with the Bertram Mills Circus at the Olympia.

Wiekbold was maixing his first appearance in England. The equipment of his act included a structure similar to a Motordrome, with metal strips widely spaced to permit vlewing by the audience. After mounting the straight wall the floorless structure was hoisted into the air.

Fatal accident was due to a mechanical failure. Part of the act had Vickbold she dd ling clown's clothing while circling the globe. The mishap occurred when he dropped his shirt, which caught in the rear wheel of the cycle and caused a break in the machine's speed. Wickbold normally worked without a net. On this occasion a net, reported as far larger than the circumference of the globe, was underneath, but Wickbold missed it and fell only 10 feet from the barrier restraming the patrons.

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
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



FIVE-MONTH COIN TAX TAKE OFF \$3,000,000

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Uncle Sam's yield from the tax on coin machines in November was \$1,500,714 (M), a drup of \$1,263,731 (M) below November a year ago. But tax receipts from tobacco climbed \$33,255,291 (M) above November 1950, Internal Revenue Bureau reported this week. Tobacco taxes yielded \$144,770,436 (M) in November compared to \$111,515,-145 (M) last year.

Over the five-month period ended November 30 tax receipts from coin machines totaled \$14,776,902, a drop of \$2,703,727 from receipts of \$17,480,629 during the corresponding period in 1950. Tobacco taxes yielded \$047,258,497 in this period this year, a climb of \$56,687,917 over a yield of \$590,568,521 in 1950.



However, the new recordings of Snow Flake" and last year's Frosty, the Snowman" also were listed with the leaders this year.





One operator reported play on these records was so bad that it was "not worth the effort" to use them and he said he did not think he would "bother" with them next Christmas.


Another operator said he believed the public's taste was changing, that people were looking for new Christmas tunes.

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
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
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
