Here the year was marked by a sharp trend toward amalgamation of producers and distributors. A number of important new shows on film, oth nationally sponsofed and syndicated, hit the air. The

continue even stronger thru the new year.
Against the video action, motion pictures continued their struggle and did relatively well. The foreign markets particularly blossomed into increasingly im portant and lucrative sources of income for theatrical producers.

Standing out, however, in sharp contrast to this generally dark pieture, was Lis Vegas, where more in-the-Hesh shows than ever before were running, and most of them doing excel The legitim ued to stumble along, tho 1952 saw it in no worse shape, and in some ways healthier, than in the past several seasons.

CHOPIN: SONATA NO. 3. IN B MINOR. OP. 58, MAZURKASWilliam Kapell. Pianist (1-12") (33) LM 1715

This 12 -inch LP devotes the first side to Sonata No. 3, in date from 1825 side for some half dozen mazurkas ranging lyrical, giving a sin to 1849. Kapell's interpretation is highiy sages. The pianist's great lechnical facitity and deep understanding of the nature of the mazurkas make possible a reading with wide emotional meaning., Many labels have cut excellent versions of the Sonata No. 3 and the Mazurkas, but this disk is of the San Francisco Chronicle has written an informative set of liner notes. This should be a steady seller.
MOZART: CASALS FESTIVAL AT PERPIGNAN VOL. 2Columbia (33) SL 168

This is gift merchandise of a very special sort. The music it contains is timeless and can serve for any occasion. For Mozart enthusiasts, or the very many lovers of the art to whom the name "Casals" is stll musical magic, it will prove a magnet ough to resist. This second volume or the Festival at Perpignan contains tour Mozart plano concerios and one for chestra. One disk couples the Flute Concerto No. in in $G$, with John Wummer as soloist and the lith Piano Concerto in $E$ Flat. played by Eugene Istomin. On one, Myra Hess is heard in the Concerto No. 9 (K. 271). Another has the Concerto No. 22. interpreted by Rudolph Serkin. probably the most outstanding piatter in the package. Stil another carries the Concerto No. 27 in B. Flat, played by Meczylaw Horszowski, On a final record displays Casals' inscribed signature Tho there the latter of uncut vinyl on these disks. the shiny surfaces should not discourage any but the most inveterate bargain hunter. On this disk Cortot performs a good sampling of some of the finest compositions by Chopin. ## Bargains Vs. Fair Play

 Ed Cohn, of Lesco Distributors, Philadelphia, has forwarded a letter received froto one of his dealers returning asubstantial number of records to be credited to the latter's account. Angie Vespa. of the Harmony Shop, State College, $P a$, is the writer. Vespa is thoroly discouraged and blames the New York market for relegating the sale of excel. lent records to "bargain basement methods. He points out has a right to set his price, but whatever amount the list price calls for should be strictly ad. hered to. "This season," says Vespa. "records should be selling at a terrifie rate. but I find small getting an extremely People are buying their gift records at bargain counters and frequently don't know what they are buying. More and more people are sending to New York for their records. Even my best supporting eussets from me, nor do they glve me quantity orders. They just buy an occasional record from time to time. It is a shame and disgrace that the record comcontinue allow situation to
customer for wanting to save a few dollars, but the current selling set-up degrades music and everything it stands for." Vespa points out that there is no probem to price-cut selling.
He believes, however, that rec ords should be sold on the basis of musical knowledge and regard for each potentlal buyer as a music lover. The rub is that the same customer feels that a few dollars saved is worth more to him. "I have
tried," says Vespa, "to sell mu. tried, says Vespa, to sell mu*
sic and not bargains, but I find sic and not bargains, but ind the record companies could sell many times more records, if people could buy them from local dealers without the enigma of a bargain price hanging over them." He ad.
mits that he doesn't know the mins:yer, but he does know that he can't continue to shelve a fine stock without being able to sell it. "It actually hurts. when I know a release is good and can't communicate my enthusiasm to my customer. He doesn't react, because he knou's he can
Ofter, after I have talked a record up, he will come in later to tell me how wonderful it is. but the sad fact is that I didn't sell it to him. I wish $\sqrt{ }$ knew the answer. It's a sorry state of affairs, to say the least."
