At this point no one knows the answer to the big question:
How will commercials affect fuke box earnings? How will commercials affeot juke box earnings?

Recorded commercials mixed with music and played in New York's Grand Central Terminal flopped because of public resentment. Opponents of the juke commercial project point to the Terminal and similar instances to prove that they are right. But this argument ought not be allowed to prejudice the commercials iden.

The findings of any test conducted and measured by the project's ady undoubtedy would bromptly challenged.

An independent research firm-whose sole interest is in recording public opinion-must conduct the tes
