N. A. B. Congressional Delay Threatens Whole Radio Structure

FEDERAL control of radio, and with it the whole structure on which broadcasting and the radio industry have been developed, is in imminent danger of collapse as a result of the hesitation and delay in both houses of Congress. Very few people appear to realize the seriousness of this situation, and the result is that the only voices heard in Washington are those of malcontents who believe they would be able to better themselves in the scramble which would follow the return of radio chaos.

As things now stand, nobody knows what will happen to the Federal control of radio after March 15th. If no action is taken by Congress it will revert to the Department of Commerce, which certainly under present circumstances is not ready to handle it, and which would have to build up a new and very extensive regional organization in order to deal with the problems which are sill pending.

The Federal Radio Commission is supposed to consist of five members. At the present time it really consists of one. Judge Sykes is the only member of the Commission whose appointment has the seal of Congressional approval. Commissioners Caldwell, Pickard and Lafount have not been confirmed, and no appointment has been made to fill the place of Admiral Bullard.

It was recently reported that the Senate

Committee on Interstate Commerce, which held hearings on the subject of confirmation beginning January 6th, had favorably reported on the confirmation of the three unconfirmed members of the Commission. Within a few hours, however, this report was withdrawn and the Senate Committee determined to take no action until the amendment to the Radio Act continuing the life of the Commission for another year was passed by the House.

The hearings before the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries have already gone far afield, and there is every indication that they will continue to introduce matters quite outside the scope of the Radio Act. Meanwhile the Federal Radio Commission is practically paralyzed, because it can take no action unfavorable to any broadcasting station without the almost certain probability that some Senator or Congressman will use the incident as a reason for opposing the confirmation of one or more of the Commission's members.

It is further proposed to make the appointments of all the members of the Commission terminate automatically the latter part of February, 1929, despite the fact that all the members were appointed for a definite term of years, and the appointment of

Question. Please tell me whether there are any stations with the call letters KFUU, KTCL and KHAC. If so, where are they located.—A. W. H., Alameda, Cal.

Answer. KFUU has long been deleted. It was the Mathewson Motors Co., Oakland. KTCL has also long been deleted. It was located in Seattle, Wash. KHAC is operated by the Flying Broadcasters, San Francisco. Operates on 204 meters with 50 watts power. It is a portable station.

Question. Will you please publish in your columns the location of KMM and KGTR?

Answer. There is no station with call letters KMM. Perhaps you heard KMMJ at Clay Center, Nebraska. KGTR is not listed at the present time.

Have one of the standard makes of loop type superheterodynes, with Panatrope loud speaker. Cannot get distance, and would like to know what can be done, outside of moving to a new location.—C. G. C., San Francisco, Calif.

The probability is that you are in a location where a loop antenna will not pick up sufficient energy to receive the distant stations, and you should have an antenna connection of some kind. You can easily build a device which will enable you to use an outdoor antenna, by following the directions given herewith: Obtain a Silver Marshall type 110-A inductance coil, with its type 515 coil mounting. This mounting has six numbered terminals on it. Connect terminals 4 and 5 together, and to terminals 3 and 6 connect the two terminals in the receiver which are provided for external loop connection, disconnecting the present loop antenna altogether. The terminals 1 and 2 are those connected to the rotor coil, which will be used in the antenna circuit. Connect terminal 2 to a good ground connection, such as a water-pipe, and between terminal 1 and the antenna, connect a variable condenser of .0005 mfd. capacity, and a 100 turn honeycomb coil in series. By adjusting the position of the rotor coil, and tuning the condenser properly, you can obtain good selectivity, and greatly increase the distance over which you can receive, without making any changes inside the set. If you do not wish to build your own tuner, you can probably obtain one already built, at your dealer, or you can use a device such as the Sargent Isolator, or the Penetrola, with modifications to suit your particular set.

Have bought a Majestic A eliminator for my superheterodyne, but unfortunately the receiver requires, two A battery voltages, one of 3 volts for the 99 tubes, and 6 volts for the two audio tubes. How may I get the extra tap from the A eliminator?—F. G. A., Bakersfield. Calif.

Assuming that there are six type 99 tubes in your set, a 6 ohm rheostat should be connected with the slider to the positive binding post on the A eliminator and the other terminal of the rheostat should be connected to the plus 3 volt binding post on the set. Adjust the rheostat so that it has about half the resistance cut in, and turn on the filament rheostat controlling the 3 volt tubes. The voltmeter should not indicate more than 3.3 volts when the panel rheostat is turned up two-thirds of the way towards maximum, and if more voltage is indicated, the extra rheostat connected in the Positive A lead should have more resistance cut in, until the voltmeter records the right amount. No further change need be made in the rheostat after that, and it can be considered as a permanently adjusted resistance.

What About These Shortwave Broadcasters?

Describing a simple one-tube adapter whereby the ordinary receiver can be used for listening to these stations

We have become rather accustomed of recent years to the recording of phenomenal transmission work by our amateur friends in the short wave telegraph field, but the awakening of the average broadcast listener to realization of the extensive developments taking place in short wave broadcasting has been comparatively recent. At present, however, there appears to be quite a considerable interest in these short wave schedules of a number of well known stations; no doubt this heretofore passive interest has been stimulated by the recent announcements of picture transmission and experimental television, on the higher frequency bands.

In a later article we shall tell you more of the television experiments contemplated by certain local stations; for the present we will confine ourselves mostly to the description of a simple home-built unit which may be used as a short wave attachment with your present receiver.

First, however, let's see what new fields of exploration these much-talked-of short wave bands hold for us. Well, let's be content to start with local reception-that is. stations within the United States-for down here nothing is considered DX under four or five thousand miles. Not that the sole reason for building a short wave receiver is the urge for distance; but that same urge does die hard, and it is sometimes gratifying to switch from the locals and listen to an Easterner come pounding in. No, the obvious retort is not "Try and do it"-it is being done; the best part of it is that one needn't be a night owl to accomplish it on short waves. WGY broadcasting on one of several short wave plants, KDKA on 27 and 62.5 meters, and WRNY in New York on 30.9 meters are three of the Eastern stations putting their regular programs on the air nightly. Coming west we pick up WLW. the Crosley station at Cincinnati, on 52 meters, and several other well known mid-

westerners. Our own KGO will shortly have a transmitter going too, on about 35 meters. Then, as our skill in tuning increases, a possible foreigner may fall to our lot-say, the Hollander PCJJ, or maybe 2ME at Sydney. Not so unlikely as it seems, for listen to the log of a fan in New Zealand, using a unit similar to the one we will describe: "I picked up station 2XAF of Schenectady last Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m. and had a most enjoyable hour's program from him. . . . I heard a special call from 2XAF referring to the American broadcast of 2ME. He called their representative in San Francisco and told him he wished he could have been in New York early last week as they had broadcast 2ME's signals with great success." Not bad verbatim reporting for a mere 8000 miles, is it? Note especially the time of day. and the reference to WGY's re-broadcast of the Australian station. Must be something to this short wave stuff, what? Well, let's get started, then.

Practically all of the stations now broadcasting on short waves are on some portion of the band between 20 and 60 meters, so




Fig. 1. Construction of the fixed coil set.

the receiver unit described, therefore, will be one utilizing a fixed coil to cover this entire range. One can readily obtain suitable coils of the plug in variety to cover a multitude of bands, but as each coil set is designed to cover a restricted wave band. I have thought it advisable to include some information on the construction of an inexpensive coil, which may be wound at home in very little time.

A 5-inch piece of tubing 3 inches in diameter will do for the coil former. If the ribbed type can be had, it is to be preferred; if not, the ordinary straight-side tubing will do. The cut in Fig. 1 shows the completed form with the various coils marked. The first thing to do is to drill the form for wire terminals, these being the regular soldering tabs, held in place by a small machine The terminals should be offset slightly as the cut shows and fastened under their screws before beginning winding. The first coil to be wound is the primary and consists of 3 turns, using No. 22 DCC. The wire should be soldered to terminal 1 and then wound very tightly until you have the desired number of turns. The spacing is secured by winding a bit of ordinary string alternately with the wire. The string can be fastened under the nut of the starting terminal and pulled quite as tightly as the wire; it is essential to keep a good tension on the windings as otherwise they will slip from place and lose their uniformity of spacing. When the winding has been completed the wire is skinned and, with the tension still kept on it, is soldered to terminal No. 2. The string is then removed from between windings, and the secondary coil can then be wound. For your information in placing the terminals, there are 7 turns of No. 22 wire double cotton covered space wound, as described, to the half inch. I have chosen this size and kind of wire arbitrarily, only because one usually has a length of it on hand from odd jobs. However, any size from 18 to 24 will do nicely and will result in no serious divergence other than spacing of the soldering tabs at the wire terminals. If you are purchasing the wire especially for this job a 1/4-lb. should suffice.

The number of turns for each coil are: Primary 3, secondary 7 and tickler 4, with a 1-inch separation between primary and secondary windings. The tickler winding need not as a matter of fact be spaced, although the cut shows it to be. There is nothing to be gained by so spacing these tickler windings, and it is really unnecessary labor to do so. This coil should be separated from the lower end of the sec-

ondary, however, by % inch; of course, all coils are wound in the same direction.

With our coil completed, the next step is the layout. Any size of panel may be used—




Fig. 2. Layout showing fixed set of coils.

to conform with the regular receiver dimensions if desired—but I should suggest a 7x12 as being about right. Two variable condensers are used with this circuit, one of .00015 mfd for tuning, and a larger one, .0005 mfd, for regeneration. The former should mount at the left hand side of the panel, the other balancing up at the right side. This layout is the most convenient for tuning, but can, of course, be varied to suit the individual taste without much harm being done. The coil, however, should not be mounted too closely to the condensers, and leads from it to the tube socket should be kept as short as possible. By referring to the diagram the circuit will be easily recognized as the standard 3-circuit tuner except for the substitution of a fixed coil and condenser control of regeneration in place of the usual movable tickler. A series condenser of .0001 mfd capacity is connected in the antenna circuit, and a grid condenser of like size should be used. The grid leak must be fairly high, say from 3 to 7 megohms, for best distance results. The radio frequency choke shown can be a Silver Marshall No. 275-one of the few real short wave chokes on the market-while the small sized antenna and grid condensers can be secured in the Sangamo and possibly other lines. Incidentally the Amco people make a fine tuning condenser with a maximum of .00014 to .00015, just the thing for secondary tuning. The tickler condenser may be of any cheap make, since losses in this circuit are not important. I have mentioned the names of products which happen to have come to my attention, simply as an aid in your selection. It is quite possible that other makes equally good are procurable, but be certain of their values and, above all, do not experiment with a cheap r.f. choke. There aren't any.

Now with our wiring complete, we come to the job of coupling juto our audio amplifier and of supplying juice to the short wave detector. This is done by using the base of an old defunct UX tube-and who hasn't at least one lying about?—and coupling into the detector socket of the broadcast receiver. The glass of the tube is broken, and the elements removed; then flexible wires are soldered to the two thick pins, which are the filament prongs, the wires being long enough to couple from the main receiving set to the short wave unit where they solder to the filament busses. Then, looking at the base of the ex-tube. bottom up, the left hand pin takes the third lead, the other end of which runs to the r.f. choke as shown. The remaining pin is not used; our purpose is to couple into the plate circuit of the detector stage, the grid being left open. The three flexible leads should be taped up and then, removing the detector tube from the broadcast receiver and plugging in the tube base connectorpresto, we have adapted the set to short waves.

Before we attempt any remarkable distance reception, however, it would be advisable to master thoroughly the tuning of the circuit. Some good make of vernier dial should be chosen, as the tuning is quite critical, and unless care is taken one will slide right over the station carrier. The set is always operated in the oscillating condition to pick up the carrier, but it should not be permitted to oscillate too violently. Turn the right hand condenser or regeneration control until the hiss just breaks in, then exploring with the tuning condenser for signals, the former should be adjusted slightly to keep it always just barely oscillating. When the station has been tuned in at maximum, the regeneration will be adjusted to just below the point of oscillation for greatest volume and clarity. The regular receiver, of course, plays no part in the tuning on short waves; it is only the audio frequency end of this which we are using.

Well, there's the starting dope; it will cost you less than \$10 to build the unit described, and its simplicity should encourage

many incipient enthusiasts who have been deterred from experimenting on their own heretofore by the assumed complications of installation of a separate short wave receiver. It is just a plug-in job with this unit, and when you've discovered for yourself what's going on in the lower bands I prophesy the detector socket will come in for a lot of wear and tear. Let us hear of your results—and, oh yes, before closing—a 199 usually makes the best short wave tube, while an antenna not more than 65 feet over all is about right; an indoor one will do if no other is available.

A list of short wave stations now operating is given below and is fairly complete. The times are all Pacific standard, and except in very poor locations most of the locals listed will, I am sure, be added to your regular logs in a short while.

RADIO INTERFERENCE CAMPAIGN

Broadcast Weekly

Investigation of radio interference and the campaign to reduce such interference is under way again, according to W. J. Aschenbrenner, secretary of the Pacific Radio Trade Association, under whose auspices the work is being carried on. After a lapse of several months the campaign has again reopened but on an enlarged scale.

Heretofore investigations were confined to the city of San Francisco but under the new plan the East Bay region will be included as well.

The campaign will be carried on jointly by the Pacific Radio Trade Association, the Pacific Gas & Electric Co., Great Western Power Co., Key System Transit Co., and the Southern Pacific Co.

Radio listeners experiencing radio interference are advised to send their complaints to the Pacific Radio Trade Association, 284 Chronicle Building, phone Garfield 6214, and not to the above named utility companies. This will obviate delay.

N. E. Borch has been employed to act as investigator. Upon receipt of a complaint by the Association, the investigator will call and determine the cause of interference. thereafter advising the agency at fault and asking the latter to remove or remedy the

Investigations will cost the radio listener nothing. The work is being carried on and financed by the radio industry and the public utility companies as their contribution to the radio public.

The real "secret" of making a one-tube receiving set "reach out" is to make it so efficient that there is practically no loss in the set. Radio sets were in existence for many years before it occurred to some bright individual that "low-loss" parts were the solution to the problem of making a super-efficient single-tube set. That was several years ago; but the rule still holds good. If a low-loss, three-circuit tuner (untuned primary, secondary, and tickler) and low-loss variable condensers are used, and the wiring done carefully, the resistance of the tuning circuit will be very slight, which will result in much louder signals and a set that is positively amazing in its sharpness of tuning.

Judge Sykes for a term of four years was confirmed by the Senate.

What this amazing proposition means is that the Commission would continue its work for another year with the certainty that at the end of that period all its members would be unceremoniously kicked out of office, and an entirely new body, totally unacquainted with the situation, would be appointed.

There is immediate and urgent need for prompt action. In the main, both the Senate and the House have listened only to those who had grievances against the Commission, and whose cases were so weak that they did not dare to appeal to the Courts in the manner provided by law. It is high time for everyone interested in radio who, while they may question the wisdom of any of the individual actions of the Commission believe that adequate Federal control is an absolute necessity for the future of radio. to make themselves heard.

The National Association of Broadcasters has done its utmost to present to the Senators and Congressmen the views of its members. The members themselves, and their listeners. must now take a hand.

Whatever changes in the present broadcasting situation may be desirable, the essential thing is to have the administration of the law in the hands of an executive body capable of administering it. The continuation of the Federal Radio Commission for another year, the confirmation of its members, the prompt appointment of a member from the second zone, and the removal of the threat of discharge at the end of another year, are absolutely essential if radio broadcasting is not to return to the condition in which it was a year ago.

There are only a very few weeks before the 15th of March, when, if no action is taken, the Commission becomes merely an Appellate body. Every week of delay means further danger. The time to get in touch with Senators and Congressmen and urge immediate action now.






