A BIG HELLO TO ALL CB'ERS IN THE U.K. AND WORLDWIDE.

The main subject of this months contact is 'The Legal Rig'. Well today NO C.B. is legal in the U.K. Plans are happening, it is HOPED to legalise C.B. on F.M. spec. 15th October, but against this the powers that be now admit 2½ million C.B.'ers in the U.K. and that Taiwan will still hold the market for C.B. — Britain will loose BUT if they allowed US C.B.'ers 3 million x whatever £.

NOW THEN, many so called legal rigs (F.M.) are pictured existing sets re-labeled — watchout. The legal rigs will appear when government spec. is confirmed. Taiwan will take 50 hours to produce to the new specification when confirmed. Sets will show a stamp confirming legal specs. It is not in practical terms possible to convert existing A.M. sets to the British proposed F.M. SO BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU BUY. British F.M. will not allow you to sideband and no chance of using a burner (Will you bin your S.S.B. sets???). A.D.S. of Blackpool was able to import and sell American 27MHz C.B.'s but you are not allowed to use them. 27MHz A.M. at this point in time remains ILLEGAL. However, A.D.S. of Blackpool is all geared up for the new spec. THUMBS up to BRITISH INDUSTARY with the go for C.B. in U.K.

Once you know where you are with your Rig gain some professional advise on your twig. A good thing for us here in the U.K. is that we have strict manufacturing specs. not always the same in America — JUST WHAT IS YOUR TWIG CAPABLE OF.

If you are new to C.B. then we strongly advise you that you buy your goods from a shop capable of expert advice and who can help you.

The only thing that stops me from going down on all my good buddies and good ladys is I'd lose too many good friends.





Well good buddies since we started this magazine our aim as been to be your magazine AND WE ARE. We have toured the U.K. and met with all of you C.B.'ers. There have been big brutish types to gorgous dolls, many with the same views and some with opinions of their own and each and everyone of you has that right. We give anyone of you space in your magazine. With this in mind I consider it right to point out some firm facts so that we all have the same base from which we grow our opinion.

27 MHz A.M. IS ILLEGAL IN THIS COUNTRY

On this basis straight 40 or Side Banders have no rights over anyone else or each other. As we have said before 'keep the peace'.

C.B.'ers are and should be as one let us never forget the rules from which C.B. started and promoted its good use.

You must not use a CB:-

- (1) In connection with any activity which is against the law;
- (2) To transmit obscene, indecent or profane words, language or meaning;
- (3) To interfere intentionally with the communications of another CB station;
- (4) To transmit one-way communications, except for emergency communications, traveller assistance, brief tests (radio checks) or voice paging;
- (5) To transmit music, whistling, sound effects or any material to amuse or entertain;
- (6) To transmit any sound effect solely to attract attention:
- (7) To transmit the word "Mayday" or any other international distress signal, except when your station is located in a ship, aircraft, or other vehicle which is threatened by trave and imminent danger and you are requesting immediate assistance;
- (8) To transmit a false or deceptive communication;
- (9) Never key the mike (push the mike switch), unless you intend to transmit (OR you are checking SWR). Keying the mike without talking produces an unmodulated or "dead" carrier, and will effect signals of any nearby transmitter.
- (10) Never Ratchet or Break on Channel 9. Preserve this Channel for emergency and assistance calls only. Who knows the next plea for help may be yours!
- (11) Always listen before transmitting.
- (12) Try to limit conversation, wherever possible, during busy periods, find out what you want to know then give someone else a break!

Now bringing you more up to date: The only legally accepted rigs will be those with the U.K. stamp (C.B. 27/81) (C.B. 934/81).



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
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DXingDXing

Now that C.B. Radio has really taken off in the U.K., breakers are forever increasing, the price of rigs has dropped dramatically over the last two years and because of the now 'legal' sets being imported from Europe. Ireland. Isle of Man, and the States, breakers as young as 14 and 15 are being able to purchase 40 channel rigs for as little as £45.00. Less than half the price two years ago, and so because of this the airwaves are full of 14 year old breakers asking for a 10-36 every couple of minutes or men wanting to talk to "Sexy female Breakers" and invariably clamming up when they get one, or just somebody keying the mike and not saying anything and so upsetting breakers within a three mile radius, thus upsetting his out-going signal.

This is why more and more people are turning from the straight forty channel rigs to 120 channel rigs with sideband.

S.S.B. means single side band, the members in my own club have changed the format slightly to serious sideband, and over the next few months I will be introducing to you various achievements that can be obtained when switching your rig to upper and lower sideband.

Obviously to achieve good results you will need a decent antenna for DXing and I suggest you pick going Home Base rather than mobile as efforts to talk to countries like S. Africa and Australia and the like can be increased by buying an antenna with D.B. gain, such as Sigma IV or, if you can really afford it an element beam or Quad, which is obviously going to give you better results.

To explain what D.B. gain is, supposing you bought an antenna with 3 D.B. gain (D.B. stands for decibels, which is how gain is measured) you would have the power equivalent of running almost double your R.F. output. The beam antenna focuses its energy in a narrow beam with the use of elements. The gain in these is reflected at the expense of energy that may have been lost going in all directions, so in short, don't be fooled by the name of the antenna, judge it by its D.B. gain, another thing also to note is to decide whether you want omni or directional.

Omni-directional antennas such as Silver Rod or Shakespeare Big Stick would give equal coverage over all directions while a beam antenna would give you a longer range but only in one line and so a T.V. Rttater would be needed, so you can point your signal in whatever direction you want.

Now, having assumed that your sideband rig is ready and your antenna is connected we will now say you are ready to talk shop, a phrase used by Americans, meaning literally a signal that skips from one place to another.

DXingDXing

To understand skip really you need to know how radio waves travel, like beams of light in a straight line, depending on the season and temperature of the earth, a layer of atmosphere called the ionisphere is made up from energy from the sun and could be situated 25-250 miles above the earths surface.

The radio waves reflected the same way a mirror reflects a beam of light. Depending on how light the ionisphere depends on how far you can skip talk. If these layers are strongly charged by the sun, signals may bounce off, hit the earth and bounce back again, increasing the distance all the time.

On the conventional C.B. Radio the signal may bounce about 500 miles or more.

Skip talk is normally best at this time of the year between about 6.00 p.m. -1.00 a.m. or mid-morning-mid-afternoon which is when at this time of the year stations in South Africa and the Middle East are heard quite strongly. It is now quite apparent that American stations are becoming stronger at this time of year.

Sun-spots on the suns surface affects how frequently skip stays — the more sun-spots there are, the better the skip. The sun-spots on the sun go up and down every 11 years, the peak in the last cycle was last year, and although this will die off in the next 4-5 years do not think that having bought all this equipment you will not be able to talk to anyone until 1991.

In next months article I will try and explain how to get out that bit further with the aid of 'Linear Amplifiers' or "boots" as they are affectionally called.

I hope that "A.M." users will come over to using Sideband rigs so join in the wonderful world of DXing now being experienced by DXers all over the country and for those who are interested I will give you a typical conservation that may occur between say a station in England and someone in America, giving an example of how to speak, the codes used etc., thereby striking up a friendship with somebody over 7,000 miles away.

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Row a Boat to the Isle

THE sponsored row to Northern Ireland by the I.O.M. CB clubs didn't go exactly according to plan, the idea was to row from Peel, I.O.M. to Portaferry in a recently repaired and repainted Viking Festival longboat. The crew set sail from Peel at 4 am on the morning of the 25th of July with the support vessel the Suzakie close behind, unfortunately, despite making reasonable progress the wind suddenly changed direction and after a period of four hours at the oars they had to be towed back into Peel harbour. At this stage it was realised that the prevailing winds (south westerlies and westerlies) were blowing in the opposite direction and a better attempt could be made if they attempted the route the other way round (i.e. from Ireland back to Peel).

The following morning they decided to try again, and at 9.30 the Sea Dragon left Peel harbour, uncerimoniously being towed across to Ireland by a fishing vessel (Sea Vaux), on the crossing problems started to arise when the Sea Dragon started to spring leaks due to the speed at which they were travelling and during the row from the mouth of Stangford Lough to Portaferry the Sea Dragon nearly sank, but the enthusiastic crowds which greeted them on arrival soon bucked their spirits up.



That night as guests of the Portaferry Yacht Club they were treated to a slap up meal, also a raffle was held which raised £29,50 towards the fund and Superski from the Susakie won the star prize (a three foot long

cuddly tiger) which he handed over to an eight-year-old in the club. The crew were also presented with a cheque from the Shamrock Breakers DX Club for a total of £58.00.

The following morning the damage to the boat was repaired, while the rest of the crew went on a sightseeing trip, and at 10.00 pm they left Portaferry, aided by an outgoing tide they made good progress to the mouth of the lough, but upon reaching the open sea the problems of the day before once again cropped up with the wind speed decreasing to zero. So the oars came out yet again, this time the crew being determined to make the crossing.

However 12 miles out into the Irish Sea the wind together with their luck changed for the worst as the slight easterly became first a strong southerly and then a northerly, blowing them ten miles south and north respectively. In this near hopeless situation they slowly headed for the Mull of Galloway in a force six gale. After all the trouble they had gone to together with the problems of the day before they decided that the only way they were ever going to achieve Peel harbour was with the assistance of a tow and when a fishing boat appeared the chance was just to good to miss. As Keith Crompton explained "The lives of the crew were far more important than rowing all the way back."

The ailing Sea Dragon was then towed to the mouth of Peel harbour, and by then the men who had been continuously rowing now for 21 hours managed the last few hundred yards under their own steam, still against the wind and the flow of the river.

The large crowd that had gathered on the harbour cheered them to their berth alongside the harbour bridge where they were greeted by the Peel Commissioners chairman, Mr. Harry Kelly. Despite all the set backs the sponsors still decided that the venture was a success, and still worth the money given.

The crew of the Sea Dragon would like to thank publicly the members of the Portaferry Yacht Club for their hospitality, Bob Barnes in the Suzakie for his support and Kings College for the loan of the oars used on the journey. One cannot say that a good time was had by all but the effort and energy put into the event did none the less achieve its goal.

This attitude of the B.B.C. is consistent with the problems that the Group Citizens Band experienced with their releases, let us hope that when C.B. is finally legalised that the B.B.C. will relent.



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FM from ISLE OF MAN

The U.K. Market is now being flooded by British specification F.M.40 channel C.B. transceivers. Some of which are being manufactured by Turmann Models Limited in the Isle of Man. This is made possible due to a loophole created by trade agreements with the Isle of Man. Section 7 of the Wireless Telegraphy Act prohibiting the manufacture of C.B. transceivers does not apply in the Isle of Man, this enables Turmann Models to manufacture the new F.M. sets.

These sets are in turn distributed throughout the United Kingdom by a well known company in Blackpool.

Various models are available, A.M. and F.M., brand names include Lake, Cobra, Superstar, C.B. Master, Wagner, Colt, Midland, Hy-Gain, Motorola, Ham International and President, but unfortunately all sets cannot be used until legalisation which Turmann Models anticipate will be sometime during the Winter of 1981/82.

The same system has made it possible for thousands of breakers in the United Kingdom to own an A.M. C.B. set legally without fear of confiscation. (This system is still available so long as the set is not put to use).

At present distributors are being appointed by this Blackpool Company throughout Northern Ireland, Scotland, England and Wales, who, in turn, will be able to offer local breakers in their area the chance to be: **ITHE FIRST ON THE AIR***



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


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RIG REVIEW.

The rig to be put through its paces this month is the COLT 444. As soon as I saw this rig I immediately fell in love with it (I'm kinky that way) as contained in a very compact and good looking case is everything any breaker is likely to need, apart from sideband.


The COLT 444 is a 120 channel mobile A.M./F.M. transceiver with up to 10 watts R.F. output. The 120 channels consists of 3 bands of forty channels any of which can be used in A.M. or F.M. mode. Mid-band is the usual forty channels found on straight 40 rigs. High-band contains forty channels above Mid-band, and Low-band consists of another forty channels below Mid-band. This arrangement is much better than most other 120 channel rigs which have all but 11 channels of their High-band inside the 28 MHz Amateur band which cannot be used. The frequencies range from 26.515 MHz (Ch. 1 – Low Band) to 27.855 MHz (Ch. 40 – High Band). Power output can be set to 0.5 watts, 5 watts or 10 watts using the switch on the front panel, the lower power positions being selected to cut down 'bleed-over' on your neighbours rig (or TV).

Although the COLT 444 is illegal to use in just about every country you can think of, it is very popular and it's no wonder, the 10 watts and abundance of channels makes for a good range capability, whilst the ability to reduce power and use F.M. makes it ideal for those plagued with T.V.I.




(or your pens) to write about those happy events (no not babies), just little happenings to cheer me up and keep me gay . . . (gay as in happy). Now that I've reminded




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
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To the Editor!

Well done to that and ALL clubs which raise money for charities and help out disabled people.




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

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 - b) The radioactive toxic explosive or other hazardous properties of any explosive nuclear assembly or nuclear component thereof.
- 13. Losses due to defective design and specification.
- 14. Loss, destruction, damage or liability occasioned by pressure waves caused by aircraft or other aerial device travelling at sonic or supersonic speeds.
- 15. Electrical and mechanical breakdown.
- 16. Radios or equipment in soft top vehicles.
