Dear BOTS

With the government moving ever closer to legalising CB radio on FM I agree with your article in the Sept. issue of BOTS "Rough and Duff" that education is the key to better modulations. The question that I ask myself however, is "What is the fear that CB breakers have of FM" as a Radio Instructor in H.M. Forces for many years I operated on both forms of modulation and found that the operators that knew how to handle their equipment, and understood antenna theory to some degree had little to fear and their signals got through.

For the information of my fellow breakers, FM was developed by the late Major Edwin Howard Armstrong in the 1930's its intended use was for High-Fidelity, noise-free radio broadcasting. However, it also proved superior in many communications applications.

The distance at which FM stations can be received is somewhat greater than the "Radio Horizon", usually less than 100 miles, because of the characteristics of VHF waves.

The distance at which AM stations can be received varies between Day and Night as well as seasonally.

So as far as distance and noise free modulations are concerned we will be high and dry on FM what we will have to watch is "Channel Interference", The 27 Mhz CB Channels are spaced only 10 kHz apart. The Band occupancy of the AM Transmitters used on these channels is around 6 to 8 kHz, allowing a small guard space between channels.

If -5 kHz Narrowband FM were used, there would be no guard space between channels. (T.V. uses both AM and FM).

In the past I have found my fellow breakers to be in general pretty tolerent so if we are forced to use FM and you do observe some interference do not go shouting into your mike "I am being walked on" and give up or just flick to another channel, First try moving your "Wrapper" or your "Twig" if this does not work then flick, if for some reason all the channels are busy then "Wait" or better still give a "Breaker on the side" and if asked join in.

As far as Legal CB goes my opinion is better a legal system (although limited) than none at all.

WHAT MORE CAN BE SAID ABOUT C.B. IN BRITAIN

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
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DXingDXing

Last month 1 covered Antennas, this month 1 would like to briefly go over Linear amplifiers or boots. It must be said though that however useful they may be to the DXer they are strictly illegal (more so that the use of C.B.) and they are also a damned nuisance to A.M. users in the same area. It is already accepted that 12 watts P.E.P. on sideband will bleed over the A.M., however pushing out 100 watts or more can be quite annoying. In these cases take a few tips before actually switching it on.

Firstly, the homebase user can purchase anything up to 1000 watts. Most DXers normally buy 200 watts Bremi's or Zetagi's but it is no use you throwing out 200 hundred watt on sideband when there is no skip around. No matter how far your signal may travel, a signal has to be there to receive this end. The great problem that faces all home base stations is TVI, well as you can imagine, this will increase when "burning" thereby upsetting your neighbours even more, because no matter how many filters or ferite rings you may fit to your set up, you will still bleed over Coronation Street or Match of the Day. It only takes the wrong sort of neighbour and you stand to lose a lot of expensive equipment. So remember, when using your boots make sure it is outside TV viewing hours because the man next door has paid for his tele' licence.

With the mobile user the same thing applies, except the only other disadvantage to mobile burners and these range from 30 to 300 watts is that they will drain the battery very quickly. So use a heavy duty battery and when you get home put in on charge again. Another piece of equipment that is a must, and also makes the set up look more impressive is a SWR metre with built in antenna matcher tuner, capable of reacting to however many watts you intend to push through it. They are not too expensive, ranging from £8.00 to £28 or thereabouts. The tuner you should use when burning because when using extra power you will find that the SWR reading will go from 1.1-1 to almost 2.5-3 depending what freq' you are on and how many watts you are pushing. Full instructions are included, but a word with your local CB stockist will ensure you are put right.

Having now looked at Antennas and Linears another good subject is Microphones, and next month I will go into the different types there are available and best to use.

Now you are ready to talk on sideband, please take one very important piece of advice: forget the 10 code, I will explain why a bit later.

Firstly you will need to give yourself a station name or callsign. This you would call your sideband handle, and will consist of letters and sometimes numbers. A station in a foreign speaking country will not understand you if you say you are the Gin Lady or Woodpecker. However taking the first letters of your personal name or AM handle one would be known as the Golf Lima or whatever. If you turn to the back of the magazine you will see the phonetic alphabet, this is used all over the world by radio operators. Sometimes the local DXing club will asign you a call sign like Echo India which is short for English International followed by a number. Once a call sign has been decided you will be ready to talk skip. Remember there is no set breaking channel for sideband and DXing. Start off by checking the frequency you have chosen to call on is not busy, then call out, CQ CQ CQ DX. CQ simply means seek you and DX means distance copy. I will now give you briefly how a QSO with a station in America would go.

"CQ CQ CQ DX the station Bravo Tango 242 in the south of England calling CQ DQ. I am QTX and standing by"

DXingDXing

"CQ that station in England, do you copy the Unit 36 QTH New York USA back to you" Notice how the Q code is now being used, this is code that was originated by radio hams years ago and is a world recognised code, a full copy of the Q code is in the back of the mag. Please get familiar with it. The 10 code is not used, simply because foreign stations will now know what a 10-20 is as opposed to QTH nor is 10-4 10-4 used, the correct wording would be Roger. Now back to the QSO Roger Unit 36 in New York, I do read you my friend, My personal is Phil, like PAPA HOTEL INDIA LIMA. Is that a Roger Back to you.

"No problem there Phil, we have you on Santiago 4 & Radio". What has happened here is that Unit 36 has told Phil what his signal reading is. Santiago means signal and Radio means Readability. It is determined the same as poundage and modulation would be on AM. S2 R1 would be a bad copy but S9 R5 is perfect, so Phil has done quite well S4 R4. Unit 36 will then exchange his personal name and the two countries would then enjoy a QSO with each other describing setups, family, jobs, and hobbies. The question of swapping co-ordinates for exchange QSL will undoubtedly be mentioned. Co-ordinates is a sideband term for address and QSL means to confirm the QSL in writing. Next month I will go into how to QSL with other stations and what to send the person at the other end. Co-ordinates will normally consist of a PO Box number then the City and City No. or postal code. It might be a good idea to have with you a supply of scrap paper and a couple of pens handy. Once you have the a.d. repeat them back so as to show your new friend that you have understood him.

By now other stations will be waiting to talk to Phil or the guy in America so it would be best to end the QSO, it might also be there is QRM coming over on the frequency.

"O.K. Phil, I have QRM on this end so I will wish you and your family all the best 73's and 55's from this end my friend and I look forward to meeting you again on frequency Phil. Chow Chow and the station Unit 36 in New York will be standing by for your finals." Certainly not "Yeah right o mate, 10 10 till we do it again, we up we down whoosh we gone".

Phils finals will be similar and then just as on AM take a standby for the next "trip abroad". Well there you have a rough idea on how to DX, but just remember these few tips:-

- 1. Be polite do not swear.
- 2. Only use the Q code not the 10 code.
- 3. Do not break into another QSO.
- 4. There is no breaking channel on sideband.
- 5. Always use the phonetic alphabet when spelling.
- Here is the R S Code
- R1 Unreadable.
- R2 Barely few words distinguishable.
- R3 Readable but with difficulty.
- R4 Readable with hardly any difficulty.
- R5 Perfect readability.

- S1 Faint signal, barely perceptible.
- S2 Very weak signals.
- S3 Weak signals. S4 Fair signal.
- S4 Fair signal. S5 Fairly acod sia
- S5 Fairly good signal. S6 Good signal.
- So Good Signal. S7 Moderately strong signal.
- S8 Strong signal.
- S9 Extremely strong signal.

Thats it then for this month, I hope between now and next month you will be successful in your DXing. Any questions or QSL cards you may wish to swap, please send them to me at PO Box 14 Godalming Surrey. Until then this is the DUKE station Bravo Bravo 001 saying 73 and 51 I am QRT.

"What was a Belcher, Dad?"

"Well, we used to cruise the channels above channel 40 looking for sidewinders. When we found one, we would key up on top of him. I did the belching and the other buddies would come on with the bad language stuff, until the sidewinders went down." "Who won the War, Dad?"

"Nobody, Son. We all got busted."

"By the Home Office, Dad?"

"No Son, by half a dozen sidewinders who were waiting in the pub carpark. When they'd finished putting the boot in, the Fuzz came and booted the lot of us all over the street."

The above imaginary conversation would have looked stupid even six months ago, because there was not all that much AM above channel 40. Now there is AM everywhere and the sideband DXers are NOT happy. Neither would you be if you had spent lots of loot on a good rig and a big twig, only to have your weak copies nicely screwed up by some plank keying up on AM.

It is not all one way either. Sideband has been heard tearing up channel 19 and other bits of the Straight 40.

Its not long since we said that breaker v. breaker was a possible outcome of legal CB, but even before legal CB the aggro and bucketmouthing has started. Willie must be chuffed by it too.

He and the Buzby boys would be quite happy to have breakers wiping one another out. What we can do to stop it is another matter.

AM versus SSB is a tough problem, because to the AM operator Sideband is a load of gibberish. To the SSB Dxer, AM is an earsplitting whistle that ruins weak copies. The two modes are incompatible and even if one of them (AM) is obsolete, there's a lot of around; more sets are being fired up every day. If only AM could be kept below channel 50, say, and sideband above, that would be OK. But all the aggro on the straight 40 has driven lots of AM operators way above 50 already, which is understandable if you earwig the offensive stuff down below, eg. bucketmouth parties, gay channels etc.

There is only one solution to all this. PLEASE LISTEN BEFORE you key up. If you hear a weak signal in there, look for another channel. How would you like to have your weak copy blasted off the band by an inconsiderate plank? Too many breakers think its OK to key up anywhere they fancy.

The public image of CB has been shredded by increasing TVI. Now its being shredded by the aggro and bucketmouth fighting between breakers arguing who or what should happen on channel 59. And we thought CB was about communication! No-one has a right to monopolize a channel, certainly not above 40.

Finally those of you who have heard the Stateside CBer effing away at British breakers, on channel 72 sideband will realise how much damage one man can do to the reputation of a whole country. Local or DX, bucketmouthing is bad news. You can't expect any co-operation from a breaker you just told to "---- off my channel".


If CB is about co-operation and many people think it is, then considerate, polite use of the airwaves must be the rule.

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ANTENNA FARMING

The antenna system is the only really critical item you have. If they can't hear you, they won't talk to you. A few common difficulties are set out below in question and answer form:

- Q. I dare'nt use an outdoor antenna. Can I put one in the loft?
- A. Yes, but be prepared for trouble. There is usually mains wiring up there; also perhaps TV aerials and plumbing.
- Q. Why do they matter?
- A. Two reasons: a) They may detune your antenna, causing a mismatch to the feeder; b) Much more serious, they will pick up your signal and carry it all over the house. Its a good way to get TVI into the neighbours sets.
- Q. What can I do about the TVI?
- A. Braidbreaker filters on the cable at the back of the telly sets may fix the TVI, but if its on the mains wiring too, you will need fernite chokes on the power lead to the TV as well. There's no guarantee of success if the incoming CB signals are strong, and they will be!
- Q. Why is an outdoor twig better?
- A. Two reasons: a) its further from the TV sets; b) its less likely to be affected by proximity to mains wires etc.
- Q. You mentioned a mismatch. Whats that?
- A. I wish you hadn't asked that. To avoid undue complications, just treat it as incompatibility between antenna and feeder cable. It can be slight incompatibility up to virtually total incompatibility or anything in between.
- Q. You say its between twig and feeder cable. Is that at the twig end of the cable, or at the rig end?
- A. You are thinking that we put the SWR meter at the rig end to measure the mismatch. In fact you can have a mismatch at both ends of the feeder cable.
- Q. Yowie! How do you make that out?
- A. Murphy's law applies. If your antenna is not matched to the feeder, its odds on that your feeder will not be exactly the right length to give a good match at the rig end. If it is, you are lucky, very lucky.
- Q. My buddy says you can match the twig by pruning the cable at the rig end. Is he right?
- A. No. Nothing you do at the rig end will change a mismatch at the other end, (at the antenna). To fix that you have to adjust the antenna somehow.
- Q. But pruning my feeder by four feet brought the SWR down, so what about that one, smartipants?
- A. All you did you to find a feeder length that transformed the mismatch at one end to a near-match at the other end. Pure luck!
- Q. If I get a good SWR at the rig, who cares about the mismatched antenna?
- A. Nobody, if the mismatch is small, say an SWR of 2 to 1. When the mismatch is high, the losses on the feeder cable itself become important. Remember the object of a good match between antenna and feeder is to dump as much power in the antenna as possible. Also you get bandwidth problems.

- Q. Whats bandwidth?
- A. Bandwidth is the number of channels you can use either side of minimum SWR without running into trouble. CB antennas usually tune fairly sharply, especially if they are physically small. As you move away from the reasant frequency of the antenna the mismatch to the feeder increases fast. That in turn is transferred to the rig end of the cable and shows up as an SWR increase. It may show up in rig overheating if the rig cannot dump its signal power into the mismatched cable.
- Q. Phew, that was a mouthful! Are there any broadband CB antennas?
- A. Yes. Full size groundplanes are good, as a rule. So are cream antennas such as the cubicle quad.
- Q. Is the quad better than a groundplane?
- A. For working mobiles in the area, NO. For skip working, it is a flamethrower. Groundplanes radiate equally badly in all directions, but its the kind of signal radiation needed for local copies.
- Q. How efficient is the average DV27 compared with a full size groundplane?
- A. On its reasant frequency, or very near it, there is not much difference. But the groundplane will perform just as well over more channels, a lot more in fact.
- Q. Why is it called a groundplane?
- A. Because it has its own built in earth system, the radials at the bottom end. That means you can shove it up in the air and forget the need for an earth connection. Very useful!
- Q. What happens if I put a DV27 on the chimney stack?
- A. Those things are designed to use the wrapper body as the earth connection. Shove the twig up on its own and you have instant mismatch. It needs an earth.
- Q. You mean it needs radials?
- A. Yes, at least one, preferably four.
- Q. Can I use the real earth, by putting the twig out in the garden with an earth rod under it?
- A. Yes, but it will be lossy indeed. The real earth is a desperately bad conductor, so its a good idea to use radial wires laid on the ground and fastened securely to the twig earth terminal, (the braid of the feeder cable).
- Q. My SWR does not vary very much from channel 1 to channel 80. That seems pretty good to me. What do you think?
- A. Bet your signals are a bit 10-1! If your SWR is that flat you must have significant losses somewhere. I'd be looking for bad cable, bad joints, or a faulty antenna, or all three.
- Q. My SWR is OK at channel 23, but about 3 to 1 at channel 4 or at channel 38. I want to be able to operate anywhere in the CB band. What can I do?
- A. Easy; get yourself a good antenna tuning unit. Put it between the SWR meter and the antenna feeder, NOT between meter and rig! (Yes, people do that). Then you can set up for a 1 to 1 perfect match wherever you fancy operating on the band.
- Q. What happens to the mismatch when I use an A.T.U.?
- A. Nothing at all. However, the rig sees a perfect match so it delivers maximum power. The ATU transforms the perfect match until it is compatible with the mismatch at the end of the feeder, so the power (minus a few per cent losses) is shoved into the feeder and sent to the antenna.
- Q. But there is a mismatch at the antenna end -you said so!
- Right on, baby! But as long as the mismatch is not too bad (like the antenna has several feet missing) there will be nothing to worry about. Even cheap feeder cable will stand hideous voltages without breakdown. You can push hundreds of whiskies down a mismatched cable if you are careful to use an ATU at the rig end, (to protect the rig).

ANTENNA FARMING contd.

- Q. The top end of my groundplane got bent by a passing 747. Should I straighten it out?
- A. Don't waste your time. Only if it drops off altogether do you need to fix it. The sharp end of any twig has practically no current flowing in it, because there is nowhere for it to go to.
- Q. Does that mean I can chop the end off?
- A. No, because even if it carries no current it is still part of the total length needed to hit the CB frequencies.
- Q. I have worked out from what you said earlier that mobile operation means trouble. What twig is best?
- A. As big as you can get. The bigger the twig the more channels you can use without high SWR trouble. I have never yet managed to use an ATU to SWR a twig on the M1. The less you need to fiddle with when driving the safer it is.
- Q. I want to use a small, non-sus mobile twig. Is that possible?
- A. Yes, but stay close to the channel with lowest SWR if you want to avoid screwing up your rig. Operating it into a bad mismatch can cause all sorts of troubles like feedback, distortion, overheating and even transister burnout.
- Q. I cannot get the SWR below about 5 to 1, even with an ATU. Any ideas?
- A. Yes; you have a problem. Next question please!
- Q. Stop being a plank. What do I have to do to sort it out?
- A. Start at the beginning and take one step at a time, as follows: a) check every cable connection for a faulty joint or even a short circuit; b) check that the cable goes from rig to SWR meter to ATU to twig, in that order; c) check the twig for bad joints or faulty assembly. If in doubt get a friend to check it too. Take nothing for granted, not even the SWR meter, because you might have connected it back-to-front, or it may even be a dud. Assuming everything is OK, try again, after reading the ATU instruction sheet! If its still no joy, then you have still got a fault to trace. The best bet when all seems lost is not to panic, but to start being dead logical. Try substituting the various patch cables with cables that are known to be OK. Same with the SWR meter and the ATU. Something has to be wrong, even if it turns out to be the bit between your ears. We all make mistakes
- Q. The new legal CB antenna has a maximum length of 1.5 metres and can only have a loading coil at the feeder end. How will it work?
- A. With difficulty. Base loading coil plus short length equals inefficiency and narrow bandwidth.
- Q. How can we use the legal twig?
- A. Probably only on a wrapper or with some radials; some sort of earth return will be needed.
- Q. Will existing twigs be illegal?
- A. Only most of them. That is the idea, good bud!
- Q. Sounds like they want to cut the range down to zero, doesn't it?
- A. EXACTLY.



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
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REACT United Kingdom

REACT UK is an independent, non-profit, non-political Public Service organisation and amongst the purposes of this system are, to develop and administer public information projects to demonstrate and publicise the potential benefits and proper use of future CB Radio Services to individuals, organisations, industry and government, also to encourage participation in citizens crime prevention programmes where established by the law enforcement agencies when legalisation of CB radio has been enacted.

During 1981, Citizens Band Radio will be in full official operation and therefore with even a single motorist in communication with his own base station, two-way radio for motorist assistance will have begun.

All over the country, base stations as well as mobiles will form a network of twoway communication for the average citizen interested in this form of 'airwave' information.

CB Clubs are already in full swing and have been for some considerable time throughout the United Kingdom and in themselves form part of every community. They operate as a unit with the best interests of CB radio at heart. Many clubs support charities and carry out charitable work.

With the eventual legalisation of a two-way radio system in this country, an emergency organisation will swing into full effect, this organisation is REACT UK, the officially recognised emergency body which, throughout it's existence in the UK, has maintained a strictly legal position, thereby gaining the respect of the various official statutory authorities. This position will be strictly adhered to and only when the legalisation date is announced, will REACT UK begin to operate it's emergency network of teams throughout the country. Every member of REACT UK respects and abides by this condition.

So, one asks – what is REACT.


RÉACT was formed in 1962 in the United States, it was quickly recognised and so formed a pattern for organised local emergency groups — as a result, in that year REACT (Radio Emergency Associated Citizen Teams) was founded.

In 1970 REACT joined with other interested parties in petitioning the Federal Communications Commission to establish an official emergency channel, this being channel 9. This was agreed by limiting the channel to "emergency communications involving the immediate safety of individuals or the immediate protection of property or communications necessary to render assistance to a motorist". Basically, the same ideals will operate in the UK, with amendments to suit local conditions. So far in the UK Channel 9 is regarded as the emergency channel and it is generally accepted that as other countries use this emergency channel, it will be used here as from 'D-Day'.

REACT UK is an entirely voluntary organisation, and is run and worked by volunteers. Individual teams agree to work a twenty-four hour monitoring system on Channel 9 as part of their agreement with National Headquarters. It requires all of its teams to monitor Channel 9 and all who need assistance are encouraged to call Channel 9. The key to this system will be the people who are monitoring, who will be ready to help at any time. The REACT concept works this way: The motorist (or indeed anyone) communicates his needs for assistance to the REACT monitor on CB channel 9. The monitor station contacts the proper service agency required by telephone, be it the Police, Fire Brigade, Ambulance or Road Service organisations. Once the call has been made and the service concerned is on the way to the incident, the REACT monitor advises the motorist (still on Channel 9) that help is on the way.

The monitor station records all calls in a monitor log which gives all the necessary and important information that will be required by any of the statutory authorities including the British Red Cross Society and the St. John's Ambulance Brigade. With training, each and every monitor station will be able to cope with any type of emergency, from a National disaster to a village dog fight.

Already, various County Emergency Planning Officers are negotiating with REACT UK concerning the radio coverage which can be given under wartime conditions. Base stations will be required from the County Hall level to the Districts, Urbans and Hamlets of the various Counties giving a lifeline to those in need of help and advice – a very important service in time of war. This could easily also be necessary in a national disaster.

There are a great many other services REACT UK will be able to give as it grows in strength, such as: road conditions, road hazards, diversions, serious traffic jams, road accidents, rail accidents, crime reports, missing persons and missing children, relay personal calls, vandalism, Hospital service, flood conditions, family emergencies, Red Cross and St. John's Ambulance affairs, and many more. Every possible assistance will be given to the Police whenever requested as it will be to other statutory services.

Since 1962, REACT Teams have handled over 60 million emergency calls including approximately 15 million road accidents and REACT members have provided over 21 million volunteer man-hours in public service activities.

A formal co-operative understanding exists between the American National Red Cross and REACT and it is possible that such an understanding will be agreed in this country and not only with the Red Cross but also the St. John's Ambulance. A large percentage of REACT Teams have already taken Red Cross and St. John's First Aid training courses and are now ready to provide emergency cover and communications co-ordinated through their Districts and Country Areas.

REACT UK is aware of the important part which often tends to get overlooked, and this is the encouragement of the handicapped, blind and elderly to join a local REACT UK team. So many of these folk arc unable to get around as much as they would like and their life, in many instances, is being housebound with nothing much to do. A local REACT UK team would welcome membership from these folk as it would give them an interest in life, help them to stop being bored and give them the satisfaction also that they too can help somebody in need. Being a monitor would give them a new lease of life.

Therefore to sum up in nine words: MONITORING IS THE MOST IMPORTANT FUNCTION OF REACT UK!

Our goal is 100% coverage, 24-hours a day. When this is achieved, you can travel anywhere in the United Kingdom and obtain help through your CB set at any time. Your monitoring will provide the service in the area. As more Teams perform the 24-hour monitoring function, more groups will want to develop it in additional areas. In this way, every effort made in monitoring will contribute to the 100% national coverage which we are striving to achieve.

The role of a REACT UK team member is to listen for emergency calls on Channel 9. Listen and report! The primary function is that of a receiving station, and the only response you may legally give is to emergency traffic and motorist's assistance on Channel 9, once CB has been legalised.


REACT UK can save lives – help protect property – help prevent crime – and will assist all the statutory authorities whenever and wherever possible.
